## ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD Regular Quarterly Meeting October 29, 2021

### **Minutes of Meeting**

The October 29, 2021, regular meeting of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was held via Zoom video conferencing. Chair Al Brodell called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, ADHE staff, members of the press, and guests were also present.

Chair Brodell began by thanking everyone for participating in the virtual meeting.

Agenda Item No. 1 Approval of Minutes

Keven Anderson moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Greg Revels seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

### Agenda Item No. 2 Appointment of Nominating Committee

Chair Al Brodell appointed members of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board nominating committee. The nominating committee will recommend Board officers for 2022-23 at the January 28, 2022, meeting. The members included Greg Revels (Chair), Graycen Bigger and Lori Griffin.

Chad Hooten moved to approve Agenda Item No. 2. Andy McNeill seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

## Agenda Item No. 3 Approval of 2022 Coordinating Board Meeting Schedule

The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board meets quarterly to act upon Board initiatives and to respond to campus proposals. Director Maria Markham noted that in lieu of social distancing measures, all AHECB Meetings would be held via Zoom until further notice.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board agrees to the following dates for regular quarterly meetings during 2022: January 28, April 29, July 29, and October 28.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Board expresses its appreciation for your patience during these challenging times and will continue to meet virtually in January, April, July, and October.

Chair Brodell asked if ADHE had any guidance or measures in place for in-person meetings. Dr. Markham said currently there are no measures in place.

Graycen Bigger moved to approve Agenda Item No. 3. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

### Agenda Item No. 4 Director's Report

#### ADHE Staff Changes

Terry Hunkapiller, Perkins Federal Program Manager, began on August 11.

Felexia Thomas, Program Advisor for Veterans Training, began on August 16.

Jamaal Gaines, Systems Specialist, began on September 7.

Starr Crow, Outreach and Events Officer, began on September 7.

Dr. Eric Flowers, New Assistant Director for Academic Affairs, began October 27.

#### Institutional Changes

Charles F. Robinson, Ph.D., provost and executive vice chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, was named interim chancellor on August 16, 2021.

#### School Closure

Vista College in Richardson, Texas closed on October 8; they had a branch campus in Fort Smith. The college offered associate degrees and certificates. There were 354 students at the Fort Smith campus at the time of the closure. ADHE has obtained their transcripts and are sending them out upon request. Several public colleges and universities have been in contact with Vista College students in hopes of salvaging their earned credits.

#### Career Pathways Initiative Update

Monieca West, CPI/Perkins Program Director, presented information on the Career Pathways initiative (CPI). The CPI program was created to help end the dependence of needy parents on government benefits by improving the educational and employment outcomes for TANF and TANF-eligible adults.

### Agenda Item No. 5 Report on Annual Review of Faculty Performance

The Annual Review of Faculty Performance was removed from the agenda.

## Agenda Item No. 6 Annual Status Report for Sexual Assault Prevention on Campus

Dr. Markham presented the Annual Status Report for Sexual Assault Prevention on Campus. Under Act 563 of 2017, the Higher Education Coordinating Board was directed to develop an action plan to address the prevention of sexual assault. ADHE has collected the annual campus status reports for the 2020–2021 academic year, as required by the legislation.

There were no questions.

### Agenda Item No. 7 Unplanned Pregnancy Prevention Annual Report

Dr. Markham presented the Unplanned Pregnancy Prevention Annual Report. Under Act 943 of 2015, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was directed to develop an action plan to address unplanned pregnancies on college campuses. In the uncodified portion of the legislation, the high rate of unplanned pregnancy among older teens of college age was addressed and institutions of higher education were called upon to act. ADHE has collected the campus implementation reports for 2020-2021.

Andy McNeill voiced concern regarding the number of non-academic reports ADHE is required to provide.

### Agenda Item No. 8 Rules Governing the Star-Spangled Banner Act

In compliance with Act 958 of 2021, the proposed rules to the Star-Spangled Banner Act are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the proposed rules presented in this agenda item for implementation of the Star-Spangled Banner Act.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or her designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the rules to implement the Star-Spangled Banner Act.

Keven Anderson asked if there were any consequences for violating this act or is it just a reporting request. Dr. Markham said violators would be reported to legislators as their only consequence. There are no provisions for enforcement.

Keven Anderson moved to approve Agenda Item No. 8. Greg Revels seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 9
Recognition of Institute as Non-Formula Unit by Arkansas Tech University

The administration and Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University (ATU) request official recognition of the Arkansas Tech Institute (ATI) as a non-formula unit of ATU.

As stated in House Bill 1287, the Act for the ATU appropriation for the 2021-2022 fiscal year, ATI "shall explore, develop, implement, and evaluate new and better ways to integrate the teaching, study and performance of business, engineering, emergency management, agriculture, healthcare, technical programs and computer science for academic, economic, and economic development purposes in Arkansas.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board recognizes the Arkansas Tech Institute as a non-formula unit of Arkansas Tech University.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board recognizes the Arkansas Tech Institute to offer noncredit credentials and that such authority will reside in the Arkansas Tech Institute as a non-formula unit of Arkansas Tech University. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to notify the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of this action.

Chief of Staff Dr. Mary Gunter and ATU Ozark Campus Chancellor Bruce Sikes, provided additional information.

Dr. Jim Carr asked if approval would help ATU acquire private grants and funding. Dr. Gunter said it would be very beneficial and enhance those efforts.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve Agenda Item No. 9. Andy McNeill seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

### Agenda Item No. 10 Report on Academic Program Deletions

Rachel Lewis provided summary and detailed information about academic program deletions at all Public Arkansas Colleges and Universities for the 2021 academic year. Colleges and universities deleted 64 programs in AY 2021 as compared to 80 in 2020, 108 deletions in 2019, 104 deletions in 2018, and 69 deletions in 2017. Of the 64 programs deleted in 2021, 2-Year Colleges deleted 39, while the 4-Year Universities deleted 25 programs.

Dr. Jim Carr expressed concern over the number of deleted health professions programs and asked if they were nursing programs. Ms. Lewis said they are not affiliated with nursing but are more administrative programs.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if the certificates of proficiencies were included in the funding formula and why so many were deleted. Ms. Lewis said they are included in the formula and typically programs are deleted because a newer STEM specific program replaced it, as well as program viability.

### Agenda Item No. 11 Annual Report on Credentials Awarded

Rachel Lewis presented summary and detailed information about credentials awarded. Arkansas higher education institutions overall experienced a slight increase of .2% in the number of credentials awarded in 2021 compared to 2020. There was an increase of 85 credentials awarded in 2021. The 4-year universities had an increase of .8%, while the 2-year colleges reported a slight decline from 2020 to 2021 of 1.5%. The private and independent colleges and universities reported an increase of 6.8% in the number of credentials awarded. Our Nursing Schools and Northwest Technical Institute experienced the largest percentage loss comparing 2020 to 2021 of almost 14%, said Lewis.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if ASU had any graduates from their Osteopathic Medicine program. Ms. Lewis said she would get the graduate information for Dr. Cash.

Dr. Jim Carr commended the institutions and ADHE staff for helping to increase the number of certificates and degrees awarded. An increase of almost 10 percent between 2017 and 2021.

## Agenda Item A Minority Masters Fellows Program Rules Repeal

The rules to the Minority Masters Fellows Program were presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for repeal.

**RESOLVED**, That the Minority Masters Fellows Program is no longer active and does not receive funding.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the repeal of the rules presented in this agenda item for the Minority Masters Fellows Program.

There were no questions.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve Agenda Item A. Keven Anderson seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

## Agenda Item B Minority Teacher Scholars Program Rules Repeal

The rules to the Minority Teacher Scholars Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for repeal.

**RESOLVED**, That the Minority Teacher Scholars Program is no longer active and does not receive funding.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the repeal of the rules presented in this agenda item for the Minority Teacher Scholars Program.

There were no questions.

Dr. Jerry Cash moved to approve Agenda Item B. Keven Anderson seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

## Agenda Item C Emergency Secondary Education Loan Rules Repeal

The rules to the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for repeal.

**RESOLVED**, That the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program is no longer active and does not receive funding.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the repeal of the rules presented in this agenda item for the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program.

There were no questions.

Greg Revels moved to approve Agenda Item C. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda item No. 12
Recommendation for Distribution of Productivity Funding for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education

A.C.A. §6-61-234 directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

This distribution recommendation results in a total request for new general revenue funds of \$7,425,742.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendation for distribution of productivity funding to the Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2022-23 fiscal year as included in Table 12B.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2022-23 productivity funding distribution recommendation of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That should any errors of a technical nature be found in this recommendation, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 12 to the full Board for consideration. Chad Hooten seconded and the committee approved.

### Agenda Item No. 13 Operating Recommendations for FY2022-23

A.C.A. §6-61-234 (Act 148 of 2017) directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education. That language reads as follows:

For the **universities**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in university funding of \$8,508,875.

For the **two-year colleges**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in two-year college funding of \$2,897,559.

For the **non-formula entities**, the recommendation is for a 2.5% increase based on the HEPI index and a recommendation of full funding of Operations and Program Enhancement requests which combined would require an additional \$22.2 million, of which \$2.4 million would be for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS).

The individual institutional recommendations for all three types of institutions (Colleges, Universities, and Non-Formula Entities) were determined in the following manner: The general revenue funds were distributed based upon the productivity funding distribution policy adopted by the AHECB in October 2017. The non-formula needs were based on the justifications submitted by the institutions. The total funding recommendation for 2022-23 for Colleges and Universities is \$11,406,434 in new revenue with \$3,980,692 of that being redistributed from one-time incentive funds. The total recommendation for 2022-2023 for the Non-Formula Entities is \$22,166,725 in new revenue.

In addition to these funding recommendations, an additional appropriation increase recommendation of 2% of the formula-based entities funding recommendation has been added to address any changes in disbursements for Educational Excellence Trust Fund revenues or any other state funding adjustments. This increase totals \$9,703,113 for the **universities** and \$3,616,267 for the **two-year colleges**.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendations for state funding of the educational and general operations of Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2022-23 fiscal year as included in Tables 13A, 13B, 13C, and 13D.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for

transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2022-23 operating recommendations of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That should any errors of a technical nature be found in these recommendations, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked what institutions make up non-formula entities. Nick Fuller explained that programs that do not generate full-time equivalent students are categorized as non-formula. The U of A Division of Agriculture, the Criminal Justice Institute and the Regional Education Network are examples of non-formula entities, said Fuller.

Chad Hooten moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 13 to the full Board for consideration. Keven Anderson seconded and the committee approved.

### Agenda Item No. 14 Personal Services Recommendations

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, and line-item maximum salaries for all non-classified administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education have been reviewed, and changes are recommended.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 27,989 positions currently authorized. For the 2022-23 Fiscal Year, institutions requested an increase of 113 positions and the deletion of 36 positions, for a net new request of 77 positions. ADHE staff recommends this net increase of 77 positions, for a total recommendation of 28,066 positions (a 0.3 percent increase). UAMS currently has 11,559 authorized positions and did not submit a request to change this total. ADHE staff recommends the current level of 11,559 positions.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, and maximum salaries for non-classified positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2022-23 fiscal year as recommended by staff.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board requests the Director to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

Dr. Jim Carr asked if there was an enrollment increase for the public institutions. Nick Fuller said the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville is the only institution with an increase in enrollment.

Keven Anderson asked how many of the authorized positions are filled. Fuller said that ADHE is currently reviewing positions that have been vacant for two years and will make a recommendation to the legislature next year regarding those positions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 14 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded and the committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 15
Report on Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues
and Expenditures for 2020-21

Act 245 of 1989 (A.C.A. §6-62-106) directed the Coordinating Board to develop and establish uniform accounting standards and procedures for reporting revenues and expenditures. Based on these standard definitions and formats, the Coordinating Board is to collect the financial data and provide a uniform report of each institution's athletic revenues and expenditures for the previous fiscal year to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee and the public by November of each year.

The 2020-21 total amount of athletic expenditures reported by state-supported universities is \$169,508,885 and two-year colleges is \$2,086,736. The statewide total is \$171,595,621 – a decrease of \$21,614,436 (11.2%) from \$193,210,057 in 2019-20.

A comparison of 2020-21 actual expenditures to 2020-21 budgeted revenues certified to the Coordinating Board in July 2020 is also illustrated at the bottom of the summary chart. Certified budgeted expenditures for 2020-21 totaled \$199,150,149 for all institutions. Total actual expenditures for 2020-21 for all institutions was below this budgeted amount by 13.8% percent. Actual expenditures varied from the Board of Trustees-certified budgeted expenditures by a range of 19.6 percent below to 6.3 percent over the budgeted amount.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Report of 2020-21 Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board authorizes the Director to transmit the Report of 2020-21 Intercollegiate Athletic

Revenues and Expenditures to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee according to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-62-106.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 15 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded and the committee approved.

Agenda Item. No. 16
Economic Feasibility of Bond
University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences

The University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$148.6 million with a maximum term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 4.50%. Proceeds from the bond issues will be used for auxiliary purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on September 17, 2021.

Proceeds from the bond issue for \$109.6 million will be used for the acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Northwest Arkansas UAMS Orthopaedics and Sports Medicine Facility, including an associated land acquisition with an annual debt service of \$9,356,625. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides those annual auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual auxiliary debt service.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences to issue bonds not to exceed \$148.6 million with a term of up to thirty (30) years at an expected annual interest rate not to exceed 4.50 percent for the acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Northwest Arkansas UAMS Orthopaedics and Sports Medicine Facility, including associated land acquisition and to refund Parking System Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2011; and for the acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Parking 4 parking deck.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Dr. Kyle Miller moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 16 to the full Board for consideration. Keven Anderson seconded and the committee approved.

## Agenda Item No. 17 Economic Feasibility of Line of Credit Loan University of Arkansas - Grantham

The University of Arkansas-Grantham requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a line of credit loan not to exceed \$8.0 million at an annual interest rate not to exceed 3.25%. Proceeds from the line of credit loan will be used for education and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on September 17, 2021.

Proceeds from the revolving line of credit will be used to facilitate the purchase and operation of Grantham University by providing Grantham funds for the continuation of existing facility and equipment leases, to acquire and maintain information technology infrastructure and to acquire and maintain other contracts and services related to operation and use of its facilities. This line of credit will not be a term loan, but rather a mechanism to ensure funding for servicing contracts related to normal operations of the university, as well as assuring timely distribution of student financial aid during the transition. It is anticipated that the line would be repaid as soon as funds are available. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for educational and general projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of net tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to educational and general debt service.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas-Grantham to obtain a line of credit loan not to exceed \$8.0 million at an annual interest rate not to exceed 3.25% to facilitate the purchase and operation of Grantham University by providing Grantham funds for the continuation of existing facility and equipment leases, to acquire and maintain information technology infrastructure and to acquire and maintain other contracts and services related to operation and use of its facilities.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if there was an estimate of the campus value and does it include buildings. Gina Terry, Vice President for Finance and CFO for the University of Arkansas System, stated that an evaluation was done on the online university. It does include a leased space in Kansas. The university was appraised at 23.8 million in 2020.

Dr. Kyle Miller moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 17 to the full Board for consideration. Keven Anderson seconded and the committee approved.

## Agenda Item No. 18 Economic Feasibility Lease Purchase Agreement Southeast Arkansas College

Southeast Arkansas College (SEAC) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to enter into a lease purchase agreement with a par amount of not to exceed \$42.0 million for up to thirty (30) years and a coupon rate not to exceed 4.0 percent and an approximate annual base payment of \$2,503,400. The lease purchase agreement will be used for auxiliary purposes. The Southeast Arkansas College Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on October 11, 2021.

The approximate base lease payment in the amount of \$2,503,400 annually. The lease purchase agreement will facilitate the construction of an approximately 30,000 square foot student union building consisting of classrooms, conference center, dining hall, and health clinic, as well as up to 619 beds of student housing in two buildings totaling approximately 130,000 square feet. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides those annual auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual auxiliary debt service.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Southeast Arkansas College to enter into a lease purchase agreement with a par amount of not to exceed \$42.0 million for up to thirty (30) years and a coupon rate not to exceed 4.0 percent and an approximate annual base payment of \$2,503,400 to facilitate the construction of an approximately 30,000 square foot student union building consisting of classrooms, conference center, dining hall, and health clinic, as well as up to 619 beds of student housing in two buildings totaling approximately 130,000 square feet.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Southeast Arkansas College of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 18 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded and the committee approved.

### Agenda Item No. 19 Bond/Loan Feasibility Update

Nick Fuller presented an update of the actual terms for bond and loan issues receiving AHECB approval that occurred October 2020 through October 2021. An annual update was requested by the AHECB during the July 30, 2010, quarterly meeting.

There were no questions.

# Agenda Item No. 20 Certificate of Proficiency and Technical Certificate in Pre-Health Diagnostic Medical Sonography – University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences NorthWest Arkansas Community College

The Certificate of Proficiency in Pre-Health Diagnostic Medical Sonography will allow students in the program to earn some of the prerequisite requirements under the MOU with UAMS to enter their Diagnostic Medical Sonography (DMS) program. No additional curriculum modifications, program costs, faculty resources or institutional resources are needed to provide this certificate, which requires 19 credit hours.

The technical certificate in Pre-Health Diagnostic Medical Sonography will provide the prerequisite requirements under the MOU with UAMS to enter their Diagnostic Medical Sonography program. Curriculum for the certificate consists of general education courses required as prerequisites to the UAMS Bachelor of Science in Diagnostic Medical Sonography as outlined in the MOU.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Certificate of Proficiency in Pre-Health Diagnostic Medical Sonography (CIP 51.0910; 19 credit hours; Spring 2022) and the Technical Certificate in Pre-Health Diagnostic Medical Sonography (CIP 51.0910; 48-52 credit hours; Spring 2022) offered by NorthWest Arkansas Community College and University of Arkansas Medical Sciences (Northwest campus).

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the NorthWest Arkansas Community College and the University of Arkansas Medical Sciences (Northwest campus) of the approval.

Dr. Ricky Tompkins, Vice president of Learning and Chief Academic Officer, provided additional program information.

Graycen Bigger asked if the students receiving the certificate of proficiency and technical certificates were able to immediately find employment or if this is a bridge program into UAMS Northwest. Dr. Tompkins said this is a bridge program that allows students to receive their general education and then move over to UAMS.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if students completing this program are required to be state board certified. Dr. Tompkins said there is no certification process while at NWACC.

Chair Brodell asked if NWACC knew the number of positions available at the local hospitals and facilities. Dr. Tompkins said well over a hundred positions are currently available.

## Agenda Item No. 21 Master of Science in Marketing University of Arkansas, Fayetteville

The Master of Science in Marketing in the Sam M. Walton College of Business is designed for early-career professionals who want to receive advanced, specialized training in marketing. Students enrolling in the Master of Science in Marketing (MSM) must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. The total number of credit hours for this degree is 30.

**RESOVLED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Master of Science in Marketing (CIP 52.1401; 30 credit hours; Spring 2022) at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Division on Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and Chancellor of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville of the approval.

Dr. Terry Martin, Interim Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, provided additional program information.

Graycen Bigger asked if this program was going to be in-person or online. Dr. Martin said it will be an online program.

#### **Initial Program Certification-Distance Technology**

**RESOLVED,** That pursuant to A.C.A. §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board grants initial certification to the institutions listed on pages 1 - 2 to offer the specified degree programs to Arkansas residents for a period of three years through December 31, 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the administration of said institutions that the certification of the degree programs requires the institution to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education whenever any of the following occurs: (1) major reorganization of the controlling body; (2) changes in the charter or incorporation documents of the institution; or (3) changes in the method of operation of the institution's programs in Arkansas.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director to notify the administration of said institutions that any advertisement or published materials 466using the name of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board or the Arkansas Department of Higher Education must contain the following statement:

Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board certification does not constitute an endorsement of any institution or program. Such certification merely indicates that certain criteria have been met as required under the rules and regulations implementing institutional and program certification as defined in A.C.A. §6-61-301.

### Agenda Items No. 23 & 24 Letters of Notification and Letters of Intent

The Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education approved institutional requests for new programs not requiring Board action unless further review is requested by the Board. During this period, the Institutional Certification Advisory Committee received notice of requests from out-of-state institutions to offer degree programs to Arkansas residents. The program notice lists appear in the Letters of Notification on pages 23-1 through 23-18 and in the Letters of Intent on pages 24-1 through 24-8 of the agenda book.

Chair Brodell commented on the number of comments received from institutions regarding the National Park College Role and Scope change request listed in the letters of intent. John Hogan, President of National Park College said that their intent is to proceed with their proposal and they will ask the board to consider it at a future date.

Dr. Jim Carr said while he admires NPC and the work they do, if this is the beginning of another four-year institution he would be reluctant to approve it in the future. However, if it is just a nursing program, then he would consider it. Dr. Hogan said NPC is focused on changing their scope only and not their role. Our goal is to remain a community college, said Hogan.

Chair Brodell asked Director Markham if she could provide a timeline for the role and scope change process. Director Markham explained that the official public comment phase has passed. Next, NPC will develop a full proposal that will be presented to the board for approval.

Keven Anderson asked if NPC had considered partnering with another institution that already has an existing program. Dr. Hogan said that NPC has several partnerships, however, he doesn't believe the nursing program is a good fit for a partnership.

Greg Revels presented the report of the Finance Committee and moved approval of Agenda Items 12 - 18. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded, and the board approved.

Keven Anderson presented the report of the Academic Committee and moved approval of Agenda Items 20 – 22. Dr. Jerry Cash seconded, and the board approved.

## APPROVAL OF REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES FOR MEMBERS OF THE HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD AND INSTITUTIONAL CERTIFICATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

\_\_\_\_\_

Although members of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) and its Institutional Certification Advisory Committee (ICAC) by law serve without compensation, they may receive expense reimbursement for performing official board duties after following certain procedures set out by Act 1211 of 1995 (A.C.A. §25-16-901 et seq.).

Prior to the passage of Act 1211 of 1995, members were authorized to receive reimbursement for actual expenses. Act 1211 provided that each state board may, by a majority vote of the total membership of the board cast during its first regularly scheduled meeting of each calendar year, authorize expense reimbursement for each board member for performing official board duties. The act also stated that the expense reimbursement shall not exceed the rate established for state employees by state travel regulations.

Act 250 of 1997 amended Arkansas Code §6-61-201(e), which provided for reimbursement of actual expenses for the Board, and §6-61-302(d), which provided for reimbursement of normal expenses for members of the ICAC, to conform with the 1995 Act. Act 114 of 1997, which created the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, also states, "(I) Members of the board shall serve without compensation but may receive expense reimbursement in accordance with §25-16-901 et seq."

Because Act 1211 of 1995 (A.C.A. §25-16-901 et seq.) is the sole authority for expense reimbursement, it is necessary for the Coordinating Board to adopt a resolution authorizing expense reimbursement for board members and members of the ICAC. The following resolution is presented for the Coordinating Board's consideration:



### **AACUBO Annual Conference**



On October 4-5, 2021, Dr. Maria Markham joined business officers from around the state for the Arkansas Association of College and University Business Officers (AACUBO) Annual Conference. Emerging trends in payments, succeeding in the battle for well-being, productivity funding and current legal and compliance issues, were among the topics discussed.

AACUBO is one of the 16 member states of the Southern Association of College and University Business Officers (SACUBO) and is likewise affiliated with the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO). NACUBO is headquartered in Washington, D.C., and represents the needs of higher education as well as acting as a clearing house for information and professional development.

### **SHEEO Higher Education Policy Conference**

Dr. Markham participated in the State Higher Education Executive Officers Association (SHEEO) 2021 Higher Education Policy Conference in Washington, D.C., November 8-11, 2021. The annual Policy Conference is the preeminent gathering of leaders from state higher education policy agencies, national higher education policy organizations, institutions, and state and federal governments.

### **SREB State Leaders' Forum**

December 6-8, 2021, Dr. Markham joined state leaders, including agency heads from K-12, postsecondary, workforce and policy makers, at the State Leaders' Forum in Atlanta, Georgia. To support states as they improve how they share and use data across agencies, SREB launched a new effort that will bring together teams from each of their 16 states to share their current practices, examine obstacles and analyze promising solutions. In this project, SREB will focus on the sharing and use of secondary, postsecondary and workforce data within states. The discussions will provide opportunities to review sharing and collaborative efforts in the context of workforce development and open the door for additional conversations that result in strong collaborative efforts to use data to address state goals.



#### ANNUAL ENROLLMENT REPORT


The **total** unduplicated headcount for the fall 2021 term in all sectors of Arkansas higher education, including public universities, public colleges, private/independent colleges and universities, and nursing schools was **145,695 students**, representing a decline of 1.1% from the fall 2020 term.

The last time all sectors of Arkansas higher education experienced an increase in fall term headcount was the fall 2011 term. Fall 2011 total unduplicated headcount of 173,887 represented the largest fall term headcount ever. Declines from year-to-year since the 2011 fall term range from .5% to 5.6%. Arkansas higher education currently has 28.192 fewer students than it did in the fall 2011 term.


Of the 145,695 students enrolled in fall 2021, 1,548 students are enrolled at more than one institution and represent one percent of the total fall 2021 headcount.




The following graph depicts a five-year total headcount trend for each sector of Arkansas higher education. Four-year universities and 2-year colleges all experienced an overall decline in headcount, while private/independent institutions and nursing institutions reported an increase.




The 4-year public universities reported a fall term decline for a fifth consecutive year. They experienced their highest headcount in the fall 2016 term of 100,413.




The 2-year public colleges reported a decrease from 2020 of 1.5%. They experienced their highest headcount in the fall 2012 term of 59,601.




Private/independent colleges reported an increase of 275 students. They experienced their highest headcount in the fall 2015 term of 16,611.




High School student headcount, including both concurrent and dually enrolled students, increased from last year by 1,379 students. Covid-19 is believed to have been a significant factor in the decline in high school headcounts in AY 2020. While high school headcounts in AY 2021 have rebounded over AY 2020, they have not returned to prepandemic enrollment levels. There are 683 high school students enrolled in concurrent courses with more than one institution, which is 3.9% of the total high school concurrent headcount.




Undergraduate headcount declined by 3.8%. The largest undergraduate class on record is 142,442 reported in fall 2011. Undergraduate headcount reported here does not include high school student headcount.



Graduate headcount for all public and private institutions increased for fall 2021 term by 1,095 students representing an increase of 6.7% from the fall 2020 term.



First-professional headcount has grown each of the last ten years. Headcount includes students in law, medicine, pharmacy, advanced nursing programs, and occupational and physical therapies.




























#### Private/Independent/Nursing - Total Headcount Trends

Seven private/independent and nursing schools reported fall term headcount declines ranging from -3.7% to -12.1%. The remaining eleven schools reported increases ranging from 0.3% to 31.8%.



# ANNUAL REPORT OF ARKANSAS PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES ENROLLING IN ARKANSAS PUBLIC OR PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The college-going rate measures the proportion of students enrolling in postsecondary education in the fall semester after finishing high school. The percentage, therefore, reflects the accessibility of higher education as well as students' assessment of the value of attending college when compared to working, entering the military, or following other pursuits.

This report is a collaboration between the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and the Division of Higher Education (ADHE) of the Arkansas Department of Education. ADHE received 2020 public high school graduate data from DESE and combined it with fall 2020 data submitted to ADHE from all Arkansas public and private institutions. The College-Going Rate calculations include only students graduating from an Arkansas Public High School or Public Charter High School.

Of the 32,949 public high school students graduating from an Arkansas public high school in 2020, 14,551 enrolled at an Arkansas public or private/independent institution in fall 2020 the fall term immediately following their high school graduation. This represents a College-Going Rate of 44.2%, which is a 3.1% decrease from the previous year of 47.3%. This decline reflects the impact the Covid-19 pandemic had on students entering higher education immediately following their high school graduation.




The table below provides the actual number of Arkansas public high school graduates along with the total number of students entering Arkansas public and private higher education. The CGR column represents the college-going rate for that year.


Our college-going rate has been on a steady, but slight decline for the past three years, and it is important to note that the current economy does not affect our traditional aged students who attend college right after high school like it does our non-traditional aged students. The enrollment declines experienced by many of our colleges has been in the non-traditional, adult student population.

Over five years, the share of students who did enroll in college at 4-year universities decreased from 30.2% in fall 2016 to 25.2% in fall 2020. The share of enrolled students at 2-year colleges was 15.9% in fall 2016 and 15.6% in fall 2020. The share of students attending our private/independent institutions declined from 3.8% in fall 2016 to 3.3% in fall 2020.




**Gender:** As shown below, of the Spring 2020 High School Graduate cohort, females go to college at higher rates than males. These percentages are consistent with prior year percentages.




**Attendance Status:** Only 3.8% of students entering college immediately after high school enrolled part-time. This is typical for students enrolling in higher education the semester after graduating high school.



**Race/Ethnicity:** The race/ethnicity percentages below represent the proportion of the students who entered an Arkansas Higher Education college or university.





## Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program

#### **Policy Statement**

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

#### **Applicable Arkansas Code**

Ark. Code Ann. 6-85-202 ET. Seq.

#### **Applicability**

This rule is applicable to students who apply for a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program for the academic year 2010-2011 and each academic year thereafter. Recipients of Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarships are prohibited from receiving Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarships under this subchapter.

#### **Definitions**

- (1) "Academic Year" means fall, spring, first and second summer semesters in that order, or as defined by the Division of Higher Education;
- (2) "ACT" means the ACT Assessment administered by ACT, Inc.;
- (3) "ACT equivalent" means the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), COMPASS, Accuplacer ACCUPLACER, Asset or other nationally normed test that is correlated with the ACT and approved by the Division of Higher Education for use by institutions of higher education to assess a person's college readiness;
- (4) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program Part 2 and that is:
  - (a) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
  - **(b)** A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student

aid funds; or

- (c) An approved school of nursing, subject to the provisions of § 6-85-213(c);
- (5) "Approved school of nursing" means a school of nursing with its primary headquarter located in Arkansas that:
  - (a) Prepares students as registered nurses;
  - **(b)** Grants nursing diplomas;
  - (c) Is eligible to participate in the Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IV federal student aid programs;
  - (d) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
  - (e) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program; and
  - **(f)** Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- (6) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Division of Higher Education that:
  - (a) For the twelve-month period required under basic eligibility requirements the person:
    - (i) Maintained a permanent home in Arkansas where the person resides for an average of no less than four (4) days and nights per calendar week; and
    - (ii) Either:
      - (a) Is an Arkansas registered voter;
      - **(b)** Holds a valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;
      - (c) Receives benefits under an Arkansas public assistance program;
      - (d) Uses an Arkansas residence address for federal or state tax purposes; or
      - (e) Claims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions; or
  - **(b)** Before the deadline for filing a scholarship application under this rule the applicant:
    - (i) Is on active military status;

- (ii) Qualifies for in-state tuition and fees if the student is a:
  - (1) Veteran who was <u>honorably</u> discharged or released from a period of not less than ninety (90) days of active duty in the military, naval, or air service within three (3) years before the date of enrollment in a program of study;
  - (2) Dependent of a veteran under subdivision (1) of this section;
  - (3) Member of the armed forces; or
  - (4) Spouse of a member of the armed forces and,
- (iii) Meets one (1) of the conditions under subdivision (6)(A)(ii) of this section;

#### (7) "Continuously enrolled" means:

- (a) For a traditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education twenty-seven (27) semester hours in the first academic year as a recipient and, except while the recipient is enrolled as a part-time student if the recipient is enrolled in the number of credit hours necessary to complete the recipient's degree program, successfully completes thirty (30) semester hours each academic year thereafter;
- **(b)** For a full-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least fifteen (15) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters:
- (c) For a part-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least six (6) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters; and
- (d) For a student who is enrolled in a degree plan that has a maximum number of semester hours in a semester that is less than the requirements of subdivisions (7)(A)-(C) of this section, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education the maximum number of hours required by the degree plan for the semester;
- (8) "Cost of attendance" means the recognized cost of attendance of an institution of higher education calculated under rules established by the Division of Higher Education;
- (9) "Full Time Student" means a student enrolled in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Division of Higher Education;
- (10) End-of-course assessment" means an examination taken at the completion of a course of study to determine whether a student demonstrates attainment of the knowledge and skills

#### necessary for mastery of that subject;

- (10) "Enrolled" means that the approved institution of higher education where the student is attending class counts the student as enrolled for the hours claimed on the last day to add or drop a class at the approved institution of higher education;
- (11) "High school equivalency test" means a test measuring the knowledge and skills usually learned in high school that is administered by a state-approved institution or organization;
- (13) (11) High school grade point average" means the numbered grade average on a student's high school transcript calculated:
  - a. For a traditional student, using the first seven (7) of the last eight (8) semesters the student completed prior to graduating high school; or
  - b. For a nontraditional student, using the last eight (8) semesters the student completed before graduating high school;
- (12) (14) "Incarcerated" means a person who has been convicted of a crime and is imprisoned for that crime or is being held in custody for trial or sentencing. Incarceration will result in applicant or recipient being ineligible for the Academic Challenge Scholarship;
- (13) (15) "Lawful permanent resident" means a non-United States citizen who resides in the United States under a legally recognized and lawfully recorded permanent residence and who may receive state public benefits under 8 U.S.C. § 1622;
- (15)"Nontraditional student" means a student who is not a traditional student;
- (16)"Personally identifiable student data" means any information that, alone or incombination with other available information, is linked or linkable to a specific student-that would allow a reasonable person in the student's school community to identify the student with reasonable certainty;
- (17) Postsecondary grade point average means the cumulative numbered grade average for college credit courses as calculated using a 4.0 scale;
- (19) (14) "Qualified certificate program" means a program:
  - a. That is offered by an approved institution of higher education;
  - b. For which credit hours are awarded that are creditable toward an associate degree or baccalaureate degree; and
  - c. Recognized by the United States Division of Education for financial aid purposes;

- (20) (15) "Recipient" means an applicant awarded a scholarship funded through the program;
- (21) "Scholarship hold" means the temporary suspension of a scholarship award to a traditional student under this rule approved by the Division of Higher Education under § 6-85-221;
- (22) (16) "Semester" means one-half (1/2) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the Division of Higher Education, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
  - a. Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or
  - b. Six (6) credit hours as a part-time student;
- (23) "Smart Core" means:
  - c. The college and career readiness curriculum by that name under rules of the State Board of Education; or
  - d. A college and career readiness curriculum that is:
    - i.Established by rules of the state board in coordination with the Division of Higher Education; and
  - ii. Substituted for the curriculum named "Smart Core";
- (24) (17) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery awarded by:
  - a. The Division of Higher Education; or
  - b. A scholarship or grant awarded by an institution of higher education in this state in whole or in part by state funds, including without limitation:
    - i. Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
    - ii. Tuition waivers based on age, military service, occupation, or other factors;
    - iii.Out-of-state tuition waivers for undergraduate students from contiguous states in close proximity to a college or university;
    - iv. Scholarships for transfers from two-year institutions;

- v. Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
- vi. Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the institution of higher education for tuition, fees, books, or other costs of attendance;
- (25) "Successfully completed" means that a student completed a course at an institution of higher education and received the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D";
- (26) (18) "Superscore" means the final composite score that is calculated according to a combination of the highest individual section scores across all of the ACT tests taken by an individual.

#### (26) (A) (19)(A) "Traditional student" means a student who:

- (i) Will enter postsecondary education as a full-time first-time freshman on or before the fall semester of the academic year that begins immediately following:
  - (a) The student's graduation from high school; or
  - **(b)** The last day of the school year:
    - (1) That would have been the student's junior or senior year of high school; and
    - (2) In which the student completes the requirements for high school graduation and obtains a General Educational Development certificate instead of receiving a diploma; and
- (ii) Remains continuously enrolled as a full-time student;
- **(B)** "Traditional student" includes a student who otherwise meets this definition but delays entering postsecondary education under a scholarship hold approved by the Division of Higher Education.

#### **Procedures**

#### **Basic Eligibility Requirements.**

The basic requirements for an applicant to be eligible for an award from the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program are:

- (1) (A) The applicant has been an Arkansas resident for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
  - **(B)** If the applicant is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the applicant or a parent or guardian of the applicant shall have maintained Arkansas residency for at least

the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.

- (C) (i) To be considered an Arkansas resident, an applicant shall demonstrate residency by evidence deemed sufficient to the Division of Higher Education.
  - (ii) Evidence of residency may include without limitation information provided by the applicant on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Division of Education for federal financial aid.
- **(D)** During the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date an applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education if the person for whom the twelvementh period is calculated under subdivision (1)(A) or (1)(B) of this section is deployed outside of Arkansas under military orders, the Division of Higher Education shall calculate the twelve (12) months by:
  - (i) Excluding months of military deployment outside of Arkansas that are within the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education; and
  - (ii) Including months the person maintained Arkansas residency immediately preceding the military deployment outside of Arkansas;
- (2) The applicant is a citizen of the United States or is a lawful permanent resident;
- (3) (A) The applicant is accepted for admission as a full-time student or part-time student at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to or is creditable toward:
  - (a) A baccalaureate degree;
  - (b) An associate degree;
  - (c) A certificate from a qualified certificate program; or
  - (d) A graduate-level or professional degree; or
  - (ii) An approved school of nursing in a program of study that leads to a nursing diploma under § 6-85-213.
  - **(B)** A full-time student shall enroll in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Division of Higher Education.
  - (C) A part-time student shall complete at least six (6) semester hours but less than the minimum number of semester hours for a full-time student, as defined by the Division of Higher Education.

- (4) The applicant has not met the maximum continuing education eligibility requirements under § 6-85-210;
- (5) The applicant does not owe a refund on a federal or state student financial aidgrant for higher education;
- (6) The applicant is not in default on a state or federal student financial aid loan for higher education;
- (7) The applicant has not borrowed, as determined by the approved institution of higher education to be attended, in excess of the annual loan limits under the Federal Family Educational Loan Program Systems, William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, Income Contingent Loan Demonstration Program, Stafford Loan Program, Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students Program, or Supplemental Loan for Students Program in the same academic year for which the student has applied for assistance under this rule;
- (8) The applicant is not incarcerated at the time of the application for or during the time the applicant receives a scholarship under this rule;
- (9) The applicant has complied with United States Selective Service System requirements for registration;
- (10) The applicant has completed and submitted to the United States Division of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Division of Education for federal financial aid; and
- (11) The applicant certifies that he or she is drug-free and pledges in writing on the application form to refrain from the use or abuse of illegal substances in order to become eligible and maintain eligibility for this program.

#### Additional Eligibility Requirements for Traditional Students.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a traditional student if the applicant:

- (1) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and has a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
- (2) Has a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., as it existed on July 1, 2009, and graduated from an Arkansas public high school, and either:
  - (A) Had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or

- **(B)** Scored proficient or higher on all state-mandated end-of-course-assessments, including without limitation end-of-course assessments on:
  - (i) Algebra I;
  - (ii) Geometry;
  - (iii) Biology; and
  - (iv) Literacy; or
- (3) Achieved a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; and
  - (A) Graduated from a private high school, an out-of-state high school, or a home school high school; or
  - **(B)** In the year in which the student would have been a junior or senior in high school, completed the requirements for high school graduation and obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Career Education Division of Workforce Services instead of receiving a diploma; or
- (4) Meets the following criteria;
  - (A) Was enrolled at an institution of higher education in the immediately preceding academic year as a full-time, first-time freshman;
  - **(B)** Did not receive a scholarship under this rule as a first-time, full-time freshman;
  - (C) Successfully completed with the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D" at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours of courses as a full-time, first-time freshman; and
  - **(D)** Achieved a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale as a full-time, first –time freshman.

#### Additional eligibility requirements for a nontraditional student.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a nontraditional student if the applicant meets one (1) of the following requirements:

- (1) If the applicant has not been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has either:
  - (A) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and achieved a 2.5 high school grade point average; or
  - **(B)** Graduated from an Arkansas public high school, a private high school, an out-of-state high school, a home school high school, or obtained a high school equivalency

diploma approved by the <u>Division of Career Education</u> <u>Division of Workforce</u> <u>Services</u> and had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or

(2) If the applicant has been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has earned a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.

#### Continuing eligibility.

- (a) (1) (A) A recipient who meets continuing eligibility criteria under this rule shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year renewable annually until the recipient has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours.
  - **(B)** A recipient may continue to receive a scholarship after he or she has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, if the student is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under § 6-61-232.
  - (1) A semester in which a student withdraws or fails to complete the number of credit hours for which the student first enrolled is counted toward the maximum number of semesters for which the student may receive a scholarship award under this rule.
  - (2) The maximums under this subsection apply to any degree program, regardless of whether or not the degree program requires additional semesters.
  - (3) A recipient may attend summer terms at the student's own expense to earn credit hours necessary to maintain eligibility for a scholarship under this rule.
  - (4) For each eligible term, all required hours for continuing eligibility must be taken at one approved institution.
- **(b)** To maintain eligibility for an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under this rule, a recipient shall meet the following requirements:
  - (1) A recipient shall continue Continue to meet the <u>relevant</u> eligibility requirements of this rule while a recipient of a scholarship under this rule;
  - (2) (A) (i) A recipient shall meet Meet the satisfactory academic progress standards required to receive other financial aid at the approved institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled, as determined by the Division of Higher Education in conjunction with the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled.
    - (ii) (a) (B)(i) A recipient who does not successfully complete any credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this rule immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that

academic year.

- (b) (ii) The Division shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.
- (iii) (C) By accepting scholarship funds under this rule, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree.
- (B) The Division may approve a leave of absence for a reason that includes without limitation:
  - (i) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home based medical care or recuperation until released by the attending physician;
  - (ii) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
    - (a) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
    - **(b)** Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
  - (iii) Military service under § 6-61-112;
  - (iv) (a) A commitment for twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months of service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
    - (b) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project;
    - (c) The Division shall release a scholarship hold if the Division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement; or
    - (v) Any other reason approved by the Division;
- (3) A recipient who enrolls If enrolling in one (1) or more remedial courses, shall complete all remedial courses required by the approved institution of higher education by the time the student completes the first thirty (30) semester hours attempted after receiving the scholarship;
- **(4)** A recipient shall earn <u>Earn</u> a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher <u>on a 4.0</u> scale at an approved institution of higher education;
- (5) A recipient shall enroll Enroll in courses that lead toward a baccalaureate degree or

graduate-level or professional degree after attempting the lesser of:

- (A) Five (5) semesters; or
- **(B)** The completion of an associate degree program; and
- **(6)** A recipient shall meet Meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- (c) (1) A traditional student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply as a first-time nontraditional student.
  - (2) A recipient under subdivision (c)(1) of this section who loses eligibility for the nontraditional student scholarship is not eligible to apply for a scholarship under any eligibility provision of this rule.
- (d) If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under subsection (c) of this section due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family member of the recipient, the Division may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

#### Literacy tutoring.

- (a) As an additional component to the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program:
  - (1) Each applicant for the scholarship shall agree that for each year the scholarship is awarded he or she may volunteer to serve as a literacy tutor for a minimum of twenty (20) clock hours each semester in a public school or a faith-based educational institution serving students in prekindergarten through grade six (preK-6);
  - (2) A recipient who agrees to volunteer as a literacy tutor:
    - (A) Shall complete the prerequisite training in literacy and college readiness skillsprovided under this section before he or she begins tutoring; and
    - (B) May receive college credit for the tutoring as determined by the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled; and
  - (3) An enrolled college student who participates in the tutorial program and fails to meet the academic eligibility requirement under this rule for the fall or spring semester shall be given the probationary opportunity during the subsequent spring or summer term to continue his or her education and improve academic performance before losing scholarship funding in the subsequent semester.
- (b) A recipient who agrees to volunteer as a literacy tutor under this section shall receive the prerequisite training in literacy and college readiness from an approved institution of higher education based on training modules developed by the Division of Education.

#### Scholarship award amounts.

- (a) The General Assembly may use net proceeds from the state lottery to fund the scholarships awarded under this rule and to supplement the state-supported student financial assistance that the General Assembly determines is necessary to meet the state's objective for broadening and increasing access of Arkansas citizens to higher education.
- **(b)** Net proceeds from the state lottery used to fund scholarships under this rule shall:
  - (1) Be used exclusively for the purposes set out in Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 87, and this rule; and
  - (2) Supplement and shall not supplant nonlottery state educational resources.
- (c) It is the General Assembly's intent that before increasing award amounts for scholarships under this rule, the number of scholarships awarded to nontraditional students under § 6-5-208 be increased.
- (d) (c) The scholarships established under this rule are subject to available funding and do not create for any student an entitlement to financial assistance to enable the student's attendance at an approved institution of higher education.
- (e) (1) (A) (d)(1)(A) Beginning with the 2016-2017 academic year, Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount under this rule for an academic year for a full-time recipient enrolled in a four-year approved institution of higher education is:
  - (i) One thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a recipient who has earned less than twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours;
  - (ii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours but less than fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours;
  - (iii)Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours but less than eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours; and
  - (iv) (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a recipient who has earned at least eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours but no more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, as provided under § 6-61-232, then up to the number of credit hours required to complete the baccalaureate program.
    - **(b)** A recipient shall receive no more than one (1) year of the scholarship provided under subdivision  $\frac{(e)(1)(A)(iv)(a)}{(d)(1)(A)(iv)(a)}$  of this section unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours as provided under § 6-61-232.

- (c) (1) A recipient who is eligible to receive the scholarship under subdivision (e)  $\frac{(1)(A)(iv)(a)}{(d)(1)(A)(iv)(a)}$  of this section may receive the scholarship while enrolled in a semester as a part-time student.
  - (2) The scholarship amount for the semester in which a recipient is enrolled as a part-time student under subdivision  $\frac{(e)(1)(A)(iv)(e)(1)}{(d)(1)(A)(iv)(e)(1)}$  of this section shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the recipient is enrolled.
- **(B)** The Division of Higher Education shall not accept new applications for scholarships for current achiever students under § 6-85-209 after June 1, 2012.
- (C) (i) (B)(i) To determine the correct scholarship award amount based on credit hours, a first-time recipient shall submit a current college or university transcript if the first-time recipient has earned any semester credit hours to the Division of Higher Education no later than a date determined by the Division prior to the academic year for which the first-time recipient will receive an initial scholarship award.
  - (ii) A first-time recipient who does not submit a transcript to the Division on or before the date determined by the Division shall receive the award amount under subdivision  $\frac{(e)(1)(A)(i)}{(d)(1)(A)(i)}$  of this section.
- (D) (i) (C)(i) An Applicant may elect for the earned semester credit hours under subdivision (e)(1)(A) (d)(1)(A) of this section to be only those semester credit hours earned after graduating from high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Career Education Division of Workforce Services.
  - (ii) If the applicant makes the election under subdivision (e)(1)(D)(i) (d)(1)(C)(i) of this section, any semester credit hours earned through concurrent credit or any other method before graduating high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Career Education Division of Workforce Services shall not be counted as earned semester credit hours for the purposes of determining a recipient's scholarship award amount under subdivision (e)(1)(A) (d)(1)(A) of this section.
- (2) (A) Beginning with the 2017-18 academic year, the <u>The</u> Division shall award an aggregate amount of scholarship awards to nontraditional students of up to fifteen million <u>dollars</u> (\$15,000,000).
  - **(B) (i)** The Division shall return to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery the excess funding, if any, for scholarship awards the Division received under § 23-115-801.
    - (ii) The office shall deposit any funds received from the Division under this subdivision (e)(2)(B) (d)(2)(B) into a trust account the Lottery Scholarship Trust Account established under § 23-115-801(b).
  - (C) Priority for scholarships awarded to nontraditional students is based on:

- (i) The applicant's level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree; or
- (ii) Other criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- (3) The Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award for an academic year for a full-time student enrolled in one (1) of the following institutions of higher education is one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the first year and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the second year:
  - (A) A two-year approved institution of higher education;
  - **(B)** A branch campus of a four-year approved institution of higher education; or
  - (C) An approved nursing school. school of nursing.
- (4) The Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount for a part-time student recipient shall be:
  - (A) One-half (1/2) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least six (6) semester hours but less than nine (9) semester hours; or
  - **(B)** Three-quarters (3/4) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least nine (9) semester hours but less than the number of hours required for a full-time student recipient.
- (5) A current recipient who maintains eligibility for the scholarship under this rule shall continue to receive the scholarship award amount first awarded to the recipient.
- **(6)** The Division shall give priority for a scholarship award to a full-time or part-time student:
  - (A) Who meets the eligibility requirements under this rule; and
  - **(B)** Whose parent, by birth or legal adoption:
    - (i) Was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the United States Armed Forces or whose official residence is in Arkansas; and
    - (ii) Was a member of the United States Armed Forces who was killed while performing military duty:
      - (a) In a status identified under 32 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. or 10 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. as they existed on January 1, 2011; or
      - **(b)** In state active duty status.

- (f)(e) Annually by December 15, the Legislative Council shall provide to the General Assembly its recommendations for any changes to the:
  - (1) Award amounts;
  - (2) Number or type of scholarships; and
  - (3) Eligibility requirements.
  - (g) (f) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in determining award amounts under this rule the General Assembly will consider whether sufficient funds will be available to pay for scholarship awards through the anticipated completion of the degree or certificate a recipient is seeking.
  - (h) (g) All awards under this subchapter are subject to the prohibition under § 6-80-105 against using public funds in a student financial package in excess of the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student is enrolled.
  - (i)(1) (h)(1) If the Division has less than a sufficient amount from net proceeds from the state lottery to provide for the scholarship commitments under this rule, the Division shall give priority for continued financial support under this rule to a student with continuing eligibility superior to first-time applicants.
    - (2) If the funding is insufficient to fully fund the scholarships for students with continuing eligibility created under this rule, the Division shall award scholarships based upon the following criteria to students with continuing eligibility as follows:
      - (A) First, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study that is:
        - i. In an area of critical workforce need as determined by the Division; or
        - ii. In a science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field;
        - **(B)** Second, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study other than those listed in subdivision (i)(2)(A) (h)(2)(A) of this section; and
        - (C) Last, in the event funding is insufficient to fully fund students under subdivision (i)(2)(A) (h)(2)(A) or (i)(2)(B) (h)(2)(B)of this section, to students who have the highest postsecondary grade point average.
    - (3)(A) If after funding all students with continuing eligibility under this section funding is insufficient to fund all qualified first-time applicants, the Division shall award scholarships to first-time applicants in order of priority based upon the applicants' ACT superscore or ACT-equivalent superscore.

**(B)** If after prioritizing first-time applicants based upon the applicants' ACT or ACT equivalent scores funding is insufficient to fund all applicants with like ACT or ACT equivalent scores, the Division shall determine who receives an award by random drawing.

#### Payments of Scholarships.

- (A) The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarships to the approved institution of the student's choice. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall send funds to the institution via electronic funds transfer or state warrant. After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures. The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institution. In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of such student in advance.
- **(B)** Transfer of Scholarships to another Approved Institution

A recipient who has received an Academic Challenge Scholarship may transfer the scholarship to another approved Arkansas institution of higher education, provided that:

1. The student notifies the Arkansas Division of Higher Education of the change of status by October 1 for the fall term and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms by changing the college on the student's ADHE YOUniversal financial aid account;

#### (C) Repayment of Scholarships

If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses. Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled. It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayments.

#### (D) Refunds

The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program is entitled to a refund of the scholarship or loan amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a scholarship or loan withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after his or her first day of class of the payment period and the situation falls under the refund policy of the institution. The institution shall pay the refund to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

#### (E) Overpayment

If the award of an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student according to the state law (Arkansas Code § 6-80-105) governing the stacking of

scholarships, the institution shall follow the ADHE Stacking policy in reducing the student's financial package to prevent the student from receiving funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

#### Institutional Responsibilities.

#### I. College/University Responsibilities

#### A. Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

#### B. Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

#### C. Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed. The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. Students who are enrolled less than full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the spring term. The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education no later than June 1 to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

#### D. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education. For those students whose

applications are received by ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

#### E. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education on any Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

#### II. Recipient's Responsibilities

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education of any change in status within 21 days. This will include:

- Change in name
- Change in address
- Change in institution
- Change in full-time status (twelve college credit hours for those students who are in their first fall semester following high school graduation, fifteen college credit hours for those students who are beyond the first fall semester following high school graduation)

Failure to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education of a change of status may affect future eligibility.

#### Scholarship hold-Leave of absence.

- (a) (1) The Division of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold <u>or a leave of</u> absence for a traditional student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
- **(b)** (2) The reasons for a scholarship hold <u>or a leave of absence</u> may include without limitation:
  - (A)(1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
  - (B) (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
    - (i)(A) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or (ii)(B) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent; or

- (C) (3) Military service under § 6-61-112; or
- (D) (4)(A) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
- (ii) (B) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
- (iii) (C) The Division shall release a scholarship hold <u>or a leave of absence, whichever is applicable</u>, if the Division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

#### **SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS**

## DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING ARKANSAS ACADEMIC CHALLENGE PROGRAM

In 2021, the Arkansas Academic Challenge Program – Part 1 was repealed by Act 81, leaving in place Part 2 of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Program, which was established by Act 605 of 2009.

All amendments to these rules, aside from technical changes and the removal and clarification of eligibility requirements for traditional students, were the result of Act 636 of 2021.

Act 636 removed the definitions of "end-of-course assessment," "high school equivalency test," "non-traditional student," "personally identifiable student data," "postsecondary grade point average," "scholarship hold," "Smart Core," and "successfully completed." As a result of the Act, these definitions were also removed from the rules.

The rules were amended to remove language regarding end-of-course assessments under the heading "Additional Eligibility Requirements for Traditional Students." This language was removed because districts do not currently administer end-of-course assessments in the subjects of Algebra, Geometry, Biology, and Literacy. The inclusion of this language in the rules created confusion regarding eligibility requirements.

Act 636 of 2021 removed language from Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-210 regarding leave of absence. Corresponding language was removed from one section of the rules and language regarding leave of absence was added to the "Scholarship hold" section.

Act 636 of 2021 also removed language regarding literacy tutoring. The corresponding language was removed from the rules.

The previous version of the rules referred to the "Division of Career Education" rather than the "Division of Workforce Services." The rules have been amended to replace "Division of Career Education" with "Division of Workforce Services."

In the interest of ensuring consistency between Act 636 of 2021 and the rule, there were some additional technical changes made.

# Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing The Arkansas Future Grant Program

### **Policy Statement**

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Future Grant Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### **Applicable Arkansas Code**

Ark. Code Ann. 6-82-1801 ET. Seq.

#### **Definitions**

- (1) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Department Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program and that is:
  - (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
  - (B) A state-supported technical institute; or
  - (C) An approved state-supported school of nursing; or
  - (D) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university.
- (2) "Approved state-supported school of nursing" means a state-supported school of nursing with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that:
  - (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
  - (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
  - (C) Is eligible to participate in the federal student aid programs of the Higher Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. § 1070 et seq.;
  - (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;

- (E) Has been approved by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program; and
- (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- (3) "Federal student financial assistance" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of:
  - (A) An approved Free Application for Federal Student Aid, including without limitation a Pell Grant; or
  - (B) The student's or other family member's service in the United States Armed Forces, including without limitation the Army National Guard or Air National Guard;
- (4) "Private scholarship" means a scholarship or grant awarded by a private entity or donor; and
- (5) "Regional high-demand field" means any field of study identified as in demand by the Arkansas Department Division of Workforce Services as published on its annual regional Projected Employment Opportunities List or any field of study identified as high demand by an approved institution of higher education and approved by the Department Division of Higher Education.
- (6) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery awarded by:
  - (A) The <del>Department</del> Division of Higher Education; or
  - (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an approved institution of higher education in this state funded, in whole or in part, by state funds, including without limitation:
    - (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement:
    - (ii) Tuition waivers based on age, military service, occupation, or other factors;
    - (iii) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
    - (iv) Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the approved institution of higher education for tuition, fees, books, or other costs of attendance.

#### **Procedures**

Eligibility Requirements.

- (a) A student is eligible for an Arkansas Future Grant if the student is an Arkansas resident who:
  - (1) Meets one (1) of the following requirements:
    - (A) Has either:
      - (i) Graduated from an Arkansas:
        - (a) Public high school;
        - (b) Private high school; or
        - (c) Home school under § 6-15-501 et seq.; or
      - (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the <del>Department of Career</del> Education Division of Workforce Services; or
    - (B) Verifies that he or she has resided in Arkansas for the three (3) years immediately preceding application for the grant and has either:
      - (i) Graduated from an out-of-state:
        - (a) Public high school;
        - (b) Private high school; or
        - (c) Home school recognized by another state; or
      - (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by another state;
  - (2) Is enrolled part-time or full-time at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in a:
    - (A) Science, technology, engineering, accounting, finance, nursing, education or mathematics field, including without limitation computer science, information technology, data analysis, or graphic design;
    - (B) Regional high-demand field; or
    - (C) State high-demand field; and
  - (3) Has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

## Continuing Eligibility Requirements.

- (a) A student may continue to be eligible until the student has:
  - (1) Received the grant for five (5) academic semesters;
  - (2) Obtained an associate degree;

- (3) Failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled; or
- (4) Failed to complete the mentoring or community service requirements under the Grant Recipient Responsibilities section of this rule.

#### **Grant Award Amounts.**

- (a) (1) An Arkansas Future Grant shall be in an amount equal to the tuition, fees, and other charges incurred by a student who meets the requirements under the Eligibility Requirements and Continuing Eligibility Requirements sections of this rule to attend an approved institution of higher education less the amount the student receives in:
  - (A) State-supported student financial assistance;
  - (B) Federal student financial assistance; and
  - (C) Private scholarships.
  - (2) If the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled is a <u>state-supported four-year</u> institution of higher education or a <u>private</u>, <u>nonprofit</u> four-year institution of higher education, the total amount of tuition, fees, and other charges under subdivision (a)(1) of this section shall be calculated as the average cost of tuition, fees, and other charges at approved institutions of higher education that are <u>state-supported two-year institutions</u> of higher education or <u>private</u>, <u>nonprofit</u> two-year institutions of higher education.
- (b) The <u>Department Division</u> of Higher Education shall disburse the grant directly to the approved institution of higher education.
- (c) The department division shall award grants under this rule in the order in which the department division receives applications from eligible students and based on availability of funds.

### Grant Hold.

- (a) (1) The Department Division of Higher Education may approve a grant hold for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
  - (2) The reasons for a grant hold may include without limitation:
    - (A) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
    - (B) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
      - (i) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or

- (ii) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- (C) Military service under § 6-61-112; or
- (D) (i) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
  - (ii) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
  - (iii) The department division shall release a grant hold if the department division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

### Grant Recipient Responsibilities.

- (a) A student who receives an Arkansas Future Grant shall enter into a written agreement with the Department Division of Higher Education to:
  - (1) (A) Receive monthly mentoring from a mentor from an organization determined by the Department Division of Higher Education.
    - (B) A mentor under subdivision (a)(1)(A) of this section shall:
      - (i) Receive annual mentoring training:
        - (a) Developed by the <del>Department</del> Division of Higher Education; and
        - (b) Provided by a local volunteer group approved by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education; and
      - (ii) Certify to the Department Division of Higher Education that at least one (1) time each ealendar month semester the mentor has provided mentoring services by telephone, email, or in person to each student he or she is mentoring;
  - (2) (A) Complete at least ten (10) hours of community service each semester the student receives a grant.
    - (B) (i) A student may select a community service project that meets requirements developed by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education.
      - (ii) An approved institution of higher education may provide community services opportunities designed to benefit the approved institution of higher education community or the broader local community.

- (C) A student shall certify his or her community service to the approved institution of higher education by the last regular day of the semester the student received the grant; and
- (3) (A) Reside in this state for three consecutive (3) years and be employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification.
  - (B) The Department Division of Higher Education may defer the requirement under subdivision (a)(3)(A) of this section if:
    - (i) The Department Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the Department Division of Workforce Services, determines that there was no employment position available that would reasonably enable the student to meet this requirement; or
    - (ii) Special circumstances as determined by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education exist.
  - (C) After the period of deferral, the student shall begin or resume working in this state or become subject to repayment under subsection (b) of this section.
- (b) The written agreement under subsection (a) of this section shall provide that the grant converts into a loan and the student shall repay the grant amount:
  - (1) On a pro rata basis at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Department Division of Higher Education for each year the student does not reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years and become employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification; or
  - (2) In its entirety at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Department Division of Higher Education if the recipient does not comply with the written agreement under subsection (a) of this section.
- (c) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of any change in status within 21 days. Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of a change of status may affect future eligibility. Change of status will include:
  - (1) Change in name
  - (2) Change in address
  - (3) Change in institution

### Collection of Loan.

(a) Accounts will be retained by the Department Division of Higher Education in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for deferment. The account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment. The student will be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections and they will be sent a loan amortization schedule along with the letter. The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due. Loan recipients who are determined by the Department Division of Higher Education to be 120 days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment

payment is due. If payment is not forthcoming within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date. If the loan recipient has not responded within 90 days from the original payment due date, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient informing them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not made within 30 days.

### (b) Skip Tracing Mechanisms

- (1) ADHE will use these steps to locate recipients if communications are returned as undelivered:
  - (A) Contact the Motor Vehicle Division of the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration;
  - (B) Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
  - (C) Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient's last known address;
  - (D) Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
  - (E) Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;
  - (F) Contact recipient's field of study--professional organization, union, or licensing board;
  - (G) Contact post office;
  - (H) Contact utility companies; and,
  - (I) Contact Chamber of Commerce.
- (c) Credit Reporting Agencies
  - (1) Defaulted recipients will be reported to the following Credit Reporting Agencies:
    - (A) CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.
    - (B) T R W Credit Data
    - (C) Trans Union Credit Reporting
  - (2) Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients are located in the collections file. The Department Division of Higher Education will also respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients.

### (d) State Income Tax Set Off

(1) By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education has been included as a claimant agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds.

## (e) Litigation

(1) No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, the Department Division of Higher Education shall institute a civil suit against the recipient for repayment of the loan. Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00. If over \$3,000.01, the Department Division of Higher Education must use Circuit Court. If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, the Department Division of Higher Education may choose to use Small Claims Courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court. If the Department Division of Higher Education chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference. Forms to take the recipient to Small Claims Courts are requested from the recipient's county of residence.

<del>(2)</del>

### (f) Write-Offs

- (1) Arkansas Future Grants that convert to loans may be written off as uncollectible if the Department Division of Higher Education shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:
  - (A) The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
  - (B) The recipient does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- (2) Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the Administrator must be received before Arkansas Future Grant loan accounts may be written off.

## (g) Nonpayment Penalties

(A) Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

### Institutional Responsibilities.

- (a) College/University Responsibilities
  - (1) Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Future

Grant Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

## (2) Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

### (3) Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed. The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term. The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

### (4) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. For those students whose applications are received by ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

## (5) Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education on any Arkansas Future Grant recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Future Grant Program. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

## **SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS**

## DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS FUTURE GRANT PROGRAM

These rules were amended to incorporate the provision of Act 388 of 2021 that expanded the definition of approved institution of higher education to include private, non-profit two-year or four-year colleges or universities. In addition, to mirror the language of Act 388, section (a)(2) of the rules under sub-heading "Grant Award Amounts" was amended to include language further defining the four-year institutions of higher education as "state-supported" or "private, non-profit."

Act 618 of 2019 changed the frequency of certification of receipt of mentoring services from once per month to once per semester. This change has now been made in the rules.

## Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing The Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program

### **Policy Statement**

A scholarship program to promote academic excellence and to encourage the state's most talented graduates to enroll in Arkansas postsecondary educational institutions is created and established which shall be cited as the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, and continuing eligibility requirements procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### **Applicable Arkansas Code**

Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Seq.

### **Definitions**

- (1) "Academic ability" means the intellectual standing of a student. In determining superior academic ability, the <u>Department Division</u> of Higher Education shall examine the student's high school records, competitive examination scores, and demonstrated leadership capabilities;
- (2) "Academic Year" means fall, spring, first and second summer semesters in that order, or as defined by the <del>Department</del> Division of Higher Education;
- (3) "Approved institution" means a public or private college or university:
  - (A) Which is dedicated to educational purposes, located in Arkansas, or located out of state and educating Arkansas residents in dentistry, optometry, veterinary medicine, podiatry, chiropractic, or osteopathy under agreement with the Board of Control for Southern Regional Education, accredited by an accrediting agency certified and recognized by the United States Department of Education or the Division of Agency Evaluation and Institutional Accreditation, or a school giving satisfactory assurance that it has the potential for accreditation and is making progress which, if continued, will result in its achieving accreditation;

- (B) Which does not discriminate in the admission of students on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin; and
- (C) Which subscribes to the principle of academic freedom;
- (4) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Department Division of Higher Education. Such evidence includes but is not limited to a valid Arkansas voter's registration card; valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license; Arkansas residence address used for federal or state tax purposes; or claims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions;
- (5) "Competitive examination" means a standardized examination measuring achievement which is administered annually on a specified date and at a specified location and which is announced publicly;
- (6) "Department" "Division" means the Department Division of Higher Education;
- (7) "Eligible student" means a resident of the State of Arkansas as defined by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education who:
  - (A) Is eligible for admission as a full-time student;
  - (B) Declares an intent to matriculate in an approved institution in Arkansas; and
  - (C) Graduates from:
    - (i) A high school in this state, for Arkansas Governor's Scholars; or
    - (ii) A high school, for Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars;
- (8) (A) "Extraordinary academic ability" means:
  - (i) Achievement of a <u>secre superscore</u> of 32 or above on the American College Test (ACT) or <u>a score of 1410</u> or above on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); and
  - (ii) (a) Achievement of a high school grade point average of 3.5 or above on a 4.0 scale; or
  - (b) Selection as a finalist in either the National Merit Scholarship competition, the National Hispanic Recognition Program, or the National Achievement Scholarship competition conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
  - (B)The American College Test <u>superscores</u> and Scholastic Aptitude Test <u>scores</u> shall be earned by December 31 prior to the application deadline in order for the scores to be considered by the <u>department division</u> for a scholarship award;

- (9) "Full-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in at least twelve (12) credit hours the first semester and fifteen (15) hours thereafter, or other reasonable academic equivalent as defined by the department division;
- (10) "Part-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in less than fifteen (15) credit hours for their fourth academic year;
- (11) "Scholarship" means an award to an eligible student for matriculation in an approved institution in the State of Arkansas;
- (12) "Undergraduate student" means an individual who is enrolled in a postsecondary educational program, which leads to or is directly creditable toward the individual's first baccalaureate degree;
- (13) "U.S. Citizen" means the student must be either a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien. If the student is not a United States citizen, but a permanent resident alien, the student must attach a copy of the permanent resident alien form I 151, I 551, I 94, or G 641 to the application.

### **Procedures**

### **Organization and Structure**

The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Scholars Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education or his/her designee. The Governor's Scholars Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Department Division of Higher Education regarding the administration of the program.

## Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council

- A. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council shall consist of ten members appointed by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board for staggered two-year terms and shall represent the public and private sectors of post-secondary education and secondary schools.
- B. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council shall advise the Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education in the determination of guidelines and regulations for the administration of this program.
- C. The Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education or his/her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council and shall ensure that staff services for the Council are provided.

The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Seq.

When functioning under Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Seq., the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

## **Eligibility Criteria**

- (a) The Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program scholarships are to be awarded to those students who demonstrate the highest capabilities for successful college study.
- (b) A student is eligible for this scholarship if he or she:
  - (1) Meets the admission requirements and is accepted for enrollment as a full-time undergraduate student in an eligible public or private college or university in Arkansas;
  - (2) (A) Is a bona fide resident of the state, as defined by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education, and is either:
    - <u>a.</u> (3) Is <u>A citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien;</u>
    - b. The holder, or the child of a holder, of a Federal Form I-766
      United States Citizenship and Immigration Services-issued
      Employment Authorization Document, known popularly as a
      "work permit"; or
    - c. A person who is a migrant from the Compact of Free Association Islands
- (B) Preference will be given to students who plan to enter college at the beginning of the academic year directly following their last year of high school attendance;
  - (4) (3) Graduates from a high school;
  - (4) Completes and submits to the U.S. Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or a subsequent application required by the U.S. Department of Education for federal financial aid;
- (5) (A) Demonstrates proficiency in the application of knowledge and skills in reading and writing literacy and mathematics by passing the end-of-course examination as may be developed by the Department of Education and as may be designated by the Department of Higher Education for this purpose.
- (B) "End-of-course" assessment means those assessments defined in § 6-15-419; and
  - (6) (5)(A) Satisfies the qualifications of superior academic ability as established by the Department Division of Higher Education with criteria consisting of value points for academic achievement and leadership, including without limitation:

- (i) American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Merit Finalist, or National Achievement Finalist;
- (ii) High school grade point average;
- (iii) Rank in high school class; and
- (iv) Leadership in school, community, and employment.
- (B) (i) The Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education may alter the weight assigned to the individual criterion to more appropriately meet the needs of the state as determined by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Value points assigned to each selection criterion are weighted as follows:

American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Me	rit Finalist,
or National Achievement Finalist 45%	
High school grade point average	- 35%
Rank in high school class	10%
Leadership in school, community, and employment	10%

- (ii) The Department Division of Higher Education shall ensure that the weight assigned to each individual criterion under this subdivision (b)(6)(B) (b)(5)(B) does not place a home-schooled, public school, or private school student at a disadvantage.
- (iii) (a) After determining qualified recipients based on the qualifications under subdivision (b)(6)(A) (b)(5)(A) of this section, the Department Division of Higher Education shall ensure that at least one (1) recipient is selected from each of the seventy-five (75) counties in Arkansas.
  - (b) If any of the seventy-five (75) counties is not represented, the  $\frac{\text{Department}}{\text{Division}}$  of Higher Education shall select a student from each nonrepresented county with the highest qualifications under subdivision  $\frac{\text{(b)(6)(A)}}{\text{(b)(5)(A)}}$  of this section who was not initially qualified.
  - (c) The scholarship shall be weighed on the factors of achievement, ability, and demonstrated leadership capabilities.
  - (d) Students who are selected as Arkansas Governor's Scholars who also exhibit extraordinary academic ability as defined in the definitions section of this rule shall be designated as Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars.
  - (e) Preference will be given to students who plan to enter college at the beginning of the academic year directly following their last year of high school attendance.

### **Continued Eligibility**

- (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship may be awarded annually for a period not to exceed an academic year.
- (b)(1) A scholarship shall correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institutions.
  - (2) In no instance may the entire amount of the grant for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of students in advance.
- (c) Provided sufficient funds are available, a scholarship shall be awarded for one (1) academic year and renewed annually for three (3) additional academic years if the following conditions for renewal are met:
  - (1) The student maintains not less than a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
  - (2) A student receiving a scholarship under the Scholarship Amounts subsection (a) maintains not less than a 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
  - (3) The recipient has successfully completed a total of at least twenty-seven (27) hours during the first full academic year and, if applicable, a total of at least thirty (30) hours per academic year thereafter; and
  - (4) The recipient has met any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Department Division of Higher Education.
  - (5) If a student who has continuously been a recipient of the scholarship for at least three (3) consecutive years is enrolled as a part-time student in the student's fourth academic year, the student shall be eligible to continue to receive the scholarship if the student has completed, by his or her fourth academic year, or is enrolled in, for his or her fourth academic year, the requisite number of credit hours to complete the student's degree program.

## **Application**

Students must submit an on-line application, available at the ADHE website http://scholarships.adhe.edu/.

The application deadline shall be established by the Department Division of Higher Education of the calendar year in which a student graduates from high school. At its discretion, the Department Division of Higher Education may extend the deadline, provided sufficient notice is provided to the public. The applicant is responsible for submitting the

application and all supporting documentation in a timely manner.

## **Number of Scholarships**

- (a) If sufficient funds are available, effective for students receiving their initial awards beginning in fall 2007, the number of initial scholarship awards to eligible high achievers shall not exceed three hundred seventy-five (375) each year.
- (b) If there are more eligible applicants than available scholarships, the department division may determine a procedure for awarding additional scholarships while not exceeding available funds.

### **Use of Scholarship**

- (a) No student may utilize scholarship funds for educational purposes beyond the baccalaureate degree.
- (b) There shall be an exception to the requirement of subsection (a) of this section for any student who receives a baccalaureate degree in three (3) years or less. The student may receive an award of the scholarship for a fourth academic year to be used as a full-time student enrolled in a postgraduate program at an approved institution.

## **Scholarship Amounts**

- (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship awarded to a new recipient who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman shall be in an amount that equals the lesser of:
  - (1) Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); or
  - (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- (b) A student selected as a recipient under the "Eligibility Criteria" subsection (b)(6)(B)(iii)(b) who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman after July 1, 2017, shall be awarded in an amount that equals the lesser of:
  - (1) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000); or
  - (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- (c) The scholarship amount for each semester in which a student who is the recipient of a scholarship is enrolled as a part-time student during their fourth academic year shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the student is enrolled.

### **Notification of Application and Award Status**

- (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship shall receive an award notice and information sheet explaining disbursement procedures and conditions of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Award.
- (b) The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall notify applicants who are determined to be ineligible and provide the reason for ineligibility. They will also be given instructions on how to correct any information on the application they believe to be incorrect.
- (c) Applicants who fail to submit complete applications, or who fail to supply the required documentation to process the application, will be classified as Incomplete. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall notify these students of their status. The Incomplete Notice provides a list of the incomplete items and the actions necessary for completion.

### **Scholarship Payment Policies**

## (a) Payment of Scholarships

Funds will be disbursed to the approved institution of the Governor's Scholars choice by state warrant. After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution shall disburse the Governor's Scholars Award to the student according to the individual institution's disbursement procedures. Disbursement of the Governor's Scholars award shall correspond with the institution's academic terms (semesters, trimesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods). In no instance may the entire amount of the award for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of the student in advance.

## (b) Transfer to Another Institution of Higher Education

A student who receives a Governor's Scholars Award may transfer to another eligible Arkansas institution of higher education, provided the recipient notifies the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, in writing, of the change of institution by October 1 for the fall term, and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms. Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by the specified deadlines shall result in the loss of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

## (c) Scholarship Hold

The Department Division of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold for a student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less for the following reasons without limitation:

(1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates that the student or the student's immediate family member be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or recuperate until released by the attending physician;

- (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
  - (a) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
  - (b) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- (3) Military service under § 6-61-112; or
- (4) (a) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
- (b) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
- (c) The department division shall release a scholarship hold if the department division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

The recipient must submit a written request for a scholarship hold. The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and be supported by documentation. In the absence of extraordinary circumstances, the award will be revoked if the recipient fails to enroll full-time in an eligible institution in Arkansas, and the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education receives neither notification of transfer of the scholarship to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the fall term and February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms. At the discretion of the Department Division of Higher Education, the award will not be revoked if it is determined by ADHE that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying ADHE by the required dates.

- (d) Cancellation of Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award
  - (1) The Governor's Scholars Award and the Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award shall be terminated for any one of the following reasons:
    - (a) Failure to maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Scholars) or a minimum 3.25 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Distinguished Scholars) on a 4.0 scale and successfully complete and pass a minimum of at least twenty-seven (27) credit hours the first academic year and thirty (30) hours each academic year thereafter;
    - (b) Failure to complete a baccalaureate degree within five years from initial college entrance; or
    - (c) Failure to petition the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education for

a temporary withdrawal for two consecutive academic terms; or

- (d) Failure to enroll as a full time student in an eligible Arkansas college or university after a two-year temporary withdrawal.
- (2) Failure by the Governor's Scholar to provide written notification to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of a change in status (such as a transfer to another eligible institution, change in address, change in name, etc.) before appropriate deadline dates shall result in cancellation of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

## (e) Refunds and Overpayments

If a Governor's Scholar withdraws from an eligible institution, and under the refund policy of that institution the student is entitled to a refund of any tuition, fees, or other changes, the institution shall pay the refund amount in question to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

## **Higher Education Institution Responsibilities**

## (a) Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for Governor's Scholars disbursement, completion of all forms and rosters, verification of data, and compliance with all Governor's Scholars Program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

#### (b) Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of Governor's Scholars funds.

#### (c) Institutional Information Sheet

The administrator is responsible for designating a certifying official responsible for certifying full-time enrollment and a disbursing official responsible for the disbursement of Governor's Scholars Program funds.

#### (d) Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education each semester after registration, giving the names of the Governor's Scholars who are officially enrolled as full-time students as of the end of the 11th class day of enrollment. This information is reported on a verification roster. The person responsible for verification of full-time enrollment is the registrar or a member of the registrar's staff. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster twice a year for those schools on the semester system and three times a year for those schools on the quarter system. The verification roster shall be mailed to the Financial Aid Administrator prior to registration for the semester or quarter. The completed and signed Governor's Scholars verification roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by the dates specified on the roster. The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award for a given academic term. Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive Governor's Scholars funds for that term.

#### (e) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

All funds must be disbursed within ten days of written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned within ten days to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

## (f) Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of the name of the person who withdrew, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information shall be placed on the institution's verification roster before the roster is returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. The institution shall be responsible for the refund amount and shall pay that amount to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

## (g) Continuing Eligibility

It is the responsibility of each institution to complete annually the Continuing Eligibility roster. This roster shall be mailed to all institutions that have a Governor's Scholar enrolled. The Continuing Eligibility roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by the date specified on the roster. The person responsible for completing the Continuing Eligibility roster is the Financial Aid Administrator. The Continuing Eligibility roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award that attended that institution for the academic year immediately preceding receipt of the Continuing Eligibility roster. The certifying official must complete the roster by providing the number of hours completed for the previous academic year and the cumulative grade point average achieved for each student listed.

## (h) Due Diligence

The institution shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education for any Governor's Scholar or former Governor's Scholar. In addition, the institution shall exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning the Governor's Scholars Program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of State of Arkansas funds.

## SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS GOVERNOR'S SCHOLARS PROGRAM

Act 217 of 2021 expanded eligibility criteria for the program by adding language stating that an eligible student can be a holder or child of a holder of a work permit or a migrant from the compact of Free Association Islands. This language was added to the rule.

Act 331 of 2021 added a requirement that applicants must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or subsequent financial aid application. This language was added to the rule.

Act 79 of 2021 removed language regarding end-of-course assessments. This language was also removed from the rule.

Per Act 743 of 2021, ACT "score" was changed to "superscore as defined by § 6-85-204(25)" in the rule.

The previous version of the rules referred to the "Department of Higher Education" rather than the "Division of Higher Education." The rules have been amended to replace "Department of Higher Education" with "Division of Higher Education."

In the interest of ensuring consistency between Acts 331, 217, 79, and 743 of 2021 and the rule, there were some additional minor technical changes made.

# Arkansas Department of Higher Education Rules Governing The Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program

#### **Policy Statement**

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### **Applicable Arkansas Code**

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-302 et seq.

#### **Definitions**

- (1) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Department Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program and that is:
  - (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
  - (B) A private, nonprofit two-year or four year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds.
- (2) (A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license, including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.
  - (B) The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program may include may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or a baccalaureate degree.

## **Funding**

- (1) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under these rules:
  - (A) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-212(e)(2)(B)(i) § 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and
  - (B) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery:
    - (i) Transfers the funds requested by the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-801(c)(2); and
    - (ii) Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).
- (2) A scholarship under these rules shall not be awarded for an academic year if:
  - (A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (1) of this section; or
  - (B) The Department Division of Higher Education received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.
- (3) Any funds under subsection (1) of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under these rules shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under these rules.

#### **Procedures**

### Eligibility Requirements.

- (1) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship for an academic year if the student applies to the <u>Department Division</u> of Higher Education by a date determined by the <u>Department Division</u> of Higher Education preceding the academic year and:
  - (A) Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either a parent of the student or the student is an Arkansas resident;
  - (B) Meets either of the following requirements:
    - (i) Graduated from a:

- (a) Public high school in Arkansas or another state;
- (b) Private high school in Arkansas or another state; or
- (c) Home school as recognized under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-501 et seq. or recognized by another state; or
- (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Arkansas Department of Career Education Division of Workforce Services or another state;
- (C) Is not receiving a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq.;
- (D) Is accepted for admission in a program of study at an approved institution of higher education that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program in one (1) of the following high-demand fields:
  - (i) Industry;
  - (ii) Health care; and
  - (iii) Information technology; and
- (E) (i) Whose program of study or certificate program will result in the student's being qualified to work in an occupation identified by the Arkansas Department Division of Workforce Services under subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section.
  - (ii) (a) The Department Division of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Department Division of Higher Education by March 1 a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field under subdivision (1)(D) of this section that require the completion of a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program.
    - (b) The Department Division of Workforce Services shall publish on its website the list under subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section and data supporting the list.
- (2) A student who received a scholarship under these rules and successfully completed a program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (1)(D) of this section is eligible to reapply for a scholarship under these rules if the student is accepted for admission in a different program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (1)(D) of this section.
- (3) A student who received a scholarship under these rules and does not successfully complete the program of study or certificate program is eligible to reapply for and receive a scholarship one (1) time only.

#### **Distribution – Award Amounts.**

- (1) If funds are available, the <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education ("<del>Department"</del>" "<u>Division"</u>) shall distribute Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships to all students who meet the eligibility requirements.
- (2) (A) The Department Division shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every student eligible to receive a scholarship.
  - (B) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, the maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
    - (i) Eight hundred dollars (\$800); or
    - (ii) (a) The cost of the certificate program or program of study.
      - (b) The cost of a certificate program or program of study shall be limited to:
        - 1) Tuition, fees, or other charges;
        - 2) Textbooks or other course materials; and
        - 3) Equipment needed for a course.
  - (C) The scholarship awards may be used for expenses included in the cost of the certificate program or program of study.
  - (D) A scholarship under this section shall be only for the academic year for which it is awarded.
- (3) (A) If the department division has funds remaining after making the distributions under subsection (2) of this section, the department division shall distribute scholarships to students for the summer term of the academic year.
  - (B) If funds are available under subdivision (3)(A) of this section, a student shall apply for a scholarship for a summer term by a date determined by the department division preceding the summer term.
  - (C) (i) The <u>department division</u> shall distribute scholarships for a summer term in the same manner as under subsection (2) of this section.
    - (ii) Scholarships for a summer term may be used in the same manner as under subsection (2) of this section.
  - (D) A student who received a scholarship under subsection (2) of this section may also receive a scholarship for a summer term.
- (4) The department division shall disburse scholarship awards on behalf of an eligible student directly to the approved institution of higher education.

## Institutional Responsibilities.

### (1) College/University Responsibilities

#### (A) Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

## (B) Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

### (C) Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed. The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term. The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

## (D) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. For those students whose applications are received by ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

## (E) Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

## (F) Agreements between Institutions

An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under these rules to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

# Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing The Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program

### **Policy Statement**

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Education, Department Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

## **Applicable Arkansas Code**

Act 456 of 2019

## **Applicability**

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program.

#### **Definitions**

- 1) "Approved institution of higher education" an institution of higher education that:
  - a. Is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program;
  - b. Offers at least a fifty percent (50%) discount on the tuition and mandatory fees of an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program to a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program, unless other opportunities are provided that lower the tuition and mandatory fees below fifty percent (50%); and
  - c. Is a:
    - i. State-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
    - ii. Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university that has its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds
- 2) "Eligible course" means any endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 3) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by

an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license. This definition does not include a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

- 4) "Endorsed concurrent enrollment course" means a college-level course offered by an approved institution of higher education in Arkansas that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the approved institution of higher education and a public high school that:
  - a. Is in one (1) of the four (4) core areas of math, English, science, and social studies;
  - b. Meets the requirements of § 6-16-1204(b); and
  - c. Is listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System of the Division of Higher Education; This definition does not include programs operated or sponsored by a third party;
- 5) "Student" means a person who has junior or senior status and who is enrolled at a:
  - a. Public high school in Arkansas;
  - b. Private high school in Arkansas; or
  - c. Home school, as defined in § 6-15-501 et seq.;
- 6) "Student success plan" means a plan developed by school personnel in collaboration with parents and the student that is reviewed annually. The plan shall, at a minimum:
  - a. Guide the student along pathways to graduation;
  - b. Address accelerated learning opportunities;
  - c. Address academic deficits and interventions; and
  - d. Include college and career planning components;
- 7) "Third party" means a person or entity that does not receive disbursement directly from the Division for this program, including a subcontractor of the institution.

### **Eligibility**

- 1) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship for an academic semester or academic year during which the student is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program if the student:
  - a. Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the student or one (1) parent of the student is an Arkansas resident; and
  - b. Provides proof that a completed student success plan has been submitted to the student's high school or home school.
- 2) The student success plan for a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program shall:
  - a. Be prepared in consultation with school personnel, the student, and the student's parent or legal guardian or a college advisor.
  - b. Include an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program that is relevant to the student's success plan and include measures that ensure the successful completion of the endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program in

- which the student is enrolled.
- c. A student whose enrollment in a vocational center is reimbursable under § 6-51-305 is not eligible for a scholarship under this program.
- d. Students must meet all established requirements for endorsed concurrent enrollment courses set by the Division of Higher Education.

# **Continuing Eligibility**

- 1) A student is eligible to continue to receive the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship if the student successfully completes an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course and receives a minimum letter grade of "C" or the equivalent grade point average of 2.5.
- 2) A student who fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course with a minimum letter grade of "C" or the equivalent grade point average of 2.5 may shall retain eligibility and enroll in only no more than one (1) endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course for the <u>first</u> semester immediately following the semester in which the student failed to successfully complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.
  - a. If a student fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course a second time, the student shall be ineligible to reapply or receive the scholarship again. This also applies to a student that drops out of an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course before the end of the semester.

### **Amount of Awards**

- 1) If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education shall award Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarships to all students eligible for the scholarship for the fall and spring terms.
- 2) The maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
  - a. Five hundred dollars (\$500)
    - i. Eligible students shall be awarded one-hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) for each eligible course the student is enrolled, up to two (2) eligible courses per semester; or
  - b. The actual tuition and mandatory fees cost to the student for up to two (2) eligible courses per semester.
- 3) A scholarship granted under this section may be awarded in addition to any funds received for the enrollment in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course under § 6-16-1204(e)(3).
- 4) Unless a student's high school or community-based program provides financial assistance for the cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course, the remaining cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program is the responsibility of the

eligible student who is enrolled in the endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.

5) The division shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every approved institution of higher education that has enrolled a student eligible to receive this scholarship.

### Institutional Responsibilities.

Approved institution of higher education responsibilities.

### 1) Administrative agreement.

The chief executive officer of the approved institution of higher education is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with these rules. The approved institution of higher education shall comply with all rules order to maintain the status of an approved institution of higher education.

### 2) Disbursement records.

The approved institution of higher education shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

### 3) Verification.

The approved institution of higher education shall provide certification of enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by an approved institution of higher education of all students receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester.

### 4) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by this date must be returned to the division. For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by this dates date, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds to the approved institution of higher education.

### 5) Due diligence.

The approved institution of higher education will exercise due diligence in providing

complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any scholarship recipient or former scholarship recipient. In addition, the approved institution of higher education will exercise due diligence in complying with these rules. The division may periodically review the approved institution of higher education's records concerning this scholarship program to ensure the eomply compliance with due diligence requirements.

# 6) Course eligibility.

The approved institution of higher education is responsible for verifying that the endorsed concurrent credit courses and certificate program courses meet the requirements set in Arkansas Code § 6-16-1202 and policies of the division.

# **High School and Home School Responsibilities**

1) The high school or home school shall provide certification of eligibility for a student to enroll in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program. A high school or home school shall verify the completion of the student's student success plan before certifying that a student is eligible for the scholarship.

# **SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS**

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS CONCURRENT CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Act 82 of 2021 made some minor changes to the continuing eligibility requirements of the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Program. These changes include removing the language "letter grade of C or the equivalent" and replacing it with "grade point average of 2.5." The rules were amended to maintain consistency with Act 82.

Paragraph 2 under the heading "Continuing Eligibility" was also amended to reflect that students with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 shall, rather than "may" as the previous version of the rules stated, retain eligibility. This is consistent with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-403.

The previous version of the rules referred to the "Department of Higher Education" rather than the "Division of Higher Education." The rules have been amended to replace "Department of Higher Education" with "Division of Higher Education."

# Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing The Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program

**RULES AND REGULATIONS** 

### RULE 1 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

### **Organization and Structure**

- I. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall administer the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education or his/her designee.
- II. The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, and Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009 and any subsequent legislation.
- III. When functioning under Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009, and any subsequent legislation. The the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

### RULE 2 SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

# Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

In order to be eligible for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship, the student must be a natural child, adopted child, stepchild, or spouse of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Punishment employee who was killed or permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred in the performance of duty or in the course of going to or returning from a location where a hazardous situation existed. Scholarship benefits shall not accrue to the dependents if the wounds or injuries suffered by the law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Punishment employee are self-inflicted or if death is self-induced.

A law enforcement officer means:

- A. State Arkansas state highway patrolman, which includes any law enforcement officer, regardless of department or bureau, of the Department Division of Arkansas State Police;
- B. Municipal Arkansas municipal and college or university police officers, which includes all law enforcement officers of any municipality, college, or university who are regular duty personnel on full-time status and does not include auxiliary officers or those serving on a temporary or part-time status;
- C. Sheriff Arkansas sheriff or deputy sheriff, which includes all law enforcement officers of full-time status on a regular basis serving the sheriff's department of any county located in Arkansas, but does not include deputy sheriffs who are engaged in administrative or civil duty or deputy sheriffs serving in a temporary capacity or part-time basis;
- D. Constable Arkansas constable, which includes all duly elected constables of any beat of any county within the State of Arkansas while actually engaged in the performance of their duties concerning the criminal laws of the county and state; and,
- E. Game warden Arkansas game warden, which includes all appointed game wardens employed by the State of Arkansas on a full-time duty status while actually engaged in their duties concerning the game laws of this state.

### A fireman means:

A. Any <u>Arkansas</u> fireman employed on a full-time or volunteer duty status while actually engaged in the performance of his or her duties;

### A state highway employee means:

A. An Arkansas Highway and Department of Transportation Department employee, which is defined as any employee who actively engages in highway maintenance, construction, or traffic operations on the roadways and bridges of the state highway system while the roadways and bridges are open for use by the traveling public;

# A state forestry employee means:

A. An employee of the <u>Arkansas</u> State Forestry Commission who is actively engaged in his or her duties of fighting forest fires;

### A state correction employee means:

A. Any employee of the <u>Arkansas</u> <u>Department Division</u> of Correction or the <u>Arkansas</u> <u>Department of Correction</u> <u>Correctional</u> School District who becomes subject to injury through contact with inmates or parolees of the <u>department</u>

### Division of Correction;

# A state park employee means:

A. Any employee of the State Parks Division of the Arkansas Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism who is a commissioned law enforcement officer or emergency response employee while actively engaged in the performance of his or her duties; and,

### A teacher means:

A. Any person employed by a <u>an Arkansas</u> public school for the purpose of giving instructions and whose employment requires state certification; and

A Department of Community Punishment Correction employee means:

- A. Any employee of the <u>Arkansas</u> Department of Community <u>Punishment</u> <u>Correction</u> who suffers fatal injuries or wounds or becomes permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred through contact with parolees, probationers, or center residents.
- II. To be eligible to receive the Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship, the applicant must be:
  - A. A child must have been born prior to the date of the death or total and permanent disability (See Rule 2 "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);
  - B. An adopted child must have been adopted prior to or the adoption process must have begun prior to the date of the death or total and permanent disability (See Rule 2 "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);
  - C. A stepchild must have been listed as a dependent on the federal and state income tax returns in each of the five (5) income tax years immediately prior to the death or total and permanent disability and must have received more than one-half (1/2) his or her financial support (See Rule 2 "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I)
  - D. Enrolled or accepted for enrollment as an undergraduate student in any Arkansas state-supported college, university or technical institute.
  - E. Less than twenty-three (23) years old on or before the first day of the semester or quarter, unless the applicant is a spouse,; and,
  - F. A bona fide resident of Arkansas, as defined by the Arkansas Department

    <u>Division</u> of Higher Education, for at least six (6) months prior to enrollment in
    an Arkansas institution.

### III. Continued Eligibility

The scholarship will be awarded for one academic year and renewed annually up to three years (for a total of 8 semesters) so long as the student maintains a minimum of a 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and satisfactory progress toward a degree as defined by the institution.

IV. The spouse will not be eligible for the educational benefits if he or she re-marries. The benefits will cease at the end of the semester in which the spouse is currently enrolled at the time of the marriage.

#### RULE 3 APPLICATION PROCESS

### **Application Process**

# I. Applications

- A. Applications and brochures regarding the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship are mailed to the following:
  - 1. Counselors and principals at all public and private high schools in the State; and,
  - 2. Financial aid officers at all public colleges, universities, and public technical institutes in the state. The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students at their institution are made aware of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and its benefits.
- B. Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

# II. Submission of Applications

- A. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education the following:
  - 1. The Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship Application;
  - 2. Documentation in the form of a Death Certificate;
  - 3. Order & Finding of Facts from the Arkansas State Claims Commission;
  - 4. A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child; and,

- 5. A copy of their marriage license, if a spouse.
- C. The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

### **RULE 4 AWARD PROCESS**

### **Award Process**

- I. Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the required eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within thirty (30) days of receipt of all required documentation of the status of their application.
- II. Eligible students will receive an award notice that contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.
- III. The institution will also receive an award notice that contains the student's name and social security number, the award limits, the conditions of the award, the verification process, and the payment process. The institution will be asked to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continuing eligibility each semester.
- V. The award will be renewed annually as long as the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as Rule 2 "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria,", Section V.

# RULE 5 SCHOLARSHIP PAYMENT POLICIES

### **Scholarship Payment Policies**

- I. A recipient may receive up to eight (8) semesters of tuition and fee waivers from the scholarship program. Payment to the scholarship recipient will be in the form of a tuition and fee waiver at the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution upon verification of enrollment after the 11th day of classes each semester for approved charges.
- II. The scholarship will pay the cost of tuition at the in-state rate and room in school-owned housing at any state-supported college, university or technical institute within the State of Arkansas. It does not include the cost of the following:
  - A. Books
  - B. Food

- C. School supplies and materials
- D. Dues and fees for extracurricular activities
- III. The Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education will pay the institution for tuition and fees covered by this program at the beginning of each term upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form and verification of the charges.

### A. Transfer Policy

A recipient who has received a Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education receives written notification of the change of status by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.

### B. Withdrawal Policy

Recipients may withdraw from the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and shall be supported with documentation.

### C. Revocation Policy

The award will be revoked if the recipient fails to:

- 1. Enroll in an eligible Arkansas institution;
- 2. Notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, in writing, of transfer to another eligible institution by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms; or,
- 3. Petition the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, in writing, for withdrawal from an institution by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.
- 4. Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 per academic year.

At the discretion of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, the award will not be revoked if the ADHE determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying ADHE by the required dates.

### D. Military Service

Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces Reserves units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will be placed on deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

### RULE 6 - INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

### **Institutional Responsibilities**

### I. Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education or technical institute is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations.

The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status:

### A. Verification

The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education at the close of each term concerning the student's continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the Department Division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

### B. Identification of Eligible Students

Institutions will be responsible for publicizing the program and identifying students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application. Applications made after May 1 of the academic year in which the student is enrolled will not be considered and the student will not be eligible for the scholarship.

### C. Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating

disbursement of these funds

### D. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to ADHE.

### E. Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE.

- F. Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.
- G. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

### RULE 7 RECIPIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

### **Recipient Responsibilities**

- I. The recipient must notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 30 days. This includes changes in:
  - A. Name;
  - B. Address;
  - C. Institution; and/or,
  - D. Withdrawal from an institution.

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of a change in status may affect future eligibility.

II. It is also the recipient's responsibility to be knowledgeable of the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

### **RULE 8 PROGRAM DEFINITIONS**

### **Program Definitions**

The following definitions are used in the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program:

Approved Institution A state-supported two-year or four-year college or

university or technical institute located in the State of Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central

Association, Commission on Higher Education, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against

applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.

Dependent A spouse, natural child, adopted child, or step child of an

Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state correction employees, state forestry employees, certain Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department of Transportation employees, state parks employees, teacher, or Department of Community Punishment Correction employees killed or

totally and permanently disabled in the line of duty.

Satisfactory Progress Satisfactory academic progress toward a degree as defined

by the institution.

- II. The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009, and subsequent legislation.
- III. When functioning under Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009, and subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

### **RULE 2 -- SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

# Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

- I. To be eligible for the Military Dependents' Scholarship, an applicant must meet the following conditions:
  - A. The student's parent or spouse must have been declared to be a disabled veteran, prisoner of war, missing in action, killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery during the course of active military duty after January 1, 1960.
  - B. The student's parent or spouse must have been a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time he/she entered service in the United States Armed Services, or whose official residence is currently within the State of Arkansas.
  - C. The dependent child or spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or a person killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran must be a current resident of Arkansas.

- D. The student must qualify as the dependent of a disabled veteran, prisoner of war or a person declared to be missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery by meeting one of the following criteria:
  - 1. The student is the legal spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war, missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery or a person declared to be a disabled veteran or,
  - 2. The dependent child must be the biological child of the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran; or,
  - 3. The dependent child is legally adopted or in legal custody of the guardian that was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
  - 4. The dependent child must meet the U.S. Department of Education's definition of dependent with regards to children.
  - 5. A stepchild is not eligible for this scholarship unless he/she has been legally adopted by the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
- E. The dependent child must meet the U.S. Department of Education's definition of "dependent" with regards to children.
- F. A stepchild is not eligible for this scholarship unless he/she has been legally adopted by the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
- E. G. The applicant must apply for the Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA) Chapter 35 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code with the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- F. H. The applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time student in a public college or university any private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education in Arkansas.
- G. I. The applicant must be an undergraduate student seeking an associate's degree, a baccalaureate degree or certificate of completion.
- H. J. The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline

in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

II. Once a person qualifies as an eligible student under the terms of the program, there shall be no situation, such as the return of a parent or spouse, or the reported death of a parent or spouse that will remove the dependent from the benefits of this program.

### III. Continued Eligibility

An eligible recipient shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year, renewable for up to three (3) additional academic years if the recipient meets the following continuing eligibility criteria established by ADHE:

- 1. The student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale.
- 2. The student is making satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion;
- 3. The student is enrolled in at least twelve semester hours or the equivalent per semester and completes 24 semester hours, or the equivalent, per academic year.

### RULE 3 -- APPLICATION PROCESS

### **Application Process**

- I. Applications
  - A. Brochures are mailed to counselors and principals at public and private Arkansas high schools.
  - B. Brochures are mailed to financial aid officers at public colleges and universities private, nonprofit institutions of higher education in Arkansas and state-supported institutions of higher education in the state of Arkansas. The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students are made aware of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and its benefits.
  - C. Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

### II. Submission of Applications

A. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education shall establish the

- deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas <del>Department</del> <u>Division</u> of Higher Education the following documentation as it applies to the applicant:
  - 1. Military Dependents' Scholarship Application;
  - 2. A death certificate or other documentation certifying the death of the parent or spouse. A death as a result of injuries received while serving in the armed forces is only covered if the death occurred while on active duty.
  - 3. A Report of Casualty from the appropriate branch of the United States Armed Services or a copy of the veteran's DD214 form;
  - 4. Documentation from the federal Department of Veterans Affairs citing service-connected, one hundred percent (100%) total and permanent disability;
  - 5. A copy of the application and statement of acceptance or denial of the federal program for dependents of veterans, Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA).
  - 6. A copy of DEA benefits statement showing the amount of educational assistance allowed for each term.
  - 7. A copy of legal adoption or court appointed legal guardianship for a dependent child;
  - 8. A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child;
  - 9. A copy of marriage license, if a spouse.

#### RULE 4 -- AWARD PROCESS

### **Award Process**

- I. Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within 30 days of the status of their application.
- II. Eligible students will receive an award notice, which contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.

- III. The institution will also receive an award notice, which contains the student's name, social security number, award limits, the conditions of the award, verification process, and payment process. The institution will be required to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continued eligibility each semester.
- V. The award will be renewed annually provided the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as defined by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education in Rule 2-"Scholarship and Eligibility Criteria," Section III.
- VI. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

### RULE 5 -- SCHOLARSHIP PAYMENT POLICIES

### **Scholarship Payment Policies**

- I. The scholarship will pay that portion of charges that exceeds the amount of the DEA educational assistance allowance OR the full amount if the recipient is ineligible for DEA, but is eligible for the MDS Military Dependents' Scholarship. Reimbursement is limited to the cost of tuition at the in-state rate, mandatory fees, and a room and meal plan when provided in campus facilities from such institution or school. The amount reimbursed for the room shall not exceed the usual and custom amounts charged by the institution as for similar scholarship programs.
- II. Payment on behalf of the scholarship recipient will be made directly to the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution at the beginning of each semester for approved charges covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.
- III. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education will pay the institution for the award covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges.

# A. Transfer Policy

A recipient who has received a Military Dependents' Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education receives written notification of the change of status by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and June 1 for the

Summer Terms. Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of the transfer by the deadline will disqualify the student for waiver of tuition and fees at the institution to which he/she has transferred.

# B. Withdrawal Policy

Recipients may withdraw from the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and will be supported with documentation. Recipients who withdraw from school and fail to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring terms, and June 1 for the Summer terms will not be eligible for a tuition waiver for that semester. The recipient may receive the tuition waiver if he/she can demonstrate that extraordinary circumstances prevented him/her from notifying the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

# C. Revocation Policy

The award will be permanently revoked if the recipient fails to enroll full-time and the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education receives neither written notification of transfer to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms and June 1 for the Summer Terms. At the discretion of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, the award will not be revoked if the Department Division determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying the Department Division by the required dates.

# D. Military Service

Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces Reserve units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will be placed in deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

- IV. Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.
- V. The state assistance awarded to a dependent attending a private, nonprofit institution of higher education in this state shall not exceed the maximum amount of state assistance

### **RULE 6 -- INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

### **Institutional Responsibilities**

### I. Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with these responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

### II. Verification

The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education (ADHE) at the close of each term concerning the student's name and continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the Department Division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

# III. Identification of Eligible Students

Institutions will be responsible for exercising all reasonable efforts to identify students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

### IV. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.

# V. Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE of the names of persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE.

# VI. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program.

### RULE 7 -- RECIPIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

# **Recipient Responsibilities**

- I. It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 21 days. This includes:
  - A. Changes in name, or
  - B. Change in address, or
  - C. Change in Institution, or
  - D. Change in full-time status, or
  - E. Withdrawal from an institution.

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of any change in status may affect future eligibility.

### **RULE 8 - PROGRAM DEFINITIONS**

### **Program Definitions**

The following definitions are used in the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program:

Approved Institution A public college or university A private, nonprofit institution of

higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education or technical school located in Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central Association Commission on Higher Education, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.

applicable state and redefal laws.

Dependent Child Any child born or conceived, been legally adopted, or under court

appointed legal guardianship of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran, AND who meets the definition of dependent with regards to children established by the U.S. Department of Education. Stepchildren are not eligible unless legally adopted as stated above.

Dependent Spouse

The legal spouse of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.

Disabled Veteran

A person who has been declared by the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs to be one hundred percent (100%) totally and permanently disabled as a result of service-connected injuries or medical conditions AND who is currently receiving special monthly compensation for such, AND who was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the U.S. armed forces OR who is a current resident of Arkansas.

Full-time Student

An undergraduate student enrolled in at least twelve (12) semester credit hours, or its equivalent, per semester.

Satisfactory Progress

Undergraduate students must maintain a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, and make satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion, as defined by the institution.

Fees Waived

Includes tuition at the in-state rate, room and board when provided in campus facilities, fees or other charges incurred from the approved institution. Non-reimbursable charges would include any penalty charges, including but not limited to, parking tickets, or other penalty payments.

# **SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS**

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE MILITARY DEPENDENTS' SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Act 988 of 2021 expanded the definition of institution of higher education in § 6-82-601 to include private and non-profit institutions of higher education in Arkansas. This language was added to the rule.

Additionally, Act 988 of 2021 clarified that state assistance awarded to a dependent attending a private, nonprofit institution of higher education shall not exceed the maximum amount of state assistance awarded to dependents attending state-supported institutions of higher education. This language was added to the rule.

The previous version of the rules referred to the "Department of Higher Education" rather than the "Division of Higher Education." The rules have been amended to replace "Department of Higher Education" with "Division of Higher Education."

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# Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment Program

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

### RULE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

### **Organization and Structure**

- I. The Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education or his/her designee.
- II. When functioning under Act 881 of 2011, and any subsequent legislation, ADHE shall follow provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

### **RULE 2 - ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

### **Eligibility Criteria**

- I. Eligibility Criteria
  - A. Applicants must be bona fide Arkansas residents, as defined by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, for at least twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline.
    - B. Applicants must be a citizen of the United States or a lawful permanent resident.
    - C. Applicants must have graduated from a veterinary medicine program from the Mississippi State University College of Veterinary Medicine program after April 20<del>12</del>22.
    - D. Applicants must have outstanding federal student loans.
    - E. Applicants must hold a valid Arkansas veterinary's license.
    - F. Applicants must practice food supply veterinary medicine;
    - G. Applicants must begin practicing food supply veterinary medicine in Arkansas within ninety (90) days after the completion of:

- 1. The professional degree program for which the loan was made;
- 2. An internship program; or
- 3. The professional degree program for which the loan was made and an internship program
- H. Applicants must have graduated from an Arkansas public, private, or home school or, GED program.

### II. Continued Eligibility

Recipients shall notify ADHE annually with documentation that proves his/her continuation to meet the eligibility criteria set forth above. A recipient may receive an annual award for a maximum of five (5) consecutive years. However, if a recipient fails to practice the minimum amount of food supply veterinary medicine for even one (1) year out of the five (5) consecutive year period, he/she will not receive loan repayment.

### RULE 3 - SELECTION PROCESS

### **Selection Process**

I. Application

Students must submit an application for the Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Program to the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education. The application is available online at the scholarship website. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will also provide paper applications to any individual upon request. The applicant must complete the Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Program application either in writing or via the website.

II. Submission of Application and Application Deadline

The application deadline shall be <u>JuneJuly</u> 1 of the calendar year in which a student graduates and begins practicing food supply veterinary medicine in Arkansas. At its discretion, the ADHE may extend the deadline, provided sufficient notice is provided to the public. The student is responsible for submitting the application and all supporting documentation in a timely manner.

III. Upon receipt by ADHE, applications are reviewed to ensure that all pertinent data is included. Each applicant will receive confirmation of the receipt and completeness of the application. For those whose application is either incomplete or ineligible, a notification will be made identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility. The applicant will then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information. Before an applicant can be considered for an award, the corrected/missing information must be received by the ADHE by the deadline indicated in the Incomplete/Ineligible Notice.

### IV. Selection and Notification of Recipients

- A. The ADHE shall review applicants and select recipients based on the eligibility criteria for the Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment program.
- B. Selected recipients will receive award notices stating their eligibility for the program and the conditions of their award.
- C. Awards will be provided based on available funding.
- D. If a shortage of funds occurs, the applicants will be ranked by the percentage of the veterinary practice that is devoted to food supply veterinary medicine with those with the highest percentages being awarded first.
- D. Awards will be made on a first-come, first-serve basis.

### V. Disbursement of Award

The award will be disbursed in one (1) disbursement to the federal student loan holder indicated by the applicant. If the award amount is larger than the outstanding loan balance, the award amount will be reduced to the amount of the loan balance.

### **RULE 4 - LIMITATIONS OF LOAN REPAYMENT**

# **Limitations of Loan Repayment**

- I. The Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment program shall be used to provide:
  - A. A loan repayment for federal student loans in the amount not to exceed the amount of tuition assistance provided under the Southern Regional Education Compact program per year for each year a licensed veterinarian, who graduated from Mississippi State University College of Veterinary Medicine program after April 201222, practices food supply veterinary medicine in Arkansas. Total term of federal student loan repayment shall not exceed five consecutive years.
  - B. If a recipient fails to satisfy the obligation to engage in the practice of food supply veterinary medicine for one (1) year in a five (5) consecutive year period, then he/she shall not receive the loan repayment amount.

# **RULE 5 - RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITY**

### **Recipient's Responsibility**

I. Recipient's Responsibility

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of any change in status within 21 days. This will include:

Change in name;

Change in residence;

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education of a change in status will affect future eligibility or collection status.

### **RULE 6 – DEFERMENT OF PRACTICE**

# **Deferment of Practice**

- A. The obligation to engage in the practice of food supply veterinary medicine for a five (5) consecutive year period shall be postponed during any:
  - 1. Period of temporary medical disability if the recipient is unable to practice veterinary medicine;
  - 2. Period of military service under A.C.A. § 6-61-112; or
  - 3. Other period of postponement agreed to by the ADHE.
- B. To qualify for a deferment, a recipient must notify ADHE of their claim for the deferment and provide supporting documentation on a Request for Deferment form that will be supplied by ADHE upon request. The Request for Deferment form must be completed and returned to ADHE by the recipient. The recipient will be notified within ten (10) days of approval or disapproval of any application for a deferment.

#### **RULE 6 - PROGRAM DEFINITIONS**

# **Program Definitions**

The following definitions are used in the State Teacher Education Program Out-of-State Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment Program:

Arkansas Resident

to be considered an Arkansas resident by ADHE, an applicant must be an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program. Further, the recipient may be asked to provide evidence of

a permanent connection with the State of Arkansas. ADHE will look to one or more of the following to determine residency in those cases:

- (A) Valid Arkansas Driver's License;
- (B) Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for previous year;
- (C) Proof of Arkansas vehicle registration;
- (D) Proof of Arkansas voter registration; and
- (E) Other forms of proof of Arkansas residency.

Award Year

The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year, and extends to June 30 of the next calendar year.

Food Animal

A bovine, porcine, ovine, camelid, cervid, poultry, and any other species determined by the Arkansas State Veterinarian.

Food Supply Veterinary Medicine

All aspects of veterinary medicine's involvement in food supply systems, from traditional agricultural production to consumption.

Lawful Permanent Resident

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G-641 can also

Loan Repayment

A payment made to a federal loan holder on a recipient's behalf after the completion of the yearly requirements by recipient.

be used to document permanent resident status.

Participating Institution

Mississippi State University College of Veterinary Medicine

Practice of Food Supply Veterinary Medicine

A corporate or private veterinary practice with a minimum of thirty percent (30%) of the practice

devoted to food animal medicine or mixed animal medicine located in rural areas.

U.S. Citizen

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory- Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

# SUMMARY OF AMENDMENTS

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE OUT-OF-STATE VETERINARY MEDICAL EDUCATION LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM

The Veterinary Medical Education Loan Repayment Program was established by Act 811 of 2011. While rules were promulgated previously, the program has only recently been funded. Therefore, it was necessary to amend the rules to include the updated graduation year. The application deadline has also been updated.

Because the program was created for the benefit of Arkansas students, the rules have been amended to clarify that an applicant must be a graduate of an Arkansas public, private, or home school or GED program.

The rules are amended to include the requirement that applications be accessed online rather than mailed upon request. This amendment removes the unnecessary language stating that applications must be filled out online.

Because funding for the program comes from fees that vary from year to year, the selection process in the rules has been amended to clarify that awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis.

The previous version of the rules referred to the "Department of Higher Education" rather than the "Division of Higher Education." The rules have been amended to replace "Department of Higher Education" with "Division of Higher Education."

# MINORITY MASTERS FELLOWS PROGRAM-RULES AND REGULATIONS

# **RULE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE**

I. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Minority Masters Fellows Program within the policies set by the State Board of Higher Education. The program will provide scholarships to students who have completed their baccalaureate degrees and are entering a master's program in mathematics, science, or foreign language, and to students in the fifth year of a five year teacher education program who were eligible to participate in the Minority Teacher Scholars Program. Beginning with the 1997-98 academic year, applicants who enroll in master's degree program in education must have been recipients of the Minority Teacher Scholars Programscholarships.

All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his/her designee.

II. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

### **RULE 2 - SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

# I. Eligibility Criteria

- A. Applicants must be African-American, Hispanic, or Asian-American, or Native
  - 1. For guidance purposes, the terms African American, Hispanic, Asian—American, and Native American are based on the Race/Ethnic classifications utilized by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) as follows:
    - a. African-American = Black/Non-Hispanic: a person having origins in any other black racial groups of Africa.
    - b. Hispanic: a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
    - c. Asian-American = Asian or Pacific Islander: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes those from China, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, Samoa, India and Vietnam.

- d. Native American = American Indian or Alaska Native: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- B. Applicants must be bona fide Arkansas residents, as defined by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, for at least six months prior to the application deadline.
- C. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or permanent resident aliens.
- D. Applicants must be enrolled full-time in a public or independent 4-year institution located in Arkansas. Full- time is defined as a minimum of nine college semester hours, or the equivalent, excluding correspondence courses.
- E. Applicants must have received a baccalaureate degree. They must be admitted to a master's level program in mathematics, the sciences or foreign languages at an Arkansas university. In addition, students in the fifth year of a five-year teacher education program who were eligible for the Minority Teacher Scholars-Program scholarship are eligible for the Minority Masters Fellows Program if their undergraduate major field was mathematics, any of the sciences or foreign languages. In 1995-96 and 1996-97, such applicants are eligible to receive Minority Masters Fellowships whether or not they actually received a Minority Teacher Scholars scholarship. Starting in 1997-98, however, a fifth year master's program applicant must have been a recipient of the Minority Teacher Scholars award.
- F. Priority will be given to applicants who have completed baccalaureate degrees within the past two years.
- G. Applicants must have a minimum 2.75 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale (or its equivalent). For continued eligibility, masters fellows must maintain a 3.0 grade point average.

#### RULE 3 - SELECTION PROCESS

I. Students must submit an application to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. Applications will be mailed to presidents and chancellors for distribution to all deans and department chairs, to financial aid directors, and to Teacher Certification Officials at all public and independent four-year institutions in the State of Arkansas. Applications may also be obtained from ADHE upon request.

### II. Deadline for Applications

The application deadline will be established by the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education and published in its brochure and announced to each participatinginstitution when applications are distributed.

### III. Review of Applications

For applications that are either incomplete or ineligible, a notice will be sent to the applicant identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility. The applicant will then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information.

# IV. Ranking of Applicants

Applications are ranked according to a combination of components including cumulative grade point average and major grade point average.

# V. Selection and Notification of Recipients

- A. The ADHE shall review ranked applicants and make recommendations for scholarship recipients based on allocation of funds. The total of initial awards shall not exceed \$200,000 in 1995-96.
- B. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.
- C. Recipients will be notified by mail of their awards.

# VI. Institutional Eligibility

The institution to be attended under the scholarship program must be an Arkansaspublic or independent four-year institution and must meet federal institutional eligibility requirements.

### RULE 4 - AWARDING OF SCHOLARSHIP

### I. Award Process

Scholarship recipients will be mailed award notices announcing their selection for the program. Prior to the disbursement of funds, each recipient will receive a promissory note for the purpose of entering into an agreement with ADHE. The terms of the agreement will include the general purpose, repayment and deferment procedures, interest calculations, and a schedule of advances. The promissory note shall be signed by the scholarship recipient and by a co-maker of eligible age. Modifications to any award amounts will be confirmed through the issuance of a new promissory note.

# II. Limitation of Scholarships

- A. Students may receive up to \$7,500 for one academic year (or up to \$2,500 per summer for no more than three summers).
- B. Students may receive the scholarship for a maximum of one academic year (or no more than three summers).

III. Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost ofattendance.

### **RULE 5 - REPAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIP**

# I. Terms of Repayment

- A. Scholarship recipients who teach full-time in an Arkansas public school or public institution of higher education for two years shall have the total scholarship and related interest forgiven. This shall be in addition to any teaching obligation the recipient may have to fulfill based on receipt of a Minority Teacher Scholars Programscholarship.
- B. Recipients who do not teach full-time in an Arkansas public school or public institution of higher education, or who discontinue their studies prior to completing their programs of study, shall go into repayment.
- C. The repayment schedule will be set in monthly payments based on the total amount of the loan remaining at the time of entry into repayment, plus interest. Payments will be computed to ensure that repayment will be completed within a maximum of five years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school.

### II. Interest on Loan

- A. Interest will accrue from the beginning of the repayment period at a maximum annual percentage rate not to exceed five percent (5%) per annum above the Federal Reserve Discount Rate at the time of the contract on the outstanding principal.
- B. Interest will not accrue and installments need not be paid when a deferment has been approved by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. Any recipient who desires a deferment must submit an application for deferment to ADHE for approval.

# III. Deferment of Loan

- A. At ADHE's discretion, scheduled loan repayments may be deferred if ADHE determines that extraordinary circumstances prevent the recipient from making such repayments. Deferments may be granted for the following conditions:
  - 1. The recipient is engaged in a full-time course of doctoral study at an institution of higher education. This must be verified by the Registrar's Office.

- 2. The recipient is seeking and unable to find employment as a teacher for a single period not to exceed twelve (12) months. The loan recipient must submit a list of schools contacted for employment. ADHE will verify this information with the schools listed.
- 3. The recipient is temporarily totally disabled, for a period not to exceed three years, as established by sworn affidavit from a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
- 4. The recipient is unable to secure employment for a period not to exceed twelve (12) months by reason of the care of a spouse who is disabled, as established by the signature of a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
- 5. Other extraordinary circumstances which would prevent the recipient from repaying the debt within the contractual obligations of the promissory note may be considered.
- B. To qualify for any of the deferments, recipients must notify ADHE of their claim to the deferment on a Request for Deferment form which will be supplied by ADHE upon request. The recipient must complete the Request for Deferment form and return it, along with supporting documentation, to ADHE. ADHE will notify the recipient within ten (10) working days of approval or disapproval of any application for a deferment.

### IV. Cancellation of Scholarship

ADHE will cancel a recipient's repayment obligations if it determines:

- A. On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician; or
- B. On the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient has died.

# V. Prepayment of Loan

There shall be no penalty for prepayment or repayment of all or any portion of the principal.

### VI. Grace Period

There will exist a nine-month grace period following graduation before the recipient must either take employment in an Arkansas public school or public institution of

higher education in an approved subject specified for this program or beginrepayment of the scholarship.

# VII. Failure to Repay

Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

### **RULE 6 - INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

# I. College/University Responsibilities

#### A. Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification to ADHE each semester after registration, giving the names of the program scholarship recipients who are officially enrolled as full-time students and their grade point average. This information is reported on a verification roster.

The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster two times a year for those institutions on the semester system and three times a year for those institutions on the trimester system. The verification roster will be mailed to the financial aid director at the time of registration for each term. The signed verification roster should be returned to ADHE by July 1 for the summer I term, September 1 for the summer II term, November 1 for the fall term, March 15 for the winter and/or spring term, and May 1 of the spring term for institutions on the trimester system.

The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Minority Masters Fellows scholarship for a given academic semester or trimester. Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.

### B. Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE of the names of any personsowing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. Thisinformation should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE.

### C. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The scholarship will divided equally according to the number of terms at each institution: three payments for those institutions on trimesters and two-payments for those institutions on semesters. After verification of full-time enrollment for the scholarship recipients, the institutions disburses the funds in accordance with its policy.

### D. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by ADHE on any current or former loan recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Minority Master's Fellows Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

### RULE 7 - SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITY

# I. Recipient's Responsibility

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education of any change in status within 21 days. This will include:

Change in name

Change in residence

**Change in institution** 

Change in full-time status (below nine college semester credit hours or its equivalent per semester or trimester)

Change in course of study and/or

Change in employment.

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of a change in status will affect future eligibility or collection status.

### RULE 8 - COLLECTION OF LOAN

### I. Collection of Loan

Accounts will be retained by ADHE in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for forgiveness or deferment due to the recipient's failure to remain employed in the teaching field for the specified time period. At that time, the scholarship will be converted to a loan and the account will be turned over to a vendor for servicing. ADHE will notify the student by mail of this action and include a loan amortization schedule with the notification letter. The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due. Upon determination that a loan recipient is 120 days delinquent, ADHE will mail both the recipient and the co-signer a first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due. If payment is not received within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient and the co-signer

declaring the account delinquent and requesting that it be immediately brought upto date. If no response is received by 90 days from the original payment due, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient and co-signerinforming them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding paymentsare not received within 30 days. At this point, defaulted recipients and/or cosigners will be reported to credit reporting agencies, a state income tax set-offwill be requested, and a civil suit will be initiated, if necessary, against the recipient and co-signer for repayment of theloan.

# II. Skip Tracing Mechanisms

If letters are returned as undeliverable, the Department of Finance and Administration's Motor Vehicle Division can be used to perform skip tracing activities. Motor Vehicle Division's records are updated in March and September each year. To get this information, mail name, current address, and social security number on Arkansas Department of Higher Education letterhead to:

A response from the Motor Vehicle Division should be received within ten (10) working days. Additionally, ADHE will use these steps to locate recipients and/or co-signers if communications are returned as undelivered:

- A. Contact references listed on the recipient'sapplication
- B. Use telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient and/or co-signer's last knownaddress
- C. Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended
- D. Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender
- E. Contact recipient's field of study professional organization, union, or licensing board
- F. Contact post office
- G. Contact utility companies
- H. Contact Chamber of Commerce.

# III. Credit Reporting Agencies

Defaulted recipients and/or co-signers will be reported to the following credit reporting agencies:

A. CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.

### B. TRW Credit Data

# C. Trans Union Credit Reporting

Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers are located in the collections file. ADHE will also respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers.

### IV. State Income Tax Set-Off

By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, ADHE is a claimant agency for the set-off of debts against state tax refunds. To access the Set-Off Section of the State Tax Administration Office, ADHE must submit name, address, social security number, and amount of debt via computer magnetic tape by December 1 to intercept taxes for the next year.

# V. Litigation

No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, ADHE may institute a civil suit against the recipient and co-signer for repayment of the scholarship. Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00. If over \$3,000.00 ADHE must use Circuit Court. If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, ADHE may choose to use Small Claims Court and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court.

If ADHE chooses to waive the difference, it may not, at a later date, attempt to collect the difference. Forms to take the recipient and/or co-signer to Small Claims Court are requested from the recipient's and/or co-signer's county of residence.

### VI. Write-Offs

Minority Masters Fellows scholarships may be written off as uncollectible if ADHE shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file reflect that:

- A. The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
- B. The recipient and co-signer do not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.

Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approved by the administrator before Minority Masters Fellows Program accounts may be written off as uncollectible.

# VII. Nonpayment Penalties

Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

### **RULE 9 - PROGRAM DEFINITIONS**

**Deferment** 

This is a postponement of repayments and the accrual of interest. ADHE shall not consider that the recipient has violated the repayment schedule if he or she does not meet the payments during the time he or she is in deferment status.

**Due Diligence** 

This process refers to those steps ADHE takes to collect Minority Masters Fellows Program funds when a recipient enters repayment status. It includes: billing the recipient, sending overdue notices, conducting address searches if the recipient cannot be located, reporting the account to credit bureaus, collection, and litigation. Due diligence also includes keeping the recipient informed of all changes in the Minority Masters Fellows Program that affect his or her rights and responsibilities and responding promptly to the recipient'singuiries.

Full-time Student

A student enrolled for a minimum of 9 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

Grace Period

A nine-month period of time followinggraduation and before the recipient must either take employment in an Arkansas public school or public institution of higher-education or begin repayment of thescholarship.

Permanent Resident Alien

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

**Promissory Note** 

The promissory note is a legal document obligating the recipient to repay the loan if he or she does not teach for two (2) full years in an approved subject area on a full-time basis in an Arkansas public school or public institution of higher education. The recipient's rights and responsibilities will be stated on the promissory note.

Satisfactory Academic

**Progress** 

Satisfactory academic progress is maintainedif the recipient has a minimum 3.00 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

**Skip Tracing** 

A process for locating a recipient who is in repayment status. ADHE's efforts may include contacting relatives, friends, references, and other individuals or entities in the recipient's file.

Teach on a Full-time Basis

Teach the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency at which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

U.S. Citizen or National

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born orwho have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory

Palau. The term "national" includes citizens

- Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION MINORITY MASTERS FELLOWS PROGRAM RULES AND REGULATIONS

These rules are being repealed because they are no longer needed. The scholarship program is no longer in existence and all repayments have been satisfied.

### MINORITY TEACHER SCHOLARS PROGRAM RULES AND REGULATIONS

### **RULE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE**

I. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Minority Teacher Scholars Program within the policies set by the State Board of Higher Education. The purpose of the Minority Teacher Scholars Program is to provide scholarships to assist and encourage African-American, Hispanic, and Asian-American and Native American Arkansans to enter and complete programs leading to certification as public school teachers. The program will provide scholarships to students who have completed sixty semester credit hours and have been admitted to a teacher certification program. The program is needed to increase the number of African-American students pursuing certification as public school teachers. Special efforts will be made to recruit black males into this program, especially in the areas of elementary education and guidance counseling.

All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his/her designee.

II. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

### **RULE 2 - SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

- I. Eligibility Criteria
  - A. Applicants must be African-American, Hispanic, or Asian-American, or Native American.
    - 1. For guidance purposes, the terms African American, Hispanic, Asian—American, and Native American are based on the Race/Ethnic classifications utilized by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) as follows:
    - a. African-American = Black/Non-Hispanic: a person having origins in any other black racial groups of Africa.
      - b. Hispanic: a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
      - c. Asian-American = Asian or Pacific Islander: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes those from China, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, Samoa, India and Vietnam.

- d. Native American = American Indian or Alaska Native: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- B. Applicants must be bona fide Arkansas residents, as defined by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, for at least six months prior to the application deadline.
- C. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or permanent resident aliens.
- D. Applicants must be enrolled full-time in a public or independent 4-year institution located in Arkansas. Full- time is defined as a minimum of twelve college semester hours, or the equivalent, excluding correspondence courses.
- E. New applicants must have completed sixty semester credit hours and have been admitted to a teacher certification program. Applicants for a continuing award must meet continuing eligibilityrequirements.
- F. Applicants must be admitted to an approved program resulting in teacher certification.
- G. Applicants must have a minimum 2.50 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale (or its equivalent).

# **II.** Continued Eligibility Requirements

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will renew awards for a second academic year to recipients who continue to meet the criteria set forth in Rule 2, paragraphs I.A-G; and who complete at least 24 semester-credit hours (or the equivalent) applicable toward teacher certification during the first academic year of the loan.

### **RULE 3 - SELECTION PROCESS**

I. Students must submit an application to the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education. Applications will be mailed to Education Departments, financial aid-directors, Deans of Colleges of Education, and Teacher Certification Officials at all public and independent 2-year and 4-year institutions in the State of Arkansas. Applications may also be obtained from ADHE upon request.

### II. Deadline for Applications

The application deadline will be established by the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education and published in its brochure and announced to each participatinginstitution when applications are distributed.

### **III. Review of Applications**

For applications that are either incomplete or ineligible, a notice will be sent to the applicant identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility. The applicant will-then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information.

# IV. Ranking of Applicants

Applications are ranked according to a combination of components including cumulative grade point average and major grade point average.

# V. Selection and Notification of Recipients

- A. The ADHE shall review ranked applicants and make recommendations for scholarship recipients based on allocation of funds. The number of initial awards shall not exceed 50.
- B. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

# VI. Institutional Eligibility

The institution to be attended under the scholarship program must be a public or independent four year institution located in Arkansas, meet federal institutional eligibility requirements, and be approved by the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education for the teacher certification program chosen by the student.

### **RULE 4 - AWARDING OF SCHOLARSHIP**

### I. Award Process

Selected scholarship recipients will be mailed award notices stating their eligibility for the program and the conditions for continued eligibility. Prior to the disbursement of funds, recipients will receive promissory notes for the purpose of entering into an agreement with ADHE. The terms of the agreement will include the general purpose, repayment and deferment procedures, interest calculations, and a schedule of advances. The promissory note shall be signed by the scholarship recipient and by a co-maker of eligible age. Modifications to any award amounts will be confirmed through the issuance of a new promissory note.

### II. Disbursement of Scholarship

The scholarship will be divided equally according to the number of terms at each institution: three payments for those institutions on trimesters and two payments for those institutions on semesters. Funds will be sent to the institution via electronic funds transfer. After verification of full-time enrollment for the scholarship recipient, the institution disburses the funds in accordance with its policy.

Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institutions must follow ADHE policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

# III. Limitation of Scholarships

- A. Students may receive up to \$5,000 per academicyear.
- B. Students may receive scholarships for a maximum of four (4) semesters or six (6) trimesters or until such time as they have completed certification requirements, as determined by the teacher certification official, to teach in Arkansas, whichever comes first.
- C. Recipients must indicate an intention to teach in the public schools of Arkansas and be enrolled as full-time students pursuing initial certification unless the course of study is guidance counseling. (See Rule 5, III. A. 6.)

# **RULE 5 - REPAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIP**

# I. Terms of Repayment

- A. Scholarship recipients who teach full-time in an Arkansas public school following certification shall have 20 percent of the total scholarship and related interest forgiven for each full academic year employed in such capacity, up to a maximum of five (5) years, when the total scholarship and accumulated interest will be forgiven.
- B. Recipients shall have their teaching commitment reduced to three (3) years if they teach full-time in an Arkansas public school following certification in one of the following critical areas:
  - 1. Elementary (African-American malesonly)
  - 2. Secondary Math
  - 3. Secondary Science
  - Foreign Language
  - 5. Guidance Counseling
  - Any subject or level in the Delta Region

ADHE will verify the recipient's employment once a year in June by contacting the superintendent's office in the recipient's employment district.

C. Recipients who do not teach full-time in an Arkansas public school following certification, or who discontinue their studies prior to completing their program of study shall, within a maximum of five (5) years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school, repay the full remaining balance, plus accrued interest according to an interest and repayment schedule provided by ADHE. At this point, the recipient's scholarship converts to aloan.

The repayment schedule will be set in monthly payments based on the total amount of the loan remaining at the time of entry into repayment, plus interest. Payments will be computed to ensure that repayment will be completed within a maximum of five years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school.

### II. Interest on Loan

- A. Interest will accrue from the beginning of the repayment period at a maximum annual percentage rate of 10 percent on the unpaid balance. Interest will be calculated as a simple, per annum interest charge on the outstanding principal.
- B. Interest will not accrue and installments need not be paid when a deferment has been approved by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. Any recipient who wishes a deferment must submit an application for deferment to ADHE for approval.

### III. Deferment of Loan

- A. At ADHE's discretion, scheduled loan repayments may be deferred if the Department determines that extraordinary circumstances prevent the recipient from making such repayments. Deferments may be granted for the following conditions:
  - 1. The recipient is engaged in a full-time course of undergraduate or graduate study at an institution of higher education. This must be verified by the registrar.
  - 2. The recipient is seeking and unable to find employment as a teacher in an approved shortage field or area for a single period not to exceed twelve (12) months. The loan recipient must submit a list of schools contacted for employment. ADHE will verify this information with the superintendent's office in each of those school districts.
  - 3. The recipient is temporarily totally disabled, for a period not to exceed three years, as established by sworn affidavit from a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
  - 4. The recipient is unable to secure employment for a period not to exceed twelve (12) months by reason of the care of a spouse who is disabled, as

- established by the signature of a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
- Other extraordinary circumstances which would prevent the recipient from repaying the debt within the contractual obligations of the note may be considered.
- 6. Inasmuch as guidance counselors are required to teach one full year before they can be certified as a counselor, the recipient may qualify for up to two years of deferment if the student majors in a behavioral social science field and states an intent to pursue guidance counseling as a career.
- B. To qualify for any of the deferments, recipients must notify ADHE of their claim to the deferment on a Request for Deferment form which will be supplied by ADHE-upon request. The recipient must complete the Request for Deferment form and return it, along with supporting documentation, to ADHE. ADHE will notify the recipient within ten (10) working days of approval or disapproval of any application for a deferment.

# IV. Cancellation of Scholarship

ADHE will cancel a recipient's repayment obligations if it determines:

- A. On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician; or
- B. On the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient has died.

### V. Prepayment of Loan

There shall be no penalty for prepayment or repayment of all or any portion of the principal.

# VI. Grace Period

There will exist a nine-month grace period following graduation before the recipient must either take employment in a public school in Arkansas in an approved subject, level, or geographic area specified for this program or begin repayment of the scholarship.

### VII. Failure to Repay

Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

### **RULE 6 - INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

# I. College/University Responsibilities

### A. Proposal to Participate

An institution with more than one Minority Teacher Scholar enrolled in the institution's teacher education program may submit a proposal to the Department of Higher Education for up to \$5,000 which describes support services it will make available to facilitate the academic success of scholarship recipients.

The proposal should describe services and activities designed to mentor and otherwise assist scholarship recipients to become successful and effective teachers. The institution must designate a member of the teacher education faculty to manage the program. A faculty mentor, who may be the same person, must also be assigned to the scholarship recipients; this individual must agree to dedicate a portion of his or her time to work directly with these students.

The institutional plan should also propose other services and activities which in its judgment will further the academic success of scholarship recipients. These may include special seminars or conferences, informal opportunities for the recipients to work with each other, with practicing teachers, or with teacher education students at other institutions.

Proposed institutional plans may be up to five pages in length, should specify the responsible faculty member and faculty mentor, explain how ADHE funds will be used and describe the source and use of institutional matching funds, which may be cash or in-kind. Plans should be submitted to ADHE by October 15 of each year.

ADHE will fund the proposal, if approved, by November 1 of each year.

### **B.** Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification to ADHE each semester after registration, giving the names of the program scholarship recipients who are officially enrolled as full-time students. This information is reported on a verification roster. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster two times a year for those schools on the semester system and three times a year for those schools on the trimester system. The verification roster will be mailed to the financial aid director at the time of registration for each term. The signed verification roster should be returned to ADHE by November 1 for the fall term, March 15 for the winter and/or spring term, and May 1 of the spring term for institutions on the trimester system. The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Minority Teacher Scholars scholarship for a given academic semester or

trimester. Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.

### C. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

# D. Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE.

### E. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information requested by ADHE on any current or former loan recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of Minority Teacher Scholars Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will periodically review the institution's recordsconcerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

F. UALR, UAPB, UCA, and HSU are presently participating in Teachers of Tomorrow Academy, a program funded by a Promotional Grant for minority students in high school who are interested in teaching careers. Those universities are invited to participate in a pilot program designed to build upon the pre-collegiate activities already in place for students in the Teachers of Tomorrow program who will be enrolled as freshmen or sophomores on those campuses.

The four institutions may submit a joint proposal which describes activities designed to build on the students' interest in teaching as a career and to help-prepare them for successful entry into a teacher education program. The proposal should provide for education-related work experience for which participating students would receive a stipend. The proposal should specify that in order to be eligible to participate, a student must be enrolled as a freshman or sophomore in one of the four institutions and must have participated in the Teachers of Tomorrow program.

The proposed plan should explain how the program will be administered and how ADHE funds will be used. The plan should be submitted to ADHE by October 15. Funding for the initial year will be \$20,000.

### **RULE 7 - SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITY**

### I. Recipient's Responsibility

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher-Education of any change in status within 21 days. This will include:

Change in name

Change in residence

Change in institution

Change in full-time status (below twelve college semester credit hours or its equivalent per semester or trimester)

Change in course of study and/or

Change in employment.

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of a change in status will affect future eligibility or collection status.

### **RULE 8 - COLLECTION OF LOAN**

### Collection of Loan

Accounts will be retained by ADHE in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for forgiveness or deferment due to the recipient's failure to remain employed in the teaching field for the specified time period. At that time, the scholarship will be converted to a loan and the account will be turned over to a vendor for servicing. ADHE will notify the student by mail of this action and include a loan amortization schedule with the notification letter. The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due. Upon determination that a loanrecipient is 120 days delinquent, ADHE will mail both the recipient and the co-signer a first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due. If payment is not received within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient and the co-signerdeclaring the account delinquent and requesting that it be immediately brought upto date. If no response is received by 90 days from the original payment due, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient and co-signer informing them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not received within 30 days.

# II. Skip Tracing Mechanisms

If letters are returned as undeliverable, the Department of Finance and Administration's Motor Vehicle Division can be used to perform skip tracing activities. Motor Vehicle Division's records are updated in March and September each year. To get this information, mail name, current address, and social security number on Arkansas Department of Higher Education letterhead to:

A response from the Motor Vehicle Division should be received within ten (10) working days. Additionally, ADHE will use these steps to locate recipients and/or co-signers if communications are returned as undelivered:

- A. Contact references listed on the recipient's application
- B. Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient and/or co-signer's last knownaddress
- C. Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient lastattended
- D. Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender
- E. Contact recipient's field of study professional organization, union, or licensing board
- F. Contact post office
- G. Contact utility companies
- H. Contact Chamber of Commerce.
- III. Credit Reporting Agencies

Defaulted recipients and/or co-signers will be reported to the following credit reporting agencies:

- A. CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.
- B. T.R.W.Credit Data

# C. Trans Union Credit Reporting

Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers are located in the collections file. ADHE will also respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers.

### IV. State Income Tax Set-Off

By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, ADHE is a claimant agency for the set-off of debts against state tax refunds. To access the Set-Off Section of the State Tax Administration Office, ADHE must submit name, address, social security number, and amount of debt via computer magnetic tape by December 1 to intercept taxes for the next year.

# V. Litigation

No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, ADHE shall institute a civil suit against the recipient and co-signer for repayment of the scholarship. Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00. If over \$3,000.00 ADHE must use Circuit Court. If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, ADHE may choose to use Small Claims Courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court. If ADHE chooses to waive the difference, it may not, at a later date, attempt to collect the difference. Forms to take the recipient and/or co-signer to Small Claims Court are requested from the recipient's and/or co-signer's county of residence.

### VI. Write-Offs

Minority Teacher Education scholarships may be written off as uncollectible if ADHE shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:

- A. The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced, or
- B. The recipient and/or co-signer does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.

Proof of due diligence collections activities must be submitted to the administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approved by the administrator before Minority Teacher Scholars Program accounts may be written off as uncollectible.

# VII. Nonpayment Penalties

Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

# **RULE 9 - PROGRAM DEFINITIONS**

The following definitions are used in the Minority Teacher Scholars Program:

Academic Year	A measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient. The academic year is defined as two semesters, two trimesters, or three quarters.
Approved Institution	An Arkansas public or independent collegeor university that is currently accredited by the North-Central Association, Commission of Institutions of Higher Education, or has achieved candidacy status, and has a teacher certification program approved by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
Award Year	The award year begins on July 1 of onecalendar year and ends on June 30 of the next calendaryear.
Cancellation	ADHE shall cancel a recipient'srepayment obligation if it determines:
	On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician; or on the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient is deceased.
Default	Failure to repay the MinorityTeacher Education scholarship in accordance with the terms of the promissory note provided that this failure persists for 180 days for monthlypayments.
Deferment	This is a postponement of repayments and the accrual of interest. ADHE shall not consider that the recipient has violated the repayment schedule if heor

she does not meet the payments during the time he or she is in deferment status.

**Delta Region** 

The following 42 counties of Arkansasare designated as being in the Delta Region: Arkansas, Ashley, Baxter, Bradley, Calhoun, Chicot, Clay, Cleveland, Craighead, Crittenden, Cross, Dallas, Desha, Drew, Fulton, Grant, Greene, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Lee, Lincoln, Lonoke, Marion, Mississippi, Monroe, Ouachita, Phillips, Poinsett, Prairie, Pulaski, Randolph, St. Francis, Searcy, Sharp, Stone, Union, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff. (Information obtained from the Delta Foundation in Mississippi.)

**Due Diligence** 

This process refers to those steps ADHE takes to collect Minority Teacher Scholars Program fundswhen a recipient enters repayment status. It includes: billing the recipient, sending overdue notices, conducting address searches if the recipient cannot be located, reporting the account to credit bureaus, collection, and litigation. Due diligence also includes keeping the recipient informed of all changes in the Minority Teacher Scholars Program that affect his or her rights and responsibilities and responding promptly to the recipient's inquiries.

Full-time Student

A student enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

**Grace Period** 

A nine-month period of time followinggraduation and before the recipient must either take employment in a public school in Arkansas or begin repayment of the scholarship.

Permanent Resident Alien

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

**Promissory Note** 

The promissory note is a legaldocument obligating the recipient to repay the loan if he or she doesnot

teach for five (5) or three (3) full years in a subject area shortage or specified geographic area on a full-time basis in a public school in Arkansas. The recipient's rights and responsibilities will be stated on the promissory note.

**Satisfactory Academic** 

Progress Satisfactory academic progress is maintainedif the

recipient has a minimum 2.50 cumulative grade

point average on a 4.0 scale.

Skip Tracing A process for locating a recipient who is in

repayment status. ADHE's efforts may include contacting relatives, friends, references, and other

individuals or entities in the recipient's file.

Teach on a Full-time

Basis Teach the same number of hours required of

teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency at which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or

agency in which an individual is teaching.

U.S. Citizen or National The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born orwho

have become naturalized citizens of the 50-States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory - Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or

Swain's Island.

# EMERGENCY SECONDARY EDUCATION LOAN RULES AND REGULATIONS

### RULE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- I. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Emergency Secondary Education Loan (ESEL) Program within the policies set by the State Board of Higher Education. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his/her designee. The Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program Advisory Council shall provide advice to ADHE regarding the administration of the program.
- II. Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program Advisory Council
  - A. The Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program Advisory Council shall consist of three members appointed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and three members appointed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Education, General Education Division. They will be appointed annually on July 1.
  - B. The ESEL Advisory Council shall provide advice to ADHE in the establishment of program rules, regulations, procedures, and selection criteria, and shall recommend individuals to be awarded loans.
  - C. The Director of ADHE or his/her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the ESEL Advisory Council and shall ensure that staff services for the Advisory Council are provided.
- III. The final responsibility for selecting loan recipients shall rest jointly with the Directors of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and the Arkansas Department of Education, General Education Division.
- IV. When functioning under Act 390 of 1983, Act 509 of 1985, and any subsequent legislation, ADHE shall follow provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

### RULE 2 - LOAN ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

# . Eligibility Criteria

- A. Applicants must be bona fide Arkansas residents, as defined by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, for at least six months prior to the application deadline.
- B. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or permanent resident aliens.
- C. Applicants must be enrolled full-time in an Arkansas public or independent college or university which is regionally accredited, has been approved by ADHE and has a teacher education program, or enrolled full-time in a regionally accredited two-year Arkansas institution whose courses are directly creditable toward a teacher education program in a baccalaureate granting institution. Full-time is defined as a minimum of twelve college semester hours, or the equivalent, excluding correspondence courses.
- D. Applicants must be enrolled:
  - 1. As a major in a program leading to secondary teacher certification in math or science, or any other teaching field that has been determined to be a shortage field in Arkansas; or,
  - 2. Must have received a baccalaureate degree in such field as a major and beenrolled full-time in a program leading to Arkansas teacher certification; or,
- 3. Must have received a baccalaureate degree or teacher certification in another field and be enrolled to complete course work in a shortage field that is the equivalent to that required for a major in a field and teacher certification.
  - E. Applicants must plan to teach the approved subject(s) in an Arkansas public or private-secondary school.
  - F. Applicants must have a minimum 2.50 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale.
  - G. Applicants must have completed their freshman year of college.
  - H. In addition to the minimum 2.50 cumulative grade point average, sophomore applicants must have a minimum composite score of 18 on the ACT. Juniors, seniors, and others must have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 in their major area of study.
  - I. Loan recipients must maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least a 2.50 on a 4.0 scale and complete a minimum of 24 semester credit hours, or the equivalent, per academic year.

# RULE 3 - LOAN PROCESS

€.	Upon receipt by ADHE, applications are reviewed to ensure that all pertinent data is included. A letter is mailed to each applicant confirming the receipt and completeness of the application. For those whose application is either incomplete or ineligible, a notice will be sent identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility. The applicant will then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information. Before an applicant can be considered for an award, the corrected/missing information must be received by the Department of Higher Education by the deadline indicated in the Incomplete/Ineligible Notice.
<del>II.</del>	Ranking of Applicants
	Applications are ranked according to a combination of components including cumulative grade point average, major grade point average, ACT score, area of study, and whether or not the

applicant is a prior recipient. If a prior recipient remains fully qualified, he/she will be given-

priority for any future awards.

III. Selection and Notification of Loan Recipients

- A. The ESEL Advisory Council shall review ranked applicants and make recommendations for loan recipients.
- B. The final responsibility for selecting loan recipients shall rest jointly with the Directors of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and Arkansas Department of Education, General Education Division.
- C. Consideration will be given to assuring the inclusion of minority students in this program.
- D. Priority in the awarding of loans shall be given to those applicants who have demonstrated the greatest academic ability.
- E. In cases where two (2) or more applicants receive the same priority rating, the advantage shall be given to the student who can become certified in the shortest period of time.
- F. Selected loan recipients will be mailed award notices stating their eligibility for the program and the conditions for continued eligibility. This award, when combined with the recipient's other sources of financial aid, may not exceed the total cost of education. Prior to the disbursment of funds, loan recipients will receive promissory notes for the purpose of entering into a loan agreement with ADHE. The terms of the loan agreement will include the general purpose, repayment and deferment procedures, interest calculations, and a schedule of advances. The promissory note shall be signed by the loan recipient and by a co-maker of eligible age. Modifications to any award amounts will be confirmed through the issuance of a new promissory note.

# IV. Disbursement of Loan

The loan will be divided equally according to the number of terms at the institution: three-payments for those institutions on trimesters and two payments for those institutions on semesters. Warrants payable to individual recipients will be sent by certified mail to the approved institution of their choice as indicated on their accepted award notices. After-verification of full-time enrollment for the loan recipient, funds will be disbursed in accordance with the institution's disbursement policy.

# V. Follow-Up and Verification

- A. Questionnaires are mailed to the institutions at the close of each term to verify the number of semester hours completed for that term and cumulative grade point average of each loan-recipient.
- B. Students determined to be ineligible for further awards will be notified and contacted for repayment. Graduating students will be contacted to determine repayment/forgiveness status.

### RULE 4 - LIMITATIONS OF LOAN AWARDS

I. Students may receive loans up to but not in excess of one-half (1/2) of the cost of student fees, room, board, books, and instructional supplies at the institution to be attended, or \$2,500 per academic year, whichever is less.

A survey of educational expenses at each college or university will be taken annually to-facilitate the determination of awards.

II. No student shall receive a loan that, when totaled with all other sources of student financial assistance, shall exceed the total cost of education at the institution to be attended. Other sources of student financial assistance include: scholarships, grants, college work study, and other loans. Institutional financial aid officers are responsible for ensuring that awards do not exceed the cost of education.

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will mail a list of loan awards and amounts of loans to the institutional financial aid officers for them to calculate each student's financial aid package to ensure that awards do not exceed the total cost of education. If a loan award results in a overpayment to a student, the institutional financial aid officer will notify ADHE of the amount of overpayment four (4) months prior to the Department's disbursement deadline. The loan award will be adjusted for the amount of the overpayment.

- III. Students may receive loans for a maximum of four academic years or until such time as they have completed certification requirements, as determined by teacher certifying officials, to teach in Arkansas, whichever comes first.
- IV. Loan awards will be disbursed pursuant to the loan limitations above and ranking status based on the availability of program funds. Each recipient must maintain eligible status to receive funds.

### RULE 5 - REPAYMENT OF LOAN

# I. Terms of Repayment

A. Loan recipients who teach full-time in an approved shortage area in a public or private

Arkansas secondary school following certification in the appropriate subject field shall have

20% of the total loan and related interest forgiven for each full academic year employed in

such capacity, up to a maximum of five (5) years, when the total loan and accumulated interest

will be forgiven.

A verification of the loan recipient's employment will be conducted twice a year, in September and June, through the school superintendent's office in the recipient's employment district.

B. Loan recipients who do not teach full-time in a approved shortage area in a public or private Arkansas secondary school following certification, or who discontinue their studies prior to completing their program of study shall, within a maximum of five (5) years, repay the full-remaining loan balance, plus accrued interest according to an interest and repayment schedule.

The repayment schedule will be 20% of the total loan, plus interest, paid in twelve monthly installments for each year of service not completed. Repayment will be completed within a maximum of five years from the completion of study.

- H. Interest on Loan
- A. Interest will accrue from the beginning of the repayment period and will be at the annual percentage rate of ten percent (10%) on the unpaid balance, except that no interest will accrue during any deferment period. Interest will be calculated as a simple, per annum interest charge on the outstanding principal.
- B. Interest will not accrue and installments need not be paid when an official deferment has been approved by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. Any recipient who wishes a deferment must submit an application for deferment to ADHE for approval.

## III. Deferment of Loan

- A. At the discretion of ADHE scheduled loan repayments may be deferred if it is determined by ADHE that extraordinary circumstances prevent the recipient from making such repayments. Deferments may be granted for the following conditions:
- 1. The recipient is engaged in a full-time course of undergraduate or graduate study at an institution of higher education. This must be verified by the registrar.
- The recipient is seeking and unable to find employment as a secondary teacher in an approved shortage field for a single period not to exceed twelve (12) months. The loan recipient must submit a list of schools contacted for employment. ADHE will verify this information with the superintendent's office in that school district.

- The recipient is temporarily totally disabled, for a period not to exceed three years, as established by sworn affidavit from a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
- 4. The recipient is unable to secure employment for a period not to exceed twelve (12) months by reason of the care of a spouse who is disabled, as established by the signature of a licensed physician. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician.
- Other extraordinary circumstances which would prevent the recipient from repaying the debt within the contractual obligations of the note may be considered.
- B. To qualify for any of the deferments, recipients must notify ADHE of their claim to the deferment and provide supporting documentation on a **Request for Deferment** which will be supplied by ADHE upon request. The Request for Deferment must be completed and returned to ADHE by the recipient. The recipient will be notified within ten (10) days of approval or disapproval of any application for a deferment.

# IV. Cancellation of Loan

ADHE will cancel a recipient's repayment obligations if it determines:

- A. On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician; or
- B. On the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient has died.

# V. Prepayment of Loan

There shall be no penalty for prepayment or repayment of all or any portion of the principal.

# VI. Grace Period

There will exist a nine-month grace period following graduation before the recipient must either take employment in a public or private secondary school in Arkansas in an approved subject field specified for this program or begin repayment of the loan.

# VII. Failure to Repay

Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt and shall have their teaching certification in Arkansas revoked.

### RULE 6 - INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

I. College/University Responsibilities

# A. Administrative Agreement

An Administrative Agreement outlining all of the requirements of the institutions participating in the various state aid programs will be obtained from each institution and kept on file at ADHE. This document will be updated as necessary. The institution must comply with the responsibilities set out in the rule in order to maintain continued eligibility status. The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Emergency Secondary Education Loan-Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for program disbursement, completing all forms, verification data, and complying with all program-rules and regulations.

# B. Disbursement Records

In addition to maintaining records, it is the responsibility of the institution to ensure that a loan receipient's signature acknowledging the amount of the loan received is maintained at the institution. The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of these funds.

## C. Institutional Information Sheet

The institution is required to complete annually the Institutional Information Sheet for all-financial aid programs administered by ADHE. The institutional representative must record the refund policy governing all students who completely withdraw from the institution and those who drop below full-time enrollment. The administrator is responsible for the disbursement of the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program checks. This information sheet is due annually on July 1. Any changes in tuition and other institutional information after submission of the sheet shall be reported to ADHE within ten (1) days of institutional or Board of Trustees action.

### D. Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification to ADHE each semester after registration, giving the names of the program loan recipients who are officially enrolled as full time students. This information is reported on a verification roster. The person responsible for verification of full time enrollment and grade point average is the registrar or the registrar's designee. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster two times a year for those schools on the semester system and three times a year for those schools on the trimester system. The verification roster will be mailed to the financial aid director at the time of registration for each term. The signed ESEL verification roster should be returned to ADHE by November 1 for the Fall term, March 15 for the Winter and/or Spring term, and May 1 the Spring term for three term institutions. The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons

receiving ESEL loans for a given academic semester or trimester. Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive loan benefits in that term.

5. Deadlines for Check Disbursement

All checks must be disbursed by November 1 for the Fall term, March 1 for the Winter term, and May 1 for the Spring term. Any outstanding checks after May 1 must be returned to ADHE for cancellation within ten (10) days.

G. Refund Policy

It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE.

H. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by ADHE on any current or former loan recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

# RULE 7 - LOAN RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITY

# I. Collection of Loan

Accounts will be retained by ADHE in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for forgiveness or deferment. The account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment. The student will be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections and they will be sent a loan amortization schedule along with the letter. The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due. Loan recipients who are determined by ADHE to be 120 days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due. The co-signer will be notified at the same time. If payment is not forthcoming within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient and the co-signer declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date. If the loan recipient has not responded within 90 days from the original payment due due, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient and co-signer informing them that the account will officially be in default in outstanding payments are not made within 30 days.

# II. Skip Tracing Mechanisms

If letters are returned as undeliverable, the Department of Finanace and Administration's Motor Vehicle Division can be used to perform skip tracing activities. Motor Vehicle Division's records are updated in March and September each year. To get this information, mail name, current address, and social security number on Arkansas Department of Higehr Education

A response from the Motor Vehicle Division should be received within ten (10) working days.

Additionally, ADHE will use these steps to locate recipients and/or co-signers if communications are returned as undelivered:

- 1. Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
- 2. Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient and/or co-signer's last known address;
- 3. Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
- 4. Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;

### IV. State Income Tax Setoff

By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, the Department of Higher Education has been included as a claimain agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds. To access the Set-Off Section of the State Tax Administration Office, ADHE must submit name, address, social security number, and amount of debt via computer magnetic tape by December 1 to intercept taxes for the next year.

# V. Litigation

No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, ADHE shall institute a civil suit against the recipient and co signer for repayment of the loan. Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00. If over \$3,000.01, ADHE must use Circuit Court. If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, ADHE may choose to use Small Claims Courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court. If ADHE chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference. Forms to take the receipient and/or co-signer to Small Claims Courts are requested from the recipient's and/or co-signer's county of residence.

# VI. Write-Offs

Emergency Secondary Education Loans may be written off as uncollectible if ADHE shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:

A. the cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or

B. the recipient and/or co-signer does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.

Proof of due diligence collections activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the Administrator must be received before ESEL accounts may be written off.

VII. Nonpayment Penalties

- A. Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.
- B. Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations shall have their Arkansas teaching certification revoked.

### RULE 9 - - PROGRAM DEFINITIONS

The following definitions are used in the Emergency Secondary Education Loan Program:

Academic Year

A measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient. The academic year is defined as at least two-semesters, two trimesters, or three quarters.

**Approved Institution** 

An Arkansas postsecondary public or private college or university school that is currently accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association that has a teacher education program or a regionally accredited two year Arkansas institution where those courses are directly creditable toward teacher education in a baccalaureate institution. The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws. The institution must have a signed administrative agreement with ADHE.

Award Year

The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year, and extends to June 30 of the next calendar year.

Cancellation

ADHE shall cancel a recipient's repayment obligation if it-

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on the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. ADHE reserves the right to require a second opinion by an ADHE approved physician; or

on the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under State law, that the scholar-has died.

Cost of Attendance

The student's cost of attendance as defined by statute. It includes tuition and fees, books and supplies, room and board and other student's living expenses while attending school.

**Default** 

Failure to repay the ESEL in accordance with the terms of the Promissory Note provided that this failure persists for 180 days for monthly payments.

**Deferment** 

This is a postponement of repayments and interest does not

accrue while in this status. ADHE shall not consider that the recipient has violated the repayment schedule if he or she does not meet the payments during the time he or she is in deferment status.

**Due Diligence** 

This process refers to those steps ADHE takes to collect ESEL funds when a recipient enters repayment status. It includes: billing the scholar, sending overdue notices, conducting address searches if the recipient cannot be located, reporting the account to credit bureaus, collection, and litigation. Due diligence also includes keeping the recipient informed of all changes in the ESEL Program that affect his or her rights and responsibilities and responding promptly to the recipient's inquiries.

Full-time Student

A student enrolled in an approved Arkansas institution who is enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester credit hours per semester. Students must complete 24 credit hours each academic year to remain eligible for the Emergency Secondary Education Loan.

Grace Period

A nine-month period of time following the graduation of a recipient before the recipient must either take employment-

in a public or private secondary school in Arkansas in an approved field specified for this program or begin repayment of the loan.

Permanent Resident Alien

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he orshe is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident.

Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence".

A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

**Promissory Note** 

The Promissory Note is a legal document obligating the recipient to repay the loan if he or she does not teach for five (5) full years on a full-time basis in a public or private Arkansas secondary school in an approved subject area.

The recipient's rights and responsibilities will be stated on the promissory note.

Satisfactory Academic Progress

To be maintaining satisfactory academic progress the

recipient must have a minimum 2.50 cumulative gradepoint average on a 4.0 scale. Juniors, seniors and othersmust have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 in their major area of study.

**Skip Tracing** 

A process for locating a recipient who is in repayment status. ADHE's efforts may include contacting relatives, friends, references, and other individuals or entities in the recipient's file.

Teach on a Full-time Basis

Teach the same number of hours required of teachers whohave full time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

U.S. Citizen or National

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory - Palau.

The term "national" includes citizens of American Somoa or Swain's Island.

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# The Financial Condition of Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education

# Introduction

The purpose of this report is to describe the financial condition as well as the challenges experienced by Arkansas's Public Institutions of Higher Education. These challenges have been brought on by a number of competing, and often conflicting demands: fluctuations in enrollments; lagging or declining state support; increasing public and political pressure to hold tuition down; underprepared students; and students who come to college with the expectations of new amenities and programs from the institutions.

This financial conditions report will address several topics including productivity-based funding, revenues versus costs in higher education, funds per full-time equivalent (FTE) student, the increased volume of construction on campuses, a comparison of Arkansas faculty salaries to other Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) states and various charts and graphs on tuition and fees by institution, expenditures by function, fund balances, operating margins, athletic incomes and expenditures, scholarship expenditures and measures of performance. It will also include some recommendations for future financial policies of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

# Performance-Based to Productivity-Based Funding

From the early 1990s to the present, Arkansas has experienced a more positive pattern of growth than the nation as a whole. Unfortunately, because of lower rates of educational growth and development throughout most of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Arkansas still lags significantly behind the region and the nation. Former Governor Mike Beebe recognized the importance of Arkansas's educational attainment for the future economic growth and the prosperity of its people. On January 11, 2011, Governor Beebe issued a challenge to the State and to its institutions of higher education by stating: "We can and must double the number of college graduates in Arkansas by 2025 if we are to stay competitive. This is a lofty goal aimed at the future, but we must begin implementing it today." More recently, Governor Asa Hutchinson has established a goal of 60% of Arkansans with a post-secondary credential by 2025.

In response to former Governor Beebe's challenge of doubling the number of college graduates, the Arkansas General Assembly, ADHE and the state's public institutions of higher education accepted the challenge by supporting Act 1203 of 2011 (AN ACT TO PROMOTE ACCOUNTABILITYAND EFFICIENCY AT STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION; TO CLARIFY FUNDING FORMULA CALCULATIONS FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION). Act 1203 of 2011 was enacted by the Arkansas General Assembly and on April 5, 2011, former Governor Beebe signed it into law. Over a period of five years starting with FY 2014, 25 percent of an institution's base funding will be allocated according to performance or outcomes.

Significant time and effort from ADHE and all of the public institutions was put into developing models for implementing the performance-based funding component of Act 1203. Some of the guiding principles in developing the models included increasing credentials without compromising academic rigor; missions, role and scope; economic development; need for flexibility; keeping it simple; and data-driven decision making.

As described above, Arkansas has historically funded higher education loosely based on enrollment-based formulas, with a performance component introduced in 2011 which penalized institutions that did not meet predetermined performance measures. Most research around state funding formulas suggest that both approaches can be problematic. Additionally, funding had fallen short of the amounts recommended by the formulas due to limitations on the state's budget. As a result, only a small number of institutions had received the full amount recommended by the formula.

A fully outcomes-based model was proposed in the Closing the Gap 2020: A Master Plan for Arkansas Higher Education to address these concerns. Substantial efforts to adopt such a model began through an established Institutional Funding work group. The group held an initial meeting in October 2015 and continued to work since that time to develop the model. The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) adopted a framework for the

outcomes-based model at its meeting on July 29, 2016 and the new funding policy was enacted with the passage of Act 148 of 2017.

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas that were created by Act 1203 of 2011. This act directs the AHECB to adopt policies developed by the Department of Higher Education necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state supported institutions.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

The productivity measures consist of four categories: (1) Effectiveness; (2) Affordability; (3) Adjustments; and (4) Efficiency. Each of these categories contain certain metrics. Effectiveness (Credentials, Progression, Transfer Success, Gateway Course Success) makes up eighty percent (80%) of the formula. Affordability (Time to Degree, Credits at Completion) makes up twenty percent (20%). Adjustments are applied for Research (4-year only) and Diseconomies of Scale (2-year only). And, Efficiency (Core Expense Ratio, Faculty to Administrator Salary Ratio) applies a plus/minus two percent (2%) change to the formula. Other future technical modifications, such as an addition of an inflationary index and refining of existing metrics will be considered when necessary.

In the formula, institutions receive points based on the requirements of each metric. Points are totaled and applied according to the weight of the metric. Once the points for the Effectiveness and Affordability measures are totaled, the Adjustments will be applied to the points accordingly. Finally, the Efficiency measure will be applied against the adjusted total. This final total of points will become the institution's Productivity Index. That Productivity Index will be compared to the prior year's index for that institution. For example, in 2018 the Productivity

Index uses data averages from the Baseline subset of AY2014, AY2015, and AY2016 and compares it to the 3-year average from the Comparative subset of AY2015, AY2016, and AY2017. The difference in the Baseline Index and the Comparative Index is the Change in Productivity Index. This percent change determines the distribution of funding.

The AHECB will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no more than a 2% growth over the prior year's Revenue Stabilization Act (RSA) general revenue funding amount for four- and two-year institutions. The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each four- and two-year institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation. If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the Board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding for that institution. The AHECB will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.

Within each four- and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases. Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four- or two-year institution productivity index increases. Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline. Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.

# **Revenue versus Cost in Higher Education**

Every organization – whether it is for-profit, nonprofit or government – faces the same financial imperative: It must cover its financial outflows (costs or expenditures) with financial inflows

(revenues). Although deficits can occur, they cannot be maintained forever. The one exception to this rule may be the federal government, which has the power to tax and print currency – even these actions have political limits. "Every other type of organization must choose a cash-flow strategy that ensures that revenues will at least cover its expenditures and debt service." – *Robert E. Martin, "Revenue-to-Cost Spiral in Higher Education"* 

Colleges and universities represent a specific type of nongovernment cash-flow strategy. Higher education is composed of state-supported colleges and universities, private nonprofit schools, and a number of for-profit schools. State-supported schools are the largest component. While they are part of state governments, they are very similar to private higher education in terms of their cash-flow management challenges, governance structures, role of third-party payers and the services they provide.

The foregoing was presented to establish that colleges and universities, whether state-supported or private non-profit institutions, must make certain that their revenues cover their expenditures and debt service, which presents unique challenges for state-supported colleges and universities. Unlike businesses which see their sales and profits decline during an economic downturn, state-supported colleges and universities may experience enrollment increases due to layoffs and unemployment, thereby increasing cost to educate additional students; along with state revenue decline causing a reduction, thereby creating the need to increase tuition and fees to cover the lost state support.

This demand for services experienced by colleges and universities during an economic downturn is the inverse of the lack of demand for services from for-profit businesses. While businesses are laying off employees, colleges and universities are forced to hire new faculty and support staff (admissions staff, financial aid staff, etc.) to meet the demands of new enrollment. As businesses are cutting expenses, state-supported colleges and universities must increase expenditures if they are to provide services to the larger student body. For example, if state support makes up 50 percent of the funding for higher education and tuition and fees make up the other 50 percent, and no new state dollars are received for higher education, then any cost of living increases or inflation must be balanced by reducing costs/services or by increasing tuition

and fees. If inflation increases by 3 percent, costs/services must be cut by 3 percent or tuition and fees must increase 6 percent.

Often, the response is to encourage institutions to seek private funds to replace lost state support. However, many times private donors are unwilling to give to support the ordinary operating expenses associated with educating the students (unrestricted educational and general funds) because they consider those things the responsibility of the state and there is no notoriety or recognition associated with donations for operating expenses. Donors are willing to give to a building fund (to be able to name the building or a room) and to sponsor a specific type of research program that has the potential of benefitting their business, or them personally, but such funds are considered restricted funds since their use is designated by the donor. These funds provide no relief for the overburdened unrestricted educational and general needs of the institution.

Successive economic downturns such as that experienced after Sept. 11, 2001, and during the Great Recession have been devastating for Arkansas higher education, in that institutions are spending less per student from all sources of revenue. During that same time period the enrollment growth in Arkansas has been one of the highest in the SREB and in the nation. The Delta Cost Study summed it up this way – students are paying more and getting less. Higher education is losing the battle with the combination of more students, less state funding and tuition rates that exceed inflation. Several recent studies show that the institutions are actually spending less per student than they did 10 or 20 years ago in constant dollars, which makes the idea of cutting expenditures less than plausible.

The cost cutting that has occurred has been in the form of using adjunct faculty to replace full-time faculty and the postponement of maintenance of facilities. The shift towards adjunct faculty may cause unintended consequences. Research has shown that an increase in adjunct faculty has negatively impacted graduation and retention rates. More specifically, the impact can be seen on first- to second-year retention because adjuncts are more likely to teach introductory courses. Many of these negative outcomes are caused by lack of professional development for adjunct faculty, adjunct faculty are not paid for office hours which results in students receiving less out

of the classroom support, and typically institutional policies are created around full-time faculty. Another undesirable action is to forego the maintenance of facilities allowing for huge deferred maintenance accumulations that represent a high percentage of the replacement value of the facilities. These things are not only true for Arkansas; they are true nationally as well. Impacts of declining state funds on Arkansas Higher Education include:

- Tuition and fee increases
- Reduced access
- No progress on equity funding issues
- Outdated instructional equipment
- Reduced ability to attract external funding
- Inability to recruit and retain faculty/staff
- Further deterioration of facilities
- Worst case scenarios: enrollment caps, loss of accreditation, no new programs, lost jobs
- Program eliminations and reduction in public service.

As the economic recovery has strengthened, enrollments have declined (particularly at community colleges), as jobs have been created and individuals have gone back to work. Though state revenues have recovered, colleges and universities have not seen reinvestment in their funding due to competing demands from K-12, health care and other priorities.

# **Funds per FTE Student from All Sources**

Table 88 of the <u>SREB Factbook on Higher Education</u> published in June 2019 shows that the total funds available per FTE student in Arkansas's universities increased by 7.36 percent in the five year period from 2012-13 to 2017-18. Delaware experienced the lowest increase for this period at around 7.3 percent. Florida experienced the greatest gain in funding available per FTE student, a 36.6 percent increase. For 2017-18, Arkansas's universities ranked ninth (9<sup>th</sup>) in state funding and twelfth (12<sup>th</sup>) in tuition and fee revenues per FTE student in the SREB region.






Table 89 of the <u>SREB Factbook on Higher Education</u> contains the comparable data for Two-Year Colleges. Arkansas's two-year schools funds per FTE student increased approximately 37 percent over the same five year period. West Virginia experienced the smallest increase for this period at 7 percent, while South Carolina had the greatest gain in funding available per FTE student with a 37.01 percent increase. For 2017-18, Arkansas's two-year colleges ranked second (2<sup>nd</sup>) in state funding and ninth (9<sup>th</sup>) in tuition and fee revenues per FTE student in the SREB region.



From 2012 to 2017 the enrollment growth (Table 21 of the <u>SREB Factbook on Higher</u> <u>Education</u>) in Arkansas Public Higher Education was the thirteenth highest percentage growth rate at -6.7 percent. The average growth rate in the SREB states was -0.62 percent and the national average growth rate was -2.27 percent. Only 4 states produced positive growth over the five-year time period.



# The Reason for the Volume of Construction on University and College Campuses in Arkansas

Arkansas universities are making a concerted effort to be good stewards of the facilities that the state and private donors have funded. These facilities require continued maintenance and renovations throughout their existence. Today, over 50 percent of the university facilities are more than 30 years old. After a facility has reached the 30-year mark, most of the life expectancy of the building systems has elapsed. The average Facilities Condition Index (FCI)

for 2020 for Arkansas's educational and general facilities is 50 percent, meaning 50 percent of the life expectancy of the average facility has passed. The national literature states that when the FCI for a campus exceeds 15 percent it should raise a red flag that signals that the facility's maintenance needs improvement and a dedicated source of funding.

In response to the huge accumulated deferred maintenance, universities are renovating many older facilities whose FCI is higher than 50 percent. The choice between renovating a facility and replacing it is based upon the relative cost of the two options.

Why is all this renovation and new construction necessary? Today's students are coming to the universities to learn that their high schools had better and more modern labs and equipment than the universities. Many universities' laboratory facilities have been seriously outdated for many years and were not or could not be brought into compliance with Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations. Students come to a university expecting to receive instruction on the latest technology available, but are finding labs with outdated equipment and technology.

If universities are to produce graduates in the sciences and engineering programs who can compete in future economies, facilities must be renovated, updated or replaced, which is why much of the construction activity is taking place on college and university campuses.


Not surprisingly, systems including electrical, in the older facilities are not adequate to handle all the new computing equipment, which was not even contemplated when the buildings were designed. Computer equipment also places stress on outdated air conditioning systems. In addition, EPA regulations necessitate new plumbing for labs in the sciences and engineering programs. Unless these renovations are completed, graduates will find their degrees have not prepared them for the careers they have chosen.

Lack of dedicated capital improvement funding means that institutions have increasingly turned to bond indebtedness to finance essential improvements, leading to rising tuition or fees. SREB recently surveyed its member states to learn more about state supported funding for capital needs. Only two states, Alabama and Oklahoma, indicated that higher education received no state support for capital needs. The remaining fourteen SREB states do receive state funding to


address capital needs either as recurring/designated funding, surplus/non-recurring funding or some combination of the two. In 2006, Arkansas did designate funding for higher education capital needs through General Obligation (GO) Bonds, but institutions have had to rely on surplus/non-recurring funds in more recent years. Lack of dedicated capital improvement funding is a common challenge across SREB states and you can find more detail for each SREB state in Appendix A. Eight of the sixteen SREB states are currently considering GO Bonds to address this challenge. Arkansas is not currently considering GO Bonds.

#### **Arkansas Faculty Salaries**

The *SREB State Data Exchange* information published in May 2021 compares average faculty salaries in each of the SREB states with the regional average. The average university faculty member's salary in Arkansas has increased \$378 from 2019. However, it remains the lowest in the region at \$14,830 below the SREB average.



Two-year college salaries increased by \$414, remaining at 15<sup>th</sup> in 2020. The average faculty salary in Arkansas for two-year colleges of \$45,517 was \$11,052 below the SREB average.



While Arkansas has made great strides in improving faculty salaries, it is hard to be competitive in higher education with salaries still below the regional and national average.

Closing the Gap 2020: A Master Plan for Arkansas Higher Education addresses the need to increase faculty salaries to the regional average. Considering the goals set forth in the master plan, raising salaries to attract and retain quality faculty are essential to improving student retention and completion. In order to remain competitive and affordable, resource allocation decisions are very important. It will be imperative going forward to examine resource allocation by analyzing expenditures per full-time equivalent (FTE) student in the following functional expense categories - Instruction (includes faculty salaries), Academic Support, Student Services

and Institutional Support. Institutions must make decisions that will maximize their core functional expenses in a way that will improve student success. One potential study that is being considered to help in further analyzing resource allocation is the annual SACUBO Benchmarking Study. Appendix C will provide further details for each institution's expenditures per FTE by functional expense category.

#### Why Research Is Important

Research, the pursuit of knowledge, is the life blood of a university. It is the key to economic development and new higher paying jobs in the state. New developing cutting-edge industries tend to locate near universities that are heavily involved in research related to their industry. Research is the basis for some of the most important parts of the upper level undergraduate and graduate level instruction. It provides students with cutting edge knowledge, problem-solving skills and familiarity with the latest technology which prepare them to be leaders in their chosen field. In addition, research results in a better quality of life for all citizens of Arkansas through the development of better medications, diagnostic equipment, methods of diagnosis and treatment of illness.

Commitment to research is a necessity in attracting the best faculty to a university. Faculty members who are involved in research are also a necessity for quality doctoral programs. Doctoral candidates are required to do research for dissertations and the guidance for both research ideas and methodology can only be provided by faculty who are actively involved in research.

The Nanotechnology research currently being conducted at several of Arkansas's doctoral institutions seems to have almost unlimited potential in numerous fields of human endeavor. This is particularly true in the developments in medicine.

Logistics research has allowed a number of Arkansas trucking firms to be leaders in the nation in their ability to deliver goods across America efficiently, economically and on time. The Arkansas Research and Education Optical Network (ARE-ON) is making the latest medical diagnosis and treatment capabilities available to rural hospitals and improving the health and

longevity of those citizens who have not had access before without the expense of traveling a great distance. Research is improving the quality of life for Arkansans in terms of health care, better jobs, and a quality education.

It is incumbent on Land Grant institutions (University of Arkansas & University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) to have a commitment to research and to public service. Failure to be involved in both would result in the loss of significant federal funding. The research and public service functions of these Land Grant universities have resulted in our nation's farmers being the most productive in the world and our food supply exceeding our consumption. Research is improving the quality of life for Arkansans in terms of health care, better jobs, and a quality education

Much of the research that has resulted in our major advancements have often started out as theoretical (basic) research, what some may have labeled "pie-in-the-sky," rather than applied research. This simply illustrates that the major thrust of research should not be only on applied research – research with immediate practical outcomes or seeking solutions to existing problems.

In summary, research improves the quality of life, attracts knowledge-based business and industry, improves economic development in the state, and creates better paying jobs in the state.

#### **Tuition and Fees**

Certainly, tuition and fee increases at colleges and universities, both public and private, have been under scrutiny in Arkansas and the nation. Some of the major factors responsible for tuition inflation has been rising cost in technology, employee benefits, and campus security.

With the Governor and the Legislature's addition of roughly \$16,000,000 in State funding for higher education since the implementation of the Productivity Funding model in fiscal year 2018-19, institutions have been tasked with trying to limit tuition increases as to keep costs to students as affordable as possible. Even with these new state funds and cost saving measures, four-year institutions found it necessary to increase tuition and fees on average by 1.5 percent and two-year colleges needed to increase tuition and fees on average by .7 percent for fiscal year 2021-2022 which is reflected in the charts that follow.



As tuition and fees continue to rise, many students are finding relief with state and federal aid, including veteran's benefits. For now, government subsidies and aid from schools are serving to hold down net tuition and fees – the actual cost students pay when grants and scholarships are taken into consideration.


## **Operating Margins**

Operating Margins are used to measure an institution's operating efficiency. It is a measurement of what proportion of a college or university's revenue is left over after expenses. The operating margin shows what an institution makes per each dollar of revenue.

Two graphs comparing 2016-2017 operating margins to the 2020-2021 margins are presented below. The more detailed historical operating margins by institutions are in Appendix B. Of the 10 universities, there was one with a negative operating margin in 2020-2021, as compared to 3 in 2016-2017.




The graph below contains the comparison of 2016-2017 and 2020-2021 operating margins of the two-year colleges. Of the 22 institutions, three had negative operating margins compared to two in 2016-2017.




\*Note - Often negative operating margins are the result of expending prior year fund balances to complete a serious deferred maintenance problem.

#### **Fund Balances**

Educational and General Fund balances are the perennial measure of the financial condition of institutions for higher education. An institution's fund balance is a measure of its resources. The fund balance reported is measured by subtracting the total unrestricted E&G liabilities of an institution from the total unrestricted E&G assets. For universities the minimum recommended level is 5 percent of the E&G operating budget with an ideal level of at least 14 percent. In 2020-2021, all but one of the universities were able to achieve the minimum recommended level. However, it is important that other fund balances are studied in detail along with these findings.



All of the two-year colleges had fund balances that exceeded the 5 percent recommended for E&G. Although all 22 of the two-year institutions fund balances were above the recommended 14 percent, this is not always adequate for the very small institutions. For those institutions with smaller budgets and enrollment, a better benchmark would be \$2.5 million in fund balance. Another important factor to consider when analyzing an institution's fund balance is the effect of recognizing post-employment and retirement liabilities. The recognition of these future liabilities will decrease the current year's fund balance. In addition, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has recently approved a new pension standard that will accelerate the recognition of pension/retirement liabilities. It will be important to continue to monitor the effects of the new GASB standards. The complete report of historical fund balances as a percent of revenue are in Appendix B.



# **Institutional Scholarship Expenditures**

The report for Institutional Scholarship Expenditures for 2020-2021 indicates that the average university's expenditure for scholarships represented 9.9 percent of their total educational and general tuition and mandatory fee revenue. For 2020-2021, the legislatively mandated cap on Academic and Performance Scholarships was 20 percent of educational and general tuition and fee revenue. All institutions reported scholarships below this mandated amount.

A.C.A § 6-80-106 establishes limitations on the maximum percent of unrestricted tuition and mandatory fee income that can be spent on academic and performance scholarships, which in 2011-12 was 30 percent. The scholarship cap decreased by 5 percent each fiscal year until it reached a 20 percent cap in 2013-14. Beginning in 2013-14, if an institution exceeds the cap there will be a reduction in the funding recommendation for the next fiscal year. Academic and Performance scholarships awarded to students who qualify for Pell Grants were excluded in the calculation of the scholarship cap in accordance with A.C.A § 6-80-106. While these scholarships awarded to Pell qualifiers were excluded in the chart above, they make up 17.2 percent of the total amount of academic and performance scholarships awarded at universities.

The chart below provides a five-year history of the universities' scholarship expenditures for the purpose of observing trends in light of the legislation placing a cap on such expenditures. The 9.9 percent for 2020-2021 is the highest in the five-year span and a 0.7 percent increase from 2019-2020.

#### **Educational and General Facilities**


The Facilities Audit Program reported the replacement values for E&G facilities as \$5.5 billion. The **E&G maintenance** needs as of 2020 shows that the institutions have **\$2.95 billion** in deferred maintenance with **\$259.8 million of that classified as critical**.


If Arkansas's colleges and universities are to prepare students for the economy of the future, they must have *cutting-edge* laboratories and classroom equipment. Yet, students enter college and find that their high school offered better equipped labs and facilities than the college or university they selected. This is a matter of concern for institutions that are expected to be leading the way with the latest technology for the disciplines they offer.

Faculty and staff work to find ways to compensate for the problems of inadequate labs and equipment, the quality of the graduates has not been compromised. The administration and faculty of the institutions deserve to be recognized for their efforts. If the desire is to produce more graduates in math, science and health professions, Arkansas must find funding for the equipment and facilities to support these disciplines. If not, Arkansas will find it difficult to compete in the economy of the 21st century.

#### **Auxiliaries**

Auxiliaries are primarily a matter of university concern. Most two-year colleges have minimal auxiliary operations; therefore, the only analyses of auxiliaries in this report deal with the auxiliary operations of universities. The following two graphs deal with the auxiliary fund balances. The first depicts the changing auxiliary fund balances over a three-year period. The second represents the fund balances as a percent of auxiliary income. The auxiliary fund balances for 6 of the 10 institutions presented increased over the previous year.





Below is a series of spreadsheets that give the income and expenditures for institution by each type of auxiliary enterprise for 2020-2021. The spreadsheets group the same category of institutions together for a better comparison of the profits and losses of each type of auxiliary enterprise.

From these spreadsheets it is obvious that bookstores are not "cash cows" as commonly believed. The difference you will notice in bookstores and food service are generally due to whether or not an institution has out-sourced/privatized its bookstore or food service operation. Modest income and very low expenditures usually indicate an institution that has out-sourced that operation. Losses in bookstore operations and food service are usually an indicator that the institution is operating its own bookstore and/or food service. As you can see in the graphs, another drain on Auxiliary funds is from the College Unions and/or Student Organizations and Publications.

#### **Athletics**

Athletics are a major component of the auxiliary operations at universities. The athletic report details revenues and expenditures for each institution. Athletic revenues will equal athletic expenditures unless there is an ending fund balance. A.C.A. § 6-62-804 prohibits athletic deficits. A designated athletic fee must be charged to the students by the institution if athletic-generated revenues (i.e., ticket sales, media/tournament/bowl, concessions/program sales, and game guarantees), foundations/clubs and other private gifts, other athletic income, auxiliary profits, and the allowable educational and general transfer do not cover the total expenditures for athletics.

The 2020-2021 total amount of athletic expenditures reported by state supported universities is \$169,508,885 and two-year colleges is \$2,086,736. The statewide total is \$171,595,621 – a decrease of \$21,614,436 (11.2%) from \$193,210,057 in 2019-2020.

A comparison of 2020-2021 actual expenditures to 2020-2021 budgeted revenues certified to the Coordinating Board in July 2020 is also illustrated at the bottom of the summary chart. Certified budgeted expenditures for 2020-2021 totaled \$199,150,149 for all institutions. Total actual expenditures for 2020-2021 for all institutions was below this budgeted amount by 13.8% percent. Actual expenditures varied from the Board of Trustees certified budgeted expenditures by a range of 19 percent below to 6 percent over the budgeted amount.

Athletic expenditures since the 1990s have often grown faster than many institutions' overall budget. However, when athletics' expenditures and their interaction with educational and general income are examined together, a different perspective emerges. The importance of athletics to the educational and general budget becomes evident. Regrettably, such an analysis is beyond the scope and time constraints of this report.





The graph below looks at the revenue sources as a percent of total revenue which provides perspective on how dependent some institutions are on athletic fees, other auxiliary profits and E&G transfers to support their athletic program. The allowable athletic transfer from E&G revenue should be noted in this graph. The 2020-2021 allowable transfer from E&G was the greater of either 2 percent of the institutions' FY20 Unrestricted E&G Revenues or \$1,319,407 for universities and \$157 per FTE for colleges regardless of the size of the institution or level of the athletic competition. For some institutions, the E&G transfer is less than 10 percent of the revenue but for others it represents up to 95 percent of the revenue.

The following graph presents athletic expenditures as a percent of the total university expenditures. The heavy yellow horizontal line represents the average for the universities. The average athletic expenditure (excluding UAF) for 2020-2021 represented only 5.06 percent of the total of the universities' expenditures. When UAF is included, that brings the average up to the 5.62 percent reflected in the below graph.



### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Continue to work with institutions to monitor and refine the Productivity Funding Model
  policies to ensure adequate funding is available to meet student needs, innovation is
  encouraged, and that the policies continue to respond to attainment goals and priorities of
  the state.
- AHECB, ADHE and institutions of higher education work with the legislature toward alignment of institutional funding policies, state financial aid policies, and tuition policies in a way that prioritizes higher education affordability.

#### REPORT ON AHECB POLICY FOR MAINTENANCE OF NEW FACILITIES

The AHECB policy for maintenance of new facilities, passed October 29, 2010, states that a report on the amount transferred to plant funds would be presented annually at the October Board meeting. This policy was proposed to ensure that in the future all newly constructed or purchased facilities would have a source of funding for maintenance of the new facility. Institutions seeking approval of a loan or a bond issue for the construction or purchase of a new facility must provide for the maintenance of that facility by transferring annually to plant funds an amount as recommended by the Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges (APPA). This is currently \$2.50 per gross square foot for an educational and general facility or \$1.25 per gross square foot for an auxiliary facility. A lower rate per gross square foot for a specific building/facility can be approved with appropriate justification.

It is the expectation that the institution provide for the long term maintenance of the facility for which the funds were accrued. Funds may be utilized for facility renovation and upkeep including upgrade or replacement of equipment and furnishings of the designated building. These funds will be transferred to the plant fund annually and shall begin in the fiscal year following the completion and occupancy of the facility and will continue as long as the building is in use. The funds can also be used for critical and deferred maintenance of the institution. This report includes the status of the FY2019-20 and FY2020-21 maintenance transfers.

#### PROGRAM VIABILITY REVIEW

The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopted new program viability standards for Arkansas colleges and universities in October 2008. The new viability standards, based on a 3-year average, are as follows:

- An average of four (4) graduates per year for career and technical education certificates (CTE) and career and technical associate degree programs (AAS);
- An average of four (4) graduates per year for bachelor's degrees in science, mathematics, engineering, foreign languages, middle school education, and secondary education programs for licensure in science and mathematics;
- An average of six (6) graduates per year for transfer associate degrees (AA, AS, and AAT) and bachelor's programs;
- An average of four (4) graduates per year for master's, specialist and first-professional programs; and,
- An average of two (2) graduates per year for doctoral programs

## **Initial Program Certification-Distance Technology**

**RESOLVED,** That pursuant to A.C.A. §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board grants initial certification to the institutions listed on pages 1 - 3 to offer the specified degree programs to Arkansas residents for a period of three years through December 31, 2025.

# **Information Item/Transfer Agreement**

Memorandum of Understanding

University of Arkansas at Cossatot and the Criminal Justice Institute of the University of Arkansas System

The University of Arkansas at Cossatot and Criminal Justice Institute (CJI) of the University of Arkansas System agree to the following Memorandum of Understanding concerning the proposal to offer an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Crime Scene Investigation, a Technical Certificate in Crime Scene Investigation, a Certificate of Proficiency in Crime Scene Investigation, Associate of Applied Science Degree in Law Enforcement Administration, a Technical Certificate in Law Enforcement Administration, and a Certificate of Proficiency in Law Enforcement Administration.

The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas agrees to grant credit and award certificate and associate degrees for Crime Scene Investigation/Law Enforcement Administration programs in partnership with the Criminal Justice Institute according to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Each student must be admitted to the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas and eligible for enrollment in classes at the Criminal Justice Institute using the standard admissions procedures of each institution. Coursework offered by the Criminal Justice Institute is available only to sworn law enforcement officers and individuals employed full-time by a law enforcement agency in a crime scene capacity.
- 2. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will conduct registration and book sales for general education courses and financial aid will be administered in accord with federal /state regulations by the institution.
- All students enrolling in the program will comply with state and University guidelines concerning freshman assessment and course placement in English, Mathematics, and Reading.
- 4. The general education component of the program provided by the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will consist of up to 30 hours of course work.
- 5. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas agrees to transcript the completed courses in the Criminal Justice Institute without a tuition charge to the student. The institution may charge the normal administrative fees for this service. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will state the fee in all publications concerning this program.

- 6. The Criminal Justice Institute classes included in these programs are provided only to Arkansas law enforcement personnel.
- 7. A student must successfully complete a minimum number of general education credit hours for each certificate and the Associate of Applied Science degree at the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas before credit for any Criminal Justice Institute courses will be placed on the transcript.
- 8. The hours of instruction provided by the Criminal Justice Institute will be shown on a student transcript as credit hours. (See degree plan outline attached to this document for exact number of hours in each program).
- It will be the responsibility of the student to request credit for Criminal Justice Institute courses and submit the proper documentation prior to or during the student's enrollment at the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas.
- Students will complete an Intent to Enroll Form at the Criminal Justice Institute and identify the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas. CJI will maintain files for each student, also containing copies of official CJI transcripts sent to the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas and other pertinent studentspecific information or correspondence. These files will be maintained for a minimum of ten (10) years.
- An official CJI transcript will be sent to the Cossatot Community College of the University
  of Arkansas only when the student has successfully completed all of the CJI classes
  needed for a designated college credit course.
- Transcripts signed by the Director of the Criminal Justice Institute will be required to indicate that a student has completed the required courses. Student Data Center (SDC) software will be used to manage all student data and prepare all official CJI transcripts. Student information will be maintained for a minimum of ten (10) years.
- The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will inform the Criminal Justice Institute when an officer completes a certificate or associate degree program only when the officer has completed a FERPA waiver form.
- 9. The process for which college credits granted is by the mastery of competencies equivalent to a college course. The Criminal Justice Institute experience results in mastery of competencies equivalent to those taught in the designated college course. All coursework from the Criminal Justice Institute will be entered on the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas transcript as credit without a grade.
- For each hour of college credit awarded, a minimum of 15 CJI class contact hours is required.
- A course description, a list of course objectives and a detailed course outline will be included in the class file for each class that will be eligible college credit. This information will be included in a CJI class file which will be maintained for a minimum of ten years.
- 10. Courses offered by the Criminal Justice Institute will apply only toward an Associate of Applied Science degree/technical certificate/certificate of proficiency. Students who complete the AAS degree can apply degree credit toward the Bachelor of Applied Science degree program.

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- 11. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will not make any additions or substitutions of courses in the certificate or degree programs without approval by amendment to this agreement.
- 12. All publications of both the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas and Criminal Justice Institute when referring to this degree/certificate program will clearly indicate that both the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas and the Criminal Justice Institute of the University of Arkansas System offer the certificates and degrees in partnership.
- 13. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will include the Certificates of Proficiency, Technical Certificate and Associate of Applied Science degrees in Law Enforcement Administration and Crime Scene Investigation in their course catalogue (noting programs are available only to sworn law enforcement officers and individuals employed fulltime by a law enforcement agency in a crime scene capacity).
- 14. The Criminal Justice Institute will assist the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas in advertising and recruitment activities by:
  - Posting all degree plans and a list of hosting institutions on CJI 's website (www.cji.edu).
  - Including updated degree plans annually on CJI's website (www.cji.edu).
  - Developing and distributing an informational brochure to officers attending CJI classes.
  - Providing presentations at key law enforcement professional meetings.
  - Providing presentations to officers/deputies graduating from key CJI courses.
- 15. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will provide degree advising.
- A contact person at the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will be identified. The Criminal Justice Institute will be notified if contact person changes.
- 16. The Criminal Justice Institute will provide degree advising only in reference to the CJI portion of the degree plans.
- A contact person(s) at the Criminal Justice Institute will be identified. The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas will be notified if contact person changes.
- The CJI Degree Program Committee will conduct appeals reviews, as necessary, for only courses provided by the CJI.
- 17. Either the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas or the Criminal Justice Institute may withdraw from this program by submitting a written notice to the Criminal Justice Institute Director or the CEO of the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas. Once such notice is given, no new students would be admitted to the program but every effort would be made to offer completion of the program to students currently enrolled at the time of cancellation of this agreement. After such notice, either institution may elect not to offer the courses listed in the curriculum.

The Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas and the Criminal Justice Institute of the University of Arkansas System jointly agree to this Memorandum of

Understanding. This agreement shall become effective upon execution and following notification to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education Coordinating Board and will remain in effect until a new agreement is exercised or until terminated in writing by either party. Nothing in this MOU shall be construed to alter the authority of either the Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas or Criminal Justice Institute as provided under law.
