CERTIFICATION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES FOR 2025-26

A.C.A. §6-62-805 (Act 366 of 1991) requires each state-supported institution of higher education to annually certify by June 15 to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board that its intercollegiate athletic program will generate sufficient revenues to meet expenditures or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional board-sanctioned student athletic fees.

Verification of Athletic Budgets and Fee Information

Institutions with intercollegiate athletic programs submitted ADHE Form 21-2, "Certification of Budgeted Athletic Revenues and Expenditures" and proper supporting documentation. ADHE finance staff verified that the athletic data submitted by the institutions matched the overall 2025-26 institutional operating budgets.

A.C.A. §6-62-804 requires that any student athletic fees assessed must be clearly defined in all publications and institutional board minutes and listed separate and distinct from tuition or other student fees on student tuition and fee statements. All institutions assessing a student athletic fee have certified to the Department compliance with this requirement and have submitted copies of their student fee billing statements illustrating the disclosure of the athletic fee to each student.

Summary of Data

The institutional submissions establish the 2025-26 operating budgets for intercollegiate athletic programs and certify to the Coordinating Board any student athletic fees that will be charged to cover operating deficits. The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), Arkansas State University Mountain Home (ASUMH), Arkansas State University MidSouth (ASUMS), Arkansas State University Newport (ASUN), Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas (CCCUA), North Arkansas College (NAC), National Park College (NPC), Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas (PCCUA), South Arkansas College (SAC), Southeast Arkansas College (SEAC), and the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain (UACCRM) do not charge an athletic fee and expect to continue to meet their athletic operating costs without assessing a student athletic fee for the 2025-26 fiscal year. The following institutions have set their athletic fee per student semester credit hour (SSCH) as follows:

A summary chart of 2025-26 athletic certification data from each institution is shown on page 1-3. The summary chart, excluding the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), indicates that 29.4 percent of athletic program budgets are being funded from student athletic fees, while 12.3 percent comes from athletic generated revenues. Transfers from educational and general funds contribute 23.4 percent of the funding. There is one institution budgeting for the additional transfer from educational and general funds for Women's Athletic Sports Programs. This accounts for 1.2% of budgeted revenues. The remaining 33.7 percent is funded from other auxiliary profits, endowment and investment income, contributions and other athletic income.

Other than the educational and general transfer, the use of auxiliary profits is the most sensitive source of income for financing athletic budgets. Other auxiliary profits are included as a revenue source for intercollegiate athletic programs; however, the use of auxiliary funds to support intercollegiate athletic programs should not undermine sound fiscal management of those auxiliary enterprises. A breakdown of the various auxiliary profits utilized to fund the athletic budgets is included on page 1-4.

The following resolution is presented for the board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures Budgeted for 2025-26 as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM REVIEW AY2025

Arkansas Code §6-61-214 requires that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) review existing academic programs at Arkansas public colleges and universities to identify certificate and degree programs not meeting minimum standards of quality and to establish schedules for either resolving these concerns or removing the programs from the AHECB approved program inventory.

The existing academic program review policies were adopted in 1988 and revised in 1995, 1998, 2008 and last updated in January 2025. Institutions have been submitting program reviews for more than 35 years.

Arkansas colleges and universities are required to employ external consultants to review all certificate and degree programs over a period of 7-10 years with the findings from the reviews reported to the Coordinating Board. Accredited, licensed and state certified programs follow the usual review practices and the schedule of the accrediting/approval body.

A quality program review, or self-study, describes the status of a program, assesses program strengths, identifies areas for improvement, and provides strategic direction on program goals and specific plans to achieve those goals. The external reviewers' written report must include a summary of each area examined and should provide examples that document the conclusions. This summary report does not include a recommendation to AHECB on program continuation or program deletion.

AY2025 ACADEMIC PROGRAM REVIEW RECOMMENDATIONS OF NOTICE

July 25, 2025

Arkansas Code §6-61-214 requires that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) review existing academic programs at Arkansas public colleges and universities to identify certificate and degree programs not meeting minimum standards of quality and to establish schedules for either resolving these concerns or removing the programs from the AHECB approved program inventory.

Arkansas colleges and universities are required to employ external consultants to review all certificate and degree programs over a period of 7-10 years with the findings from the reviews reported to the Coordinating Board. Accredited, licensed and state certified programs follow the usual review practices and the schedule of the accrediting/approval body.

Following the comprehensive program review process for existing academic programs, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) staff has identified a list of certificate and degree programs that are currently out of compliance with the established policy requirements. These programs have not submitted the required evidence and documentation within the 7-10 year period, outlined in the policy.

Therefore, pursuant to Section 4 of the "Recommendations to Coordinating Board" within the aforementioned policy, the programs listed below are hereby placed on notice for potential removal from the AHECB approved program inventory. ADHE is committed to working with institutions to address these concerns and maintain the highest quality of academic programs across Arkansas.

These programs will be subject to a two-year notice period, during which the respective institutions are expected to bring the programs into compliance with the policy requirements. At the conclusion of this two-year period, any programs that continue to not meet the minimum standards will be recommended for deletion from the approved program inventory.

Please be advised that, as per policy, state general revenue funds may not be used for the operation of a program beyond the termination deadline set by the Coordinating Board. Furthermore, ADHE will not include Student Semester Credit Hours (SSCHs) generated by major courses of programs removed from the approved program inventory in its funding formula calculations.

Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board Recommendation for Continued Authorization of Concurrent Enrollment Programs

In accordance with the Concurrent Enrollment policy, an institution with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board continued authorization for the Concurrent Enrollment Program can offer courses for concurrent enrollment for a period of up to seven (7) years. Institutions that wish to continue to offer courses for concurrent enrollment must request AHECB reauthorization.

The Concurrent Enrollment Policy outlines clear criteria for continued authorization, focusing on the quality of instruction, student support, and institutional oversight. The policy requires institutions seeking reauthorization to provide documentation demonstrating:

- Current Memorandum of Understanding (MOU): Institutions submitted for review an example Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) template.
- Current List of Concurrent Courses: Institutions provided a comprehensive list of all concurrent courses offered, including course numbers, ACTS numbers (if applicable), and prerequisites.
- **Assurance of Course Content:** A detailed description of the process for ensuring concurrent course content meets the academic unit's requirements at the college or university.
- Current List of Concurrent Instructors: A list of all concurrent instructors, along with a statement confirming they meet the AHECB and academic department's minimum requirements for instruction.
- Grading and Recording Procedures: An explanation of how grades are awarded and recorded with the college or university Registrar, ensuring consistency with on-campus courses.
- Student Success Data Analysis: An analysis of student success, persistence, and retention data from the three years prior to the reauthorization request, demonstrating the effectiveness of concurrent credit courses.

Each institution recommended for continued authorization has submitted the required documentation, which has been reviewed by a three-member team selected by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE). The positive evaluations from these reviews form the basis of this recommendation. ADHE recommends to AHECB for continued authorization for the following institutions concurrent enrollment program:

ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD Regular Quarterly Meeting April 25, 2025

Minutes of Meeting

The April 25, 2025, regular meeting of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was held at Southern Arkansas University in Magnolia. Chair Jim Carr called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, ADHE staff and quests were also present.

Chair Carr began by calling on President Bruno Hicks for a welcome. Dr. Hicks welcomed Coordinating Board members, ADHE staff, and presidents and chancellors to the SAU Campus. Established in 1909, on approximately 1700 acres, SAU has become the best small comprehensive public university in Arkansas, said Hicks.

Next, Carr stated the board would go into a Committee of the Whole, which would allow all members to vote during both committee meetings.

Agenda Item No. 1 Distribution of Mineral Lease Funds

Nick Fuller presented the Distribution of Mineral Lease Funds. According to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-61-801 through §6-61-808, there is established the Arkansas Research Development Program for providing Arkansas Research Development Program Grants to publicly-supported universities in Arkansas by the Division of Higher Education. Act 870 of 2023 provides that after the sum of \$13,200,000 has been deposited into the Higher Education Building Maintenance Fund, any additional deposits are to be transferred to the Research Development Fund to be used as provided by law.

RESOLVED, That after review by the Legislative Council, the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education is authorized to distribute up to \$475,000 from the Higher Education Research Development Fund to the

University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for continuing personal services and operating expenses related to ARE-ON.

There were no questions.

Graycen Bigger moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 1 to the full Board for consideration. Heather Maxey seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2
Associate of Applied Science in Industrial Maintenance
Technical Certificate in Industrial Maintenance
Certificate of Proficiency in Industrial Maintenance
Certificate of Proficiency in automation
Certificate of Proficiency in Machine Tool Technology
Arkansas Northeastern College

The proposed Industrial Maintenance program is designed to address the critical workforce need for skilled industrial maintenance technicians within the steel industry, steel service industries, and other manufacturing sectors in the region surrounding ANC. This program proposal is in direct response to industry demands for a trained and adaptable workforce capable of maintaining and optimizing advanced manufacturing equipment and systems.

The proposed Industrial Maintenance program will educate students in the areas of electricity/electronics, mechanics, welding, automation systems, manufacturing, machining operations, blueprint/schematics, industrial tools, and troubleshooting. It will provide students with the knowledge and skills required to secure high skill, high demand, and high wage employment in a variety of industries. Three Certificates of Proficiency, each 12 credit hours, and a 30 credit-hour Technical Certificate are embedded in the 60 credit-hour Associate of Applied Science curriculum. These stackable credentials will give students the opportunity to earn nationally recognized industry credentials and local employer endorsed credentials while learning specific high-demand skillsets.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Associate of Applied Science in Industrial Maintenance (CIP 47.0303), Technical Certificate in Industrial Maintenance (CIP 47.0303), Certificate of Proficiency in Industrial Maintenance (CIP 47.0303), Certificate of Proficiency in Automation (CIP 15.0406), and Certificate of Proficiency in Machine Tool Technology (CIP 48.0501) at Arkansas Northeastern College, effective Fall 2025.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Northeastern College of the approval.

Ryan Perkins, Vice President for Instruction/CAO and Stacy Walker, Associate Vice President for Workforce Development, presented additional background information.

Graycen Bigger said she was surprised this program wasn't already in place. She asked if the critical need for skilled industrial maintenance technicians was due to skilled workers retiring and questioned if there were any plans for two plus two transfer agreements.

Perkins said the need is mostly retirement based, and yes, they are looking at potential two plus two agreements.

Chair Carr asked how many new students are anticipated in this program. Perkins said they anticipate 20-25 new students in each program.

Graycen Bigger moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 2 to the full Board for consideration. Lucas Pointer seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 3
Bachelor of Science in Advanced Manufacturing Engineering
Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Manufacturing
University of Arkansas at Fort Smith

The proposed 120 credit-hour Bachelor of Science in Advanced Manufacturing Engineering blends courses in traditional and applied mechanical and electrical engineering with courses from business and data science. Graduates will be prepared to design, implement, maintain, and manage modern manufacturing systems that require knowledge in automation, device networking, systems integration, technical communication, project management, quality control, procurement, supply chain management, compliance, safety, and manufacturing processes.

The embedded 9 credit-hour Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Manufacturing prepares graduates to apply technical and management principles in an advanced manufacturing environment to achieve operational excellence. Graduates will apply technical skills such as quality assurance, risk analysis, process management, product management, and other necessary specialties in the field of technology management.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the offering of the Bachelor of Science in Advanced Manufacturing Engineering (CIP 14.3601) and Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Manufacturing (CIP 14.3601) at the University of Arkansas Fort Smith, effective Fall 2025.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to inform the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Fort Smith and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System of the approval.

Dr. Shadow Robinson, Provost and Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs, presented additional background information.

Bigger asked if there is an anticipated average wage or increase for students getting this degree or technical certificate? Dr. Robinson said, yes, the certificate program will open leadership opportunities while the bachelor's degree will see average salaries in the \$70,000 - \$80,000 range.

Graycen Bigger moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 5 to the full Board for consideration. Lucas Pointer seconded, and the committee approved.

Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board certification does not constitute an endorsement of any institution or program. Such certification merely indicates that certain criteria have been met as required under the rules and regulations implementing institutional and program certification as defined in A.C.A. §6-61-301.

Agenda Item No. 10 Commissioner's Report

Commissioner Warden began by thanking Dr. Hicks and SAU for hosting such a wonderful meeting. He then thanked the Coordinating Board members and DHE staff for all they do for higher education in Arkansas. Next, he announced that Dr. Terry Martin was stepping down as provost and executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Arkansas and thanked him for his service to higher education in Arkansas.

Return on Investment

All of the institutions should have received our initial findings on the return on investment metric, said Warden. A lot of work went into the report in a short period of time to really highlight that there is value in higher education in Arkansas.

Agenda Item No. 11 Report on First-Year Student Remediation

Mason Campbell presented information about first-year student remediation. He noted the primary focus of this report is the cohort of 7,620 students receiving remediation during the academic year 2023-2024. These students are a subset of the 21,357 first-time entering, degree seeking students who graduated high school in 2022 or 2023. Of this population, 91% were classified as full-time students and 9% were classified as part-time students. With regards to sex, 58% were female, 42% were male, and less than 1% percent did not report. When examining the institution type, 69% of this population enrolled at a four-year institution compared to 31% enrolled at a two-year institution. Lastly, the remediation status of all first-time entering students, 64% did not require remediation while 36% did require remedial coursework.

Agenda Item No. 12
Report on Student Retention and Graduation for Arkansas Higher Education

Sonia Hazelwood reported on the statewide student retention and graduation rates for students entering Arkansas higher education institutions for public 4-Year and 2-Year institutions, and private/independent institutions. While the 4-year institutions held steady, a 1.7% decrease for the 2-year colleges resulted in a small decline of 0.7% in the statewide retention rate.

Sonia Hazelwood reported on the retention and graduation rates for first-time in college students who participate in Arkansas intercollegiate athletics. In Academic Year 2023-24, 4,509 students participated in athletics at ten universities and twelve 2-year colleges, which is up from nine who reported last year. This is the most student-athletes ever reported for an academic year. The increase was due in part to 139 student-athletes reported by the three additional 2-year colleges and several increases in the number of student-athletes reported by other institutions.

There were no questions.

APPROVAL OF ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD BY-LAWS

The amended by-laws are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for approval.

The AHECB By-Laws Committee, appointed by Chair Jim Carr, met and reviewed the by-laws that were originally approved at the July 24, 1997 meeting. The committee recommends the amended by-laws in this agenda item for adoption to allow the Coordinating Board to discharge its responsibilities in a more effective manner. The recommended revisions are shown with strikeouts and underline.

The By-Laws were originally approved on July 24, 1997 (Item No. 6):

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the amended by-laws presented in this agenda item for the operation of the Coordinating Board.

ARKANSAS HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD

BY-LAWS

Statement of Mission and Values

- 1. As members of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, we understand that acceptance of appointment to this Board is an acknowledgment of our responsibility to serve the citizens of Arkansas in the arena of higher education, and not simply the receipt of an honor or recognition.
- 2. We shall prepare for meetings by studying and understanding relevant materials supplied by staff.
- 3. We shall constantly improve our effectiveness as board members by reading widely in general and specialized publications in the subjects of educational matters and in state and local news.
- 4. We shall consider issues from the viewpoint of the needs and best interests of the people of Arkansas as a whole, and without partiality for or against any particular institution or type of institution.
- 5. We shall base our decisions on valid and appropriate data, information, and professional advice and counsel.
- 6. We shall bring to and expose to Board deliberations all concerns we have; we debate openly, vigorously, candidly, and politely; and we support decisions of the Board once made.
- We consider attendance at regular and special Board meetings a priority because of our responsibility to bring our individual questions and counsel to Board deliberations.
- 8. We understand and support the public's right to observe and be informed about the work of the Board as a public body tending to the public's business.
- 9. We understand the distinction between our duty to set policy and establish appropriate monitoring or reporting to ensure compliance with policy, and our duty to refrain from interfering in the administration and management of the division's responsibilities. We should, however, communicate freely with the Commissioner and appropriate staff regarding information relevant to the respective responsibilities of the Board and the division.
- 10. We are dedicated to establishing policy and discharging our responsibilities without discrimination on the basis of race, gender, color, creed, religion, age, or other inappropriate characteristics or criteria.

- 11. We serve as a bridge between institutions of higher education and the division staff on the one hand, and the Governor, General Assembly, and public on the other.
- 12. We serve as a buffer that shields the institutions and the division staff from inappropriate criticism and political pressure.
- 13. As individual board members we acknowledge that we should neither act nor speak on behalf of the Board with respect to matters under the jurisdiction of the Board. On these matters the Board should act collectively and the chair should be deemed the spokesperson for the Board.
- 14. We encourage and demand, within the bounds of the Board's legal authority and responsibility, integrity and accuracy of data and information supplied by institutions and relied upon by the staff and Board in the discharge of its responsibilities.

BY-LAWS

Article I

The Board

Section 1. Statute. The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board") was created by Acts of 1997, No. 1114, which abolished the State Board of Higher Education and transferred its powers, duties, and functions, records, personnel, property, unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, or other funds to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. The Coordinating Board is empowered with those duties and responsibilities specified or implied in Acts of 1997, No. 1114; Acts of 1977, No. 560, as amended by Acts of 1991, No. 1244; those duties and responsibilities specified or implied in Acts of 1991, No. 773 and No. 1244; and as otherwise specified by state and federal law.

Section 2. Board Composition. The Coordinating Board consists of twelve (12) members appointed by the Governor as provided in Acts of 1997, No. 1114. No more than four (4) members shall be appointed from any one (1) congressional district, as the districts exist at the time of the appointment. The members of the Board shall serve staggered terms of six (6) years. The terms of the members of the initial board shall be determined by lot so that the terms of two (2) members shall expire each year.

Article II

Officers of the Board and Their Duties

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Coordinating Board are the Chair, the Vice Chair, the Secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary to fulfill their responsibilities.

Section 2. Election. The officers of the Coordinating Board are elected annually by the affirmative vote of the majority of the entire Board at its first quarterly meeting. Officers shall serve until the first quarterly meeting one year following their election or until their successors are elected and qualified. A member shall not be eligible to serve for more than two (2), one (1) year terms as chair of the Board.

Section 3. Chair. The Chair shall be a member of the Coordinating Board and (1) shall preside at the meetings of the Board, (2) shall call special meetings as required, (3) shall appoint the chair of and appoint or provide for the election of all committees, and (4) shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by law or by action of the Board. The Chair shall be an ex officio member of all committees. The Chair shall be entitled to vote only in the event of a tie.

Section 4. Vice Chair. The Vice Chair shall be a member of the Coordinating Board and shall perform the duties and have the powers of the Chair during the absence or disability of the Chair.

Section 5. Secretary. The Secretary shall be a member of the Coordinating Board and shall attest to the official actions of the State Board.

Article III

Executive Staff

Section I. Commissioner. The executive head of the Division of Higher Education ("Division") shall be the Commissioner of the Division. The Commissioner shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The Coordinating Board shall evaluate the Commissioner annually. The Presidents Council shall provide an evaluation report of the Division and the Commissioner to the Board at least annually.

Section 2. Authority of Commissioner. The Commissioner of the Division, with the advice and consent of the Governor, shall appoint the heads of the respective <u>divisions</u> <u>units</u> within the Division. All of the personnel of the Division shall be employed by and serve at the pleasure of the Commissioner of the Division. Each department of the Division shall be under the direction, control, and supervision of the Commissioner. The Commissioner may delegate his/her functions, powers, and duties to various departments of the Division as deemed desirable or necessary for the effective and efficient operation of the Division.

Article IV

Committee Structure

Section 1. Committees. The Coordinating Board may establish as permanent committees an Executive Committee, a Finance Committee, and an Academic Committee. Special ad hoc committees may be appointed from time to time as the Board may deem desirable as needed.

Section 2. Authority of Committees. All committees of the Coordinating Board, both standing and special, have advisory status to the Board. These committees are not empowered to speak for the Board unless specifically granted such authorization by a majority of the Board or such authority is specified in the By-Laws of the Board.

Section 3. Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Coordinating Board and one member at-large appointed by the Chair. The Chair of the Board shall serve as committee chair. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to act on behalf of the Board, subject to ratification of the full Board at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

Section 4. Finance Committee. Members of the Finance Committee shall be appointed by the Chair at the first quarterly meeting of each year with vacancies to be filled by appointment by the Chair as they occur. The terms of committee members shall be one year. The Chair shall designate one member to serve as committee chair. The Finance Committee shall consider and make recommendations to the Coordinating Board on all matters relating to fiscal affairs of the institutions within the jurisdiction of the Board.

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Section 5. Academic Committee. Members of the Academic Committee shall be appointed by the Chair at the first quarterly meeting of each year with vacancies to be filled by appointment by the Chair as they occur. The terms of the committee members shall be one year. The Chair shall designate one member to serve as committee chair. The Academic Committee shall consider and make recommendations to the Coordinating Board on all matters pertaining to instructional programs of the institutions, including academic policies, program review and approval, and master planning.

Section 6. Committee Chair. A committee chair shall be entitled to vote only in the event of a tie.

Article V

Meetings and Procedures

Section 1. Meetings. The Coordinating Board shall meet at least once during each calendar quarter and at such other times upon call of the Chair or any other four (4) members. The Board shall not meet in any facility owned or operated by any organization which practices or condones discrimination. The Board may, at such times as it desires, meet on the campuses of the respective institutions of higher education in the state.

The Board may hold remote meetings or allow for members that cannot attend in person to attend remotely. If a remote meeting is held, it must be recorded in the format it is conducted. Remote methods of attendance include without limitation by telephone, video conference, or video broadcast.

Section 2. Notice. Notice concerning the time, <u>date</u>, and place of each regular meeting of the Coordinating Board shall be sent to each member of the Board by the Commissioner of the Division at least ten (10) days in advance of the meeting date. Public notice <u>of the time</u>, <u>date</u>, <u>and place of each meeting</u> as required by the Arkansas Freedom of Information Act shall be given-<u>of all meetings</u>. <u>Such notice shall be posted on the Board's website at least three (3) days before a regular meeting and two (2) hours before a special meeting. The notice must include the most current agenda. Agendas must be updated if items are added after posting.</u>

Section 3. Quorum. At all meetings of the Coordinating Board one member more than 50% of the current number of slated members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. Agenda. An agenda for each regular meeting of the Coordinating Board will be prepared by the Commissioner of the Division in consultation with the Chair of the Board setting forth each matter of business to be conducted at the meeting. Such agenda shall be sent to the members at least ten days before each meeting. Pursuant to Acts of 1997, No. 1114, all items to be considered as a Board agenda item must be reviewed by the Executive Council and the Presidents Council prior to being placed on the Board agenda. In the event that the Commissioner and staff shall not be in

agreement with the Executive Council on a matter to be considered by the Board, the Executive Council recommendation will be placed on the Board agenda automatically for a presentation and explanation of the Executive Council's position. The Board will then make a decision based on both positions. Matters not on the agenda can be considered at the meeting only by vote of a majority of the members present and voting following appropriate review by the Executive Council and the Presidents Council

Section 5. Rules of Order. Except as modified by these By-Laws, <u>Roberts Rules of Order</u> (latest edition) shall constitute the rules of parliamentary procedure applicable to all meetings of the Coordinating Board and its committees.

Section 6. Minutes. The Commissioner of the Division, or his/<u>or</u> her designee, shall be responsible for keeping minutes of all meetings and shall file, index and preserve all minutes, papers and documents pertaining to the business and proceedings of the Coordinating Board. The minutes of each meeting of the Board shall be reported in the agenda book of the next quarterly meeting of the Board.

Section 7. Open Meetings. All meetings of the Coordinating Board shall be open to the public unless, consistent with the requirements of the Arkansas Freedom of Information Act, a meeting is closed to the public for the consideration of personnel matters. Should any decision be made during an executive session, the Board must reconvene in public session for official action. The Board shall ensure that Arkansas residents have reasonable access to attend a public meeting, including through remote means, if such remote means are utilized by the governing body. The public must be able to verify that the attendee is in fact a Board member, therefore, if attending via video broadcast or video conference, the Board member must turn their camera on to verify their identity. Cameras must also be on for Board members that are speaking or voting. If attending via telephone, the Board member must state their name each time the member speaks or votes.

Polling, which is the practice of a non-member querying the members to determine the likely outcome of any future board action or whether the member of the governing body supports or opposes a certain proposed action by the governing body, is prohibited.

Article VI

Amendment of By-Laws

Section 1. Amendment. These By-Laws may be amended upon thirty (30) days prior written notice at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Coordinating Board by a majority vote of the Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER

ArkACRAO – Registrar's Summer Meeting

The ADHE Data Team presented recently at the Arkansas Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers regular summer meeting. Presentation topics included an update on Arkansas Launch, Credential Engine initiatives, and AHEIS reporting updates.

Lyon College Groundbreaking

ADHE staff attended the Lyon College School of Veterinary Medicine groundbreaking on June 12. Staff joined state and local leaders, college officials, and community members as they celebrated the beginning of construction on what will become a hub for innovation, education, and compassionate animal care. The Cabot campus will train and graduate veterinarians ready and able to serve the veterinary healthcare needs of Arkansas into the future, advance public health for Arkansans, create more small businesses, and contribute to community and state economy.



Eastern Arkansas Business and Industry Regional Summit

On June 17, Commissioner Warden presented at the Eastern Arkansas Business and Industry Regional Summit on the ACCESS Act and higher education return on investment (ROI). The Summit was held at UAEACC in partnership with UA Phillips and the Arkansas Delta Training and Education Consortium.





SHEEO Annual Meeting

The SHEEO Annual Meeting will be held at the Park Hyatt in Washington, D.C., July 14-17, 2025. Commissioner Warden will join CEOs of state higher education boards and commissions and leaders of national and regional organizations at the meeting which will emphasize key state and national higher education policy issues and relationship building.

New Chancellor begins at UAPB

On July 1, Anthony Graham, Ph.D., began as chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB). Dr. Graham previously served as a tenured professor of education and former provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs at Winston-Salem State University. Graham also served as interim chancellor at Winston-Salem State University from 2023-24.



AHECB POLICY - CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT POLICY

Arkansas law allows for the enrollment of high school students in college-level courses under certain conditions. Concurrent enrollment allows students to obtain credit toward a high school diploma at the same time they earn college credit.

The concurrent enrollment policy was first approved by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) in October 1998 with the latest revision was in July 2024. Proposed new language is in <u>italics and underlined</u>, and deleted language is struck through.

AHECB Resolutions

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the policy amendment on concurrent enrollment effective Fall 2025. The concurrent enrollment policy outlines the guidelines for concurrent program participation; however, Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities are not required to participate in a concurrent enrollment program; and a high school/school district may choose to partner with more than one Arkansas college/university for concurrent courses.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That any Arkansas state-supported college or university that chooses to participate in a concurrent enrollment program with a public school district, private high school, or home-school student shall implement and administer the concurrent program in accordance with the policies of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the rules of the Arkansas State Board of Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to provide a copy of the amended policy to presidents and chancellors, chief academic affairs officers, students affairs officers, and institutional research officers at Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities.

Concurrent Enrollment Policy

1. Introduction

Concurrent enrollment programs in Arkansas allow students to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously. These programs have evolved over time through legislative acts and subsequent policy refinements to provide accessible and quality higher education opportunities to high school students. Collectively, these policies reflect the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board's ongoing commitment to foster college and career readiness by integrating high school and postsecondary education. The intent is to:

Ensure Quality: Maintain rigorous academic standards by requiring concurrent courses to meet the same content and instructional standards as college courses, taught by highly qualified instructors.

<u>Promote Readiness:</u> Equip students with the academic skills necessary for success in postsecondary education and future careers, with a long-term goal of reducing college remediation rates and increasing college graduation rates across the state.

Reduce Financial Barriers: Mitigate financial barriers by providing scholarship opportunities and ensuring no student, parent, or guardian will be held accountable for the costs of tuition, fees, or materials associated with concurrent credit course participation.

Increase Access: Provide eligible high school students with opportunities to earn college credit, thereby accelerating their academic progress and potentially reducing the financial burden.

2. Arkansas Code and Concurrent Credit

Arkansas Code §6-18-223 allows public high school students in Arkansas who have successfully completed the eighth grade to enroll in publicly supported community colleges or four-year universities. If they successfully complete these college courses, they are entitled to receive academic credit in both the institution of higher education and their public high school.

Arkansas Code §6-60-202 declares it state policy that qualified public or private high school students should be accepted for part-time enrollment in public institutions of higher education upon request.

Arkansas Code §6-16-1202, §6-16-1203, and §6-16-1204 detail implementation requirements and qualifications and training required for teachers of Accelerated Learning opportunities. For concurrent enrollment courses, the law specifies that

courses must be college-level, approved by the higher education institution, meet the same standards as post-secondary courses, and be taught by qualified instructors. The higher education institution is responsible for instructor support, student academic guidance, and access to resources.

3. Definitions

Accelerated Learning means an organized method of learning that enables students to meet individual academic goals and graduation requirements while pursuing higher levels of skill development, including without limitation the following coursework:

- A College Board pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement course
- An International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme course
- A Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education course
- A concurrent credit course
- A substantively similar course or program approved by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education

<u>Pre-Advanced Placement course is a middle, junior high, or high school course that specifically prepares students for an AP course.</u>

Advanced Placement course is a high school course that prepares a student for a college AP test, incorporating required topics and approved by The College Board

Concurrent Enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in a college course for high school credit and college-level credit. (Arkansas Code §6-18-223) Concurrent enrollment allows students to obtain credit toward a high school diploma at the same time they earn college credit.

Concurrent Credit Course is a college-level course offered by an institution of higher education in Arkansas that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the institution of higher education and a public high school.

Dual Enrollment Course is the enrollment of a high school student in postsecondary education exclusively for college credit. High school students enrolled in a dual enrollment course may petition the district or high school to consider allowing the college-level dual enrollment credit to be considered for high school credit. (Arkansas Code §6-60-202)

4. State Authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program

A college or university must be accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) or be authorized by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to participate in the State Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP).

College/University offering Concurrent Courses on College/University Campus Only

A college/university only offering concurrent courses on the college/university campus (and does not offer or plan to offer concurrent courses on the high school campus) has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation.

The college/university must submit to ADHE a copy of the written, signed MOU agreement between the college/university and high school/school district as verification of the on-campus college/university concurrent enrollment program. The MOU must outline in detail the concurrent enrollment arrangements between the two parties. A copy of the current written, signed MOU agreement must be submitted to ADHE each subsequent year for continued authorization.

Any college/university currently not offering concurrent courses on a high school campus must follow the concurrent program approval process outlined below; and the college/university must have AHECB authorization for its institutional (high school) concurrent enrollment program prior to the offering of concurrent courses on a high school campus.

I. College/University with NACEP Accreditation Authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program

All colleges or universities with NACEP accreditation must provide written documentation to ADHE of <u>the institution's</u> NACEP accreditation status. upon approval of this concurrent policy.

- A. A college or university currently initial accredited by NACEP has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation, and must maintain NACEP accreditation for continued CEP participation; or
- B. A college or university with continued NACEP accreditation must submit written documentation to ADHE of its current accreditation status within 30 days of NACEP notification of reaccreditation to maintain AHECB CEP continued authorization.
- C. A college or university currently accredited by NACEP-has satisfied the requirements for initial authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program participation and may request AHECB authorization to satisfy the requirements for continued CEP participation when current-NACEP accreditation expires or is revoked. The college or university must submit the written notification to ADHE no later than June 1 no later than 30 days prior to expiration, requesting AHECB authorization for continued CEP participation.

II. College/University without NACEP Accreditation Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board Authorization for Concurrent Enrollment Program (and offering Concurrent Courses on High School Campus)

To receive initial authorization through the state review process, developed in cooperation with the colleges and universities, and implemented by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE); a college or university must demonstrate that the college or university concurrent program meets or exceeds all requirements outlined in the AHECB Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP) policy, <u>outlined below</u>.

AHECB approval will be granted to the college or university to offer concurrent credit courses for a period not to exceed <u>up to</u> seven (7) years once the college or university has submitted a CEP proposal that has been reviewed and recommended for approval by a 3-member review team selected from a panel of reviewers agreed upon by the Concurrent Review Committee (CRC) and ADHE.

The initial proposal for offering concurrent credit must specify how the college or university concurrent enrollment program satisfies each component of the CEP policy by providing evidence of the following:

A. Faculty

Each college or university must have a policy for selecting faculty to teach concurrent courses that meets AHECB, <u>institutional</u>, <u>and accreditor</u> <u>guidelines</u>. Each concurrent instructor for general education courses at a minimum must hold a master's degree <u>and</u> have 18 graduate-level hours in the subject to be taught.

Each college or university must have an official transcript on file for each instructor approved for concurrent courses which clearly indicates that the concurrent faculty member <u>meets the requirements specified by the college or university</u> has the required academic credentials.

Each college or university must have a description of the orientation process for new <u>all</u> concurrent faculty and a sample of information that is provided to concurrent faculty during orientation. Each college or university must have a description of the plan to assure concurrent faculty receive appropriate, <u>ongoing</u> professional development.

B. Courses

Each college or university must present a current list of proposed concurrent courses by course name, course number (i.e. ENGL 1013), and the associated Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS) course number (if

applicable) and indicate any pre-requisite courses. <u>All general education</u> course offerings must follow the approval process for additions to the Arkansas Course Transfer System.

C. Syllabi and Course Materials Textbooks

Each college or university must have a policy regarding final approval of concurrent syllabi and <u>course materials</u> textbooks. <u>The course content and instruction must meet the same standards and adopt the same learning outcomes as those developed for a course taught at post-secondary institution of higher education, including the administration of any departmental exams applicable to the course and the use of substantially the same materials and syllabus as is used at the college level.</u>

D. Students

Each college or university must verify that students have met admission criteria for the college or university and that the process conforms to AHECB guidelines.

Each college or university must provide an explanation of how grades are awarded and recorded with the college or university registrar and must provide documentation that the college or university course grading/awarding and course recording standards are followed for concurrent courses.

E. Student Guide for Concurrent Enrollment

Each college or university must have a student guide for concurrent enrollment available to students and parents that outlines the college or university and school district participation requirements and includes information regarding syllabi, academic standing, grading, links to ACTS, academic dishonesty, transcripts, current contact information for the concurrent enrollment liaison at the college or university, drop/withdrawal from class, academic due process guidelines, use of the college or university library, <u>FERPA protections</u>, <u>policy for students with disabilities</u>, <u>sexual</u> harassment policy, and student evaluation of instruction procedures.

F. Faculty Guide for Concurrent Enrollment

Each college or university must have a faculty guide for concurrent enrollment detailing the syllabus requirements, FERPA requirements, academic dishonesty policy, grading system, access to input grades, grade changes, student academic due process, student evaluation of instruction, policy for students with disabilities, sexual harassment policy, contact information for the college or university concurrent liaison, child maltreatment and reporting policy, non-compliance policy, and process of faculty evaluation by the

academic unit head from the college or university.

G. Assessment

By academic discipline, a description of the process for assuring concurrent course content satisfies the requirements of the college or university academic unit. Examples may include common examinations, approval of concurrent tests by the college or university, common grading criteria, etc.

H. Evaluation

Each college or university will analyze its student success, persistence, and retention data to determine to what extent concurrent credit courses are leading to student success.

I. Memorandum of Understanding

The college or university must have on file a current written, signed Memorandum of Understanding with each high school with whom the college or university offers or desires to offer concurrent enrollment.

The Memorandum of Understanding must include the following:

- 1. The names and addresses of the college or university and the participating school district/high school
- 2. Academic calendar with which the college or university and the high school must comply
- 3. Guidelines and requirements for approval of instructors
- 4. Guidelines for approval and assessment of courses
- 5. Guidelines and requirements for admission and eligibility of students
- 6. Requirements for syllabi
- 7. Non-compliance statement
- Length of time covered by the MOU and procedures for termination of MOU
- 9. Description of the concurrent course billing process.

All evidence indicating how the college or university plans to offer a concurrent enrollment program must be submitted to ADHE by June 1 for an evaluation by a review team selected from among those designated by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education to serve on the Concurrent Review Committee. The Committee members will be selected by ADHE and will serve for a three-year period.

The CRC evaluation report will be forwarded to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education for consideration of a recommendation for AHECB approval of the institutional concurrent enrollment program.

AHECB Continued Authorization

A college or university with AHECB initial authorization for the Concurrent Enrollment Program can offer courses for concurrent enrollment for a period of up to seven (7) years unless the AHECB requires a follow-up review within the 7-year timeframe and/or the NACEP accreditation has expired.

The college or university must submit a CEP Continued Authorization Proposal that will be reviewed for approval by a 3-member review team selected by the Concurrent Review Committee (CRC) and ADHE. The CEP Continued Authorization Proposal will serve as the institution's request for AHECB Reauthorization.

The request for AHECB CEP reauthorization must include documentation of the following:

- A current Memorandum of Understanding with each high school with whom the college/university desires to offer concurrent enrollment.
- 2. A current list of concurrent courses offered by course name, number (i.e. ENGL 1013), the ACTS course number, and any pre-requisites courses.
- By academic discipline, a description of the process for assuring that concurrent course content satisfies the requirements of the college/university academic unit.
- 4. A current list of concurrent instructors offering courses for concurrent credit including a statement that each instructor meets the minimum requirements for instruction as required by AHECB and the academic department offering the concurrent credit.
- 5. An explanation of how grades are awarded and recorded with the college/university Registrar.
- 6. An analysis of student success, persistence, and retention data to determine to what extent concurrent credit courses are leading to student success for the three years prior to the reauthorization request year.

The information for continued authorization must be submitted to ADHE by June 1 before the expiration date of AHECB CEP initial authorization; and reviewed by a 3-member team selected by ADHE from among those designated to serve on the Concurrent Review Committee. Based on the CRC review, ADHE will make a recommendation to AHECB for continued authorization or a recommendation for discontinuation of the institutional concurrent enrollment program.

5. Criteria for Conflict Resolution from AHECB Policy: Off-Campus Instruction Policy-Criteria for Conflict Resolution

Institutions that seek to offer concurrent courses at the same high school and cannot reach agreement between each other, either informally or with a written Memorandum of Understanding, will appeal to the ADHE Commissioner. After

receiving a written request from each affected institution that includes pertinent information and data, the ADHE Commissioner will mediate the conflict. If the affected institutions reject the decision of the ADHE Commissioner, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board will hear evidence, consider staff recommendations, and make a final determination.

In order to determine the merits of presented arguments, the ADHE Commissioner and Board members will require in writing from each institution the following information:

- Mission of institution
- Willingness of institution to offer the course at the off-campus/high school location
- Capability of institution
- Type of courses/programs proposed
- Cost to students
- Desire of the community or local school district
- History of off-campus offerings in the geographical area or at the high school
- Evidence that this course offering will not result in unnecessary duplication of courses/programs
- Evidence that the course offerings will not result in overextension of state's resources
- Other relevant information as determined by the institutions, ADHE Commissioner, and/or AHECB members

Although the "30-Mile Rule" is not a criterion used to resolve institutional conflicts regarding off-campus or concurrent offerings, the AHECB does not look favorably on an institution that encroaches on the service area of a second institution.

6. College and University Concurrent Course Ownership

Any The course offered for concurrent credit must meet the same standards as college courses taught on <u>offered by</u> the college or university campus. Students can earn college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each general education concurrent course and each blended AP/concurrent course that is a minimum of 3 semester credit hours. Students can earn college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each CTE course that is a minimum of 3 semester credit hours.

Note: It is understood that one High schools may have concurrent agreements with more than one college or university; however, there should not be unnecessary duplication of eollege concurrent course offerings.

If there is not agreement among multiple institutions offering college courses at one high school/school district, the college/university seeking clarification on the

implementation of the concurrent enrollment policy must contact the ADHE Commissioner in writing and follow AHECB Policy: Off-Campus Instruction Policy-Criteria for Conflict Resolution.

Institutions of higher education must demonstrate "ownership" of any course offered for concurrent credit for which students are reported. Ownership means the administration must exercise direct oversight of all aspects of the concurrent course, including participation in the faculty selection, orientation, professional development, and evaluation processes. Ownership of courses means that the college or university will:

- Provide the instructors with appropriate training and orientation in course curriculum, assessment criteria, course philosophy, and administrative requirements after approval of the instructors to teach the college or university courses.
- Ensure that instructors receive continuing collegial interaction with college faculty through professional development, required seminars, and site visits. These interactions will address topics such as course content, course delivery, student learning assessment, in-class evaluation, and professional development in the field of study.
- Ensure that students have the opportunity to utilize institutional resources including the college or university library and academic advising on the college or university campus.

The instructor teaching the college course for concurrent credit must:

- Use the approved college or university course syllabus,
- Use the same textbook or a textbook with aligned content and course learning outcomes as approved by the college or university,
- Adopt the same learning outcomes and assignments as those developed for the course offered on the college or university campus with limited exceptions approved by the college or university, and
- Use the same course grading/awarding standards as those on the college or university campus. If departmental exams are used in college or university campus courses, then those course exams must be used at the high school site.

Simply awarding college credit to students who are enrolled in concurrent courses offered by a sponsoring college or university does not meet the principle of "course ownership" as described above.

7. General Education Courses

Concurrent credit courses should be freshman-level and/or sophomore-level

college/university courses, or in select cases upper-level courses, approved through the established process of an institution and included in the institutional catalog. General education courses offered for concurrent credit should be listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS). Students taking general education courses that are not part of the Arkansas Course Transfer System must be informed by the institution and high school that the course may not transfer to another college or university. A list of the career and technical education (CTE) courses offered for concurrent credit must be attached to the signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the high school/school district and the college/university.

8. Concurrent Course Enrollment - Career and Technical Education Courses

Students enrolled in Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses that are included in the MOU agreement between the school district and college or university can be awarded college credit and/or up to one unit of high school credit for successful completion of each CTE course that is a minimum or 3 semester credit hours, as delineated in the MOU agreement.

9. Concurrent Course Enrollment – <u>Co-Requisite</u> Remedial/Developmental Education Courses (College or University Participation Optional)

High school students may only enroll in remedial/developmental education in English, reading, and/or mathematics for concurrent credit if they are simultaneously enrolled in the corresponding college-level course in the same subject area. These types of courses, also known as co-requisite remediation, can allow students to access college-level material while receiving necessary support.

Nothing in this concurrent policy, shall require a college or university or school district to offer remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading, and mathematics for concurrent credit.

A high school student enrolled in college or university <u>co-requisite</u> remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading, and/or mathematics for concurrent credit must be notified verbally and in writing by the high school principal or designee <u>that while remedial/developmental courses may be used as co-requisites they do not earn college credit and do not count towards graduation requirements.</u> successful completion of remedial/ developmental education courses at one college or university does not guarantee college-level course placement at another Arkansas college or university, unless there is a written/signed college course placement agreement with the other Arkansas college or university.

A college or university remedial/developmental education course cannot be used to meet the college or university core subject area/unit requirements in English and mathematics.

A list of the colleges/universities with a signed college course placement agreement must be:

- A. Attached to the signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the school district and college or university
- B. Included in the Concurrent Enrollment Student Guide/Information Sheet
- C. Posted on the college or university website

10. AP/Concurrent or IB/Concurrent Blended Courses

(College or University Participation Optional)

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are high school courses in which students are required to take the AP Exam and make the requisite score in order to receive college credit from an Arkansas institution of higher education.

The merging of AP or IB courses and general education college courses is allowed under certain circumstances, and these merged courses will be referenced as blended AP/concurrent or IB/concurrent courses.

- Colleges and universities that offer blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/ concurrent courses must ensure that these blended courses meet all the requirements of concurrent courses as set forth in this concurrent enrollment policy.
- The AP course guidelines specified by the College Board in its published course description must be incorporated into the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus, and the core IB program requirements must be incorporated into the blended IB/concurrent course syllabus.
- The blended AP/concurrent course syllabus must be submitted by the high school teacher for approval by the College Board AP Course Audit; and the school district must have on file the written documentation of the College Board approval of the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus. A copy of the blended AP/concurrent course syllabus currently approved by the College Board must be submitted for college or university approval during the concurrent instructor/course approval process. A copy of the blended IB/concurrent course syllabus also must be on file at the school district.
- All students enrolled in blended AP/concurrent courses are required to take the AP exam; and the high school must have written documentation on file of the students who took the AP exam with this AP exam data provided to the college or university upon request.
- There also must be written documentation on file of the students who took the IB assessment with the assessment data provided to the college or university upon request.

- Students can earn at least three semester credit hours of college credit and one unit of high school credit for successful completion of one blended AP/ concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course only if the student registers for concurrent course credit at the beginning of the term. (A minimum score on the AP exam or IB assessment is not required for the student to earn college credit for the blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course.) All other students enrolled in the blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent course can earn only one unit of high school credit for the course.
- Students enrolled in these blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses must meet all college or university requirements included in this concurrent enrollment policy.
- Any high school that cannot furnish data on blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent test takers (during an ADE/ADHE concurrent enrollment program audit) will not be approved for the continued offering of blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses.

11. Instructor/Faculty Qualifications and Credentials

Faculty <u>An instructor</u> teaching general education concurrent courses must meet the requirements of the institution of higher education that is offering the course, and the requirements of the accrediting <u>organizations</u>, and the Arkansas Higher Education <u>Coordinating Board. Institutions authorized to offer concurrent enrollment in Arkansas should work closely with accreditors and consider the 2023 Higher <u>Learning Commission "Institutional Policies and Procedures for Determining Faculty Qualifications Guidelines" or other relevant accreditor standards to assure requirements for reasonable policies and procedures are met.</u></u>

An instructor's credentials shall be approved by the academic unit or chief academic officer of the institution of higher education offering the concurrent credit course, per §6-16-1203. Any instructor approved by an institution of higher education must possess relevant credentials, experience, and qualifications necessary to teach from the syllabus approved by the institution granting the course credit. have a master's degree that includes a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject area being taught.

The teacher of the blended AP/concurrent course(s) must have completed the <u>College Board</u> AP training in the subject area(s), must have a master's degree with a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject area being taught, and must be approved to teach the concurrent course(s) by the college or university, and must provide the college or university with documentation of successful completion of AP training.

The instructor of record must be the individual that teaches the concurrent course(s);

and for general education concurrent courses and blended AP/concurrent or blended IB/concurrent courses these individuals must have a master's degree that includes a minimum of 18 graduate college credit hours in the subject areas being taught. For the purpose of teaching a concurrent course under this policy, an individual under contract with the school district as a teacher will not be considered an adjunct faculty member of the college or university; although, they must be reported as an academic rank of adjunct faculty to AHEIS.

12. Instructor/Faculty Background Checks & Child Maltreatment

College or university faculty who travel to the high school or secondary center to teach concurrent courses, <u>regardless of modality</u> (and/or faculty and staff that have direct, official contact with the high school student), must have a criminal background check <u>every five (5) years</u> and complete the child maltreatment training course as required of public-school teachers. <u>Background checks and child maltreatment course completion records must be kept on file at the college or university. It is the responsibility of the institution of higher education to adopt reasonable policies and procedures to comply with this requirement.</u>

13. Concurrent Course Enrollment

Concurrent College Admission

High school students enrolled in general education concurrent courses will be those who have successfully completed the eighth grade and are admitted to the college or university as non-award seeking students per §6-16-1204 (although a major can be reported for the concurrent students to AHEIS to assist with tracking of students completing college certificates/degrees before high school graduation). Each college or university must specify the concurrent admission requirements for high school students.

Concurrent Course Registration

All high school students enrolled in the concurrent course must meet the same requirements for completion of the course whether or not the student is registered for college credit <u>or not</u>. The concurrent course withdrawal process and procedures must be implemented in accordance with established college or university guidelines.

Concurrent/Dual Course Placement

To ensure successful placement in concurrent English, math, and reading intensive courses, institutions are encouraged to consider a variety of factors beyond a single standardized test score. Procedures and standards for placement are outlined in the Higher Education Coordinating Board Student Placement Policy.

 A college or university may allow simultaneous enrollment in college-level credit and developmental courses.

- The board and administration of any campus may elect to set minimum scores for enrollment in college-level mathematics and English composition courses based on established and documented criteria, which demonstrate the students' ability to succeed.
- All concurrent students shall be assessed for placement into credit-bearing courses by at least one of the following methods:
 - An objective examination
 - Previous coursework and/or career training
 - Measures supported by sufficient analysis of predicted student success

The placement assessment should reflect a better than 75 percent likelihood of the student's ability to earn a "C" or better grade in the course in which the student is placed. A student's reading level should be strong enough for them to earn a "C" or better in courses that require substantial reading such as courses in the sciences, humanities, and social sciences. Ideally, students should possess a readiness for credit-bearing courses and the institution admitting them should develop and refine a system to determine this.

Concurrent Course Enrollment - Data Reporting (via Student Information System)

All institutions are required to collect and report placement exam/assessment scores for the purpose of AHEIS reporting although a minimum score is not required.

Concurrent Course Enrollment - Payment of Tuition and Fees

The college or university will establish tuition and fee rates for concurrent students.

The high school student or the student's parent or guardian shall <u>not</u> be responsible for <u>tuition</u>, <u>fees</u>, <u>or materials for participation in a concurrent credit course</u>. all costs of college or university courses taken for concurrent credit, unless the costs for these courses are paid by the public school district, a college or university scholarship, a grant, or a private foundation. If the costs for a college or university course(s) are paid by the public school district, a college or university scholarship, a grant, or a private foundation a signed agreement must exist between the public school district, the external entity or foundation, and the Arkansas state-supported college or university.

If the college or university sets tuition and fees at a lower rate than the regular full tuition rate on campus, reduction in tuition shall not be considered an institutional scholarship per §6-16-1204.

The tuition rate for a concurrent credit course offered by a public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in partnership with an institution of higher education shall not exceed the standard tuition rate and fee structure of the

institution of higher education providing the concurrent credit course.

For every one (1) academic credit hour provided by an institution of higher education, the agreed amount:

- Must not be more than two and one-half percent (2.5%) of the per-pupil amount established under §6-20-2305 that is allotted per student each year and.
- <u>Must not be less than one-half percent (0.5%) of the per-pupil amount established under §6-20-2305 that is allotted per student each year.</u>

<u>Institutions may leverage the following sources to satisfy costs associated with tuition, fees, or materials:</u>

- ACCESS to Acceleration Scholarship Program funds, or
- Funding from the school district where a student is enrolled, or
- Other consideration agreed to by the public school district or openenrollment public charter school and institution of higher education, or
- Any other available sources as determined by the Division of Higher Education

An institution of higher education shall not receive funding for concurrent credit courses for tuition at secondary vocational centers under § 6-51-301 et seq. if the institution of higher education is already receiving funding designated for vocational center aid. Pursuant to Arkansas Code §6-53-501, the intent of this concurrent policy is that the college courses described above shall include but not be limited to articulated courses designed for instruction of secondary students qualifying for state aid from the public-school fund. Nothing in this policy shall preclude money flowing to the secondary centers under Arkansas Code §6-51-305.

An institution must be accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP); or effective August 1, 2015, the college or university must have an AHECB-approved Concurrent Enrollment Program to report concurrent courses/students to AHEIS.

(Note: More details on funding for concurrent enrollment may be included in AHECB financial aid policy.

14. Partnership Agreement/Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

A written and signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) must exist to reflect the various expectations, obligations, and responsibilities of all parties.

The MOU must be reviewed annually, and the college or university must provide to the high school a list of all college courses that may be offered for concurrent

credit during the school year. The unit of high school credit that will be awarded for each college course must be noted for each concurrent course along with the high school course replacement/substitution. The high school/school district or the college or university can modify or terminate the written, signed concurrent agreement during the annual review period.

High school students who desire to enroll in a college or university must first be recommended by their high school principal or designee.

High school students enrolled in college courses for concurrent credit purposes must be 1) informed that the student is responsible for all costs associated with enrollment in the concurrent course, unless the courses are paid by another approved public or private entity; and 2) advised about the potential limitations concerning the transfer of college course credit.

If remedial/developmental education courses in English, reading or mathematics are offered for concurrent credit to high school seniors, a list of the colleges/universities with a signed college course placement agreement must be attached to the MOU, published in the student guide/information sheet, and posted on the college or university website.

The college or university must provide the school district with a student guide or information sheet for concurrent enrollment that the high school must distribute to students and parents that outlines the college or university and school district requirements for student participation. The high school will assure that the student and parent acknowledge that the student will participate in the concurrent program in accordance with the stated college or university and school district participation requirements.

Concurrent program requirements and guidelines required for course instruction must be provided by the college or university to the school district and concurrent instructors.

RULES GOVERNING THE UNIFORM COURSE CREDIT FOR INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In compliance with the Arkansas ACCESS Act of 2025 (Act 341 Section 5) and The LEARNS Act of 2023 (Act 413 Section 54), the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Rules Governing Uniform Course Credit for Institutions of Higher Education are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Uniform Course Credit for Institutions of Higher Education to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Uniform Course Credit for Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Uniform Course Credit for Institutions of Higher Education rules be approved for public comment release.

Subchapter A. Generally

Part 374 Rules Governing Uniform Course Credit at Institutions of Higher

Education

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 374.101. Purpose.

(a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's Rules Governing Uniform Course Credit at Institutions of Higher Education.

(b) The purpose of this part is to establish uniform course credit awarded upon achieving the required score on approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses toward completing a post-secondary degree or certificate program.

6 CAR § 374.102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) "Accelerated learning" means an organized method of learning that enables a student to meet individual academic goals and graduation requirements while pursuing higher levels of skill development, including without limitation the following coursework:

(A) A College Board pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement

course;

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- (B) An International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme course:
- (C) A Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education course;
- (D) A concurrent credit course; and
- (E) A substantively similar course or program approved by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education;
- (2) "Alignment" means equivalent expectations, for which a student seeks to receive college credit;
- (3) "Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education course" means a program offered through a University of Cambridge approved school and administered by the International Education division of the Cambridge University Press and Assessment department of the University of Cambridge that:
- (A) Consists of Cambridge International AS and A Level courses and standardized examinations;
- (B) Is designed to prepare high school students for college or university study and employment;
- (C) Allows students to receive high school credit as well as qualify for college or university level credit; and
- (D) Can lead to an Advanced International Certificate of Education

 <u>Diploma</u>;
- (4) "CLEP examination" means an examination administered through the College-Level Examination Program for which a student seeks to receive college credit;
- (5) "College Board pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement course" means a non-for-profit organization that develops and administers standardized tests and curricula used by the elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education institutions:
 - (A) To promote college readiness; and
 - (B) As part of the college admissions process;
- (6) "Concurrent credit course" means a college-level course offered by an institution of higher education in this state that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the institution of higher education and a public high school:

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- (7) "International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme" means the curriculum and examinations leading to an International Baccalaureate Diploma awarded by the International Baccalaureate;
 - (8) "Institution of higher education" means a:
 - (A) State-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
- (B) Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds;
- (9) "Learning outcomes" mean measurable skills, abilities, knowledge, or values that students should be able to demonstrate as a result of successful course completion, for which a student seeks to receive college credit; and
- (10) "Rigor" means an appropriate level of sophistication, difficulty, and challenge for which a student seeks to receive college credit.

6 CAR § 374.103. Faculty Committee Duties & Responsibilities.

- (a) To determine whether a student has met the minimum criteria for award of course credit, the Division of Higher Education, in consultation with faculty committees, will determine post-secondary credit to ensure proper alignment and application of uniform credit awards across all institutions of higher education.
- (b) Post-secondary credit will be awarded upon achieving the required score on approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses.
- (c) As determined by the division, post-secondary credit will also be awarded upon successful completion of, but not limited to:
 - (1) An accelerated learning course; or
 - (2) Industry based credentials.
- (d) The number of faculty committees will be determined by the division, based on the disciplines being considered for uniform credit, and comprised of no less than seven (7) faculty from two-year and four-year institutions, system and non-system institutions, and representative of different state regions, each appointed by the Commissioner of Higher Education.

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(e) Faculty committees shall be responsible for:

(1) The alignment of subject or discipline specific examinations with general education core courses from the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS); and

(2) Ensuring appropriate rigor for credit awards by determining performance expectations based on assessment scores.

(f) Faculty committees may issue recommendations to align subject or discipline specific examinations for courses outside of the general education core courses and the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS).

6 CAR § 374.104. Award of Uniform Credit.

(a) For students to receive an award of course credit, upon receiving the required assessment score on the approved accelerated learning assessments, exams, or courses, the knowledge and skills assessed must align with the ACTS student learning outcomes.

(b) In determining whether there is proper alignment, faculty committees will consider, without limitation, the following:

(1) Learning outcomes; and

(2) Rigor.

(c)(1) All institutions will have an opportunity to comment on the equivalency prior to the division adding the course equivalency to the Articulation Tables.

(2) It is presumed that all courses are aligned unless the committee determines otherwise.

(d) If the committee determines there are zero alignment issues found, then uniform credit for the course will be awarded.

(e)(1) Institutions may choose to award additional credit for those students who score higher than the minimum credit awards identified by the faculty committees.

(2) Institutions receiving transfer credit given from another institution beyond the minimum requirement are encouraged to honor additional credit given by the sending institution.

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(f) All accelerated learning or CLEP examination to course equivalencies will be publicly available online in the Division of Higher Education Credit for Prior Learning Articulation Tables annually.

SCHOLARSHIP STACKING POLICY CHANGE

In compliance with Act 340 of 2025, changes to the Scholarship Stacking Policy will be presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for approval. Proposed new language is in <u>italics and underlined</u>, and deleted language is struck through.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board Reviews the changes presented in this agenda item for the Scholarship Stacking Policy.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Stacking Policy changes be approved.

SCHOLARSHIP STACKING POLICY

Pursuant to Arkansas Code § 6-80-105, Aa post-secondary institution shall not award state aid in a student aid package in excess of the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. State aid is defined to include scholarships and grants awarded to a student from public funds, including without limitation the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under § 6-85-201 et seq., Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) scholarships and grant programs, state general revenues, tuition, and local tax revenue. All post-secondary institutions shall report to ADHE the total amount of financial aid from all sources for any student who receives an award from an ADHE program. When a student receives a student aid package that includes state aid and the student aid package exceeds the cost of attendance, the postsecondary institution shall reduce state aid starting with the institutional aid.

For purposes of this policy, the student aid package includes federal aid, state aid and other aid a student receives for postsecondary education expenses. The definitions for federal aid, state aid and other aid are below.

Federal aid - scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, excluding the Pell grant.

Other aid – a scholarship, grant, waiver, or reimbursement for tuition, fees, books, or other cost of attendance, other than federal aid or state aid, provided to a student from a postsecondary institution or a private source.

State aid - scholarships and grants awarded to a student from public funds, including without limitation the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under § 6-85-201 et seq., Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) scholarshipsand grants, programs, state general revenues, tuition, and local tax revenue.

The Federal Cost of Attendance (COA) method shall be used for all students receiving state aid, regardless of whether the student is receiving federal financial aid. Costs that would not be included in Federal COA may not be included in the package of any student who receives state aid. Exceptions to the normal COA allowances as set forth in federal regulations may be included in COA calculations. Institutional work study is not included in COA unless it is need based. This policy shall apply to students entering college in the 2025-2026 academic and subsequent years.

An institution of higher education shall award aid in the following order:

- (A) The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship;
- (B) Any other state scholarship program, excluding the Arkansas Future Grant Program, Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program, and Arkansas National Guard Tuition Waiver Program;

(C) The Arkansas Future Grant Program, Arkansas Teacher 4 Academy Scholarship Program, or Arkansas National Guard Tuition Waiver Program; and (D) Institutional aid.

A postsecondary institution shall report to the division, no later than September 30 of each year, the total amount of federal aid, state aid, and other aid a student receives if the student receives an award from a division scholarship or grant program, including the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under § 6-85-201 et seq.

When a student receives a student aid package that includes state aid and the student aid package exceeds the cost of attendance, the post-secondary institution shall repay state aid in the amount exceeding the cost of attendance, utilizing the stacking order under subdivision (b)(6) of this section

Part 403. Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program

Subpart 1. Generally

— This part is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.

6 CAR § 403-103. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1)(A) "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be

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accomplished by the recipient by a student through the fall, spring, and summer semesters, or the equivalent of the fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.

- (B) The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order;
- (2) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program—and that is a:
- (A) State-supported two-year or four-year-college or university institution of higher education; or
- (B) Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university institution of higher education with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; and or
 - (C) A public or private vocational-technical school that is:

(i) Included on the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act eligible training provider list;

(ii) Qualified to receive approval for veterans' education benefits from the United States Department of Veteran Affairs; or

(iii) Included on the division's Private Career Education list;

(3)(A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment attainment of a certification, or course completion including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

(B) Certificate programs include without limitation:

(i) Advanced manufacturing:

(ii) Health care:

(iii) Information technology;

(iv) Construction trades; or

(v) Logistics and distribution.

(B)(C) The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or

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a baccalaureate degree.

- (a) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under this part:
- (1) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Arkansas Code \S 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and
- (2) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery-
- (A) Transfers transfers the funds requested by the Division of Higher Education under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801(c)(2); and
- (B) Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Arkansas Code § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).
 - (b)(1) A scholarship under this part shall not be awarded for an academic year if:
- (A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (a) of this section; or
- (B) The division received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Arkansas Code § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program, Arkansas Code § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.
- (2) Any funds under subsection (a) of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under this part shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under this part.

Subpart 2. Procedures



- (3) The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
- (4) The Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic verification rosters to the financial aid administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
- (5) The electronic verification rosters shall be returned to the division by November 1 for the fall termsemester, and by March 15 for the spring termsemester, and at the date specified by the division for the summer semester.

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- (6) The division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the financial aid administrator before the end of the fall, and spring, and summer termsemesters.
- (7) The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division no later than January 15 based on the fall semester, and June 1 based on the spring semester, and at the date specified by the division for summer semesters to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(d) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

- (1) The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
- (2) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the division.
- (3) For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(e) Due diligence.

- (1) The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.
- (2) In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.
- (3) The division shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.
- (f) **Agreements between institutions.** An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under this part to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

(e) Approved institutions of higher education shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any scholarship recipient or former scholarship recipient.



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nertiage, and rourism who is a commissioned law enforcement officer of emergency

(8) "Teacher" means any person employed by an Arkansas public school for
the purpose of giving instructions and whose employment requires state certification;
and
(b)(1) In order to be eligible for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents

Chapter IV. Division of Higher Education, Department of Education Subchapter B. Scholarships and Grants

Part 391. Rules Governing Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 391-101. Policy statement.

- (a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's "Rules Governing the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program".
- (b) This part addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

6 CAR § 391-102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

- (1) "Academic year" means <u>a measure of the academic work to be</u>

 <u>accomplished by a student through the fall, spring, first-and second summer semesters, or the equivalent of fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order, or as defined by the Division of Higher Education;</u>
 - (2) "ACT" means the ACT administered by ACT, Inc.;

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(3) "ACT equivalent" means the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), COMPASS, ACCUPLACER, Asset, or other nationally normed test that is correlated with the ACT and approved by the Division of Higher Education for use by institutions of higher education to assess a person's college readiness;

(4)(A) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and that is:

(A)(i) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university institution of higher education;

(B)(ii) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; of

(C)(iii) An approved school of nursing, subject to the provisions of Arkansas Code § 6-85-213(c);

(iv)(a) A public or private vocational-technical school.

(b) A public or private vocational-technical shall be bonded and

insured; or

(v)(a) A public or private technical institute.

(b) A public or private technical institute shall be bonded and

insured.

(B) An approved institution of higher education that is a private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university shall be eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds;

- (5) "Approved school of nursing" means a school of nursing with its primary headquarter located in Arkansas that:
 - (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
 - (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
- (C) Is eligible to participate in the Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IV federal student aid programs;
 - (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;

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- (E) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program; and
 - (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- (6) "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Division of Higher Education that:
- (A) For the twelve-month period required under basic eligibility requirements the person:
- (i) Maintained a permanent home in Arkansas where the person resides for an average of no less than four (4) days and nights per calendar week; and (ii) Either:
 - (a) Is an Arkansas registered voter;
 - (b) Holds a valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;
 - (c) Receives benefits under an Arkansas public assistance

program;

(d) Uses an Arkansas residence address for federal or state tax

purposes; or

judicial actions; or

- (e) Claims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for
- (B) Before the deadline for filing a scholarship application under this part the applicant:
 - (i) Is on active military status;
 - (ii) Qualifies for in-state tuition and fees if the student is a:
- (a) Veteran who was honorably discharged or released from a period of not less than ninety (90) days of active duty in the military, naval, or air service within three (3) years before the date of enrollment in a program of study;
 - (b) Dependent of a veteran under subdivision (6)(B)(ii)(a) of this

section;

- (c) Member of the armed forces; or
- (d) Spouse of a member of the armed forces; and
- (iii) Meets one (1) of the conditions under subdivision (6)(A)(ii) of this

section;

- (7) "Continuously enrolled" means:
- (A) For a traditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education twenty-seven (27) semester hours in the first academic year as a recipient and, except while the recipient is enrolled as a part-time student if the recipient is enrolled in the number of credit hours necessary to complete the recipient's degree program, successfully completes thirty (30) semester hours each academic year thereafter;
- (B) For a full-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least fifteen (15) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters:
- (C) For a part-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least six (6) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters; and
- (D) For a student who is enrolled in a degree plan that has a maximum number of semester hours in a semester that is less than the requirements of subdivisions (7)(A) (C) of this section, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education the maximum number of hours required by the degree plan for the semester;
- (8) "Cost of attendance" means the recognized cost of attendance of an institution of higher education calculated under rules established by the Division of Higher Education;

(9)(A) "Diploma of Merit" means a diploma that requires a student to complete a Career Ready Pathway as outlined in the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education Rules Governing Career-Ready Pathways to Diploma, 6 CAR pt 106.

(B) Students shall demonstrate readiness by earning at least one of the following:

(i) An industry-recognized credential;

(ii) Twelve (12) hours of postsecondary education credit;

(iii) The Seal of Biliteracy;

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(iv) An AP Scholar or Scholar with Honor designation; or (v) A score of thirty-one (31) or higher on the ASVAB;

(9)(10) "Full-time student" means a student enrolled in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Division of Higher Education;

(10)(11) "Enrolled" means that the approved institution of higher education where the student is attending class counts the student as enrolled for the hours claimed on the last day to add or drop a class at the approved institution of higher education:

(11)(12) "High school grade point average" means the numbered grade average on a student's high school transcript calculated:

- (A) For a traditional student, using the first seven (7) of the last eight (8) semesters the student completed prior to graduating high school; or
- (B) For a nontraditional student, using the last eight (8) semesters the student completed before graduating high school;
- (12)(13)(A) "Incarcerated" means a person who has been convicted of a crime and is imprisoned for that crime or is being held in custody for trial or sentencing.
- (B) Incarceration will result in applicant or recipient being ineligible for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship;
- (13)(14) "Lawful permanent resident" means a non-United States citizen who resides in the United States under a legally recognized and lawfully recorded permanent residence and who may receive state public benefits under 8 U.S.C. § 1622;

(14)(15) "Qualified certificate program" means a program:

- (A) That is offered by an approved institution of higher education:
- (B) For which credit hours are awarded that are creditable toward an associate degree or baccalaureate degree; and
- (C) Recognized by the United States Department of Education for financial aid purposes;

(15)(16) "Recipient" means an applicant awarded a scholarship funded

through the program;

- (17)(16) "Semester" means one-half (1/2) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the Division of Higher Education, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
- (A) Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or
 - (B) Six (6) credit hours as a part-time student;
- (17)(18) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery awarded by:
 - (A) The Division of Higher Education; or
- (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an institution of higher education in this state in whole or in part by state funds, including without limitation:
- (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
 - (ii) Tuition waivers based on:
 - (a) Age;
 - (b) Military service;
 - (c) Occupation; or
 - (d) Other factors;
- (iii) Out-of-state tuition waivers for undergraduate students from contiguous states in close proximity to a college or university;
 - (iv) Scholarships for transfers from two-year institutions;
- (v) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
- (vi) Any other publicly-funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the institution of higher education for:

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(a) Tuition;

- (b) Fees;
- (c) Books; or
- (d) Other costs of attendance;

(18)(19) "Superscore" means the final composite score that is calculated according to a combination of the highest individual section scores across all of the ACT tests taken by an individual;

(19)(20)(A) "Traditional student" means a student who:

- (i) Will enter postsecondary education as a full-time first-time freshman on or before the fall semester of the academic year that begins immediately following:
 - (a) The student's graduation from high school; or
 - (b) The last day of the school year:
 - (1) That would have been the student's junior or senior year

of high school; and

- (2) In which the student completes the requirements for high school graduation and obtains a General Educational Development certificate instead of receiving a diploma; and
 - (ii) Remains continuously enrolled as a full-time student;
- (B) "Traditional student" includes a student who otherwise meets this definition but delays entering postsecondary education under a scholarship hold approved by the Division of Higher Education.

Subpart 2. Procedures

6 CAR § 391-201. Basic eligibility requirements.

The basic requirements for an applicant to be eligible for an award from the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program are:

(1)(A) The applicant has been an Arkansas resident for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.

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- (B) If the applicant is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the applicant or a parent or guardian of the applicant shall have maintained Arkansas residency for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
- (C)(i) To be considered an Arkansas resident, an applicant shall demonstrate residency by evidence deemed sufficient to the Division of Higher Education.
- (ii) Evidence of residency may include without limitation information provided by the applicant on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.
- (D) During the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date an applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education if the person for whom the twelve-month period is calculated under subdivision (1)(A) or (1)(B) of this section is deployed outside of Arkansas under military orders, the Division of Higher Education shall calculate the twelve (12) months by:
- (i) Excluding months of military deployment outside of Arkansas that are within the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education; and
- (ii) Including months the person maintained Arkansas residency immediately preceding the military deployment outside of Arkansas;
- (2) The applicant is a citizen of the United States or is a lawful permanent resident;
- (3)(A) The applicant is accepted for admission as a full-time student or parttime student at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to or is creditable toward:
 - (i) A baccalaureate degree;
 - (ii) An associate degree;
 - (iii) A certificate from a qualified certificate program;

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(iv) A graduate-level or professional degree; or

- (v) An approved school of nursing in a program of study that leads to a nursing diploma under Arkansas Code § 6-85-213.
- (B) A full-time student shall enroll in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this part, or the equivalent as defined by the Division of Higher Education.
- (C) A part-time student shall complete at least six (6) semester hours but less than the minimum number of semester hours for a full-time student, as defined by the Division of Higher Education;
- (4) The applicant has not met the maximum continuing education eligibility requirements under Arkansas Code § 6-85-210;
- (5) The applicant does not owe a refund on a federal or state student financial aid grant for higher education;
- (6) The applicant is not in default on a state or federal student financial aid loan for higher education;
- (7) The applicant has not borrowed, as determined by the approved institution of higher education to be attended, in excess of the annual loan limits under the Federal Family Educational Loan Program Systems, William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, Income Contingent Loan Demonstration Program, Stafford Loan Program, Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students Program, or Supplemental Loan for Students Program in the same academic year for which the student has applied for assistance under this part;
- (8) The applicant is not incarcerated at the time of the application for or during the time the applicant receives a scholarship under this part;
- (9) The applicant has complied with United States Selective Service System requirements for registration;
- (10) The applicant has completed and submitted to the United States

 Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid; and

(11) The applicant certifies that he or she is drug-free and pledges in writing on the application form to refrain from the use or abuse of illegal substances in order to become eligible and maintain eligibility for this program.

6 CAR § 391-202. Additional eligibility requirements for traditional students.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a traditional student if the applicant either:

(1)(A) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and has a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or

(B) Upon graduation from high school:

(i) Achieved a minimum grade point average of 3.0 during high

school;

(iii) Completed at least one (1) college readiness assessment; and (iii) Achieved a Diploma of Merit.

(a) Proof of attainment shall be submitted with the student's

scholarship application.

- (2) Has a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., as it existed on July 1, 2009, and graduated from an Arkansas public high school, and either had:meets the requirements defined in subdivision (1) of this section.
 - (A) A minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT; or
 - (B) The equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
- (3) Achieved a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent and A student shall also meet one (1) of the following eligibility requirements:
- (A) <u>GraduatedGraduate</u> from a private high school, an out-of-state high school, or a home school high school; or
 - (B) In the year in which the student would have been a junior or senior in

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high school, completed the requirements for high school graduation and obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services instead of receiving a diploma; or

- (4) Meets one (1) of the following criteria:
- (A) Was enrolled at an institution of higher education in the immediately preceding academic year as a full-time, first-time freshman;
- (B) Did not receive a scholarship under this part as a first-time, full-time freshman;
- (C) Successfully completed with the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D" at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours of courses as a full-time, first-time freshman; and or
- (D) Achieved a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale as a full-time, first–time freshman.

6 CAR § 391-203. Additional eligibility requirements for a nontraditional student.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a nontraditional student if the applicant meets one (1) of the following requirements:

- (1) If the applicant:
 - (A) Has not been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education;
- (B) Has graduated from an Arkansas public high school, a private high school, an out-of-state high school, a home school high school, or obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services; and
- (C) Had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or
- (2) If the applicant has been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has earned a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.

6 CAR § 391-204. Continuing eligibility.

- (a)(1)(A) A recipient who meets continuing eligibility criteria under this part shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year renewable annually until the recipient has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours.
- (B) A recipient may continue to receive a scholarship after he or she has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, if the student is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232.
- (2) A semester in which a student withdraws or fails to complete the number of credit hours for which the student first enrolled is counted toward the maximum number of semesters for which the student may receive a scholarship award under this part.
- (3) The maximums under this subsection apply to any degree program, regardless of whether or not the degree program requires additional semesters.
- (4) A recipient may attend summer terms at the student's own expense to earn credit hours necessary to maintain eligibility for a scholarship under this part.
- (5) For each eligible term, all required hours for continuing eligibility must be taken at one (1) approved institution.
- (b) To maintain eligibility for an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under this part, a recipient shall:
- (1) Continue to meet the relevant eligibility requirements of this part while a recipient of a scholarship under this part;
- (2)(A) Meet the satisfactory academic progress standards required to receive other financial aid at the approved institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled, as determined by the Division of Higher Education in conjunction with the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled.
- (B)(i) A recipient who does not successfully complete any credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this part immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that academic year.

- (ii) The division shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.
- (C) By accepting scholarship funds under this part, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree;
- (3) If enrolling in one (1) or more remedial courses, complete all remedial courses required by the approved institution of higher education by the time the student completes the first thirty (30) semester hours attempted after receiving the scholarship:
- (4) Earn a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale at an approved institution of higher education;
- (5) Enroll in courses that lead toward a baccalaureate degree or graduate-level or professional degree after attempting the lesser of:
 - (A) Five (5) semesters; or
 - (B) The completion of an associate degree program; and
 - (6) Meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the division.
- (c)(1) A traditional student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply as a first-time nontraditional student.
- (2) A recipient under subdivision (c)(1) of this section who loses eligibility for the nontraditional student scholarship is not eligible to apply for a scholarship under any eligibility provision of this part.
- (d) If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under subsection (c) of this section due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family member of the recipient, the division may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

6 CAR § 391-205. Scholarship award amounts.

(a) The General Assembly may use net proceeds from the state lottery to fund the

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scholarships awarded under this part and to supplement the state-supported student financial assistance that the General Assembly determines is necessary to meet the state's objective for broadening and increasing access of Arkansas citizens to higher education.

- (b) Net proceeds from the state lottery used to fund scholarships under this rule shall:
- (1) Be used exclusively for the purposes set out in Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 87, and this part; and
 - (2) Supplement and shall not supplant nonlottery state educational resources.
- (c) The scholarships established under this part are subject to available funding and do not create for any student an entitlement to financial assistance to enable the student's attendance at an approved institution of higher education.
- (d)(1)(A) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount under this part for an academic year for a full-time recipient enrolled in a four-year approved institution of higher education is:
- (i) One Two thousand dollars (\$1,000) (\$2,000) for a recipient who has earned less than twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours;
- (ii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours but less than fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours;
- (iii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours but less than eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours; and
- (iv) (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a recipient who has earned at least eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours but no more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232, then up to the number of credit hours required to complete the baccalaureate program.

(b) A recipient shall receive no more than one (1) year of the scholarship provided under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232.

(c)(1) A recipient who is eligible to receive the scholarship under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section may receive the scholarship while enrolled in a semester as a part-time student.

(2) The scholarship amount for the semester in which a recipient is enrolled as a part-time student under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(c)(1) of this section shallmay be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the recipient is enrolled.

(B)(i) To determine the correct scholarship award amount based on credit hours, a first- time recipient shall submit a current college or university transcript if the first-time recipient has earned any semester credit hours to the Division of Higher Education no later than a date determined by the Division of Higher Education prior to the academic year for which the first-time recipient will receive an initial scholarship award.

(ii) A first-time recipient who does not submit a transcript to the Division of Higher Education on or before the date determined by the Division of Higher Education shall receive the award amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(i) of this section.

(C)(i) An applicant may elect for the earned semester credit hours under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section to be only those semester credit hours earned after graduating from high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services.

(ii) If the applicant makes the election under subdivision (d)(1)(C)(i) of this section, any semester credit hours earned through concurrent credit or any other method before graduating high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services shall not be counted as earned semester credit hours for the purposes of determining a recipient's scholarship award

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amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section.

- (2)(A) The Division of Higher Education shall award an aggregate amount of scholarship awards to nontraditional students of up to fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000).
- (B)(i) The Division of Higher Education shall return to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery the excess funding, if any, for scholarship awards the Division of Higher Education received under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801.
- (ii) The office shall deposit any funds received from the Division of Higher Education under subdivision (d)(2)(B) into the Lottery Scholarship Trust Account established under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801(b).
- (C) Priority for scholarships awarded to nontraditional students is based on:
 - (i) The applicant's level of progress toward completion of:
 - (a) A certificate;
 - (b) An associate degree;
 - (c) A nursing diploma;
 - (d) A baccalaureate degree; or
 - (e) A graduate-level or professional degree; or
 - (ii) Other criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- (3) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award for an academic year for a full-time student enrolled in one (1) of the following institutions of higher education is one thousand dollars (\$1,000) (\$2,000) for the first year and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the second year:
 - (A) A two-year approved institution of higher education;
- (B) A branch campus of a four-year approved institution of higher education; or
 - (C) An approved school of nursing.
- (4) Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount for a part-time student recipient shall be:

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(A) One-half (1/2) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if

the recipient is enrolled in at least six (6) semester hours but less than nine (9) semester hours; or

- (B) Three-quarters (3/4) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least nine (9) semester hours but less than the number of hours required for a full-time student recipient.
- (5) A current recipient who maintains eligibility for the scholarship under this part shall continue to receive the scholarship award amount first awarded to the recipient.
- (6) The Division of Higher Education shall give priority for a scholarship award to a full-time or part-time student:
 - (A) Who meets the eligibility requirements under this part; and
 - (B) Whose parent, by birth or legal adoption:
- (i) Was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the United States Armed Forces or whose official residence is in Arkansas; and
- (ii) Was a member of the United States Armed Forces who was killed while performing military duty:
- (a) In a status identified under 32 U.S.C. \S 101 et seq. or 10 U.S.C. \S 101 et seq. as they existed on January 1, 2011; or
 - (b) In state active duty status.
- (e) Annually by December 15, the Legislative Council shall provide to the General Assembly its recommendations for any changes to the:
 - (1) Award amounts;
 - (2) Number or type of scholarships; and
 - (3) Eligibility requirements.
- (f) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in determining award amounts under this part, the General Assembly will consider whether sufficient funds will be available to pay for scholarship awards through the anticipated completion of the degree or certificate a recipient is seeking.
 - (g) All awards under this section are subject to the prohibition under Arkansas

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Code § 6-80-105 against using public funds in a student financial package in excess of the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student is enrolled.

- (h)(1) If the Division of Higher Education has less than a sufficient amount from net proceeds from the state lottery to provide for the scholarship commitments under this part, the Division of Higher Education shall give priority for continued financial support under this part to a student with continuing eligibility superior to first-time applicants.
- (2) If the funding is insufficient to fully fund the scholarships for students with continuing eligibility created under this part, the Division of Higher Education shall award scholarships based upon the following criteria to students with continuing eligibility as follows:
- (A) First, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study that is:
- (i) In an area of critical workforce need as determined by the Division of Higher Education; or
 - (ii) In a science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field;
- (B) Second, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study other than those listed in subdivision (h)(2)(A) of this section; and
- (C) Last, in the event funding is insufficient to fully fund students under subdivision (h)(2)(A) or (h)(2)(B) of this section, to students who have the highest postsecondary grade point average.
- (3)(A) If after funding all students with continuing eligibility under this section funding is insufficient to fund all qualified first-time applicants, the Division of Higher Education shall award scholarships to first-time applicants in order of priority based upon the applicants' ACT superscore or ACT equivalent superscore.
- (B) If after prioritizing first-time applicants based upon the applicants' ACT or ACT equivalent scores funding is insufficient to fund all applicants with like ACT or

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ACT equivalent scores, the Division of Higher Education shall determine who receives an award by random drawing.

6 CAR § 391-206. Payments of scholarships.

- (a)(1) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarships to the approved institution of the student's choice.
- (2) The division shall send funds to the institution via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.
- (3) After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.
- (4) The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institution.
- (5) In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of such student in advance.
- (b) Transfer of scholarships to another approved institution. A recipient who has received an Academic Challenge Scholarship may transfer the scholarship to another approved Arkansas institution of higher education, provided that the student notifies the division of the change of status by October 1 for the fall term and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms by changing the college on the student's department YOUniversal financial aid account.

(c) Repayment of scholarships.

- (1) If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for noninstitutional expenses.
- (2) Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for noninsititutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.
- (3) It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayments.

(d) Refunds.

- (1) The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program is entitled to a refund of the scholarship or loan amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a scholarship or loan withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after his or her first day of class of the payment period and the situation falls under the refund policy of the institution.
 - (2) The institution shall pay the refund to the division.
- (e) **Overpayment**. If the award of an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student according to the state law, Arkansas Code § 6-80-105, governing the stacking of scholarships, the institution shall follow the Department of Higher Education stacking policy in reducing the student's financial package to prevent the student from receiving funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

6 CAR § 391-207. Institutional responsibilities.

- (a) College/university responsibilities.
 - (1) Administrative agreement.
- (A) The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
- (B) This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with all program rules.
- (C) The institution must comply with all rules in order to maintain continued eligibility status.
- (2) **Disbursement records.** The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.
 - (3) Institutional verification.
- (A) The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the

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eleventh day of classes, by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.

- (B) The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
- (C) The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
- (D) The Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic verification roster to the financial aid administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
- (E) The electronic verification roster shall be returned to the division by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
- (F) Students who are enrolled less than full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.
- (G) The division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the spring term.
- (H) The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division no later than June 1 to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(4) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

- (A) The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
- (B) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the division.
- (C) For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(5) Due diligence.

- (A) The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.
 - (B) In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with

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all the rules of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program.

(C) The division shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

(b) Recipient's responsibilities.

- (1) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the division of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days.
 - (2) This will include change in:
 - (A) Name;
 - (B) Address:
 - (C) Institution; and
- (D) Full-time status (twelve (12) college credit hours for those students who are in their first fall semester following high school graduation, fifteen (15) college credit hours for those students who are beyond the first fall semester following high school graduation).
- (3) Failure to notify the division of a change of status may affect future eligibility.

6 CAR § 391-208. Scholarship hold — Leave of absence.

- (a) The Division of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold or a leave of absence for a traditional student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
- (b) The reasons for a scholarship hold or a leave of absence may include without limitation:
- (1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
 - (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - (A) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
 - (B) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in

which death is possible or imminent;

- (3) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- (4)(A) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
- (B) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
- (C) The division shall release a scholarship hold or a leave of absence, whichever is applicable, if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

(3) "State-supported institution of higher education" means a public postsecondary institution or a department in a public postsecondary institution that:

(A) Provides:

(i) An eligible program of training to prepare students for gainful employment in a recognized occupation; or

(ii) A program leading to a baccalaureate degree or a graduate degree:

and

(B) Is accredited by a recognized accrediting agency or association and has continuously held the accreditation for the number of years required by the Division of Higher Education; and

(4) "Qualifying program" means a postsecondary education program for a student with an intellectual disability that is accredited by the Inclusive Higher Education Accreditation Council.

6 CAR § 405-103. Organization and structure.

- (a) The Division of Higher Education shall administer the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program.
 - (b) The division shall establish application periods and deadlines.

6 CAR § 405-104. Eligibility criteria.

- (a)(1) The Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship may only be awarded to those students who are admitted into transition programs that are accredited by the Institute for Community Inclusion as comprehensive training programs.
- (2) In order to be considered a qualifying institution, an institution must offer a transition program as described in this subsection.
 - (b) Students, or representatives acting on behalf of students, must complete the

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online scholarship application provided by the Division of Higher Education.

(c)

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6 CAR § 405-105. Continued eligibility.

Recipients of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship will maintain award eligibility for a maximum of four (4) up to eight (8) continuous semesters, or until credentialing is obtained, whichever ever comes first, as long as the recipients are continuously enrolled in a transition program.

6 CAR § 405-106. Scholarship amounts.

- (a) Scholarship awards are contingent upon availability of funds.
- (b)(1) Awards may not exceed the institutional cost of attendance.
- (2) The maximum award amount is two thousand five hundred (\$2,500) per semester that the student qualifies for the scholarship.
 - (c) Awards may be applied to:
 - (1) Tuition;
 - (2) Mandatory fees;
 - (3) Programmatic fees;
 - (4) Room and board;
 - (5) Supplies; or
 - (6) Extended support services.

6 CAR § 405-107. Payment of scholarships.

- (a) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarship funds to the qualifying institution of the recipient's choice via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.
- (b) After verification of enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship funds to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.
- (c)(1) The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the institution.

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- (2) For purposes of scholarship payments, academic terms at the institution may include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent.
- (d) In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid in advance to or on behalf of such student.
- (e) If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for noninstitutional expenses.
- (f)(1) Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for noninstitutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled.
- (2) It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayment or overpayments.
- (3) The institution shall refund the overpayment or overpayments to the division.
- (g) If the award of a Governor's Higher Education Transition Program Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student per Arkansas Code § 6-80-105, the institution shall follow the division scholarship stacking policy in reducing the student's financial package so that the student does not receive funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

6 CAR § 405-108. Responsibilities of qualifying institutions.

- (a)(1) The chief executive officer of the qualifying institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, and other correspondence related to the program.
 - (2) This representative will be responsible for:
 - (A) Verification;
 - (B) Data; and
 - (C) Compliance with all program rules.
 - (b) The institution shall maintain information regarding disbursement of scholarship

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funds.

- (c) The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
- (d)(1) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Division of Higher Education.
- (2) If the division receives an application beyond the deadline referenced in this subsection, disbursement will be made within ten (10) business days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.
- (e) In exercising its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds, the division shall periodically review the qualifying institution's records concerning this program.
- (f) Upon request, the qualifying institution shall exercise due diligence in providing the division with complete, accurate, and timely information regarding current and former Governor's Higher Education Transition Scholarship Program recipients.
- (g) Institutions with accredited transition programs will certify students' admittance and enrollment prior to scholarship award.
- (h) The institution shall comply with all applicable law and rules in order to maintain its status as a qualified institution.

6 CAR § 405-109. Responsibilities of recipients.

- (a) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days, including the recipient's:
 - (1) Name;
 - (2) Address; and
 - (3) Institution.
 - (b) Failure to notify the division of a change in status may affect future eligibility.

Program

Subpart 1. Generally

6 CAR § 406-101. Definitions.

As used in this part:

- (1) "Academy attendee" means an individual who is enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution who is a:
 - (A) Current teacher;
- (B) Teacher who has graduated from an Arkansas Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution; or
 - (C) Current student;
- (2) "Eligible postsecondary institution" means a public or private two-year or four-year institution of higher education that:
- (A) Offers a postbaccalaureate program that leads to teacher certification; and
- (B) Has entered into an agreement with the Division of Higher Education for purposes of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program; and
 - (3) "Tuition and fees" means any one (1) of the following that is charged by

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an eligible postsecondary institution, associated with a program of study as part of the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program, that leads to teacher certification:

- (A) Tuition;
- (B) Mandatory fees; and
- (C) Program fees.

6 CAR § 406-102. Implementation of program — Purpose.

- (a) An eligible postsecondary institution shall implement an Arkansas Teacher Academy to incentivize potential and enrolled academy attendees to:
 - (1) Enter the teaching profession; and
 - (2) Commit to teaching in:
 - (A) Arkansas public schools; or
- (B) Critical shortage areas in Arkansas based on subject areas or geographical areas.
- (b) The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with public and private postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement a centralized administrative process for each Arkansas Teacher Academy, which shall include without limitation the following:
- (1) A marketing and promotion plan to recruit academy attendees for an Arkansas Teacher Academy;
 - (2) Data collection and reporting;
 - (3) Tracking of postgraduation service requirements;
 - (4) Coordination of induction services;
- (5) Distribution of moneys in the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Fund between eligible postsecondary institutions;
- (6) Collection of reimbursements from individuals who fail to meet the service requirements under this part;
- (7) A process for assessing an academy attendee's ability to repay financial assistance received if the academy attendee who receives financial assistance is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the requirements of an Arkansas Teacher

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Academy program; and

(8) A process for deferring service or repayment required by the Arkansas Teacher Academy Scholarship Program Act, Arkansas Code § 6-82-2201 et seq., based on factors adopted by the division.

6 CAR § 406-103. Eligible postsecondary institution duties.

- (a) An Arkansas Teacher Academy may include without limitation a new or existing teacher preparation program that utilizes proven, research-based models of best practices that are already being implemented in similar program pathways.
 - (b) An eligible postsecondary institution may-
- (1) <u>Develop</u> a portfolio of teacher preparation programs to offer as part of its Arkansas Teacher Academy; and
 - (2) Give priority to students in grades eleven (11) and twelve (12).
- (c)(1) An eligible postsecondary institution shall not:
- (A) Exclude students in grades nine (9) and ten (10) from its Arkansas Teacher Academy; and
- (B) Use scholarship funds that exceed the cost of tuition and fees at the eligible postsecondary institution to support its Arkansas Teacher Academy costs.
- (2) However, if the scholarship awarded does not fully cover the tuition and fees after all other financial gifts, aid, and grants are received, the academy attendee shall not be charged the remaining difference.
- (d) An eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formal partnerships with Arkansas public schools to build commitments for teacher employment upon an academy attendee's completion of an Arkansas Teacher Academy program.
- (e) The targeted deployment of academy attendees who are currently teachers who have completed an Arkansas Teacher Academy program shall be based on the:
 - (1) Needs of each public school system;
 - (2) Community that is being served; and
- (3) Individual skills of each current teacher who has completed an Arkansas Teacher Academy program.

- (f) A program offered as part of an eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas

 Teacher Academy shall include accelerated program models for the following, without

 limitation:
- (1) Subject areas and geographical areas identified by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education as experiencing a critical shortage of teachers;
- (2) An individual seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in a professional certification; and
- (3) A student in a noneducation program who seeks to complete one (1) or more teacher preparation courses leading to a teaching certification following graduation.

6 CAR § 406-104. Scholarship amounts — Academy attendee requirements.

- (a) Each Effective beginning the 2025-2026 academic year, each academy attendee that is accepted and enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy program at an eligible postsecondary institution shall be awarded an annual scholarship, not to exceed the maximum award as determined by the Division of Higher Education each eligible semester, up to the actual cost of the:
 - (1) Eligible postsecondary institution's tuition and fees, for a maximum of:
- (A) Two (2) academic years, or four (4) academic semesters, not to exceed sixty (60) academic hours, or completion of the program for academy attendees who are graduate students enrolled in a Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution;
- (B) Four (4) academic years, or eight (8) academic semesters, not to exceed one hundred twenty (120) academic hours, or completion of the program for academy attendees who are undergraduate students enrolled in a Teacher Academy at an eligible postsecondary institution; and
- (C)(i) Two (2) academic years, or four (4) academic semesters, not to exceed sixty (60) academic hours, or completion of the program for academy attendees community college students enrolled in a Teacher Academy Program at an eligible

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community college postsecondary institution.

- (ii) Academy attendees enrolled at a community college shall receive continued eligibility for two (2) additional academic years or four (4) additional academic semesters at an undergraduate institution; and
- (2) Obtainment of a teaching license issued by the State Board of Education, including without limitation the actual cost of one (1) exam required by the state board.
- (b)(1) A scholarship shall be distributed to academy attendees only after all other financial gifts, aid, and grants have been received by an academy attendee in accordance with the division's scholarship stacking policy under Arkansas Code § 6-80-105.
- (2) The total scholarship amount awarded to each academy attendee In compliance with the division's scholarship stacking policy, a student's total financial aid package, which can include multiple scholarships, shall not exceed the total recognized cost of tuition and fees attendance at any public a state supported institution of higher education.
 - (c) Each academy attendee enrolled in an Arkansas Teacher Academy shall:
- (1)(A) Agree to teach at least one (1) full school year in Arkansas at a public school, or a school that serves primarily public school students with disabilities, for each academic year the academy attendee successfully completes and receives a scholarship for all or part of his or her tuition and fees.
- (B) For an academy attendee who teaches and receives the scholarship concurrently, the academy attendee's commitment period to teach in an Arkansas public school shall begin after graduation from an Arkansas Teacher Academy;
 - (2) Reimburse the Division of Higher Education:
- (A) For the total amount of scholarship funds received for tuition and fees for an academic year the academy attendee does not successfully complete the academic year in good academic standing; and
- (B) Proportional to the amount of the scholarship funds received by the academy attendee that corresponds to the number of school years the academy attendee agreed to teach, but did not teach; and

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- (3) Not include time enrolled in a summer term when calculating his or her commitment period required for teaching in an Arkansas public school.
- (d) Academy attendees must apply for the Arkansas Teacher Academy scholarship during the open application period via the division's Scholarship Application Management System portal.

6 CAR § 406-105. Scholarship distribution duties — Reporting requirements.

- (a) On or before March 1, 2024, and each year thereafter, the Division of Higher Education shall report to the Joint Budget Committee, or if the General Assembly is not in session, the Legislative Council and the Governor's office, the following information:
- (1) The total number of academy attendees enrolled in each eligible postsecondary institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy in the current academic year; and
- (2) The total number of Arkansas Teacher Academy graduates receiving induction services in the current academic year.
- (b) On or before September 1, 2024, and each year thereafter, the division shall report to the Governor, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, with a copy submitted to the Secretary of State, the following information:
- (1) The total number of academy attendees enrolled in each institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy by year of college enrollment;
- (2) The percentage of academy attendees who complete each year of an institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy that plans to continue to the subsequent year, delineated by each teacher preparation program offered by each institution as part of the Arkansas Teacher Academy;
- (3) The number of academy attendees who are currently teachers and who complete a program of study through an institution's Arkansas Teacher Academy;
- (4) The number of academy attendees who are currently teaching in an Arkansas public school as part of an agreement for receiving a scholarship pursuant to

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this part;

- (5) The total number of Arkansas Teacher Academy graduates receiving induction services;
 - (6) The number of academy attendees who:
 - (A) Have defaulted on their obligations defined in this part; and
 - (B) Are in repayment agreements;
- (7) The number of academy attendees who have deferred repayment agreements;
- (8) The number of academy attendees who have completed repayment agreements;
- (9) The methodology for distributing any moneys appropriated for Arkansas Teacher Academy scholarships and the amounts distributed to each institution; and
- (10) The amount of any unused moneys in the fund from the previous fiscal year.

 - (C) The members of this council will consist of representatives from:
- (i) Public and private postsecondary institutions with teacher education programs;
 - (ii) Public and private elementary and secondary schools; and

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- (iii) The teacher certification section of the division.
- (2) The commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall:
- (A) Serve as the presiding officer of the Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council; and
 - (B) Ensure that staff services for the council are provided.
 - (c) The final responsibility for selecting loan recipients shall rest with the division.
- (d) When functioning under Acts 1983, No. 109, Acts 1987, No. 331, and any subsequent legislation, the division shall follow the provisions of the Arkansas Administrative Procedure Act, Arkansas Code § 25-15-201 et seq.

6 CAR § 398-102. Program definitions.

The following definitions are used in the Teacher Opportunity Program:

- (1)(A) "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
- (B) The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order;

- (B) The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws;
 - (4) "Award year" means the year:
 - (A) Beginning on July 1 of one (1) calendar year; and
 - (B) Extending to June 30 of the next calendar year;
- (5) "Classroom teacher" means an individual who is required to hold a teaching license from the Division of Higher Education and who is:
- (A) Engaged directly in instruction with students in a classroom setting for more than seventy percent (70%) of the individual's contracted time;
 - (B) A media specialist or librarian;
 - (C) A guidance counselor; or
 - (D) An administrator;
 - (6) "Dual license" means licensure to teach in more than one (1) subject area;
- (7) "Semester" means one-half (1/2) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the Division of Higher Education, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
- (A) Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or
 - (B)(i) Six (6) credit hours as a part-time student.
- (ii) For purposes of summer courses at an institution of higher education, "semester" means the same as is defined in this section;
 - (8) "Scholarship" means a program that is:
 - (A) Funded with state funds or lottery proceeds; and
 - (B) Administered by the Division of Higher Education; and

(9) "Student" means a classroom teacher who is attending an institution of higher education for additional education in:

(A) Science, technology, engineering, or mathematics fields;

(B) Computer science;

(C) Literacy or reading;

(D) Prekindergarten education; or

(E) Special education.

(9)(10) "Teach on a full-time basis" means teaching the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one (1) academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

6 CAR § 398-103. Eligibility and continuing eligibility criteria.

- (a) Applicants must be bona fide residents of the State of Arkansas, as defined by the Division of Higher Education, having lived in Arkansas continually for at least twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline.

 - (d)(1) The Non-Dual Licensure Program requires that the applicant must be:
- (A) Currently employed as a classroom teacher, which includes librarian and media specialist, guidance counselor, and administrator, in Arkansas and declare an intention to continue such employment in Arkansas;
 - (B) Enrolled in an approved institution in Arkansas; and
- (C) Enrolled in college-level courses, excluding correspondence courses, directly related to their employment as certified by the Commissioner of the Division of Higher Education, General Education section.
- (2)(A) Recipients must maintain at least a <u>cumulative</u> 2.5 grade point average <u>on a 4.0 scale, or an appropriate equivalent,</u> in the courses funded by the Teacher Opportunity Program.
- (B) Recipients funded for one (1) course must obtain at least a "B" for that course.
- (C) Recipients funded for two (2) courses must obtain at least a "B" for one (1) course and a "C" for the other.
- (D) Recipients enrolled in dissertation coursework must receive a "Pass" for the course to receive reimbursement.
- (d) Failure to notify the division of a change in status may affect future eligibility or collection status.

- (a) Solicitation of applicants.

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- (1) Applications will be available on the Division of Higher Education's website.
- (2) Applications will also be mailed to individuals upon request.

(b) Submission of application.

- (1) Applications include personal information, as well as education and employment information.
- (2) The division will review all applications to ensure that all requested information is included and will notify the applicant of the status of the application.
 - (3) If the application is incomplete, the division will notify the applicant of:

- (2) The reimbursement made to one (1) individual within one (1) fiscal year may not exceed the aforementioned costs associated with six (6) semester hours or the equivalent of six (6) semester credit hours.
- (2) For purposes of award disbursement under this section, an academic year begins in the fall semester and runs through the summer semester.
- (c)(1) Based on the availability of program funds, awards will be disbursed to the recipient pursuant to the reimbursement award limitations above and ranking status.
 - (2) Recipients must maintain an eligible status to receive funds.

6 CAR § 400-101. Policy statement.

- (a) This part shall be known as the Division of Higher Education's "Rules Governing the Arkansas Future Grant Program".
 - (b) This part addresses the:
 - (1) Student eligibility criteria;
 - (2) Method for recipient selection;
 - (3) Continuing eligibility requirements;
- (4) Procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education; and
 - (5) Other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

6 CAR § 400-102. Definitions.

As used in this part:

(1) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program that is:

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- (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
- (B) A state-supported technical institute;
- (C) An approved state-supported school of nursing; or
- (D) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university;
- (2) "Approved state-supported school of nursing" means a state-supported school of nursing with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that:
 - (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
 - (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
- (C) Is eligible to participate in the federal student aid programs of the Higher Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. § 1070 et seg.;
 - (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
- (E) Has been approved by the Division of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program; and
 - (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- (3) "Federal student financial assistance" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of:
- (A) An approved Free Application for Federal Student Aid, including without limitation a Pell Grant; or
- (B) The student's or other family member's service in the United States Armed Forces, including without limitation the Army National Guard or Air National Guard;
- (4) "Private scholarship" means a scholarship or grant awarded by a private entity or donor;
 - (5) "Regional high-demand field" means any field of study identified as:
- (A) In demand by the Division of Workforce Services as published on its annual regional Projected Employment Opportunities List; or
- (B) In high demand by an approved institution of higher education and approved by the Division of Higher Education; and
- (6) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement, funded with state funds or

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net proceeds from the state lottery, awarded by:

- (A) The Division of Higher Education; or
- (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an approved institution of higher education in this state, funded in whole or in part by state funds, including without limitation:
- (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
 - (ii) Tuition waivers based on:
 - (a) Age;
 - (b) Military service;
 - (c) Occupation; or
 - (d) Other factors;
- (iii) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
- (iv) Any other publicly-funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the approved institution of higher education for:
 - (a) Tuition;
 - (b) Fees;
 - (c) Books; or
 - (d) Other costs of attendance.

Subpart 2. Procedures

6 CAR § 400-201. Eligibility requirements.

A student is eligible for an Arkansas Future Grant if the student is an Arkansas resident who meets one (1) of the following requirements:

- (1) Has either:
 - (A) Graduated from an Arkansas:
 - (i) Public high school;

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- (ii) Private high school; or
- (iii) Home school under Arkansas Code § 6-15-501 et seq.; or
- (B) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services; or
- (2) Verifies that he or she has resided in Arkansas for the three (3) years immediately preceding application for the grant, and has either:
 - (A) Graduated from an out-of-state:
 - (i) Public high school;
 - (ii) Private high school; or
 - (iii) Home school recognized by another state; or
- (B) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by another state:
- (3) Is enrolled part-time or full-time at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in a:
- (A) Science, technology, engineering, accounting, finance, nursing, education, or mathematics field, including without limitation:
 - (i) Computer science;
 - (ii) Information technology;
 - (iii) Data analysis; or
 - (iv) Graphic design;
 - (B) Regional high-demand field; or
 - (C) State high-demand field; and
- (4) Has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

6 CAR § 400-202. Continuing eligibility requirements.

A student may continue to be eligible until the student has:

(1) Received the grant for five (5) academic semesters a maximum of seventy-five (75) course credit hours in which the student is enrolled;

- (2) Obtained an associate degree; or
- (3) Failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled; or
- (4) Failed to complete the mentoring or community service requirements under 6 CAR § 400-205.

6 CAR § 400-203. Grant award amounts.

(a)(1) An Arkansas Future Grant shall be in:

(A) Distributed in accordance with the Division of Higher Education's stacking policy under Arkansas Code § 6-80-105; and

(B) Distributed in an amount equal to the tuition, fees, and other charges incurred by a student who meets the requirements under 6 CAR § 400-201 and 6 CAR § 400-202-to attend an approved institution of higher education, less the amount the student receives in:

- (A) State-supported student financial assistance;
- (B) Federal student financial assistance; and
- (C) Private scholarships.
- (2) If the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled is a state-supported four-year institution of higher education or a private, nonprofit four-year institution of higher education, the total amount of tuition, fees, and other charges under subdivision (a)(1) of this section shall be calculated as the average cost of tuition, fees, and other charges at approved institutions of higher education that are state-supported two-year institutions of higher education or private, nonprofit two-year institutions of higher education.
- (b) The Division of Higher Education shall disburse the grant directly to the approved institution of higher education.
- (c) The division shall award grants under this part in the order in which the division receives applications from eligible students and based on availability of funds, to include summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalents, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.

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6 CAR § 400-204. Grant hold.

- (a) The Division of Higher Education may approve a grant hold for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
 - (b) The reasons for a grant hold may include without limitation:
- (1) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
 - (2) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - (A) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
- (B) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
 - (3) Military service under Arkansas Code § 6-61-112; or
- (4)(A) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project, sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
- (B) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization, including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
- (C) The division shall release a grant hold if the division determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

6 CAR § 400-205. Grant recipient responsibilities.

- (a)(1) A student who receives an Arkansas Future Grant shall enter into a written agreement with the Division of Higher Education to:
- (1)(A) Receive monthly mentoring from a mentor from an organization determined by the Division of Higher Education.
 - (B) A mentor under subdivision (a)(1)(A) of this section shall:

(i) Receive annual mentoring training:

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(a) Developed by the Division of Higher Education; and
(b) Provided by a local volunteer group approved by the Division
of Higher Education; and
(ii) Certify to the Division of Higher Education that at least one (1)
time each semester the mentor has provided mentoring services by telephone, email, o
in person to each student he or she is mentoring;
(2)(A) Complete at least ten (10) hours of community service each semester
the student receives a grant.
(B)(i) A student may select a community service project that meets
requirements developed by the Division of Higher Education.
(ii) An approved institution of higher education may provide
community services opportunities designed to benefit the approved institution of higher
education community or the broader local community.
(C) A student shall certify his or her community service to the approved
institution of higher education by the last regular day of the semester the student
received the grant; and
(3)(A) Reside-reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years-six (6) months
and be employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or
a certification.
(B)(2) The Division of Higher Education may defer the requirement under
subdivision (a)(3)(A)(a)(1) of this section if:
(i)(A) The Division of Higher Education, in consultation with the
Division of Workforce Services, determines that there was no employment position
available that would reasonably enable the student to meet this requirement; or
(ii) (B) Special circumstances as determined by the Division of Higher
Education exist.
(C)(3) After the period of deferral, the student shall begin or resume
working in this state or become subject to repayment under subsection (b) of this
section.

(b) The written agreement under subsection (a) of this section shall provide that

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the grant converts into a loan and the student shall repay the grant amount:

- (1) On a pro rata basis at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Division of Higher Education, for each year the student does not reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years, and become employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification; or
- (2) In its entirety at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Division of Higher Education if the recipient does not comply with the written agreement under subsection (a) of this section.
- (c)(1) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Division of Higher Education of any change in status within twenty-one (21) days.
- (2) Failure to notify the Division of Higher Education of a change of status may affect future eligibility.
 - (3) Change of status will include:
 - (A) Change in name;
 - (B) Change in address; and
 - (C) Change in institution.

6 CAR § 400-206. Collection of loan.

- (a)(1)(A) Accounts will be retained by the Financial Aid Division of the Division of Higher Education until the individual is no longer eligible for deferment, at which point the account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment.
 - (B) The student will:
- (i) Be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections; and
 - (ii) Receive a loan amortization schedule.
- (2)(A) The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or one hundred twenty (120) days past due.
- (B) Loan recipients who are determined by the Division of Higher Education to be one hundred twenty (120) days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due.

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- (C) If payment is not forthcoming within sixty (60) days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date.
- (3) If the loan recipient has not responded within ninety (90) days from the original payment due date, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient informing them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not made within thirty (30) days.
- (b) **Skip tracing mechanisms.** The Division of Higher Education will use the following steps to locate recipients if communications are returned as undelivered:
- (1) Contact the Office of Motor Vehicle of the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration:
 - (2) Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
- (3) Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient's last known address;
- (4) Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
- (5) Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;
 - (6) Contact recipient's:
 - (A) Field of study;
 - (B) Professional organization;
 - (C) Union; or
 - (D) Licensing board;
 - (7) Contact post office;
 - (8) Contact utility companies; and
 - (9) Contact Chamber of Commerce.
 - (c) Credit reporting agencies.
 - (1) Defaulted recipients will be reported to the following credit reporting

agencies:

- (A) CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.;
- (B) TRW Credit Data; and
- (C) Trans Union Credit Reporting.
- (2)(A) Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients are located in the collections file.
- (B) The Division of Higher Education will respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients.
- (d) **State income tax set-off.** By the authority of Acts 1993, No. 345, the Division of Higher Education has been included as a claimant agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds.

(e) Litigation.

- (1) No sooner than thirty (30) days after sending the third letter of notification, the Division of Higher Education shall institute a civil suit against the recipient for repayment of the loan.
- (2) Small claims courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to three thousand dollars (\$3,000).
- (3) If the account is over three thousand dollars and one cent (\$3,000.01), the Division of Higher Education must use circuit court.
- (4) If the account is three thousand dollars and one cent (\$3,000.01) or above, the Division of Higher Education may choose to use small claims courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to circuit court.
- (5) If the Division of Higher Education chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference.
- (6) Forms to take the recipient to small claims court are requested from the recipient's county of residence.

(f) Write-offs.

(1) Arkansas Future Grants that convert to loans may be written off as uncollectible if the Division of Higher Education shows due diligence to satisfy the

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collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:

- (A) The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced: or
- (B) The recipient does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- (2) Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the administrator must be received before Arkansas Future Grant loan accounts may be written off.
- (g) **Nonpayment penalties.** Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

6 CAR § 400-207. Institutional responsibilities — College and university responsibilities.

(a) Administrative agreement.

- (1) The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one (1) representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Future Grant Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
- (2) This representative is responsible for verification, data, and compliance with all program rules.
- (3) The institution must comply with all rules in order to maintain continued eligibility status.
- (b) **Disbursement records.** The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

(c) Institutional verification.

- (1)(A) The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in an eligible program of study, and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.
 - (B) The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all

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persons receiving the award for a given academic term.

- (C) The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
- (D) The Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic verification roster to the financial aid administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
- (2) The electronic verification roster shall be returned to the division by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
- (3)(A) The division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the financial aid administrator before the end of the fall and spring term.
- (B) The rosters shall be returned to the division no later than January 15 based on the fall semester and June 1 based on the spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(d) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.

- (1) The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
- (2) Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the division.
- (3) For those students whose applications are received by the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(e) Due diligence.

- (1) The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any Arkansas Future Grant recipient or former recipient.
- (2) In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules of the Arkansas Future Grant Program.
- (3) The division shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.
