CERTIFICATION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES FOR 2024-25

A.C.A. §6-62-805 (Act 366 of 1991) requires each state-supported institution of higher education to annually certify by June 15 to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board that its intercollegiate athletic program will generate sufficient revenues to meet expenditures or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional board-sanctioned student athletic fees.

Verification of Athletic Budgets and Fee Information

Institutions with intercollegiate athletic programs submitted ADHE Form 21-2, "Certification of Budgeted Athletic Revenues and Expenditures" and proper supporting documentation. ADHE finance staff verified that the athletic data submitted by the institutions matched the overall 2024-25 institutional operating budgets.

A.C.A. §6-62-804 requires that any student athletic fees assessed must be clearly defined in all publications and institutional board minutes and listed separate and distinct from tuition or other student fees on student tuition and fee statements. All institutions assessing a student athletic fee have certified to the Department compliance with this requirement and have submitted copies of their student fee billing statements illustrating the disclosure of the athletic fee to each student.

Summary of Data

The institutional submissions establish the 2024-25 operating budgets for intercollegiate athletic programs and certify to the Coordinating Board any student athletic fees that will be charged to cover operating deficits. The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), Arkansas State University Mountain Home (ASUMH), Arkansas State University MidSouth (ASUMS), Arkansas State University Newport (ASUN), Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas (CCCUA), North Arkansas College (NAC), National Park College (NPC), Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas (PCCUA), South Arkansas College (SAC), Southeast Arkansas College (SEAC), and the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain (UACCRM) do not charge an athletic fee and expect to continue to meet their athletic operating costs without assessing a student athletic fee for the 2024-25 fiscal year. The following institutions have set their athletic fee per student semester credit hour (SSCH) as follows:

A summary chart of 2024-25 athletic certification data from each institution is shown on page 1-3. The summary chart, excluding the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), indicates that 26.0 percent of athletic program budgets are being funded from student athletic fees, while 14.6 percent comes from athletic generated revenues. Transfers from educational and general funds contribute 19.5 percent of the funding. The remaining 39.9 percent is funded from other auxiliary profits, endowment and investment income, contributions and other athletic income.

Other than the educational and general transfer, the use of auxiliary profits is the most sensitive source of income for financing athletic budgets. Other auxiliary profits are included as a revenue source for intercollegiate athletic programs; however, the use of auxiliary funds to support intercollegiate athletic programs should not undermine sound fiscal management of those auxiliary enterprises. A breakdown of the various auxiliary profits utilized to fund the athletic budgets is included on page 1-4.

The following resolution is presented for the board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures Budgeted for 2024-25 as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

RECOMMENDATION FOR DISTRIBUTION OF PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION 2025-26 FISCAL YEAR

Background

A.C.A. §6-61-234 directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education. That language reads as follows:

"(a) (1) (A) The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall adopt policies developed by the Division of Higher Education necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education."

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

At its October 27, 2017 meeting, the AHECB approved the productivity funding model policies for the two-year colleges and universities and made amendments to these policies for unintended consequences in a special meeting on May 24, 2019. The policies were developed in conjunction with presidents and chancellors after meetings and revisions. The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. According to A.C.A. §6-61-234, the productivity-based funding model shall not determine the funding needs of special units such as a medical school, division of agriculture, or system offices. These special units are known as nonformula entities and ADHE staff will review justification requests submitted by the nonformula entities and prepare funding recommendations for Fiscal Year 2025-26 based upon those requests.

Productivity Funding Distribution Recommendations for the 2025-26 Fiscal Year

The distribution recommendations are based upon the productivity funding formula policies approved by the AHECB in October 2017 and amended by the AHECB in May 2019.

The two-year college and university productivity funding models have been calculated

using academic year 2021 through academic year 2023 student data as well as academic year 2020 through academic year 2022 expenditure data reported to and published by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). The productivity funding model calculations represent a total productivity increase of 0.12% for two-year colleges and universities. This 0.12% supports the recommendation for state funding of institutions of higher education at \$588,582,614 in 2025-26, which continues to be an overall flat request from the previous two fiscal years.

As part of the productivity funding formula, institutions are only allowed to retain a portion of their funding increase from the prior year. This amount is up to 2% of their Base Level revenue in the prior year. The remaining funds are considered one time Incentive funding and would be redistributed in the following year to reduce the need for additional state funds to meet the productivity funding need. This amount for FY2026 is \$2,011,803. With the overall productivity being such a slight increase, these incentive funds will not be fully distributed to individual institutions, but instead will be recommended for utilization by the Division of Higher Education for statewide purposes.

For the **universities**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in university funding of \$511,153. In addition to this new funding, institutions with productivity declines will have an amount reduced and then reallocated to the institutions who showed an increase. 4 out of the 10 universities reflected increases for FY2026 resulting in a reallocation of \$3,988,999.

For the **two-year colleges**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in two-year college funding of \$171,343. In addition to this new funding, \$1,244,601 was reallocated from 18 institutions to 4 of the other two-year colleges.

This distribution recommendation results in a total request for new general revenue funds of \$0.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendation for distribution of productivity funding to the Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2025-26 fiscal year as included in Table A.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2025-26 productivity funding distribution recommendation of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That should any errors of a technical nature be

found in this recommendation, the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR EDUCATIONAL AND GENERAL OPERATIONS STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION FISCAL YEAR 2025-26

Background

A.C.A. §6-61-234 (Act 148 of 2017) directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education. That language reads as follows:

"(a) (1) (A) The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall adopt policies developed by the Division of Higher Education necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education."

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

At its October 27, 2017 meeting, the AHECB approved the productivity funding model policies for the two-year colleges and universities. The policies were developed in conjunction with presidents and chancellors after meetings and revisions. The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. According to A.C.A. §6-61-234, the productivity-based funding model shall not determine the funding needs of special units such as a medical school, division of agriculture, or system offices. These special units are known as non-formula entities and ADHE staff reviewed justification requests submitted by the non-formula entities and prepared funding recommendations for Fiscal Year 2024-25 based upon those requests.

Operating Funding Recommendations for the 2025-26 Fiscal Year

The operating recommendations are based upon the productivity funding formula policies approved by the AHECB in October 2017 as well as requests submitted by the non-formula entities.

For the universities, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in university funding of \$511,153.

For the two-year colleges, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total change in two-year college funding of \$171,343.

For the **non-formula entities**, the recommendation is for a 7.0% increase based on the HEPI index and a recommendation of full funding of Operations and Program Enhancement requests which combined would require an additional \$25.6 million, of which \$7.1 million would be for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS).

The individual institutional recommendations for all three types of institutions (Colleges, Universities, and Non-Formula Entities) were determined in the following manner: The general revenue funds were distributed based upon the productivity funding distribution policy adopted by the AHECB in October 2017. The non-formula needs were based on the justifications submitted by the institutions. The total funding recommendation for 2025-26 for Colleges and Universities is \$0 in new revenue with \$5,885,292 of one-time incentive funds being utilized for statewide purposes. The total recommendation for 2025-2026 for the Non-Formula Entities is \$25,582,847 in new revenue.

In addition to these funding recommendations, an additional appropriation increase of 5% of the formula-based entities funding recommendation has been added to address any changes in disbursements for Educational Excellence Trust Fund revenues or any other state funding adjustments. This increase totals \$24,808,706 for the **universities** and \$9,055,730 for the **two-year colleges**.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendations for state funding of the educational and general operations of Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2025-26 fiscal year as included in Tables 03A, 03B, 03C, and 04D.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2025-26 operating recommendations of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That should any errors of a technical nature be found in these recommendations, the Commissioner of

the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

PERSONAL SERVICES RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NON-CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL 2025-27 BIENNIUM

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, grades, and line-item maximum salaries for all administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education have been reviewed, and changes are recommended.

These recommendations, to be effective July 1, 2025, recognize the varying structures and sizes of institutions, while maintaining reasonable consistency among similar positions at institutions. The primary objective of the ADHE staff was to maintain relative uniformity in titles and line-item maximums for similar positions in comparable institutions, while recognizing the varying missions and structures of institutions, priorities of the new biennium, and FTE enrollment growth.

While additional positions and titles were recommended when institutions demonstrated a compelling need, ADHE staff attempted to keep the net growth at a minimum due to concerns over budget shortfalls and the expansion of state services. Salary recommendations for new positions were based on salaries for similar positions previously established at comparable Arkansas institutions. In addition to this review, this recommendation presents additional positional pool recommendations to allow institutions greater flexibility within job roles for promotion and reduce the number of overall positions needed to accommodate these promotional paths.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 27,058 positions currently authorized. For the 2025-27 Biennium, institutions have requested a net new request of 52 positions. ADHE staff recommends the net increase of 52 positions, for a total recommendation of 27,110 positions (a 0.2 percent increase). UAMS currently has 11,974 authorized positions and submitted a request that does not change this total. ADHE staff recommends the current level of 11,974 positions.

Institutions' state funding is not based on the number of approved positions. Additional positions do not generate a need for new funding. If institutional growth necessitates additional positions during the year, positions may be requested from the appropriate pool.

Summaries of authorized, requested, and recommended positions for two-year and four-year institutions are shown in Table 8-A and Table 8-B. Recommended maximum salaries for selected key administrative and academic positions are shown in Table 8-C and Table 8-D.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, grades, and maximum salaries for positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2025-27 Biennium as recommended by staff.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board requests the Director to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2025-27 Biennium.

ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF LOAN SOUTH ARKANSAS COLLEGE

South Arkansas College (SAC) requests approval of the economic feasibility to secure a loan not to exceed \$4.0 million with a maximum term of twenty (20) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.5 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The South Arkansas College Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on June 20, 2024.

The E&G issue will be up to \$4.0 million with a combined estimated annual debt service of \$386,685 and a term of twenty (20) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used to construct a new facility building to house Procurement, Maintenance, Custodial and Shipping & Receiving for the College. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for educational and general (E&G) projects provides that sales tax proceeds must be a minimum of 120 percent of the estimated annual debt service. The policy also states that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to debt service.

The above data demonstrates that South Arkansas College has sufficient sales tax revenue and tuition & fee revenue to support a loan up to \$4.0 million with a term of twenty (20) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.5 percent.

In accordance with board policy, any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, which are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October 2010. South Arkansas College will sustain a building maintenance fund to be supported by millage revenue for the E&G facilities. These funds will be held in a separate account for the maintenance of the new facilities by transferring annually to plant funds based on the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) of Universities and Colleges recommendation. The current APPA recommendation is \$2.50 per gross square foot for E&G facilities.

The projects contemplated herein provide 14,399 additional square footage to the campus and therefore, based on \$2.50 per gross square foot \$36,000 will be transferred annually beginning in the fiscal year after the projects are placed into service.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for South Arkansas College to secure a loan in the amount not to exceed \$4.0 million with a maximum term of twenty (20) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.5 percent as requested by the institution to construct a new facility building to house Procurement, Maintenance, Custodial and Shipping and Receiving for the College.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of South Arkansas College of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

COLLEGE SAVINGS BOND PROGRAM COMMUNITY / TECHNICAL COLLEGE REVOLVING LOAN ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF A LOAN ISSUE ARKANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY-SYSTEM

At its regular meeting on July 23, 1993, the State Board, acting under authority provided by Act 683 of 1989, as amended, established application procedures and criteria for the College Savings Bond Community/Technical College Revolving Loan Fund (CSB Loan Fund), including the method of establishing each loan's interest rate. The Higher Education Coordinating Board is requested to consider adjusting the interest rate calculation on these loans to ensure the lowest rate possible for qualifying institutions and for the approval of a request for a loan from the Arkansas State University System.

CSB LOAN FUND INTEREST RATES

In 1993, the State Board provided that rates of interest for College Savings Bond loans be fixed at the yield rate of one-year U.S. Treasury bills (as published on the third Thursday of the month preceding the State Board meeting) plus a sliding-scale margin based on the term of the loan.

In 1995, in order to encourage more active use of the CSB Loan Fund, staff recommended that the sliding-scale margin be eliminated, and that loans be issued at the yield rate of one-year U.S. Treasury bills. The service fees of the Arkansas Development Finance Authority, which is providing the collection services for these loans, will continue to be paid from the interest assessed.

Today, we are recommending that this rate determination be eliminated and replaced with the same interest rate that will be utilized for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Revolving Loan Program. This rate is set at 0.2% to provide for administrative costs associated with the loan. With the current state of interest fluctuations and inflationary measures affecting yield rates, this change will ensure a low interest loan for institutions that was the goal of this program from the outset.

Arkansas State University-System (ASU-SYS) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to secure a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund (CSBRLF) not to exceed \$2,900,000 with a term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 0.2 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational & general (E&G) purposes. The Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University-System approved this financing at its meeting on June 6, 2024.

The E&G CSBRLF loan issue will not exceed \$2,900,000 with an annual debt service of approximately \$293,200 and a term of ten (10) years. Proceeds the loan will be used to proceed with various critical and deferred maintenance, renovation, and other miscellaneous projects across the System.

The debt service on the loan issue will be supported by E&G revenues derived from tuition and fees. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of the net tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to educational and general debt service.

The above data demonstrates that ASU-SYS has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an E&G CSBRLF not to exceed \$2,900,000 with a term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 0.2 percent.

Any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October of 2010. The projects contemplated herein do not provide additional square footage to the campus.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board directs that the interest rates for loans made from the College Savings Bond Community/Technical College Revolving Loan Fund (CSB Loan Fund) be fixed at the yield rate of 0.2% in line with the interest rate charged against loans from the Sustainable Building Maintenance Loan Fund.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas State University-System to secure a loan not to exceed \$2,900,000 with a term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 0.2 percent to proceed with various critical and deferred maintenance, renovation, and other miscellaneous projects across the System.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of Arkansas State University-System of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

REPORT ON ANNUAL REVIEW OF FACULTY PERFORMANCE

Arkansas Code Annotated §6-63-104 and Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) policy require that each college and university conduct an annual performance review of faculty members. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) staff are also required to make an annual report to the Coordinating Board and Legislative Council. Each institution is required to submit a report to ADHE that describes the process followed during the 2023-2024 academic year. Institutional plans are on file with ADHE. Institutions are required to conduct rigorous, consistently applied, annual review of all faculty.

Faculty Performance Review Activities

Annual reviews include evaluation of teaching, scholarship, service, advising, overall productivity, and planning expectations for all instructional faculty. There are various methods including assessment by students, classroom monitoring visits, administrator review, peer review, and self-evaluation activities utilized in the faculty performance review process. Evaluation methods and timeframes of the process varied among institutions. All teaching faculty members including full-time, part-time, adjunct, visiting faculty, and teaching assistants were evaluated.

Institutional Monitoring and Overall Satisfaction of the Evaluation Process

Administrators and academic leaders at various levels were responsible for oversight of the evaluation process. Results, whether related to faculty performance or to the effectiveness of the process, were monitored and appropriate actions were addressed or facilitated. Evaluation results provided the basis for personnel promotion, merit salary increases, and reappointment decisions. Faculty who scored lower were provided with timely opportunities for faculty development. Institutions offered faculty mentors, workshops, critiques of course syllabi, and opportunities to collaborate on faculty development projects.

Appropriate stakeholders were involved in the formulation of the institution's faculty performance evaluation plan. Most faculty members viewed the process as a useful tool for providing continuous assessment and improvement of instructional delivery and student learning.

Notable Findings

Most institutions indicated no notable findings were present during the annual faculty review process.

Other mentionable findings are summarized below:

- Faculty members regularly collaborate with their peers (HEI and K12) across Arkansas as well as nationally.
- Many institutions cited Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) systems and Learning Management systems (LMS) as an area of improvement for process and efficiency. This is a result of many institutions in the state having either recently changed or are currently undergoing a change of ERP and/or LMS systems.
- Artificial Intelligence (AI) is an area of needed faculty training and development.
- Institutions continue to improve and implement assessment and evaluation software, such as Insights, Helio Campus, Watermark, and Mentor
- Several institutions specifically mentioned focused improvements in online course development and faculty support.
- Observation forms and assessment tools are being discussed, evaluated, and updated at multiple institutions.
- The faculty peer review components are being strengthened and modernized at many institutions.
- One institution mentioned improving professional development specifically for skills in teaching and instruction for industry experts who teach workforce/occupational courses.

English Fluency of Teaching Faculty

At most institutions both the student evaluation of the faculty and administrative evaluation of the faculty address English fluency. Responses to the student English fluency rating are monitored and faculty leadership and administration are notified when ratings raise concerns. In addition, student concerns related to English fluency may be addressed immediately with department/division leaders. English fluency is also appropriately considered in the instructor hiring process across all institutions.

No faculty deficiencies in English fluency that warranted action were identified in the past review cycle.

Compliance with Statutory Requirements that Colleges of Education Work Collaboratively with Accredited Public Schools

The collaboration between institutional Colleges of Education and the public schools in their respective areas was documented in these reports. Institutions partnered with public schools through Educational Renewal Zones, secondary career centers, educational cooperatives, and other programs that encouraged high school students to pursue postsecondary education. Institutions also engaged in numerous activities that provided assistance with staff development and school improvement programs, including advisory councils, field service programs, professional development, mentoring programs, teacher job fairs, and data collection and needs assessments.

Improvement Plans Developed as a Result of These Findings

When appropriate, improvement plans were developed between the faculty member and the administrator who conducted the evaluation. Specific remedial or disciplinary actions were taken because of performance deficiencies revealed by the evaluation process. Most often, this involved the development of professional improvement plans. In addition, changes in the institutional process have been addressed when warranted.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM REVIEW AY2024

Arkansas Code §6-61-214 requires that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) review existing academic programs at Arkansas public colleges and universities to identify certificate and degree programs not meeting minimum standards of quality and to establish schedules for either resolving these concerns or removing the programs from the AHECB approved program inventory. The existing academic program review policies (AHECB Policy 5.2) were adopted in 1988 and revised in 1995 and 1998. Institutions have been submitting program reviews for more than 35 years.

Beginning Fall 2010, Arkansas colleges and universities were required to employ external consultants to review all certificate and degree programs over a period of 7-10 years with the findings from the reviews reported to the Coordinating Board. Accredited, licensed and state certified programs follow the usual review practices and the schedule of the accrediting/approval body. These programs do not require further ADHE staff review.

A quality program review, or self-study, describes the status of a program, assesses program strengths, identifies areas for improvement, and provides strategic direction on program goals and specific plans to achieve those goals.

The external reviewers' written report must include a summary of each area examined and should provide examples that document the conclusions. The report will be used by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to verify the student demand and employer need for the program, the appropriateness of the curriculum, and the adequacy of the program resources. The report does not include a recommendation to ADHE on program continuation or program deletion.

Minutes of Meeting

The April 26, 2024, regular meeting of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was held at North Arkansas College in Harrison. Chair Graycen Bigger called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, ADHE staff and quests were also present.

Chair Bigger began by announcing that AHECB Member Kelley Erstine had been appointed to the University of Central Arkansas Board of Trustees and would no longer serve on the Coordinating Board.

calling on President Rick Massengale for a welcome. Dr. Massengale began by welcoming Coordinating Board members to North Arkansas College (NAC) and shared information about their institution.

Agenda Item No. 1 Distribution of Mineral Lease Funds

Nick Fuller presented the Distribution of Mineral Lease Funds. According to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-61-801 through §6-61-808, there is established the Arkansas Research Development Program for providing Arkansas Research Development Program Grants to publicly-supported universities in Arkansas by the Division of Higher Education. Act 870 of 2023 provides that after the sum of \$13,200,000 has been deposited into the Higher Education Building Maintenance Fund, any additional deposits are to be transferred to the Research Development Fund to be used as provided by law.

RESOLVED, That after review by the Legislative Council, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to distribute up to \$475,000 from the Higher Education Research Development Fund to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for

continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

There were no questions.

Heather Maxey moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 1 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2 Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue University of Arkansas, Fayetteville

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$34.175 million with a maximum term of thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on March 12-13, 2024.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville issue bonds not to exceed \$34.175 million with a term not to exceed thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Chair Bigger asked if the 5.5 percent interest rate is fixed over thirty years. Nick Fuller said it will depend on what the final rate from the bank is. He noted that ADHE staff will report the actual interest rate yearly to the Coordinating Board.

Bigger asked if UAF would raise tuition and fees in the future to cover this bond. Fuller said they will not. The feasibility was based on current revenue projections, said Fuller.

Heather Maxey moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 2 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton

The University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton (UACCM) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$12 million with a maximum term of thirty-two (32) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on March 12-13, 2024.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton to issue bonds not to exceed \$12 million with a term not to exceed thirty-two (32) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Dr. Jerry Cashed questioned the negative operational margin for 2022-23 and asked what the operational margin for 2023-24 would look like.

Chancellor Lisa Willenberg and Vice Chancellor for Finance Jeff Mullen said UACCM is tracking even this year. If everything stays on track for the summer, we expect the operational margin to be even, said Mullen.

Heather Maxey moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 3 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 4
Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue
Arkansas Tech University

Arkansas Tech University (ATU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$10.4 million with a maximum term of fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.0 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes and auxiliary renovations supported by tuition and fee revenue. The Arkansas Tech University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on December 14, 2023.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas Tech University issue bonds not to exceed \$10.4 million with a term not to exceed fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.0 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects and auxiliary renovations.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Heather Maxey moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 4 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Kyle Miller seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 5 Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue Arkansas Tech University

Nick Fuller announced that Agenda Items 4 and 5 were combined into Agenda Item 4.

Agenda Item No. 6
Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology
Arkansas State University Newport

The proposed 65 credit-hour, 5 semester program in Radiologic Technology will prepare students for the American Registry of Radiologic Technology (ARRT) Certification exam by educating students on the operation of imaging or radiation therapy equipment and the preparation of patients for these imaging studies. Students completing this program will earn the Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology, as well as the existing Certificate of Proficiency and Technical Certificate in Pre-Health Professions. Potential earnings of graduates within the area surrounding ASUN are approximately \$52,000 per year.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology (CIP 51.0911), at Arkansas State University Newport, effective Fall 2024.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of Arkansas State University Newport and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University System of the approval.

Dr. Typhanie Myers, Provost/Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs, provided additional information.

Dr. Katie Dudley asked if the clinical spaces are exclusive to the ASUN students. Angie Smith, Director of Nursing Workforce and Innovation for St. Bernards Healthcare, said their clinical slots are not exclusive to any school. She explained that St. Bernards is a 437-bed facility serving 26 counties in Northeast Arkansas.

Chair Bigger asked if the clinical students would be placed would be placed primarily through St. Bernards. Dr. Myers said they are looking at St. Bernards Healthcare, Black River Health Systems and Unity Health in Searcy.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 6 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Katie Dudley seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 7
Associate of Applied Science in Nursing
University of Arkansas at Fort Smith

The proposed 65 credit-hour program consists of 15 credit hours of general education, a 30 credit-hour nursing core, and 20 additional credit hours of courses that can serve as pre-requisites or co-requisites. The program also contains a total of 450 clock hours of laboratory and/or clinical experience.

Chair Bigger asked for additional information regarding the partnerships with Mercy Health and Baptist Health. Dr. Robinson said that Mercy Health and Baptist Health have been key members of UAFS's advisory board since its formation and said they have a symbiotic relationship.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 7 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Katie Dudley seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Carolyn Miller moved to approve Agenda Item No. 13. Dr. Jerry Cash seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 14 Commissioner's Report

Commissioner Warden began by thanking the Coordinating Board and ADHE staff for all they do to help move education forward in Arkansas.

Institutional Changes

Dr. Wade Derden has been named the new National Park College president, effective July 1, 2024. Derden is currently the executive vice president for advancement and government relations at National Park College.

LEARNS

The LEARNS Act requires that a Career Ready Pathway to a diploma be developed. Warden said processes and requirements are being developed to ensure they lead to high-wage, high growth careers for all graduates.

90 Hour Bachelor's Degree Consideration

Standard measure has a bachelor's degree at 120 credit hours, said Warden. Several schools around the country are considering implementing 90-hour bachelor's degrees. ADHE will pull together a committee to see if this is something that would work for Arkansas.

Dr. Jerry Cash what schools are currently implementing 90-hour bachelor's degrees. Mason Campbell said Brigham Young University does. Campbell said he will provide a list of all the institutions that currently implement 90-hour bachelor's degrees.

Agenda Item No. 15 Annual Report on First-Year Student Remediation

Mason Campbell presented a summary report on the Annual Report on First-Year Student Remediation. He provided an overview of the 21,510 first-time entering, degree-seeking students who graduated high school in 2021 or 2022 and enrolled in an Arkansas public institution of higher education in AY2023. Of this population, 91% were classified as full-time students and 9% were classified as part-time students. With regards to sex, 56% were female, 44% were male, and less than 1% percent did not report. When examining the institution type, 70% of this population enrolled at a four-year institution compared to 30% enrolled at a two-year institution. Lastly, remediation status of all first-time entering students, 62% did not require remediation while 38% did require remedial coursework.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 16 Report on Student Retention and Graduation

Sonia Hazelwood presented a summary report on the Annual Report on Student Retention and Graduation. When looking at both public sectors together The state's fall-to-fall retention rate of 74.7% for the Fall 2022 cohort had an increase of 2.1% over the Fall 2021 cohort. Both male and female cohorts for the 4-year institutions reported increases in their retention rates for the Fall 2022 cohort, while the 2-year colleges reported a 3% increase for the female cohort and a modest decline for the male cohort.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 17 Annual Report on Retention and Graduation of Student-Athletes

Sonia Hazelwood presented a summary report on the Annual Report on Retention and Graduation of Student-Athletes. In Academic Year 2022-23, 4,120 students participated in athletics at ten universities and nine 2-year colleges. This is the second most student-athletes ever reported for an academic year. This is a decrease of 12 student-athletes over the 2021-22 academic year, including 751 student-athletes reported by nine 2-year colleges.

Agenda Item No. 18 Request for ARHEG Slot Fee Increase

Arkansas Division of Higher Education administers a grant program for Arkansas students and a forgivable loan program to assist Arkansas students attending specified out-of-state health and medical professional schools. This grant program is known as the "Arkansas Health Education Grant (ARHEG) Program. In accordance with Arkansas Code 6-81-1101, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) is authorized to enter into direct contracts with selected accredited schools of dentistry, optometry, and veterinary medicine, along with podiatry, chiropractic, or osteopathy which do not participate in the program, if the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board determines that the needs of the state are not being met by institutions participating in the program. Currently, there are 13 Chiropractic slots in the ARHEG program. The Arkansas Chiropractic Physicians Association (ACPA) has requested the scholarship be increased to \$10,000 each while the 13 ARHEG slots remain the same. This is to better incentivize students into the professional program of Chiropractic care.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, authorizes the increase of the scholarship to \$10,000 of the chiropractic slots in the Arkansas Health Education Grant (ARHEG) Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Division of Higher Education to send a copy of this resolution to the Arkansas Chiropractic Physicians Association (ACPA).

Minutes of Meeting

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, and quests were also present.

Chair Bigger welcomed presidents and chancellors to the special board meeting and thanked everyone for attending.

Agenda Item No. 1
Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue
University of Arkansas Community College

University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville (UACCB) requests approval of the economic feasibility to secure a loan not to exceed \$3.5 million with a maximum term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 6.5 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on May 22-23, 2024.

The E&G issue will be up to \$3.5 million with a combined estimated annual debt service of \$478,921 and a term of ten (10) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used to complete renovations of the recently purchased property at 2210 E. Main Street, located approximately one-third (1/3) mile from the main campus. The debt service on the loan will be supported by sales tax revenue, lease revenue, tuition and fee revenue, and/or any additional revenue generated by the College. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for educational and general (E&G) projects provides that sales tax proceeds must be a minimum of 120 percent of the estimated

annual debt service. The policy also states that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville to secure a loan in the amount not to exceed \$3.5 million with a maximum term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 6.5 percent as requested by the institution for the E&G project.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Dr. Jim Carr asked if they still expect to receive an annual interest rate of approximately 6.5 percent.

Dr. Brian Shonk, chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville, said yes. They talked to the bank recently and the interest rate is still at 6.5 percent.

Chair Bigger asked if this is the expansion of an existing program. Dr. Shonk said it is a combination of new and existing programs.

Dr. Carr complimented UACCB on the wonderful job they are doing for Batesville and asked if they have any enrollment projections for this fall as compared to last fall.

Dr. Shonk explained that last fall's numbers were 20 percent higher than the previous years. He noted that he is confident this year's enrollment numbers will be up, he noted that they are a little harder to predict. UACCB is in the process of doing a conversion from their current system, which has caused their timing to be off by a month.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Dr. Jerry Cash seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER

Commissioner Tours Higher Education Campuses

Commissioner Warden completed his pledge to visit all 33 Arkansas public institutions in his first year as commissioner. Warden met with presidents and chancellors to discuss higher education issues and toured their beautiful campuses.

















Academic Signing Day

On May 1, Commissioner Warden participated in the Annual Conway Area Chamber of Commerce Academic Signing Day held at the University of Central Arkansas. Recognizing some of the highest achieving graduating seniors in the Conway area, Warden addressed students, their parents, and school representatives from St. Joseph High School, Conway Christian School, and Conway High School.

69th SHEEO Annual Meeting

The 69th SHEEO Annual Meeting was held at the Park Hyatt in Washington, D.C., July 15-18, 2024. Commissioner Warden joined CEOs of state higher education boards and commissions and leaders of national and regional organizations at the meeting which emphasized the discussion of key state and national higher education policy issues and relationship building.

CPI Case Management Training

Thirty-eight Career Pathways Initiative (CPI) case managers and directors will complete case management training in July. CPI has an increased focus on case management to improve student success and it is a performance measure required by the Department of Human Services (DHS).

Arkansas Higher Education Information System

The ADHE Data Team hosted several information meetings recently, including four inperson workshops and one online workshop for more than 80 institutional non-credit workforce staff to review the expanded Arkansas Higher Education Information System (AHEIS) Non-Credit Workforce Reporting requirements. In addition, the annual AHEIS Update Meeting was held at UAPTC for those involved with state reporting.

Digital Credential Ecosystem Workshop

Several ADHE staff attended the Digital Credential Ecosystem Workshop in support of the state establishing a digital credential ecosystem to support learners, workers, employers and providers through streamlined issuance and verification of digital credentials.



New Leadership at UAPB

Dr. Andrea Stewart has been named interim chancellor at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) beginning July 1. Stewart, currently provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs at UAPB, will lead the campus as a national search to replace current Chancellor Dr. Laurence Alexander, is in progress.

Southern Arkansas University Names 13th President

Southern Arkansas University announced the appointment of Dr. Bruno Hicks as its 13th president, effective June 17, 2024. Dr. Hicks previously served as the provost and vice president of academic affairs at Dalton State College (DSC). Before joining DSC in 2020, Hicks was the founding dean of the School of Education from 2016-2020 at Fitchburg State University.





New President Named at Southeast Arkansas College

The Board of Trustees of Southeast Arkansas College (SEARK) announced the appointment of Dr. Tyrone Jackson as the college's next President, effective July 1, 2024. Dr. Jackson, previously served as the President at Mississippi Delta Community College in Mississippi.

South Arkansas College Announces New President

South Arkansas College (SouthArk) has announced Dr. Stephanie Tully-Dartez as the college's sixth president. Having served as Interim President of SouthArk since August 2023, Dr. Tully-Dartez will assume her role as President of SouthArk, effective July 1. Dr. Tully-Dartez has served at SouthArk for 14 years.



AHECB Policy - CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

Arkansas law allows for the enrollment of high school students in college-level courses under certain conditions. Concurrent enrollment allows students to obtain credit toward a high school diploma at the same time they earn college credit.

The concurrent enrollment policy was first approved by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) in October 1998 with the latest revision in 2017. Proposed new language is in *italics and underlined*, and deleted language is struck through

AHECB Resolutions

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the policy amendment on concurrent enrollment effective Fall 2024. The concurrent enrollment policy outlines the guidelines for concurrent program participation; however, Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities are not required to participate in a concurrent enrollment program; and a high school/school district may choose to partner with more than one Arkansas college/university for concurrent courses.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That any Arkansas state-supported college or university that chooses to participate in a concurrent enrollment program with a public school district, private high school, or home-school student shall implement and administer the concurrent program in accordance with the policies of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the rules of the Arkansas State Board of Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to provide a copy of the amended policy to presidents and chancellors, academic affairs officers, students affairs officers, and institutional research officers at Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities.

Concurrent Enrollment Policy

I. Definitions

Concurrent Enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in a college course taught on a high school campus (or in selected cases on the college campus or by distance/digital technology) for high school credit and college-level credit. (Arkansas Code §6-18-223) Concurrent enrollment allows students to obtain credit toward a high school diploma at the same time they earn college credit.

Dual enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in postsecondary education for college-level credit exclusively. (Arkansas Code §6-60-202)

II. Concurrent Course Credit – Institutional Requirements

For concurrent course enrollments to be counted for FTE/higher education funding purposes, the following conditions must be met:

- Program Accreditation/Authorization If an institution of higher education
 offers a concurrent credit course(s) on a high school campus taught by a high
 school teacher, the institution must be accredited by the National Alliance of
 Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP); or the college/university must
 be approved by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB)
 to offer courses, including courses offered via distance technology, for
 concurrent credit.
- 2. Concurrent Credit Courses Concurrent credit courses must should be freshman-level and/or sophomore-level college/university courses, or in select cases upper-level courses that are approved through the established process of an institution and included in the institutional catalog. The General education courses offered for concurrent credit must should be listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS). Students taking general education courses that are not part of the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS) must be informed by the institution and high school that the course may not transfer to another college or university. A list of the career and technical education (CTE) courses offered for concurrent credit must be attached to the signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the high school/school district and the college/university.

The course offered for concurrent credit must meet the same standards as college courses taught on the college/university campus. Students can earn college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each general education concurrent course and each blended

AP/concurrent course that is a minimum of 3 semester credit hours. Students can earn college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each CTE course that is a minimum of 3 semester credit hours.

The college/university administration must exercise direct oversight of all aspects of the concurrent course, including participation in the faculty selection, orientation, *professional development*, and evaluation processes.

The instructor teaching the college course for concurrent credit must:

- 1) use the approved college/university course syllabus.
- use the same textbook or a textbook with aligned content and course learning outcomes as approved by the college/university,
- adopt the same learning outcomes and assignments as those developed for the course offered on the college/university campus with limited exceptions approved by the college/university, and
- 4) use the same course grading/awarding standards as those on the college/university campus. If departmental exams are used in college/university campus courses, then those course exams must be used at the high school site.

Note: It is understood that one high school may have a concurrent agreement with more than one college/university; however, there should not be unnecessary duplication of college course offerings.

If there is not agreement among multiple institutions offering college courses at one high school/school district, the college/university seeking clarification on the implementation of the concurrent enrollment policy must contact the ADHE <u>Director Commissioner</u> in writing and follow AHECB Policy 5.17: Off-Campus Instruction Policy-Criteria for Conflict Resolution.

Criteria for Conflict Resolution from AHECB Policy 5.17

Institutions that seek to offer concurrent courses at the same high school and cannot reach agreement between each other, either informally or with a written Memorandum of Understanding, will appeal to the ADHE <u>Director Commissioner</u>. After receiving a written request from each affected institution that includes pertinent information and data, the ADHE <u>Director Commissioner</u> will mediate the conflict. If the affected institutions reject the decision of the ADHE <u>Director Commissioner</u>, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board will hear evidence, consider staff recommendations, and make a final determination.

In order to determine the merits of presented arguments, the ADHE <u>Director Commissioner</u> and Board members will require in writing from each institution the following information:

Mission of institution

- Willingness of institution to offer the course at the off-campus/high school location
- Capability of institution
- Type of courses/programs proposed
- Cost to students
- Desire of the community or local school district
- History of off-campus offerings in the geographical area or at the high school
- Evidence that this course offering will not result in unnecessary duplication of courses/programs
- Evidence that the course offerings will not result in overextension of state's resources
- Other relevant information as determined by the institutions, ADHE <u>Director</u> <u>Commissioner</u>, and/or AHECB members

Although the "30-Mile Rule" is not a criterion used to resolve institutional conflicts regarding off-campus or concurrent offerings, the AHECB does not look favorably on an institution that encroaches on the service area of a second institution.

3. **AP/Concurrent or IB/Concurrent Blended Courses** (College/University Participation Optional)

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are high school courses in which students are required to take the AP Exam and make the requisite score in order to receive college credit from an Arkansas institution of higher education. (Student enrollments in AP or IB courses cannot be reported through the Arkansas Higher Education Student InformationSystem.)

The merging of AP or IB courses and general education college courses is allowed under certain circumstances, and these merged courses will be referenced as blended AP/concurrent or IB/concurrent courses.

- Colleges and universities that offer blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/ concurrent courses must ensure that these blended courses meet all the requirements of concurrent courses as set forth in this concurrent enrollment policy.
- The AP course guidelines specified by the College Board in its published course description must be incorporated into the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus, and the core IB program requirements must be incorporated into the blended IB/concurrent coursesyllabus.
- The blended AP/concurrent course syllabus must be submitted by the high school teacher for approval by the College Board AP Course Audit;

and the school district must have on file the written documentation of the College Board approval of the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus. A copy of the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus currently approved by the College Board must be submitted for college/university approval during the concurrent instructor/course approval process. A copy of the blended IB/concurrent course syllabus also must be on file at the school district.

- All students enrolled in blended AP/concurrent courses are required to take the AP exam; and the high school must have written documentation on file of the students who took the AP exam with this AP exam data provided to the college/university upon request. There also must be written documentation on file of the students who took the IB assessment with this assessment data provided to the college/university upon request.
- Students can earn at least three semester credit hours of college credit and one unit of high school credit for successful completion of one blended AP/ concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course only if the student registers for concurrent course credit at the beginning of the term. (A minimum score on the AP exam or IB assessment is not required for the student to earn college credit for the blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course.) All other students enrolled in the blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course can earn only one unit of high school credit for the course.
- Students enrolled in these blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses must meet all college/university requirements included in this concurrent enrollment policy.
- Any high school that cannot furnish data on blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent test takers (during an ADE/ADHE concurrent enrollment program audit) will not be approved for the continued offering of blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses.

(The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme is a comprehensive two- year curriculum and assessment system that requires students to study six subjects and core components across all disciplines with assessment of student work both by external examiners as well as the students' own teachers to ensure that a common standard is applied equally to the work of all students internationally. Students also may elect to enroll in individual IB courses and receive a minimum course score for college/university recognition.)

4. Concurrent Course Ownership

Institutions of higher education must demonstrate "ownership" of any course offered for concurrent credit for which students are reported for funding purposes. Ownership of courses means that the college/university will:

- Provide the instructors with appropriate training and orientation in course curriculum, assessment criteria, course philosophy, and administrative requirements after approval of the instructors to teach the college/university courses.
- Ensure that instructors receive continuing collegial interaction with college faculty through professional development, required seminars, and site visits. These interactions will address topics such as course content, course delivery, student learning assessment, in-class evaluation, and professional development in the field of study.
- Ensure that students have the opportunity to utilize institutional resources including the college/university library and academic advising on the college/university campus.

Simply awarding college credit to students who are enrolled in concurrent courses offered by a sponsoring college/university does not meet the principle of "course ownership" as described above.

5. Teaching Credentials

Faculty teaching general education concurrent courses must have a master's degree that includes a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject area being taught. College or university faculty who travel to the high school or secondary center to teach concurrent courses (and/or faculty and staff that have direct, official contact with the high school student) must have a criminal background check and complete the child maltreatment training course as required of public school teachers.

The teacher of the blended AP/concurrent course(s) must have completed AP training in the subject area(s), must have a master's degree with a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject area being taught, must be approved to teach the concurrent course(s) by the college/university, and must provide the college/university with documentation of successful completion of AP training.

The instructor of record must be the individual that teaches the concurrent course(s); and for general education concurrent courses and blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses these individuals must have a

master's degree that includes a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject areas being taught. For the purpose of teaching a concurrent course under this policy, an individual under contract with the school district as a teacher will not be considered an adjunct faculty member of the college/university; although, they must be reported as an academic rank of adjunct faculty to AHEIS.

III. Concurrent Course Enrollment

Concurrent College Admission

High school students enrolled in general education concurrent courses will be those who have successfully completed the eighth grade and are admitted to the college/university as non-award seeking students per §6-16-1204 (although a major can be reported for the concurrent students to AHEIS to assist with tracking of students completing college certificates/degrees before high school graduation). Each college/university must specify the concurrent admission requirements for high school students.

Concurrent Course Registration

Because discrete classes that totally separate concurrent credit students from non- concurrent credit students may be prohibitive to operate in some cases, those classes with a mixed population must have at least a majority of the students enrolled for concurrent credit; and All high school students enrolled in the concurrent course must meet the same requirements for completion of the course whether or not the student is registered for college credit. The concurrent course withdrawal process and procedures must be implemented in accordance with established college/university guidelines.

Concurrent/Dual Course Placement/Statewide Minimum Exam Scores

High school students must have scored 19 or better on the ACT Reading sub-test or equivalent test. Please refer to the annual SIS manual for ACT equivalency scores, to enroll in any general education (ACTS) course.

Enrollment in English Composition and mathematics courses also require a 19 or better on the respective ACT sub-test or equivalent test. Please refer to the annual SIS manual for ACT equivalency scores.

The designated exam scores are statewide minimum scores. Any college/university campus may elect to set higher minimum scores for general education concurrent courses, and may choose to require the COMPASS or ASSET score in addition to EXPLORE, PLAN, Aspire or PSAT scores.

To ensure successful placement in concurrent English, math, and reading intensive

courses, institutions are encouraged to consider a variety of factors beyond a single standardized test score. Procedures and standards for placement are outlined in the Higher Education Coordinating Board Student Placement Policy.

- <u>A college or university may allow simultaneous enrollment in college-level credit</u> and developmental courses.
- The board and administration of any campus may elect to set minimum scores for enrollment in college-level mathematics and English composition courses based on established and documented criteria, which demonstrate the students' ability to succeed.
- All concurrent students shall be assessed for placement into credit-bearing courses by at least one of the following methods:
 - o <u>an objective examination,</u>
 - o previous coursework and/or career training,
 - o <u>or measures supported by sufficient analysis of predicted student success.</u>

The placement assessment should reflect a better than 75 percent likelihood of the student's ability to earn a "C" or better grade in the course in which the student is placed. A student's reading level should be strong enough for them to earn a "C" or better in courses that require substantial reading such as courses in the sciences, humanities, and social sciences. Ideally, students should possess a readiness for credit-bearing courses and the institution admitting them should develop and refine a system to determine this.

IV. Concurrent Course Enrollment - Data Reporting (via Student Information System)

Only students who are enrolled in concurrent courses for college credit can be counted for FTE purposes by the college/university.

Students enrolled in blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses can be counted for FTE purposes.

Students enrolled in career and technical education courses for concurrent credit at a secondary center can be counted for FTE purposes.

High school students enrolled in remedial/developmental courses for concurrent credit cannot be counted for FTE and higher education funding purposes.

All institutions are required to collect and report exam scores for the purpose of AHEIS reporting although a minimum score is not required.

(Note: More details on data reporting for concurrent enrollment may be included in

ADHE guidelines on institutional data submissions.)

Specific guidance for reporting concurrent enrollment to the Arkansas Higher Education Information System (AHEIS) is provided in the AHEIS manual.

V. Concurrent Course Enrollment - Payment of Tuition and Fees

The college/university will establish tuition and fee rates for concurrent students.

Colleges and universities cannot claim student semester credit hours or funding if tuition is not received by the institution in any form.

The high school student shall be responsible for all costs of college/university courses taken for concurrent credit, unless the costs for these courses are paid by the public school district, a college/university scholarship, a grant, or a private foundation. If the costs for a college/university course(s) are paid by the public school district, a college/university scholarship, a grant, or a private foundation; a signed agreement must exist between the public school district, the external entity or foundation, and the Arkansas state-supported college/university.

If the college/university sets tuition and fees at a lower rate than the regular full tuition rate on campus, the difference between the regular rate and the charged rate must be reported as an academic scholarship for all purposes and must be reported as such to ADHE reduction in tuition shall not be considered an institutional scholarship per §6-16-1204.

For formula recommendation purposes, ADHE will include the regular full tuition and fees for all concurrent courses (except remedial/developmental education concurrent courses) in the funding recommendation.

Pursuant to Arkansas Code §6-53-501, the intent of this concurrent policy is that the college courses described above shall include but not be limited to articulated courses designed for instruction of secondary students qualifying for state aid from the public school fund. Nothing in this policy shall preclude money flowing to the secondary centers under Arkansas Code §6-51-305.

High school students enrolled in college/university remedial/developmental education courses for concurrent credit cannot be counted for FTE/higher education funding purposes.

An institution must be accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP); or effective August 1, 2015, the college/university must have an AHECB-approved Concurrent Enrollment Program to claim student semester credit hours for courses offered for concurrent credit. Report concurrent courses/students to AHEIS.

(Note: More details on funding for concurrent enrollment may be included in

AHECB institutional finance financial aid policy.)

VI. Concurrent Course Enrollment - Career and Technical Education Courses

Students enrolled in Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses that are included in the MOU agreement between the school district and college/university can be awarded college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each CTE course that is a minimum of 3 semester credit hours, as delineated in the MOUagreement.

VII. Concurrent Course Enrollment – Remedial/Developmental Education Courses (College/University Participation Optional)

A high school senior who possesses at least an ACT sub-test score of 17 in English, reading or mathematics (or comparable exam score) may enroll in the requisite remedial/ developmental education courses in English, reading, and mathematics at an Arkansas state-supported college/university.

A high school senior student enrolled in college/university remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading and/or mathematics for concurrent credit must be notified verbally and in writing by the high school principal or designee that successful completion of remedial/ developmental education courses at one college/university does not guarantee college-level course placement at another Arkansas college/university, unless there is a written/signed college course placement agreement with the other Arkansas college/university.

A college/university remedial/developmental education course cannot be used to meet the college/university core subject area/unit requirements in English and mathematics.

A list of the colleges/universities with a signed college course placement agreement must be:

- 1) attached to the signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the school district and college/university,
- 2) included in the Concurrent Enrollment Student Guide/Information Sheet, and
- 3) posted on the college/universitywebsite.

Nothing in this concurrent policy, shall require a college/university or school district to offer remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading and mathematics for concurrent credit.

VIII. Partnership Agreement/Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

A written and signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) must exist to reflect the various expectations, obligations, and responsibilities of all parties.

The MOU must be reviewed annually, and the college/university must provide to

the high school a list of all college courses that may be offered for concurrent credit during the school year. The unit of high school credit that will be awarded for each college course must be noted for each concurrent course along with the high school course replacement/substitution. Courses identified by ADE as math transitions courses will be awarded the same credit as a fourth year math for high school. The high school/school district or the college/university can modify or terminate the written, signed concurrent agreement during the annual review period.

High school students who desire to enroll in a college or university first must be recommended by their high school principal or designee.

High school students enrolled in college courses for concurrent credit purposes must be 1) informed that the student is responsible for all costs associated with enrollment in the concurrent course, unless the courses are paid by another approved public or private entity; and 2) advised about the potential limitations concerning the transfer of college course credit.

If remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading or mathematics are offered for concurrent credit to high school seniors, a list of the colleges/universities with a signed college course placement agreement must be attached to the MOU, published in the student guide/information sheet, and posted on the college/university website.

The college/university must provide the school district with a student guide or information sheet for concurrent enrollment that the high school must distribute to students and parents that outlines the college/university and school district requirements for student participation. The high school will assure that the student and parent acknowledge that the student will participate in the concurrent program in accordance with the stated college/university and school district participation requirements.

Concurrent program requirements and guidelines required for course instruction must be provided by the college/university to the school district and concurrent instructors.

IX. State Authorization for Concurrent EnrollmentProgram

A college/university must be accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) or be authorized by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to participate in the Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP).

I. College/University offering Concurrent Courses on College/University Campus Only A college/university only offering concurrent courses on the college/university campus (and does not offer or plan to offer concurrent

courses on the high school campus) has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation.

The college/university must submit to ADHE no later than June 1, 2014, a copy of the written, signed MOU agreement between the college/university and high school/school district as verification of the on-campus college/university concurrent enrollment program. The MOU must outline in detail the concurrent enrollment arrangements between the two parties. A copy of the current written, signed MOU agreement must be submitted to ADHE by June 1 of each subsequent year for continued authorization.

Any college/university currently not offering concurrent courses on a high school campus must follow the concurrent program approval process outlined in Item III below; and the college/university must have AHECB authorization for its institutional (high school) concurrent enrollment program prior to the offering of concurrent courses on a high school campus.

II. College/University with NACEP Accreditation Initial Authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program

All colleges/universities with NACEP accreditation must provide written documentation to ADHE of NACEP accreditation status upon approval of this concurrent policy.

- A college/university currently accredited by NACEP has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation, and must maintain NACEP accreditation for continued CEP participation; or
- 2) A college/university currently accredited by NACEP has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation and may request AHECB authorization to satisfy the requirements for continued CEP participation when current NACEP accreditation expires. The college/university must submit the written notification to ADHE no later than June 1, 2014, or June 1 of a subsequent year, requesting AHECB authorization for continued CEP participation.
- III. College/University without NACEP Accreditation (and offering Concurrent Courses on High School Campus)

Initial Authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program

To receive initial authorization through the state review process, developed in cooperation with the colleges and universities, and implemented by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education (ADHE); a college/university must demonstrate that the college/university concurrent program meets or exceeds all requirements outlined in the AHECB Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP) policy.

AHECB approval will be granted to the college/university to offer concurrent credit courses for a period not to exceed seven (7) years once the college/university has submitted a CEP proposal that has been reviewed and recommended for approval by a 3-member review team selected from a panel of reviewers agreed upon by the Concurrent Review Committee (CRC) and ADHE.

The initial proposal for offering concurrent credit must specify how the college/university concurrent enrollment program satisfies each component of the CEP policy by providing evidence of the following:

1. Faculty

Each college/university must have a policy for selecting faculty to teach concurrent courses that meets AHECB guidelines. Each concurrent instructor for general education courses at a minimum must hold a master's degree and have 18 graduate-level hours in the subject to be taught.

Each college/university must have an official transcript on file for each instructor approved for concurrent courses which clearly indicates that the concurrent faculty member has the required academic credentials.

Each college/university must have a description of the orientation process for new concurrent faculty and a sample of information that is provided to concurrent faculty during orientation.

Each college/university must have a description of the plan to assure concurrent faculty receive appropriate professional development.

2. Courses

Each college/university must present a current list of proposed concurrent courses by course name, number (i.e. ENGL 1013), the associated Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS) course number (if applicable) and indicate any pre-requisite courses.

3. Syllabi and Textbooks

Each college/university must have a policy regarding final approval of concurrent syllabi and textbooks.

4. Students

Each college/university must verify that students have met admission criteria for the college/university and that the process conforms to AHECB guidelines.

Each college/university must provide an explanation of how grades are awarded and recorded with the college/university Registrar; and must provide documentation that the college/university course grading/awarding and course recording standards are followed for concurrent courses.

5. Student Guide for ConcurrentEnrollment

Each college/university must have a student guide for concurrent enrollment available to students and parents that outlines the college/university and school district participation requirements; and includes information regarding syllabi, academic standing, grading, links to ACTS, academic dishonesty, transcripts, current contact information for the concurrent enrollment liaison at the college/university, drop/withdrawal from class, academic due process guidelines, use of the college/university library, and student evaluation of instruction procedures.

6. Faculty Guide for Concurrent Enrollment

Each college/university must have a faculty guide for concurrent enrollment detailing the syllabus requirements, FERPA requirements, academic dishonesty policy, grading system, access to input grades, grade changes, student academic due process, student evaluation of instruction, policy for students with disabilities, sexual harassment policy, contact information for the college/university concurrent liaison, and child maltreatment and reporting policy, non-compliance policy, and process of faculty evaluation by the academic unit head from the college/university.

7. Assessment

By academic discipline, <u>each college/university must include</u> a description of the process for assuring concurrent course content satisfies the requirements of the college/university academic unit. Examples may include common examinations, approval of concurrent tests by the college/university, common grading criteria, etc.

8. Evaluation

Each college/university will analyze its student success, persistence, and retention data to determine to what extent concurrent credit courses are leading to student success.

9. Memorandum of Understanding

The college/university must have on file a current written, signed Memorandum of Understanding with each high school with whom the college/university offers or desires to offer concurrent enrollment.

The Memorandum of Understanding must include the following:

- 1. The names and addresses of the college/university and the participating school district/high school;
- 2. Academic calendar with dates which the college/university and the high school must comply;
- 3. Guidelines and requirements for approval of instructors;
- 4. Guidelines for approval and assessment of courses;
- 5. Guidelines and requirements for admission and eligibility of students;
- 6. Requirements for syllabi;
- 7. Non-compliance statement; Length of time covered by the MOU and procedures for termination of MOU;
- 8. Description of the concurrent course billing process.

All evidence indicating how the college/university plans to offer a concurrent enrollment program must be submitted to ADHE by June 1, 2014, (or by June 1 of a subsequent year if concurrent courses will be offered for the first time during the next academic year) for an evaluation by a review team selected from among those designated by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education to serve on the Concurrent Review Committee. The Committee members will be selected by ADHE and will serve for a three-yearperiod.

The CRC evaluation report will be forwarded to the Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education for consideration of a recommendation for AHECB approval of the institutional concurrent enrollment program.

AHECB Continued Authorization

A college/university with AHECB initial authorization for the Concurrent Enrollment Program can offer courses for concurrent enrollment for a period of up to seven (7) years unless the AHECB requires a follow-up review within the 7- year timeframe and/or the NACEP accreditation has expired.

A college/university that wishes to continue to offer courses for concurrent enrollment must request AHECB reauthorization or must maintain NACEP accreditation.

The request for AHECB CEP reauthorization must include documentation of the following:

- 1. A current Memorandum of Understanding with each high school with whom the college/university desires to offer concurrent enrollment.
- 2. A current list of concurrent courses offered by course name, number (i.e.

- ENGL 1013), the ACTS course number, and any pre-requisites courses.
- 3. By academic discipline, a description of the process for assuring that concurrent course content satisfies the requirements of the college/university academic unit.
- A current list of concurrent instructors offering courses for concurrent credit including a statement that each instructor meets the minimum requirements for instruction as required by AHECB and the academic department offering the concurrent credit.
- 5. An explanation of how grades are awarded and recorded with the college/university Registrar.
- 6. An analysis of student success, persistence, and retention data to determine to what extent concurrent credit courses are leading to student success for the three years prior to the reauthorization request year.

The information for continued authorization must be submitted to ADHE by June 1 before the expiration date of AHECB CEP initial authorization; and reviewed by a 3-member team selected by ADHE from among those designated to serve on the Concurrent Review Committee. Based on the CRC review, ADHE will make a recommendation to AHECB for continued authorization or a recommendation for discontinuation of the institutional concurrent enrollment program.

A college/university with NACEP accreditation must submit written documentation to ADHE of its current accreditation status within 30 days of NACEP notification of reaccreditation to maintain AHECB CEP continued authorization.

<u>DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING</u> THE ARKANSAS TEACHER ACADEMY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academy attendee" means an individual who is enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher
 Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution who is a:
 - 1.01.1 Current teacher;
 - 1.01.2 Teacher who has graduated from an Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution; or
 - 1.01.3 Current student.
- 1.02 "Eligible postsecondary institution" means a public or private two-year or four-year institution of higher education that:
 - 1.02.1 Offers a postbaccalaureate program that leads to teacher certification; and
 - 1.02.2 Has entered into an agreement with the Division of Higher Education for purposes of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program.
- 1.03 "Tuition and fees" mean any one (1) of the following that is charged by an eligible postsecondary institution, associated with a program of study a part of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program, that leads to teacher certification:
 - 1.03.1 Tuition;
 - 1.03.2 Mandatory fees; and
 - 1.03.3 Program fees.

2.00 IMPLEMENTATION OF PROGRAM & PURPOSE

- 2.01 An eligible postsecondary institution shall implement an Arkansas Teacher Academy to incentivize potential and enrolled academy attendees to:
 - 2.01.1 Enter the teaching profession; and

- 2.01.2 Commit to teaching in:
 - 2.01.2.1 Arkansas public schools; or
 - 2.01.2.2 Critical shortage areas in Arkansas based on subject areas or geographical areas.
- 2.02 The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with public and private postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement a centralized administrative process for each Teacher Academy, which shall include, without limitation, the following:
 - 2.02.1 A marketing and promotion plan to recruit academy attendees for a Teacher Academy;
 - 2.02.2 Data collection and reporting;
 - 2.02.3 Tracking of postgraduation service requirements;
 - 2.02.4 Coordination of induction services;
 - 2.02.5 Distribution of moneys in the Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Fund between eligible postsecondary institutions;
 - 2.02.6 Collection of reimbursements from individuals who fail to meet the service requirements under these rules;
 - 2.02.7 A process for assessing an academy attendee's ability to repay financial assistance received if the academy attendee who receives financial assistance is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the requirements of a Teacher Academy program; and
 - 2.02.8 A process for deferring service or repayment required by this subchapter based on factors adopted by the division.

3.00 ELIGIBLE POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTION DUTIES

3.01 A Teacher Academy may include, without limitation, a new or existing

- teacher preparation program that utilizes proven, research-based models of best practices that are already being implemented in similar program pathways.
- 3.02 An eligible postsecondary institution may:
 - 3.02.1 Develop a portfolio of teacher preparation programs to offer as part of its Teacher Academy; and
 - 3.02.2 Give priority to students in grades eleven (11) and twelve (12).
- 3.03 An eligible postsecondary institution shall not:
 - 3.03.1 Exclude students in grades nine (9) and ten (10) from its Arkansas Teacher Academy; and
- 3.04 Use scholarship funds that exceed the cost of tuition and fees at the eligible postsecondary institution to support its Teacher Academy costs.
 - 3.04.1 However, if the scholarship awarded does not fully cover the tuition and fees after all other financial gifts, aid, and grants are received, the academy attendee shall not be charged the remaining difference.
- 3.05 An eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formal partnerships with

 Arkansas public schools to build commitments for teacher employment upon an
 academy attendee's completion of a Teacher Academy program.
- 3.06 The targeted deployment of academy attendees who are currently teachers who have completed an Teacher Academy program shall be based on the:
 - 3.06.1 Needs of each public school system;
 - 3.06.2 Community that is being served; and
 - 3.06.3 Individual skills of each current teacher who has completed an Teacher Academy program.
- 3.07 A program offered as part of an eligible postsecondary institution's Teacher

 Academy shall include accelerated program models for the following, without limitation:

- 3.07.1 Subject areas and geographical areas identified by the Division of

 Elementary and Secondary Education as experiencing a critical shortage
 of teachers;
- 3.07.2 An individual seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in a professional certification; and
- 3.07.3 A student in a non-education program who seeks to complete one (1) or more teacher preparation courses leading to a teaching certification following graduation.

4.00 SCHOLARSHIP AMOUNTS & ACADEMY ATTENDEE REQUIREMENTS

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS CONCURRENT CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Education, Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Act 456 of 2019 Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-401 et seq.

APPLICABILITY

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program.

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 + "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that:
 - 1.02.1 a. Is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program;
 - 1.02.2 b. Offers at least a fifty percent (50%) discount on the tuition and mandatory fees of an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program to a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program, unless other opportunities are provided that lower the tuition and mandatory fees below fifty percent (50%); and
 - <u>1.02.3</u> e. Is a:
 - 1.02.3.1 i. State-supported two-year or four-year college or university;

- 1.02.3.2 ii. Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university that has its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
- 1.02.3.3 Beginning January 1, 2025, public or private vocational-technical school or technical institute, only if its primary headquarters is located in Arkansas, and it is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds.
- 1.03 2) "Eligible course" means any endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 1.04 3) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license.
 - 1.04.1 This definition does not include a program operated or sponsored by a third party.
- 4) "Endorsed concurrent enrollment course" means a college-level course offered by an approved institution of higher education in Arkansas that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the approved institution of higher education and a public high school that;
 - 1.05.1 a.—Is in one (1) of the four (4) core areas of math, English, science, and social studies:
 - 1.05.2 b. Meets the requirements of § 6-16-1204(b); and
 - 1.05.3 e. Is listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System of the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education;
 - 1.05.3.1 This definition does not include programs operated or sponsored by a third party;
- 1.06 5) "Student" means a person who has sophomore, junior or senior status and who is enrolled at a:
 - 1.06.1 a. Public high school in Arkansas;
 - 1.06.2 b. Private high school in Arkansas; or
 - <u>1.06.3</u> e. Home school, as defined in § 6-15-501 et seq.;

- 1.07 6) "Student success plan" means a plan developed by school personnel in collaboration with parents and the student that is reviewed annually.
 - 1.07.1 The plan shall, at a minimum:
 - 1.07.1.1 a. Guide the student along pathways to graduation;
 - 1.07.1.2 b. Address accelerated learning opportunities;
 - 1.07.1.3 e. Address academic deficits and interventions; and
 - 1.07.1.4 d. Include college and career planning components;
- $\frac{1.08}{1.08}$ "Third party" means a person or entity that does not receive disbursement directly from the $\underline{\textbf{Dd}}$ ivision for this program, including a subcontractor of the institution.

2.00 ELIGIBILITY

- 2.01 4) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship for an academic semester or academic year during which the student is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program if the student:
 - 2.01.1 a. Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the student or one (1) parent of the student is an Arkansas resident; and
 - <u>2.01.2</u> b. Provides proof that a completed student success plan has been submitted to the student's high school or home school.
- 2.02 2) The student success plan for a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program shall:
 - 2.02.1 a. Be prepared in consultation with school personnel, the student, and the student's parent or legal guardian or a college advisor.
 - 2.02.2 b. Include an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program that is relevant to the student's success plan and include measures that ensure the successful completion of the endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program in which the student is enrolled.
 - 2.02.3 e. A student whose enrollment in a vocational center is reimbursable under § 6-51-305 is not eligible for a scholarship under this program.
 - <u>2.02.4</u> d. Students must meet all established requirements for endorsed concurrent enrollment courses set by the Division of Higher Education.

3.00 CONTINUING ELIGIBILITY

- 3.01 4) A student is eligible to continue to receive the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship if the student successfully completes an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course and receives a minimum grade point average of 2.5.
- 3.02 2) A student who fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 shall retain eligibility and enroll in no more than one (1) endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course for the first semester following the semester in which the student failed to successfully complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.
 - 3.02.1 a. If a student fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course a second time, the student shall be ineligible to reapply or receive the scholarship again.
 - 3.02.1.1 This also applies to a student that drops out of an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course before the end of the semester.

4.00 AMOUNT OF AWARDS

- 4.01 1) If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education shall award Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarships to all students eligible for the scholarship for the fall, and spring or summer terms.
- 4.02 2) The maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
 - 4.02.1 a. Five hundred dollars (\$500)
 - 4.02.1.1 i.—Eligible students shall be awarded one-hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) for each eligible course the student is enrolled, up to two (2) eligible courses per semester; or
 - 4.02.2 b. The actual tuition and mandatory fees cost to the student for up to two (2) eligible courses per semester.
- 4.03 3)-A scholarship granted under this section may be awarded in addition to any funds received for the enrollment in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course under § 6-16-1204(e)(3).
- 4.04 4)-Unless a student's high school or community-based program provides financial assistance for the cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent

credit course or certificate program course, the remaining cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program is the responsibility of the eligible student who is enrolled in the endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.

4.05 The division shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every approved institution of higher education that has enrolled a student eligible to receive this scholarship.

5.00 INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 5.04 4) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

- 5.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
 - 5.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by this date must be returned to the division.
 - 5.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by this date, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds to the approved institution of higher education.

- <u>5.05.3</u> The division may periodically review the approved institution of higher education's records concerning this scholarship program to ensure the compliance with due diligence requirements.

5.06 6) Course eligibility.

5.06.1 The approved institution of higher education is responsible for verifying that the endorsed concurrent credit courses and certificate program courses meet the requirements set in Ark. ansas Code Ann. § 6-16-1202 and policies of the division.

6.00 HIGH SCHOOL AND HOME SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.01 The high school or home school shall provide certification of eligibility for a student to enroll in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.

POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Future Grant Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. 6-82-1801 ET. Seq.

1.00 PROGRAM DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education, approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program, and that is:
 - 1.01.1 (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
 - 1.01.2 (B) A state-supported technical institute; or
 - 1.01.3 (C) An approved state-supported school of nursing; or
 - 1.01.4 (D) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university.
- 1.02 "Approved state-supported school of nursing" means a state-supported school of nursing with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that:
 - 1.02.1 (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
 - 1.02.2 (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
 - 1.02.3 (C) Is eligible to participate in the federal student aid programs of the Higher Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. § 1070 et seq.;
 - 1.02.4 (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
 - 1.02.5 (E) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program; and

- 1.02.6 (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- 1.03 "Federal student financial assistance" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of:
 - 1.03.1 (A) An approved Free Application for Federal Student Aid, including without limitation a Pell Grant; or
 - 1.03.2 (B) The student's or other family member's service in the United States Armed Forces, including without limitation the Army National Guard or Air National Guard.
- 1.04 "Private scholarship" means a scholarship or grant awarded by a private entity or donor;
- 1.05 "Regional high-demand field" means any field of study identified as:
 - 1.05.1 <u>iIn</u> demand by the Arkansas Division of Workforce Services as published on its annual regional Projected Employment Opportunities List; or
 - <u>1.05.2</u> any field of study identified as <u>In</u> high demand by an approved institution of higher education and approved by the Division of Higher Education.
- 1.06 "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement, funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery, awarded by:
 - 1.06.1 (A) The Division of Higher Education; or
 - 1.06.2 (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an approved institution of higher education in this state, funded, in whole or in part, by state funds, including without limitation:
 - 1.06.2.1 (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
 - 1.06.2.2 (ii) Tuition waivers based on:

1.06.2.2.1 aAge,

1.06.2.2.2 mMilitary service,

1.06.2.2.3 Occupation, or

<u>1.06.2.2.4</u> <u>oO</u>ther factors;

- 1.06.2.3 (iii) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and

2.00 ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

2.01 (a) A student is eligible for an Arkansas Future Grant if the student is an Arkansas resident who: (1) Mmeets one (1) of the following requirements:

2.01.1 (A) Has either:

2.01.1.1 (i) Graduated from an Arkansas:

2.01.1.1.1 (a) Public high school;

2.01.1.1.2 (b) Private high school; or

<u>2.01.1.1.3</u> (c) Home school under § 6-15-501 et seq.; or

- 2.01.1.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services; or
- 2.01.2 (B) Verifies that he or she has resided in Arkansas for the three (3) years immediately preceding application for the grant, and has either:
 - 2.01.2.1 (i) Graduated from an out-of-state:

<u>2.01.2.1.1</u> (a) Public high school;

2.01.2.1.2 (b) Private high school; or

- 2.01.2.1.3 (c) Home school recognized by another state; or
- 2.01.2.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by another state;
- 2.01.3 (2) Is enrolled part-time or full-time at an approved institution of higher education, in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in a:
 - 2.01.3.1 (A) Science, technology, engineering, accounting, finance, nursing, education, or mathematics field, including without limitation:
 - 2.01.3.1.1 eComputer science;
 - 2.01.3.1.2 iInformation technology;
 - 2.01.3.1.3 dData analysis; or
 - 2.01.3.1.4 gGraphic design;
 - 2.01.3.2 (B) Regional high-demand field; or
 - 2.01.3.3 (C) State high-demand field; and
- 2.01.4 (3) Has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

3.00 CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- $\underline{3.01}$ (a) A student may continue to be eligible until the student has:
 - 3.01.1 (1) Received the grant for five (5) academic semesters;
 - 3.01.2 (2) Obtained an associate degree;
 - 3.01.3 (3) Failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled; or
 - 3.01.4 (4) Failed to complete the mentoring or community service requirements under the Grant Recipient Responsibilities section of this rule.

4.00 GRANT AWARD AMOUNTS

- 4.01 (a) (1) An Arkansas Future Grant shall be in an amount equal to the tuition, fees, and other charges incurred by a student who meets the requirements under the Eligibility Requirements and Continuing Eligibility Requirements sections of this rule to attend an approved institution of higher education, less the amount the student receives in:
 - $\underline{4.01.1}$ (A) State-supported student financial assistance;
 - 4.01.2 (B) Federal student financial assistance; and
 - 4.01.3 (C) Private scholarships.
- 4.02 (2) If the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled is a state supported four-year institution of higher education, or a private, nonprofit four-year institution of higher education, the total amount of tuition, fees, and other charges under subdivision (a)(1) 4.01 of this section shall be calculated as the average cost of tuition, fees, and other charges, at approved institutions of higher education that are state-supported two-year institutions of higher education.
- 4.03 (b) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse the grant directly to the approved institution of higher education.
- 4.04 (e) The division shall award grants under this rule in the order in which the division receives applications from eligible students and based on availability of funds, to include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.

5.00 GRANT HOLD

- 5.01 (a) (1) The Division of Higher Education may approve a grant hold for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
 - 5.01.1 (2) The reasons for a grant hold may include without limitation:
 - 5.01.1.1 (A)—A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member, to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care, or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
 - 5.01.1.2 (B) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:

- 5.01.1.2.1 (i) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
- 5.01.1.2.2 (ii) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- 5.01.1.3 (C) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- 5.01.1.4 (D) (i) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project, sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
 - 5.01.1.4.1 (ii) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
 - 5.01.1.4.2 (iii) The division shall release a grant hold if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

6.00 GRANT RECIPIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- <u>6.01</u> (a) A student who receives an Arkansas Future Grant shall enter into a written agreement with the Division of Higher Education to:
 - <u>6.01.1</u> (1) (A) Receive monthly mentoring from a mentor from an organization determined by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education.;
 - 6.01.2 (B) A mentor under subdivision $\frac{(a)(1)(A)}{(B)}$ 6.01.1 of this section shall:
 - <u>6.01.2.1</u> (i) Receive annual mentoring training:
 - <u>6.01.2.1.1</u> (a) Developed by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education; and
 - <u>6.01.2.1.2</u> (b)-Provided by a local volunteer group approved by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education; and
 - 6.01.2.2 (ii) Certify to the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> that at least one (1) time each semester the mentor has provided mentoring services by telephone, email, or in person to each student he or she is mentoring;

- <u>6.01.3</u> (2) (A) Complete at least ten (10) hours of community service each semester the student receives a grant-;
 - 6.01.3.1 (B) (i) A student may select a community service project that meets requirements developed by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u>.
 - 6.01.3.1.1 (ii) An approved institution of higher education may provide community services opportunities designed to benefit the approved institution of higher education community or the broader local community.
 - 6.01.3.2 (C) A student shall certify his or her community service to the approved institution of higher education by the last regular day of the semester the student received the grant; and
- 6.01.4 (3) (A) Reside in this state for three consecutive (3) years and be employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification.

 - 6.01.4.1.1 (i) The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the Division of Workforce Services, determines that there was no employment position available that would reasonably enable the student to meet this requirement; or
 - <u>6.01.4.1.2</u> (ii) Special circumstances as determined by the Division of Higher Education exist.
 - 6.01.4.2 (C)-After the period of deferral, the student shall begin or resume working in this state or become subject to repayment under subsection (b)-6.02 of this section.
- 6.02 (b) The written agreement under subsection (a) 6.01 of this section shall provide that the grant converts into a loan and the student shall repay the grant amount:
 - 6.02.1 (1) On a pro rata basis at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the <u>division</u>, <u>Division of Higher Education</u> for each year the student does not reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years, and become employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification; or

- <u>6.02.2</u> (2) In its entirety, at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the <u>division</u>, <u>Division of Higher Education</u> if the recipient does not comply with the written agreement under <u>subsection</u> (a) <u>6.01</u> of this section.
- 6.03 (e) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days.
 - 6.03.1 Failure to notify the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> of a change of status may affect future eligibility.
 - <u>6.03.1.1</u> Change of status will include:

<u>6.03.1.1.1</u> (1) Change in name;

6.03.1.1.2 (2) Change in address; and

<u>6.03.1.1.3</u> (3) Change in institution.

7.00 COLLECTION OF LOAN

- 7.01 (a) Accounts will be retained by the Division of Higher Education's in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for deferment, at which point Tthe account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment.
 - 7.01.1 The student will be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections and they will be sent-receive a loan amortization schedule-along with the letter.
 - 7.01.2 The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due.
 - 7.01.2.1 Loan recipients who are determined by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> to be <u>one hundred twenty (120)</u> days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due.
 - 7.01.2.2 If payment is not forthcoming within <u>sixty (60)</u> days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date.
 - 7.01.2.3 If the loan recipient has not responded within <u>ninety (90)</u> days from the original payment due date, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient informing them that the

account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not made within thirty (30) days.

7.02 (b) Skip Tracing Mechanisms

- 7.02.1 (1) ADHE The division will use these following steps to locate recipients if communications are returned as undelivered:
 - 7.02.1.1 (A) Contact the Motor Vehicle Division of the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration;
 - <u>7.02.1.2</u> (B) Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
 - 7.02.1.3 (C) Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient's last known address;
 - 7.02.1.4 (D) Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
 - 7.02.1.5 (E) Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;
 - 7.02.1.6 (F) Contact recipient's:
 - <u>7.02.1.6.1</u> <u>F</u>ield of study;
 - 7.02.1.6.2 pProfessional organization;
 - 7.02.1.6.3 <u>uUnion</u>; or
 - <u>7.02.1.6.4</u> <u>1Licensing board;</u>
 - 7.02.1.7 (G) Contact post office;
 - 7.02.1.8 (H) Contact utility companies; and,
 - 7.02.1.9 (I) Contact Chamber of Commerce.
- 7.03 (c) Credit Reporting Agencies
 - 7.03.1 (1) Defaulted recipients will be reported to the following Ccredit Rreporting Aagencies:
 - 7.03.1.1 (A) CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.;

- 7.03.1.2 (B) TRW Credit Data; and
- 7.03.1.3 (C) Trans Union Credit Reporting.
- <u>7.03.2</u> (2) Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients are located in the collections file.
 - 7.03.2.1 The <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> will <u>also</u> respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients.
- 7.04 (d) State Income Tax Set Off
 - 7.04.1 (1) By the authority of Acts 345 of 1993, No. 345, the division Division of Higher Education has been included as a claimant agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds.
- 7.05 (e) Litigation
 - 7.05.1 No sooner than thirty (30) days after sending the third letter of notification, the division Division of Higher Education shall institute a civil suit against the recipient for repayment of the loan.
 - 7.05.1.1 Small Cclaims Ccourts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00).
 - 7.05.1.2 If the account is over three thousand dollars and one sent (\$3,000.01), the division Division of Higher Education must use circuit court.
 - 7.05.1.3 If the account is three thousand dollars and one cent (\$3,000.01) or above, the division Division of Higher Education may choose to use Ssmall Cclaims Ccourts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court.
 - 7.05.1.4 If the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference.
 - 7.05.1.5 Forms to take the recipient to \underline{Ss} mall \underline{Cc} laims \underline{Cc} ourts are requested from the recipient's county of residence. (1)

7.06 (f) Write-Offs

- 7.06.1 (1)-Arkansas Future Grants that convert to loans may be written off as uncollectible if the <u>division-Division of Higher Education</u> shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:
 - 7.06.1.1 (A) The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
 - 7.06.1.2 (B) The recipient does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- 7.06.2 (2) Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the Administrator must be received before Arkansas Future Grant loan accounts may be written off.

7.07 (g) Nonpayment Penalties

7.07.1 Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

8.00 INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES—COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RESPONSIBILITIES

(a) College/University Responsibilities

- 8.01 (1) Administrative Agreement
 - 8.01.1 The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Future Grant Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
 - 8.01.1.1 This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations.
 - 8.01.2 The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.
- 8.02 (2) Disbursement Records
 - 8.02.1 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

8.03 (3) Institutional Verification

- 8.03.1 The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in <u>an</u> eligible program of study, and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a <u>V</u>verification <u>Rroster</u> each semester after registration.
 - 8.03.1.1 The <u>Vv</u>erification <u>Rr</u>oster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
 - <u>8.03.1.2</u> The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
 - 8.03.1.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Vverification Rrosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
- 8.03.2 The electronic Vverification Rroster shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
- 8.03.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Ffinancial Aaid Aadministrator before the end of the fall and spring term.
 - 8.03.3.1 The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division no later than January 15 based on the Ffall semester and June 1 based on the Sspring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

8.04 (4) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

- 8.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
 - 8.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u>.
 - 8.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by ADHE the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

8.05 (5) Due Diligence

- 8.05.1 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> on any Arkansas Future Grant recipient or former recipient.
- <u>8.05.2</u> In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Future Grant Program.
- 8.05.3 The <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS GOVENOR'S SCHOLARS PROGRAM Effective Date:

POLICY STATEMENT

A scholarship program to promote academic excellence and to encourage the state's most talented graduates to enroll in Arkansas postsecondary educational institutions is created and established which shall be cited as the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. These rules shall be known as the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, and continuing eligibility requirements procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-82-301 et. seq.

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 (1) "Academic ability" means the intellectual standing of a student.
 - 1.01.1 In determining superior academic ability, the Division of Higher Education shall examine:

1.01.1.1	<u>†The student's high school records</u> ;
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<u>1.01.1.2</u> e<u>C</u>ompetitive examination scores; and

<u>1.01.1.3</u> <u>dD</u>emonstrated leadership capabilities;

- 1.02 (2) "Academic Year" means fall, spring, first and second summer semesters in that order, or as defined by the Ddivision of Higher Education;
- 1.03 (3) "Approved institution" means a public or private college or university:
 - 1.03.1 (A) Which is dedicated to educational purposes, located in Arkansas, or located out of state and educating Arkansas residents in dentistry, optometry, veterinary medicine, podiatry, chiropractic, or osteopathy under agreement with the Board of Control for Southern Regional Education, accredited by an accrediting agency certified and recognized by the United States Department of Education or the Division of Agency Evaluation and Institutional Accreditation, or a school giving satisfactory assurance that it

has the potential for accreditation and is making progress which, if continued, will result in its achieving accreditation;

 $\underline{1.03.2}$ (B) Which does not discriminate in the admission of students on the basis of:

- <u>1.03.2.1</u> <u>rRace</u>;
- 1.03.2.2 eColor;
- 1.03.2.3 #Religion;
- 1.03.2.4 sSex; or

- 1.03.3 (C) Which subscribes to the principle of academic freedom;
- 1.04 (4) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Ddivision of Higher Education.
 - 1.04.1 Such evidence includes but is not limited to:
 - 1.04.1.1 aA valid Arkansas voter's registration card;
 - 1.04.1.2 \(\forall \) Valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;
 - 1.04.1.3 Arkansas residence address used for federal or state tax purposes; or
 - <u>1.04.1.4</u> e<u>C</u>laims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions;
- 1.05 (5) "Competitive examination" means a standardized examination measuring achievement which is administered annually on a specified date and at a specified location and which is announced publicly;
- 1.06 (6) "Division" means the Division of Higher Education;
- 1.07 (7) "Eligible student" means a resident of the State of Arkansas as defined by the Ddivision of Higher Education who:
 - 1.07.1 (A) Is eligible for admission as a full-time student;
 - 1.07.2 (B) Declares an intent to matriculate in an approved institution in Arkansas; and

- 1.07.3 (C) Graduates from:
 - 1.07.3.1 (i) A high school in this state, for Arkansas Governor's Scholars; or
 - 1.07.3.2 (ii) A high school, for Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars;
- 1.08 (8)(A) "Extraordinary academic ability" means:
 - 1.08.1 (i) Achievement of a superscore of thirty-two (32) or above on the American College Test (ACT) or a score of 1410 or above on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); and
 - 1.08.2 (ii) (a) Achievement of a high school grade point average of 3.5 or above on a 4.0 scale; or
 - 1.08.3 (b) Selection as a finalist in either the National Merit Scholarship competition, the National Hispanic Recognition Program, or the National Achievement Scholarship competition conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
 - 1.08.4 (B) The American College Test superscores and Scholastic Aptitude Test scores shall be earned by December 31 prior to the application deadline in order for the scores to be considered by the division for a scholarship award;
- 1.09 (9) "Full-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in at least twelve (12) credit hours the first semester and fifteen (15) hours thereafter, or other reasonable academic equivalent as defined by the division;
 - 1.09.1 For purposes of summer semesters, "full-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled fifteen (15) hours.
- 1.10 (10) "Part-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in less than fifteen (15) credit hours for their fourth academic year;
 - 1.10.1 For purposes of summer semesters, "part-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in less than fifteen (15) hours.

- 1.11 (11) "Scholarship" means an award to an eligible student for matriculation in an approved institution in the State of Arkansas;
- 1.12 (12) "Undergraduate student" means an individual who is enrolled in a postsecondary educational program, which leads to or is directly creditable toward the individual's first baccalaureate degree; and
- 1.13 (13) "U.S. Citizen" means the student must be either a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien.
 - 1.13.1 If the student is not a United States citizen, but a permanent resident alien, the student must attach a copy of the permanent resident alien form I 151, I 551, I 94, or G 641 to the application.

Procedures

2.00 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- 2.01 The Arkansas-Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Scholars Program within the policies set by the Arkansas-Higher Education Coordinating Board.
 - 2.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or his/ or her designee.
 - 2.01.2 The Governor's Scholars Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Division of Higher Education division regarding the administration of the program.
- 2.02 Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council
 - 2.02.1 A. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil shall consist of ten (10) members appointed by the Arkansas Higher Education Ccoordinating Bboard for staggered two-year terms and shall represent the public and private sectors of postsecondary education and secondary schools.
 - 2.02.2 B. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil shall advise the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education in the determination of guidelines and regulations rules for the administration of this program.
 - 2.02.3 C. The Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or hist or her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil and shall ensure that staff services for the Ccouncil are provided.

- 2.02.3.1 The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Seq.
- 2.02.3.2 When functioning under Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Sseq., the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Arkansas Code § 25-15-201 et seq.

3.00 ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- 3.01 (a) The Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program scholarships are to be awarded to those students who demonstrate the highest capabilities for successful college study.
- 3.02 (b) A student is eligible for this scholarship if he or she:
 - 3.02.1 (1) Meets the admission requirements and is accepted for enrollment as a fulltime undergraduate student in an eligible public or private college or university in Arkansas;
 - 3.02.2 (2) (A) Is a bona fide resident of the state, as defined by the Division of Higher Education, and is either:
 - 3.02.2.1 a. A citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien;
 - 3.02.2.2 b. The holder, or the child of a holder, of a Federal Form I-766 United States Citizenship and Immigration Services-issued Employment Authorization Document, known popularly as a "work permit"; or
 - 3.02.2.3 e. A person who is a migrant from the Compact of Free Association Islands.
 - 3.02.3 (3) Graduates from a high school;
 - 3.02.4 (4) Completes and submits to the U.S. United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or a subsequent application required by the U.S. United States Department of Education for federal financial aid;
 - 3.02.5 (5)(A) Satisfies the qualifications of superior academic ability as established by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education with criteria

consisting of value points for academic achievement and leadership, including without limitation:

- 3.02.5.1 (i) American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Merit Finalist, or National Achievement Finalist;
- 3.02.5.2 (ii) High school grade point average;
- 3.02.5.3 (iii) Rank in high school class; and
- 3.02.5.4 (iv) Leadership in school, community, and employment.
- 3.02.6 (B) (i) The division Division of Higher Education may alter the weight assigned to the individual criterion to more appropriately meet the needs of the state as determined by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.
- 3.03 Value points assigned to each selection criterion are weighted as follows:

American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Merit Finalist, or National Achievement Finalist ----- forty-five percent 45%

High school grade point average ----- thirty-five percent 35%

Rank in high school class ----- ten percent 10%

Leadership in school, community, and employment ----- ten percent 10%

- 3.03.1.1 (ii) The <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> shall ensure that the weight assigned to each individual criterion under this subdivision (b)(5)(B) 3.02.6 does not place a homeschooled, public school, or private school student at a disadvantage.
- 3.03.1.2 (iii) (a) After determining qualified recipients based on the qualifications under subdivision (b)(5)(A) 3.02.5 of this section, the <u>Ddivision of Higher Education</u> shall ensure that at least one (1) recipient is selected from each of the seventy-five (75) counties in Arkansas.
 - 3.03.1.2.1 (b) If any of the seventy-five (75) counties is not represented, the <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> shall select a student from each nonrepresented county with the highest qualifications under <u>subdivision (b)(5)(A)</u>
 3.02.5 of this section who was not initially qualified.

- 3.03.1.2.2 (e) The scholarship shall be weighed on the factors of:
 - 3.03.1.2.2.1 **a**Achievement,;
 - 3.03.1.2.2.2 <u>aAbility</u>; and
 - 3.03.1.2.2.3 dDemonstrated leadership capabilities.
- 3.03.1.2.3 (d) Students who are selected as Arkansas Governor's Scholars who also exhibit extraordinary academic ability as defined in the definitions section of this rule shall be designated as Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars.
- 3.03.1.2.4 (e) Preference will be given to students who plan to enter college at the beginning of the academic year directly following their last year of high school attendance.

4.00 CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY

- 4.01 (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship may be awarded annually for a period not to exceed an academic year.
 - 4.01.1 (b)(1) A scholarship shall correspond to <u>fall</u>, <u>spring</u>, <u>and summer</u> academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institutions.
 - 4.01.2 (2) In no instance may the entire amount of the grant for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of students in advance.
- 4.02 (e) Provided sufficient funds are available, a scholarship shall be awarded for one (1) academic year, to include summer terms, and renewed annually for three (3) additional academic years if the following conditions for renewal are met:
 - 4.02.1 (1) The student maintains not less than a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
 - 4.02.2 (2) A student receiving a scholarship under the Scholarship Amounts subsection (a) 8.00 maintains not less than a 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
 - 4.02.3 (3) The recipient has successfully completed a total of at least twenty-seven (27) hours during the first full academic year and, if applicable, a total of at least thirty (30) hours per academic year thereafter; and

- 4.02.4 (4) The recipient has met any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- 4.02.5 (5) If a student who has continuously been a recipient of the scholarship for at least three (3) consecutive years is enrolled as a part-time student in the student's fourth academic year, the student shall be eligible to continue to receive the scholarship if the student has completed, by his or her fourth academic year, or is enrolled in, for his or her fourth academic year, the requisite number of credit hours to complete the student's degree program.

5.00 APPLICATION

- 5.01 Students must submit an on-line application, available at the ADHE Division of Higher Education website http://scholarships.adhe.edu/.
- 5.02 The application deadline shall be established by the <u>Ddivision of Higher</u> Education of the calendar year in which a student graduates from high school.
- 5.03 At its discretion, the <u>Ddivision of Higher Education</u> may extend the deadline, provided sufficient notice is provided to the public.
- 5.04 The applicant is responsible for submitting the application and all supporting documentation in a timely manner.

6.00 NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS

- 6.01 (a)-If sufficient funds are available, effective for students receiving their initial awards beginning in fall 2007, the number of initial scholarship awards to eligible high achievers shall not exceed three hundred seventy-five (375) each year.
- <u>6.02</u> (b) If there are more eligible applicants than available scholarships, the <u>division</u> <u>Division of Higher Education</u> may determine a procedure for awarding additional scholarships while not exceeding available funds.

7.00 USE OF SCHOLARSHIP

- 7.01 (a) No student may utilize scholarship funds for educational purposes beyond the baccalaureate degree.
- 7.02 (b) There shall be an exception to the requirement of subsection (a) 7.01 of this section for any student who receives a baccalaureate degree in three (3) years or less.

7.02.1 The student may receive an award of the scholarship for a fourth academic year to be used as a full-time student enrolled in a postgraduate program at an approved institution.

8.00 SCHOLARSHIPAMOUNTS

- 8.01 (1) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship awarded to a new recipient who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman shall be in an amount that equals the lesser of:
 - 8.01.1 (1) Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); or
 - 8.01.2 (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- 8.02 (2) A student selected as a recipient under the "Eligibility Criteria" subsection (b)(6)(B)(iii)(b) 3.03.121 who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman after July 1, 2017, shall be awarded in an amount that equals the lesser of:
 - 8.02.1 (1) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000); or
 - 8.02.2 (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- 8.03 (3) The scholarship amount for each semester in which a student who is the recipient of a scholarship is enrolled as a part-time student during their fourth academic year shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the student is enrolled.

9.00 NOTIFICATION OF APPLICATION AND AWARD STATUS

- 9.01 (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship shall receive an award notice and information sheet explaining disbursement procedures and conditions of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Award.
- 9.02 (b) The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall notify applicants who are determined to be ineligible and provide the reason for ineligibility.
 - 9.02.1 They will also be given instructions on how to correct any information on the application they believe to be incorrect.

- 9.03 (e) Applicants who fail to submit complete applications, or who fail to supply the required documentation to process the application, will be classified as Incomplete.
 - <u>9.03.1</u> The Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education shall notify these students of their status.
 - <u>9.03.2</u> The <u>Hincomplete Nnotice</u> provides a list of the incomplete items and the actions necessary for completion.

10.00 SCHOLARSHIP PAYMENT POLICIES

10.01 (a) Payment of Scholarships

- 10.01.1 Funds will be disbursed to the approved institution of the Governor's Scholars choice by state warrant.
- 10.01.2 After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution shall disburse the Governor's Scholars Award to the student according to the individual institution's disbursement procedures.
- 10.01.3 Disbursement of the Governor's Scholars award shall correspond with the institution's <u>fall</u>, <u>spring</u>, <u>and summer</u> academic terms (semesters, trimesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods).
- 10.01.4 In no instance may the entire amount of the award for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of the student in advance.

10.02 (b) Transfer to Another Institution of Higher Education

- 10.02.1 A student who receives a Governor's Scholars Award may transfer to another eligible Arkansas institution of higher education, provided the recipient notifies the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education, in writing, of the change of institution by October 1 for the fall term, and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms, and by June 1st for summer terms.
- 10.02.2 Failure to notify the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education by the specified deadlines shall result in the loss of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

10.03 (e) Scholarship Hold

10.03.1 The <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> may approve a scholarship hold for a student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less for the following reasons without limitation:

- 10.03.1.1 (1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates that the student or the student's immediate family member be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or recuperate until released by the attending physician;
- $\underline{10.03.1.2}$ (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - 10.03.1.2.1 (a) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
 - 10.03.1.2.2 (b) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- 10.03.1.3 (3) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- 10.03.1.4 (4) (a) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
 - 10.03.1.4.1 (b) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
 - 10.03.1.4.2 (e) The division shall release a scholarship hold if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.
- 10.03.2 The recipient must submit a written request for a scholarship hold.
 - 10.03.2.1 The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and be supported by documentation.
 - 10.03.2.2 In the absence of extraordinary circumstances, the award will be revoked if the recipient fails to enroll fulltime in an eligible institution in Arkansas, and the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education-receives neither notification of transfer of the scholarship to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the fall term, and February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms, and by June 1st for summer terms.

- 10.03.2.3 At the discretion of the <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u>, the award will not be revoked if it is determined by <u>the division</u>

 ADHE-that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying <u>the division</u> ADHE-by the required dates.
- 10.04 (d) Cancellation of Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award
 - 10.04.1 (1) The Governor's Scholars Award and the Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award shall be terminated for any one of the following reasons:
 - 10.04.1.1 (a) Failure to maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Scholars) or a minimum 3.25 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Distinguished Scholars) on a 4.0 scale and successfully complete and pass a minimum of at least twenty-seven (27) credit hours the first academic year and thirty (30) hours each academic year thereafter;
 - 10.04.1.2 (b) Failure to complete a baccalaureate degree within five (5) years from initial college entrance; or
 - 10.04.1.3 (e) Failure to petition the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education for a temporary withdrawal for two (2) consecutive academic terms; or
 - 10.04.1.4 (d) Failure to enroll as a full time student in an eligible Arkansas college or university after a two-year temporary withdrawal.
 - 10.04.2 (2) Failure by the Governor's Scholar to provide written notification to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education of a change in status (such as a transfer to another eligible institution, change in address, change in name, etc.) before appropriate deadline dates shall result in cancellation of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

10.05 (e) Refunds and Overpayments

- 10.05.1 If a Governor's Scholar withdraws from an eligible institution, and under the refund policy of that institution the student is entitled to a refund of any tuition, fees, or other changes, the institution shall pay the refund amount in question to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.
- 10.05.2 Acts 1180 of 1999, No. 1180, states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid

- package to exceed the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls.
- 10.05.3 The institution must follow <u>division</u> ADHE-policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

11.00 HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTION RESPONSIBILITIES

11.01 (a) Administrative Agreement

- 11.01.1 The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
- 11.01.2 This representative is responsible for Governor's Scholars disbursement, completion of all forms and rosters, verification of data, and compliance with all Governor's Scholars Program rules and regulations.
- 11.01.3 The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

11.02 (b) Disbursement Records

11.02.1 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of Governor's Scholars funds.

11.03 (e) Institutional Information Sheet

11.03.1 The administrator is responsible for designating a certifying official responsible for certifying full-time enrollment and a disbursing official responsible for the disbursement of Governor's Scholars Program funds.

11.04 (d) Institutional Verification

- 11.04.1 The institution shall provide certification to the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education each semester after registration, giving the names of the Governor's Scholars who are officially enrolled as full-time students as of the end of the 11th eleventh class day of enrollment.
- 11.04.2 This information is reported on a verification roster.
- 11.04.3 The person responsible for verification of full-time enrollment is the registrar or a member of the registrar's staff.

- 11.04.4 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster twice (2) a year for those schools on the semester system and three (3) times a year for those schools on the quarter system.
- 11.04.5 The verification roster shall be mailed to the F_1 inancial A_2 id A_2 dministrator prior to registration for the semester or quarter.
- 11.04.6 The completed and signed Governor's Scholars verification roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education by the dates specified on the roster.
- 11.04.7 The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award for a given academic term.
- 11.04.8 Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive Governor's Scholars funds for that term.
- 11.05 (e) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds
 - 11.05.1 All funds must be disbursed within ten (10) days of written receipt of funds.
 - 11.05.2 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned within ten (10) days to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.

11.06 (f) Refund Policy

- 11.06.1 It is the institution's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education of the:
 - 11.06.1.1 nName of the person who withdrew;
 - 11.06.1.2 the dDate of the withdrawal; and
 - 11.06.1.3 the rRefund amount.
- 11.06.2 This information shall be placed on the institution's verification roster before the roster is returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.
- 11.06.3 The institution shall be responsible for the refund amount and shall pay that amount to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.

11.07 (g) Continuing Eligibility

- 11.07.1 It is the responsibility of each institution to complete annually the Ccontinuing Eeligibility roster.
- 11.07.2 This roster shall be mailed to all institutions that have a Geovernor's Secholar enrolled.
- 11.07.3 The Continuing Eeligibility roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education by the date specified on the roster.
- 11.07.4 The person responsible for completing the C_0 ontinuing E_0 ligibility roster is the E_0 in E_0
- 11.07.5 The Continuing Eeligibility roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award that attended that institution for the academic year immediately preceding receipt of the Continuing Eeligibility roster.
- 11.07.6 The certifying official must complete the roster by providing the number of hours completed for the previous academic year and the cumulative grade point average achieved for each student listed.

11.08 (h) Due Diligence

- 11.08.1 The institution shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education for any Ggovernor's Scholar or former Ggovernor's Sscholar.
- 11.08.2 In addition, the institution shall exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program.
- 11.08.3 The Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning the Governor's Scholars Program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of State of Arkansas funds.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS WORKFORCE CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-302 et seq.

APPLICABILITY

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 1) "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program and that is:
 - 1.02.1 (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
 - 1.02.2 (B) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
 - 1.02.3 Beginning January 1, 2025, public or private vocational-technical school or technical institute, only if its primary headquarters is located in Arkansas, and it is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds.
- 1.03 (2)(A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the

obtainment of a certification or license, including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

1.03.1 (B) The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or a baccalaureate degree.

2.00 FUNDING

- 2.01 (1) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under these rules:
 - 2.01.1 (A) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and
 - 2.01.2 (B) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery:
 - 2.01.2.1 (i)—Transfers the funds requested by the Division of Higher Education under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-801(c)(2); and
 - 2.01.2.2 (ii)—Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).
- 2.02 (2)—A scholarship under these rules shall not be awarded for an academic year if:
 - 2.02.1 (A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section; or
 - 2.02.2 (B) The Division of Higher Education division received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.
- 2.03 (3) Any funds under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under these rules shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under these rules.

Procedures

3.00 ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- 3.01 (1) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship for an academic year if the student applies to the Division of Higher Education by a date determined by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> preceding the academic year and:
 - 3.01.1 (A) Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either a parent of the student or the student is an Arkansas resident;
 - 3.01.2 (B) Meets either of the following requirements:
 - <u>3.01.2.1</u> (i) Graduated from a:
 - 3.01.2.1.1 (a) Public high school in Arkansas or another state;
 - 3.01.2.1.2 (b) Private high school in Arkansas or another state; or
 - 3.01.2.1.3 (e) Home school as recognized under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-501 et seq. or recognized by another state; or
 - 3.01.2.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Arkansas Division of Workforce Services or another state;
 - 3.01.2.3 (C) Is not receiving a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq.;
 - 3.01.2.4 (D) Is accepted for admission in a program of study at an approved institution of higher education that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program in one (1) of the following high-demand fields:
 - <u>3.01.2.4.1</u> (i)—Industry;
 - 3.01.2.4.2 (ii) Health care; and
 - 3.01.2.4.3 (iii)Information technology; and

- 3.01.2.5.1 (ii)(a) The Division of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Division of Higher Education by March 1 a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section that require the completion of a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program.
- 3.01.2.5.2 (b) The Division of Workforce Services shall publish on its website the list under 3.01.2.5.1 subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section and data supporting the list.
- 3.02 (2)-A student who received a scholarship under these rules and successfully completed a program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section is eligible to reapply for a scholarship under these rules if the student is accepted for admission in a different program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under 3.01.2.4 subdivision (1)(D) of this section.
- 3.03 (3) A student who received a scholarship under these rules and does not successfully complete the program of study or certificate program is eligible to reapply for and receive a scholarship one (1) time only.

4.00 DISTRIBUTION – AWARD AMOUNTS

 - 5.03.1 The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in <u>an</u> eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration.
 - 5.03.1.1 The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
 - 5.03.1.2 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
 - 5.03.2 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
 - 5.03.2.1 The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
 - 5.03.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term.
 - 5.03.3.1 The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.
- 5.04 (D) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.
 - 5.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
 - 5.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

5.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by the division ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

5.05 5) Due diligence.

- 5.05.1 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.
- <u>5.05.2</u> In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.
- 5.05.3 The <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

<u>5.06</u> (F) Agreements Between Institutions.

5.06.1 An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under these rules to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE GOVERNOR'S HIGHER EDUCATION TRANSITION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

1.00 REGULATORY AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

- 1.01 These rules shall be known as the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 1.02 This rule is enacted pursuant to the Higher Education Coordinating Board's authority under Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-61-202 and 6-82-105.
- 1.03 The purpose of these rules is to establish the requirements and processes governing the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.

2.00 GOVERNOR'S HIGHER EDUCATION TRANSITION SCHOLARSHIP

- 2.01 The Division of Higher Education shall oversee the establishment of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 2.02 Continuation of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program shall be contingent upon available funding.

3.00 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- 3.01 The Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 3.02 The division shall establish application periods and deadlines.

4.00 ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

4.01 The Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship may only be awarded to those students who are admitted into transition programs that are accredited by The Institute for Community Inclusion as Comprehensive Training Programs.

- 4.01.1 In order to be considered a qualifying institution, an institution must offer a transition program as described in 4.01 of these rules.
- 4.02 Students, or representatives acting on behalf of students, must complete the online scholarship application provided by the Division of Higher Education.

5.00 CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY

5.01 Recipients of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship will maintain award eligibility for a maximum of four (4) semesters as long as the recipients are continuously enrolled in a transition program.

6.00 SCHOLARSHIP AMOUNTS

- 6.01 Scholarship awards are contingent upon availability of funds.
- Awards may not exceed the institutional cost of attendance. The maximum award amount is \$2,500.00 per semester that the student qualifies for the scholarship.
- 6.03 Awards may be applied to tuition, mandatory fees, programmatic fees, room and board, supplies, or extended support services.

7.00 PAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIPS

- 7.01 The Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarship funds to the qualifying institution of the recipient's choice via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.
- 7.02 After verification of enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship funds to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.
- 7.03 The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the institution.
 - 7.03.1 For purposes of scholarship payments, academic terms at the institution may include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent.
- 7.04 In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid in advance to or on behalf of such student.
- 7.05 If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the

student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses.

- 7.05.1 Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.
- 7.05.2 It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayment(s).
- 7.05.3 The institution shall refund the overpayment(s) to the division.
- 7.06 If the award of a Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student per Ark. Code Ann. § 6-80-105, the institution shall follow the division's Scholarship Stacking Policy in reducing the student's financial package so that the student does not receive funds above the federally-recognized cost of attendance.

8.00 RESPONSIBILITIES OF QUALIFYING INSTITUTIONS

- 8.01 The chief executive officer of the qualifying institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, and other correspondence related to the program. This representative will be responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules.
- 8.02 The institution shall maintain information regarding disbursement of scholarship funds.
- 8.03 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
 - 8.03.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Division of Higher Education.
 - 8.03.2 If the division receives an application beyond the deadline referenced in section 8.03, disbursement will be made within ten (10) business days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

- 8.04 In exercising its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds, the division shall periodically review the qualifying institution's records concerning this program.
- 8.05 Upon request, the qualifying institution shall exercise due diligence in providing the division with complete, accurate, and timely information regarding current and former Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program recipients.
- 8.06 Institutions with accredited transition programs will certify students' admittance and enrollment prior to scholarship award.
- 8.07 The institution shall comply with all applicable law and rules in order to maintain its status as a qualified institution.

9.00 RESPONSIBILITIES OF RECIPIENTS

- 9.01 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days, including the recipient's:
 - 9.01.1 Change in name;
 - 9.01.2 Change in address; and
 - 9.01.3 Change in institution.
- 9.02 Failure to notify the division of a change in status may affect future eligibility.

- 7.04 In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid in advance to or on behalf of such student.

- 7.05 If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses.
 - 7.05.1 Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.
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 - 7.05.3 The institution shall refund the overpayment(s) to ADHE the division.
- 7.06 If the award of a Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student per Ark. Code Ann. § 6-80-105, the institution shall follow the ADHE Scholarship Stacking Policy in reducing the student's financial package so that the student does not receive funds above the federally-recognized cost of attendance.

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- 8.01 The chief executive officer of the qualifying institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, and other correspondence related to the program. This representative will be responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules.
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 - 8.03.2 If ADHE the division receives an application beyond the deadline referenced in 8.03 of these rules, disbursement will be made within ten (10)

business days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

- 8.04 In exercising its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds, ADHE the division shall periodically review the qualifying institution's records concerning this program.
- 8.05 Upon request, the qualifying institution shall exercise due diligence in providing ADHE the division with complete, accurate, and timely information regarding current and former Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program recipients.
- 8.06 Institutions with accredited transition programs will certify students' admittance and enrollment prior to scholarship award.
- 8.07 The institution shall comply with all applicable ADHE <u>law and</u> rules in order to maintain its status as a qualified institution.

9.00 RESPONSIBILITIES OF RECIPIENTS

- 9.01 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify ADHE the Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days. This will include, including the recipient's:
 - 9.01.1 Change in name;
 - 9.01.2 Change in address; and
 - 9.01.3 Change in institution.
- 9.02 Failure to notify ADHE the division of a change in status may affect future eligibility.

PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING DISTRIBUTION POLICY

Background

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. The Board shall recommend funding for the state-supported institutions of higher education as a whole and the allocation of funding to each state-supported institution of higher education. The AHECB shall make separate recommendations for the two-year institutions and four-year institutions. The framework for those recommendations is described in this policy.

Funding Distribution Framework

A productivity index for each institution will be calculated based on the Productivity Funding Model policies for four and two-year institutions. Each institution's current productivity index will be compared to its previous year's index to determine productivity changes. One productivity index will be calculated to represent productivity changes for institutions of higher education as a whole and will be used to determine how much new state funding is recommended. The AHECB will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no more than a 2% growth over the prior year's Revenue Stabilization Act (RSA) general revenue funding amount for four and two-year institutions.

When new state funding is recommended, the proportion of new monies to be distributed among four and two-year institutions will be divided into two separate funding pools based upon the percentage of existing RSA general revenue. If any RSA general revenue funds remain unallocated to state-supported institutions of higher education

due to productivity declines, ADHE shall utilize the funds to address statewide needs in higher education.

New RSA general revenue allocated to four and two-year institutions will be distributed among the institutions with productivity index increases. The percentage of new RSA general revenue funding recommended for institutions with productive index increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institutions productivity index increases.

Within each four and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases. Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institution productivity index increases. Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline. Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.

The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each four and two-year institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation. If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the Board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding for that institution. The AHECB will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.

In the event that an institution of higher education's RSA general revenue funding declines by more than 5% of the 2018-2019 fiscal year level due to productivity declines, ADHE shall not further recommend reductions in funding for that institution, but shall assist the institution in developing a plan for improvement and progression.

In any fiscal year for which the aggregate general revenue funding forecast to be available for state-supported institutions of higher education is greater than 2% less than the amount provided for the immediate fiscal year, the ADHE shall not further implement the productivity-based funding model until the following fiscal year.

This policy will be reviewed every three (3) years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. However, if it is determined that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this policy will be reviewed immediately.

<u>Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Productivity-Based Funding for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education</u>

1.00 Purpose.

- 1.01 The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending to the General Assembly funding for applicable institutions.
- 1.02 The board shall recommend funding for the institutions as a collective and funding to each individual institution.
- 1.03 The board shall make separate recommendations for the two-year institutions and four-year institutions.

2.00 Definitions.

- 2.01 "Institution" means a state supported:
 - 2.01.1 Two-year institution of higher education; or
 - 2.01.2 Four-year institution of higher education.
- 2.02 "Productivity-based funding" means a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for postsecondary education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals.
- 2.03 "RSA" means the Revenue Stabilization Act.

3.00 Funding Distribution Framework

- 3.01 A productivity index for each institution will be calculated based on the Productivity Funding Model Policies for Universities and Colleges.
 - 3.01.1 Each institution's current productivity index will be compared to its previous year's index to determine productivity changes.
 - 3.01.2 One productivity index will be calculated to represent productivity changes for institutions as a collective and will be used to determine how much new state funding is recommended.
 - 3.01.3 The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no more than a 2% growth over the prior year's RSA general revenue funding amount for institutions.

- 3.02 When new state funding is recommended, the proportion of new monies to be distributed among institutions will be divided into two separate funding pools for four and two-year institutions based upon the percentage of existing RSA general revenue.
 - 3.02.1 If any RSA general revenue funds remain unallocated to institutions due to productivity declines, the Division of Higher Education shall utilize the funds to address statewide needs in higher education.
 - 3.02.2 New RSA general revenue allocated to institutions will be distributed among the institutions with productivity index increases.
 - 3.02.3 The percentage of new RSA general revenue funding recommended for institutions with productivity index increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall institutions' productivity index increases.
- 3.03 Within each four and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases.
 - 3.03.1 Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institution productivity index increases.
 - 3.03.2 Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline.
 - 3.03.3 Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.
- 3.04 The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation.
 - 3.04.1 If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; or 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding for that institution.

- 3.04.2 The board will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.
- 3.05 In the event that an institution of higher education's RSA general revenue funding declines by more than 5% within any consecutive five-year period due to productivity declines, the division shall not further recommend reductions in funding for that institution.
- 3.06 In any fiscal year for which the aggregate general revenue funding forecast to be available for state-supported institutions of higher education is greater than 2% less than the amount provided for the immediate fiscal year, the division shall not further implement the productivity-based funding model until the following fiscal year.
- 3.07 This rule will be reviewed every three (3) years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state.
- 3.08 However, if the division determines that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this rule will be reviewed immediately.

RULES GOVERNING THE SUSTAINABLE BUILDING MAINTENANCE PROGRAM FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In compliance with Act 751 of 2023, the rules for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE SUSTAINABLE BUILDING MAINTENANCE PROGRAM FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION Effective Date:

1.00 DEFINITIONS.

- 1.00 "Deferred maintenance" means necessary maintenance, repairs and upgrades or replacements that are put on hold until sometime in the future, most notably due to a lack of funds needed to complete a project.
- 1.01 "Critical maintenance" means deferred maintenance projects that, if not addressed, could result in substantial damage to the structural integrity of a building or are related to the imminent failure of building systems such as HVAC, electrical and plumbing.
- 1.02 "Renovation of state-owned property" means updates to existing institutional facilities to address changing program needs on a campus.

2.00 LOANS.

- 2.01 Under the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education, the Division of Higher Education may:
 - 2.01.1 Authorize money to be loaned from the Sustainable Building Maintenance
 Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education Revolving
 Loan Fund, pursuant to Arkansas Code § 19-5-1277, to a state-supported institution of higher education.
- 2.02 A loan from the fund made under 2.01 shall be:

2.02.1 For:

2.02.1.1 Deferred maintenance;

2.02.1.2 Critical maintenance; or

2.02.1.3 A renovation of state-owned property; and

- 2.02.2 In an amount that exceeds one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).
- 2.03 The term for repayment of a loan from the fund made under 1.01 of this section shall not exceed ten (10) years.
- 2.04 An applicant applying for a loan under this rule shall meet the following eligibility requirements:

- 2.04.1 Applications for loans for construction and/or renovation projects should be accompanied by a copy of the engineer's or architect's project budget guidelines.
- 2.04.2 Criteria for loan approval will include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - <u>2.04.2.1</u> <u>The institution's current debt service requirements:</u>
 - 2.04.2.1.1 The total annual debt service (including that for the loan, if approved) may not exceed 25% of annual student tuition and fee revenue or,
 - 2.04.2.1.2 If local millage is pledged against the loan, the millage income must equal no less than 120% of total annual debt service;
 - 2.04.2.2 Feasibility of and need for the proposed project in the context of the educational and general mission of the institution; and
 - 2.04.2.3 Availability of loan funds.

3.00 LOAN APPROVAL PROCESS.

- 3.01 An applicant for a loan from the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for
 State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education Revolving Loan Fund under § 6-62-1202 shall:
 - 3.01.1 Apply for the loan on a form approved by the Division of Higher Education.
 - 3.01.1.1 The form under section 3.01.1 shall be posted on the division's website.
 - 3.01.2 The division shall review an application submitted under 3.01.1 of this subsection to determine if the applicant satisfies the eligibility criteria for a loan from the fund.
 - 3.01.3 Upon approval by the division, each application shall then be reviewed by the legislature for final approval.
- 3.02 The division shall provide an applicant for a loan from the fund with written notice of its determination regarding whether:

- 3.02.1 To offer the applicant a loan from the fund, and
- 3.02.2 Any conditions for making the loan from the fund.
- 3.03 After an applicant for a loan from the fund has satisfied the preconditions, if any, for the division's approval of the applicant's loan application, and has executed a contract for the loan from the fund, the division will present the contract for the loan from the fund to Higher Education Coordinating Board for its approval.
 - 3.03.1 In determining whether to approve an application, the board will:
 - 3.03.1.1 First, based on project type give priority to critical maintenance needs.
 - 3.03.1.2 Second give priority to deferred maintenance with renovation projects being the lowest priority for funding.
 - 3.03.1.3 As funds become available, division staff will notify the eligible institution of the intent to present the loan award for approval at the next available board meeting.
 - 3.03.2 Requirements for the issuance of a loan from the fund:
 - 3.03.2.1 Upon approval of the loan by the Higher Education
 Coordinating Board, the institution must sign a Certificate
 of Indebtedness specifying a payout schedule and asserting
 the commitment of the institutional board to budget and

RULES GOVERNING THE MILITARY DEPENDENTS' SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In compliance with Act 413 of 2023, the rules for the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING MILITARY DEPENDENTS' SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Organization and Structure

- I. 1.01 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall administer the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or his/her his or her designee.
- H. 1.02 The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009 and subsequent legislation.
- HI. 1.03 When functioning under Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009 and subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

2.00 Program Definitions

- 2.01 The following definitions are used in the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program:
 - 2.01.1 "Approved institution" means a private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education or technical school located in Arkansas that is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
 - 2.01.2 "Dependent child" means any child born or conceived, been legally adopted, or under court appointed legal guardianship, or the stepchild of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran, and who meets the definition of dependent with regards to children established by the U.S.

 Department of Education. Stepchildren are not eligible unless legally adopted as stated above.
 - 2.01.3 "Dependent spouse" means the legal spouse of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.

2.01.4 "Disabled veteran" means a person who:

- 2.01.4.1 <u>Has been declared by the Federal Department of Veterans</u>

 <u>Affairs to be one hundred percent (100%) totally and</u>

 <u>permanently disabled as a result of service-connected injuries</u>

 <u>or medical conditions; and</u>
- 2.01.4.2 <u>Is currently receiving special monthly compensation for such, and who was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the U.S. Armed Forces or who is a current resident of Arkansas.</u>
- 2.01.5 "Full-time student" means an undergraduate student enrolled in at least twelve (12) semester credit hours, or its equivalent, per semester.
- 2.01.6 "Satisfactory progress" means undergraduate students must maintain a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, and make satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion, as defined by the institution.
- 2.01.7 "Fees waived" means the inclusion of Includes tuition at the in-state rate, room and board when provided in campus facilities, fees or other charges incurred from the approved institution. Non-reimbursable charges would include any penalty charges, including but not limited to, parking tickets, or other penalty payments.

3.00 Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

- 4. 3.01 To be eligible for the Military Dependents' Scholarship, an applicant must meet the following conditions:
 - A. 3.01.1 The student's parent or spouse must have been declared to be a disabled veteran, prisoner of war, missing in action, killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery during the course of active military duty after January 1, 1960.
 - B. 3.01.2 The student's parent or spouse must have been a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time he/she he or she entered service in the United States Armed Services, or whose official residence is currently within the State of Arkansas.
 - C. 3.01.3 The dependent child or spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or a person killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran must be a current resident of Arkansas.

- D. 3.01.4 The student must qualify as the dependent of a disabled veteran, prisoner of war or a person declared to be missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery by meeting one of the following criteria:
 - 4. 3.01.4.1 The student is the legal spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war, missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery or a person declared to be a disabled veteran or,
 - 2. 3.01.4.2 The dependent child must be the biological child of the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran; or,
 - 3. 3.01.4.3 The dependent child is legally adopted or in legal custody of the guardian that was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
 - 4. 3.01.4.4 The dependent child is the stepchild of the parent that was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran..
- E. 3.01.5 The dependent child must meet the U.S. Department of Education's definition of "dependent" with regards to children.
- F. A stepchild is not eligible for this scholarship unless he/she has been legally adopted by the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
- F. 3.01.6 A stepchild must have been listed as a dependent on the federal and state income tax returns in each of the five (5) income tax years immediately prior to the death or total and permanent disability and must have received more than one-half (1/2) his or her financial support.
- G. 3.01.7 The applicant must apply for the Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA) Chapter 35 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code with the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- H. 3.01.8 The applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time student in any private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education in Arkansas.
- 4. 3.01.9 The applicant must be an undergraduate student seeking an associate's degree, a baccalaureate degree or certificate of completion.

- J. 3.01.10 The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.
- H. 3.02 Once a person qualifies as an eligible student under the terms of the program, there shall be no situation, such as the return of a parent or spouse, or the reported death of a parent or spouse that will remove the dependent from the benefits of this program.

III. Continued Eligibility

- <u>3.03</u> An eligible recipient shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year, renewable for up to three (3) additional academic years (for a total of 8 semesters) if the recipient meets the following continuing eligibility criteria established by ADHE the Division of Higher Education:
- 3.03.1 The student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale.
- 1. 3.03.2 The student is making satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion;
- 2. 3.03.3 The student is enrolled in at least twelve semester hours or the equivalent per semester term and completes 24 semester hours, or the equivalent, per academic year.
- 3.04 For purposes of scholarship payments, "academic semester" includes summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.

4.00 Application Process

I. Applications

- A. 4.01 Brochures are mailed by the Division of Higher Education to counselors and principals at public and private Arkansas high schools.
- B. <u>4.02</u> Brochures are mailed by the <u>division</u> to financial aid officers at private, nonprofit institutions of higher education in Arkansas and state-supported institutions of higher education in the state of Arkansas.
 - C. <u>4.02.1</u> The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students are made aware of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and its benefits.

D. 4.03 Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Division of Higher Education on the division's website.

II. Submission of Applications

- A. 4.04 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. 4.05 Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division the following documentation as it applies to the applicant:
 - 4.05.1 Military Dependents' Scholarship Application;
 - 2. 4.05.2 A death certificate or other documentation certifying the death of the parent or spouse.
 - 3. 4.05.2.1 A death as a result of injuries received while serving in the armed forces is only covered if the death occurred while on active duty.
 - 4. 4.05.3 A Report of Casualty from the appropriate branch of the United States Armed Services or a copy of the veteran's DD214 form;
 - 5. 4.05.4 Documentation from the federal United States Department of Veterans Affairs citing service-connected, one hundred percent (100%) total and permanent disability;
 - 6. <u>4.05.5</u> A copy of the application and statement of acceptance or denial of the federal program for dependents of veterans, Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA).
 - 7. <u>4.05.6</u> A copy of DEA benefits statement showing the amount of educational assistance allowed for each term.
 - 8. 4.05.7 A copy of legal adoption or court appointed legal guardianship for a dependent child;
 - 9. 4.05.8 A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child;
 - 4.05.9 A copy of marriage license, if a spouse.

5.00 Award Process

- 4. 5.01 Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within 30 days of the status of their application.
- H. <u>5.02</u> Eligible students will receive an award notice, which contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.
- HI. 5.03 The institution will also receive an award notice, which contains the student's name, social security number, award limits, the conditions of the award, verification process, and payment process. The institution will be required to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. 5.04 The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continued eligibility each semester.
- V. <u>5.05</u> The award will be renewed annually provided the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as defined by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education in "Scholarship and Eligibility Criteria," Section III.
- VI. <u>5.06</u> Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

VII. 6.00 Scholarship Payment Policies

- 4. 6.01 The scholarship will pay that portion of charges that exceeds the amount of the DEA educational assistance allowance OR the full amount if the recipient is ineligible for DEA, but is eligible for the MDS. Reimbursement is limited to the cost of tuition at the in-state rate, mandatory fees, and a room and meal plan when provided in campus facilities from such institution or school. The amount reimbursed for the room shall not exceed the usual and custom amounts charged by the institution as for similar scholarship programs.
- H. 6.02 Payment on behalf of the scholarship recipient will be made directly to the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution at the beginning of each semester for approved charges covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.
- HI. 6.03 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division will pay the institution for the award covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges.

A. Transfer Policy

- A recipient who has received a Military Dependents' Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Division of Higher Education receives after providing written notification of the change of status to the division by October 1 for the Fall Term a fall term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms a winter or spring term, and June 1 for the Summer Terms a summer term.
 - 6.04.1 Failure to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division of the transfer by the deadline will disqualify the student for waiver of tuition and fees at the institution to which he/she he or she has transferred.

B. Withdrawal Policy

<u>6.05</u> Recipients may withdraw from the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education division</u>. The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and will be supported with documentation. Recipients who withdraw from school and fail to notify the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education division</u> by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring terms, and June 1 for the Summer terms will not be eligible for a tuition waiver for that semester. The recipient may receive the tuition waiver if <u>he/she he or she</u> can demonstrate that extraordinary circumstances prevented <u>him/her him or her</u> from notifying the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> division.

C. Revocation Policy

6.06 The award will be permanently revoked if the recipient fails to enroll full-time and the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division receives neither written notification of transfer to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms and June 1 for the Summer Terms. At the discretion of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, the award will not be revoked if the division determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying the division by the required dates.

D. Military Service

Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces
Reserve units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit
training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will
be placed in deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

- E. 6.08 Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE division policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.
- IV. 6.09 The state assistance awarded to a dependent attending a private, nonprofit institution of higher education in this state shall not exceed the amount of state assistance awarded to dependents attending state-supported institutions of higher education.

7.00 Institutional Responsibilities

I. Administrative Agreement

7.01 The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with these responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

II. Verification

7.02 The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) division at the close of each term concerning the student's name and continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

III. Identification of Eligible Students

<u>7.03</u> Institutions will be responsible for exercising all reasonable efforts to identify students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

IV. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

<u>7.04</u> The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to the <u>Arkansas Division-of Higher Education</u> <u>division</u>.

V. Refund Policy

<u>7.05</u> It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE the division of the names of persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE the division.

VI. Due Diligence

<u>7.06</u> The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education Division</u> on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program.

8.0 Recipient Responsibilities

- 4. 8.01 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 21 days. This includes:
 - A. 8.01.1 Changes in name, or
 - B. 8.01.2 Change in address, or
 - C. 8.01.3 Change in Institution, or
 - D. 8.01.4 Change in full-time status, or
 - E. 8.01.5 Withdrawal from an institution.
 - 8.02 Failure to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division of any change in status may affect future eligibility.

appointed legal guardianship, or the stepchild of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran, AND who meets the definition of dependent with regards to children established by the U.S. Department of Education. Stepchildren are not eligible unless legally adopted as stated above.

Dependent Spouse

The legal spouse of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.

Disabled Veteran

A person who has been declared by the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs to be one hundred percent (100%) totally and permanently disabled as a result of service connected injuries or medical conditions AND who is currently receiving special monthly compensation for such, AND who was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the U.S. armed forces OR who is a current resident of Arkansas.

Full-time Student

An undergraduate student enrolled in at least twelve (12) semester credit hours, or its equivalent, per semester.

Satisfactory Progress

Undergraduate students must maintain a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, and make satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion, as defined by the institution.

Fees Waived

Includes tuition at the in-state rate, room and board when provided in campus facilities, fees or other charges incurred from the approved institution. Non reimbursable charges would include any penalty charges, including but not limited to, parking tickets, or other penalty payments.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE FINANCIAL AID APPEALS PROCESS Effective Date:

1.00 Definitions

- 1.01 "Appeals Process" means, without limitation:
 - 1.01.1 The completion and submission of an appeals application as drafted by the Financial Aid Appeals Committee;
 - 1.01.2 The confirmation of eligibility to appeal and the intention to retain appeals eligibility under this subchapter; and
 - 1.01.3 The completion of a review by the committee that shall include a determination of eligibility and a final appeals decision;
- 1.02 "Eligibility" means, without limitation, the applicant:
 - 1.02.1 Is a bona fide resident of the State of Arkansas;
 - 1.02.2 <u>Is enrolled or will be enrolled in a program of study at an eligible postsecondary institution;</u>
 - 1.02.3 Is currently in good standing; and
 - 1.02.4 Is not currently under probationary restrictions for financial aid
- 1.03 "Financial Aid" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student from public funds, including without limitation:
 - 1.03.1 The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under §6-85-201 et seq.; and
 - 1.03.2 Other division scholarship and grant programs, state general revenues, tuition, and local tax revenue.

2.00 Financial Aid Appeals Committee

- 2.01 The Financial Aid Appeals Committee is composed of five (5) representatives of the Division of Higher Education, which shall be responsible for administering the division's appeal process, appointed by the Commissioner of Higher Education.
- 2.02 The committee is authorized to:

- 2.02.1 Resolve disputes arising out of or relating to a student who is no longer considered eligible to receive a scholarship or grant;
 - 2.02.1.1 An appeal application may be filed by a parent or guardian, or student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age, who has been notified that he or she is no longer considered eligible to receive a scholarship under this rule.
 - 2.02.1.2 An appeal application must be received by the division or postmarked no later than ten (10) calendar days after the student or the student's parent, guardian, or person standing in loco parentis to the student (hereafter "appealing party") receives a notice of scholarship ineligibility and shall be delivered or mailed to:

- 2.02.1.3 The committee may wave the deadline to file an appeal if the notice of ineligibility does not inform the petitioner of the right to appeal and the deadline to file an appeal or the petitioner makes a good faith attempt to file a timely appeal.
- 2.02.1.4 The committee shall either grant or deny an appeal filed not less than forty-five (45) days after the day the appeal is received.
- 2.02.1.5 If the committee overturns the determination of scholarship eligibility on appeal, the committee shall notify the appealing party of the basis for the board's decision.
- 2.02.2 Prescribe forms for and regulate the submission of appeals applications;
- 2.02.3 Determine eligibility of applicants;
- 2.02.4 Approve or reject appeals applications;
- 2.02.5 Manage, operate, and control all funds appropriated or otherwise contributed for this purpose;
- 2.02.6 Administer final determinations of financial aid appeals made by the committee; and

- 2.02.7 Report annually to the General Assembly the number of applications for appeals:
 - <u>2.02.7.1</u> <u>Received; and</u>
 - <u>2.02.7.2</u> <u>Approved.</u>

3.00 Eligibility for Appeals

- 3.01 The Financial Aid Appeals Committee may make appeals decisions for an applicant, with each appeal being expressly made subject to the provisions of this subsection and §6-81-1905, if the committee finds that reinstating the appealed scholarship or grant will benefit the student and finds that:
 - 3.01.1 The applicant is a bona fide resident of Arkansas;
 - 3.01.2 The applicant is enrolled or will be enrolled in a program of study at an eligible postsecondary institution;
 - 3.01.3 The applicant is currently in good standing;
 - 3.01.4 The applicant is not currently under probationary restrictions for financial aid; and
 - 3.01.5 The application for appeal is submitted within two (2) academic semesters following the initial decision.

4.00 Exclusions and Conditions

- 4.01 In the event an applicant submits an appeal on the basis of failure to maintain full-time enrollment or the necessary grade point average during a previous term, the Financial Aid Appeals Committee may approve proportionate financial aid to be awarded within one (1) semester following the term during which the applicant failed to maintain full-time enrollment or the necessary grade point average.
 - 4.01.1 Proportionate financial aid awarded following failure to maintain full-time enrollment under 5.01 of this section is limited to six (6) hours.
- 4.02 The committee shall not provide reimbursement for previous terms.

5.00 Financial Aid Appeals Committee Hearing Procedures

5.01 All persons wishing to testify before the Financial Aid Appeals Committee shall first be placed under oath by the Chairperson of the committee.

- 5.02 Each party that wishes to participate in the hearing may take up to fifteen (15) minutes to present its case, beginning with a member of the Committee and then the appealing party.
 - 5.02.1 The chair of the committee may allow the parties additional time to present their cases.
- 5.03 The committee, at its discretion, shall have the authority to require any person associated with the scholarship application to appear in person before the committee as a witness during the hearing.
 - 5.03.1 The committee may accept testimony by affidavit, declaration, deposition transcript, or hearing transcript.
- 5.04 The committee will resolve the appeal based upon the totality of evidence presented.
- 5.05 On appeal, the committee denying scholarship eligibility bears the burden of justifying its decision and must overcome that burden with a clear and convincing reason for that decision.
- 5.06 When hearing an appeal, the committee may take one of the following actions:
 - 5.06.1 Affirm denial of a scholarship eligibility by the institution;
 - 5.06.2 Overturn the institution's determination and grant the scholarship; or
 - 5.06.3 Table the petition for consideration at a future meeting.
- 5.07 The consideration of a petition under this Rule shall be conducted in an open meeting.
- 5.08 The committee shall provide a written decision to the institution and the appealing party within fourteen (14) days of announcing its decision under this section.
- 5.09 An order from the committee is immediately appealable to the circuit court, pursuant to APA.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE STATE TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Program Definitions

- <u>1.01</u> <u>"Alternative Educator Preparation Program" means Nnon-traditional licensure program resulting in a valid Arkansas teaching license.</u>
- 1.02 "Approved institution" means a state-supported institution of higher education, a nursing school, or a private nonprofit institution of higher education that:
 - 1.02.1 Maintains its primary headquarters in the state;
 - 1.02.2 Is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid program funds; and
 - 1.02.3 <u>Is approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate</u> in the State Teacher Education Program;
- <u>1.03</u> <u>"Arkansas Resident" means to be considered an Arkansas resident ADHE,</u> an applicant <u>must be that has been an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program.</u>

- <u>"Teach-on a Full-time Basis" means to Tteach the same number of hours required</u> of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.
- "Teacher Education Program" means a program administered by the Division of Higher Education that provides loan repayments to a licensed teacher who teaches in a subject area or a geographic area with teacher shortage as determined by the Division of Higher Education in consultation with the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education. A program of study that has been completed at a college or university and results in the receipt of an initial Arkansas teaching license or an additional licensure area to an existing Arkansas teaching license.
- 1.11 <u>"U.S. United States Citizen" means The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born</u> or who have become naturalized citizens of:
 - 1.11.1 <u>t</u>The 50 States;
 - 1.11.2 the District of Columbia;
 - <u>1.11.3</u> Puerto Rico;

- 1.11.4 the-Virgin Islands;
- 1.11.5 Guam;
- 1.11.6 the Northern Mariana Islands; and
- 1.11.7 Trust Territory- Palau.
- 1.12 The term "nNational" means includes citizens of:
 - 1.12.1 American Samoa; or

2.00 Rule 1 - Organization and Structure

- 2.01 I. The Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the State Teacher Education Program (STEP), hereafter known as STEP, within the policies set by the Arkansas-Higher Education Coordinating Board.
 - 2.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director commissioner of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education division or his/or her designee.
- 2.02 H. When functioning under Act 1215 of 2009, and any subsequent legislation, ADHE the division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

3.00 Rule 2 - Eligibility Criteria

 - 3.01.1 A. Applicants must be bona fide Arkansas residents, as defined by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, for at least twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline.
 - 3.01.2 B. Applicants must be a citizen of the United States or a lawful permanent resident.

- 4.01 **L** Applications.
 - 4.01.1 A. Solicitation of Applicants
 - 4.01.1.1 4. Program information will be mailed to the following:
 - 4.01.1.1.1 a. K-12 school administrators and other interested personnel;
 - 4.01.1.1.2 b. Colleges/, Schools/, and Departments of Education;
 - 4.01.1.1.3 e. Financial Aid Directors/ and Officers;
 - 4.01.1.1.4 d. Other college campus personnel, such as advisors, etc. who express an interest in disseminating information to prospective applicants;

- 4.01.1.1.5 e. Information is also available upon request from the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.
- 4.01.1.2 2. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education division staff will disseminate program information through workshops, meetings, press releases, the Departmental division newsletter, and other means deemed appropriate.
- 4.01.2 B. An online application will be available at the ADHE division's website.
 - 4.01.2.1 The application deadline shall be stated on the application form each year.
 - 4.01.2.2 The ADHE division shall have the authority to extend the deadline as needed to ensure a quality applicant pool so long as sufficient public notice is provided.
- 4.01.3 C. Upon receipt by the division ADHE, applications are reviewed to ensure that all pertinent data is included.
 - <u>4.01.3.1</u> Each applicant will receive confirmation of the receipt and completeness of the application.
 - 4.01.3.2 For those whose application is either incomplete or ineligible, a notification will be made identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility.
 - 4.01.3.3 The applicant will then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information.
 - 4.01.3.4 Before an applicant can be considered for an award, the corrected or missing information must be received by the division ADHE by the deadline indicated in the Incomplete or Ineligible Nnotice.
- 4.02 H. Selection and Notification of Recipients
 - 4.02.1 A. The ADHE division shall review applicants and select recipients based on the eligibility criteria for the State Teacher Education Program-(STEP).
 - 4.02.2 B. Selected recipients will receive award notices stating their eligibility for the program and the conditions of their award.
- 4.03 III. Ranking of Applicants

- <u>4.03.1</u> Priority for <u>the State Teacher Education Program STEP</u> Repayment grants is as follows:
 - 4.03.1.1 1. First priority is Arkansas teachers teaching in both subject and geographic shortage areas.
 - <u>4.03.1.2</u> 2. Second priority is Arkansas teachers teaching in subject shortage areas.
 - 4.03.1.3 3. Third priority is Arkansas teachers teaching in geographic shortage areas.
 - 4.03.1.4 4. Fourth priority is Arkansas public school teachers who have completed an alternative educator preparation program.

4.04 HI. Disbursement of Award

- 4.04.1 The award will be disbursed in one (1) disbursement to the federal student loan holder indicated by the applicant.
 - 4.04.1.1 If the award amount is larger than the outstanding loan balance, the award amount will be reduced to the amount of the loan balance.

5.00 Rule 4 - Limitations of Loan Repayment

- 5.01 I. The State Teacher Education Program (STEP) shall be used to provide:
 - 5.01.1 A. A loan repayment for federal student loans in the amount of three six thousand dollars (\$3,000 6,000) per year, for a maximum of three (3) years for each year a licensed teacher who graduated from a teacher education program after April 2004 and teaches in a public school in this state or successfully completed an alternative educator preparation program after April 2004 and teaches in a public school in the program:
 - 5.01.1.1 In a subject matter area designated by the Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education, as having a critical shortage of teachers; and
 - 5.01.1.2 <u>ILocated in a geographical area of the state designated by the Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education, as having a critical shortage of teachers-OR in a subject matter area designated as having a critical shortage of teachers.</u>

5.01.2 A licensed teacher who is given intensive support status under the Teacher Excellence and Support System, § 6-17-2801 et seq., shall be ineligible for receipt of funds under the program for the school year.

Total term of federal student loan repayment shall not exceed three years.

B. An additional loan repayment for federal student loans in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per year for each year a licensed minority teacher, who graduated from a teacher education program after April 2004, teaches in a public school located in a geographical area of the state designated as having a critical shortage of teachers and/or in a subject matter area designated as having a critical shortage of teachers in Arkansas.

<u>The total term of federal student loan repayment shall not exceed three years.</u>

For guidance purposes, the terms African American, Hispanic, Asian American, and Native American are based on the Race/Ethnic classifications utilized by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) as follows:

i. African American = Black/Non Hispanic: a person having origins in any other black racial groups of Africa.

ii. Hispanic: a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

iii. Asian-American = Asian or Pacific Islander: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East. Southeast.

Arkansas Resident

To be considered an Arkansas resident by ADHE, an applicant must be an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program. Further, the recipient may be asked to provide evidence of a permanent connection with the State of Arkansas. ADHE will look to one or more of the following to determine residency in those cases:

- (A) Valid Arkansas Driver's License:
- (B) Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for previous year;
- (C) Proof of Arkansas vehicle registration;
- (D) Proof of Arkansas voter registration; and
- (E) Other forms of proof of Arkansas residency.

Award Year

The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year, and extends to June 30 of the next calendar year.

Geographical Areas of the State Designated as Having Critical Shortages of Teachers

Any Arkansas school district designated by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education as having critical teacher shortages.

Lawful Permanent Resident

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G 641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

Subject Matter Designated as Critical Needs in the State of Arkansas

Annually the Department of Education certifies subject matter shortage Arkansas areas based upon the results of surveys obtained from school districts in the state of Arkansas.

Teach on a Full time Basis

Teach the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

Teacher Education Program

A program of study that has been completed at a college or university and results in the receipt of an initial Arkansas teaching license or an additional licensure area to an existing Arkansas teaching license.

U.S. Citizen

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Teacher Opportunity Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Teacher Opportunity Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Teacher Opportunity Program rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING TEACHER OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Program Definitions

- 1.01 The following definitions are used in the Teacher Opportunity Program (TOP):
 - 1.01.1 "Academic Year" means A a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
 - 1.01.2 "Arkansas Resident" means an applicant that has been to be considered an Arkansas resident by ADHE, an applicant must be an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program.
 - 1.01.2.1 Further, the recipient may be asked to provide evidence of a permanent connection with the State of Arkansas.
 - 1.01.2.2 ADHE The Division of Higher Education will look to one or more of the following to determine residency through in those cases:
 - 1.01.2.2.1 (A) A valid Valid Arkansas Driver's License;
 - 1.01.2.2.2 (B)Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for previous year;
 - 1.01.2.2.3 (C)Proof of Arkansas vehicle registration;
 - 1.01.2.2.4 (D)Proof of Arkansas voter registration; and
 - 1.01.2.2.5 (E)Other forms of proof of Arkansas residency.
 - 1.01.3 "Approved Institution" means an An Arkansas postsecondary public or private college, university, or school that is currently accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association that has a teacher licensure program where those courses are directly creditable toward teacher licensure in a baccalaureate institution.
 - 1.01.3.1 The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age,

handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.

- 1.01.4 "Award Year" means the year beginning The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year, and extends extending to June 30 of the next calendar year.
- 1.01.5 "Classroom Teacher" means an An individual who is required to hold a teaching license from the division Arkansas Department of Education and who is:
 - 1.01.5.1 a. Engaged directly in instruction with students in a classroom setting for more than seventy percent (70%) of the individual's contracted time;
 - 1.01.5.2 b. A media specialist or librarian;
 - 1.01.5.3 e. A guidance counselor;
 - 1.01.5.4 d. An administrator.
- <u>1.01.6</u> "Dual License" means licensure Licensure to teach in more than one (1) subject area.
- 1.01.7 "Semester" means one-half (½) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the division, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
 - 1.01.7.1 Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or
 - 1.01.7.2 Six (6) credit hours as a part-time student.
 - 1.01.7.2.1 For purposes of summer courses at an institution of higher education, a "semester" shall mean the same as is defined in this section.

2.00 Organization and Structure

- 2.01 The Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Teacher Opportunity Program with the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB).
 - 2.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director Commissioner of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education division or the Director's commissioner's designee.
 - 2.01.2 The Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Department of Higher Education division regarding administration of the program.
- 2.02 Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council
 - 2.02.1 The Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council shall consist of eight members.
 - 2.02.1.1 The members will be appointed annually to serve a two-year staggered term by the Director commissioner of the division Department of Higher Education.
 - 2.02.1.2 The members of this council will consist of representatives from public and private postsecondary institutions with Teacher Education programs, public and private elementary and secondary schools, and the teacher certification division section of the Division Department of Education.
 - 2.02.2 The <u>Director commissioner</u> of the <u>Department of Higher Education</u> division or the <u>Director's commissioner's</u> designee shall serve as the presiding officer of the Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council and shall ensure that staff services for the Council are provided.
- 2.03 The final responsibility for selecting loan recipients shall rest with the Department of Higher Education division.
- 2.04 When functioning under Act 109 of 1983, Act 331 of 1987, and any subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education division shall follow the Provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

3.00 Eligibility and Criteria

- 3.01 Applicant must be bona fide residents of the State of Arkansas, as defined by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, as having lived in Arkansas continually for at least twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline.
- 3.02 Applicant shall maintain a current teacher license with the Arkansas Department of Education division.
 - 3.02.1 Only individuals with a provisional license or who are in the alternative licensure program are not considered certified for the purposes of the Dual Certification Incentive Program.
- 3.03 Recipient awarded under the Dual Licensure Incentive Program must:
 - 3.03.1 Be currently employed as a classroom teacher, which includes librarian/ and media specialist, guidance counselor and administrator, in a public school in Arkansas; and

- 4.01 Solicitation of Applicants
 - 4.01.1 Applications will be available at the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education's website.
 - 4.01.1.1 Applications will also be mailed to individuals upon request.
- 4.02 Submission of Application
 - 4.02.1 Applications include personal information, as well as education and employment information.
 - 4.02.2 The Department of Higher Education division will review all applications to ensure that all pertinent data are included and will notify the applicant of the status of the application.
 - 4.02.2.1 If the application is incomplete, <u>the division</u> will notify the applicant of this status, the information that is missing, and the deadline to submit the information.
 - 4.02.2.1.1 This deadline will be no less than two weeks from the date of the notification letter.
- 4.03 Application Deadline

- 4.03.1 The application deadline will be set each year by the <u>division</u> Department of Higher Education.
 - 4.03.1.1 All applications must be submitted by the established deadline date.
 - 4.03.1.2 Applications received after the deadline date will not be considered for participation in the Teacher Opportunity Program.
 - 4.03.1.3 The <u>division</u> Department may establish alternate deadlines for applicants based on the start date of each term.

5.00 Award Process

- 5.01 Selection of Recipients
 - 5.01.1 The final responsibility for selecting recipients shall rest with the Director Commissioner of the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education.
 - 5.01.2 Applications for additional education in the following areas will receive first priority for awards:
 - 5.01.2.1 Science, technology, engineering, or mathematics fields;
 - 5.01.2.2 Computer Science;
 - 5.01.2.3 Literacy or reading;
 - 5.01.2.4 Prekindergarten education; or
 - 5.01.2.5 Special Education.
 - 5.01.3 If funds remain after awarding all eligible applicants in the areas listed above, applicants will be ranked according to criteria developed in conjunction with the Department of Education Division of Elementary and Secondary Education, focusing on state-wide needs.
- 5.02 Notification of Recipients
 - 5.02.1 Selected recipients will receive an award notice stating their eligibility for the program.
 - 5.02.1.1 The award notice will include, where applicable, the student's name, social security number, and award amount.

6.00 Reimbursement Amount

- 6.01 Reimbursement for students in the Dual Licensure Incentive Program includes funding for the cost of student fees, books, and instructional supplies at a public institution of higher education in this State assessing the highest rate of student fees.
 - 6.01.1 The reimbursement made to one individual within one fiscal year may not exceed the aforementioned costs associated with six semester hours or the equivalent of six semester credit hours, though not to exceed \$3,000 during the fiscal year.
- 6.02 Non-Dual Licensure Program recipients may receive funds up to, but not in excess of, the cost of student fees, books, and instructional supplies at a public institution of higher education in this State assessing the highest rate of student fees.
 - 6.02.1 The reimbursement made to one individual within one fiscal year may not exceed the aforementioned costs associated with six semester hours or the equivalent of six semester credit hours.
- 6.03 Based on the availability of program funds, awards will be disbursed to the recipient pursuant to the reimbursement limitations above and ranking status.
- 6.04 Recipients must maintain an eligible status to receive funds.

7.00 Reimbursement Disbursement

- 8.01 Teacher Opportunity Program is a reimbursement program.
 - 8.01.1 A check made payable to the individual recipient is mailed to the student once he/or she has successfully completed the funded course with a satisfactory grade and has provided the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education with an original copy of the itemized paid receipt and grade report or transcript for the funded course.

- <u>Professional Judgment. Authority of ADHE professional staff that allows for the special consideration of applications when extraordinary circumstances occur beyond the applicant's control that may prohibit the student from meeting the exact guidelines as stated.</u>
 - <u>1.02.1</u> The student must provide documentation, as required by ADHE, to demonstrate that circumstances were beyond the student's control.

1.00 Organization and Structure

- I. 1.01 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall administer the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. - H. 1.02 The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division pursuant to the provisions of Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, and Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009 and any subsequent legislation.
- 1.03 When functioning under Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009, and any subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act.

2.00 Program Definitions

- <u>2.01</u> The following definitions are used in the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program:
- 2.01.1 "Approved Institution" means a state-supported two-year or four-year college or university or technical institute located in the State of Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central Association, Commission on Higher Education Higher Learning Commission, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
- 2.01.2 "Dependent" means a spouse, natural child, adopted child, or step child of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state correction employees, state forestry employees, certain Arkansas Department of Transportation employees, state parks employees, teacher, or Department of Community Correction employees killed or totally and permanently disabled in the line of duty.
- <u>2.01.3</u> "Satisfactory Progress" means satisfactory academic progress toward a degree as defined by the institution.

3.00 Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

5.01 In order to be eligible for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship, the student must be a natural child, adopted child, stepchild, or spouse of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Correction employee who was killed or permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred in the performance of duty or in the course of going to or returning from a location where a hazardous situation existed. Scholarship benefits shall not accrue to the dependents if the wounds or injuries suffered by the law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Punishment employee are self-inflicted or if death is self-induced.

3.01.1 A law enforcement officer means:

- A. 3.01.1.1 Arkansas state highway patrolman, which includes any law enforcement officer, regardless of department or bureau, of the Division of Arkansas State Police;
- B. 3.01.1.2 Arkansas municipal and college or university police officers, which includes all law enforcement officers of any municipality, college, or university who are regular duty personnel on full-time status and does not include auxiliary officers or those serving on a temporary or part-time status;
- C. 3.01.1.3 Arkansas sheriff or deputy sheriff, which includes all law enforcement officers of full-time status on a regular basis serving the sheriff's department of any county located in Arkansas, but does not include deputy sheriffs who are engaged in administrative or civil duty or deputy sheriffs serving in a temporary capacity or part-time basis;
- D. 3.01.1.4 Arkansas constable, which includes all duly elected constables of any beat of any county within the State of Arkansas while actually engaged in the performance of their duties concerning the criminal laws of the county and state; and,
- E. 3.01.1.5 Arkansas game warden, which includes all appointed game wardens employed by the State of Arkansas on a full-time duty status while actually engaged in their duties concerning the game laws of this state.

3.01.2 A fireman means:

A. 3.01.2 1 Any Arkansas fireman employed on a full-time or volunteer duty status while actually engaged in the performance of his

		or her duties;

3.01.7 A teacher means:

- Any person employed by an Arkansas public school for the purpose of giving instructions and whose employment requires state certification; and
- 3.01.8 A Department of Community Correction employee means:
- Any employee of the Arkansas Department of A. 3.01.8.1 Community Correction who suffers fatal injuries or wounds or becomes permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred through contact with parolees, probationers, or center residents.
- H. 3.02 To be eligible to receive the Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship, the applicant must be:
 - 3.02.1 A child must have been born prior to the date of the death or total and A.

permanent disability (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);

- B. 3.02.2 An adopted child must have been adopted prior to or the adoption process must have begun prior to the date of the death or total and permanent disability (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);
- C. 3.02.3 A stepchild must have been listed as a dependent on the federal and state income tax returns in each of the five (5) income tax years immediately prior to the death or total and permanent disability and must have received more than one-half (1/2) his or her financial support (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I)
- D. 3.02.4 Enrolled or accepted for enrollment as an undergraduate student in any Arkansas state-supported college, university or technical institute;
- E. 3.02.5 Less than twenty-three (23) years old on or before the first day of the semester or quarter, unless the applicant is a spouse; and,
- F. 3.02.6 A bona fide resident of Arkansas, as defined by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education, for at least six (6) months prior to enrollment in an Arkansas institution.

III. 3.03 Continued Eligibility

- 3.03.1 The scholarship will be awarded for one academic year and renewed annually up to three years (for a total of 8 semesters) so long as the student maintains a minimum of a 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and satisfactory progress toward a degree as defined by the institution.
- 3.03.2 For purposes of scholarship payments, "academic semester" includes summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.
- IV. 3.04 The spouse will not be eligible for the educational benefits if he or she re-marries. The benefits will cease at the end of the semester in which the spouse is currently enrolled at the time of the marriage.

4.00 Application Process

- <u>4.01</u> Applications
 - A. 4.01.1 Applications and brochures regarding the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship are mailed to the following:
 - 4.01.1.1 Counselors and principals at all public and private high schools in the State; and,

- 2. 4.01.1.2 Financial aid officers at all public colleges, universities, and public technical institutes in the state. The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students at their institution are made aware of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and its benefits.
- B. 4.01.2 Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

H. 4.02 Submission of Applications

- A. <u>4.02.1</u> The Arkansas Division of Higher Education <u>division</u> shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. 4.02.2 Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division the following:
 - 4. <u>4.02.2.1</u> The Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship Application;
 - 2. 4.02.2.2 Documentation in the form of a Death Certificate;
 - 3. 4.02.2.3 Order & Finding of Facts from the Arkansas State Claims Commission;
 - 4. 4.02.2.4 A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child; and,
 - 5. 4.02.2.5 A copy of their marriage license, if a spouse.
- C. 4.02.3 The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

5.00 Award Process

- 4. 5.01 Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the required eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within thirty (30) days of receipt of all required documentation of the status of their application.
- H. <u>5.02</u> Eligible students will receive an award notice that contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.
- HI. 5.03 The institution will also receive an award notice that contains the student's name and social security number, the award limits, the conditions of the award, the

- verification process, and the payment process. The institution will be asked to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. 5.04 The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continuing eligibility each semester.
- V. <u>5.05</u> The award will be renewed annually as long as the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section V.

6.00 Scholarship Payment Policies

- 4. 6.01 A recipient may receive up to eight (8) semesters of tuition and fee waivers from the scholarship program. Payment to the scholarship recipient will be in the form of a tuition and fee waiver at the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution upon verification of enrollment after the 11th day of classes each semester for approved charges.
- H. 6.02 The scholarship will pay the cost of tuition at the in-state rate and room in school-owned housing at any state-supported college, university or technical institute within the State of Arkansas. It does not include the cost of the following:
 - A. 6.02.1 Books
 - B. <u>6.02.2</u> Food
 - C. 6.02.3 School supplies and materials
 - D. 6.02.4 Dues and fees for extracurricular activities
- III. 6.03 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division will pay the institution for tuition and fees covered by this program at the beginning of each term upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form and verification of the charges.

A. Transfer Policy

6.03.1 A recipient who has received a Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division receives written notification of the change of status by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.

B. Withdrawal Policy

6.03.2 Recipients may withdraw from the Law Enforcement Officers'
Dependents Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division. The

petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and shall be supported with documentation.

C. Revocation Policy

<u>6.03.3</u> The award will be revoked if the recipient fails to:

- 4. 6.03.3.1 Enroll in an eligible Arkansas institution;
- 2. 6.03.3.2 Notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, in writing, of transfer to another eligible institution by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms; or,
- 3. 6.03.3.3 Petition the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, in writing, for withdrawal from an institution by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.
- 4. 6.03.3.4 Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 per academic year.
- 6.03.4 At the discretion of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education

 Division, the award will not be revoked if the ADHE division

 determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying ADHE division by the required dates.

D. Military Service

6.03.5 Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces Reserves units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will be placed on deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

7.00 Institutional Responsibilities

- I. 7.01 Administrative Agreement
 - 7.02 The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education or technical institute is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations.

7.03 The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status:

A. Verification

The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division at the close of each term concerning the student's continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

B. Identification of Eligible Students

7.05 Institutions will be responsible for publicizing the program and identifying students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application. Applications made after May 1 of the academic year in which the student is enrolled will not be considered and the student will not be eligible for the scholarship.

C. Disbursement Records

7.06 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of these funds.

D. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

7.07 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to ADHE division.

E. Refund Policy

- 7.08 It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE division of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE division.
- F. 7.09 Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE division policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

G. Due Diligence

7.10 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

8.00 Recipient Responsibilities

- 4. 8.01 The recipient must notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 30 days. This includes changes in:
 - A. <u>8.01.1</u> Name;
 - B. <u>8.01.2</u> Address;
 - $\frac{\text{C.}}{\text{8.01.3}}$ Institution; and/or,
 - D. 8.01.4 Withdrawal from an institution.
 - <u>8.02</u> Failure to notify the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> division of a change in status may affect future eligibility.
- H. 8.03 It is also the recipient's responsibility to be knowledgeable of the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

Program Definitions

The following definitions are used in the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program:

Approved Institution

A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university or technical institute located in the State of Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central Association, Commission on Higher Education, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.

Dependent

A spouse, natural child, adopted child, or step child of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state correction employees, state forestry employees, certain Arkansas Department of Transportation employees, state parks employees, teacher, or Department of Community Correction employees killed or totally and permanently disabled in the line of duty.
