Minutes of Meeting

Agenda Item No. 1
Welcome

Chair Carr began by calling on Chancellor Christina Drale for a welcome. Dr. Drale welcomed Coordinating Board members, ADHE staff, and presidents and chancellors to the UALR campus, highlighting the institution's numerous facility upgrades and announcing the February launch of the Cyberspace Operations, Research, and Education (CORE) Center.

Next, Chair Carr introduced Arkansas' Secretary of Education Jacob Oliva and ADE's Press Secretary Kaelin Clay.

Agenda Item No. 2
Approval of Minutes

Graycen Bigger moved to approve Agenda Item No. 2. Lucas Pointer seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 3
Report of Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee (Lucas Pointer, Dr. Katherine Dudley and Carolyn Rhinehart) recommended the following slate of Board officers for 2026-2027.

Graycen Bigger moved to accept the 2026-2027 nominations. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 4
Reimbursement of Expenses for
Members of the AHECB and ICAC

Although members of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and its Institutional Certification Advisory Committee (ICAC) by law serve without compensation, they may receive expense reimbursement for performing official board duties after following certain procedures set out by Act 1211 of 1995 (A.C.A. §25-16-901 et seq.).

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, by a majority vote of its total membership, authorizes expense reimbursement for each board member and member of the ICAC for performing official board duties.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the expense reimbursement shall not exceed the rate established for state employees by state travel regulations.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Division of Higher Education to send a copy of this resolution to the Department of Finance and Administration to notify that agency of compliance with Act 1211 of 1995.

Lucas Pointer moved to approve Agenda Item No. 4. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 5
Commissioner's Report

Institutional Changes

Dr. Ricky Tompkins has been named the next chancellor of the University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana (UAHT), beginning on February 1.

Tompkins currently serves as vice president for technical education and workforce development at North Arkansas College. He has worked with multiple institutions and has brought decades of experience in higher education leadership across Arkansas.

Staff Changes

Jason Kunau joined ADHE as our new Finance Controller. He began on January 20th. Jason previously served as the CFO for Arkansas PBS.

Tony Williams Update

Tony Williams, Director of the Arkansas Student Loan Authority (ASLA), provided an update on student loan programs, including recent developments, borrower trends, and ongoing efforts to support student access and affordability across the state.

Agenda Item No. 6
University of Arkansas System Update

The University of Arkansas System President Jay Silveria presented an update on the UA System. President Silveria began by thanking the AHECB and Secretary Oliva for all they do for education in Arkansas. He then explained that the UA System manages a total systemwide budget of more than \$4.2 billion and employs nearly 27,000 Arkansans. Its benefits plan covers more than 35,000 individuals, and the system enrolls nearly 70,000 students. Over the past five years, its institutions have awarded more than 100,000 degrees and certificates, helping to ensure better futures for Arkansans and their communities.

Agenda Item No. 7
Annual Report on Institutional Certification

Alana Colburn presented an update on the number of Arkansas residents pursuing academic degrees offered by out-of-state or private institutions certified to operate in Arkansas under Arkansas Code Annotated §6-61-301.

Boles reported that in 2024-25, 8 Arkansas campuses, 36 institutions with programs delivered only through distance technology, 5 institutions offering programs both on Arkansas campuses and through distance technology and 3 institutions offering programs only on an Arkansas campus, were certified under ICAC rules.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 8
Report on Academic Program Viability

Mason Campbell presented a summary report on academic programs reviewed by the institutions for program viability purposes. ADHE staff annually identify existing certificate and degree programs that do not meet AHECB program viability standards. New certificates and associate degrees will be identified for program viability standards after three years, and bachelor's degrees and above will be identified after five years.

Graycen Bigger thanked ADHE staff for their work on the program, emphasizing the importance of maintaining a strong focus on students and ensuring programs provide clear, viable pathways.

Agenda Item No. 9
Annual Enrollment Report

Sonia Hazelwood reported that the total unduplicated headcount for the fall 2025 term in all sectors of Arkansas higher education, including public 4-year universities, public 2-

year colleges, private and independent colleges and universities, two nursing schools, and one technical institute was 160,453 students.

Arkansas higher education reported its highest ever fall term headcount in fall 2011 of 173,887 unduplicated students, likely in response to the recession of 2008. After that, headcount started a ten-year downward trend where the last two years of that ten-year period were impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. Headcount fell to 145,683 in fall 2021, which is comparable to headcount reported in fall terms of 2007 and 2008. The fall 2025 statewide headcount of 160,453, finally surpassed the pre-pandemic fall 2019 headcount of 156,064.

Chair Carr inquired whether Arkansas is experiencing the enrollment cliff, and Sonia Hazelwood indicated that the state has not yet seen its impact.

Agenda Item No. 10 Report on College-Going Rate

Sonia Hazelwood reported that of the 35,057 public high school students graduating from an Arkansas public high school in 2025, 14,762 enrolled at an Arkansas public or private/independent institution in fall 2025 immediately following their high school graduation. This represents a College-Going Rate of 42.1%, which is consistent with the 42% reported since the fall 2021 term.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 11 Annual Higher Education Financial Condition Report

Nick Fuller presented the Annual Higher Education Financial Condition Report. The purpose of this report is to describe the financial condition as well as the difficulties and challenges experienced by Arkansas's Public Institutions of Higher Education. It is recommended that ADHE continue to work with institutions to monitor and refine the Productivity Funding Model policies to ensure adequate funding is available to meet student needs, innovation is encouraged, and that the policies continue to respond to attainment goals and priorities of the state. AHECB, ADHE and institutions of higher education work with the legislature toward alignment of institutional funding policies, state financial aid policies, and tuition policies in a way that prioritizes higher education affordability.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 12 Maintenance Report

The AHECB policy for maintenance of new facilities passed October 29, 2010, states that a report on the amount transferred to plant funds would be presented annually at the October Board meeting. This policy was proposed to ensure that in the future, all newly constructed or purchased facilities will have a source of funding for maintenance of the new facility. Institutions seeking approval of a loan or a bond issue for the

construction or purchase of a new facility must provide for the maintenance of that facility by transferring annually to plant funds an amount as recommended by the Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges (APPA). This is currently \$2.50 per gross square foot for an educational and general facility or \$1.25 per gross square foot for an auxiliary facility. A lower rate per gross square foot for a specific building/facility can be approved with appropriate justification.

Agenda Item No. 13
Recommendations on Educational and General Operations
State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education

A.C.A. §6-61-234 (Act 148 of 2017) directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt policies developed by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

For the universities, a net 2.00% change in funding is recommended for a total change in university funding of \$8,801,648.

For the two-year colleges, a net 2.000% change in funding is recommended for a total change in two-year college funding of \$2,933,138.

For the non-formula entities, the recommendation is for a 3.4% increase based on the HEPI index and a recommendation of full funding of Operations and Program Enhancement requests which combined would require an additional \$28.08 million, of which \$3.4 million would be for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS).

There were no questions.

Dr. Katherine Dudley moved to approve Agenda Item No. 13. Lucas Pointer seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 14
Personal Services Recommendations

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, and line-item maximum salaries for all non-classified administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education have been reviewed, and changes are recommended.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 27,144 positions currently authorized. For the 2026-27 Fiscal Year, institutions requested an increase of 49 positions and the deletion of 32 positions, for a net new request of 17 positions. ADHE staff recommends this net increase of 17 positions, for a total recommendation of 27,161 positions (a 0.1 percent increase). UAMS currently has 12,874 authorized positions and did not request any changes. ADHE staff recommends the current level of 12,874 positions.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, and maximum salaries for non-classified positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2026-27 fiscal year as recommended by staff.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board requests the Commissioner to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2026-27 fiscal year.

There were no questions.

Graycen Bigger moved to approve Agenda Item No. 14. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 15
Economic Feasibility of Debt Issue
Southern Arkansas University

Southern Arkansas University Magnolia (SAUM) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to secure auxiliary refunding bonds not to exceed \$23.775 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate of 4.85 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for auxiliary purposes. The Southern Arkansas University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on October 8, 2025.

The auxiliary bond issue will be approximately \$23.775 million with an annual debt service of \$5,389,981 and a term of thirty (30) years. Proceeds will be used to refund the 2015, 2016 and the 2018A series bonds, with no new funds issued. These bonds were secured through a privatized housing agreement with SAUM's Alumni Association. The existing obligation and the related assets will be transferred to the University.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers the economically feasible plans for Southern Arkansas University Magnolia (SAUM) to secure auxiliary refunding bonds in an amount not to

exceed \$23.775 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate of 4.85 percent. Proceeds will be used to refund the 2015, 2016 and the 2018A series bonds, with no new funds issued.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Southern Arkansas University System and Southern Arkansas University Magnolia (SAUM) of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Lucas Pointer moved to approve Agenda Item No. 15. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 16
Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue
Arkansas State University-Jonesboro

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to secure a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund (CSBRLF) not to exceed \$2.5M with a term of ten (10) years with an annual interest rate not to exceed 0.2 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general purposes (E&G). The Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University-System approved this financing at its meeting on December 12, 2025.

The E&G CSBRLF loan issue will not exceed \$2.5M with an estimated annual debt service of \$251,094 and a term of ten (10) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used for the construction of an Equine Barn and a Bovine Barn, and for the replacement of the Dean B. Ellis Library Chiller at ASUJ. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of net tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to E&G debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) to obtain a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund (CSBRLF) not to exceed \$2.5M million with a term of up to ten (10) years at an estimated annual interest rate of 0.2 percent to construct an Equine Barn and a Bovine Barn, and for the replacement of the Dean B. Ellis Library Chiller at ASUJ.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University-System (ASU-SYS) and the Chancellor of Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Dr. Katherine Dudley moved to approve Agenda Item No. 16. Lucas Pointer seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 17
Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue
Arkansas State University-Jonesboro

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$16 million with a term of fifteen (15) years at an estimated annual interest rate of 4.5 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for auxiliary purposes. The Arkansas State University System Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on December 12, 2025.

The auxiliary issue will be up to \$16 million with a total maximum annual debt service of \$1,489,821 and a term of fifteen (15) years. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used to renovate Kays Hall.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) to issue bonds not to exceed \$16 million with a term of fifteen (15) years at an estimated annual interest rate of 4.5 percent to renovate Kays Hall.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University-System and the Chancellor of Arkansas State University-Jonesboro of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Dr. Katherine Dudley moved to approve Agenda Item No. 17. Lucas Pointer seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 18
Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture
Certificate of Proficiency in Precision Agriculture
Arkansas State University – Beebe

The administration of Arkansas State University Beebe (ASUB) and Board of Trustees of the Arkansas State University System request approval to offer the Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture and Certificate of Proficiency in Precision Agriculture, effective Spring 2026.

The proposed Precision Agriculture program consists of a 31-credit-hour Technical Certificate and a 9-credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency both designed to meet growing

industry needs in technology-driven farming and agri-technology. This program's curriculum integrates plant and soil science, geospatial technologies, and agricultural systems with specialized training in GPS-guided equipment, unmanned aerial vehicles, control systems, and livestock monitoring tools. This blend of coursework and application will prepare students for entry-level employment in precision agriculture operations or for continued study in related degree programs.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture (CIP 01.0000) and Certificate of Proficiency in Precision Agriculture (CIP 01.0000) at Arkansas State University Beebe, effective Spring 2026.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of Arkansas State University Beebe and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Arkansas State University System of the approval.

Dr. Blake Perkins, Chief Academic Officer, presented additional background information.

Graycen Bigger noted the letters of support from area high schools and asked whether the program would be primarily geared toward concurrent credit. Dr. Perkins responded that the focus is not primarily on current students, but rather on the introductory course.

Bigger observed that the farming industry has changed since 2023 and asked whether ASU-Beebe has discussed the future of agriculture, including hiring needs and wage projections for 2026–27. Dr. Perkins acknowledged the uncertainty but noted that the institution has maintained ongoing contact with local partners and is working to integrate this information into their program planning.

Bigger recommended that ASUB clearly market this program to their students.

Lucas Pointer moved to approve Agenda Item No. 18. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 19
Associate of Applied Science in Farm and Ranch Management
Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture
Certificate of Proficiency in Agriculture Drone Technology
University of Arkansas Community College Batesville

The administration of the University of Arkansas Community College Batesville (UACCB) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Associate of Applied Science in Farm and Ranch Management (CIP 01.0104), Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture (CIP 01.0000), and the Certificate of Proficiency in Agriculture Drone Technology (CIP 49.0109), effective Fall 2026.

The proposed Farm and Ranch Management program will provide students with stackable credentials that integrate applied learning with essential technical and business competencies, preparing graduates to successfully operate or support modern farm and ranch enterprises. The 60-credit-hour Associate of Applied Science in Farm and Ranch Management, a primarily hands-on program, will prepare students to manage crop or livestock production by integrating best practices of agriculture operation with practical tools to start or manage a small-scale farm business. The 30-credit-hour Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture will provide students with foundational knowledge in safety principles and practices, equipment operation, maintenance, and repair, resource management, efficiency, and sustainability. The 12-credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency in Agriculture Drone Technology offers essential training in agricultural drone operations and precision agriculture tools. Together, these credentials will prepare graduates for entry-level employment in precision agriculture, farm operations, and related fields, while supporting a skilled workforce capable of meeting the technological demands of modern agriculture.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Associate of Applied Science in Farm and Ranch Management (CIP 01.0104), Technical Certificate in Precision Agriculture (CIP 01.0000), and Certificate of Proficiency in Agriculture Drone Technology (CIP 49.0109) at the University of Arkansas Community College Batesville, effective Fall 2026.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College Batesville and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System of the approval.

Dr. Zach Perrine and Dr. Brian Shonk presented additional background information.

Dr. Katherine Dudley inquired about UACCB's strategy for recruiting students. Dr. Perrinne responded that the college has already begun collaborating with local agriculture programs to identify students who may be interested in this program.

Graycen Bigger asked what portion of the poultry industry is involved in the program. Dr. Shonk explained that the farmland and poultry operations are connected.

Graycen Bigger moved to approve Agenda Item No. 19. Dr. Katherine Dudley seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Items No. 20 & 21
Arkansas Public Institutions
Letters of Notification and Letters of Intent

The Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education approved institutional requests for new programs not requiring Board action unless further review is requested by the Board. During this period, the Institutional Certification Advisory Committee received notice of requests from Arkansas public institutions to offer degree programs. The program notice lists appear in the Arkansas Public Institutions Letters of Notification on pages 20-1 through 20-24 and in the Arkansas public institutions Letters of Intent on pages 21-1 of the agenda book.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 22
Out-of-State and Arkansas Private Institutions

RESOLVED, That pursuant to A.C.A. §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board grants initial certification to the institutions listed on pages 1 - 2 to offer the specified degree programs to Arkansas residents for a period of three years through December 31, 2029.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the administration of said institutions that the certification of the degree programs requires the institution to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education whenever any of the following occurs: (1) major reorganization of the controlling body; (2) changes in the charter or incorporation documents of the institution; or (3) changes in the method of operation of the institution's programs in Arkansas.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner to notify the administration of said institutions that any advertisement or published materials using the name of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board or the Arkansas Division of Higher Education must contain the following statement:

Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board certification does not constitute an endorsement of any institution or program. Such certification merely indicates that certain criteria have been met as required under the rules and regulations implementing institutional and program certification as defined in A.C.A. §6-61-301.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER

CTE Day at the Capitol



On Tuesday, February 3, 2026, the Arkansas Department of Education's Division of Career and Technical Education (CTE) hosted CTE Day at the Capitol, showcasing a wide range of CTE programs. The event featured Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO) state officers alongside dedicated CTE educators, highlighting the impact and importance of career-focused education across the state.

BRTC & WBU Partnership

On February 17, Black River Technical College (BRTC) and Williams Baptist University (WBU) formalized a partnership by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) aimed at strengthening workforce development in the region. Through this collaboration, both institutions will work together to develop shared degree programs and educational pathways, expand shared instruction and facilities, and enhance workforce support services.



Arkansas 250 Historical Marker

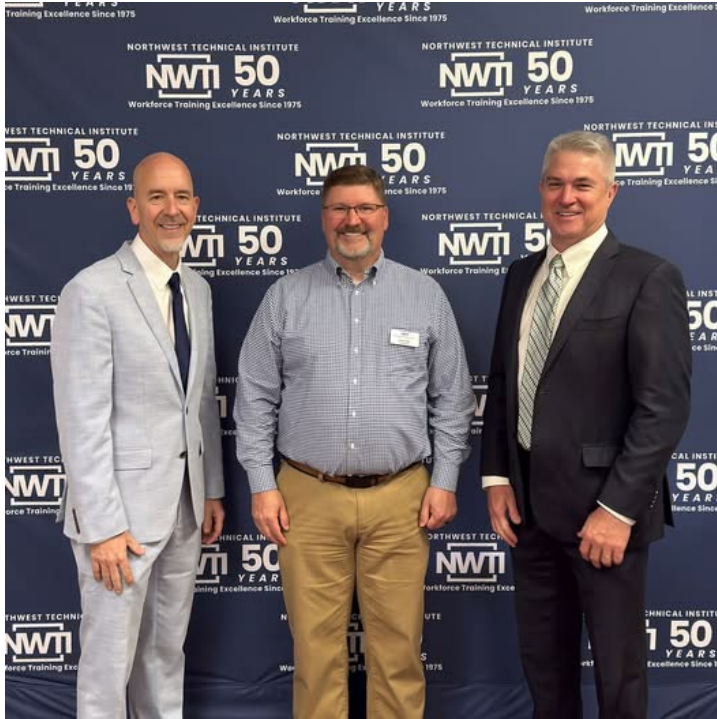
On March 6, the Arkansas250 Commission was proud to unveil the fourth Arkansas 250 historical marker at Arkansas Post Museum State Park. Arkansas Post stands as one of the oldest settlements in the Arkansas Grand Prairie and the first territorial capital of Arkansas. For generations, this place has been a crossroads of cultures, commerce, and conflict, shaping the story of our state and the nation. With the unveiling of this marker, we honor the enduring legacy of Arkansas Post and the role it played in the early foundations of Arkansas.



Veterans Training and Education

During the FY25 contract year, ADHE’s State Approving Agency received the highest rating available for its successful completion of all contract requirements, reflecting a strong commitment to quality service and compliance. On October 1, 2025, an updated system—Enrollment Manager—was launched to enhance the experience for veterans. This system provides an improved platform for veterans to access information about school options and available benefits, helping them make more informed decisions. The agency has continued this high level of performance into the current contract year and has met all required benchmarks to date.

Northwest Technical Institute Visit



On March 11, Arkansas Secretary of Education Jacob Oliva and Arkansas Department of Higher Education Commissioner Ken Warden met with David Patty, President of Northwest Technical Institute, for a tour of the institution’s new Ammonia Refrigeration facility. During the visit, they observed hands-on training environments designed to prepare students for high-demand careers in industrial refrigeration and discussed the program’s role in supporting workforce development across the region. The tour highlighted the facility’s state-of-the-art equipment, industry-aligned curriculum, and strong partnerships with employers, all of which

contribute to creating a skilled talent pipeline for Arkansas’s growing technical workforce.

CPI/Perkins Updates

Class XII of the Facilitating Career Development program was completed in March. This program prepares high school career coaches, college career advisors, Arkansas Career Pathways Initiative (CPI) staff, and other college personnel to effectively guide students in making informed college and career decisions, while also preparing participants for professional certification. A total of thirty-eight individuals completed the program this year, bringing overall participation to 325 since its inception in 2015. The program is funded through the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act and the Arkansas Career Pathways Initiative.

CPI staff and supervisors will convene in Little Rock on April 14–15 for the annual CPI Workshop. Key topics will include workforce development partnerships, student success strategies, artificial intelligence, and mental health. The workshop will feature a keynote presentation on adaptive leadership by Dr. Jeff Aulgur of Arkansas Tech University.

CPI stakeholder meetings will be held in April with Southeast Arkansas College, National Park College, and ASU Three Rivers. These meetings will focus on identifying referral partners, expanding available resources for CPI students, and strengthening collaboration to better serve participants and support workforce outcomes.

HBCU Summit

On March 12, 2026, Arkansas leaders, including Governor Sarah Huckabee Sanders and Commissioner Ken Warden attended Representative French Hill's HBCU summit at Arkansas Baptist College in North Little Rock to discuss opportunities and challenges facing historically Black colleges and universities in the state.



Engage Arkansas Update

Engage Arkansas continues to expand capacity and advance several strategic initiatives. They are currently awaiting a grant award decision from Education Design Lab for the *Advancing Workforce Mobility for STARs (Skilled Through Alternative Routes)* initiative, which would allow Engage Arkansas to assess and validate durable skills developed through AmeriCorps service in partnership with AR LAUNCH, America's Service Commissions, and three additional states. They are also awaiting implementation funding decisions for the Youth Mental Health Corps (funded by the Schultz Family Foundation and Pinterest), focused on improving youth behavioral health, and are working with Apprenticely and Arkansas Children's Hospital to develop a pathway that would allow YMHC service to function as a pre-apprenticeship leading into a registered apprenticeship after service.

EnageAR is actively administering the 2026–2027 AmeriCorps program grant competition, with eight organizations expressing interest in implementation grants and eight in planning grants to develop new programs. Later this spring, Engage Arkansas will apply for federal Volunteer Generation Funds for the first time, which will strengthen nonprofit volunteer capacity statewide, with an emphasis on disaster preparedness and response, including expanding active Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) in schools and on higher education campuses. All State AmeriCorps members recently completed the Stop the Bleed training, and the Arkansas Red Cross has expressed interest in partnering to train local members in disaster shelter management. The Red Cross may also pursue a planning grant to advance its partnership with AmeriCorps.

Finally, EngageAR is working with Arkansas Department of Higher Education leadership and ADE's CTE Pre-Educator Pathway Coordinator to design a State Service Corps focused on improving third grade reading outcomes. These efforts reflect continued momentum in aligning national service with Arkansas priorities in workforce development, education, youth behavioral health, and community resilience.

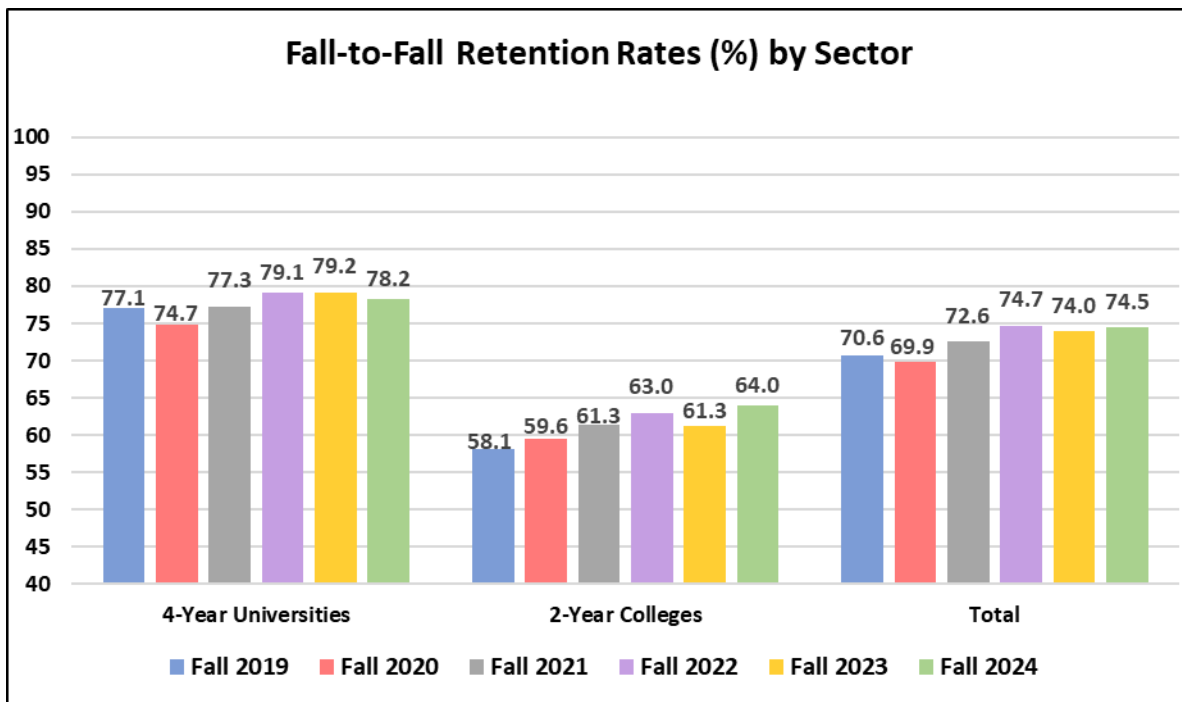
ANNUAL REPORT ON STUDENT RETENTION AND GRADUATION FOR ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION

Statewide student retention and graduation rates for students entering Arkansas higher education institutions are presented in this report for both public 4-Year and 2-Year institutions, and private/independent institutions. The Arkansas Higher Education Information System (AHEIS) enables multi-year student retention and graduation tracking in compliance with Student-Right-to-Know legislation and Act 267 of 1989.

Statewide Retention

The retention calculations for the 4-year institutions are based on students in a fall term cohort of first-time in college, full-time, bachelor-seeking students who returned the fall term of the next academic year. For 2-year colleges, students who returned the next fall, as well as those who completed a credential by the next fall are included as part of the retention rate. The methodology used for this report closely aligns with IPEDS reporting.

The following chart represents the overall retention rate for the six most recent cohorts for the public institutions. The 4-year institutions reported a 1% decline in their retention rate, while the 2-year colleges showed an almost 3% increase in their retention rate. Statewide retention rates have remained steady at 74% for the past three years.

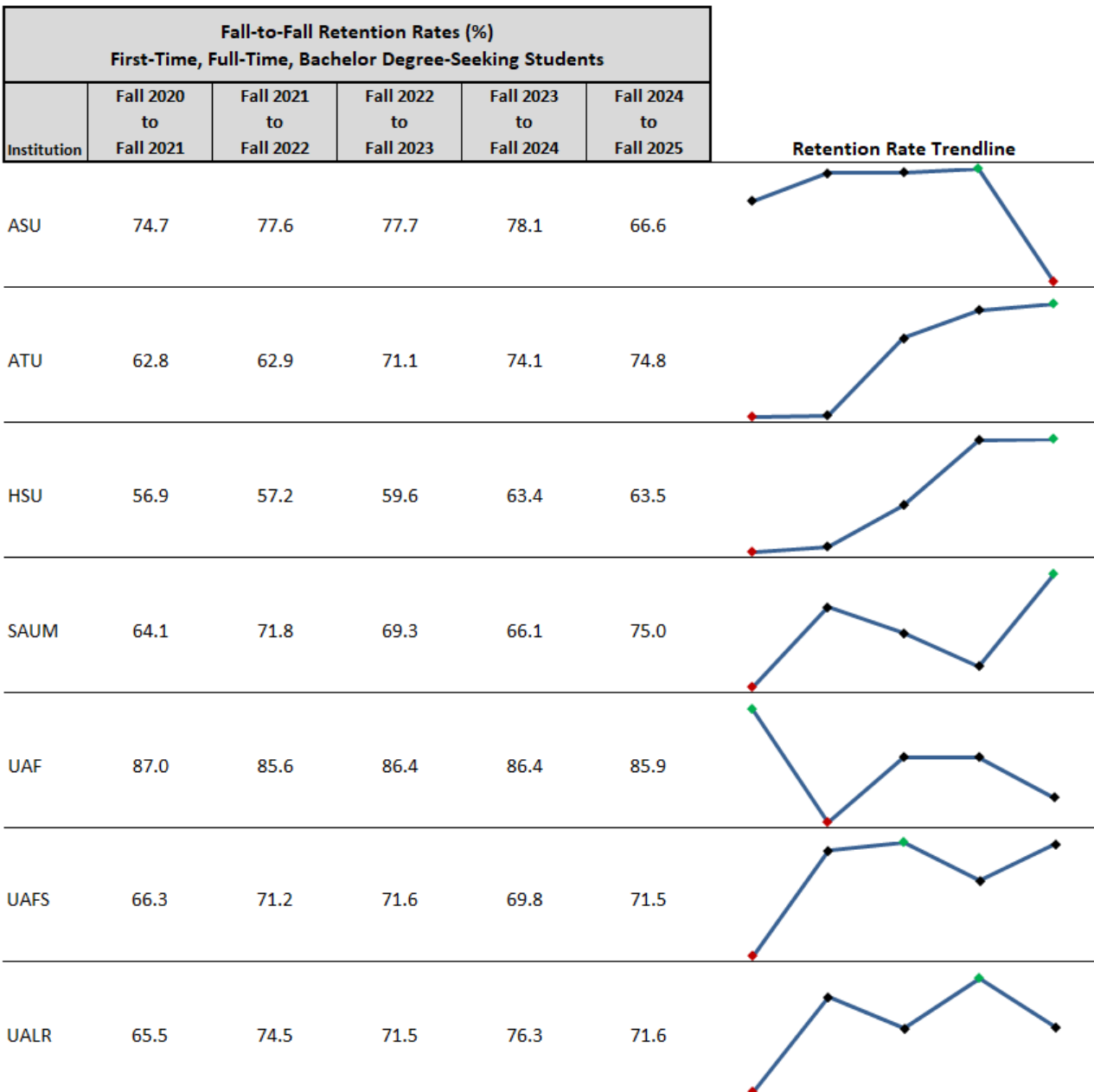


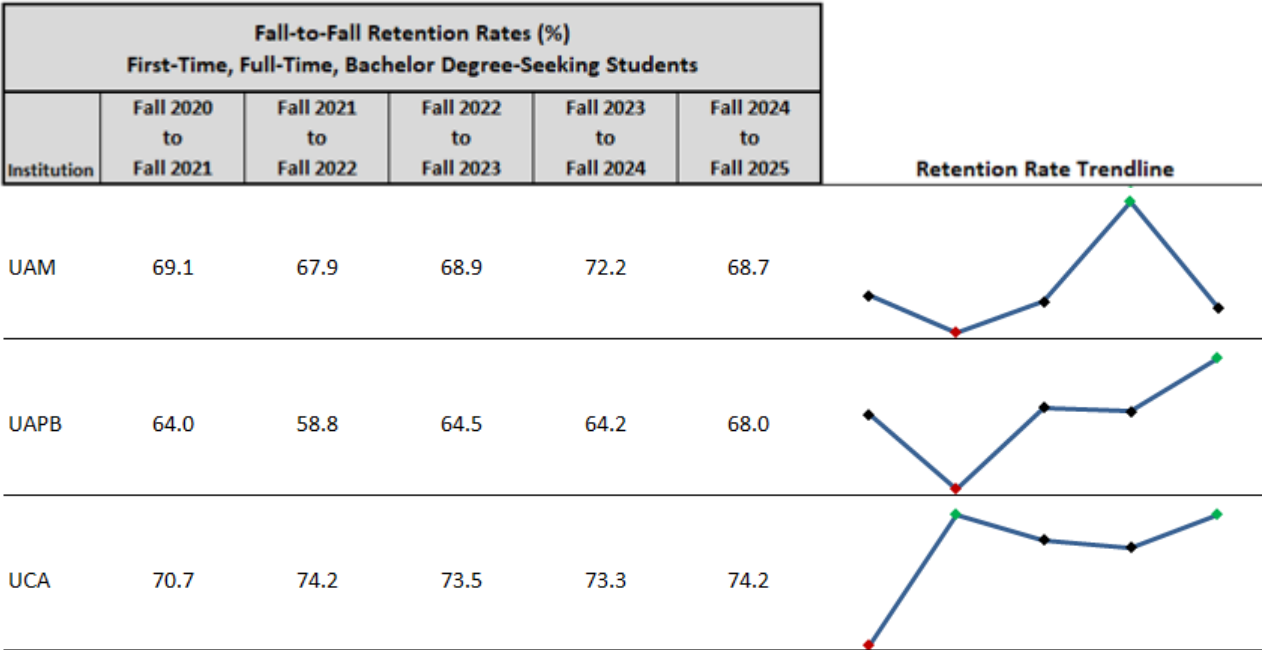
Retention Rates by University

Six 4-year universities reported an increase in the fall-to-fall retention rate when comparing the Fall 2023 cohort to the Fall 2024 cohort. Southern Arkansas University reported the largest increase of almost 9% and UA Pine Bluff reported a percentage change increase of almost 4% over last year.

Arkansas State University experienced an unusual 11.5% decline in their retention rate, which is specifically related to the uncertainties the international student population is experiencing nationwide.

Retention Rates by College

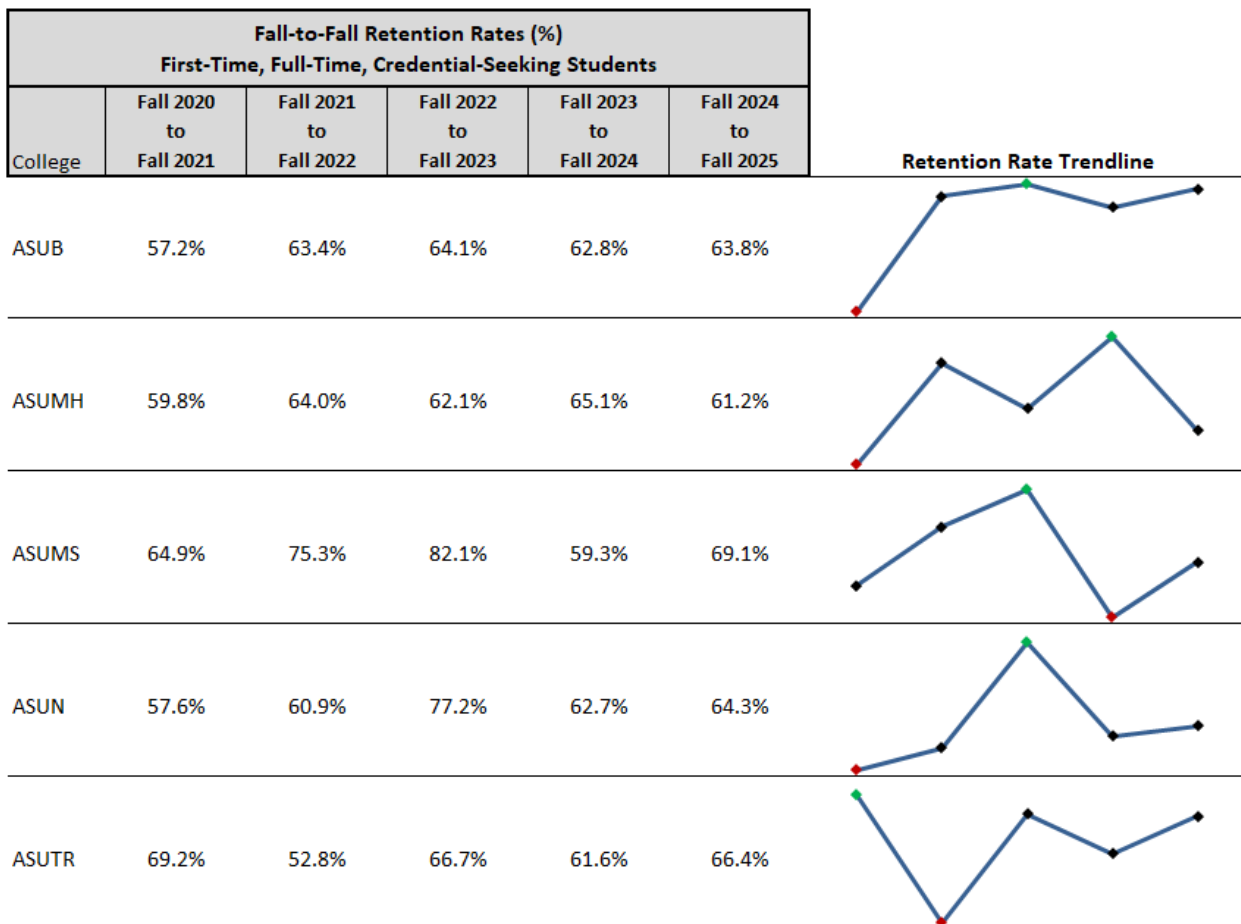
Sixteen of the twenty-two 2-year colleges reported an increase in the fall-to-fall retention rate when comparing the Fall 2023 cohort to the Fall 2024 cohort. For 2-year colleges, students who returned the next fall, as well as those who completed a credential by the next fall are included as part of the retention rate.

For the Arkansas State University System, four of five colleges reported a higher retention rate for the most recent cohort, including ASU-Mid-South which showed an almost 10% increase in their retention rate.

Four of eight of the University of Arkansas System colleges reported retention rate increases including a 15% increase for UA Cossatot. UA Hope-Texarkana showed a 5.6% increase in their retention rate.

For the other nine non-system colleges, eight reported an increase in retention rates including double-digit increases for Ozarka College at 15%, South Arkansas College at 13.8% and Arkansas Northeastern College at 12.8%.

Retention rates for the 2-year colleges include students retained the following fall term and students who completed a credential during the year.

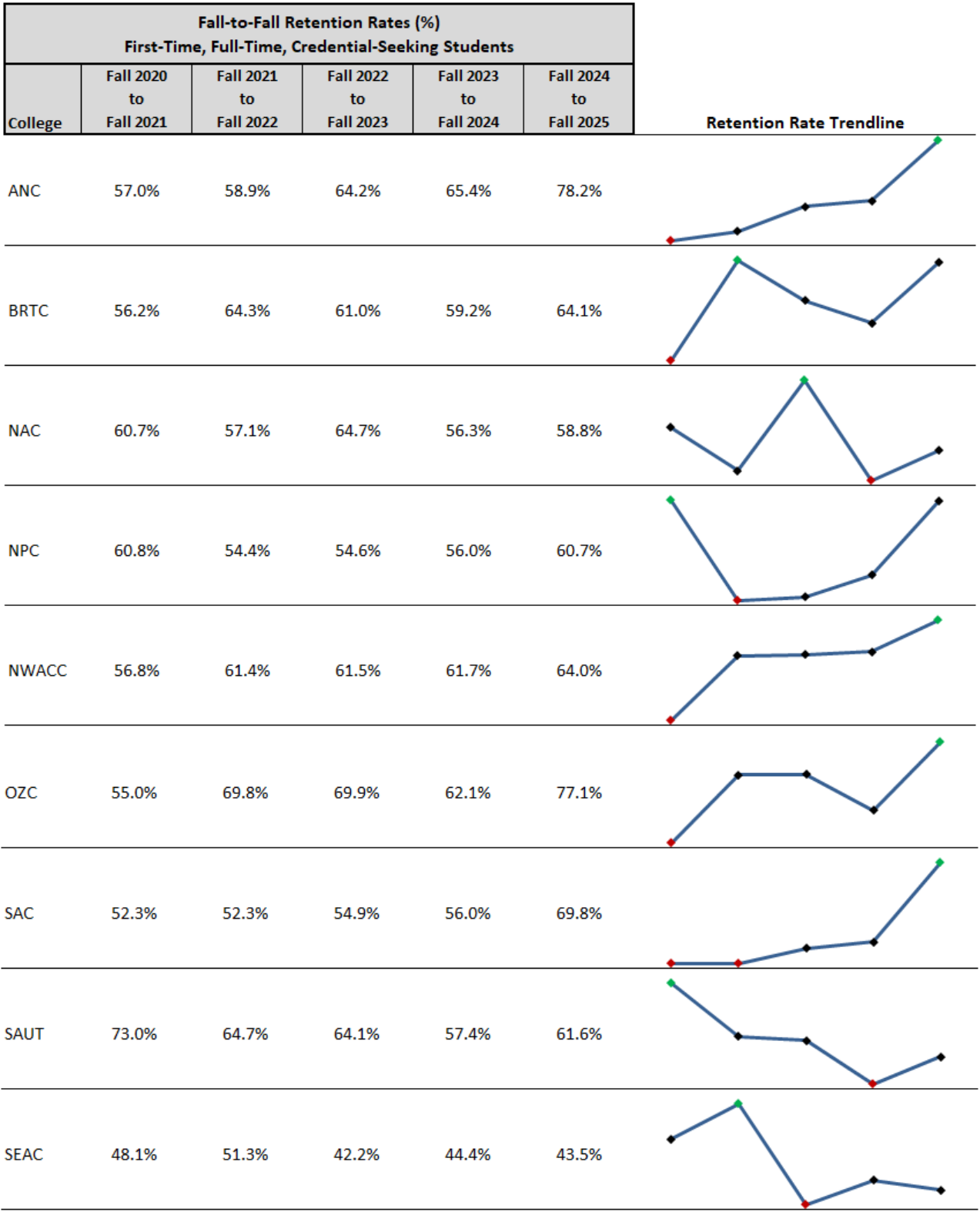

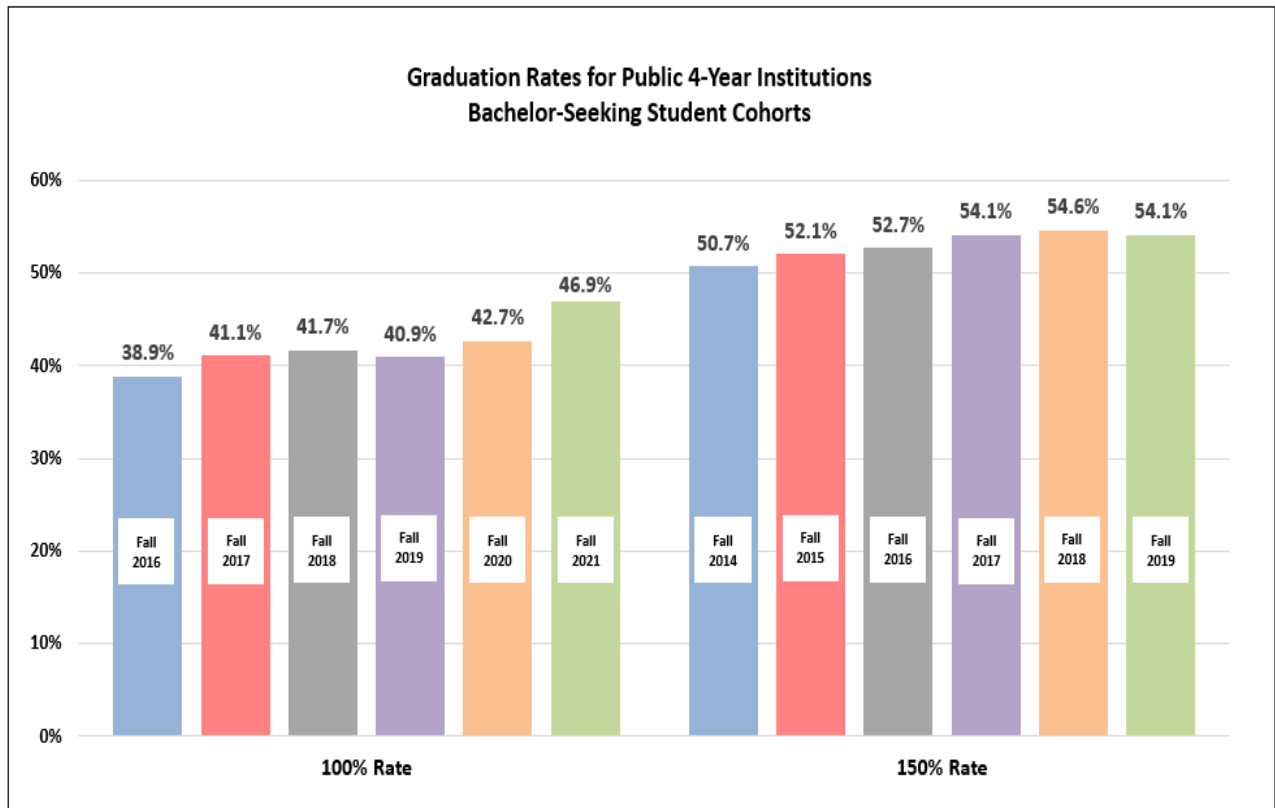

Statewide Graduation Rates

Graduation rates for our 4-year public and private/independent universities presented here are based on first-time in college, full-time, bachelor-seeking students. The following charts provide graduation rates for both students graduating in four years which is considered on-time (100% rate) and those graduating in six years (150% rate).

The 100% on-time graduation rate improved more than 4% for the Fall 2021 entering student cohort and is the highest reported 100% graduation rate. The 150% graduation rate of 54.1% is slightly lower than last year, but has consistently remained at 54% the past three cohorts.



Graduation Rates by University

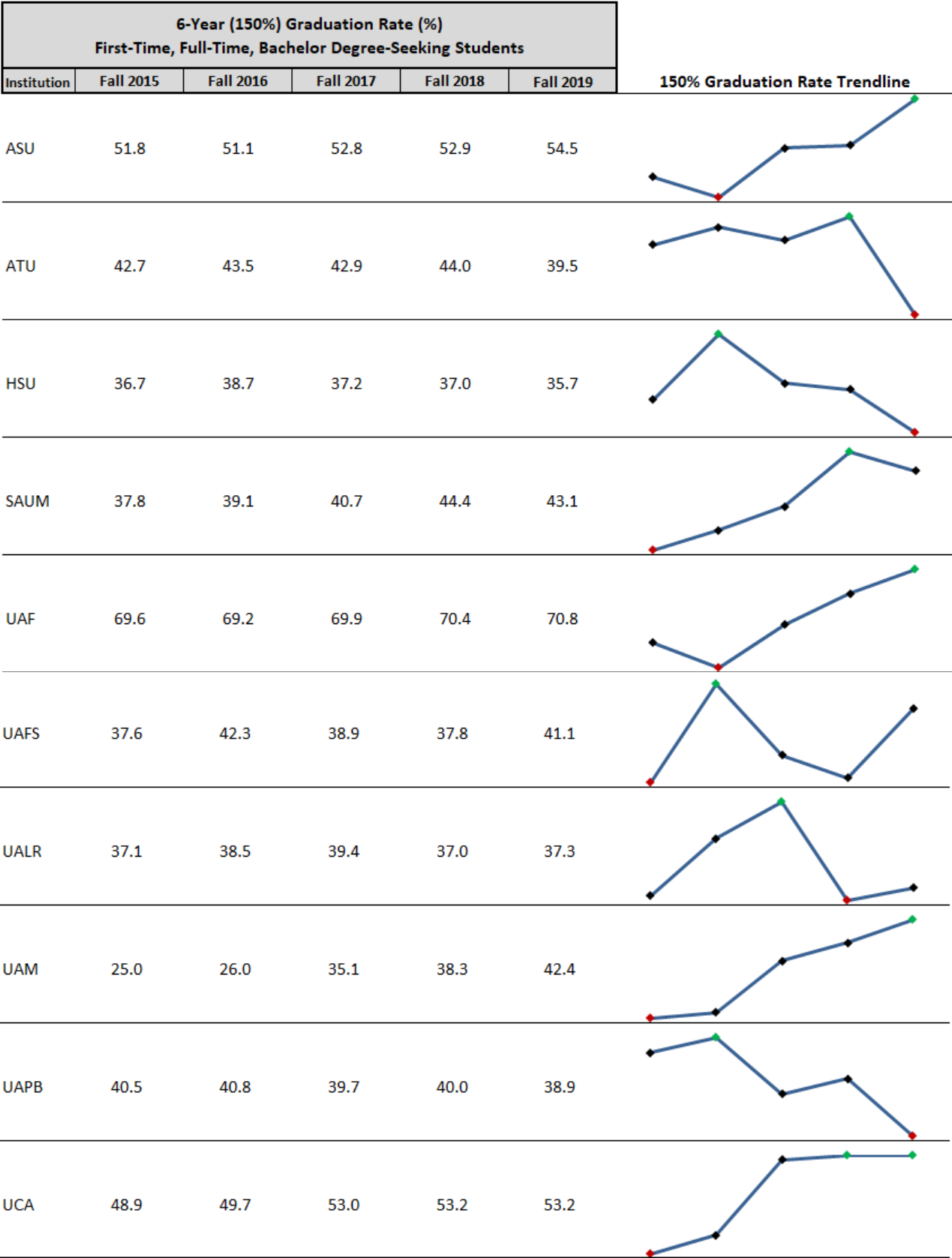
Nine of ten universities reported an increase in the 100% on-time graduation rate. Those increases ranged from 0.8 to 5.1% reported by the University of Arkansas at Monticello. Henderson State University reported the only 4-year institution decline in graduation rate of 3%.

Five of ten of the universities reported an increase in the 150% graduation rate ranging between 0.3% and 4.1%.

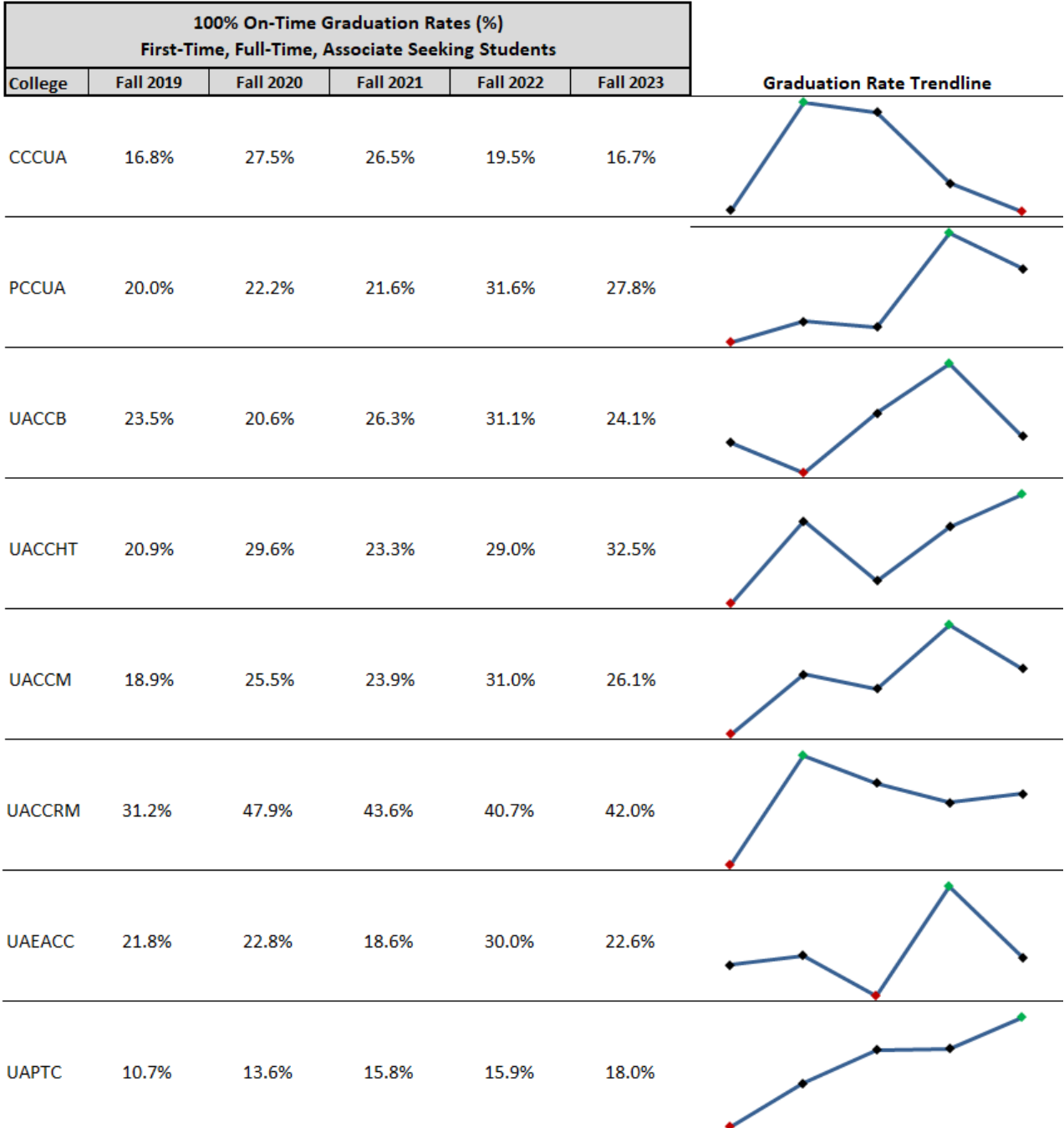

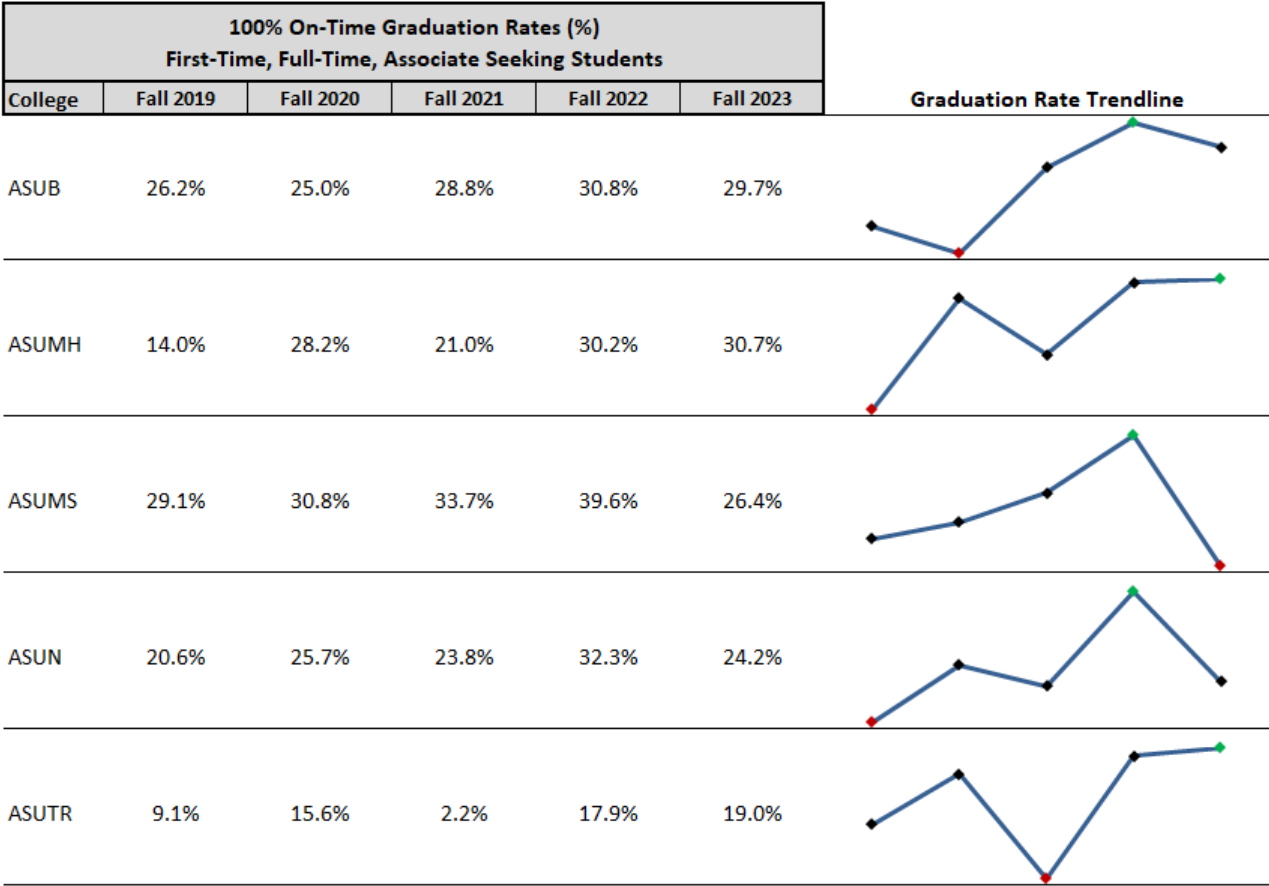

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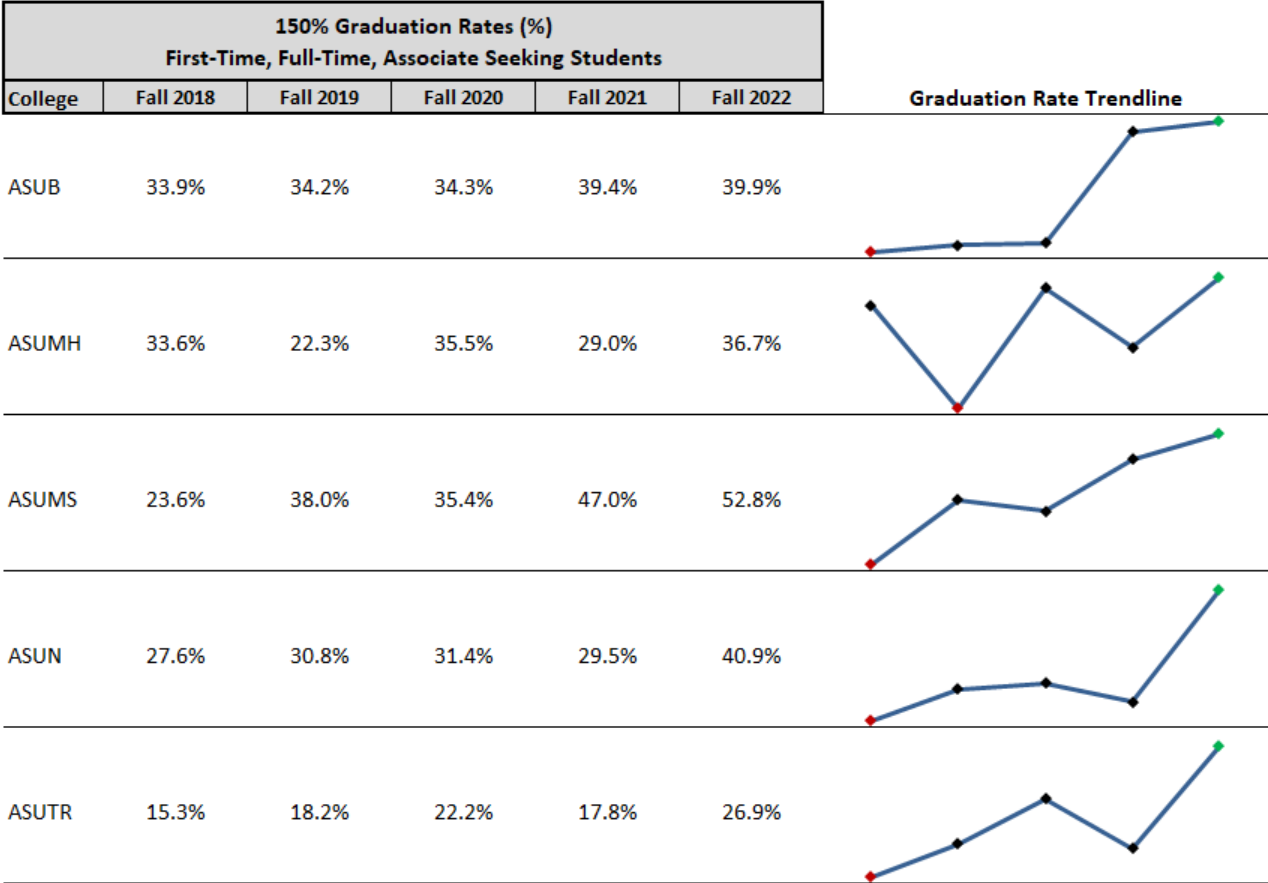
Graduation Rate Trendline

ANNUAL REPORT ON PARTICIPATION, RETENTION AND GRADUATION OF STUDENT-ATHLETES

This report complies with Act 267 of 1989 that requires reporting of retention and graduation rates for first-time in college students who participate in Arkansas intercollegiate athletics. This information is collected through institutional data submissions to the Arkansas Higher Education Information System (AHEIS) from all public colleges and universities with athletic programs. In addition to retention and graduation rates, this report provides data on all athletic participation by sport and scholarship status. The NCAA transfer portal has impacted the retention and graduation rates contained in this report and it is recommended that official NCAA reports be used for research and policy decisions.

Methodology

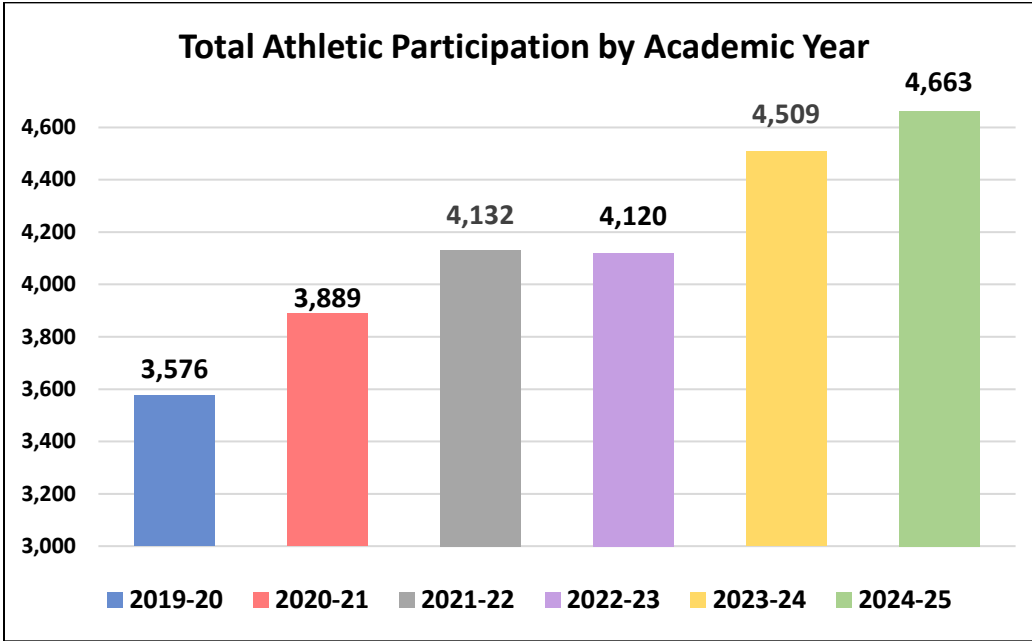
The retention calculations are based on fall-to-fall comparisons of the student-athletes in the cohort of first-time in college, full-time, and credential-seeking students from the fall term only. A student is considered retained if they returned to the same institution in the fall term of the next academic year.

Graduation rate calculations use the same cohort of first-time in college, full-time, credential-seeking student-athletes from the fall term. The graduation rates presented here include a 100% rate representing those graduating 'on time', and a 150% graduation rate. Graduation rates for all institutions are based on the highest credential the student-athlete received and the amount of time it takes to receive that credential up to 150%.

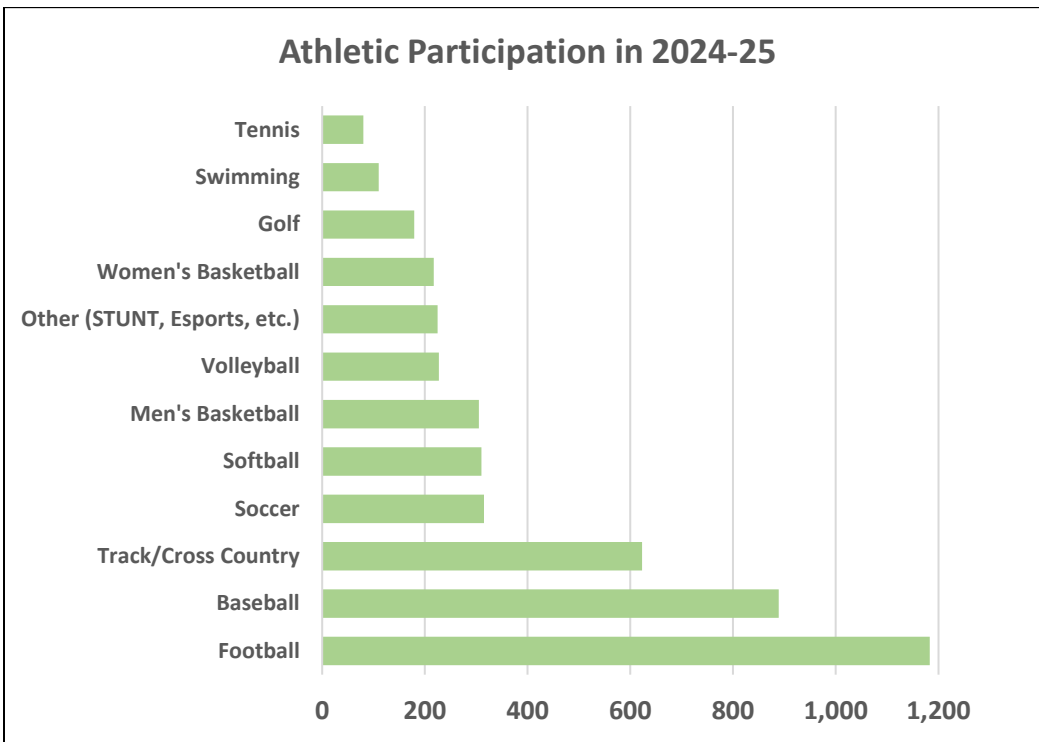
The methodology used herein is not meant to and does not correspond with the NCAA GSR (Graduation Success Rate) methodology each institution is required to report to the NCAA.

Participation Overview

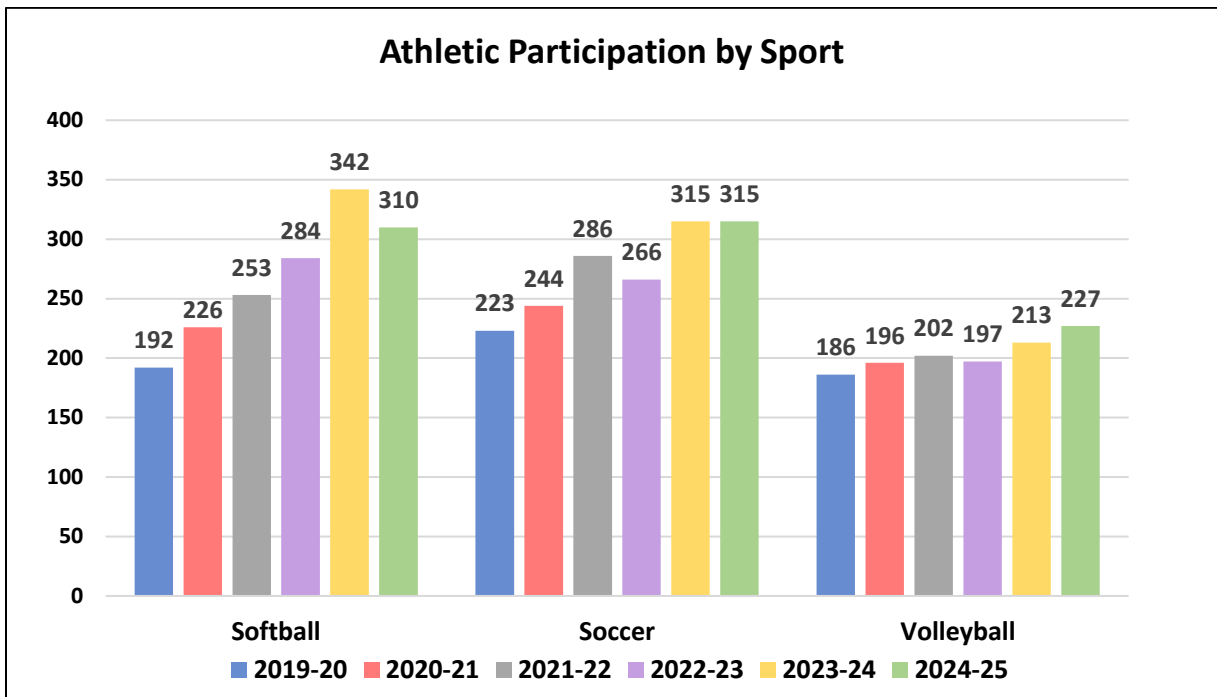
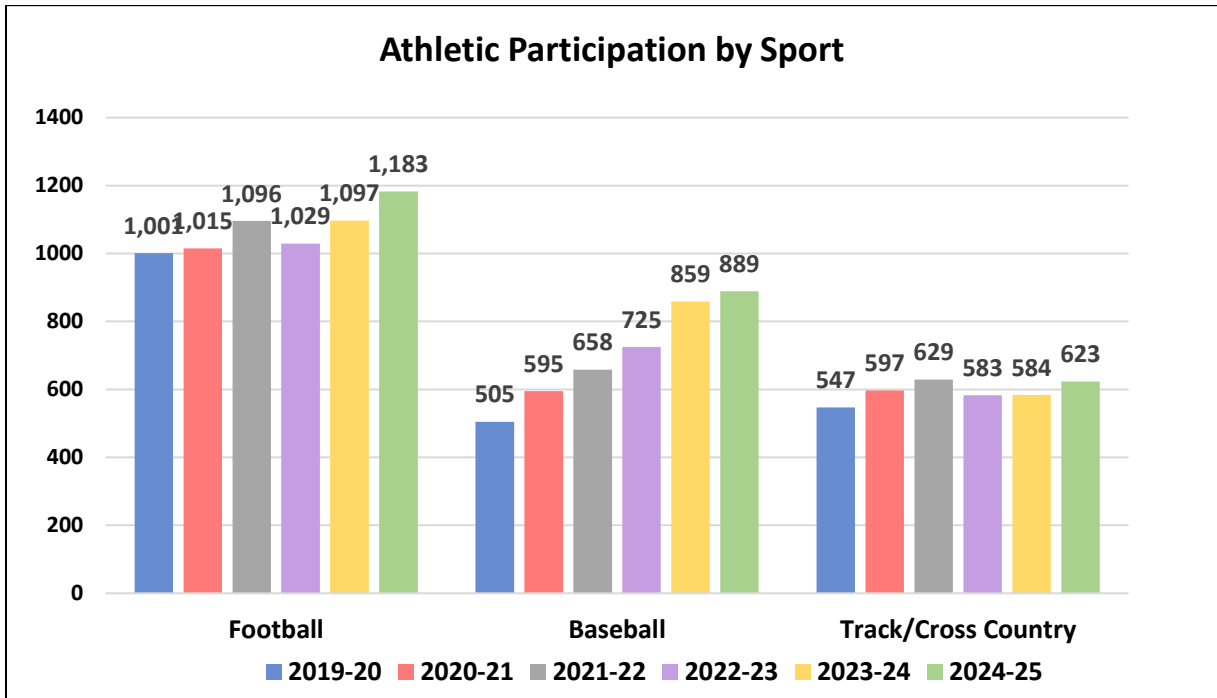
In Academic Year 2024-25, 4,663 students participated in athletics at ten universities and thirteen 2-year colleges, which is up from twelve who reported last year. This is the most student-athletes ever reported for an academic year. The increase was due to seventeen institutions reporting more student-athletes in 2025-26.

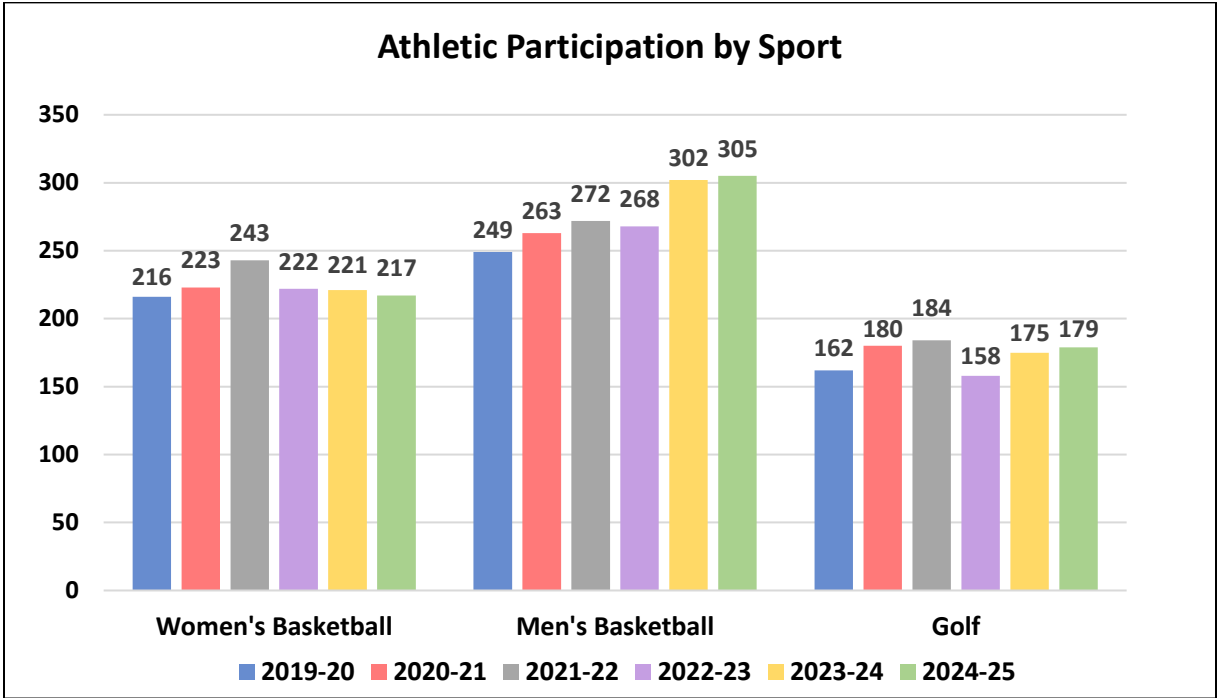

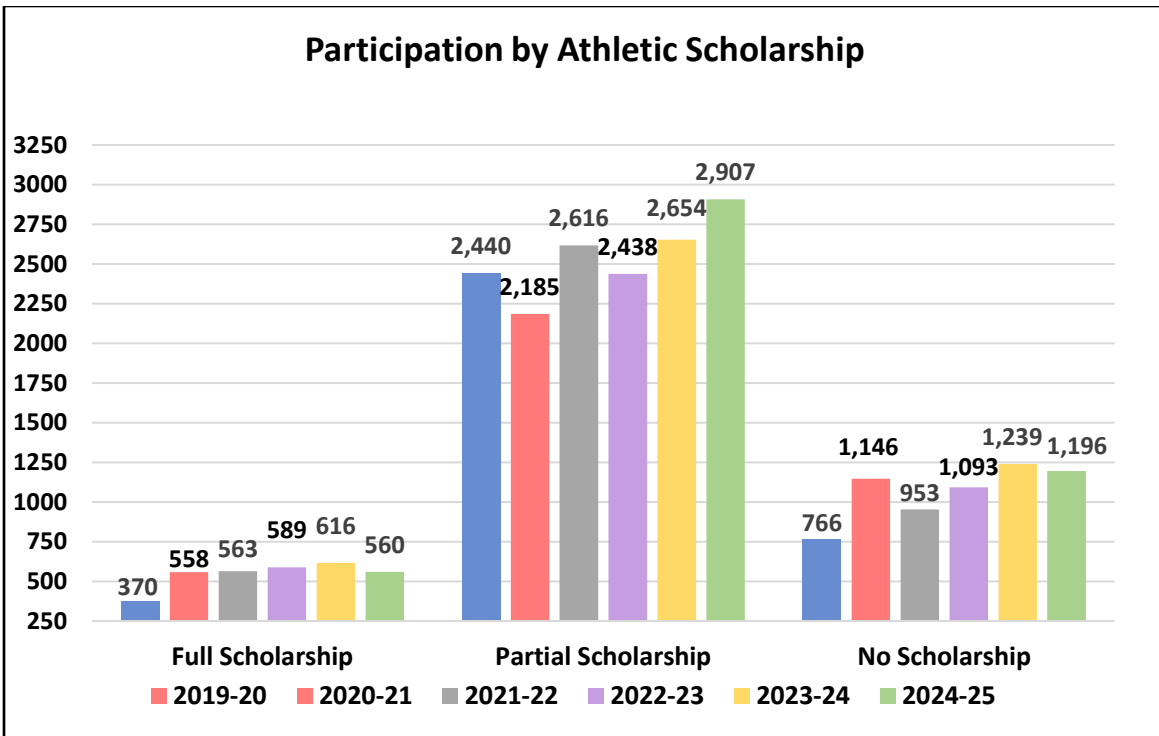


The number of student-athletes participating in football leads the way with 1,183 reported for the 2024-25 academic year.

**RULES GOVERNING RESIDENCY CLASSIFICATION FOR STATE-FUNDED
SCHOLARSHIPS AT STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER
EDUCATION**

In compliance with the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025 (Act 341 Section 63), the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Residency Classification for State-Funded Scholarships at State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education is presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for final approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rule presented in this agenda item for the Residency Classification for State-Funded Scholarships at State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the rule for the Residency Classification for State-Funded Scholarships at State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education.

Subchapter B. Scholarships and Grants

Part 408 Rules Governing Residency Classification for State-funded Scholarships at State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 408.101. Creation.

(a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's Rules Governing Residency Classification for State-funded Scholarships at State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education.

6 CAR § 408.102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) "Legal resident of Arkansas" means someone that:

(A) Will graduate or has graduated from an Arkansas public school, private school, or home school within nine (9) months of enrolling in the state-supported institution of higher education; or

(B) Resided in Arkansas at least six (6) continuous months prior to applying with the intent to remain.

(i) Mere physical presence in Arkansas is not sufficient to establish residency or demonstrate future intent to remain.

DRAFT

(2) "State-supported institution of higher education" means a public postsecondary institution or a department in a public postsecondary institution that:

(A) Provides:

(i) An eligible program of training to prepare students for gainful employment in a recognized occupation; or

(ii) A program leading to a baccalaureate degree or a graduate degree;
and

(B) Is accredited by a recognized accrediting agency or association and has continuously held the accreditation for the number of years required by the Division of Higher Education;

6 CAR § 408.103. Residency classification for state-funded scholarships administered by Division of Higher Education.

(a)(1) In making decisions about the residency classification or reclassification of a student for state-funded scholarship purposes, unless otherwise specified by statute, a student shall be classified as an in-state resident for state-funded scholarship purposes only if the student meets the requirements in this part.

(2) A student who claims in-state residency for purposes of state-funded scholarship eligibility but receives Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) verification that he or she is not an in-state resident shall have his or her state-funded scholarship amount reduced or rescinded to reflect the change in residency status.

(3) A member of the United States Armed Forces who is stationed in Arkansas under military orders, along with his or her dependents, is entitled to classification as an in-state resident for state-funded scholarship purposes.

6 CAR § 408.104. Duties and responsibilities of students.

(a)(1) It is the responsibility of each student, at the time of registration, to seek the proper residency classification for state-funded scholarship purposes.

(2) A participating state-supported institution of higher education shall have a process for a student to appeal a residency classification for state-funded scholarship purposes.

(b)(1) A student who knowingly gives false information to establish residency classification for state-funded scholarship purposes shall be subject to dismissal by the state-supported institution of higher education.

(2) An initial classification as an out-of-state student shall not limit the right of a student to be reclassified later as a resident of Arkansas for state-funded scholarship purposes provided that the student can establish proof of legal residence in Arkansas.

Subpart 1. Generally

(a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's "Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program".

(b) This part addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

~~This part is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.~~

6 CAR § 403-103. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) ~~(A)~~ "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be

accomplished ~~by the recipient~~ by a student through the fall, spring, and summer semesters, or the equivalent of the fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.

~~(B) The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order;~~

(2) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program ~~and~~ that is a:

(A) State-supported two-year or four-year ~~college or university~~ institution of higher education; ~~or~~

(B) Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year ~~college or university~~ institution of higher education with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; ~~and~~

~~(C) A public or private vocational-technical school with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is:~~

~~(i) Included on the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act eligible training provider list;~~

~~(ii) Qualified to receive approval for veterans' education benefits from the United States Department of Veteran Affairs; or~~

~~(iii) Included on the Private Career Education list; and~~

(3)(A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the ~~obtainment~~ attainment of a certification or license, including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

~~(B) Certificate programs include without limitation the following:~~

~~(i) Advanced manufacturing;~~

~~(ii) Health care;~~

~~(iii) Information technology;~~

~~(iv) Construction trades; or~~

~~(v) Logistics and distribution.~~

~~(B)(C)~~ The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program

may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or a baccalaureate degree.

(a) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under this part:

(1) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Arkansas Code § 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and

(2) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery:

~~———(A) Transfers transfers~~ the funds requested by the Division of Higher Education under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801(c)(2); ~~and~~

~~———(B) Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Arkansas Code § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).~~

(b)(1) A scholarship under this part shall not be awarded for an academic year if:

(A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (a) of this section; or

(B) The division received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Arkansas Code § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program, Arkansas Code § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.

(2) Any funds under subsection (a) of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under this part shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under this part.

Subpart 2. Procedures

6 CAR § 403-201. Eligibility requirements.

(a) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship for

an academic year if the student applies to ~~the Division of Higher Education~~ an approved institution of higher education by a date determined by the Division of Higher Education preceding the academic year and:

(1) Is ~~an~~ a legal Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either a parent of the student or the student is ~~an~~ a legal Arkansas resident;

(2) Meets either of the following requirements:

(A) Graduated from a:

(i) Public high school in Arkansas or another state;

(ii) Private high school in Arkansas or another state;

(iii) Home school as recognized under Arkansas Code § 6-15-501 et seq. or recognized by another state; or

(B) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services or another state;

(3) Is not receiving a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program, Arkansas Code § 6-85-201 et seq.; and

(4) Is accepted for admission in a program of study at an approved institution of higher education that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program in one (1) of the ~~following~~ high-demand fields: described in § 403-103(3) of this part.

~~(5)(A) Whose program of study or certificate program will result in the student's being qualified to work in an occupation identified by the Division of Workforce Services under subdivision (a)(5)(B)(i) of this section.~~

~~—————(B)(i) The Division of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Division of Higher Education by March 1 a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field under subdivision (a)(4) of this section that require the completion of a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program.~~

~~(ii) The Division of Workforce Services shall publish on its website the list under subdivision (a)(5)(B)(i) of this section and data supporting the list.~~

(b)(1) A student who received a scholarship under this part and successfully completed a program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (a)(4) of this section is eligible to reapply for a scholarship under this part if the student is accepted for admission in a different program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (a)(4) of this section.

(2) A student who received a scholarship under this part and does not successfully complete the program of study or certificate program is eligible to reapply for and receive a scholarship one (1) time only.

(c)(1) The program eligibility of institutions of higher education under § 403-103(2) of this part shall be determined by the division in collaboration with the Office of Skills Development.

(2) The division shall post the program eligibility policies on its website.

(3) An approved Workforce Challenge Program list shall be posted on the division's website.

~~— (c)(1) If the division has funds remaining after making the distributions under subsection (b) of this section, the division shall distribute scholarships to students for the summer term of the academic year.~~

~~— (2) If funds are available under subdivision (c)(1) of this section, a student shall apply for a scholarship for a summer term by a date determined by the division preceding the summer term.~~

~~— (3)(A) The division shall distribute scholarships for a summer term in the same manner as under subsection (b) of this section.~~

~~— (B) Scholarships for a summer term may be used in the same manner as under subsection (b) of this section.~~

**6 CAR § 403-203. Institutional responsibilities —~~College and university~~
Institutions of higher education responsibilities.**

(a) Administrative agreement.

(1) The chief executive officer of ~~an approved~~~~the eligible~~ institution of higher education is responsible for appointing shall appoint one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship and to receive all communications, ~~forms, etc.~~

(2) This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with all program rules.

(3) The institution must comply with all rules in order to maintain ~~continued~~ approved eligibility status.

(b) Disbursement records. The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

(c) Institutional verification.

(1) The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in an eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.

(2) The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic ~~term~~ semester or its equivalent.

(3) The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.

(4) The Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic verification rosters to the financial aid administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.

(5) The electronic verification rosters shall be returned to the division by November 1 for the fall ~~term~~ semester, and and by March 15 for the spring ~~term~~ semester, and at the date specified by the division for the summer semester.

(6) The division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the

financial aid administrator before the end of the fall, ~~and~~ spring, and summer term semesters.

(7) The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division no later than January 15 based on the fall semester, ~~and~~ June 1 based on the spring semester, and at the date specified by the division for summer semesters to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(d) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

(1) The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.

(2) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the division.

(3) For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(e) Due diligence.

(1) The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.

(2) In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.

(3) The division shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

(f) Agreements between institutions. An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under this part to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

(g) Reporting requirements.

(1) An approved institution of higher education accepting funds under § 403-

103(2)(A) and (B) of this part shall submit an annual report to the Division of Higher Education that includes without limitation the following:

(A) Individual student program completer information as identified by the division; and

(B) The following student information required pursuant to Arkansas Code § 6-85-216:

(i) The criteria for determining eligibility for scholarships;

(ii) Demographic student data; and

(iii) Disaggregated data on remedial courses.

(2) An approved institution of higher education accepting funds under § 403-103(2)(C) but not § 403-103(2)(A) or § 403-103(2)(B) of this part shall submit an annual report to the Office of Skills Development and the Department of Commerce, Division of Workforce Connections, that includes without limitation the following:

(A) Individual student program completer information as defined by the division; and

(B) Student information required to be provided to the Division of Higher Education in accordance with the requirements defined in Arkansas Code § 6-85-216.

(3) Approved institutions of higher education accepting funds under § 403-103(2)(C)(iii) of this part shall submit to the Division of Higher Education evidence of compliance with all required financial reporting requirements of the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Private Career Education, 6 CAR pt. 364.

(5) "Approved school of nursing" means a school of nursing with its primary headquarter located in Arkansas that:

(A) Prepares students as registered nurses;

(B) Grants nursing diplomas;

(C) Is eligible to participate in the Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IV federal student aid programs;

(D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;

(E) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program; and

(F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;

(6) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Division of Higher Education that:

(A) For the twelve-month period required under basic eligibility requirements the person:

(i) Maintained a permanent home in Arkansas where the person resides for an average of no less than four (4) days and nights per calendar week; and

(ii) Either:

(a) Is an Arkansas registered voter;

(b) Holds a valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;

(c) Receives benefits under an Arkansas public assistance program;

(d) Uses an Arkansas residence address for federal or state tax purposes; or

(e) Claims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions; or

(B) Before the deadline for filing a scholarship application under this part the applicant:

(i) Is on active military status;

(ii) Qualifies for in-state tuition and fees if the student is a:

(a) Veteran who was honorably discharged or released from a period of not less than ninety (90) days of active duty in the military, naval, or air service within three (3) years before the date of enrollment in a program of study;

(b) Dependent of a veteran under subdivision (6)(B)(ii)(a) of this section;

(c) Member of the armed forces; or

(d) Spouse of a member of the armed forces; and

(iii) Meets one (1) of the conditions under subdivision (6)(A)(ii) of this section;

(7) "Continuously enrolled" means:

(A) For a traditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education twenty-seven (27) semester hours in the first academic year as a recipient and, except while the recipient is enrolled as a part-time student if the recipient is enrolled in the number of credit hours necessary to complete the recipient's degree program, successfully completes thirty (30) semester hours each academic year thereafter;

(B) For a full-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes

at an approved institution of higher education at least fifteen (15) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters;

(C) For a part-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least six (6) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters; and

(D) For a student who is enrolled in a degree plan that has a maximum number of semester hours in a semester that is less than the requirements of subdivisions (7)(A) – (C) of this section, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education the maximum number of hours required by the degree plan for the semester;

(8) "Cost of attendance" means the recognized cost of attendance of an institution of higher education calculated under rules established by the Division of Higher Education;

(9)(A) "Diploma with Merit" means a diploma that requires a student to complete a Success Ready Pathway and earn one of the following:

(i) An industry-recognized credential;

(ii) Twelve (12) hours of postsecondary education credit;

(iii) The Seal of Biliteracy;

(iv) An AP Scholar or Scholar with Honor designation;

(v) A score of thirty-one (31) or higher on the ASVAB;

(vi) Arkansas Certified Pre-Apprenticeship leading to a Registered

Apprenticeship;

(vii) Cambridge Scholar;

(viii) IB Career-related Programme Certificate; or

(ix) IB Scholar.

(B) A Success Ready Pathway includes a sequence of courses defined by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education for each pathway.

~~(9)~~(10) "Full-time student" means a student enrolled in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent

as defined by the Division of Higher Education;

~~(10)~~(11) "Enrolled" means that the approved institution of higher education where the student is attending class counts the student as enrolled for the hours claimed on the last day to add or drop a class at the approved institution of higher education;

~~(11)~~(12) "High school grade point average" means the numbered grade average on a student's high school transcript calculated:

(A) For a traditional student, using the first seven (7) of the last eight (8) semesters the student completed prior to graduating high school; or

(B) For a nontraditional student, using the last eight (8) semesters the student completed before graduating high school;

~~(12)~~(13)(A) "Incarcerated" means a person who has been convicted of a crime and is imprisoned for that crime or is being held in custody for trial or sentencing.

(B) For which credit hours are awarded that are creditable toward an associate degree or baccalaureate degree; and

(i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;

(ii) Tuition waivers based on:

(a) Age;

(b) Military service;

(c) Occupation; or

(d) Other factors;

(iii) Out-of-state tuition waivers for undergraduate students from contiguous states in close proximity to a college or university;

(iv) Scholarships for transfers from two-year institutions;

(v) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and

(vi) Any other publicly-funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the institution of higher education for:

(a) Tuition;

(b) Fees;

(c) Books; or

~~(18)~~(19) "Superscore" means the final composite score that is calculated according to a combination of the highest individual section scores across all of the ACT

tests taken by an individual;

~~(19)~~(20)(A) "Traditional student" means a student who:

(i) Will enter postsecondary education as a full-time first-time freshman on or before the fall semester of the academic year that begins immediately following:

(a) The student's graduation from high school; or

(b) The last day of the school year:

(1) That would have been the student's junior or senior year of high school; and

(2) In which the student completes the requirements for high school graduation and obtains a General Educational Development certificate instead of receiving a diploma; and

(ii) Remains continuously enrolled as a full-time student;

(B) "Traditional student" includes a student who otherwise meets this definition but delays entering postsecondary education under a scholarship hold approved by the Division of Higher Education.

Subpart 2. Procedures

6 CAR § 391-201. Basic eligibility requirements.

The basic requirements for an applicant to be eligible for an award from the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program are:

(1)(A) The applicant has been an Arkansas resident for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.

(B) If the applicant is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the applicant or a parent or guardian of the applicant shall have maintained Arkansas residency for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.

(C)(i) To be considered an Arkansas resident, an applicant shall

demonstrate residency by evidence deemed sufficient to the Division of Higher Education.

(ii) Evidence of residency may include without limitation information provided by the applicant on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

(D) During the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date an applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education if the person for whom the twelve-month period is calculated under subdivision (1)(A) or (1)(B) of this section is deployed outside of Arkansas under military orders, the Division of Higher Education shall calculate the twelve (12) months by:

(i) Excluding months of military deployment outside of Arkansas that are within the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education; and

(ii) Including months the person maintained Arkansas residency immediately preceding the military deployment outside of Arkansas;

(2) The applicant is a citizen of the United States or is a lawful permanent resident;

(3)(A) The applicant is accepted for admission as a full-time student or part-time student at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to or is creditable toward:

(i) A baccalaureate degree;

(ii) An associate degree;

(iii) A certificate from a qualified certificate program;

(iv) A graduate-level or professional degree; or

(v) An approved school of nursing in a program of study that leads to a nursing diploma under Arkansas Code § 6-85-213.

(B) A full-time student shall enroll in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this part, or the equivalent as defined by

the Division of Higher Education.

(C) A part-time student shall complete at least six (6) semester hours but less than the minimum number of semester hours for a full-time student, as defined by the Division of Higher Education;

(4) The applicant has not met the maximum continuing education eligibility requirements under Arkansas Code § 6-85-210;

(5) The applicant does not owe a refund on a federal or state student financial aid grant for higher education;

(6) The applicant is not in default on a state or federal student financial aid loan for higher education;

(7) The applicant has not borrowed, as determined by the approved institution of higher education to be attended, in excess of the annual loan limits under the Federal Family Educational Loan Program Systems, William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, Income Contingent Loan Demonstration Program, Stafford Loan Program, Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students Program, or Supplemental Loan for Students Program in the same academic year for which the student has applied for assistance under this part;

(8) The applicant is not incarcerated at the time of the application for or during the time the applicant receives a scholarship under this part;

(9) The applicant has complied with United States Selective Service System requirements for registration;

(10) The applicant has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid; and

(11) The applicant certifies that he or she is drug-free and pledges in writing on the application form to refrain from the use or abuse of illegal substances in order to become eligible and maintain eligibility for this program.

6 CAR § 391-202. Additional eligibility requirements for traditional

students.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a traditional student if the applicant either:

(1) (A) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and has a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
or

(B) Upon graduation from high school:

(i) Achieved a minimum grade point average of 3.0 during high school;

(ii) Completed at least one (1) college readiness assessment; and

(iii) Achieved a Diploma with Merit.

(a) Proof of attainment shall be submitted with the student's scholarship application.

(2) Has a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., as it existed on July 1, 2009, and graduated from an Arkansas public high school, and ~~either had:~~ meets the requirements defined in subdivision (1) of this section.

~~(A) A minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT; or~~

~~(B) The equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;~~

~~(3) Achieved a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent and~~ A student shall also meet one (1) of the following eligibility requirements:

(A) ~~Graduated~~ Graduate from a private high school, an out-of-state high school, or a home school high school; ~~or~~

(B) In the year in which the student would have been a junior or senior in high school, completed the requirements for high school graduation and obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services instead of receiving a diploma; or

(4) Meets one (1) of the following criteria:

(A) Was enrolled at an institution of higher education in the immediately

preceding academic year as a full-time, first-time freshman;

(B) Did not receive a scholarship under this part as a first-time, full-time freshman;

(C) Successfully completed with the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D" at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours of courses as a full-time, first-time freshman; ~~and~~ or

(D) Achieved a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale as a full-time, first-time freshman.

6 CAR § 391-203. Additional eligibility requirements for a nontraditional student.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a nontraditional student if the applicant meets one (1) of the following requirements:

(1) If the applicant:

(A) Has not been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education;

(B) Has graduated from an Arkansas public high school, a private high school, an out-of-state high school, a home school high school, or obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services; and

(C) Had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or

(2) If the applicant has been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has earned a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.

6 CAR § 391-204. Continuing eligibility.

(a)(1)(A) A recipient who meets continuing eligibility criteria under this part shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year renewable annually until the recipient has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours.

(B) A recipient may continue to receive a scholarship after he or she has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one

hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, if the student is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232.

(2) A semester in which a student withdraws or fails to complete the number of credit hours for which the student first enrolled is counted toward the maximum number of semesters for which the student may receive a scholarship award under this part.

(3) The maximums under this subsection apply to any degree program, regardless of whether or not the degree program requires additional semesters.

(4) A recipient may attend summer terms at the student's own expense to earn credit hours necessary to maintain eligibility for a scholarship under this part.

(5) For each eligible term, all required hours for continuing eligibility must be taken at one (1) approved institution.

(b) To maintain eligibility for an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under this part, a recipient shall:

(1) Continue to meet the relevant eligibility requirements of this part while a recipient of a scholarship under this part;

(2)(A) Meet the satisfactory academic progress standards required to receive other financial aid at the approved institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled, as determined by the Division of Higher Education in conjunction with the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled.

(B)(i) A recipient who does not successfully complete any credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this part immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that academic year.

(ii) The division shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.

(C) By accepting scholarship funds under this part, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a

nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree;

(3) If enrolling in one (1) or more remedial courses, complete all remedial courses required by the approved institution of higher education by the time the student completes the first thirty (30) semester hours attempted after receiving the scholarship;

(4) Earn a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale at an approved institution of higher education;

(5) Enroll in courses that lead toward a baccalaureate degree or graduate-level or professional degree after attempting the lesser of:

(A) Five (5) semesters; or

(B) The completion of an associate degree program; and

(6) Meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the division.

(c)(1) A traditional student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply as a first-time nontraditional student.

(2) A recipient under subdivision (c)(1) of this section who loses eligibility for the nontraditional student scholarship is not eligible to apply for a scholarship under any eligibility provision of this part.

(d) If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under subsection (c) of this section due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family member of the recipient, the division may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

6 CAR § 391-205. Scholarship award amounts.

(a) The General Assembly may use net proceeds from the state lottery to fund the scholarships awarded under this part and to supplement the state-supported student financial assistance that the General Assembly determines is necessary to meet the state's objective for broadening and increasing access of Arkansas citizens to higher education.

(b) Net proceeds from the state lottery used to fund scholarships under this rule

shall:

(1) Be used exclusively for the purposes set out in Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 87, and this part; and

(2) Supplement and shall not supplant nonlottery state educational resources.

(c) The scholarships established under this part are subject to available funding and do not create for any student an entitlement to financial assistance to enable the student's attendance at an approved institution of higher education.

(d)(1)(A) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount under this part for an academic year for a full-time recipient enrolled in a four-year approved institution of higher education is:

(i) ~~One~~Two thousand dollars ~~(\$1,000)~~ (\$2,000) for a recipient who has earned less than twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours;

(ii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours but less than fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours;

(iii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours but less than eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours; and

(iv) *(a)* Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a recipient who has earned at least eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours but no more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232, then up to the number of credit hours required to complete the baccalaureate program.

(b) A recipient shall receive no more than one (1) year of the scholarship provided under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv) *(a)* of this section unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232.

(c)(1) A recipient who is eligible to receive the scholarship under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section may receive the scholarship while enrolled in a semester as a part-time student.

(2) The scholarship amount for the semester in which a recipient is enrolled as a part-time student under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(c)(1) of this section ~~shall~~may be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the recipient is enrolled.

(B)(i) To determine the correct scholarship award amount based on credit hours, a first-time recipient shall submit a current college or university transcript if the first-time recipient has earned any semester credit hours to the Division of Higher Education no later than a date determined by the Division of Higher Education prior to the academic year for which the first-time recipient will receive an initial scholarship award.

(ii) A first-time recipient who does not submit a transcript to the Division of Higher Education on or before the date determined by the Division of Higher Education shall receive the award amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(i) of this section.

~~(C)(i) An applicant may elect for the earned semester credit hours under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section to be only those semester credit hours earned after graduating from high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services.~~

~~(ii) If the applicant makes the election under subdivision (d)(1)(C)(i) of this section, any semester credit hours earned through concurrent credit or any other method before graduating high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services shall not be counted as earned semester credit hours for the purposes of determining a recipient's scholarship award amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section.~~

(2)(A) The Division of Higher Education shall award an aggregate amount of scholarship awards to nontraditional students of up to fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000).

(B)(i) The Division of Higher Education shall return to the Office of the

Arkansas Lottery the excess funding, if any, for scholarship awards the Division of Higher Education received under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801.

(ii) The office shall deposit any funds received from the Division of Higher Education under subdivision (d)(2)(B) into the Lottery Scholarship Trust Account established under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801(b).

(C) Priority for scholarships awarded to nontraditional students is based on:

(i) The applicant's level of progress toward completion of:

(a) A certificate;

(b) An associate degree;

(c) A nursing diploma;

(d) A baccalaureate degree; or

(e) A graduate-level or professional degree; or

(ii) Other criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.

(3) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award for an academic year for a full-time student enrolled in one (1) of the following institutions of higher education is ~~one~~two thousand dollars ~~(\$1,000)~~ (\$2,000) for the first year and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the second year:

(A) A two-year approved institution of higher education;

(B) A branch campus of a four-year approved institution of higher education; or

(C) An approved school of nursing.

(4) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount for a part-time student recipient shall be:

(A) One-half (1/2) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least six (6) semester hours but less than nine (9) semester hours; or

(B) Three-quarters (3/4) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least nine (9) semester hours but less than the number of hours required for a full-time student recipient.

(5) A current recipient who maintains eligibility for the scholarship under this part shall continue to receive the scholarship award amount first awarded to the recipient.

(6) The Division of Higher Education shall give priority for a scholarship award to a full-time or part-time student:

(A) Who meets the eligibility requirements under this part; and

(B) Whose parent, by birth or legal adoption:

(i) Was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the United States Armed Forces or whose official residence is in Arkansas; and

(ii) Was a member of the United States Armed Forces who was killed while performing military duty:

(a) In a status identified under 32 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. or 10 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. as they existed on January 1, 2011; or

(b) In state active duty status.

(e) Annually by December 15, the Legislative Council shall provide to the General Assembly its recommendations for any changes to the:

(1) Award amounts;

(2) Number or type of scholarships; and

(3) Eligibility requirements.

(f) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in determining award amounts under this part, the General Assembly will consider whether sufficient funds will be available to pay for scholarship awards through the anticipated completion of the degree or certificate a recipient is seeking.

(g) All awards under this section are subject to the prohibition under Arkansas Code § 6-80-105 against using public funds in a student financial package in excess of the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student is enrolled.

(h)(1) If the Division of Higher Education has less than a sufficient amount from net proceeds from the state lottery to provide for the scholarship commitments under this part, the Division of Higher Education shall give priority for continued financial

support under this part to a student with continuing eligibility superior to first-time applicants.

(2) If the funding is insufficient to fully fund the scholarships for students with continuing eligibility created under this part, the Division of Higher Education shall award scholarships based upon the following criteria to students with continuing eligibility as follows:

(A) First, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study that is:

(i) In an area of critical workforce need as determined by the Division of Higher Education; or

(ii) In a science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field;

(B) Second, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study other than those listed in subdivision (h)(2)(A) of this section; and

(C) Last, in the event funding is insufficient to fully fund students under subdivision (h)(2)(A) or (h)(2)(B) of this section, to students who have the highest postsecondary grade point average.

(3)(A) If after funding all students with continuing eligibility under this section funding is insufficient to fund all qualified first-time applicants, the Division of Higher Education shall award scholarships to first-time applicants in order of priority based upon the applicants' ACT superscore or ACT equivalent superscore.

(B) If after prioritizing first-time applicants based upon the applicants' ACT or ACT equivalent scores funding is insufficient to fund all applicants with like ACT or ACT equivalent scores, the Division of Higher Education shall determine who receives an award by random drawing.

6 CAR § 391-206. Payments of scholarships.

(a)(1) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarships to the approved

institution of the student's choice.

(2) The division shall send funds to the institution via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.

(3) After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.

(4) The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institution.

(5) In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of such student in advance.

(b) **Transfer of scholarships to another approved institution.** A recipient who has received an Academic Challenge Scholarship may transfer the scholarship to another approved Arkansas institution of higher education, provided that the student notifies the division of the change of status by October 1 for the fall term and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms by changing the college on the student's department YOUNiversal financial aid account.

(c) **Repayment of scholarships.**

(1) If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for noninstitutional expenses.

(2) Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for noninstitutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.

(3) It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayments.

(d) **Refunds.**

(1) The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program is entitled to a refund of the scholarship or loan amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a scholarship or loan withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after his or her first day of class of the payment period and the situation falls under the refund policy of the

institution.

(2) The institution shall pay the refund to the division.

(e) **Overpayment.** If the award of an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student according to the state law, Arkansas Code § 6-80-105, governing the stacking of scholarships, the institution shall follow the Department of Higher Education stacking policy in reducing the student's financial package to prevent the student from receiving funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

6 CAR § 391-207. Institutional responsibilities.

(a) College/university responsibilities.

(1) Administrative agreement.

(A) The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.

(B) This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with all program rules.

(C) The institution must comply with all rules in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

(2) **Disbursement records.** The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

(3) Institutional verification.

(A) The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.

(B) The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.

(C) The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification

rosters each semester or trimester.

(D) The Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic verification roster to the financial aid administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.

(E) The electronic verification roster shall be returned to the division by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.

(F) Students who are enrolled less than full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.

(G) The division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the spring term.

(H) The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division no later than June 1 to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(4) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

(A) The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.

(B) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the division.

(C) For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(5) Due diligence.

(A) The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.

(B) In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program.

(C) The division shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

(b) Recipient's responsibilities.

DRAFT

(1) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the division of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days.

(2) This will include change in:

(A) Name;

(B) Address;

(C) Institution; and

(D) Full-time status (twelve (12) college credit hours for those students who are in their first fall semester following high school graduation, fifteen (15) college credit hours for those students who are beyond the first fall semester following high school graduation).

(3) Failure to notify the division of a change of status may affect future eligibility.

6 CAR § 391-208. Scholarship hold — Leave of absence.

(a) The Division of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold or a leave of absence for a traditional student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.

(b) The reasons for a scholarship hold or a leave of absence may include without limitation:

(1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;

(2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:

(A) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or

(B) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;

(3) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or

(4)(A) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.

(B) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.

(C) The division shall release a scholarship hold or a leave of absence, whichever is applicable, if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

Part 408. Rules Governing Access to Acceleration Scholarship Program

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 408.101. Creation.

(a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's Rules Governing the Access to Acceleration Scholarship Program.

6 CAR § 408.102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) "Academic year" means a measure of academic work to be accomplished by the recipient during the fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order;

(2) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that:

(A) Is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Access to Acceleration Scholarship Program; and

(B) Is a:

(i) State-supported two-year or four-year institution of higher education; or

(ii) Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year institution of higher education that has its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; and

(iii) Approved by the division to offer concurrent credit courses;

(3)(A) "Concurrent credit course" means a course as defined in § 6-16-1202.

(B) "Concurrent credit course" does not include a program that is operated or sponsored by a third party;

(4)(A) "Dual enrollment course" means an enrollment program allowing high school students to take college-level courses for college credit at approved institutions of higher education.

(B) High schools may give students course credit upon completion of the dual enrollment course;

(5) "Eligible student" means a student enrolled in grade nine (9), grade ten (10), grade eleven (11), or grade twelve (12) at a public high school or home school in Arkansas;

(6) "Third party" means a person or entity that does not receive disbursement directly from the division, including a subcontractor of the institution; and

(7) "Verification rosters" means an alphabetical listing by an approved institution of higher education of all students receiving the award for a given academic term that is completed by the certifying official at an eligible institution of higher education.

6 CAR § 408.103. Eligibility.

(a) A student is eligible to be awarded a scholarship under this part for an academic semester or academic year during which the student is enrolled in a concurrent credit course if, pursuant to Arkansas Code § 6-16-1204(a)(5), the student:

(1) Is admitted to an institution of higher education; and

(2) Meets all of the prerequisites for the course in which he or she is enrolled.

(b) Scholarship funds shall not be used for:

(1) Courses at a vocational center that are reimbursable under Arkansas Code § 6-51-305; or

(2) A concurrent credit course that may be funded under Arkansas Code § 6-18-2506.

(c)(1) Scholarship funds may be used for dual enrollment courses to the same extent as concurrent credit courses.

(2) Disbursement of funds for dual enrollment courses shall be governed by an agreement between the institution of higher education and the eligible student.

6 CAR § 408.104. Continuing eligibility.

(a) To maintain eligibility for an Access to Acceleration Scholarship under this part, a recipient shall:

(1) Continue to meet the relevant eligibility requirements of this part while a recipient of a scholarship under this part;

_____ (2)(A) Meet the satisfactory academic progress standards required to receive other financial aid at the approved institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled, as determined by the Division of Higher Education in conjunction with the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled.

_____ (B)(i) A recipient who does not successfully complete any credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this part immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that academic year.

_____ (ii) The division shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.

_____ (C) By accepting scholarship funds under this part, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree;

_____ (3) Earn a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale at an approved institution of higher education;

(4) Enroll in courses that lead toward an associate degree or baccalaureate degree or graduate-level or professional degree; and

(5) Meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the division.

(b)(1) A student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply to receive the scholarship for one course the next semester to meet continuing eligibility requirements.

(2) A recipient under subdivision (b)(1) of this section who fails to meet continuing eligibility requirements loses eligibility for the scholarship for one (1) semester before being able to reapply.

(c) If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under this section due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family member of the recipient, the division may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

6 CAR § 408.105. Distribution—Award Amounts.

(a) If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education shall award an Access to Acceleration Scholarship to all eligible students who meet the requirements under this part in the order in which the rosters are received.

(b)(1) The division shall distribute scholarships from the funds available in an equal amount to every approved institution of higher education that has enrolled a student eligible to receive a scholarship under this part.

(2) A scholarship awarded to a student who is eligible under this part shall be awarded in the amount of sixty-five dollars (\$65) per concurrent credit course hour in which the eligible student is enrolled, for a maximum of fifteen (15) concurrent credit course hours per semester.

(3) The maximum scholarship amount a student may be awarded in an academic year, including summer semesters, shall not exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

(4)(A) Institutions of higher education and school districts shall not charge a public school student or the student's parent or guardian for tuition, fees, or materials for participation in concurrent credit courses, if the student is eligible under this part.

(B) If a student enrolls in more than the maximum fifteen (15) credits allowed under this section, pursuant to Arkansas Code § 6-16-1204 excess costs may be satisfied by one of the following:

(i) Funding from the school district where a student is enrolled;

(ii) Other consideration agreed to by the public school district or open-enrollment public charter school and institution of higher education; and

(iii) Any other available sources as determined by the division.

(C) A student or a student's parent or guardian shall not be responsible for tuition, fees, or materials for participation in a concurrent credit course.

(5) Institutions of higher education may charge students participating in dual enrollment courses.

(c)(1) A state-supported two-year or four-year institution of higher education may offer a reduced tuition rate for concurrent credit courses offered by the state-supported institution of higher education to eligible students under this part.

(2) The reduction in tuition under subdivision (c)(1) of this section shall not be considered an institutional scholarship.

6 CAR § 408.106. Responsibilities of Institutions of Higher Education.

(a)(1) The chief executive officer of an approved institution of higher education shall appoint one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Access to Acceleration Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.

(2) This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with this part.

(b) The approved institution of higher education shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

(c)(1) The approved institution of higher education shall provide certification of enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.

(2) Verifications rosters must be submitted to the Division of Higher Education by October 1 each fall semester, March 1 each spring semester, and at the date specified by the division for the summer semester.

(d)(1) The deadline for the division to disburse funds shall be no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds and any outstanding funds that are not disbursed by this deadline shall be returned to the division.

(2) For students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by the deadline, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds to the approved institution of higher education.

(e) Approved institutions of higher education shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any scholarship recipient or former scholarship recipient.

Part 374 Rules Governing Uniform Course Credit at Institutions of Higher Education

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 374.101. Purpose.

(a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's Rules Governing Uniform Course Credit at Institutions of Higher Education.

(b) The purpose of this part is to establish uniform course credit awarded upon achieving the required score on approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses toward completing a post-secondary degree or certificate program.

6 CAR § 374.102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) "Accelerated learning" means an organized method of learning that enables a student to meet individual academic goals and graduation requirements while pursuing higher levels of skill development, including without limitation the following coursework:

(A) A College Board pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement course;

- (B) An International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme course;
- (C) A Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education course;
- (D) A concurrent credit course; and
- (E) A substantively similar course or program approved by the Division of

Elementary and Secondary Education;

(2) "Alignment" means equivalent expectations, for which a student seeks to receive college credit;

(3) "Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education course" means a program offered through a University of Cambridge approved school and administered by the International Education division of the Cambridge University Press and Assessment department of the University of Cambridge that:

(A) Consists of Cambridge International AS and A Level courses and standardized examinations;

(B) Is designed to prepare high school students for college or university study and employment;

(C) Allows students to receive high school credit as well as qualify for college or university level credit; and

(D) Can lead to an Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma;

(4) "CLEP examination" means an examination administered through the College-Level Examination Program for which a student seeks to receive college credit;

(5) "College Board pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement course" means a non-for-profit organization that develops and administers standardized tests and curricula used by the elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education institutions:

(A) To promote college readiness; and

(B) As part of the college admissions process;

(6) "Concurrent credit course" means a college-level course offered by an institution of higher education in this state that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the institution of higher education and a public high school;

(7) "International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme" means the curriculum and examinations leading to an International Baccalaureate Diploma awarded by the International Baccalaureate;

(8) "Institution of higher education" means a:

(A) State-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or

(B) Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds;

(9) "Learning outcomes" mean measurable skills, abilities, knowledge, or values that students should be able to demonstrate as a result of successful course completion, for which a student seeks to receive college credit; and

(10) "Rigor" means an appropriate level of sophistication, difficulty, and challenge for which a student seeks to receive college credit.

6 CAR § 374.103. Faculty Committee Duties & Responsibilities.

(a) To determine whether a student has met the minimum criteria for award of course credit, the Division of Higher Education, in consultation with faculty committees, will determine post-secondary credit to ensure proper alignment and application of uniform credit awards across all institutions of higher education.

(b) Post-secondary credit will be awarded upon achieving the required score on approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses.

(c) As determined by the division, post-secondary credit will also be awarded upon successful completion of, but not limited to:

(1) An accelerated learning course; or

(2) Industry based credentials.

(d) The number of faculty committees will be determined by the division, based on the disciplines being considered for uniform credit, and comprised of no less than seven (7) faculty from two-year and four-year institutions, system and non-system institutions, and representative of different state regions, each appointed by the Commissioner of the Division of Higher Education.

(e) Faculty committees shall be responsible for:

(1) The alignment of subject or discipline specific examinations with general education core courses from the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS); and

(2) Ensuring appropriate rigor for credit awards by determining performance expectations based on assessment scores.

(f) Faculty committees may issue recommendations to align subject or discipline specific examinations for courses outside of the general education core courses and the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS).

6 CAR § 374.104. Award of Uniform Credit.

(a) For students to receive an award of course credit, upon receiving the required assessment score on the approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses, the knowledge and skills assessed must align with the ACTS student learning outcomes.

(b) In determining whether there is proper alignment, faculty committees will consider, without limitation, the following:

(1) Learning outcomes; and

(2) Rigor.

(c)(1) All institutions will have an opportunity to comment on the equivalency prior to the division adding the course equivalency to the Articulation Tables.

(2) It is presumed that all courses are aligned unless the committee determines otherwise.

(d) If the committee determines there are zero alignment issues found, then uniform credit for the course will be awarded.

(e)(1) Institutions may choose to award additional credit for those students who score higher than the minimum credit awards identified by the faculty committees.

(2) Institutions receiving transfer credit given from another institution beyond the minimum requirement are encouraged to honor additional credit given by the sending institution.

(f) All accelerated learning or CLEP examination to course equivalencies will be publicly available online in the Division of Higher Education Credit for Prior Learning Articulation Tables annually.

(2)(A) "Arkansas resident" means an applicant that has been an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program.

(B) Further, the recipient may be asked to provide evidence of a permanent connection with the State of Arkansas.

(C) The Division of Higher Education will determine residency through:

- (i) A valid Arkansas driver's license;
- (ii) Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for the previous year;

Subpart 1. Generally

- (B) Mandatory fees; and
- (C) Program fees.

6 CAR § 406-102. Implementation of program — Purpose.

(a) An eligible postsecondary institution shall implement an Arkansas Teacher Academy to incentivize potential and enrolled academy attendees to:

- (1) Enter the teaching profession; and
- (2) Commit to teaching in:
 - (A) Arkansas public schools; or
 - (B) Critical shortage areas in Arkansas based on subject areas or geographical areas.

(b) The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with public and private postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement a centralized administrative process for each Arkansas Teacher Academy, which shall include without limitation the following:

- (1) A marketing and promotion plan to recruit academy attendees for an Arkansas Teacher Academy;
- (2) Data collection and reporting;
- (3) Tracking of postgraduation service requirements;
- (4) Coordination of induction services;
- (5) Distribution of moneys in the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Fund between eligible postsecondary institutions;
- (6) Collection of reimbursements from individuals who fail to meet the service requirements under this part;
- (7) A process for assessing an academy attendee's ability to repay financial assistance received if the academy attendee who receives financial assistance is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the requirements of an Arkansas Teacher

Academy program; and

(8) A process for deferring service or repayment required by the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Act, Arkansas Code § 6-82-2201 et seq., based on factors adopted by the division.

6 CAR § 406-103. Eligible postsecondary institution duties.

(a) An Arkansas Teacher Academy may include without limitation a new or existing teacher preparation program that utilizes proven, research-based models of best practices that are already being implemented in similar program pathways.

(1) Needs of each public school system;

(2) Community that is being served; and

(3) Individual skills of each current teacher who has completed an Arkansas

Teacher Academy program.

(f) A program offered as part of an eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy shall include accelerated program models for the following, without limitation:

(1) Subject areas and geographical areas identified by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education as experiencing a critical shortage of teachers;

(2) An individual seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in a professional certification; and

(3) A student in a noneducation program who seeks to complete one (1) or more teacher preparation courses leading to a teaching certification following graduation.

(c) Each academy attendee enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy shall:

(1)(A) Agree to teach at least one (1) full school year in Arkansas at a public school, or a school that serves primarily public school students with disabilities, for each academic year the academy attendee successfully completes and receives a scholarship for all or part of his or her tuition and fees.

(B) For an academy attendee who teaches and receives the scholarship concurrently, the academy attendee's commitment period to teach in an Arkansas public school shall begin after graduation from an Arkansas Teacher Academy;

(2) Reimburse the Division of Higher Education:

(B) Are in repayment agreements;

(7) The number of academy attendees who have deferred repayment agreements;

**AHECB POLICY – ARKANSAS WORKFORCE CHALLENGE
SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM POLICY**

The Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program was amended by the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025 (Act 341 Sections 84-87). The Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program were presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for final approval on April 24, 2026. Per authority provided in the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025, ADHE in collaboration with the Office of Skills Development has determined additional policy to support implementation of the program, in adherence to the rules. The amended AHECB policy for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program shall include the approved rules along with supporting details.

AHECB Resolutions

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) approves the policy amendment for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program effective August 1, 2026. The Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program policy outlines the guidelines for program implementation. While rules may not change without legislative action, policy may be amended by the AHECB in response to evolving state workforce needs.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That any Arkansas approved institution of higher education, as defined in the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025, that chooses to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program, shall implement and administer the scholarship program in accordance with the policies of the AHECB and the promulgated rules.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the AHECB instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to provide a copy of the amended policy to presidents and chancellors, chief academic affairs officers, students affairs officers, financial aid officers, and institutional research officers at Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities as well as representatives from other approved institutions of higher education, as defined in the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025, participating in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.

Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program Policy

AHECB Resolutions

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) approves the policy effective Fall 2027. The Policy on State Minimum Core for General Education presents the State Minimum General Education Core for associate and baccalaureate degrees.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That all Arkansas state-supported colleges or universities shall implement the State Minimum Core for General Education in accordance with the policies of the AHECB and the rules of the Arkansas State Board of Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the AHECB instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to provide a copy of the policy to presidents and chancellors, chief academic affairs officers, students affairs officers at Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities.

ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD POLICY ON STATE MINIMUM CORE FOR GENERAL EDUCATION

This policy presents the State Minimum General Education Core for associate and baccalaureate degrees as adopted by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and includes general provisions necessary for implementation.

I. Definitions

For the purposes of this policy, the following terms are defined:

Requisite Core: The mandatory 15-credit-hour foundation established by Act 566 of 2025, focused on the essential domains of Communication, Quantitative Reasoning, and American Civic Traditions.

Additional Breadth Requirements: The supplemental credit hours (totaling the remaining 20 hours of the 35-hour state minimum) that expose students to the Fine Arts, Humanities, and Social and Natural Sciences.

Survey Course: A foundational offering designed to provide a comprehensive overview of a field's primary theories, historical development, and methodologies, rather than specialized or technical applications.

Competency-Based Equivalency: The recognition of student mastery in a State Minimum General Education Core area through verified assessment or proficiency testing rather than traditional seat-time.

II. Purpose

The Requisite Core and State Minimum General Education Core serve as the intellectual cornerstone for every undergraduate degree granted within the State of Arkansas. Rather than a collection of introductory coursework, the State Minimum General Education Core represents a unified educational philosophy intended to transform students into versatile thinkers and engaged participants in a free society.

The primary intent of this curriculum is to equip students with a durable academic framework that transcends the boundaries of a specific major or vocation. In an era of rapid technological and social transition, the State of Arkansas recognizes that the most valuable asset a graduate can possess is the ability to synthesize information across disparate fields, communicate with precision, and apply rigorous logic to complex problems.

Furthermore, the State Minimum General Education Core is designed to foster a shared civic identity. By engaging with the historical narratives and governing structures of the United States and the State of Arkansas, students cultivate the self-reliance and ethical clarity necessary to uphold the responsibilities of citizenship. Ultimately, the State Minimum General Education Core ensures that regardless of their professional path, every graduate of an Arkansas institution shares a common standard of cultural literacy and intellectual maturity.

III. Operational Intent

1. Within the framework of the State Minimum General Education Core specified below, each state institution shall offer 35 semester credit hours from its institutional general education core. The total general educational degree requirements at each institution may exceed the State Minimum General Education Core requirements. This 35-credit hour State Minimum General Education Core must be included in all transferable associate degrees and bachelor's degrees. The Requisite Core must be included in all associate and bachelor's degrees.
2. Each state institution shall present its institutional general education core to the Division of Higher Education for recognition under this policy via a Letter of Notification. Institutions may present proposed changes in their institutional general education cores to the Division as necessary via a Letter of Notification.
3. Each state institution shall accept and apply credit toward requirements for any undergraduate degree such parts of any other state institution's general education core as shall be presented by transfer students. If a student transfers to an institution which has total general education degree requirements that exceed the State Minimum General Education Core, after recognizing all courses presented from the sending institution's general education core, the receiving institution may determine which additional general education courses are required to make up the difference between the State Minimum General Education Core courses presented and the institution's total general education degree requirements. Courses listed in Arkansas Course Transfer System are guaranteed for transfer and must be applied toward Core requirements for associate and bachelor's degrees.
4. Institutions are encouraged to develop and implement Competency-Based Equivalency pathways to satisfy requirements within the State Minimum General Education Core. Where a student demonstrates mastery of a State Minimum General Education Core area through verified assessment or proficiency testing -

as defined in Section I - the institution may award credit or a transcript notation satisfying that specific State Minimum General Education Core requirement.

5. In mathematics and science, higher-level courses than those required will be accepted for purposes of the State Minimum General Education Core.
6. A receiving institution may be more lenient in accepting credit at its own discretion. However, the policies regarding the State Minimum General Education Core do not obligate the receiving institution beyond the stated courses and provisions.

This Appendix B - Definitions update adjusts the prescribed curriculum for the state-wide Certificate of General Studies (CGS). The update will simultaneously align the credential with ACT 566 of 2025, which established a new 15-credit hour Requisite Core, and will bring the CGS into closer alignment with the State Minimum General Education Core.

Certificate of General Studies

The Certificate of General Studies is a specific set of general education core courses that will document a student’s mastery of skills and competencies needed to be successful in the workforce and today’s world. The range of credit hours is ~~31-38~~ 31-32 semester hours. Remedial/developmental education courses must be used for placement purposes only and cannot be used to fulfill certificate requirements. DISTRIBUTION OF MINERAL LEASE FUNDS

According to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-61-801 through §6-61-808, there is established the Arkansas Research Development Program for providing Arkansas Research Development Program Grants to publicly-supported universities in Arkansas by the Division of Higher Education. Act 610 of 2025 provides that after the sum of \$13,200,000 has been deposited into the Higher Education Building Maintenance Fund, any additional deposits are to be transferred to the Research Development Fund to be used as provided by law.

In accordance with A.C.A. §6-61-803 and A.C.A. §6-61-807, “There is created a program to be known as the Arkansas Research Development program which shall be administered by the Director of the Division of Higher Education. Funds may be made available for administration of the Arkansas Development Research Program, for purchasing state-of-the-art equipment, for minor renovations of laboratory space, for publication of findings, for employing scientists or research assistants, and for providing any other assistance to scientists in order to develop a continuing research capacity in this state which is recognized as exemplary.”

The floor for the Research Development Fund was reached in September 2006, and statute requires that the funds be disbursed by the Director of the Division of Higher Education in accordance with the recommendation of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board after review by Legislative Council.

Higher Education Research Development Fund:

The current balance in the Higher Education Research Development Fund is \$193,618. The fiscal 2026 appropriation of \$500,000 is adequate for the authorization of distribution of up to \$475,000 requested by the Arkansas Research and Education Optical Network (ARE-ON) board of directors.

Recommendation:

The ARE-ON represents an essential tool for research and development in the publicly supported universities of Arkansas. It is recommended that up to \$475,000 requested by the ARE-ON board of directors be distributed to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

The following resolution is presented for the board’s consideration:

RESOLVED, That after review by the Legislative Council, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to distribute up to \$475,000 from the Higher Education Research Development Fund to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

**ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUES
UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS AT FAYETTEVILLE**

The University of Arkansas at Fayetteville (UAF) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$132 million with a term of no longer than thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 5.5 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) and auxiliary purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on April 16, 2026.

The educational and general issue will be up to \$25 million with a maximum annual debt service of \$1,527,125 and a term of thirty (30) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used for (a) the acquisition, construction, equipping, and expansion of district heating distribution material and equipment to serve the Maple Hill District and other related campus district heating capacity improvements and utility infrastructure upgrades (the "Utility Project"); and (b) the acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of other capital improvements and infrastructure and the acquisition of various equipment and/or real property for the Fayetteville Campus.

The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by tuition and fee revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for educational and general projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to educational and general debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an educational and general bond issue of up to \$25 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.50 percent.

The auxiliary issue will be up to \$107 million with a maximum annual debt service of \$6,477,750 and a term of thirty (30) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used for (a) the acquisition, construction, furnishing, and equipping of the Maple Hill Central residence hall (the "Maple Hill Central Project"); and (b) the acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of

other capital improvements and infrastructure and the acquisition of various equipment and/or real property for the Fayetteville Campus.

The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by auxiliary revenues generated through the room rates and any other revenues generated by the new residence hall. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides that annual net auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual auxiliary debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville has sufficient revenue to support a bond issue of approximately \$107 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.50 percent.

In accordance with board policy, The University of Arkansas at Fayetteville will sustain a building maintenance fund to be supported by tuition and fee revenue and by auxiliary revenues. These funds will be held in a separate account for the maintenance of the new facilities by transferring annually to plant funds based on the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) of Universities and Colleges recommendation.

The projects of the E&G issue provide no additional square footage to the campus. Therefore, there will be no additional transfer for the educational and general issue. The current APPA recommendation is \$1.25 for auxiliary facilities. Based on an estimated total of 195,700 square feet for auxiliary facilities, \$244,625 will be transferred annually.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville (UAF) to issue bonds not to exceed \$132 million with a term not to exceed thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 5.50 percent for various E&G projects.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System, and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

The administration and Board of Trustees of Northwest Arkansas Community College (NWACC) request approval to offer the Associate of Applied Science in Artificial Intelligence (CIP 11.0102), effective Spring 2027.

NWACC is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The Northwest Arkansas Community College Board of Trustees approved the program on November 10, 2025.

Program Description

The proposed Associate of Applied Science in Artificial Intelligence is a workforce-focused academic program designed to prepare students for roles in which AI tools and systems are used to improve productivity, decision-making, automation, and service delivery across industries. The program is designed with a workforce-aligned, applied focus that emphasizes practical use of artificial intelligence tools, machine learning concepts, automation, data analytics, cloud computing, and responsible AI practices.

The 60-credit hour curriculum will prepare students to apply AI technologies in real-world business and industrial settings rather than emphasizing theoretical or research-based study. The program is intended to serve adult learners, working professionals, and recent high school graduates seeking an affordable, locally accessible pathway into AI-related careers.

The proposed program will utilize existing library and learning support resources as well as existing instructional classrooms, laboratories, and computing infrastructure. Up to four new faculty members will be hired over the first three years. Specialized instructional equipment and software will be required.

Program Need

Labor-market data provided by ADHE indicates a strong and sustained demand for AI-related occupations in northwest Arkansas, with 4,163 jobs in 2026 projected to increase to 4,494 jobs by 2031 (+8.0% growth), representing 331 net new jobs and approximately 283 annual openings. Median earnings for these occupations are \$46.73 per hour (\$97,200 annually). Key aligned occupations include Software Developers, Network and Computer Systems Administrators, Web and Digital Interface Designers, and Computer Occupations. From January 2025 through January 2026, the region recorded 2,617 unique job postings, with an average of 201 monthly postings and 150 monthly hires, reflecting ongoing recruitment pressure. Labor market data also reports zero regional completions and zero regional training providers for CIP 11.0102 (Artificial Intelligence), demonstrating a significant gap in educational supply.

Regional employers further report difficulty finding workers with AI-aligned and AI-enabled skill sets, particularly individuals who can apply AI tools in practical workplace

environments. Student and community demand is evidenced through strong participation in NWACC's non-credit "AI in the Workplace" workshops, crossover participation by current and prospective students, employer requests for credit-bearing AI training options, and a credit-bearing AI course currently offered at a local high school serving approximately 40 students annually. Collectively, these indicators demonstrate both immediate and future enrollment potential and support the need for NWACC's proposed Associate of Applied Science in Artificial Intelligence.

Program Expenditures and Funding

Up to four full-time faculty members will be hired over the first three years with a program coordinator and one full-time faculty hired as soon as Spring 2026. As enrollment increases, adjunct instructors will be used for specialized topics, flexible scheduling, and additional sections. The total estimated personnel cost over the first three years ranges from \$740,000 to \$866,000. The purchase of library resources, equipment, and specialized software will be necessary to support instruction in artificial intelligence, machine learning, cloud computing, data analytics, automation, and responsible AI practices. The total estimated resource and equipment cost over the first three years is \$70,000 to \$121,000. Additional estimated costs can be found in the full proposal.

Program funding will be generated primarily through student tuition and program fees. Projected enrollment is 20 students in Year 1, 50 students in Year 2, and 80 students in Year 3. Total projected tuition and fee revenue is \$114,300 in Year 1, \$285,000 in Year 2, and \$457,200 in Year 3, for a total of \$856,500 over the first three years of operation. NWACC reports no grants, reallocations, or external funding sources at this time; long-term sustainability is expected to be supported through tuition and fee revenue based on projected enrollment.

Program Duplication

There are no active associate degree programs similar to the proposed Associate of Applied Science in Artificial Intelligence.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion, a student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate the ability to use AI platforms, machine-learning models, cloud-based tools, and automation frameworks to address authentic business, industry, and community challenges.
2. Implement AI systems that follow responsible-use guidelines, including fairness, transparency, safety, bias mitigation, documentation, and alignment with frameworks such as the NIST AI Risk Management Framework.
3. Gather, prepare, analyze, and interpret data; write Python and API-based automations; and incorporate cloud AI services into end-to-end workflows supporting technical decision-making.

4. Interpret, analyze, and validate the performance of machine-learning and generative models using appropriate evaluation metrics, regulatory considerations, and domain-specific requirements.
5. Convey AI findings through clear written, oral, and visual communication tailored to diverse audiences, including technical teams, industry partners, and non-technical decision-makers.
6. Demonstrate readiness for the workplace through hands-on project work, adherence to professional standards, version control, documentation, and collaboration across interdisciplinary teams.

The administration and Board of Trustees of South Arkansas College (SAC) request approval to offer the Associate of Applied Science in Nursing (Traditional) (CIP 51.3801), effective Summer 2026.

SAC is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The South Arkansas College Board of Trustees approved the program on January 20, 2026.

Program Description

The proposed Associate of Applied Science in Nursing (Traditional) program is designed to respond to critical and sustained registered nurse workforce shortages in southern Arkansas and surrounding areas. The program focuses on providing access to rural, underserved, and place bound students who are likely to remain employed in the region after graduation. Graduates will be prepared for the NCLEX and for immediate employment in acute care, long-term care, and community-based healthcare environments.

The program's curriculum requires completion of 68 total credit hours, comprised of 30 credit hours of general education prerequisites and, upon admission to the program, 38 credit hours of nursing coursework is completed over three semesters. Through classroom instruction, high-fidelity simulation, and supervised clinical experiences, the curriculum emphasizes patient-centered care, clinical judgment, safety and quality, evidence-based practice, professionalism, and leadership, ensuring graduates are well prepared for entry-level nursing practice and licensure.

The College will hire one program director, two faculty, and one simulation laboratory assistant to support the proposed program. Existing facilities will be utilized but will require renovations to accommodate simulation laboratory equipment requirements.

Program Need

Labor market data provided by ADHE demonstrate sustained and growing demand for Registered Nurses across southern Arkansas and surrounding counties. The region reports 4,679 registered nursing jobs in 2025, with continued growth projected through 2030 and approximately 270 annual openings. From January 2025 to November 2025, employers posted an average of 349 RN job postings per month, with 208 average monthly hires, indicating ongoing recruitment pressure and persistent workforce shortages. Registered Nursing is also a high-wage occupation in the region, with median earnings of \$36.77 per hour and 75th percentile wages exceeding \$42 per hour.

Although the educational supply has increased, it has not kept pace with the workforce demand. In 2024, the region produced 573 Registered Nursing completions across 11

institutions, reflecting 17% growth since 2020, with associate degrees representing the largest share of completions (55.5%). Despite this growth, sustained hiring activity, competitive posting intensity, and documented annual openings indicate a continued supply-demand gap, particularly in rural and underserved communities within South Arkansas College's service area.

The demand for Registered Nurses in southern Arkansas was confirmed through an employer needs survey distributed to local clinical partners, advisory committee members, and employers. All reported ongoing difficulty filling RN positions and projected continued hiring needs across acute care, long-term care, and community-based settings. Magnolia Regional Medical Center anticipates 10-15 RN vacancies annually. Employers also expressed strong support for the proposed program through clinical placements, advisory participation, tuition assistance, and recruitment partnerships, reinforcing both workforce need and commitment to graduate employment.

Program Expenditures and Funding

The proposed program will require the addition of a full-time Program Director who will be responsible for day-to-day activities, liaising with the partner healthcare facilities, developing the new RN curriculum, developing and implementing recruiting strategies with the college marketing department, procurement of necessary supplies, equipment, and training, and teaching in the program. In addition, two full-time nursing faculty, a simulation lab assistant, and adjunct clinical faculty will also be hired. Salary and fringe benefit details can be found in the full proposal. Simulation laboratory equipment, including a SimMan and SimNewborn, will be acquired at an estimated total cost of more than \$156,000.

Funding for the proposed program will be come primarily from student tuition and fees based on the projected enrollment of 24 students per cohort. Tuition revenue projections are calculated using SAC's in-district, out-of-district, and out-of-state tuition rates, with conservative estimates based primarily on in-district enrollment patterns. SAC also received a Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in the amount of \$1,572,936 with the intent of supporting the program's salaries, fringe benefits, training, new equipment, participant costs, and supplies through 2029.

A private donation through the SAC Foundation will allow renovation of existing facilities to create a designated simulation laboratory and classroom for the program.

Program Duplication

Twenty-three Arkansas public institutions offer a similar Associate of Applied Science in Nursing program with a traditional/RN focus, a transitional/LPN-to-RN focus, or both.

South Arkansas College currently offers an approved Associate of Applied Science in Nursing program with an LPN-to-RN focus developed in partnership with Arkansas Rural Nursing Education Consortium (ARNEC).

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion, a student will be able to:

1. Provide safe, compassionate, patient-centered nursing care to diverse individuals, families, and communities across the lifespan.
2. Apply clinical judgement and the nursing process to assess, plan, implement, and evaluate evidence-based nursing care.
3. Implement safe nursing practices and participate in quality improvement activities that minimize risk of harm and enhance patient outcomes.
4. Integrate best current evidence, clinical expertise, and patient preferences to guide nursing practice.
5. Use informatics and healthcare technologies to communicate, manage information, support clinical decision-making, and promote safe patient care.
6. Communicate and collaborate effectively with patients, families, and members of interprofessional healthcare teams to coordinate care and achieve optimal patient outcomes.
7. Demonstrate professional behaviors consistent with ethical principles, legal standards, and regulatory requirements of nursing practice.
8. Apply principles of leadership and delegation appropriate to the role of the associate degree nurse within structure healthcare environments.

The administration of the University of Arkansas Fayetteville (UAF) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Master of Library and Information Studies in Library and Information Studies (CIP 25.0101), effective Fall 2027.

UAF is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on March 9, 2026.

Program Description

The proposed 36-credit-hour Master of Library and Information Studies in Library and Information Studies program is designed to prepare students for professional roles in libraries, archives, museums, healthcare, government, higher education, and corporate and nonprofit organizations. The curriculum emphasizes information organization and retrieval, digital literacy, research methods, management and policy, and ethical and legal issues related to information access and stewardship. Graduates will be prepared for positions including librarians, archivists, curators, research analysts, and information professionals across a variety of sectors.

The program will be housed within the University Libraries, providing students with access to a working academic library environment and opportunities for applied, experiential learning. Instruction will be supported by newly hired full-time faculty, existing faculty librarians, and adjunct faculty as needed. The program is designed to meet American Library Association (ALA) accreditation standards, and UAF intends to seek this accreditation within the first three years of program implementation.

Program Need

Workforce analysis provided by ADHE indicates a sustained and growing demand for library and information professionals across the state. As of 2024, occupations linked to library and information science within Arkansas and immediately surrounding counties accounted for more than 25,700 positions, with nearly 5,000 jobs added over the past three years and an additional 14,800 workers projected to be needed over the next seven years.

Employer need surveys and letters of support from Arkansas public libraries, academic libraries, museums, healthcare organizations, and state agencies indicate that the Master of Library and Information Studies degree is frequently required for advancement into professional and leadership roles. Employers report anticipated retirements among long-serving librarians, expansion of digital services, and increased

demand for professionals with expertise in information organization, data management, digital literacy, and public service. Several employers noted difficulty recruiting qualified candidates within the state, resulting in reliance on out-of-state hiring.

The median wage for library and information professionals in Arkansas is approximately \$54,530, with higher salaries associated with advanced credentials and specialized responsibilities. Employer data indicate that positions requiring a master's degree offer increased earning potential and greater opportunities for advancement. Establishing an in-state master's-level program would expand access for Arkansas residents, strengthen the local talent pipeline, and support the long-term workforce needs of libraries, cultural institutions, healthcare systems, and public agencies throughout the state.

Program Expenditures and Funding

UAF will invest approximately \$145,000 annually over an initial three-year period to support faculty salaries and instructional costs. This investment will be shared between central university resources and the University Libraries. After three years, the program's funding will be evaluated again and, if sufficient enrollment exists, a permanent transfer of these funds will be considered to support the program.

The estimated total cost to students for completion of the 36-credit-hour program is \$19,423, based on current in-state tuition and fees. One new faculty member will be hired to serve as the department/program lead at an approximate salary of \$115,000 per year. The University Libraries will invest approximately \$30,000 in support of the proposed program for adjunct faculty and associated program costs.

Program Duplication

Three Arkansas public universities offer graduate degrees in library media studies or instructional technology.

The administration of the University of Arkansas Fayetteville (UAF) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Master of Science in Outdoor Recreation and Sport Tourism (CIP 31.0301), effective Fall 2026.

UAF is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on March 9, 2026.

Program Description

The proposed 30-credit-hour, 100% online Master of Science in Outdoor Recreation and Sport Tourism is designed to prepare professionals for leadership roles in outdoor recreation tourism, outdoor adventure tourism, sport tourism, and sustainable destination management. The curriculum emphasizes applied learning and integrates coursework in tourism management, finance, data analysis, sustainability, consumer behavior, and strategic planning. Courses are designed without prerequisites, allowing working professionals to complete the program in any sequence. Graduates will be prepared to manage and expand recreation and sport tourism initiatives across public, private, and nonprofit sectors.

The program will be housed in the Department of Health, Human Performance, and Recreation within the College of Education and Health Professions and will be supported by existing faculty expertise and instructional infrastructure, including the University's Global Campus. One full-time faculty member will be hired, with additional part-time lecturers utilized as needed. No new facilities are required to implement the program.

Program Need

Outdoor recreation and sport tourism represent a significant and growing component of Arkansas's economy. According to the Arkansas Office of Outdoor Recreation, the sector contributes more than \$7.3 billion annually to the state's GDP and supports over 68,000 jobs. Workforce analysis provided by ADHE indicates that occupations linked to parks, recreation, and leisure facilities management added more than 10,000 jobs over the past three years and are projected to require approximately 54,500 newly trained workers over the next seven years.

Median wages for linked occupations are estimated at \$81,600, with entry-level wages beginning near \$65,900, significantly exceeding the statewide median wage. Employer survey results indicate strong demand for graduates with advanced training who can combine business, management, and analytical skills with industry-specific knowledge. These employers expressed a preference for an online program format to

accommodate working professionals and identified leadership development and advancement opportunities tied to graduate-level credentials.

Employer support for the proposed program includes participation from organizations such as Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, Arkansas Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism, Ozark Foundation, 37 North Expeditions, and municipal parks and recreation departments. These partners cited anticipated workforce needs, advancement opportunities for current employees, and the importance of specialized training aligned with the state's Natural State Initiative.

Program Expenditures and Funding

The proposed program will be supported through existing institutional resources, tuition revenue, and instructional capacity. The program is designed to be financially sustainable over the long term. The estimated total cost to students for completion of the 30-credit-hour program is \$15,380.

One new non-tenure track faculty member will be hired to implement the program, with an anticipated cost of approximately \$81,000 including salary and fringe benefits. No significant instructional, library, or research resources are required for implementation.

Program Duplication

No similar active master's-level programs in Outdoor Recreation and Sport Tourism are currently offered in Arkansas. Comparable programs in the region are limited and are offered outside the state.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion, a student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of marketing, economics, and financial management related to tourism in outdoor recreation and sport tourism.
2. Identify funding strategies, including application and administration of grants.
3. Demonstrate knowledge of trends and issues as well as sustainability in Outdoor Recreation and Sport as it pertains to tourism.

The administration of the University of Arkansas Little Rock (UALR) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Bachelor of Science in Artificial Intelligence (CIP 11.0102), effective Fall 2026.

UALR is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on January 28-29, 2026.

Program Description

The proposed 120 credit-hour, 100% online Bachelor of Science in Artificial Intelligence degree is designed to provide students with a rigorous foundation in mathematics, computer science, and applied artificial intelligence. The curriculum integrates core computing principles with specialized coursework in machine learning, natural language processing, robotics, computer vision, reinforcement learning, intelligent agents, and AI governance.

Graduates will be prepared for employment in AI-enabled and advanced computing roles across sectors including technology, healthcare, finance, manufacturing, logistics, retail, government, and professional services. Career pathways include positions such as Software Developer, Artificial Intelligence Engineer, Machine Learning Engineer, Data Analyst, Computer Systems Analyst, and related computing occupations. The proposed program also provides a strong foundation for graduate study in artificial intelligence, computer science, data science, or related fields.

Existing faculty, state-of-the-art hybrid classrooms and laboratories, computing infrastructure, and resources will be leveraged by the proposed program.

Program Need

Labor market data provided by ADHE indicates a significant demand for occupations aligned with artificial intelligence and advanced computing across Arkansas. Target occupations are projected to support 7,909 jobs in 2026, increasing to 8,328 jobs by 2031, representing 5.3% growth and 419 net new jobs. Median earnings across these occupations are \$40.59 per hour, or \$84,400 annually, with approximately 509 annual openings. Key aligned occupations include Software Developers, Computer Systems Analysts, Computer Network Support Specialists, and Web Developers.

Hiring activity further demonstrates consistent employer demand. From January 2025 through January 2026, Arkansas recorded 12,622 total job postings (5,204 unique) for these occupations, posted by more than 550 companies, with an average of 400 monthly postings and 284 monthly hires. Educational supply remains limited as labor

market data indicates a substantial gap between workforce demand and in-state educational production.

Program Expenditures and Funding

No new full-time faculty positions are required initially. The program will utilize nine existing faculty made available through the reallocation of resources from low-enrollment programs currently under review. This reallocation ensures sufficient instructional capacity without requiring immediate new hires. Strong industry partnerships provide access to highly qualified adjunct instructors who can support rapid enrollment growth and specialized course offerings. Approximately \$18,000 per year will be spent on adjunct instructional costs. Existing facilities, equipment, and library resources will be used.

Program operations will be funded exclusively through student tuition and fees. Based on enrollment growth and a tuition rate of \$246 per credit hour, projected tuition and fee revenue totals \$147,600 in Year 1, \$407,376 in Year 2, and \$602,208 in Year 3, for a three-year total of \$1,157,184. In addition, UALR was awarded a HIRED grant through the Spring of 2027 for up to \$226,000 to support curriculum development, adjunct faculty, and AI licensing.

Program Duplication

There are no active bachelor degree programs similar to the proposed Bachelor of Science in Artificial Intelligence.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion, a student will be able to:

1. Apply core concepts of computer science, mathematics, and statistics to design and implement AI systems.
2. Develop and evaluate machine learning, deep learning, and natural language processing models for real-world applications.
3. Analyze complex problems and select appropriate AI tools and techniques to address them effectively.
4. Evaluate the ethical, societal, and governance implications of AI technologies in professional practice.
5. Communicate technical ideas, research findings, and project outcomes clearly to both technical and non-technical audiences.
6. Collaborate effectively in multidisciplinary teams to design, build, and deploy AI-driven solutions.

The administration of the University of Arkansas Little Rock (UALR) and Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System request approval to offer the Master of Science in Cybersecurity (CIP 11.1003), effective Fall 2026.

UALR is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and the proposed program is within the role and scope established for the institution. The University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees approved the program on January 28-29, 2026.

Program Description

The proposed, 100% online Master of Science in Cybersecurity prepares advanced practitioners to secure complex digital and AI-enabled systems. The curriculum includes defensive and offensive cyber operations, post-quantum cryptography, advanced cloud security, critical infrastructure protection, and secure artificial intelligence. Graduates will be equipped to design resilient architectures, manage cyber risk across enterprise and AI environments, and communicate technical findings effectively to both technical and executive audiences.

The curriculum emphasizes applied learning through hands-on labs, real-world projects, service learning, and industry-aligned practicum experiences. Students may complete either a 30-credit-hour project option or a 33-credit-hour thesis option and select a concentration in Cyber Offensive Operations or Secure Artificial Intelligence. The program offers flexible delivery in online and in-person formats, along with transfer credit options, prior learning assessment for industry certifications, and an Early Entry pathway for qualified undergraduates. Accreditation through the NSA National Centers of Academic Excellence will be pursued following graduation of the program's first cohort.

The program leverages existing university resources, such as cybersecurity labs, online infrastructure, and practicum partnerships. The proposed program will transition one part-time faculty to full-time and hire 2 additional teaching assistants to support the program.

Program Need

Labor market data provided by ADHE shows continual demand for professionals in Computer and Information Systems Security/Auditing/Information Assurance. Regionally, approximately 14,755 jobs are projected in 2026, increasing to 15,465 by 2031, representing 4.8% growth and more than 700 net new positions. High-demand roles such as Information Security Analysts are projected to grow by approximately 11%, and Computer and Information Systems Managers by 8%, indicating strong expansion in both technical and leadership cybersecurity roles. Median regional

earnings across target occupations are approximately \$83,100 annually (\$39.93 per hour), with several advanced roles exceeding \$100,000 annually.

UALR conducted an employer survey to evaluate regional workforce demand for graduates in cybersecurity and information systems security. Data were collected through structured interviews, email correspondence, letters of support, and direct engagement with industry partners in Central and Northwest Arkansas. Employers reported ongoing difficulty recruiting and retaining qualified candidates, particularly in security analysis, systems administration, cloud security, risk management, compliance, and security operations. They emphasized the need for graduates with applied technical skills in cloud platforms, scripting (e.g., Python), security frameworks, auditing, and incident response, along with strong communication, project management, and problem-solving abilities. Several employers noted reliance on out-of-state or remote recruitment due to limited in-state talent, highlighting the need to strengthen Arkansas' cybersecurity workforce pipeline.

Program Expenditures and Funding

Implementation of the proposed Master of Science in Cybersecurity program will require modest incremental personnel support. Over the first three years, projected personnel costs total \$388,200 which include converting an existing part-time appointment to full-time status, at an annual cost of \$66,000, and the hiring of two teaching assistants at \$31,700 each annually. No additional administrative positions, faculty development funds, instructional or research equipment, library resources, or facility renovations are required. The program will utilize existing hybrid classrooms, cybersecurity laboratory space, cloud infrastructure, and the newly established Cyberspace Operations Research and Education (CORE) Center.

Program sustainability will be supported through student tuition revenue generated by projected enrollment growth. Over the first three years, the total projected tuition revenue is approximately \$1,158,300. The specific tuition rates, credit hours, and enrollment projections used for this approximation can be found in the full proposal. No additional grants, reallocations, special fees, or external funding sources are identified for program implementation. Tuition revenue exceeds projected personnel costs over the three-year period, supporting long-term financial sustainability.

Program Duplication

No similar active master's-level programs in Cybersecurity are currently offered in Arkansas.

Program Description

The Cyber Learning Network (CLN) is a consortium of Arkansas institutions established to expand and diversify cybersecurity and related technology education statewide. Through a shared curriculum and coordinated delivery model, the CLN leverages pooled resources and faculty expertise to address workforce and skills gaps. The University of Arkansas Little Rock serves as the lead institution, providing coordination and shared services on behalf of the consortium. The 15-16 credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency in Artificial Intelligence provides a compact foundation in AI literacy and practical tools, while the 27-29 credit-hour Technical Certificate in Artificial Intelligence builds on this foundation through advanced coursework that develops deeper technical competencies. Students may complete these credentials as standalone workforce preparation or stack them toward a bachelor's degree in Artificial Intelligence or a related field.

The proposed Software Engineering certificates focus on modern software and web development practices. The 15 credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency in Software Engineering emphasizes front-end development, user-centered design, and JavaScript programming, while the 30 credit-hour Technical Certificate in Software Engineering builds on this foundation with server-side development, database integration, cybersecurity fundamentals, and Development, Security, Operations practices, culminating in a full-stack practicum. These stackable credentials prepare students for a range of software development roles and provide flexible pathways into related degree programs.

Lastly, the proposed 6 credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency in Cyber-Informed Engineering integrates cybersecurity principles into the systems engineering lifecycle, with an emphasis on securing industrial control and cyber-physical systems.

The proposed set of Cyberspace Foundations certificates will be supported through existing resources, faculty, equipment, instructional facilities, and technology. No new expenses are anticipated for program implementation.

Program Need

Labor market data provided by ADHE indicate continued corporate demand for applied computing, software, and systems-oriented skills aligned with Artificial Intelligence, Software Engineering, and Cyber-Informed Engineering. Employers across healthcare, finance, energy, manufacturing, logistics, government, and technology sectors report continued need for professionals who can develop software solutions, integrate emerging technologies, and support digital transformation and critical infrastructure protection. Employment projections for software development and systems-focused roles exceed statewide and national averages, and median wages are well above the statewide average. Educational supply is limited for short-term, stackable credentials in these fields, particularly in Artificial Intelligence and Cyber-Informed Engineering, creating a statewide gap that the proposed credentials are intended to address.

In addition, Cyber Learning Network program advisory members, which includes representatives from industry, government, and workforce partners across multiple sectors, provide direct feedback on hiring needs, emerging skill requirements, and desired technical competencies in artificial intelligence, software engineering, and cyber-informed engineering. This employer input helps ensure curriculum alignment with real-world workforce expectations and reinforces the documented need for these proposed certificates.

Program Expenditures and Funding

The proposed Cyberspace Foundations certificates will be implemented using existing full-time faculty across CLN partner institutions. No new administrative positions or new full-time faculty are required. Adjunct faculty may be utilized as enrollment grows, with Year 1 adjunct instructional costs supported through the ADHE HIRED grant. Faculty development will be supported through existing institutional and CLN grant-related professional development resources. No additional facility, equipment, library, or other capital expenditures are required, as the programs leverage existing classrooms, computer laboratories, cloud-based tools, software platforms, and library resources across participating institutions.

Program funding will be supported primarily through student tuition and fees retained by the institution of record for each enrolled student. Actual tuition rates and revenue will vary by institution. ADHE HIRED grant funds will offset adjunct instructional costs during program implementation, ensuring adequate instructional capacity without creating permanent start-up costs.

Program Duplication

Three Arkansas public institutions offer certificates in Artificial Intelligence, Black River Technical College, Northwest Arkansas Community College, and Arkansas Northeastern College, while no comparable certificates exist in Software Engineering. The Certificate of Proficiency in Cyber-Informed Engineering was developed by the CLN lead institution, the University of Arkansas Little Rock, in Fall 2025.

1. Develop secure, data-driven applications using server-side programming and relational and non-relational databases.
2. Implement Development, Security, Operations practices, including automated testing, security scanning, and continuous integration and deployment pipelines.

4. Collaborate in agile, team-based environments to plan, build, and present full-stack software solutions that meet stakeholder requirements.

1. Identify and distinguish between digital and non-digital assets within engineered systems and describe their intended functions, capabilities, and criticality.
2. Analyze potential cyber-initiated events that could affect system operations and evaluate mitigation strategies within industrial control system environments.
3. Explain the role and importance of cybersecurity in engineering and operational technology contexts to technical and non-technical audiences.
4. Apply engineered controls, layered defenses, and basic active defense strategies to protect critical system functions.
5. Demonstrate appropriate handling of sensitive information, supply chain considerations, and operational constraints within critical infrastructure environments.
