#### **DISTRIBUTION OF MINERAL LEASE FUNDS**

\_\_\_\_\_

According to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-61-801 through §6-61-808, there is established the Arkansas Research Development Program for providing Arkansas Research Development Program Grants to publicly-supported universities in Arkansas by the Division of Higher Education. Act 870 of 2023 provides that after the sum of \$13,200,000 has been deposited into the Higher Education Building Maintenance Fund, any additional deposits are to be transferred to the Research Development Fund to be used as provided by law.

In accordance with A.C.A. §6-61-803 and A.C.A. §6-61-807, "There is created a program to be known as the Arkansas Research Development program which shall be administered by the Director of the Division of Higher Education. Funds may be made available for administration of the Arkansas Development Research Program, for purchasing state-of-the-art equipment, for minor renovations of laboratory space, for publication of findings, for employing scientists or research assistants, and for providing any other assistance to scientists in order to develop a continuing research capacity in this state which is recognized as exemplary."

The floor for the Research Development Fund was reached in September 2006, and statute requires that the funds be disbursed by the Director of the Division of Higher Education in accordance with the recommendation of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board after review by Legislative Council.

#### **Higher Education Research Development Fund:**

The current balance in the Higher Education Research Development Fund is \$255,859. The fiscal 2024 appropriation of \$500,000 is adequate for the authorization of distribution of up to \$475,000 requested by the Arkansas Research and Education Optical Network (ARE-ON) board of directors.

#### Recommendation:

The ARE-ON represents an essential tool for research and development in the publicly supported universities of Arkansas. It is recommended that up to \$475,000 requested by the ARE-ON board of directors be distributed to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

The following resolution is presented for the board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That after review by the Legislative Council, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to distribute up to \$475,000 from the Higher Education Research Development Fund to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

### ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS, FAYETTEVILLE

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$34.175 million with a maximum term of thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on March 12-13, 2024.

The E&G issue will be up to \$34.175 million with a maximum annual debt service of \$2,328,488 and a term of thirty (30) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used for (a) the renovation, acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Building; (b) the acquisition of property for expansion purposes and other purposes of the Fayetteville Campus; and (c) the acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of other capital improvements and infrastructure and the acquisition of various equipment and/or real property for the Fayetteville Campus.

The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by tuition and fee revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to E&G debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an E&G bond issue of up to \$34.175 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent.

In accordance with board policy, any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, which are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October 2010. The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville will sustain a building maintenance fund to be supported by tuition and fee revenue for the E&G facilities. These funds will be held in a separate account for the maintenance of the new facilities by transferring annually to plant funds based on the Association of Physical Plant

Administrators (APPA) of Universities and Colleges recommendation. The current APPA recommendation is \$2.50 per gross square foot for E&G facilities.

The renovation, acquisition, construction, furnishing and equipping of the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Building portion of the project of the educational and general issue will not provide additional square footage to the campus. The acquisition of property portion of the of the E&G issue will provide additional square footage to the campus of 73,886. Therefore, based on an estimate of 73,886 new square footage for all projects, \$184,715 will be transferred annually beginning in the fiscal year after the projects are placed into service.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville issue bonds not to exceed \$34.175 million with a term not to exceed thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

### ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS COMMUNITY COLLEGE AT MORRILTON

The University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton (UACCM) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$12 million with a maximum term of thirty-two (32) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on March 12-13, 2024.

The E&G issue will be up to \$12 million with a maximum annual debt service of \$827,575 and a term of thirty-two (32) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used for (1) the acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Nursing and Science Center, and (2) the acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of other capital improvements and infrastructure and the acquisition of various equipment and/or real property for UACCM.

The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by tuition and fee revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to E&G debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an E&G bond issue of up to \$12 million with a term of thirty-two (32) years at an estimated annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent.

In accordance with board policy, any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, which are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October 2010. The University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton will sustain a building maintenance fund to be supported by tuition and fee revenue for the E&G facilities. These funds will be held in a separate account for the maintenance of the new facilities by transferring annually to plant funds based on the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) of Universities and Colleges recommendation. The current APPA recommendation is \$2.50 per gross square foot for E&G facilities.

The E&G issue will provide a two-story 36,000 sq foot building for the Nursing and Science Center that will feature seven science labs and classrooms, ten nursing labs and classrooms, and two student lounges to be used for studying. The new construction will provide space for the addition of multiple new programs including Certified Medication Assistant, Paramedics, Respiratory Therapists, Medical Office Technology Assistant, and Medical Clinical Assistant. Therefore, based on an estimate of 36,000 new square footage for the building, \$90,000 will be transferred annually beginning in the fiscal year after the projects are placed into service.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton to issue bonds not to exceed \$12 million with a term not to exceed thirty-two (32) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 5.50 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

### ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUE ARKANSAS TECH UNIVERSITY

Arkansas Tech University (ATU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$10.4 million with a maximum term of fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.0 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes and auxiliary renovations supported by tuition and fee revenue. The Arkansas Tech University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on December 14, 2023.

The E&G issue will be up to \$10.4 million with a maximum annual debt service of \$1,151,958 and a term of fifteen (15) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used for the renovation of an educational building, elevator replacement, and HVAC infrastructure in ten (10) of our buildings on the Russellville campus. These projects will include an HVAC infrastructure project on an athletic building and two HVAC infrastructure projects on residence life buildings. While there are auxiliary buildings included, the bond will use the student tuition and fee as the revenue source.

The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by tuition and fee revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to E&G debt service.

The above data demonstrates that Arkansas Tech University has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an E&G bond issue of up to \$10.4 million with a term of fifteen (15) years at an estimated annual interest rate of approximately 7.0 percent.

Any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October of 2010. The projects contemplated herein do not provide additional square footage to the campus.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board

considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas Tech University issue bonds not to exceed \$10.4 million with a term not to exceed fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate of approximately 7.0 percent as requested by the institution for various E&G projects and auxiliary renovations.

### ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE IN RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGY ARKANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY NEWPORT

The following resolution is presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board for consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology (CIP 51.0911), at Arkansas State University Newport, effective Fall 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of Arkansas State University Newport and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University System of the approval.

### ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE IN RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGY ARKANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY NEWPORT

The administration of Arkansas State University Newport (ASUN) and Board of Trustees of the Arkansas State University System request approval to offer the Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology, effective Fall 2024.

ASUN is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The Arkansas State University System Board of Trustees approved the program on December 8, 2023.

#### **Program Description**

The proposed Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology program supports the mission of Arkansas State University Newport by providing affordable, accessible, and innovative learning opportunities that transform lives and strengthen the regional economy. Based on local industry requests, the proposed program is designed to prepare students for immediate and future workforce needs.

The proposed 65 credit-hour, 5 semester program in Radiologic Technology will prepare students for the American Registry of Radiologic Technology (ARRT) Certification exam by educating students on the operation of imaging or radiation therapy equipment and the preparation of patients for these imaging studies. Students completing this program will earn the Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology, as well as the existing Certificate of Proficiency and Technical Certificate in Pre-Health Professions. Potential earnings of graduates within the area surrounding ASUN are approximately \$52,000 per year.

Students will be admitted to the Radiologic Technology program once every two years. One full-time faculty member will be hired and will serve as the lead instructor of the proposed program. No additional equipment or resources will be purchased. Future grant opportunities will be explored to assist with the expansion of the program.

#### **Program Need**

Labor Market Information, provided by ADHE for the area of Arkansas defined by Jackson, Independence, White, Woodruff, Lawrence, Craighead, Poinsett, and Cross counties, shows that there are currently 65 online job postings for Radiologic Technologist/Technicians with 542 postings statewide. Additionally in the same area of AR, this field has shown a 2.4% annual growth rate over the past 5 years and is projected to grow 0.4% annually for the next 10 years, compared to a statewide annual growth rate of 1.5% over the past 5 years and 0.1% annually for the next 10 years.

A recent survey of current ASUN health profession students revealed a large interest in the proposed Associate of Applied Science in Radiologic Technology program. Furthermore, a survey of local employers was conducted, and results show that they are struggling to find Radiologic Technologists to fill their vacancies. Local industry partners/employers contacted ASUN to seek the possibility of offering a radiology program to help fill the current and future vacancies. Presently, to rectify their shortages, one employer is utilizing an online, out-of-state institution.

#### **Program Expenditures and Funding**

One full-time, 12-month faculty member will be hired and will serve as lead instructor of the Radiologic Technology program. As enrollment increases, adjunct faculty will be hired to support instruction. The proposed program will use existing facilities and resources currently being utilized by other health profession programs. Students will use the equipment at the local clinic/hospital for learning purposes. Future plans include seeking grant monies for lab equipment to maximize hands-on learning.

Funding for the proposed program will come primarily from tuition and fees and general revenue. A special student lab fee of \$300 per semester will be acquired from students to help offset lab equipment needs.

#### **Program Duplication**

Associate-level degree programs in Radiologic Technology are offered at the Arkansas public institutions: East Arkansas Community College (66 miles away), North Arkansas College (146 miles away), National Park College (155 miles away), South Arkansas College (210 miles away), and Southeast Arkansas College (136 miles away). Bachelor-level programs are offered at Arkansas State University Jonesboro (41 miles away), University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (97 miles away), and the University of Central Arkansas (96 miles away).

ADHE received a formal objection to the proposed program from the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences on September 28, 2023. ASUN provided a formal response to the objection on September 28, 2023. All communications are included at the end of this summary.

#### **Program Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion, a student will be able to:

- 1. Apply appropriate positioning skills in the clinical facility.
- 2. Produce quality diagnostic images.
- 3. Account for certain technical factors that can degrade the quality of images.
- 4. Practice proper radiation protection.
- 5. Display effective written and oral communication.
- 6. Apply critical thinking ability in trauma situations.
- 7. Demonstrate the importance of ethical and professional behavior.

Good afternoon, Dr. Myers,

Thank you for your reply. We certainly understand the current need for radiologic technologists by healthcare institutions throughout the state and the response you are taking to address the needs of your industry partners. However, the availability of sites for the clinical education component of the curriculum of a radiography program, regardless of the degree or certificate awarded, remains the limiting factor to opening a new program. There are currently barely enough clinical sites for the ten existing programs in the state to ensure the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology (JRCERT) Standard 4, Objective 4.4 is met, which states, "The program provides timely, equitable, and educationally valid clinical experiences for all students." East Arkansas Community College (EACC), which is an AS degree program, and UAMS are just over an hour away from Newport, while ASU-Jonesboro is less than an hour away. We all utilize clinical sites in the area. If ASU-Newport accepts an annual cohort of 20 students, this would make it the largest Certificate/AS degree program in the state, and the third largest overall. Have you identified clinical sites in your area that will agree to take your students and not encroach on established programs should your request be approved?

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Fort Smith and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System of the approval.

### ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE IN NURSING UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS FORT SMITH

The administration of the University of Arkansas Fort Smith (UAFS) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Associate of Applied Science in Nursing, effective Fall 2024.

UAFS is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees will consider the program for approval on March 12-13, 2023.

#### **Program Description**

The proposed Associate of Applied Science in Nursing will prepare students for the NCLEX-RN examination necessary to become a Registered Nurse and will also allow current Licensed Practice Nurses to transition to the role of Registered Nurse. This program will support the mission of UAFS by contributing to economic growth and by directly addressing a local need.

The proposed 65 credit-hour program consists of 15 credit hours of general education, a 30 credit-hour nursing core, and 20 additional credit hours of courses that can serve as pre-requisites or co-requisites. The program also contains a total of 450 clock hours of laboratory and/or clinical experience.

Four full-time faculty and 3-4 adjunct instructors will be hired to teach in the proposed program. Current facilities will house the program while additional resources, equipment, and supplies will be purchased though funding received from a Windgate Foundation grant.

#### **Program Need**

Nursing is, and continues to be, a high-demand, high-wage, high-skill occupation for the area around Fort Smith and for the state of Arkansas. More than 200 current job openings exist for the Fort Smith region. This large number of vacancies is indicative of the struggle employers are facing when trying to fill the current need with an anticipated additional 150-280 openings over the next 2-5 years.

Representatives from two local hospitals, Baptist Health and Mercy Health, approached the administration of UAFS with their continued concerns of the nursing shortages in the area. Both hospitals have shown their commitment to overcoming this shortage by offering tuition assistance, extern positions, and clinical rotation space to the students enrolled in this program. Additionally, several letters of support were received by UAFS from other community members and local employers.

#### **Program Expenditures and Funding**

Four full-time, master-level faculty members, with a median salary of \$55,000, will be hired to teach in the proposed program as well as 3-4 adjunct instructors for clinical rotations. Program-specific library resources, supplies, and equipment will be purchased for a total of \$42,000 per year. This expenditure includes NCLEX test preparation and pinning/graduation ceremonies for students. Current facilities are adequate for housing the proposed program and therefore, no renovations are required at this time. Other expenses include accreditation fees that consist of both one-time and annual fees. These include an initial application fee of \$2,500, initial accreditation fees totaling \$12,000, and an annual fee of \$2,875.

Funding for the proposed Associate of Applied Science in Nursing program will come from both tuition and fees and from a 3 year, \$936,000 Windgate Foundation grant. Students enrolled in the program incur special fees totaling \$1,352.50 over the course of the program.

#### **Program Duplication**

Twenty-four Arkansas public institutions offer an Associate of Applied Science in Nursing. Four of the 24 programs are offered at 4-year universities and 20 are offered at 2-year colleges. These programs may use certain program specific courses as prerequisites or as corequisites. Total credit hours for these programs vary depending on the design but range from 60 to 77 credit hours.

#### **Program Learning Outcomes**

Upon completion of the program, students will be able to:

- Incorporate knowledge of the nursing process in the application of providing culturally sensitive, holistic, and compassionate care for clients across the lifespan.
- 2. Implement moral, ethical, and legal concepts in caring for the clients.
- 3. Integrate health promotion, prevention, and restoration in the nursing care of clients across the lifespan.
- 4. Demonstrate accountability and responsibility in a professional manner.
- 5. Use effective communication as an essential nursing skill.

# **Minutes of Meeting**

The January 26, 2024, regular meeting of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was held at National Park College in Hot Springs. Chair Graycen Bigger called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m., with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, ADHE staff and guests were also present.

Chair Bigger began by welcoming new AHECB members Dr. Katherine Dudley and Heather Maxey to their first Coordinating Board meeting. She then welcomed Representative Richard McGrew and Gary Troutman, president and CEO of the Greater Hot Springs Chamber of Commerce and Hot Springs Metro Partnership.

Chair Bigger introduced former AHECB member, Al Brodell and presented him with a plaque for his years of dedicated service to the Coordinating Board.

Next, Chair Bigger called on President John Hogan for a welcome. Dr. Hogan began by welcoming Coordinating Board members to National Park College (NPC) and then shared information about NPC. He noted that NPC earned a perfect score on their Higher Learning Commission (HLC) regional accreditation visit, in November of 2021.

# Agenda Item No. 1 Annual Higher Education Financial Condition Report

Nick Fuller presented the Annual Higher Education Financial Condition Report. The purpose of this report is to describe the financial condition as well as the difficulties and challenges experienced by Arkansas's Public Institutions of Higher Education. It is recommended that ADHE continue to work with institutions to monitor and refine the Productivity Funding Model policies to ensure adequate funding is available to meet

student needs, innovation is encouraged, and that the policies continue to respond to attainment goals and priorities of the state. AHECB, ADHE and institutions of higher education work with the legislature toward alignment of institutional funding policies, state financial aid policies, and tuition policies in a way that prioritizes higher education affordability.

Dr. Jim Carr asked what the starting salary for K-12 teachers is for this year. Fuller said he did not know. The SREB data is still lagging.

# Agenda Item No. 2 Maintenance Report

The AHECB policy for maintenance of new facilities passed October 29, 2010, states that a report on the amount transferred to plant funds would be presented annually at the October Board meeting. This policy was proposed to ensure that in the future, all newly constructed or purchased facilities would have a source of funding for maintenance of the new facility. Institutions seeking approval of a loan or a bond issue for the construction or purchase of a new facility must provide for the maintenance of that facility by transferring annually to plant funds an amount as recommended by the Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges (APPA). This is currently \$2.50 per gross square foot for an educational and general facility or \$1.25 per gross square foot for an auxiliary facility. A lower rate per gross square foot for a specific building/facility can be approved with appropriate justification.

There were no questions.

# Agenda Item No. 3 Institutional Personnel Recommendations

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, and line-item maximum salaries for all non-classified administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education have been reviewed, and changes are recommended.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 27,022 positions currently authorized. For the 2024-25 Fiscal Year, institutions requested an increase of 129 positions and the deletion of 112 positions, for a net new request of 17 positions. ADHE staff recommends this net increase of 17 positions, for a total recommendation of 27,039 positions (a 0.1 percent increase). UAMS currently has 11,974 authorized positions and their submission for changes reflects a net zero (0) change. ADHE staff recommends the current level of 11,974 positions.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, and maximum

salaries for non-classified positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2024-25 fiscal year as recommended by staff.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board requests the Commissioner to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2024-25 fiscal year.

There were no questions.

Lucas Pointer moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 3 to the full Board for consideration. Heather Maxey seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

# Agenda Item No. 4 Master of Music in Music Education Arkansas Tech University

The proposed self-paced, 100% online Master of Music in Music Education program is designed to allow currently employed music educators to further their education, while maintaining employment in their current K-12 teaching position. The proposed program reflects a practice-oriented curriculum emphasizing the extension of specialized performance and pedagogy competencies for music teachers.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Master of Music in Music Education (CIP 13.1312) at Arkansas Tech University, effective Summer 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the approval.

Dr. Jeff Bright, head of the Department of Music and Professor of Music, presented additional background information.

Chair Bigger said that after digging into this proposal, she did not find any formal letters of support and asked who the survey respondents were. She also noted that 36% of survey respondents said they are not interested in a graduate program.

Dr. Bright said most of the respondents were ATU alumni that are interested in the program.

Chair Bigger asked if schools are asking for more teachers with a master's degree and are they having problems finding them. Dr. Bright said he believes the rural schools are having problems finding highly qualified teachers.

Dr. Jim Carr said he had reservations until he read that the entire program is only going to cost \$6500. Dr. Bright said that is correct.

Commissioner warden commended Dr. Bright and ATU for finding a low-cost way to support a graduate degree program by using existing faculty and resources.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 4 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Jim Carr seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Dr. Patricia Poulter, UCA Provost and Executive Vice President of Academic Affairs, congratulated Dr. Bright on the program's approval and stated that the program approval process worked exactly like it should. UCA was able to raise concerns about this program and Dr. Bright was able to successfully address them.

# Agenda Item No. 5 Master of Science in Counseling Arkansas Tech University

The proposed, 60 credit-hour Master of Science in Counseling provides graduate-level instruction in counseling theory, individual and group facilitation skills, psychopharmacologic and psychiatric rehabilitation, research and assessment competencies, ethics, evidence-based decision making, diversity, equity, inclusion and social justice practices. Additionally, students are required to complete a 100 clock-hour preprofessional practicum with 40 direct client contact hours and a 600 clock-hour pre-professional internship with 240 direct client contact hours.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Master of Science in Counseling (CIP 42.2899) at Arkansas Tech University, effective Summer 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the approval.

Dr. Tim Carter, Dean; Dr. Erica Wondolowski, Program Director, and Associate Professor of Rehabilitation Science; and Dr. Robert Stevens, Graduate Coordinator and Associate Professor of Rehabilitation Science, presented additional background information.

Dr. Jim Carr voiced concerns over the number of institutions in Arkansas that already provide a similar program, including the University of Arkansas. Carr asked if there is a need for a sixth program in Arkansas.

Dr. Carter said he believes there is a need. He said he is concerned about the shortage areas.

Dr. Carr asked if there was anyone from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville that would like to address the board.

Dr. Terry Martin, UAF Provost, said he did not believe ATU's response addressed their concerns. Dr. Carter said he does believe the need for these positions will increase within the next eight years.

Commissioner Warden said that it is extremely difficult to recruit individuals with these credentials. He said having lived in the river valley area most of his life, he knows there is a shortage there.

Chair Bigger said the full program did receive several letters of support.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 5 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded, and the committee approved with Dr. Jim Carr opposed.

Agenda Item No. 6
Technical Certificate in Skilled Trades
Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Construction & HVAC
Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Electrical & Plumbing
Ozarka College

The administration and Board of Trustees of Ozarka College (OZC) request approval to offer the Technical Certificate in Skilled Trades, Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Construction & HVAC, and the Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Electrical & Plumbing, effective Fall 2024. Ozarka College is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The Ozarka College Board of Trustees approved the program on September 25, 2023.

The proposed, 30 credit-hour Technical Certificate in Skilled Trades incorporates basic skills in HVAC, Electrical, Plumbing, and General Construction. It is designed to help students become more qualified for entry-level positions in the above-mentioned areas, thus giving them a competitive advantage. The program will help expand the strategic initiatives of the Ozarka College by providing a robust variety of job-ready training opportunities that meet the needs of the College's educational and industry partners in its communities.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Technical Certificate in Skilled Trades (CIP 46.0000), Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Construction & HVAC (CIP

46.0000), and the Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Electrical & Plumbing (CIP 46.0000) at Ozarka College, effective Fall 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Ozarka College of the approval.

Dr. Chris Lorch, Provost, provided additional information.

Chair Bigger noted that in her role as an Economic Development partner to Ozarka College's Ashflat campus, she provided a letter of recommendation for this program.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 6 to the full Board for consideration. Carolyn Rhinehart seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 7
Certificate of Proficiency and Technical Certificate
in Automotive/Diesel Mechanics
University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain

The administration and Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain (UACCRM) request approval to offer the Technical Certificate in Automotive/Diesel Mechanics, Certificate of Proficiency in Brakes, Suspension, and Steering, Certificate of Proficiency in Electrical Systems and Engine Performance, and the Certificate of Proficiency in Engine Repair and Climate Control, effective Fall 2024. The University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on November 15, 2023.

The proposed program intends to provide the necessary education and skills training for a student to gain employment in the area of automotive/diesel mechanics. This program will offer students four credentials, two 8 credit-hour Certificates of Proficiency, a 12 credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency, and a 31 credit-hour Technical Certificate. The embedded structure of this curriculum is designed to encourage employment at the earliest opportunity possible. The proposed program will also be incorporated in the career center offerings for concurrent students.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Technical Certificate in Automotive/Diesel Mechanics (CIP 47.0600), Certificate of Proficiency in Brakes, Suspension, and Steering (CIP 47.0600), Certificate of Proficiency in Electrical Systems and Engine Performance (CIP 47.0600), and the Certificate of Proficiency in Engine Repair and Climate Control (CIP 47.0600) at the University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain, effective Fall 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System of the approval.

Dr. Krystal Thrailkill, Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs, provided additional information.

Chair Bigger asked if the proposal included any salary information for potential graduates. Dr. Thrailkill said the salary would range from \$28,000 to \$59,000.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 7 to the full Board for consideration. Carolyn Rhinehart seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 8
Technical Certificate in Paramedic
University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain

The administration and Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain (UACCRM) request approval to offer the Technical Certificate in Paramedic, effective Fall 2024. The University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on November 15, 2023.

The proposed Technical Certificate in Paramedic will train professionals to provide advanced emergency medical care for patients in need of emergent treatment. The certificate program will prepare students with the complex knowledge and skills needed to provide all stages of patient care to link the patient at the scene of an incident with the nearest medical center.

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Technical Certificate in Paramedic (CIP 51.0904) at the University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain, effective Fall 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College Rich Mountain and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System of the approval.

Dr. Kyle Carpenter, Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, provided additional information.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if UACCRM partners with any hospitals. Dr. Carpenter said they work with the Mena Regional Health Systems and Healthy Connections.

Chair Bigger commented that one of the largest employers in the county is an ambulance service. Dr. Carpenter said the ambulance service has widespread reach and services five counties.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 8 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

# Agenda Item No. 9 Institutional Certification Advisory Committee

**RESOLVED,** That pursuant to A.C.A. §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board grants initial certification to the institutions listed on pages 1 - 2 to offer the specified degree programs to Arkansas residents for a period of three years through December 31, 2027.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the administration of said institutions that the certification of the degree programs requires the institution to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education whenever any of the following occurs: (1) major reorganization of the controlling body; (2) changes in the charter or incorporation documents of the institution; or (3) changes in the method of operation of the institution's programs in Arkansas.

#### Institutional Changes

Arkadelphia native and longtime higher education administrator Dr. Trey Berry was appointed Henderson State University's next chancellor, effective Jan. 1, 2024.

The American Association of State Colleges and Universities announced that Dr. Chuck Welch will become its new president and chief executive officer effective Jan. 15, 2024.

The Arkansas State University System Board of Trustees voted to name Dr. Robin Myers, chancellor emeritus at ASU-Mountain Home, to serve as interim system president effective Jan. 15. Myers, who retired in July after 11 years as chancellor of ASU-Mountain Home, will not be a candidate for the permanent position.

Dr. Jerry Thomas has been selected as the new Southern Arkansas University Tech chancellor, effective January 10, 2024. Thomas is currently the vice president for academic affairs at National Park College.

Steven Bloomberg has been hired as chancellor of the Kern Community College District in California and will leave SEARK after six years as the president.

Southeast Arkansas College Provost Stacy Pfluger will take over as interim president after Steven Bloomberg steps down from the full-time role Feb. 16.

### Concurrent Report Update

Mason Campbell explained that in Spring of 2023, ADHE partnered with Complete College America to pull together a state-wide concurrent enrollment stakeholder group to evaluate policies and practices and to develop a menu of potential state policy recommendations that might broaden access to high quality concurrent enrollment. The full report is available on the ADHE website. *FAFSA Update* 

Alisha Lewis explained that the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form is an application for federal student aid. You need to complete the FAFSA form to apply for federal student aid such as federal grants, work-study funds, and loans. Completing and submitting the FAFSA form is free and easier than ever, and it gives

you access to federal student aid—the largest source of aid— to help you pay for college or career/trade school. Several states and colleges use your FAFSA information to determine your eligibility for state and school aid. Some private aid providers may use your FAFSA information to determine whether you qualify for their aid.

Lewis said the new FAFSA form that was released in December 2023, had several technical issues that are delaying the application process and preventing colleges and universities from sending aid packages to students. ADHE is currently working with institutions to conditionally award students that are having issues completing the FAFSA.

# Agenda Item No. 17 Annual Report on Institutional Certification

Alana Colburn presented an update on the number of Arkansas residents pursuing academic degrees offered by out-of-state and for-profit institutions certified to operate in Arkansas under Arkansas Code Annotated §6-61-301.

Boles reported that in 2022-23, 9 Arkansas campuses, 33 institutions with programs delivered only through distance technology, 5 institutions offering programs both on Arkansas campuses and through distance technology and 4 institutions offering programs only on an Arkansas campus, were certified under ICAC rules.

There were no questions.

# Agenda Item No. 18 Report on Academic Program Viability

Mason Campbell presented a summary report on academic programs reviewed by the institutions for program viability purposes. ADHE staff annually identify existing certificate and degree programs that do not meet AHECB program viability standards. New certificates and associate degrees will be identified for program viability standards after three years, and bachelor's degrees and above will be identified after five years.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if a non-viable program is resubmitted by an institution, do they have to re-submit a program proposal as well. Mason Campbell said they do. If an institution deletes a program for any reason, they will have to go through the new program process.

Chair Bigger said she is glad that staff are reviewing these programs on an annual basis.

Agenda Item No. 19
Minimum Core Curriculum of High School Courses
Recommended for Preparation for Higher Education

Mason Campbell reported that in 1989, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopted the Minimum Core of High School Courses Recommended for Higher

Education as mandated by A.C.A. § 6-61-217. The Board has since revised the list of high school courses, as allowed by A.C.A. § 6-61-217.

The intent of this agenda item is to align the minimum core of high school courses recommended for preparation for college with current college mathematics pathways. Changes in both higher education and high school mathematics course options merit this revision.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the revision of the Minimum Core Curriculum of High School Courses Recommended for Higher Education adopted on January 2024.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board directs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to consult with the Secretary of Education and State Board of Education to distribute to students in the public schools of Arkansas as provided by A.C.A. 6-61-217.

Dr. Jim Carr questioned whether the board could strongly encourage all high school seniors to take the most rigorous course work they can instead of the minimum. He noted that statistics show the more rigorous courses students take in high school, the better their ACT and SAT scores are.

Commissioner Warden commented that the LEARNS pathway group is developing a career ready pathway where a high school diploma and a career diploma are both challenging. Warden recognized Ross White, the director of Career and Technical Education, for the work they are doing as well.

Carolyn Rhinehart moved to approve Agenda Item No. 18. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

# Agenda Item No. 20 Fall Annual Enrollment Report

Sonia Hazelwood presented summary and detailed information about annual student enrollment. She noted the total unduplicated headcount for the fall 2023 term in all sectors of Arkansas higher education, including public universities, public colleges, private/independent colleges and universities, and nursing schools was 150,786 students, representing an increase of 2.0% from the fall 2022 term. Fall headcount is slowly recovering from the considerable drop in headcount caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, but still has not reached the pre-pandemic headcount of 156,069 reported in fall 2019. Of the 150,786 students enrolled in fall 2023, 1,531 students enrolled at more than one Arkansas institution, which represents 1% of the total fall 2023 headcount.

Dr. Jerry Cash asked if 12 hours defined a full-time student. Sonia Hazelwood said to calculate a fall term FTE, 15 hours are used for undergraduates and 12 hours for graduate students.

Dr. Katherine Dudley asked if there were any theories or data that show why Arkansas has continued to trend downward. Commissioner Warden said Arkansas' numbers are consistent with national statistics.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER

#### **Annual Trustees Conference**





The 2024 Trustees Conference convened on March 26, at the University of Arkansas - Pulaski Technical College in North Little Rock with remarks by Commissioner Ken Warden and Secretary of Education Jacob Oliva. Warden thanked the Governing Board members from all over the state for participating in the conference. In addition to board members, conference attendees included presidents and chancellors, as well as administrators from state and independent institutions.

The conference also featured presentations from Robert McGough with the Department of Information Services, Thomas Pennington with Arkansas Tech University, Tony Williams with the Arkansas Student Loan Authority, Mike Rogers, Arkansas' Chief Workforce Officer, and ADHE presenters Dr. Tina Moore, Nick Fuller and Blake Cannon.

Robert McGough discussed data-driven approaches to education and workforce alignment. McGough identified the need for data resources to assess skills gaps and support alignment of academic programs with workforce needs.

Thomas Pennington presented information on legal issues and higher education governing boards. He highlighted new anticipated regulations implementing Title IX on college campuses, recent changes to the Freedom of Information Act, and the political uses of social media.

Hosted by ADHE, the Trustees Conference assists institutions in providing legislative mandated training for the trustees of public institutions of higher education.






# **Career Pathways Initiative**

Effective July 1, CPI will implement a more focused effort on providing services to students enrolled in Adult Education programs. In this partnership, Adult Ed will continue to provide training and CPI will provide supportive services such as tuition costs, childcare and transportation in the same manner that college enrolled students receive.

#### **Spring CTE Coordinator Retreat**





Coordinators and state staff responsible for oversight of the Carl D. Perkis Career and Technical Education program met jointly on March 13-14. Primary points of discussion included plans for updating and submitting the Perkins State Plan, identification of potential projects using joint funding between high schools and colleges, and a review of data and proposed performance targets. Professional development was provided to increase the number of students enrolling in nontraditional fields, special populations, and underperforming student groups.

### **Carl D. Perkins Program**

The Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006 (Perkins IV) provides a renewed vision of career and technical education programs for the 21st century. The Act envisions that all students will achieve challenging academic and technical standards and be prepared for high skill, high wage, or high demand occupations in current or emerging professions. Perkins IV provides an increased focus on academic achievement of career and technical education students, increases state and local accountability, and strengthens the connections between secondary and postsecondary education.

Perkins hosted the Facilitating Career Development course for Career Coaches in the fall semester of 2022. There were over 40 individuals that completed the course. Perkins plans to host another course in the fall of 2023. The Perkins Spring meeting was held at Four Points in March in conjunction with Career and Technical Education, which included secondary and postsecondary coordinators. Dr. Warden shared his vision of Perkins in the state.

# **Academic Affairs Officers Meet to Discuss Academic Policies**

On April 4, ADHE staff members welcomed Chief Academic Officers (CAO) and Chief Student Affairs Officers (CSAO) via zoom to discuss numerous issues including academic program changes, minors and concentrations, productivity funding, placement plans as well as the concurrent programs. The CAO/CSAO quarterly meetings assemble a comprehensive list of the most effective policies, programs and practices that can be employed on our campuses to foster greater student success.

# ANNUAL REPORT ON FIRST-YEAR STUDENT REMEDIATION

\_\_\_\_\_

In accordance with A.C.A. §6-61-110 and Act 970 of 2009, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) addresses the placement standards necessary for enrollment of students into mathematics, English composition, and reading based on appropriate indicators of potential student success rates.

In January 2016, the AHECB revised its policy to require all institutions to adopt appropriate placement measures supported by student success data. These placement measures are to be contained within an institutional placement plan that provides appropriate justification for student course placement and allows for follow-up evaluation of placement effectiveness. Institutional placement plans are required to be submitted to ADHE on an annual basis. These plans can be provided to the Board upon request.

### **Course Placement Method**

Course placement of a student is determined by the institution based on its ADHE approved placement policy. Each institution establishes a matrix of assessment measures to evaluate the preparedness or readiness of students for gateway courses in English, math, and reading.

Measures for establishing readiness of students may include one or more of the following for each subject area:

- Standardized and normed exams (ACT, SAT, Accuplacer, etc.)
- High school academic performance (GPA, coursework, etc.)
- · Assessment of student motivation to succeed
- Writing samples (English)
- Other measures supported by sufficient analysis of predicted student success

A student's placement should indicate potential for success at a "C" or better in the course in which a student is placed. The evaluation of the institution's placement measures should reflect a better than 75% student success rate.


ACT benchmarks establish a subject test score of 22 for reading or math and a subject test score of 18 for English as cutoff scores for student success. Institutions are encouraged to use more than one measure if the ACT or ACT-equivalent is below 22 to ensure that students are placed at the appropriate course level.


Based on years of national research and on findings from the research conducted by the Center for the Analysis of Postsecondary Readiness (CAPR) and ADHE, overall high school GPA is the best predictor of student performance in college. These studies also show that increasing student access to college-level courses improves student outcomes. Though colleges may implement these practices at their own discretion, ADHE encourages institutions to adhere to recommendations issued regarding the implementation of Multiple Measure Assessment (MMA).


# Overview of First-time Entering, Degree Seeking Students


This section seeks to provide an overview of the 21,510 first-time entering, degreeseeking students who graduated high school in 2021 or 2022 and enrolled in an Arkansas public institution of higher education in AY2023.

Of this population, 91% were classified as full-time students and 9% were classified as part-time students. With regards to sex, 56% were female, 44% were male, and less than 1% percent did not report. When examining the institution type, 70% of this population enrolled at a four-year institution compared to 30% enrolled at a two-year institution. Lastly, remediation status of all first-time entering students, 62% did not require remediation while 38% did require remedial coursework.












Of the 21,510 first-time entering, degree seeking students who graduated high school in 2022 or 2021, 72% of these students reside in Arkansas. The other 28% reside out-of-state as depicted in the chart below.



The following chart illustrates a summary of the total population of first-time entering, degree-seeking students who graduated high school in 2021 or 2022 by race/ethnicity. White students represent 66%, Black students represent 13%, and Hispanic students represent 11% of the total population.



The overall high school grade point average (GPA), as reported by the public institutions in Arkansas, for the 21,510 first-time entering, degree-seeking students who graduated high school in 2021 or 2022 is shown in the following pie graph. As shown, 17,180 students, or 80%, have a GPA of 3.0 or higher.







Of the 8,106 remediated students, 89% were classified as full-time students and 11% were classified as part-time students. With regards to sex, 60% were female and 40% were male. When examining the institution type, 62% of this population enrolled at a four-year institution compared to 38% enrolled at a two-year institution. Lastly, 92% graduated high school in 2022 while 8% graduated in 2021.











Of the 8,106 students requiring remediation, 73% of these students reside in Arkansas. The other 27% reside out-of-state as depicted in the chart below.



The chart below illustrates a summary of the remediated population of first-time entering, degree-seeking students who graduated high school in 2021 or 2022 by race/ethnicity. White students represent 55%, Black students represent 21%, and Hispanic students represent 14% of the total population.



Rates comparing the remediation population to the total population by race/ethnicity can be found in the following table. As shown, White students represent a lower remediation rate at 31% when compared to the percentage of White students in the total population of 21,510 students. Likewise, Black, Hispanic, and Non-Resident Alien represent a higher remediation rate at 62%, 47%, and 52%, respectively.






Many models are used to deliver remedial coursework to students such as corequisite, gateway remedial, non-gateway remedial, or a combination of these models. Corequisite courses combine both the remedial coursework and the gateway coursework into one course or as a supplemental course to a gateway course taken in the same term. Gateway courses are considered the first college-level course a student completes in a particular subject area. However, gateway remedial courses are standalone remedial courses that allow a student to go into a college-level course in the subject upon successful completion. Non-gateway courses are any remedial courses taken as a prerequisite to another remedial course.

The following chart depicts the breakdown of these different models of remediation. As shown, at 67%, corequisite courses are the dominant model of remediation offered in the state.



The chart and table below show the enrollment for each remedial subject, or combination of subjects, by remediation model type. Although math is the most common subject of remediation, the majority of students are enrolled in a corequisite model which allows students to earn college credit while being remediated.









Act 970 of 2009 requires the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to report the number of first-time entering students who require remediation and have a high school GPA of 3.0 or higher. The following pie chart describes the analysis of GPA in ½ point ranges where 5,446 students, or 67%, required remediation and had a GPA of 3.0 or higher.







Current policy allows institutions to place students based on multiple measures. This includes the use of standardized, normed exams such as ACT, which is also the most commonly reported and used placement measure. The following line chart shows the ACT score ranges for students placed in remedial coursework. As shown, the 16-18 range is the most common score range for both the composite score and math subject score of remediated students.












# ANNUAL REPORT ON STUDENT RETENTION AND GRADUATION FOR ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION

Statewide student retention and graduation rates for students entering Arkansas higher education institutions are presented in this report for both public 4-Year and 2-Year institutions, and private/independent institutions. The Arkansas Higher Education Information System (AHEIS) enables multi-year student retention and graduation tracking in compliance with Student-Right-to-Know legislation and Act 267 of 1989.

#### **Statewide Retention**

The retention calculations for the 4-year institutions are based on students in a fall term cohort of first-time entering, full-time, bachelor-seeking students who returned the fall term of the next academic year. For 2-year colleges, students who returned the next fall, as well as those who completed a credential by the next fall are included as part of the retention rate. The methodology used for this report closely aligns with IPEDS reporting.

The following represents the overall retention rate for the five most recent cohorts for both public sectors. The state's fall-to-fall retention rate of 74.7% for the Fall 2022 cohort had an increase of 2.1% over the Fall 2021 cohort.




Chart 16.1: Student Retention Rates by Sector




Chart 16.2: Student Retention Rates by Gender




Chart 16.3: Student Retention Rates by Remediated Students




Chart 16.4: Student Retention Rates by 4-Year Institution




Chart 16.5: Student Retention Rates by 4-Year Institution




Chart 16.6: Student Retention Rates by 4-Year Institution




Chart 16.7: Student Retention Rates by Institution – 2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.8: Student Retention Rates by Institution – 2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.9: Student Retention Rates by Institution –2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.10: Student Retention Rates by Institution –2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.11: Student Retention Rates by Institution –2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.12: Student Retention Rates by Institution –2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.13: Student Retention Rates by Institution – Private Institutions




Chart 16.14: Student Retention Rates by Institution – Private Institutions




Chart 16.15: Student Retention Rates by Institution – Private Institutions




Chart 16.16: Graduation Rates - 4-Year Public Institution Trend




Chart 16.17: Graduation Rates - 4-Year Private/Independent Institution Trend




Chart 16.18: Graduation Rates - 4-Year Institutions by Gender




Chart 16.19: 150% Graduation Rates 4-Year institutions




Chart 16.20: 150% Graduation Rates 4-Year institutions




Chart 16.21: 150% Graduation Rates 2-Year Colleges




Chart 16.22 Graduation Rates 2-Year Associate Cohorts




Chart 16.23 Graduation Rates 2-Year Associate Cohorts




Chart 16.24 Graduation Rates 2-Year Associate Cohorts




Chart 16.25 Graduation Rates 2-Year Associate Cohorts




Chart 16.26: Graduation Rates by Private Institution

In addition to retention and graduation rates, this report provides data on all athletic participation by sport and scholarship status.

# Methodology

The methodology used in this report closely follows the methodology used in the Annual Report on Student Retention and Graduation. The retention calculations are based on fall-to-fall comparisons of the student-athletes in the cohort of first-time in college, full-time, and credential-seeking students from the fall term only. A student is considered retained if they returned to the same institution in the fall term of the next academic year.

Graduation rate calculations use the same cohort of first-time in college, full-time, credential-seeking students from the fall term. The graduation rates presented here include a 100% rate representing those graduating with a Bachelor's degree in four years, which is considered graduating 'on time', and a 150% graduation rate representing student-athletes graduating with a Bachelor's degree in six years.

The methodology used herein is not meant to and does <u>not</u> correspond with the NCAA GSR (Graduation Success Rate) methodology each institution is required to report to the NCAA.

### **Participation Overview**

In Academic Year 2022-23, 4,120 students participated in athletics at ten universities and nine 2-year colleges. This is the second most student-athletes ever reported for an academic year. This is a decrease of 12 student-athletes over the 2021-22 academic year, including 751 student-athletes reported by nine 2-year colleges.

Sports included in student-athlete reporting are Football, Men's Basketball, Women's Basketball, Baseball, Track/Cross Country, Golf, Swimming, Tennis, Volleyball, Soccer, Softball, and an Other Sports category that includes student-athletes from all other sports.




Chart 17.1: Athletic Participation by Academic Year

The number of student-athletes participating in football leads the way with 1,029 reported for the 2022-23 academic year. Softball had the largest increase in participation when compared to the 2021-2022 academic year.




Chart 17.2: Athletes by Sport - Detailed




Chart 17.3: Athletes by Sport - Detailed

From academic year 2018-2019 to academic year 2022-2023, the Other Sports category participation ranged between 60 and 211 student-athletes.




Chart 17.4: Athletes by Sport - Detailed

Many students receive scholarships to participate in athletics. The following graph illustrates the majority of students receive a partial scholarship, 2,438 of 4,120 student-athletes (59.2%), while only 589 (14.3%) receive a full scholarship.




Chart 17.5: Athletes by Scholarship

The University of Central Arkansas reported the most student-athletes with the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville reporting the second largest number of athletes for the 2022-23 academic year.




Chart 17.6: Athletes by Institution








Chart 17.9: Retention Rate of Athletes by Institution




Chart 17.10: Retention Rate of Athletes by Institution

For our 2-year colleges, NWACC had the highest student-athlete retention rate of 80.0% of their Fall 2022 cohort to Fall 2023.




Chart 17.11: Retention Rate of Athletes by Institution




Chart 17.12: Retention Rate of Athletes by Institution

#### STUDENT-ATHLETE GRADUATION RATES

The graduation rate calculations for student-athletes are based on the same methodology as the other graduation report. First-time in college, student-athletes enrolled for the first time define the cohorts. The chart below shows the graduation rate progression for three cohorts for the 4-year universities. Due to the varying sizes of the entering student-athlete cohorts each year, graduation rates for athletes tend to fluctuate more than rates of non-athletes. Graduating in four years (100%) is considered graduating on time for a Bachelor's degree.




Chart 17.13: 100% Graduation Rates of Athletes by Institution




Chart 17.14: 100% Graduation Rates of Athletes by Institution

UAF and ASU reported a six-year (150%) graduation rate of 60.2% and 57.4% respectively.




Chart 17.15: 150% Graduation Rates of Athletes by Institution




Chart 17.16: 150% Graduation Rates of Athletes by Institution

# ARKANSAS HEALTH EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM REQUEST FOR CONTRACT INCREASE

Arkansas Division of Higher Education administers a grant program for Arkansas students and a forgivable loan program to assist Arkansas students attending specified out-of-state health and medical professional schools. This grant program is known as the "Arkansas Health Education Grant (ARHEG) Program. In accordance with Arkansas Code 6-81-1101, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) is authorized to enter into direct contracts with selected accredited schools of dentistry, optometry, and veterinary medicine, along with podiatry, chiropractic, or osteopathy which do not participate in the program, if the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board determines that the needs of the state are not being met by institutions participating in the program. Currently, there are 13 Chiropractic slots in the ARHEG program. The Arkansas Chiropractic Physicians Association (ACPA) has requested the scholarship be increased to \$10,000 each while the 13 ARHEG slots remain the same. This is to better incentivize students into the professional program of Chiropractic care.

**RESOLVED,** That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, authorizes the increase of the scholarship to \$10,000 of the chiropractic slots in the Arkansas Health Education Grant (ARHEG) Program. FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Division of Higher Education to send a copy of this resolution to the Arkansas Chiropractic Physicians Association (ACPA).

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Future Grant Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Arkansas Future Grant Program.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Future Grant Program rules be approved for public comment release.

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS FUTURE GRANT PROGRAM Effective Date:

### POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Future Grant Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. 6-82-1801 ET. Seq.

# 1.00 PROGRAM DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education, approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program, and that is:
  - 1.01.1 (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
  - 1.01.2 (B) A state-supported technical institute; or
  - 1.01.3 (C) An approved state-supported school of nursing; or
  - 1.01.4 (D) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university.
- 1.02 "Approved state-supported school of nursing" means a state-supported school of nursing with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that:
  - 1.02.1 (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
  - 1.02.2 (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
  - 1.02.3 (C) Is eligible to participate in the federal student aid programs of the Higher Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. § 1070 et seq.;
  - 1.02.4 (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
  - 1.02.5 (E) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program; and

- 1.02.6 (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- 1.03 "Federal student financial assistance" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of:
  - 1.03.1 (A) An approved Free Application for Federal Student Aid, including without limitation a Pell Grant; or
  - 1.03.2 (B) The student's or other family member's service in the United States Armed Forces, including without limitation the Army National Guard or Air National Guard.
- 1.04 "Private scholarship" means a scholarship or grant awarded by a private entity or donor;
- 1.05 "Regional high-demand field" means any field of study identified as:
  - 1.05.1 <u>iIn</u> demand by the Arkansas Division of Workforce Services as published on its annual regional Projected Employment Opportunities List; or
  - <u>1.05.2</u> any field of study identified as <u>In</u> high demand by an approved institution of higher education and approved by the Division of Higher Education.
- 1.06 "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement, funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery, awarded by:
  - 1.06.1 (A) The Division of Higher Education; or
  - 1.06.2 (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an approved institution of higher education in this state, funded, in whole or in part, by state funds, including without limitation:
    - 1.06.2.1 (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
    - 1.06.2.2 (ii) Tuition waivers based on:

1.06.2.2.1 aAge,

1.06.2.2.2 mMilitary service,

1.06.2.2.3 Occupation, or

<u>1.06.2.2.4</u> <u>oO</u>ther factors;

- 1.06.2.3 (iii) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
- 1.06.2.4 (iv) Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the approved institution of higher education for:

1.06.2.4.1 *tTuition*,

1.06.2.4.2 fFees,

1.06.2.4.3 bBooks, or

1.06.2.4.4 Other costs of attendance.

### **Procedures**

# **2.00** ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

2.01 (a) A student is eligible for an Arkansas Future Grant if the student is an Arkansas resident who: (1) Mmeets one (1) of the following requirements:

2.01.1 (A) Has either:

2.01.1.1 (i) Graduated from an Arkansas:

2.01.1.1.1 (a) Public high school;

<u>2.01.1.1.2</u> (b) Private high school; or

<u>2.01.1.1.3</u> (c) Home school under § 6-15-501 et seq.; or

- 2.01.1.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services; or
- 2.01.2 (B) Verifies that he or she has resided in Arkansas for the three (3) years immediately preceding application for the grant, and has either:
  - 2.01.2.1 (i) Graduated from an out-of-state:

<u>2.01.2.1.1</u> (a) Public high school;

2.01.2.1.2 (b) Private high school; or

- 2.01.2.1.3 (c) Home school recognized by another state; or
- 2.01.2.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by another state;
- 2.01.3 (2) Is enrolled part-time or full-time at an approved institution of higher education, in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in a:
  - 2.01.3.1 (A) Science, technology, engineering, accounting, finance, nursing, education, or mathematics field, including without limitation:
    - 2.01.3.1.1 eComputer science;
    - 2.01.3.1.2 iInformation technology;
    - 2.01.3.1.3 dData analysis; or
    - 2.01.3.1.4 gGraphic design;
  - 2.01.3.2 (B) Regional high-demand field; or
  - 2.01.3.3 (C) State high-demand field; and
- 2.01.4 (3) Has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

# 3.00 CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- 3.01 (a) A student may continue to be eligible until the student has:
  - 3.01.1 (1) Received the grant for five (5) academic semesters;
  - 3.01.2 (2) Obtained an associate degree;
  - 3.01.3 (3) Failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled; or
  - 3.01.4 (4) Failed to complete the mentoring or community service requirements under the Grant Recipient Responsibilities section of this rule.

#### 4.00 GRANT AWARD AMOUNTS

- 4.01 (a) (1) An Arkansas Future Grant shall be in an amount equal to the tuition, fees, and other charges incurred by a student who meets the requirements under the Eligibility Requirements and Continuing Eligibility Requirements sections of this rule to attend an approved institution of higher education, less the amount the student receives in:
  - $\underline{4.01.1}$  (A) State-supported student financial assistance;
  - 4.01.2 (B) Federal student financial assistance; and
  - 4.01.3 (C) Private scholarships.
- 4.02 (2) If the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled is a state supported four-year institution of higher education, or a private, nonprofit four-year institution of higher education, the total amount of tuition, fees, and other charges under subdivision (a)(1) 4.01 of this section shall be calculated as the average cost of tuition, fees, and other charges, at approved institutions of higher education that are state-supported two-year institutions of higher education.
- 4.03 (b) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse the grant directly to the approved institution of higher education.
- 4.04 (e) The division shall award grants under this rule in the order in which the division receives applications from eligible students and based on availability of funds, to include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.

#### 5.00 GRANT HOLD

- 5.01 (a) (1) The Division of Higher Education may approve a grant hold for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
  - 5.01.1 (2) The reasons for a grant hold may include without limitation:
    - 5.01.1.1 (A)—A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member, to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care, or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
    - 5.01.1.2 (B) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:

- 5.01.1.2.1 (i) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
- 5.01.1.2.2 (ii) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- 5.01.1.3 (C) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- 5.01.1.4 (D) (i) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project, sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
  - 5.01.1.4.1 (ii) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
  - 5.01.1.4.2 (iii) The division shall release a grant hold if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

# 6.00 GRANT RECIPIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- <u>6.01</u> (a) A student who receives an Arkansas Future Grant shall enter into a written agreement with the Division of Higher Education to:
  - <u>6.01.1</u> (1) (A) Receive monthly mentoring from a mentor from an organization determined by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education.;
  - 6.01.2 (B) A mentor under subdivision  $\frac{(a)(1)(A)}{(B)}$  6.01.1 of this section shall:
    - <u>6.01.2.1</u> (i) Receive annual mentoring training:
      - <u>6.01.2.1.1</u> (a) Developed by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education; and
      - <u>6.01.2.1.2</u> (b)-Provided by a local volunteer group approved by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education; and
    - 6.01.2.2 (ii) Certify to the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> that at least one (1) time each semester the mentor has provided mentoring services by telephone, email, or in person to each student he or she is mentoring;

- <u>6.01.3</u> (2) (A) Complete at least ten (10) hours of community service each semester the student receives a grant-;
  - 6.01.3.1 (B) (i) A student may select a community service project that meets requirements developed by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u>.
    - 6.01.3.1.1 (ii) An approved institution of higher education may provide community services opportunities designed to benefit the approved institution of higher education community or the broader local community.
  - 6.01.3.2 (C) A student shall certify his or her community service to the approved institution of higher education by the last regular day of the semester the student received the grant; and
- 6.01.4 (3) (A) Reside in this state for three consecutive (3) years and be employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification.
  - 6.01.4.1 (B) The <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> may defer the requirement under subdivision (a)(3)(A) 6.01.4 of this section if:
    - 6.01.4.1.1 (i) The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the Division of Workforce Services, determines that there was no employment position available that would reasonably enable the student to meet this requirement; or
    - <u>6.01.4.1.2</u> (ii) Special circumstances as determined by the Division of Higher Education exist.
  - 6.01.4.2 (C)-After the period of deferral, the student shall begin or resume working in this state or become subject to repayment under subsection (b)-6.02 of this section.
- 6.02 (b) The written agreement under subsection (a) 6.01 of this section shall provide that the grant converts into a loan and the student shall repay the grant amount:
  - 6.02.1 (1) On a pro rata basis at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the <u>division</u>, <u>Division of Higher Education</u> for each year the student does not reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years, and become employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification; or

- <u>6.02.2</u> (2) In its entirety, at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the <u>division</u>, <u>Division of Higher Education</u> if the recipient does not comply with the written agreement under <u>subsection</u> (a) <u>6.01</u> of this section.
- 6.03 (e) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days.
  - 6.03.1 Failure to notify the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> of a change of status may affect future eligibility.
    - <u>6.03.1.1</u> Change of status will include:

<u>6.03.1.1.1</u> (1) Change in name;

6.03.1.1.2 (2) Change in address; and

<u>6.03.1.1.3</u> (3) Change in institution.

## 7.00 COLLECTION OF LOAN

- 7.01 (a) Accounts will be retained by the Division of Higher Education's in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for deferment, at which point Tthe account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment.
  - 7.01.1 The student will be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections and they will be sent receive a loan amortization schedule along with the letter.
  - 7.01.2 The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due.
    - 7.01.2.1 Loan recipients who are determined by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> to be <u>one hundred twenty (120)</u> days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due.
    - 7.01.2.2 If payment is not forthcoming within <u>sixty (60)</u> days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date.
    - 7.01.2.3 If the loan recipient has not responded within <u>ninety (90)</u> days from the original payment due date, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient informing them that the

account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not made within thirty (30) days.

# 7.02 (b) Skip Tracing Mechanisms

- 7.02.1 (1) ADHE The division will use these following steps to locate recipients if communications are returned as undelivered:
  - 7.02.1.1 (A) Contact the Motor Vehicle Division of the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration;
  - <u>7.02.1.2</u> (B) Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
  - 7.02.1.3 (C) Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient's last known address;
  - 7.02.1.4 (D) Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
  - 7.02.1.5 (E) Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;
  - 7.02.1.6 (F) Contact recipient's:
    - <u>7.02.1.6.1</u> <u>F</u>ield of study;
    - 7.02.1.6.2 pProfessional organization;
    - 7.02.1.6.3 <u>uUnion</u>; or
    - <u>7.02.1.6.4</u> <u>1Licensing board;</u>
  - 7.02.1.7 (G) Contact post office;
  - 7.02.1.8 (H) Contact utility companies; and,
  - 7.02.1.9 (I) Contact Chamber of Commerce.
- 7.03 (c) Credit Reporting Agencies
  - 7.03.1 (1) Defaulted recipients will be reported to the following Ccredit Rreporting Agencies:
    - 7.03.1.1 (A) CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.;

- 7.03.1.2 (B) TRW Credit Data; and
- 7.03.1.3 (C) Trans Union Credit Reporting.
- <u>7.03.2</u> (2) Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients are located in the collections file.
  - 7.03.2.1 The <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> will <u>also</u> respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients.
- 7.04 (d) State Income Tax Set Off
  - 7.04.1 (1) By the authority of Acts 345 of 1993, No. 345, the division Division of Higher Education has been included as a claimant agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds.
- 7.05 (e) Litigation
  - 7.05.1 No sooner than thirty (30) days after sending the third letter of notification, the division Division of Higher Education shall institute a civil suit against the recipient for repayment of the loan.
    - 7.05.1.1 Small Cclaims Ccourts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00).
    - 7.05.1.2 If the account is over three thousand dollars and one sent (\$3,000.01), the division Division of Higher Education must use circuit court.
    - 7.05.1.3 If the account is three thousand dollars and one cent (\$3,000.01) or above, the division Division of Higher Education may choose to use Ssmall Cclaims Ccourts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court.
    - 7.05.1.4 If the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference.
    - 7.05.1.5 Forms to take the recipient to  $\underline{Ss}$  mall  $\underline{Cc}$  laims  $\underline{Cc}$  ourts are requested from the recipient's county of residence.  $\underline{(1)}$

# 7.06 (f) Write-Offs

- 7.06.1 (1)-Arkansas Future Grants that convert to loans may be written off as uncollectible if the <u>division-Division of Higher Education</u> shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:
  - 7.06.1.1 (A) The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
  - 7.06.1.2 (B) The recipient does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- 7.06.2 (2) Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the Administrator must be received before Arkansas Future Grant loan accounts may be written off.

# 7.07 (g) Nonpayment Penalties

7.07.1 Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

# 8.00 INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES—COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RESPONSIBILITIES

### (a) College/University Responsibilities

- 8.01 (1) Administrative Agreement
  - 8.01.1 The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Future Grant Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
    - 8.01.1.1 This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations.
  - 8.01.2 The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.
- 8.02 (2) Disbursement Records
  - 8.02.1 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

## 8.03 (3) Institutional Verification

- 8.03.1 The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in <u>an</u> eligible program of study, and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a <u>V</u>verification <u>Rroster</u> each semester after registration.
  - 8.03.1.1 The <u>V</u>verification <u>R</u>roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
  - <u>8.03.1.2</u> The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
  - 8.03.1.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Vverification Rrosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
- 8.03.2 The electronic Vverification Rroster shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.

# DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE GOVERNOR'S HIGHER EDUCATION TRANSITION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Effective Date:

#### 1.00 REGULATORY AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

- 1.01 These rules shall be known as the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 1.02 This rule is enacted pursuant to the Higher Education Coordinating Board's authority under Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-61-202 and 6-82-105.
- 1.03 The purpose of these rules is to establish the requirements and processes governing the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.

#### 2.00 GOVERNOR'S HIGHER EDUCATION TRANSITION SCHOLARSHIP

- 2.01 The Division of Higher Education shall oversee the establishment of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 2.02 Continuation of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program shall be contingent upon available funding.

### 3.00 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- 3.01 The Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
- 3.02 The division shall establish application periods and deadlines.

### 4.00 ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

4.01 The Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship may only be awarded to those students who are admitted into transition programs that are accredited by The Institute for Community Inclusion as Comprehensive Training Programs.

- 4.01.1 In order to be considered a qualifying institution, an institution must offer a transition program as described in 4.01 of these rules.
- 4.02 Students, or representatives acting on behalf of students, must complete the online scholarship application provided by the Division of Higher Education.

### 5.00 CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY

5.01 Recipients of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship will maintain award eligibility for a maximum of four (4) semesters as long as the recipients are continuously enrolled in a transition program.

### 6.00 SCHOLARSHIP AMOUNTS

- 6.01 Scholarship awards are contingent upon availability of funds.
- Awards may not exceed the institutional cost of attendance. The maximum award amount is \$2,500.00 per semester that the student qualifies for the scholarship.
- 6.03 Awards may be applied to tuition, mandatory fees, programmatic fees, room and board, supplies, or extended support services.

### 7.00 PAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIPS

- 7.01 The Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarship funds to the qualifying institution of the recipient's choice via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.
- 7.02 After verification of enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship funds to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.
- 7.03 The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the institution.
  - 7.03.1 For purposes of scholarship payments, academic terms at the institution may include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent.
- 7.04 In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid in advance to or on behalf of such student.
- 7.05 If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the

student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses.

- 7.05.1 Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.
- 7.05.2 It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayment(s).
- 7.05.3 The institution shall refund the overpayment(s) to the division.
- 7.06 If the award of a Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student per Ark. Code Ann. § 6-80-105, the institution shall follow the division's Scholarship Stacking Policy in reducing the student's financial package so that the student does not receive funds above the federally-recognized cost of attendance.

### 8.00 RESPONSIBILITIES OF QUALIFYING INSTITUTIONS

- 8.01 The chief executive officer of the qualifying institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, and other correspondence related to the program. This representative will be responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules.
- 8.02 The institution shall maintain information regarding disbursement of scholarship funds.
- 8.03 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
  - 8.03.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Division of Higher Education.
  - 8.03.2 If the division receives an application beyond the deadline referenced in section 8.03, disbursement will be made within ten (10) business days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

- 8.04 In exercising its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds, the division shall periodically review the qualifying institution's records concerning this program.
- 8.05 Upon request, the qualifying institution shall exercise due diligence in providing the division with complete, accurate, and timely information regarding current and former Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program recipients.
- 8.06 Institutions with accredited transition programs will certify students' admittance and enrollment prior to scholarship award.
- 8.07 The institution shall comply with all applicable law and rules in order to maintain its status as a qualified institution.

### 9.00 RESPONSIBILITIES OF RECIPIENTS

- 9.01 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days, including the recipient's:
  - 9.01.1 Change in name;
  - 9.01.2 Change in address; and
  - 9.01.3 Change in institution.

## DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS CONCURRENT CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

### **POLICY STATEMENT**

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Education, Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Act 456 of 2019 Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-401 et seq.

### **APPLICABILITY**

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program.

### 1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
  - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 + "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that:
  - 1.02.1 a. Is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program;
  - 1.02.2 b. Offers at least a fifty percent (50%) discount on the tuition and mandatory fees of an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program to a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program, unless other opportunities are provided that lower the tuition and mandatory fees below fifty percent (50%); and
  - <u>1.02.3</u> e. Is a:
    - 1.02.3.1 : State-supported two-year or four-year college or university;

- 1.02.3.2 ii. Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university that has its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
- 1.02.3.3 Beginning January 1, 2025, public or private vocational-technical school or technical institute, only if its primary headquarters is located in Arkansas, and it is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds.
- 1.03 2) "Eligible course" means any endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 1.04 3) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license.
  - 1.04.1 This definition does not include a program operated or sponsored by a third party.
- 4) "Endorsed concurrent enrollment course" means a college-level course offered by an approved institution of higher education in Arkansas that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the approved institution of higher education and a public high school that;
  - 1.05.1 a.—Is in one (1) of the four (4) core areas of math, English, science, and social studies:
  - 1.05.2 b. Meets the requirements of § 6-16-1204(b); and
  - 1.05.3 e. Is listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System of the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education;
    - 1.05.3.1 This definition does not include programs operated or sponsored by a third party;
- 1.06 5) "Student" means a person who has sophomore, junior or senior status and who is enrolled at a:
  - 1.06.1 a. Public high school in Arkansas;
  - 1.06.2 b. Private high school in Arkansas; or
  - <u>1.06.3</u> e. Home school, as defined in § 6-15-501 et seq.;

- 1.07 6) "Student success plan" means a plan developed by school personnel in collaboration with parents and the student that is reviewed annually.
  - 1.07.1 The plan shall, at a minimum:
    - 1.07.1.1 a. Guide the student along pathways to graduation;
    - 1.07.1.2 b. Address accelerated learning opportunities;
    - 1.07.1.3 e. Address academic deficits and interventions; and
    - 1.07.1.4 d. Include college and career planning components;
- 1.08 7) "Third party" means a person or entity that does not receive disbursement directly from the <u>Ddivision</u> for this program, including a subcontractor of the institution.

### 2.00 ELIGIBILITY

- 2.01 4) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship for an academic semester or academic year during which the student is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program if the student:
  - 2.01.1 a. Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the student or one (1) parent of the student is an Arkansas resident; and
  - <u>2.01.2</u> b. Provides proof that a completed student success plan has been submitted to the student's high school or home school.
- 2.02 2) The student success plan for a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program shall:
  - 2.02.1 a. Be prepared in consultation with school personnel, the student, and the student's parent or legal guardian or a college advisor.
  - 2.02.2 b. Include an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program that is relevant to the student's success plan and include measures that ensure the successful completion of the endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program in which the student is enrolled.
  - 2.02.3 e. A student whose enrollment in a vocational center is reimbursable under § 6-51-305 is not eligible for a scholarship under this program.
  - <u>2.02.4</u> d. Students must meet all established requirements for endorsed concurrent enrollment courses set by the Division of Higher Education.

### 3.00 CONTINUING ELIGIBILITY

- 3.01 4) A student is eligible to continue to receive the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship if the student successfully completes an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course and receives a minimum grade point average of 2.5.
- 3.02 2) A student who fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 shall retain eligibility and enroll in no more than one (1) endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course for the first semester following the semester in which the student failed to successfully complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.
  - 3.02.1 a. If a student fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course a second time, the student shall be ineligible to reapply or receive the scholarship again.
    - 3.02.1.1 This also applies to a student that drops out of an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course before the end of the semester.

### 4.00 AMOUNT OF AWARDS

- 4.01 1) If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education shall award Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarships to all students eligible for the scholarship for the fall, and spring or summer terms.
- 4.02 2) The maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
  - 4.02.1 a. Five hundred dollars (\$500)
    - 4.02.1.1 i.—Eligible students shall be awarded one-hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) for each eligible course the student is enrolled, up to two (2) eligible courses per semester; or
  - 4.02.2 b. The actual tuition and mandatory fees cost to the student for up to two (2) eligible courses per semester.
- 4.03 3)-A scholarship granted under this section may be awarded in addition to any funds received for the enrollment in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course under § 6-16-1204(e)(3).
- 4.04 4)-Unless a student's high school or community-based program provides financial assistance for the cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent

credit course or certificate program course, the remaining cost of tuition and mandatory fees for an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program is the responsibility of the eligible student who is enrolled in the endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.

4.05 The division shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every approved institution of higher education that has enrolled a student eligible to receive this scholarship.

### 5.00 INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

Approved institution of higher education responsibilities.

- 5.01 1)-Administrative agreement.
  - 5.01.1 The chief executive officer of the approved institution of higher education is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
    - 5.01.1.1 This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with these rules.
  - <u>5.01.2</u> The approved institution of higher education shall comply with all rules <u>in</u> order to maintain the status of an approved institution of higher education.
- 5.02 2) Disbursement records.
  - <u>5.02.1</u> The approved institution of higher education shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.
- 5.03 3) Verification.
  - 5.03.1 The approved institution of higher education shall provide certification of enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration.
    - 5.03.1.1 The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by an approved institution of higher education of all students receiving the award for a given academic term.
    - 5.03.1.2 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester.
- 5.04 4) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

- 5.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
  - 5.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by this date must be returned to the division.
  - 5.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by this date, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds to the approved institution of higher education.

### 5.05 5) Due diligence.

- 5.05.1 The approved institution of higher education will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any scholarship recipient or former scholarship recipient.
- <u>5.05.2</u> In addition, the approved institution of higher education will exercise due diligence in complying with these rules.
- <u>5.05.3</u> The division may periodically review the approved institution of higher education's records concerning this scholarship program to ensure the compliance with due diligence requirements.

### 5.06 6) Course eligibility.

5.06.1 The approved institution of higher education is responsible for verifying that the endorsed concurrent credit courses and certificate program courses meet the requirements set in Ark. ansas Code Ann. § 6-16-1202 and policies of the division.

### 6.00 HIGH SCHOOL AND HOME SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.01 The high school or home school shall provide certification of eligibility for a student to enroll in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 6.02 A high school or home school shall verify the completion of the student's student success plan before certifying that a student is eligible for the scholarship.

### RULES GOVERNING THE GOVERNOR'S SCHOLARS PROGRAM

In compliance with Acts 413 of 2023, the rules for the Governor's Scholars Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Governor's Scholars Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Governor's Scholars Program.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Governor's Scholars Program rules be approved for public comment release.

## DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS GOVENOR'S SCHOLARS PROGRAM Effective Date:

### **POLICY STATEMENT**

A scholarship program to promote academic excellence and to encourage the state's most talented graduates to enroll in Arkansas postsecondary educational institutions is created and established which shall be cited as the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. These rules shall be known as the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, and continuing eligibility requirements procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-82-301 et. seq.

### 1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 (1) "Academic ability" means the intellectual standing of a student.
  - 1.01.1 In determining superior academic ability, the Division of Higher Education shall examine:

<u>1.01.1.3</u> <u>dD</u>emonstrated leadership capabilities;

- 1.02 (2) "Academic Year" means fall, spring, first and second summer semesters in that order, or as defined by the Ddivision of Higher Education;
- 1.03 (3) "Approved institution" means a public or private college or university:
  - 1.03.1 (A) Which is dedicated to educational purposes, located in Arkansas, or located out of state and educating Arkansas residents in dentistry, optometry, veterinary medicine, podiatry, chiropractic, or osteopathy under agreement with the Board of Control for Southern Regional Education, accredited by an accrediting agency certified and recognized by the United States Department of Education or the Division of Agency Evaluation and Institutional Accreditation, or a school giving satisfactory assurance that it

has the potential for accreditation and is making progress which, if continued, will result in its achieving accreditation;

 $\underline{1.03.2}$  (B) Which does not discriminate in the admission of students on the basis of:

- <u>1.03.2.1</u> <u>rRace</u>;
- 1.03.2.2 eColor;
- 1.03.2.3 #Religion;
- 1.03.2.4 sSex; or
- 1.03.2.5 nNational origin; and
- 1.03.3 (C) Which subscribes to the principle of academic freedom;
- 1.04 (4) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Ddivision of Higher Education.
  - 1.04.1 Such evidence includes but is not limited to:
    - 1.04.1.1 aA valid Arkansas voter's registration card;
    - 1.04.1.2 \(\forall \) Valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;
    - <u>1.04.1.3</u> Arkansas residence address used for federal or state tax purposes; or
    - <u>1.04.1.4</u> e<u>C</u>laims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions;
- 1.05 (5) "Competitive examination" means a standardized examination measuring achievement which is administered annually on a specified date and at a specified location and which is announced publicly;
- 1.06 (6) "Division" means the Division of Higher Education;
- 1.07 (7) "Eligible student" means a resident of the State of Arkansas as defined by the Ddivision of Higher Education who:
  - 1.07.1 (A) Is eligible for admission as a full-time student;
  - 1.07.2 (B) Declares an intent to matriculate in an approved institution in Arkansas; and

- 1.07.3 (C) Graduates from:
  - 1.07.3.1 (i) A high school in this state, for Arkansas Governor's Scholars; or
  - 1.07.3.2 (ii) A high school, for Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars;
- 1.08 (8)(A) "Extraordinary academic ability" means:
  - 1.08.1 (i) Achievement of a superscore of thirty-two (32) or above on the American College Test (ACT) or a score of 1410 or above on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); and
  - 1.08.2 (ii) (a) Achievement of a high school grade point average of 3.5 or above on a 4.0 scale; or
  - 1.08.3 (b) Selection as a finalist in either the National Merit Scholarship competition, the National Hispanic Recognition Program, or the National Achievement Scholarship competition conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
  - 1.08.4 (B) The American College Test superscores and Scholastic Aptitude Test scores shall be earned by December 31 prior to the application deadline in order for the scores to be considered by the division for a scholarship award;
- 1.09 (9) "Full-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in at least twelve (12) credit hours the first semester and fifteen (15) hours thereafter, or other reasonable academic equivalent as defined by the division;
  - 1.09.1 For purposes of summer semesters, "full-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled fifteen (15) hours.
- 1.10 (10) "Part-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in less than fifteen (15) credit hours for their fourth academic year;
  - 1.10.1 For purposes of summer semesters, "part-time student" means a resident of Arkansas who is in attendance at an approved private or public institution and who is enrolled in less than fifteen (15) hours.

- 1.11 (11) "Scholarship" means an award to an eligible student for matriculation in an approved institution in the State of Arkansas;
- 1.12 (12) "Undergraduate student" means an individual who is enrolled in a postsecondary educational program, which leads to or is directly creditable toward the individual's first baccalaureate degree; and
- 1.13 (13) "U.S. Citizen" means the student must be either a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien.
  - 1.13.1 If the student is not a United States citizen, but a permanent resident alien, the student must attach a copy of the permanent resident alien form I 151, I 551, I 94, or G 641 to the application.

#### **Procedures**

### 2.00 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- 2.01 The Arkansas-Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Scholars Program within the policies set by the Arkansas-Higher Education Coordinating Board.
  - 2.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or his/ or her designee.
  - 2.01.2 The Governor's Scholars Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Division of Higher Education division regarding the administration of the program.
- 2.02 Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Council
  - 2.02.1 A. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil shall consist of ten (10) members appointed by the Arkansas Higher Education Ccoordinating Bboard for staggered two-year terms and shall represent the public and private sectors of postsecondary education and secondary schools.
  - 2.02.2 B. The Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil shall advise the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education in the determination of guidelines and regulations rules for the administration of this program.
  - 2.02.3 C. The Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or hist or her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the Governor's Scholars Program Advisory Ccouncil and shall ensure that staff services for the Ccouncil are provided.

- 2.02.3.1 The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Seq.
- 2.02.3.2 When functioning under Arkansas Code Annotated § 6-82-301 et. Sseq., the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Arkansas Code § 25-15-201 et seq.

### 3.00 ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- 3.01 (a) The Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program scholarships are to be awarded to those students who demonstrate the highest capabilities for successful college study.
- 3.02 (b) A student is eligible for this scholarship if he or she:
  - 3.02.1 (1) Meets the admission requirements and is accepted for enrollment as a fulltime undergraduate student in an eligible public or private college or university in Arkansas;
  - 3.02.2 (2) (A) Is a bona fide resident of the state, as defined by the Division of Higher Education, and is either:
    - 3.02.2.1 a. A citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien;
    - 3.02.2.2 b. The holder, or the child of a holder, of a Federal Form I-766 United States Citizenship and Immigration Services-issued Employment Authorization Document, known popularly as a "work permit"; or
    - 3.02.2.3 e. A person who is a migrant from the Compact of Free Association Islands.
  - 3.02.3 (3) Graduates from a high school;
  - 3.02.4 (4) Completes and submits to the U.S. United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or a subsequent application required by the U.S. United States Department of Education for federal financial aid;
  - 3.02.5 (5)(A) Satisfies the qualifications of superior academic ability as established by the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education with criteria

consisting of value points for academic achievement and leadership, including without limitation:

- 3.02.5.1 (i) American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Merit Finalist, or National Achievement Finalist;
- 3.02.5.2 (ii) High school grade point average;
- 3.02.5.3 (iii) Rank in high school class; and
- 3.02.5.4 (iv) Leadership in school, community, and employment.
- 3.02.6 (B) (i) The division Division of Higher Education may alter the weight assigned to the individual criterion to more appropriately meet the needs of the state as determined by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.
- 3.03 Value points assigned to each selection criterion are weighted as follows:

American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score, National Merit Finalist, or National Achievement Finalist ----- forty-five percent 45%

High school grade point average ----- thirty-five percent 35%

Rank in high school class ----- ten percent 10%

Leadership in school, community, and employment ----- ten percent 10%

- 3.03.1.1 (ii) The <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> shall ensure that the weight assigned to each individual criterion under this subdivision (b)(5)(B) 3.02.6 does not place a homeschooled, public school, or private school student at a disadvantage.
- 3.03.1.2 (iii) (a) After determining qualified recipients based on the qualifications under subdivision (b)(5)(A) 3.02.5 of this section, the <u>Ddivision of Higher Education</u> shall ensure that at least one (1) recipient is selected from each of the seventy-five (75) counties in Arkansas.
  - 3.03.1.2.1 (b) If any of the seventy-five (75) counties is not represented, the <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> shall select a student from each nonrepresented county with the highest qualifications under <u>subdivision (b)(5)(A)</u>
    3.02.5 of this section who was not initially qualified.

- 3.03.1.2.2 (e) The scholarship shall be weighed on the factors of:
  - 3.03.1.2.2.1 <u>aA</u>chievement<del>,</del>;
  - 3.03.1.2.2.2 <u>aAbility</u>; and
  - 3.03.1.2.2.3 dDemonstrated leadership capabilities.
- 3.03.1.2.3 (d) Students who are selected as Arkansas Governor's Scholars who also exhibit extraordinary academic ability as defined in the definitions section of this rule shall be designated as Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholars.
- 3.03.1.2.4 (e) Preference will be given to students who plan to enter college at the beginning of the academic year directly following their last year of high school attendance.

### **4.00** CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY

- 4.01 (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship may be awarded annually for a period not to exceed an academic year.
  - 4.01.1 (b)(1) A scholarship shall correspond to <u>fall</u>, <u>spring</u>, <u>and summer</u> academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institutions.
  - 4.01.2 (2) In no instance may the entire amount of the grant for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of students in advance.
- 4.02 (e) Provided sufficient funds are available, a scholarship shall be awarded for one (1) academic year, to include summer terms, and renewed annually for three (3) additional academic years if the following conditions for renewal are met:
  - 4.02.1 (1) The student maintains not less than a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
  - 4.02.2 (2) A student receiving a scholarship under the Scholarship Amounts subsection (a) 8.00 maintains not less than a 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 scholastic grading scale;
  - 4.02.3 (3) The recipient has successfully completed a total of at least twenty-seven (27) hours during the first full academic year and, if applicable, a total of at least thirty (30) hours per academic year thereafter; and

- 4.02.4 (4) The recipient has met any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- 4.02.5 (5) If a student who has continuously been a recipient of the scholarship for at least three (3) consecutive years is enrolled as a part-time student in the student's fourth academic year, the student shall be eligible to continue to receive the scholarship if the student has completed, by his or her fourth academic year, or is enrolled in, for his or her fourth academic year, the requisite number of credit hours to complete the student's degree program.

### 5.00 APPLICATION

- 5.01 Students must submit an on-line application, available at the ADHE Division of Higher Education website http://scholarships.adhe.edu/.
- 5.02 The application deadline shall be established by the <u>Ddivision of Higher</u> Education of the calendar year in which a student graduates from high school.
- 5.03 At its discretion, the <u>Ddivision of Higher Education</u> may extend the deadline, provided sufficient notice is provided to the public.
- 5.04 The applicant is responsible for submitting the application and all supporting documentation in a timely manner.

### 6.00 NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS

- 6.01 (a)-If sufficient funds are available, effective for students receiving their initial awards beginning in fall 2007, the number of initial scholarship awards to eligible high achievers shall not exceed three hundred seventy-five (375) each year.
- 6.02 (b) If there are more eligible applicants than available scholarships, the division Division of Higher Education may determine a procedure for awarding additional scholarships while not exceeding available funds.

### 7.00 USE OF SCHOLARSHIP

- 7.01 (a) No student may utilize scholarship funds for educational purposes beyond the baccalaureate degree.
- 7.02 (b) There shall be an exception to the requirement of subsection (a) 7.01 of this section for any student who receives a baccalaureate degree in three (3) years or less.

7.02.1 The student may receive an award of the scholarship for a fourth academic year to be used as a full-time student enrolled in a postgraduate program at an approved institution.

### 8.00 SCHOLARSHIPAMOUNTS

- 8.01 (1) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship awarded to a new recipient who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman shall be in an amount that equals the lesser of:
  - 8.01.1 (1) Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); or
  - 8.01.2 (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- 8.02 (2) A student selected as a recipient under the "Eligibility Criteria" subsection (b)(6)(B)(iii)(b) 3.03.121 who enrolls in an approved institution as a first-time entering freshman after July 1, 2017, shall be awarded in an amount that equals the lesser of:
  - 8.02.1 (1) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000); or
  - 8.02.2 (2) Tuition, room and board, and mandatory fees charged for a regular full-time course load by the approved institution in which the recipient is enrolled.
- 8.03 (3) The scholarship amount for each semester in which a student who is the recipient of a scholarship is enrolled as a part-time student during their fourth academic year shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the student is enrolled.

### 9.00 NOTIFICATION OF APPLICATION AND AWARD STATUS

- 9.01 (a) An Arkansas Governor's Scholarship or Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarship shall receive an award notice and information sheet explaining disbursement procedures and conditions of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Award.
- 9.02 (b) The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall notify applicants who are determined to be ineligible and provide the reason for ineligibility.
  - <u>9.02.1</u> They will also be given instructions on how to correct any information on the application they believe to be incorrect.

- 9.03 (e) Applicants who fail to submit complete applications, or who fail to supply the required documentation to process the application, will be classified as Incomplete.
  - <u>9.03.1</u> The Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education shall notify these students of their status.
  - <u>9.03.2</u> The <u>Hincomplete Nnotice</u> provides a list of the incomplete items and the actions necessary for completion.

### 10.00 SCHOLARSHIP PAYMENT POLICIES

### <u>10.01</u> (a) Payment of Scholarships

- 10.01.1 Funds will be disbursed to the approved institution of the Governor's Scholars choice by state warrant.
- 10.01.2 After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution shall disburse the Governor's Scholars Award to the student according to the individual institution's disbursement procedures.
- 10.01.3 Disbursement of the Governor's Scholars award shall correspond with the institution's <u>fall</u>, <u>spring</u>, <u>and summer</u> academic terms (semesters, trimesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods).
- 10.01.4 In no instance may the entire amount of the award for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of the student in advance.

### 10.02 (b) Transfer to Another Institution of Higher Education

- 10.02.1 A student who receives a Governor's Scholars Award may transfer to another eligible Arkansas institution of higher education, provided the recipient notifies the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education, in writing, of the change of institution by October 1 for the fall term, and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms, and by June 1st for summer terms.
- <u>10.02.2</u> Failure to notify the <u>Arkansas Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> by the specified deadlines shall result in the loss of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

### 10.03 (e) Scholarship Hold

10.03.1 The <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u> may approve a scholarship hold for a student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less for the following reasons without limitation:

- 10.03.1.1 (1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates that the student or the student's immediate family member be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or recuperate until released by the attending physician;
- $\underline{10.03.1.2}$  (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
  - 10.03.1.2.1 (a) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
  - 10.03.1.2.2 (b) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- 10.03.1.3 (3) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- 10.03.1.4 (4) (a) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
  - 10.03.1.4.1 (b) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
  - 10.03.1.4.2 (e) The division shall release a scholarship hold if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.
- 10.03.2 The recipient must submit a written request for a scholarship hold.
  - 10.03.2.1 The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and be supported by documentation.
  - 10.03.2.2 In the absence of extraordinary circumstances, the award will be revoked if the recipient fails to enroll fulltime in an eligible institution in Arkansas, and the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education-receives neither notification of transfer of the scholarship to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the fall term, and February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms, and by June 1st for summer terms.

- 10.03.2.3 At the discretion of the <u>Dd</u>ivision of <u>Higher Education</u>, the award will not be revoked if it is determined by <u>the division</u>

  ADHE-that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying <u>the division</u> ADHE-by the required dates.
- 10.04 (d) Cancellation of Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award
  - 10.04.1 (1) The Governor's Scholars Award and the Governor's Distinguished Scholar Award shall be terminated for any one of the following reasons:
    - 10.04.1.1 (a) Failure to maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Scholars) or a minimum 3.25 cumulative college grade point average (Governor's Distinguished Scholars) on a 4.0 scale and successfully complete and pass a minimum of at least twenty-seven (27) credit hours the first academic year and thirty (30) hours each academic year thereafter;
    - 10.04.1.2 (b) Failure to complete a baccalaureate degree within five (5) years from initial college entrance; or
    - 10.04.1.3 (e) Failure to petition the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education for a temporary withdrawal for two (2) consecutive academic terms; or
    - 10.04.1.4 (d) Failure to enroll as a full time student in an eligible Arkansas college or university after a two-year temporary withdrawal.
  - 10.04.2 (2) Failure by the Governor's Scholar to provide written notification to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education of a change in status (such as a transfer to another eligible institution, change in address, change in name, etc.) before appropriate deadline dates shall result in cancellation of the Governor's Scholars award for the term in question.

### 10.05 (e) Refunds and Overpayments

- 10.05.1 If a Governor's Scholar withdraws from an eligible institution, and under the refund policy of that institution the student is entitled to a refund of any tuition, fees, or other changes, the institution shall pay the refund amount in question to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.
- 10.05.2 Acts 1180 of 1999, No. 1180, states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid

- package to exceed the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls.
- 10.05.3 The institution must follow <u>division</u> ADHE-policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

### 11.00 HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTION RESPONSIBILITIES

### 11.01 (a) Administrative Agreement

- 11.01.1 The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
- 11.01.2 This representative is responsible for Governor's Scholars disbursement, completion of all forms and rosters, verification of data, and compliance with all Governor's Scholars Program rules and regulations.
- 11.01.3 The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

### 11.02 (b) Disbursement Records

11.02.1 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of Governor's Scholars funds.

### 11.03 (e) Institutional Information Sheet

11.03.1 The administrator is responsible for designating a certifying official responsible for certifying full-time enrollment and a disbursing official responsible for the disbursement of Governor's Scholars Program funds.

### 11.04 (d) Institutional Verification

- 11.04.1 The institution shall provide certification to the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education each semester after registration, giving the names of the Governor's Scholars who are officially enrolled as full-time students as of the end of the 11th eleventh class day of enrollment.
- 11.04.2 This information is reported on a verification roster.
- 11.04.3 The person responsible for verification of full-time enrollment is the registrar or a member of the registrar's staff.

- 11.04.4 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster twice (2) a year for those schools on the semester system and three (3) times a year for those schools on the quarter system.
- 11.04.5 The verification roster shall be mailed to the  $F_1$  inancial  $A_2$  id  $A_2$  dministrator prior to registration for the semester or quarter.
- 11.04.6 The completed and signed Governor's Scholars verification roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education by the dates specified on the roster.
- 11.04.7 The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award for a given academic term.
- 11.04.8 Students who are not enrolled full-time in the current term shall not receive Governor's Scholars funds for that term.
- 11.05 (e) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds
  - 11.05.1 All funds must be disbursed within ten (10) days of written receipt of funds.
  - 11.05.2 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned within ten (10) days to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.

### 11.06 (f) Refund Policy

- 11.06.1 It is the institution's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education of the:
  - 11.06.1.1 nName of the person who withdrew;
  - 11.06.1.2 the dDate of the withdrawal; and
  - 11.06.1.3 the rRefund amount.
- 11.06.2 This information shall be placed on the institution's verification roster before the roster is returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.
- 11.06.3 The institution shall be responsible for the refund amount and shall pay that amount to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education.

### 11.07 (g) Continuing Eligibility

- 11.07.1 It is the responsibility of each institution to complete annually the Ccontinuing Eeligibility roster.
- 11.07.2 This roster shall be mailed to all institutions that have a Geovernor's Secholar enrolled.
- 11.07.3 The Continuing Eeligibility roster shall be returned to the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education by the date specified on the roster.
- 11.07.4 The person responsible for completing the  $C_0$  ontinuing  $E_0$  ligibility roster is the  $E_0$  in  $E_0$
- 11.07.5 The Continuing Eeligibility roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving a Governor's Scholars award that attended that institution for the academic year immediately preceding receipt of the Continuing Eeligibility roster.
- 11.07.6 The certifying official must complete the roster by providing the number of hours completed for the previous academic year and the cumulative grade point average achieved for each student listed.

### 11.08 (h) Due Diligence

- 11.08.1 The institution shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education for any Ggovernor's Sscholar or former Ggovernor's Sscholar.
- 11.08.2 In addition, the institution shall exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Governor's Scholars Program.
- 11.08.3 The Arkansas Ddivision of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning the Governor's Scholars Program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of State of Arkansas funds.

## RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS WORKFORCE CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP

In compliance with Acts 413 and 539 of 2023, the rules for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

**FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship rules be approved for public comment release.

## DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS WORKFORCE CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

### POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

### APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-302 et seq.

### **APPLICABILITY**

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.

### 1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
  - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 4) "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program and that is:
  - 1.02.1 (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
  - 1.02.2 (B) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
  - 1.02.3 Beginning January 1, 2025, public or private vocational-technical school or technical institute, only if its primary headquarters is located in Arkansas, and it is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds.
- 1.03 (2)(A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the

obtainment of a certification or license, including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

1.03.1 (B) The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or a baccalaureate degree.

### **2.00 FUNDING**

- 2.01 (1) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under these rules:
  - 2.01.1 (A) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and
  - 2.01.2 (B) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery:
    - 2.01.2.1 (i)—Transfers the funds requested by the Division of Higher Education under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-801(c)(2); and
    - 2.01.2.2 (ii)—Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).
- 2.02 (2)—A scholarship under these rules shall not be awarded for an academic year if:
  - 2.02.1 (A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section; or
  - 2.02.2 (B) The Division of Higher Education division received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program --Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.
- 2.03 (3) Any funds under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under these rules shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under these rules.

### **Procedures**

### 3.00 ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- 3.01 (1) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship for an academic year if the student applies to the Division of Higher Education by a date determined by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> preceding the academic year and:
  - 3.01.1 (A) Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either a parent of the student or the student is an Arkansas resident;
  - 3.01.2 (B) Meets either of the following requirements:
    - <u>3.01.2.1</u> (i) Graduated from a:
      - 3.01.2.1.1 (a) Public high school in Arkansas or another state;
      - 3.01.2.1.2 (b) Private high school in Arkansas or another state; or
      - 3.01.2.1.3 (e) Home school as recognized under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-501 et seq. or recognized by another state; or
    - 3.01.2.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Arkansas Division of Workforce Services or another state;
    - 3.01.2.3 (C) Is not receiving a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq.;
    - 3.01.2.4 (D) Is accepted for admission in a program of study at an approved institution of higher education that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program in one (1) of the following high-demand fields:
      - 3.01.2.4.1 (i)—Industry;
      - 3.01.2.4.2 (ii) Health care; and
      - 3.01.2.4.3 (iii)Information technology; and
    - 3.01.2.5 (E)(i) Whose program of study or certificate program will result in the student's being qualified to work in an occupation identified by the Arkansas-Division of Workforce Services under 3.01.2.5.1 subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a)-of this section.

- 3.01.2.5.1 (ii)(a) The Division of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Division of Higher Education by March 1 a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section that require the completion of a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program.
- 3.01.2.5.2 (b) The Division of Workforce Services shall publish on its website the list under 3.01.2.5.1 subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section and data supporting the list.
- 3.02 (2)-A student who received a scholarship under these rules and successfully completed a program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section is eligible to reapply for a scholarship under these rules if the student is accepted for admission in a different program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under 3.01.2.4 subdivision (1)(D) of this section.
- 3.03 (3) A student who received a scholarship under these rules and does not successfully complete the program of study or certificate program is eligible to reapply for and receive a scholarship one (1) time only.

### 4.00 DISTRIBUTION – AWARD AMOUNTS

- 4.01 (1)-If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education-("Division")-shall distribute Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships to all students who meet the eligibility requirements.
- 4.02 (2)(A) The <u>Dd</u>ivision shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every student eligible to receive a scholarship.
  - 4.02.1 (B) Except as provided in 4.03 subsection (3) of this section, the maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
    - 4.02.1.1 (i) Eight hundred dollars (\$800); or
    - 4.02.1.2 (ii)(a) The cost of the certificate program or program of study.
    - 4.02.1.3 (b) The cost of a certificate program or program of study shall be limited to:
      - 4.02.1.3.1 1)—Tuition, fees, or other charges;
      - 4.02.1.3.2 2) Textbooks or other course materials; and

- 4.02.1.3.3 3) Equipment needed for a course.
- 4.02.2 (C) The scholarship awards may be used for expenses included in the cost of the certificate program or program of study.
- 4.02.3 (D) A scholarship under this section shall be only for the academic year for which it is awarded, which includes the fall, spring, and summer semesters.
- 4.03 (3)(A) If the division has funds remaining after making the distributions under 4.02 subsection (2) of this section, the division shall distribute scholarships to students for the summer term of the academic year.
  - 4.03.1 (B) If funds are available under 4.03 subdivision (3)(A) of this section, a student shall apply for a scholarship for a summer term by a date determined by the division preceding the summer term.
  - 4.03.2 (C)(i) The division shall distribute scholarships for a summer term in the same manner as under 4.02 subsection (2) of this section.
    - 4.03.2.1 (ii)—Scholarships for a summer term may be used in the same manner as under 4.02 subsection (2) of this section.
  - 4.03.3 (D)—A student who received a scholarship under 4.02 subsection (2) of this section may also receive a scholarship for a summer term
- 4.04 (4) The division shall disburse scholarship awards on behalf of an eligible student directly to the approved institution of higher education.

### 5.00 INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- (1) College and University Responsibilities.
  - <u>5.01</u> (A) Administrative agreement.
    - 5.01.1 The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
      - 5.01.1.1 This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations.
    - <u>5.01.2</u> The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

- 5.02 (B) Disbursement records.
  - 5.02.1 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.
- 5.03 (C) Institutional Verification.
  - 5.03.1 The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in <u>an</u> eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration.
    - 5.03.1.1 The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
    - <u>5.03.1.2</u> The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
  - 5.03.2 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
    - 5.03.2.1 The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
  - 5.03.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term.
    - 5.03.3.1 The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.
- 5.04 (D) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.
  - 5.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
    - 5.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

5.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by the division ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

### 5.05 5) Due diligence.

- 5.05.1 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.
- 5.05.2 In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.
- 5.05.3 The <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

### <u>5.06</u> (F) Agreements Between Institutions.

5.06.1 An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under these rules to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

## RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS TEACHER ACADEMY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In compliance with Act 215 of 2021, the rules for the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for adoption, pending approval of the Administrative Rules Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the proposed rules presented in this agenda item for implementation of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program, pending approval of the Administrative Rules Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or her designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the rules to implement the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.

# ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS TEACHER ACADEMY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

### **Effective Date:**

### 1.00 REGULATORY AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

- 1.01 These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Education Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program.
- 1.02 These rules are enacted pursuant to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board's authority under Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-82-105 and per Act 237 of 2023.
- 1.03 The purpose of these rules is to establish the requirements and processes governing the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program.

### 2.00 **DEFINITIONS**

- 2.01 "Academy attendee" means an individual who is enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher
  Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution who is a:
  - 2.01.1 Current teacher;
  - 2.01.2 Teacher who has graduated from an Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution; or
  - 2.01.3 Current student.
- 2.02 "Division" means Arkansas Department of Education Division of Higher Education.
- 2.03 "Eligible postsecondary institution means a public or private two-year or four-year institution of higher education that:
  - 2.03.1 Offers a postbaccalaureate program that leads to teacher certification; and
  - 2.03.2 Has entered into an agreement with the Division of Higher Education for purposes of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program.

- 2.03 "Tuition and fees" means any one (1) of the following charged by an eligible postsecondary institution that is associated with a program of study that is part of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program and that leads to teacher certification:
  - 2.03.1 Tuition;
  - 2.03.2 Mandatory fees; and
  - 2.03.3 Program fees.

### 3.00 IMPLEMENTATION OF PROGRAM AND PURPOSE

- 3.01 An eligible postsecondary institution shall implement an Arkansas Teacher Academy to incentivize potential and enrolled academy attendees to:
  - 3.01.1 Enter the teaching profession; and
  - 3.01.2 Commit to teaching in:
    - 3.01.2.1 Arkansas public schools; or
    - 3.01.2.2 Critical shortage areas in Arkansas based on subject areas or geographical areas.
  - 3.01.3 As outlined in Section 5.03.1, teach at least one (1) full school year in a public school or in a school that serves primarily public school students with disabilities in the State of Arkansas for each academic year the academy attendee successfully completes and for which the academy attendee receives a scholarship for all or part of his or her tuition and fees.
- 3.02 The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with public and private postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement a centralized administrative process for each Arkansas Teacher Academy, which shall include, without limitation, the following:
  - 3.02.1 A marketing and promotion plan to recruit academy attendees for an Arkansas Teacher Academy;
  - 3.02.2 Data collection and reporting;

- 3.02.3 Tracking of postgraduation service requirements;
- 3.02.4 Coordination of induction services;
- 3.02.5 Distribution of moneys in the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Fund between eligible postsecondary institutions;
- 3.02.6 Collection of reimbursements from individuals who fail to meet the service requirements under these rules;
- 3.02.7 A process for assessing an academy attendee's ability to repay financial assistance received under this subchapter if the academy attendee who receives financial assistance under this subchapter is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the requirements of an Arkansas Teacher Academy program; and
- 3.02.8 A process for deferring service or repayment required by this subchapter based on factors adopted by the Division.

### 4.00 ELIGIBLE POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTION DUTIES

- 4.01 An Arkansas Teacher Academy may include, without limitation, a new or existing teacher preparation program that utilizes proven, research-based models of best practices that are already being implemented in similar program pathways.
- 4.02 An eligible postsecondary institution may:
  - 4.02.1 Develop a portfolio of teacher preparation programs to offer as part of its Arkansas Teacher Academy; and
  - 4.02.2 Give priority to students in grades eleven (11) and twelve (12).
- 4.03 An eligible postsecondary institution shall not:
  - 4.03.1 Exclude students in grades nine (9) and ten (10) from its Arkansas Teacher Academy; and
  - 4.03.2 Use scholarship funds that exceed the cost of tuition and fees at the eligible postsecondary institution to support its Arkansas Teacher Academy costs.

- 4.04 If a scholarship awarded to an academy attendee under these rules does not cover the eligible postsecondary institution's tuition and fees after an academy attendee receives all other financial gifts, financial aid, and grants, the eligible postsecondary institution shall not charge an academy attendee awarded a scholarship under this subchapter the remaining difference.
- 4.03 An eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formal partnerships with

  Arkansas public schools to build commitments for teacher employment upon an
  academy attendee's completion of an Arkansas Teacher Academy program.
- 4.04 The targeted deployment of academy attendees who are currently teachers who have completed an Arkansas Teacher Academy program shall be based on the:
  - 4.04.1 Needs of each public school system;
  - 4.04.2 Community that is being served; and
  - 4.04.3 Individual skills of each current teacher who has completed an Arkansas Teacher Academy program.
- 4.05 A program offered as part of an eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas

  Teacher Academy shall include accelerated program models for the following, without limitation:
  - 4.05.1 Subject areas and geographical areas identified by the Division of

    Elementary and Secondary Education as experiencing a critical shortage
    of teachers;
  - 4.05.2 An individual seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in a professional certification; and
  - 4.05.3 A student in a non-education program who seeks to complete one (1) or more teacher preparation courses in order to prepare him or her to receive a teaching certification following his or her graduation.

### 5.00 SCHOLARSHIP AMOUNTS AND ACADEMY ATTENDEE REQUIREMENTS

- 5.01 An eligible postsecondary institution shall provide to each academy attendee who is enrolled in its Arkansas Teacher Academy an annual scholarship up to the actual cost of the:
  - 5.01.1 Eligible postsecondary institution's tuition and fees for a maximum of:
    - 5.01.1.1 Two (2) academic years or four (4) academic semesters for an academy attendee who is a graduate student enrolled in the Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution;
    - 5.01.1.2 Four (4) academic years or eight (8) academic semesters for an undergraduate student enrolled in the Arkansas Teacher

      Academy at the eligible postsecondary institution; and
    - 5.01.1.3 Two (2) academic years or four (4) academic semesters for a community college student enrolled in the Arkansas Teacher Academy at the eligible postsecondary institution.
      - 5.01.1.3.1 A student who qualifies under Section 5.01.1.3 of
        these rules shall receive continued eligibility for two
        (2) additional academic years or four (4) additional
        academic semesters at a postsecondary institution
        that is an undergraduate institution.
  - 5.01.2 Obtainment of a teaching license issued by the State Board of Education, including, without limitation, the actual cost of one (1) exam required by the state board.
- 5.02 A scholarship distributed to an academy attendee under Section 5.01 of these rules shall be distributed only after all other financial gifts, financial aid, and grants have been received by an academy attendee enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution.
- 5.03 Each academy attendee who is enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy shall:
  - 5.03.1 Agree to teach at least one (1) full school year in a public school or in a school that serves primarily public school students with disabilities in the

State of Arkansas for each academic year the academy attendee successfully completes and for which the academy attendee receives a scholarship for all or part of his or her tuition and fees.

5.03.1.1 For an academy attendee who teaches and receives the scholarship concurrently, the academy attendee's commitment period to teach in a public school in the State of Arkansas as required under Section 5.03.1 of these rules shall begin after the academy attendee's graduation from an Arkansas Teacher Academy.

### 5.03.2 Reimburse the Division for the:

- 5.03.2.1 Total amount of scholarship funds the academy attendee received for tuition and fees for an academic year in which the academy attendee does not successfully complete the academic year in good academic standing; and
- 5.03.2.2 Proportional amount of the scholarship the academy attendee received for tuition and fees that corresponds to the number of school years the academy attendee agreed to teach in a public school in the State of Arkansas but did not teach in a public school in the State of Arkansas as required under Section 5.03.1 of these rules.
- 5.03.3 In the calculation of the academy attendee's commitment period to teach in a public school in the State of Arkansas per Section 5.03.1 of these rules, not include time that the academy attendee is enrolled in a summer term.
- 5.04 Students must apply for the scholarship via the Division's Scholarship Application Management System (SAMS) portal during the open application period.

### 6.00 SCHOLARSHIP DISTRIBUTION DUTIES AND REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

### 6.01 The Division shall:

6.01.1 Administer the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Fund; and

- 6.01.2 Establish criteria for distributing scholarships from the fund.
- 6.02 On or before March 1, 2024, and each year thereafter, the Division shall report to the Joint Budget Committee, or if the General Assembly is not in session, the Legislative Council, and the Governor's office, the following information:
  - 6.02.1 The total number of academy attendees enrolled in each eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy in the current academic year; and
  - 6.02.2 The total number of Arkansas Teacher Academy graduates receiving induction services in the current academic year.
- 6.03 On or before September 1, 2024, and each year thereafter, the Division shall report the following information to the Governor, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, with a copy submitted to the Secretary of State:
  - 6.03.1 The total number of academy attendees enrolled in each eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy by year of college enrollment;
  - 6.03.2 The percentage of academy attendees who complete each year of an eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy and who plan to continue to the subsequent year, delineated by each teacher preparation program offered by each eligible postsecondary institution as part of the Arkansas Teacher Academy;
  - 6.03.3 The number of academy attendees who are currently teachers and who complete a program of study through an eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy;
  - 6.03.4 The number of academy attendees who are currently teaching in a public school in the State of Arkansas as part of an agreement for receiving a scholarship under this subchapter;
  - 6.03.5 The total number of Arkansas Teacher Academy graduates receiving induction services;
  - 6.03.6 The number of academy attendees who have defaulted on their obligations

- under this subchapter and who are in repayment agreements;
- <u>6.03.7 The number of academy attendees who have deferred repayment agreements;</u>
- <u>6.03.8 The number of academy attendees who have completed repayment agreements;</u>
- 6.03.9 The methodology for distributing any moneys appropriated for the scholarships distributed under this subchapter to each eligible postsecondary institution and the amounts distributed to each eligible postsecondary institution; and
- <u>6.03.10 The amount of any unused moneys in the fund from the previous fiscal year.</u>

## RULES GOVERNING THE PRODUCTIVITY DISTRIBUTION POLICY

In compliance with Act 215 of 2021, the rules for the Productivity Funding Distribution Policy are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for adoption, pending approval of the Administrative Rules Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

**RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the proposed rules presented in this agenda item for amendment of the Productivity Funding Distribution Policy, pending approval of the Administrative Rules Subcommittee of the Arkansas Legislative Council.

**FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or her designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the rules to amend the Productivity Funding Distribution Policy.

### PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING DISTRIBUTION POLICY

### **Background**

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. The Board shall recommend funding for the state-supported institutions of higher education as a whole and the allocation of funding to each state-supported institution of higher education. The AHECB shall make separate recommendations for the two-year institutions and four-year institutions. The framework for those recommendations is described in this policy.

### **Funding Distribution Framework**

A productivity index for each institution will be calculated based on the Productivity Funding Model policies for four and two-year institutions. Each institution's current productivity index will be compared to its previous year's index to determine productivity changes. One productivity index will be calculated to represent productivity changes for institutions of higher education as a whole and will be used to determine how much new state funding is recommended. The AHECB will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no more than a 2% growth over the prior year's Revenue Stabilization Act (RSA) general revenue funding amount for four and two-year institutions.

When new state funding is recommended, the proportion of new monies to be distributed among four and two-year institutions will be divided into two separate funding pools based upon the percentage of existing RSA general revenue. If any RSA general revenue funds remain unallocated to state-supported institutions of higher education

due to productivity declines, ADHE shall utilize the funds to address statewide needs in higher education.

New RSA general revenue allocated to four and two-year institutions will be distributed among the institutions with productivity index increases. The percentage of new RSA general revenue funding recommended for institutions with productive index increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institutions productivity index increases.

Within each four and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases. Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institution productivity index increases. Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline. Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.

The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each four and two-year institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation. If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the Board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding for that institution. The AHECB will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.

In the event that an institution of higher education's RSA general revenue funding declines by more than 5% of the 2018-2019 fiscal year level due to productivity declines, ADHE shall not further recommend reductions in funding for that institution, but shall assist the institution in developing a plan for improvement and progression.

In any fiscal year for which the aggregate general revenue funding forecast to be available for state-supported institutions of higher education is greater than 2% less than the amount provided for the immediate fiscal year, the ADHE shall not further implement the productivity-based funding model until the following fiscal year.

This policy will be reviewed every three (3) years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. However, if it is determined that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this policy will be reviewed immediately.

## <u>Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Productivity-Based Funding for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education</u>

### 1.00 Purpose.

- 1.01 The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending to the General Assembly funding for applicable institutions.
- 1.02 The board shall recommend funding for the institutions as a collective and funding to each individual institution.
- 1.03 The board shall make separate recommendations for the two-year institutions and four-year institutions.

### 2.00 Definitions.

- 2.01 "Institution" means a state supported:
  - 2.01.1 Two-year institution of higher education; or
  - 2.01.2 Four-year institution of higher education.
- 2.02 "Productivity-based funding" means a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for postsecondary education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals.
- 2.03 "Productivity index" means
- 2.04 "RSA" means the Revenue Stabilization Act.

### 3.00 Funding Distribution Framework

- 3.01 A productivity index for each institution will be calculated based on the Productivity Funding Model Policies for Universities and Colleges.
  - 3.01.1 Each institution's current productivity index will be compared to its previous year's index to determine productivity changes.
  - 3.01.2 One productivity index will be calculated to represent productivity changes for institutions as a collective and will be used to determine how much new state funding is recommended.
  - 3.01.3 The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no

- more than a 2% growth over the prior year's RSA general revenue funding amount for institutions.
- 3.02 When new state funding is recommended, the proportion of new monies to be distributed among institutions will be divided into two separate funding pools for four and two-year institutions based upon the percentage of existing RSA general revenue.
  - 3.02.1 If any RSA general revenue funds remain unallocated to institutions due to productivity declines, the Division of Higher Education shall utilize the funds to address statewide needs in higher education.
  - 3.02.2 New RSA general revenue allocated to institutions will be distributed among the institutions with productivity index increases.
  - 3.02.3 The percentage of new RSA general revenue funding recommended for institutions with productivity index increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall institutions' productivity index increases.
- 3.03 Within each four and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases.
  - 3.03.1 Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four or two-year institution productivity index increases.
  - 3.03.2 Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline.
  - 3.03.3 Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.
- 3.04 The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation.
  - 3.04.1 If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; or 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any

- <u>funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding</u> for that institution.
- 3.04.2 The board will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.
- 3.05 In the event that an institution of higher education's RSA general revenue funding declines by more than 5% within any consecutive five-year period due to productivity declines, the division shall not further recommend reductions in funding for that institution.
- 3.06 In any fiscal year for which the aggregate general revenue funding forecast to be available for state-supported institutions of higher education is greater than 2% less than the amount provided for the immediate fiscal year, the division shall not further implement the productivity-based funding model until the following fiscal year.
- 3.07 This rule will be reviewed every three (3) years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state.
- 3.08 However, if the division determines that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this rule will be reviewed immediately.
