RULES GOVERNING THE SUSTAINABLE BUILDING MAINTENANCE PROGRAM FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In compliance with Act 751 of 2023, the rules for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for final approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE SUSTAINABLE BUILDING MAINTENANCE PROGRAM FOR STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION Effective Date:

1.00 DEFINITIONS.

- 1.00 "Deferred maintenance" means necessary maintenance, repairs and upgrades or replacements that are put on hold until sometime in the future, most notably due to a lack of funds needed to complete a project.
- 1.01 "Critical maintenance" means deferred maintenance projects that, if not addressed, could result in substantial damage to the structural integrity of a building or are related to the imminent failure of building systems such as HVAC, electrical and plumbing.
- 1.02 "Renovation of state-owned property" means updates to existing institutional facilities to address changing program needs on a campus.

2.00 LOANS.

- 2.01 Under the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education, the Division of Higher Education may:
 - 2.01.1 Authorize money to be loaned from the Sustainable Building Maintenance
 Program for State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education Revolving
 Loan Fund, pursuant to Arkansas Code § 19-5-1277, to a state-supported institution of higher education.
- 2.02 A loan from the fund made under 2.01 shall be:

2.02.1 For:

2.02.1.1 Deferred maintenance;

2.02.1.2 Critical maintenance; or

2.02.1.3 A renovation of state-owned property; and

- 2.02.2 In an amount that exceeds one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).
- 2.03 The term for repayment of a loan from the fund made under 1.01 of this section shall not exceed ten (10) years.
- 2.04 An applicant applying for a loan under this rule shall meet the following eligibility requirements:

- 2.04.1 Applications for loans for construction and/or renovation projects should be accompanied by a copy of the engineer's or architect's project budget guidelines.
- 2.04.2 <u>Criteria for loan approval will include, but are not limited to, the following:</u>
 - <u>2.04.2.1</u> <u>The institution's current debt service requirements:</u>
 - 2.04.2.1.1 The total annual debt service (including that for the loan, if approved) may not exceed 25% of annual student tuition and fee revenue or,
 - 2.04.2.1.2 If local millage is pledged against the loan, the millage income must equal no less than 120% of total annual debt service;
 - 2.04.2.2 Feasibility of and need for the proposed project in the context of the educational and general mission of the institution; and
 - 2.04.2.3 Availability of loan funds.

3.00 LOAN APPROVAL PROCESS.

- 3.01 An applicant for a loan from the Sustainable Building Maintenance Program for
 State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education Revolving Loan Fund under § 6-62-1202 shall:
 - 3.01.1 Apply for the loan on a form approved by the Division of Higher Education.
 - 3.01.1.1 The form under section 3.01.1 shall be posted on the division's website.
 - 3.01.2 The division shall review an application submitted under 3.01.1 of this subsection to determine if the applicant satisfies the eligibility criteria for a loan from the fund.
 - 3.01.3 Upon approval by the division, each application shall then be reviewed by the legislature for final approval.
- 3.02 The division shall provide an applicant for a loan from the fund with written notice of its determination regarding whether:

- 3.02.1 To offer the applicant a loan from the fund, and
- 3.02.2 Any conditions for making the loan from the fund.
- 3.03 After an applicant for a loan from the fund has satisfied the preconditions, if any, for the division's approval of the applicant's loan application, and has executed a contract for the loan from the fund, the division will present the contract for the loan from the fund to Higher Education Coordinating Board for its approval.
 - 3.03.1 In determining whether to approve an application, the board will:
 - 3.03.1.1 First, based on project type give priority to critical maintenance needs.
 - 3.03.1.2 Second give priority to deferred maintenance with renovation projects being the lowest priority for funding.
 - As funds become available, division staff will notify the eligible institution of the intent to present the loan award for approval at the next available board meeting.
 - 3.03.2 Requirements for the issuance of a loan from the fund:
 - 3.03.2.1 Upon approval of the loan by the Higher Education
 Coordinating Board, the institution must sign a Certificate
 of Indebtedness specifying a payout schedule and asserting
 the commitment of the institutional board to budget and
 allocate the sums necessary to make the payments agreed
 upon in the Certificate of Indebtedness.
 - 3.03.2.2 The payout schedule will include a closing fee plus an annual service fee assessed by the Development Finance Authority as agreed upon by the division and the Authority and specified in the closing document(s).
 - 3.03.2.3 The Certificate of Indebtedness will provide for penalties for late payments.
 - No penalties will be assessed for early retirement of the debt.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING MILITARY DEPENDENTS' SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Organization and Structure

- I. 1.01 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall administer the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or his/her his or her designee.
- H. 1.02 The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education pursuant to the provisions of Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009 and subsequent legislation.
- HI. 1.03 When functioning under Act 188 of 1973, Act 2127 of 2005, Act 717 of 2007, Act 1216 of 2009 and subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

2.00 Program Definitions

- 2.01 The following definitions are used in the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program:
 - 2.01.1 "Approved institution" means a private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education or technical school located in Arkansas that is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
 - 2.01.2 "Dependent child" means any child born or conceived, been legally adopted, or under court appointed legal guardianship, or the stepchild of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran, and who meets the definition of dependent with regards to children established by the U.S.

 Department of Education. Stepchildren are not eligible unless legally adopted as stated above.
 - 2.01.3 "Dependent spouse" means the legal spouse of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.

2.01.4 "Disabled veteran" means a person who:

- 2.01.4.1 <u>Has been declared by the Federal Department of Veterans</u>

 <u>Affairs to be one hundred percent (100%) totally and</u>

 <u>permanently disabled as a result of service-connected injuries</u>

 <u>or medical conditions; and</u>
- 2.01.4.2 <u>Is currently receiving special monthly compensation for such, and who was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the U.S. Armed Forces or who is a current resident of Arkansas.</u>
- 2.01.5 "Full-time student" means an undergraduate student enrolled in at least twelve (12) semester credit hours, or its equivalent, per semester.
- 2.01.6 "Satisfactory progress" means undergraduate students must maintain a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, and make satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion, as defined by the institution.
- 2.01.7 "Fees waived" means the inclusion of Includes tuition at the in-state rate, room and board when provided in campus facilities, fees or other charges incurred from the approved institution. Non-reimbursable charges would include any penalty charges, including but not limited to, parking tickets, or other penalty payments.

3.00 Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

- 4. 3.01 To be eligible for the Military Dependents' Scholarship, an applicant must meet the following conditions:
 - A. 3.01.1 The student's parent or spouse must have been declared to be a disabled veteran, prisoner of war, missing in action, killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery during the course of active military duty after January 1, 1960.
 - B. 3.01.2 The student's parent or spouse must have been a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time he/she he or she entered service in the United States Armed Services, or whose official residence is currently within the State of Arkansas.
 - C. 3.01.3 The dependent child or spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or a person killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran must be a current resident of Arkansas.

- D. 3.01.4 The student must qualify as the dependent of a disabled veteran, prisoner of war or a person declared to be missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery by meeting one of the following criteria:
 - 4. 3.01.4.1 The student is the legal spouse of a person declared to be a prisoner of war, missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery or a person declared to be a disabled veteran or,
 - 2. 3.01.4.2 The dependent child must be the biological child of the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran; or,
 - 3. 3.01.4.3 The dependent child is legally adopted or in legal custody of the guardian that was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
 - 4. 3.01.4.4 The dependent child is the stepchild of the parent that was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.,
- E. 3.01.5 The dependent child must meet the U.S. Department of Education's definition of "dependent" with regards to children.
- F. A stepchild is not eligible for this scholarship unless he/she has been legally adopted by the parent who was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.
- F. 3.01.6 A stepchild must have been listed as a dependent on the federal and state income tax returns in each of the five (5) income tax years immediately prior to the death or total and permanent disability and must have received more than one-half (1/2) his or her financial support.
- G. 3.01.7 The applicant must apply for the Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA) Chapter 35 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code with the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- H. 3.01.8 The applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time student in any private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state-supported institution of higher education in Arkansas.
- 4. 3.01.9 The applicant must be an undergraduate student seeking an associate's degree, a baccalaureate degree or certificate of completion.

- J. 3.01.10 The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.
- H. 3.02 Once a person qualifies as an eligible student under the terms of the program, there shall be no situation, such as the return of a parent or spouse, or the reported death of a parent or spouse that will remove the dependent from the benefits of this program.

III. Continued Eligibility

- <u>3.03</u> An eligible recipient shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year, renewable for up to three (3) additional academic years (for a total of 8 semesters) if the recipient meets the following continuing eligibility criteria established by ADHE the Division of Higher Education:
- 3.03.1 The student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale.
- 1. 3.03.2 The student is making satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion;
- 2. 3.03.3 The student is enrolled in at least twelve semester hours or the equivalent per semester term and completes 24 semester hours, or the equivalent, per academic year.
- 3.04 For purposes of scholarship payments, "academic semester" includes summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.

4.00 Application Process

I. Applications

- A. 4.01 Brochures are mailed by the Division of Higher Education to counselors and principals at public and private Arkansas high schools.
- B. <u>4.02</u> Brochures are mailed by the <u>division</u> to financial aid officers at private, nonprofit institutions of higher education in Arkansas and state-supported institutions of higher education in the state of Arkansas.
 - C. <u>4.02.1</u> The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students are made aware of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and its benefits.

D. 4.03 Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Division of Higher Education on the division's website.

II. Submission of Applications

- A. <u>4.04</u> The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. 4.05 Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division the following documentation as it applies to the applicant:
 - 4.05.1 Military Dependents' Scholarship Application;
 - 2. <u>4.05.2</u> A death certificate or other documentation certifying the death of the parent or spouse.
 - 3. 4.05.2.1 A death as a result of injuries received while serving in the armed forces is only covered if the death occurred while on active duty.
 - 4. 4.05.3 A Report of Casualty from the appropriate branch of the United States Armed Services or a copy of the veteran's DD214 form;
 - 5. 4.05.4 Documentation from the federal United States Department of Veterans Affairs citing service-connected, one hundred percent (100%) total and permanent disability;
 - 6. <u>4.05.5</u> A copy of the application and statement of acceptance or denial of the federal program for dependents of veterans, Dependents' Educational Assistance Program (DEA).
 - 7. <u>4.05.6</u> A copy of DEA benefits statement showing the amount of educational assistance allowed for each term.
 - 8. <u>4.05.7</u> A copy of legal adoption or court appointed legal guardianship for a dependent child;
 - 9. 4.05.8 A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child;
 - 10. 4.05.9 A copy of marriage license, if a spouse.

5.00 Award Process

- 4. 5.01 Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within 30 days of the status of their application.
- H. <u>5.02</u> Eligible students will receive an award notice, which contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.
- HI. 5.03 The institution will also receive an award notice, which contains the student's name, social security number, award limits, the conditions of the award, verification process, and payment process. The institution will be required to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. 5.04 The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continued eligibility each semester.
- V. <u>5.05</u> The award will be renewed annually provided the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as defined by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education in "Scholarship and Eligibility Criteria," Section III.
- VI. <u>5.06</u> Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

VII. 6.00 Scholarship Payment Policies

- 4. 6.01 The scholarship will pay that portion of charges that exceeds the amount of the DEA educational assistance allowance OR the full amount if the recipient is ineligible for DEA, but is eligible for the MDS. Reimbursement is limited to the cost of tuition at the in-state rate, mandatory fees, and a room and meal plan when provided in campus facilities from such institution or school. The amount reimbursed for the room shall not exceed the usual and custom amounts charged by the institution as for similar scholarship programs.
- H. 6.02 Payment on behalf of the scholarship recipient will be made directly to the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution at the beginning of each semester for approved charges covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.
- HI. 6.03 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division will pay the institution for the award covered by this program upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form, and verification of the charges.

A. Transfer Policy

- A recipient who has received a Military Dependents' Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Division of Higher Education receives after providing written notification of the change of status to the division by October 1 for the Fall Term a fall term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms a winter or spring term, and June 1 for the Summer Terms a summer term.
 - 6.04.1 Failure to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division of the transfer by the deadline will disqualify the student for waiver of tuition and fees at the institution to which he/she he or she has transferred.

B. Withdrawal Policy

Recipients may withdraw from the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division. The petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and will be supported with documentation. Recipients who withdraw from school and fail to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring terms, and June 1 for the Summer terms will not be eligible for a tuition waiver for that semester. The recipient may receive the tuition waiver if he/she he or she can demonstrate that extraordinary circumstances prevented him/her him or her from notifying the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

C. Revocation Policy

The award will be permanently revoked if the recipient fails to enroll full-time and the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division receives neither written notification of transfer to another eligible institution, nor a petition for withdrawal by the recipient by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms and June 1 for the Summer Terms. At the discretion of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, the award will not be revoked if the division determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying the division by the required dates.

D. Military Service

Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces
Reserve units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit
training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will
be placed in deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

- E. 6.08 Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE division policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.
- IV. 6.09 The state assistance awarded to a dependent attending a private, nonprofit institution of higher education in this state shall not exceed the amount of state assistance awarded to dependents attending state-supported institutions of higher education.

7.00 Institutional Responsibilities

I. Administrative Agreement

7.01 The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with these responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

II. Verification

7.02 The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education (ADHE) division at the close of each term concerning the student's name and continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

III. Identification of Eligible Students

<u>7.03</u> Institutions will be responsible for exercising all reasonable efforts to identify students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

IV. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

7.04 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

V. Refund Policy

<u>7.05</u> It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE the division of the names of persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE the division.

VI. Due Diligence

7.06 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education Division on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program.

8.0 Recipient Responsibilities

- I. <u>8.01</u> It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 21 days. This includes:
 - A. 8.01.1 Changes in name, or
 - B. 8.01.2 Change in address, or
 - C. 8.01.3 Change in Institution, or
 - D. 8.01.4 Change in full-time status, or
 - E. <u>8.01.5</u> Withdrawal from an institution.
 - 8.02 Failure to notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division of any change in status may affect future eligibility.

Program Definitions

The following definitions are used in the Military Dependents' Scholarship Program:

Approved Institution

A private, nonprofit institution of higher education in Arkansas or state supported institution of higher education or technical school located in Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central Association Commission on Higher Education, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.

Dependent Child

Any child born or conceived, been legally adopted, or under court

appointed legal guardianship, or the stepchild of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran, AND who meets the definition of dependent with regards to children established by the U.S. Department of Education. Stepchildren are not eligible unless legally adopted as stated above.

Dependent Spouse

The legal spouse of a person who has been declared to be a prisoner of war or missing or killed in action, or killed on ordnance delivery, or a disabled veteran.

Disabled Veteran

A person who has been declared by the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs to be one hundred percent (100%) totally and permanently disabled as a result of service connected injuries or medical conditions AND who is currently receiving special monthly compensation for such, AND who was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the U.S. armed forces OR who is a current resident of Arkansas.

Full-time Student

An undergraduate student enrolled in at least twelve (12) semester credit hours, or its equivalent, per semester.

Satisfactory Progress

Undergraduate students must maintain a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, and make satisfactory progress toward a degree or certificate of completion, as defined by the institution.

Fees Waived

Includes tuition at the in-state rate, room and board when provided in campus facilities, fees or other charges incurred from the approved institution. Non reimbursable charges would include any penalty charges, including but not limited to, parking tickets, or other penalty payments.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Financial Aid Appeals Process to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Financial Aid Appeals Process.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Financial Aid Appeals Process rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE FINANCIAL AID APPEALS PROCESS Effective Date:

1.00 Definitions

- 1.01 "Appeals Process" means, without limitation:
 - 1.01.1 The completion and submission of an appeals application as drafted by the Financial Aid Appeals Committee;
 - 1.01.2 The confirmation of eligibility to appeal and the intention to retain appeals eligibility under this subchapter; and
 - 1.01.3 The completion of a review by the committee that shall include a determination of eligibility and a final appeals decision;
- 1.02 "Eligibility" means, without limitation, the applicant:
 - 1.02.1 Is a bona fide resident of the State of Arkansas;
 - 1.02.2 <u>Is enrolled or will be enrolled in a program of study at an eligible postsecondary institution;</u>
 - 1.02.3 Is currently in good standing; and
 - 1.02.4 Is not currently under probationary restrictions for financial aid
- 1.03 "Financial Aid" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student from public funds, including without limitation:
 - 1.03.1 The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under §6-85-201 et seq.; and
 - 1.03.2 Other division scholarship and grant programs, state general revenues, tuition, and local tax revenue.

2.00 Financial Aid Appeals Committee

- 2.01 The Financial Aid Appeals Committee is composed of five (5) representatives of the Division of Higher Education, which shall be responsible for administering the division's appeal process, appointed by the Commissioner of Higher Education.
- 2.02 The committee is authorized to:

- 2.02.1 Resolve disputes arising out of or relating to a student who is no longer considered eligible to receive a scholarship or grant;
 - 2.02.1.1 An appeal application may be filed by a parent or guardian, or student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age, who has been notified that he or she is no longer considered eligible to receive a scholarship under this rule.
 - 2.02.1.2 An appeal application must be received by the division or postmarked no later than ten (10) calendar days after the student or the student's parent, guardian, or person standing in loco parentis to the student (hereafter "appealing party") receives a notice of scholarship ineligibility and shall be delivered or mailed to:

- 2.02.1.3 The committee may wave the deadline to file an appeal if the notice of ineligibility does not inform the petitioner of the right to appeal and the deadline to file an appeal or the petitioner makes a good faith attempt to file a timely appeal.
- 2.02.1.4 The committee shall either grant or deny an appeal filed not less than forty-five (45) days after the day the appeal is received.
- 2.02.1.5 If the committee overturns the determination of scholarship eligibility on appeal, the committee shall notify the appealing party of the basis for the board's decision.
- 2.02.2 Prescribe forms for and regulate the submission of appeals applications;
- 2.02.3 Determine eligibility of applicants;
- 2.02.4 Approve or reject appeals applications;
- 2.02.5 Manage, operate, and control all funds appropriated or otherwise contributed for this purpose;
- 2.02.6 Administer final determinations of financial aid appeals made by the committee; and

- 2.02.7 Report annually to the General Assembly the number of applications for appeals:
 - <u>2.02.7.1</u> <u>Received; and</u>
 - <u>2.02.7.2</u> <u>Approved.</u>

3.00 Eligibility for Appeals

- 3.01 The Financial Aid Appeals Committee may make appeals decisions for an applicant, with each appeal being expressly made subject to the provisions of this subsection and §6-81-1905, if the committee finds that reinstating the appealed scholarship or grant will benefit the student and finds that:
 - 3.01.1 The applicant is a bona fide resident of Arkansas;
 - 3.01.2 The applicant is enrolled or will be enrolled in a program of study at an eligible postsecondary institution;
 - 3.01.3 The applicant is currently in good standing;
 - 3.01.4 The applicant is not currently under probationary restrictions for financial aid; and
 - 3.01.5 The application for appeal is submitted within two (2) academic semesters following the initial decision.

4.00 Exclusions and Conditions

- 4.01 In the event an applicant submits an appeal on the basis of failure to maintain full-time enrollment or the necessary grade point average during a previous term, the Financial Aid Appeals Committee may approve proportionate financial aid to be awarded within one (1) semester following the term during which the applicant failed to maintain full-time enrollment or the necessary grade point average.
 - 4.01.1 Proportionate financial aid awarded following failure to maintain full-time enrollment under 5.01 of this section is limited to six (6) hours.
- 4.02 The committee shall not provide reimbursement for previous terms.

5.00 Financial Aid Appeals Committee Hearing Procedures

5.01 All persons wishing to testify before the Financial Aid Appeals Committee shall first be placed under oath by the Chairperson of the committee.

- 5.02 Each party that wishes to participate in the hearing may take up to fifteen (15) minutes to present its case, beginning with a member of the Committee and then the appealing party.
 - 5.02.1 The chair of the committee may allow the parties additional time to present their cases.
- 5.03 The committee, at its discretion, shall have the authority to require any person associated with the scholarship application to appear in person before the committee as a witness during the hearing.
 - 5.03.1 The committee may accept testimony by affidavit, declaration, deposition transcript, or hearing transcript.
- 5.04 The committee will resolve the appeal based upon the totality of evidence presented.
- 5.05 On appeal, the committee denying scholarship eligibility bears the burden of justifying its decision and must overcome that burden with a clear and convincing reason for that decision.
- 5.06 When hearing an appeal, the committee may take one of the following actions:
 - 5.06.1 Affirm denial of a scholarship eligibility by the institution;
 - 5.06.2 Overturn the institution's determination and grant the scholarship; or
 - 5.06.3 Table the petition for consideration at a future meeting.
- 5.07 The consideration of a petition under this Rule shall be conducted in an open meeting.
- 5.08 The committee shall provide a written decision to the institution and the appealing party within fourteen (14) days of announcing its decision under this section.
- 5.09 An order from the committee is immediately appealable to the circuit court, pursuant to APA.

- <u>"Teach-on a Full-time Basis" means to Tteach the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.</u>
- "Teacher Education Program" means a program administered by the Division of Higher Education that provides loan repayments to a licensed teacher who teaches in a subject area or a geographic area with teacher shortage as determined by the Division of Higher Education in consultation with the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education. A program of study that has been completed at a college or university and results in the receipt of an initial Arkansas teaching license or an additional licensure area to an existing Arkansas teaching license.

2.00 Rule 1 - Organization and Structure

- 4.01.1.2 2. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education division staff will disseminate program information through workshops, meetings, press releases, the Departmental division newsletter, and other means deemed appropriate.
- 4.01.2 B. An online application will be available at the ADHE division's website.
 - 4.01.2.1 The application deadline shall be stated on the application form each year.
 - 4.01.2.2 The ADHE division shall have the authority to extend the deadline as needed to ensure a quality applicant pool so long as sufficient public notice is provided.
- 4.01.3 C. Upon receipt by the division ADHE, applications are reviewed to ensure that all pertinent data is included.
 - 4.01.3.1 Each applicant will receive confirmation of the receipt and completeness of the application.

Total term of federal student loan repayment shall not exceed three years.

B. An additional loan repayment for federal student loans in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per year for each year a licensed minority teacher, who graduated from a teacher education program after April 2004, teaches in a public school located in a geographical area of the state designated as having a critical shortage of teachers and/or in a subject matter area designated as having a critical shortage of teachers in Arkansas.

<u>The total term of federal student loan repayment shall not exceed three years.</u>

- (A) Valid Arkansas Driver's License:
- (B) Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for previous year;
- (C) Proof of Arkansas vehicle registration;
- (D) Proof of Arkansas voter registration; and
- (E) Other forms of proof of Arkansas residency.

Award Year

The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year, and extends to June 30 of the next calendar year.

Geographical Areas of the State Designated as Having Critical Shortages of Teachers

Any Arkansas school district designated by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education as having critical teacher shortages.

Lawful Permanent Resident

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

Subject Matter Designated as Critical Needs in the State of Arkansas

Annually the Department of Education certifies subject matter shortage Arkansas areas based upon the results of surveys obtained from school districts in the state of Arkansas.

Teach on a Full time Basis

Teach the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

Teacher Education Program

A program of study that has been completed at a college or university and results in the receipt of an initial Arkansas teaching license or an additional licensure area to an existing Arkansas teaching license.

U.S. Citizen

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Teacher Opportunity Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Teacher Opportunity Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Teacher Opportunity Program rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING TEACHER OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Program Definitions

- 1.01 The following definitions are used in the Teacher Opportunity Program (TOP):
 - 1.01.1 "Academic Year" means A a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
 - 1.01.2 "Arkansas Resident" means an applicant that has been to be considered an Arkansas resident by ADHE, an applicant must be an Arkansas resident for twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline for the financial aid program.
 - 1.01.2.1 Further, the recipient may be asked to provide evidence of a permanent connection with the State of Arkansas.
 - 1.01.2.2 ADHE The Division of Higher Education will look to one or more of the following to determine residency through in those cases:
 - 1.01.2.2.1 (A) A valid Valid Arkansas Driver's License;
 - 1.01.2.2.2 (B)Proof of payment for Arkansas personal and/or real taxes for previous year;
 - 1.01.2.2.3 (C)Proof of Arkansas vehicle registration;
 - 1.01.2.2.4 (D)Proof of Arkansas voter registration; and
 - 1.01.2.2.5 (E)Other forms of proof of Arkansas residency.
 - 1.01.3 "Approved Institution" means an An Arkansas postsecondary public or private college, university, or school that is currently accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association that has a teacher licensure program where those courses are directly creditable toward teacher licensure in a baccalaureate institution.

- <u>1.01.6</u> "Dual License" means licensure Licensure to teach in more than one (1) subject area.
- 1.01.7 "Semester" means one-half (½) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the division, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
 - 1.01.7.1 Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or

- 2.01 The Arkansas Department <u>Division</u> of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Teacher Opportunity Program with the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB).
 - 2.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director Commissioner of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education division or the Director's commissioner's designee.
 - 2.01.2 The Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Department of Higher Education division regarding administration of the program.
- 2.02 Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council
 - 2.02.1 The Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council shall consist of eight members.
 - 2.02.1.1 The members will be appointed annually to serve a two-year staggered term by the Director commissioner of the division Department of Higher Education.
 - 2.02.1.2 The members of this council will consist of representatives from public and private postsecondary institutions with Teacher Education programs, public and private elementary and secondary schools, and the teacher certification division section of the Division Department of Education.
 - 2.02.2 The Director commissioner of the Department of Higher Education division or the Director's commissioner's designee shall serve as the presiding officer of the Teacher Opportunity Program Advisory Council and shall ensure that staff services for the Council are provided.
- 2.03 The final responsibility for selecting loan recipients shall rest with the Department of Higher Education division.
- 2.04 When functioning under Act 109 of 1983, Act 331 of 1987, and any subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education division shall follow the Provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

3.00 Eligibility and Criteria

- 3.01 Applicant must be bona fide residents of the State of Arkansas, as defined by the Arkansas Department Division of Higher Education, as having lived in Arkansas continually for at least twelve (12) months prior to the application deadline.
- 3.02 Applicant shall maintain a current teacher license with the Arkansas Department of Education division.
 - 3.02.1 Only individuals with a provisional license or who are in the alternative licensure program are not considered certified for the purposes of the Dual Certification Incentive Program.
- 3.03 Recipient awarded under the Dual Licensure Incentive Program must:
 - 3.03.1 Be currently employed as a classroom teacher, which includes librarian/ and media specialist, guidance counselor and administrator, in a public school in Arkansas; and
 - 3.03.2 Have been employed as a classroom teacher for at least three (3) years immediately preceding application; and
 - 3.03.3 Be accepted for enrollment in a teacher education program that will lead to licensure in a subject area that is different than the teacher's current licensure area and the subject area has either:
 - 3.03.3.1 Been declared by the Arkansas Department of Education division as a subject area with a shortage of teachers; or
 - 3.03.3.2 Is in the grade level and subject area for which the school district has requested a waiver under 6-17-309.

 - 3.03.4.1 Recipients enrolled in dissertation coursework must receive a "Pass" for the course to receive reimbursement.

 - 3.04.1 Applicant must be currently employed as a classroom teacher which includes librarian and media specialist, guidance counselor and administrator, in Arkansas and declare an intention to continue such employment in Arkansas.

RULES GOVERNING THE WASHINGTON CENTER SCHOLARSHIP

In compliance with Act 413 of 2023, the rules for the Washington Center Scholarship are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for final approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Washington Center Scholarship to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Washington Center Scholarship.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Washington Center Scholarship rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE WASHINGTON CENTER SCHOLARSHIP Effective Date:

1.00 Program Definitions

- <u>"Approved Institution" means aA</u> public-supported or private non-profit postsecondary institution with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV Federal student aid funds and will grant academic credit for participation in The Washington Center Internship Program located in Washington, D.C.
- <u>Professional Judgment. Authority of ADHE professional staff that allows for the special consideration of applications when extraordinary circumstances occur beyond the applicant's control that may prohibit the student from meeting the exact guidelines as stated.</u>
 - <u>1.02.1</u> The student must provide documentation, as required by ADHE, to demonstrate that circumstances were beyond the student's control.
- <u>1.03</u> <u>"The Washington Center" means The Washington Center the center</u> for Internships and Academic Seminars <u>which</u> is an educational nonprofit organization that provides selected students' opportunities to work and learn for academic credit.

2.00 RULE 1 - Organization and Structure

 - 3.01.5 E. The applicant must be enrolled in a program of study, which leads to or is creditable towards a baccalaureate degree.
 - 3.01.5.1 These programs include baccalaureate degree programs and associate degree programs.

4.00 **RULE 3 - Application Process**

- 4.01 **L.** Application
 - 4.01.1 Students must submit an application to The Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars and be accepted for participation in The Washington Center's internship program.

RULES GOVERNING THE LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS' DEPENDENTS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In compliance with Act 413 of 2023, the rules for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for final approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program rules be approved.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS' DEPENDENTS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

1.00 Organization and Structure

- I. 1.01 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall administer the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division or his/her his or her designee.
- H. 1.02 The final responsibility for determining eligibility of scholarship recipients shall rest with the Director of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division pursuant to the provisions of Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, and Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009 and any subsequent legislation.
- 1.03 When functioning under Act 521 of 1973, Act 47 of 1983, Act 190 of 1989, Act 153 of 1993, Act 1034 of 1999, Act 113 of 2001, Act 158 of 2001, Act 172 of 2007, Act 1217 of 2009, and any subsequent legislation, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act.

2.00 Program Definitions

- <u>2.01</u> The following definitions are used in the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program:
- 2.01.1 "Approved Institution" means a state-supported two-year or four-year college or university or technical institute located in the State of Arkansas that is accredited by the North Central Association, Commission on Higher Education Higher Learning Commission, or has achieved candidacy status, and does not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
- 2.01.2 "Dependent" means a spouse, natural child, adopted child, or step child of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state correction employees, state forestry employees, certain Arkansas Department of Transportation employees, state parks employees, teacher, or Department of Community Correction employees killed or totally and permanently disabled in the line of duty.
- <u>2.01.3</u> "Satisfactory Progress" means satisfactory academic progress toward a degree as defined by the institution.

3.00 Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

5.01 In order to be eligible for the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship, the student must be a natural child, adopted child, stepchild, or spouse of an Arkansas law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Correction employee who was killed or permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred in the performance of duty or in the course of going to or returning from a location where a hazardous situation existed. Scholarship benefits shall not accrue to the dependents if the wounds or injuries suffered by the law enforcement officer, fireman, state highway employee, state forestry employee, state correction employee, state park employee, teacher, or Department of Community Punishment employee are self-inflicted or if death is self-induced.

3.01.1 A law enforcement officer means:

- A. 3.01.1.1 Arkansas state highway patrolman, which includes any law enforcement officer, regardless of department or bureau, of the Division of Arkansas State Police;
- B. 3.01.1.2 Arkansas municipal and college or university police officers, which includes all law enforcement officers of any municipality, college, or university who are regular duty personnel on full-time status and does not include auxiliary officers or those serving on a temporary or part-time status;
- C. 3.01.1.3 Arkansas sheriff or deputy sheriff, which includes all law enforcement officers of full-time status on a regular basis serving the sheriff's department of any county located in Arkansas, but does not include deputy sheriffs who are engaged in administrative or civil duty or deputy sheriffs serving in a temporary capacity or part-time basis;
- D. 3.01.1.4 Arkansas constable, which includes all duly elected constables of any beat of any county within the State of Arkansas while actually engaged in the performance of their duties concerning the criminal laws of the county and state; and,
- E. 3.01.1.5 Arkansas game warden, which includes all appointed game wardens employed by the State of Arkansas on a full-time duty status while actually engaged in their duties concerning the game laws of this state.

3.01.2 A fireman means:

A. 3.01.2 1 Any Arkansas fireman employed on a full-time or volunteer duty status while actually engaged in the performance of his

or her duties;

3.01.3 A state highway employee means:

A. 3.01.3.1 An Arkansas Department of Transportation employee, which is defined as any employee who actively engages in highway maintenance, construction, or traffic operations on the roadways and bridges of the state highway system while the roadways and bridges are open for use by the traveling public;

<u>3.01.4</u> A state forestry employee means:

A. 3.01.4.1 An employee of the Arkansas Forestry Commission who is actively engaged in his or her duties of fighting forest fires;

<u>3.01.5</u> A state correction employee means:

A. 3.01.5.1 Any employee of the Arkansas Division of Correction or the Arkansas Correctional School District who becomes subject to injury through contact with inmates or parolees of the Division of Correction:

3.01.6 A state park employee means:

A. 3.01.6.1 Any employee of the Arkansas Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism who is a commissioned law enforcement officer or emergency response employee while actively engaged in the performance of his or her duties;

3.01.7 A teacher means:

A. 3.01.7.1 Any person employed by an Arkansas public school for the purpose of giving instructions and whose employment requires state certification; and

3.01.8 A Department of Community Correction employee means:

- A. 3.01.8.1 Any employee of the Arkansas Department of Community Correction who suffers fatal injuries or wounds or becomes permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries or wounds which occurred through contact with parolees, probationers, or center residents.
- H. 3.02 To be eligible to receive the Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship, the applicant must be:
 - A. 3.02.1 A child must have been born prior to the date of the death or total and

permanent disability (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);

- B. 3.02.2 An adopted child must have been adopted prior to or the adoption process must have begun prior to the date of the death or total and permanent disability (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I);
- C. 3.02.3 A stepchild must have been listed as a dependent on the federal and state income tax returns in each of the five (5) income tax years immediately prior to the death or total and permanent disability and must have received more than one-half (1/2) his or her financial support (See "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section I)
- D. 3.02.4 Enrolled or accepted for enrollment as an undergraduate student in any Arkansas state-supported college, university or technical institute;
- E. 3.02.5 Less than twenty-three (23) years old on or before the first day of the semester or quarter, unless the applicant is a spouse; and,
- F. 3.02.6 A bona fide resident of Arkansas, as defined by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education, for at least six (6) months prior to enrollment in an Arkansas institution.

III. 3.03 Continued Eligibility

- 3.03.1 The scholarship will be awarded for one academic year and renewed annually up to three years (for a total of 8 semesters) so long as the student maintains a minimum of a 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and satisfactory progress toward a degree as defined by the institution.
- 3.03.2 For purposes of scholarship payments, "academic semester" includes summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.
- IV. 3.04 The spouse will not be eligible for the educational benefits if he or she re-marries. The benefits will cease at the end of the semester in which the spouse is currently enrolled at the time of the marriage.

4.00 Application Process

- <u>4.01</u> Applications
 - A. 4.01.1 Applications and brochures regarding the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship are mailed to the following:
 - 4.01.1.1 Counselors and principals at all public and private high schools in the State; and,

- 2. 4.01.1.2 Financial aid officers at all public colleges, universities, and public technical institutes in the state. The institutional financial aid officer is responsible for ensuring that eligible students at their institution are made aware of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and its benefits.
- B. 4.01.2 Applications will be made available online from the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

H. 4.02 Submission of Applications

- A. 4.02.1 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application.
- B. 4.02.2 Scholarship applicants shall submit to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division the following:
 - 4. <u>4.02.2.1</u> The Law Enforcement Officer's Dependents Scholarship Application;
 - 2. 4.02.2.2 Documentation in the form of a Death Certificate;
 - 3. 4.02.2.3 Order & Finding of Facts from the Arkansas State Claims Commission;
 - 4. 4.02.2.4 A copy of birth certificate, if a dependent child; and,
 - 5. <u>4.02.2.5</u> A copy of their marriage license, if a spouse.
- C. 4.02.3 The applicant must apply for the scholarship prior to the published deadline in order to receive the scholarship. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application.

5.00 Award Process

- I. 5.01 Applications and supporting documentation will be reviewed for completeness and to determine whether the applicant meets all the required eligibility requirements. Applicants will be notified within thirty (30) days of receipt of all required documentation of the status of their application.
- H. <u>5.02</u> Eligible students will receive an award notice that contains the conditions of the award, the requirements for continued eligibility, an explanation of the benefits, and the student's responsibilities.
- III. 5.03 The institution will also receive an award notice that contains the student's name and social security number, the award limits, the conditions of the award, the

- verification process, and the payment process. The institution will be asked to complete a Reimbursement Form listing all charges covered by this program.
- IV. 5.04 The institution will be responsible for verifying the student's continuing eligibility each semester.
- V. <u>5.05</u> The award will be renewed annually as long as the student satisfies the continued eligibility requirements as "Scholarship Eligibility Criteria," Section V.

6.00 Scholarship Payment Policies

- 4. 6.01 A recipient may receive up to eight (8) semesters of tuition and fee waivers from the scholarship program. Payment to the scholarship recipient will be in the form of a tuition and fee waiver at the recipient's institution. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education will reimburse the institution upon verification of enrollment after the 11th day of classes each semester for approved charges.
- H. 6.02 The scholarship will pay the cost of tuition at the in-state rate and room in school-owned housing at any state-supported college, university or technical institute within the State of Arkansas. It does not include the cost of the following:
 - A. 6.02.1 Books
 - B. 6.02.2 Food
 - C. 6.02.3 School supplies and materials
 - D. 6.02.4 Dues and fees for extracurricular activities
- III. 6.03 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division will pay the institution for tuition and fees covered by this program at the beginning of each term upon receipt of the Reimbursement Form and verification of the charges.

A. Transfer Policy

6.03.1 A recipient who has received a Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship may transfer to another eligible institution provided the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division receives written notification of the change of status by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.

B. Withdrawal Policy

6.03.2 Recipients may withdraw from the Law Enforcement Officers'
Dependents Scholarship Program upon written notification to, and approval by, the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division. The

petition shall give the reason for withdrawal and shall be supported with documentation.

C. Revocation Policy

<u>6.03.3</u> The award will be revoked if the recipient fails to:

- 4. 6.03.3.1 Enroll in an eligible Arkansas institution;
- 2. 6.03.3.2 Notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, in writing, of transfer to another eligible institution by October 1 for the Fall term, February 1 for the Winter and/or Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms; or,
- 3. 6.03.3.3 Petition the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division, in writing, for withdrawal from an institution by October 1 for the Fall Term, February 1 for the Winter/Spring Terms, and May 1 for the Summer Terms.
- 4. 6.03.3.4 Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 per academic year.
- 6.03.4 At the discretion of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education

 Division, the award will not be revoked if the ADHE division

 determines that extraordinary circumstances prevented the student from notifying ADHE division by the required dates.

D. Military Service

6.03.5 Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces Reserves units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit training and are unable to complete the current term will not be penalized. They will be placed on deferred status until six (6) months after release from active duty.

7.00 Institutional Responsibilities

- I. 7.01 Administrative Agreement
 - 7.02 The chief executive officer of the state-supported institution of higher education or technical institute is responsible for appointing one representative from the Financial Aid Office to act as administrator of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program and to receive all communications and forms issued by the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education. This representative is responsible for completing all forms, verification of data, and complying with all program rules and regulations.

7.03 The institution must comply with the following responsibilities in order to maintain continued eligibility status:

A. Verification

The institution shall provide verification to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division at the close of each term concerning the student's continuing eligibility. This is accomplished using the Verification Form issued by the division. Reimbursement to the institution will be made after the institution has completed the Verification Form and the Reimbursement Form and returned them to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

B. Identification of Eligible Students

7.05 Institutions will be responsible for publicizing the program and identifying students eligible for the program. Reimbursement can only be made for the year in which the student is currently enrolled and has made application. Applications made after May 1 of the academic year in which the student is enrolled will not be considered and the student will not be eligible for the scholarship.

C. Disbursement Records

7.06 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of these funds.

D. Deadline for Disbursement of Funds

7.07 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to ADHE division.

E. Refund Policy

- 7.08 It is the institution's responsibility to notify ADHE division of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount. This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to ADHE division.
- F. 7.09 Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls. The institution must follow ADHE division policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

G. Due Diligence

7.10 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division on any scholarship recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

8.00 Recipient Responsibilities

- 4. 8.01 The recipient must notify the Arkansas Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status within 30 days. This includes changes in:
 - A. <u>8.01.1</u> Name;
 - B. <u>8.01.2</u> Address;
 - $\frac{\text{C.}}{\text{8.01.3}}$ Institution; and/or,
 - D. 8.01.4 Withdrawal from an institution.
 - <u>8.02</u> Failure to notify the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> division of a change in status may affect future eligibility.
- H. 8.03 It is also the recipient's responsibility to be knowledgeable of the rules and regulations of the Law Enforcement Officers' Dependents Scholarship Program.

RULES GOVERNING THE OSTEOPATHIC RURAL MEDICAL PRACTICE STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP BOARD

In compliance with Act 857 of 2019 and Act 725 of 2023, the rules for the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE OSTEOPATHIC RURAL MEDICAL PRACTICE STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP BOARD

Effective Date:

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Medically Underserved Community" means an area in Arkansas that the
 Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board
 determines has unmet needs for medical services due to factors, including without limitation:
 - 1.01.1 The ratio of primary care physicians to population;
 - 1.01.2 The infant mortality rate;
 - 1.01.3 The percentage of:
 - 1.01.3.1 Population with incomes below the federal poverty level, as it existed on January 1, 2019;
 - 1.01.3.2 Resident individuals sixty (60) years of age and older; and
 - 1.01.3.3 Physicians sixty (60) years of age and older;
 - 1.01.4 Accessibility within the area to primary care medicine; and
 - 1.01.5 Other relevant criteria the board may deem necessary for a determination of unmet needs for medical services.
- 1.02 "Primary Care Medicine" means health care provided in one (1) of the following areas of practice:
 - 1.02.1 Family medicine;
 - 1.02.2 General internal medicine;
 - 1.02.3 General internal medicine and pediatrics;
 - 1.02.4 General pediatrics;
 - 1.02.5 General obstetrics and gynecology;
 - 1.02.6 General surgery;

- 1.02.7 Emergency medicine; and
- 1.02.8 Geriatrics.
- 1.03 "Qualified rural community" means an area:
 - 1.03.1 With a population below twenty thousand (20,000) according to the most recent federal census;
 - 1.03.2 That is at least twenty (20) miles from a city or town with a population of more than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the most recent federal census; and
 - 1.03.3 That is reasonably determined by the board to be medically underserved.

2.00 DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD

- 2.01 The Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board shall administer the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Program and the Community Match Rural Physician Recruitment Program and shall consist of six (6) members, including:
 - 2.01.1 One (1) member appointed by the Governor after consultation with each medical school in Arkansas that is not the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences;
 - 2.01.2 One (1) member appointed by the Governor after consultation with the Arkansas Osteopathic Medical Association, who shall serve as vice chair;
 - 2.01.3 Two (2) physician members appointed by the Governor after consultation with the Arkansas Osteopathic Medical Association, giving preference to physicians who have received:
 - 2.01.3.1 Osteopathic rural medical practice loans;
 - 2.01.3.2 <u>Community match loans; or</u>
 - 2.01.3.3 Income incentives; and
 - 2.01.4 Two (2) representatives appointed by the Governor after consultation with the Arkansas Hospital Association, Inc.
- 2.02 Members of the board shall:
 - 2.02.1 Serve a term of three (3) years;

- 2.02.2 Not serve more than two (2) consecutive terms; and
- 2.02.3 Except as provided under 2.05.9, shall serve without compensation.
- 2.03 The board shall:
 - 2.03.1 Prescribe forms for, and regulate the submission of, loan applications;
 - 2.03.2 Determine eligibility of applicants;
 - 2.03.3 Allow or disallow loan or income incentive applications;
 - 2.03.4 Contract, increase, decrease, terminate, and otherwise regulate:
 - 2.03.4.1 All loan and income incentive disbursements;
 - 2.03.4.2 Receipts for their repayment; and
 - 2.03.4.3 Convert loans to scholarships or grants, as applicable;
 - 2.03.5 Manage, operate, and control all funds and property appropriated or otherwise contributed;
 - 2.03.6 Accept gifts, grants, bequests, or devises and apply them as a part of the loan and scholarship program;
 - 2.03.7 Sue and be sued as the board; and
 - 2.03.8 Accept monies from federal programs that may be used for furtherance of the purposes of this rule.
- 2.04 The members of the board may receive expense reimbursement and stipends in accordance with § 25-16-901 et seq.
- 2.05 The board shall examine all osteopathic rural medical practice loan applications to determine whether the applicant needs a loan to advance his or her medical education.
 - 2.05.1 To determine whether an applicant needs a loan to advance his or her medical education, the board shall investigate:
 - 2.05.1.1 Ability, character, and qualifications of the applicant; and
 - 2.05.1.2 Financial standing of the applicant or his or her parents.

- 2.06 The board shall make an annual report to the Governor concerning the activities of the board and shall file a copy of its report with the Legislative Council.
 - 2.06.1 The report shall include:
 - <u>2.06.1.1</u> The names of the recipients of the loans;
 - 2.06.1.2 The amount of each loan;
 - 2.06.1.3 An accounting of the funds granted, on hand, and expended for necessary expenses;
 - 2.06.1.4 The total amount of funds received during the year from gifts, federal grants, bequests, and devises; and
 - 2.06.1.5 The amount of loans which, during the year, become scholarships through compliance with the conditions of the loan contracts.
 - 2.06.2 This report shall include the names and addresses, and amount of loans to each person, of those recipients who are in default of repayment obligations.

3.00 OSTEOPATHIC RURAL MEDICAL PRACTICE STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM ADMINISTRATOR

- 3.01 The Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Program administrator shall:
 - 3.01.1 Be employed by the Division of Higher Education;
 - 3.01.2 Serve as liaison between loan recipients and rural communities by:
 - 3.01.2.1 Working with the communities to:
 - 3.01.2.1.1 Identify their unique needs;
 - 3.01.2.1.2 Develop profiles of their ideal candidates; and
 - 3.01.2.1.3 Prepare for recruitment visits;
 - 3.01.2.2 Assisting medical students and residents to:
 - 3.01.2.2.1 <u>Identify medically underserved and other rural</u> communities that suit their personal and medical practice needs; and

3.01.2.2.2 Meet their contractual obligations;

- 3.01.3 Collect and monitor student loan and scholarship program data, including:
 - <u>3.01.3.1</u> <u>Demographic data of participants and communities;</u>
 - 3.01.3.2 Service completion rates;
 - 3.01.3.3 Retention rates beyond service completion;
 - 3.01.3.4 Satisfaction of obligated physicians and communities; and
 - 3.01.3.5 Other relevant information;
- 3.01.4 Prepare annual program evaluations and present the evaluations to the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board;
- 3.01.5 Assist with preparation and submission of program reports;
- 3.01.6 Attend board meetings in a nonvoting capacity; and
- 3.01.7 Perform other functions assigned by the board.

4.00 LOAN APPLICATIONS

- 4.01 An individual may apply for a loan through the Scholarship Application

 Management System, which will then be reviewed by the Osteopathic Rural

 Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board, if the individual is:
 - 4.01.1 Accepted for admission to, or enrolled in good standing in, in studies at an Arkansas medical school that lead to the degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine;
 - 4.01.2 A person of good moral character that has the talent and capacity to profit by medical studies;
 - 4.01.2.1 The qualified rural community does not have to be determined at the time of application but instead at the completion of residency training.
 - 4.01.3 In need of financial assistance to complete their medical studies through a "medically underserved and rural practice curriculum"; and
 - 4.01.4 A bona fide resident of Arkansas.

- 4.02 A graduate of an accredited osteopathic medical school in the United States may apply for the community match income incentive program so long as the applicant satisfies the criteria set forth in section 8 of these rules.
- 4.03 The osteopathic rural medical practice loans are solely for paying the applicant's tuition, maintenance, educational, and necessary living expenses of his or her dependents while the applicant is enrolled in the program pursuant to these rules.
- 4.04 The board may make osteopathic rural medical practice loans to the applicant, subject to the provisions of 4.08 and 5.03, if the board finds that the applicant:
 - 4.04.1 <u>Is a bona fide resident of Arkansas</u>;
 - 4.04.2 Has been accepted for admission to or is enrolled in good standing in studies that lead to the degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine;
 - 4.04.3 Is enrolled in a medically underserved and rural practice curriculum;
 - 4.04.4 Needs financial assistance to complete his or her medical studies;
 - 4.04.5 Desires to practice medicine in an eligible qualified rural community; and
 - 4.04.6 Has good moral character, talent, and capacity to profit by medical studies.
- 4.05 Subject to the availability of funds, an initial osteopathic rural medical practice loan for one (1) academic year shall:
 - 4.05.1 Be renewable annually for the number of years required to complete studies leading to the Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine degree; or
 - 4.05.2 For additional amounts, not to exceed the maximum amounts specified in 4.06; but
 - 4.05.3 All subsequent osteopathic rural medical practice loans shall be granted only upon application by recipient and finding by the board that applicant:
 - 4.05.3.1 Has completed successfully the medical studies of the preceding academic year and remains in good standing as an enrolled student in the college;
 - 4.05.3.2 <u>Is enrolled or participating in a medically underserved and rural practice curriculum;</u>
 - 4.05.3.3 Continues to be a resident of Arkansas; and
 - 4.05.3.4 Continues to warrant financial assistance.

- 4.06 The maximum amount of each osteopathic rural medical practice loan for osteopathic medical students is \$12,000 per academic year or \$6,000 per academic semester, or those costs that are reasonable and necessary for the student's attendance as determined by the board.
- 4.07 The maximum amount of each community match income incentive shall not exceed eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) or as the board otherwise shall determine payable under 9.02 of these rules.
 - 4.07.1 The board shall provide fifty percent (50%) of the community match income incentive, and the qualified rural community shall provide the other fifty percent (50%) of the income incentive.
 - 4.07.2 However, if the board does not have sufficient funds to match the community's portion of the income incentive, nothing precludes a qualified rural community from providing the total income incentive amount.
- 4.08 All payments for osteopathic rural practice loans and community match loans shall be made on requisitions signed by the Chair of the board, drawn against the funds held for purposes of these rules.
 - 4.08.1 The following funds shall be held in trust and disbursed by the fiscal officers of a medical school in Arkansas, that is not the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences:
 - 4.08.1.1 State appropriations so designated;
 - 4.08.1.2 Revolving amounts received from repayment of loans and interest; and
 - 4.08.1.3 All funds, property, and income received by the board under its authority to accept and apply gifts, bequests, and devises for the aforesaid purposes.
 - 4.08.2 Funds collected because of a recipient's breach of an osteopathic rural practice loan contract or community match loan contract shall be:
 - 4.08.2.1 Held in trust for either the use of the Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Program;
 - 4.08.2.2 The Community Match Rural Physician Recruitment Program;
 - 4.08.2.3 Or any other use otherwise deemed appropriate by the board in its discretion; and

4.08.2.4 <u>Disbursed by the fiscal officer of an osteopathic medical school</u> in Arkansas pursuant to these rules.

5.00 LOAN CONTRACTS — OBLIGATIONS AND CONDITIONS

- 5.01 The Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board shall enter into a loan contract with each osteopathic rural medical practice loan recipient.
- 5.02 Contracts shall be approved by the Attorney General and shall be:
 - 5.02.1 Signed by the Chair of the board;
 - 5.02.2 Countersigned by the Secretary of the board; and
 - 5.02.3 Signed by the applicant.
- 5.03 Each applicant receiving an osteopathic rural medical practice loan granted by the board shall execute a written loan contract that incorporates the following obligations and conditions:
 - 5.03.1 The recipient shall agree to practice primary care medicine full time in a qualified rural community upon completion of:
 - 5.03.1.1 Medical internship of one (1) year undertaken immediately following earning a degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine;
 - 5.03.1.2 Four (4) additional years of medical training beyond the internship if:
 - 5.03.1.2.1 The training has been approved in advance by the board; and
 - 5.03.1.2.2 <u>Includes practice experience in a rural community; or</u>
 - 5.03.1.3 At the request of the loan recipient, the board may approve practice in more than one (1) qualified rural community to meet the obligation to practice full time.
 - 5.03.1.3.1 This requires a board determination that either:
 - 5.03.1.3.1.1 Physician need in rural communities cannot sustain a full-time medical practice; or
 - 5.03.1.3.1.2 Other compelling circumstances exist.

- 5.03.2 The recipient of a loan shall agree that for each year's loan that he or she shall practice medicine in accordance with 5.03.1 for a whole year.
- 5.03.3 For each continuous whole year of medical practice, subject to reasonable leave periods, including without limitation vacation, sick leave, continuing medical education, jury duty, funerals, holidays, or military service, the board shall cancel, by converting to a scholarship grant, the full amount of one (1) year's loan plus accrued interest;
 - 5.03.3.1 Loans made for subsequent years will be converted in like manner, one year of service for each year of assistance until the loan obligation is retired.
 - 5.03.3.2 Requests for deferment of payment must be approved by the board on an annual basis, however, allowance is made for involuntary military service.
- 5.04 The recipient of an osteopathic rural medical practice loan or loans shall agree that not engaging in the practice of medicine in accordance with these rules may result in suspension of his or her license to practice medicine in this state.
 - 5.04.1 The recipient's medical license may not be suspended unless:
 - 5.04.1.1 Recipient's contract contained a specific term that loss of license was a consequence of breach; and
 - 5.04.1.2 Recipient signed a written acknowledgment that the suspension of license was explained orally as a potential consequence of breaching the contractual provisions.
 - 5.04.2 The suspension may be for a period of years equivalent to the number of years recipient is obligated to practice medicine in a rural area, but has not so practiced, and until the loan with interest together with any civil money penalties, as reduced by each full year of medical practice according to the terms of the loan contract, is paid in full;
- 5.05 Any communication from a medical school in Arkansas, that is not the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, with any state medical licensing board shall include a notation that:
 - 5.05.1 The recipient of an osteopathic rural medical practice loan has a contract with Arkansas to practice medicine in a rural community; and
 - 5.05.2 Breach of contract may result in suspension of recipient's Arkansas medical license;

- 5.06 If any loan recipient does not engage in the practice of medicine in accordance with the terms of this rule and recipient's loan contract to have the loan contract recognized as a scholarship, the recipient shall remain obligated to repay the loan or loans received, together with interest at the maximum rate allowed by Arkansas law or the federal discount rate plus five percent (5%) per annum, whichever is the lesser, the interest to accrue from the date each payment of funds was received by the recipient.
 - 5.06.1 Neither interest nor the obligation to repay the principal sums accrued shall accrue during any one (1) period of time that the recipient involuntarily serves on active duty in the United States Armed Forces.
 - 5.06.2 Repayment of principal with interest shall be due and payable in full at the earliest to occur of the following events:
 - 5.06.2.1 Failure to remain enrolled in a medically underserved and rural practice curriculum;
 - 5.06.2.2 Failure to remain in enrollment status continuously to completion of the degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine for any reason other than temporary personal illness;
 - <u>5.06.2.3</u> Failure to complete the internship;
 - 5.06.2.4 Failure to engage in the full-time practice of medicine while residing in a qualified rural community;
 - 5.06.2.4.1 However, the board may waive the residency requirement on a case-by-case basis; and
 - 5.06.2.5 Failure to establish a practice as required in this rule within six (6) months following either internship or four (4) additional years of medical education that includes practice experience in a rural community.
 - 5.06.3 In the event of the death of the recipient, the entire loan amount that has not been converted to a scholarship grant pursuant to the terms of the loan contract shall be due and payable.
- 5.07 Medical school alternate's contracts shall contain an additional term that breach of the contract may result in civil money penalties in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the loan amount if:
 - 5.07.1 An alternate on the waiting list for acceptance to an osteopathic medical school in Arkansas enters into an osteopathic rural medical practice

- program contract conditioned only upon the applicant's being accepted for admission to the college;
- 5.07.2 The alternate otherwise meets the requirements of this rule; and
- 5.07.3 The applicant is moved to the top of the waiting list pursuant to section 9.
 - 5.07.3.1 This shall not prohibit the board from considering and entering a negotiated settlement with the loan recipient involving:
 - 5.07.3.1.1 The license suspension;
 - 5.07.3.1.2 The amount of the civil money penalty; and
 - 5.07.3.1.3 The terms of repayment of the loan.
- 5.08 The board may amend agreements entered into with any loan recipient at any time prior to full performance of the recipient's contractual obligations.
 - 5.08.1 A loan recipient may apply to an osteopathic medical school in Arkansas for a waiver of the contractual provisions set forth in 5.04.
 - 5.08.1.1 If the osteopathic medical school determines that exigent circumstances warrant a waiver, the loan recipient shall be notified in writing.
 - 5.08.1.2 The osteopathic medical school in Arkansas shall immediately notify the State Medical Board of such a determination.

6.00 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- 6.01 The following may appeal any decision or action by the Osteopathic Rural
 Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board relating to the application
 for a loan or income incentive or relating to a loan or income incentive granted by
 the board under the dispute resolution procedure:
 - 6.01.1 Any applicant for a loan or income incentive issued by the board;
 - 6.01.2 Any person who has been granted a loan or has been granted income incentives by the board; or
 - 6.01.3 Any party to an osteopathic rural medical practice or community match loan or income incentive established under these rules.
- 6.02 The board shall establish and follow procedures, as required per § 6-81-1803(b)(1), used by a loan or income incentive recipient, the board, or a qualified

rural community, to resolve any dispute arising out of or relating to an osteopathic rural medical practice or community match loan or income incentive contract, including the validity or interpretation of a contract term, contract enforcement or defenses, the occurrence of an event of default or breach, loan repayment, the assessment or imposition of contract damages or civil money penalties, or other related disputes.

- 6.03 The dispute resolution procedure established by the board shall be followed before the initiation of any litigation related to:
 - 6.03.1 An osteopathic rural medical practice or community match loan; or
 - 6.03.2 Income incentive contract.
- 6.04 These rules do not prohibit informal disposition by:
 - 6.04.1 Stipulation;
 - 6.04.2 Settlement; or
 - 6.04.3 Consent.

7.00 COMMUNITY MATCH CONTRACTS—ELIGIBILITY

- 7.01 The Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board shall administer the Community Match Rural Physician Recruitment Program.
 - 7.01.1 <u>Interested rural communities may apply to the board to participate in the program as a qualified rural community.</u>
 - 7.01.2 The board shall approve a designated representative of the qualified rural community to assist the board in matters relating to any community match contracts entered into by the board and the qualified rural community.
- 7.02 The board, in conjunction with a qualified rural community, may grant community match income incentives to applicants, each incentive being expressly made subject to section 8 of these rules, if it finds that:
 - 7.02.1 The applicant is a graduate of:
 - 7.02.1.1 An accredited osteopathic medical school in the United States; or
 - 7.02.1.2 A foreign medical school if the applicant:

- 7.02.1.2.1 Was a resident of Arkansas and citizen of the United States prior to enrollment in foreign medical school; and
- 7.02.1.2.2 Has been licensed by the State Medical Board;
- 7.02.2 The applicant satisfies one (1) of the following criteria:
 - 7.02.2.1 Enrollment in a residency or other training program in an area of primary care medicine; or
 - 7.02.2.2 No more than two (2) years before the date of the application, he or she completed a residency or other training program in an area of primary care medicine;
- 7.02.3 The applicant desires to practice medicine in the qualified rural community; and
- 7.02.4 The designated representative approve the applicant.

8.00 COMMUNITY MATCH CONTRACTS—OBLIGATIONS & CONDITIONS

- 8.01 The Osteopathic Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board and the qualified rural community shall enter a joint community match income incentive contract with the applicant.
 - 8.01.1 The community match contract shall be approved by the Attorney General and signed by the following:
 - 8.01.1.1 The Chair of the board;
 - 8.01.1.2 The Secretary of the board;
 - 8.01.1.3 The designated representative of the qualified rural community; and
 - 8.01.1.4 The applicant.
- 8.02 Each applicant granted a community match income incentive by the board shall execute a written contract incorporating the following obligations and conditions:
 - 8.02.1 The recipient agrees to practice primary care medicine full time in the contracting qualified rural community for a period of four (4) years.

- 8.02.1.1 The recipient shall receive the community match funds according to a disbursement schedule acceptable to the board, the qualified rural community, and the recipient to the contract.
- 8.02.1.2 For each three-month period of full-time medical practice by the recipient, according to the terms of the contract, the board and the qualified rural community shall award one-fourth (1/4) of the income incentive for the year of service;
- 8.02.2 If any recipient does not begin, or ceases the full-time practice of medicine in breach of contract, or otherwise breaches the contract, the recipient shall pay:
 - 8.02.2.1 Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for each uncompleted full year of the four-year contract term; and
 - 8.02.2.2 Any civil money penalties that apply.
 - 8.02.2.2.1 The board may impose civil money penalties of up to fifty percent (50%) of the principal amount of the income incentive under the terms of the contract because of breach; and
- 8.02.3 Neither interest nor the obligation to repay the principal sums accrued shall accrue during any one (1) period of time that the recipient involuntarily serves on active duty in the United States Armed Forces.
- 8.03 Section 8.02 of this rule does not prohibit the board from considering and entering into a negotiated settlement with the recipient involving the terms of repayment of amounts paid under the terms of the contract.
- 8.04 Contracts may be amended at any time before the income incentive has been paid in full or terms and conditions of the contract are satisfied.

- 9.01 If an alternate on the waiting list for acceptance to an osteopathic medical school in Arkansas demonstrates a willingness to enter into an osteopathic rural medical practice loan contract and meets the requirements of 4.04, the applicant shall be moved to the top of the waiting list upon entering into an osteopathic rural medical practice student loan contract.
 - 9.01.1 The priority on the waiting list for an alternate who enters into a loan contract shall be determined by the date and time such an alternate enters into the contract.

- 9.02 An osteopathic medical school in Arkansas shall:
 - 9.02.1 Track graduates who were recipients of loans under this rule for the length of their contractual obligations; and
 - 9.02.2 Report to the Legislative Council by October 1 of each even-numbered year regarding the compliance of those graduates with the terms of their contracts.

RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS GEOGRAPHICAL CRITICAL NEEDS MINORITY TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In compliance with Act 413 of 2023, the rules for the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS GEOGRAPHICAL CRITICAL NEEDS MINORITY TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Effective Date:

1.00 Program Definitions

The following definitions are used in the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program:

- 1.01 "Academic Year" means aA measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as two semesters, two trimesters, or three quarters.
- <u>"Approved Institution" means Aan</u> Arkansas postsecondary public or private college or university school that is currently accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association that has a teacher education program or a regionally accredited two-year Arkansas institution where those courses are directly creditable toward teacher education in a baccalaureate institution.
 - 1.02.1 The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws.
 - 1.02.2 The institution must have a signed administrative agreement with ADHE Division of Higher Education.
- <u>1.03</u> "Award Year" means <u>Tthe award year begins beginning</u> on July 1 of one calendar year and ends ending on June 30 of the next calendar year.
- 1.04 "Cancellation" means the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff UAPB shall cancel a recipient's repayment obligation if it determines:
 - 1.04.1 On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death.
 - 1.04.1.1 UAPB The university reserves the right to require a second opinion by an UAPB university approved physician; or
 - 1.04.1.2 On the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient is deceased.

- 1.05 <u>"Default" means</u> F<u>failure</u> to repay the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher S<u>s</u>cholarship in accordance with the terms of the promissory note provided that this failure persists for 180 days for monthly payments.
- 1.06 "Deferment" means This is a postponement of repayments and the accrual of interest. UAPB The university shall not consider that the recipient has violated the repayment schedule if he or she does not meet the payments during the time he or she is in deferment status.
- <u>"Delta Region" means Tthe following 42 counties of Arkansas are designated as being in the Delta Region: Arkansas, Ashley, Baxter, Bradley, Calhoun, Chicot, Clay, Cleveland, Craighead, Crittenden, Cross, Dallas, Desha, Drew, Fulton, Grant, Greene, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Lee, Lincoln, Lonoke, Marion, Mississippi, Monroe, Ouachita, Phillips, Poinsett, Prairie, Pulaski, Randolph, St. Francis, Searcy, Sharp, Stone, Union, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff. (Information obtained from the Delta Foundation in Mississippi.)</u>
- 1.08 <u>"Due Diligence" means This process refers to those steps UAPB the university</u> takes to collect Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship funds when a recipient enters repayment status.

<u>1.08.1</u> It includes:

- 1.08.1.1 Bbilling the recipient,
- 1.08.1.2 Seending overdue notices,
- <u>1.08.1.3</u> <u>Ceonducting address searches if the recipient cannot be located,</u>
- <u>1.08.1.4</u> <u>Rreporting the account to credit bureaus, collection, and</u>
- <u>1.08.1.5</u> <u>L</u>litigation.
- 1.08.2 Due diligence also includes keeping the recipient informed of all changes in the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher

 Sscholarship that affect his or her rights and responsibilities and responding promptly to the recipient's inquiries.
- 1.09 <u>"Full-time Student" means A a</u> student enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.
- <u>"Grace Period" means A-a</u> nine-month period of time following graduation and before the recipient must either take employment in a public school in Arkansas or begin repayment of the scholarship.

- 1.11 "Minority" means Ppersons who are Black Americans, Hispanic Americans, Asian Americans, and Native Americans which group includes all persons having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- 1.12 <u>"Part-time Student" means aA</u> student enrolled in at least 6 semester credit hours of the equivalent, but less than 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.
- 1.13 <u>"Permanent Resident Alien" means Aan individual who can provide</u> documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident.
 - 1.13.1 Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence".
 - 1.13.2 A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.
- <u>1.14</u> <u>"Promissory Note" The promissory note is means a legal document obligating the recipient to repay the loan if he or she does not teach one year for each year of scholarship assistance received.</u>
 - 1.14.1 The recipient must <u>be</u> licensed to teach in a public school district in a geographical area of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the Department of Education.
 - 1.14.2 The recipient's rights and responsibilities will be stated on the promissory note.
- 1.15 <u>"Satisfactory Academic Progress"</u> Satisfactory academic progress is maintained if the recipient has a minimum grade point average of:
 - 1.15.1 2.75 on a 4.0 scale if attending an approved two-year institution; or
 - 1.15.2 3.0 on a 4.0 scale if attending an approved four-year institution.
- 1.16 "Skip <u>Tracing</u>" means a A process for locating a recipient that is in repayment status.
 - <u>1.16.1</u> The university's <u>UAPB's</u> efforts may include contacting relatives, friends, references, and other individuals or entities in the recipient's file.
- 1.17 <u>"Teach on a Full-time Basis" means Tteaching</u> the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or

- agency at which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.
- <u>"U.S. Citizen-or National"</u> The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory Palau.
- 1.19 <u>"U.S. National"</u> The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

2.00 RULE 1 - Organization and Structure

- 2.01 Let The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) shall administer the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program.
 - 2.01.1 The purpose of the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program this scholarship program is to attract qualified minority teachers to the Delta and those geographical areas of this state where there exists a critical shortage of teachers by awarding full scholarships to minorities declaring an intention to serve in the teaching field who actually render service to this state while possessing an appropriate teaching license.
- 2.02 H. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university or his/her designee.
- 2.03 III. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.

3.00 RULE 2 - Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

- 3.01 L. Applicants must meet the following requirements to be eligible to receive the Arkansas Geographical Critical Need Minority Teacher Scholarship:
 - 3.01.1 A. Be African-American, Hispanic-American, Asian-American or Native American, which group includes all persons having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
 - 3.01.2 B. Be enrolled in or accepted for enrollment at a baccalaureate degree-granting institution of higher education whose teacher education program is approved by the State Board of Education or at an accredited state-supported community college in the State of Arkansas.
 - 3.01.3 C. Be either full-time or part-time.

- 3.01.4 D. Agree, in writing, of an intention to teach in the Delta or a geographical area of the state in which there exists a critical shortage of teachers, as designated by the state board State Board of Education for a term of:
 - 3.01.4.1 At least two (2) years of service as a licensed teacher if he or she received four (4) annual awards, or the equivalent of four (4) annual awards; or
 - At least one (1) school semester of service as a licensed teacher, for each year that the person received a full-time student scholarship, or for the number of academic hours equivalent to one (1) school year, as determined by the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, for which a part-time student received a scholarship, if he or she received fewer than four (4) annual awards, or the equivalent of four (4) annual awards.
- 3.01.5 E. Have successfully completed the core curriculum established by the State Board of Education state board and the Arkansas-Higher Education Coordinating Board.
 - 3.01.5.1 Applicants who have not completed the core curriculum due to unavailability of the courses in the applicant's high school, shall have a grace period of twelve (12) months from the date of high school graduation in which to make up any course deficiencies.
- 3.01.6 F. Have a 2.75 on a 4.0 scale in the core curriculum courses if attending an approved two-year institution or 3.0 on a 4.0 scale in the core curriculum courses if attending an approved four-year institution.
- 3.01.7 G. Have scored nineteen (19) or above on the ACT composite or the equivalent as defined by the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university.
- 3.01.8 H. Be a citizen of the United States or permanent resident alien.
- 3.02 II. Continued Eligibility Requirements:
 - 3.02.1 The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university will renew awards for succeeding years to recipients who:
 - 3.02.1.1 Ceontinue to meet the criteria set forth in subsections 3.01.1 through 3.01.8 Rule 2, Paragraphs I, A-H; and

3.02.1.2 Wwho complete at least 24 semester credit hours (or the equivalent) unless they are a part-time student.

4.00 RULE 3 - Selection Process

- 4.01 L. Application
 - 4.01.1 Students must submit an application to the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.
 - 4.01.1.1 Applications will be mailed to Education Departments, financial aid directors, Deans of Colleges of Education, and Teacher Certification Officials at all public and independent 2-year and 4-year institutions in the State of Arkansas.
 - 4.01.1.2 Applications may also be obtained from the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, university's School of Education upon request.
- 4.02 H. Deadline for Applications
 - 4.02.1 The application deadline will be established by the <u>university</u> of Arkansas at Pine Bluff and the Department of Education and announced to each participating institution when applications are distributed.
- 4.03 III. Review of Applications
 - 4.03.1 For applications that are either incomplete or ineligible, a notice will be sent to the applicant identifying the reason for incompleteness or ineligibility.
 - 4.03.1.1 The applicant will then have the opportunity to provide the missing information or correct any inaccurate information.
- 4.04 IV. Ranking of Applicants
 - 4.04.1 Applications are ranked according to a combination of components including cumulative grade point average and major grade point average.
- 4.05 V. Selection and Notification of Recipients
 - 4.05.1 A. UAPB The university and the department Arkansas Department of Education shall review ranked applicants and make recommendations for scholarship recipients based on allocation of funds.

- 4.05.1.1 If sufficient funds are not available to fully fund scholarship awards to all eligible students, UAPB the university shall make awards to first-time students on a first-come, first-served basis.
- 4.05.2 B. The final responsibility for selecting scholarship recipients shall rest with the Chancellor of the university University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.

4.06 VI. Institutional Eligibility

4.06.1 The institution to be attended under the scholarship program must be a baccalaureate degree-granting institution of higher education whose teacher education program is approved by the State Board of Education or at an accredited state-supported community college in the State of Arkansas.

5.00 RULE 4 - Awarding of Scholarship

5.01 L. Award Process

- <u>5.01.1</u> Selected scholarship recipients will be mailed award notices stating their eligibility for the program and the conditions for continued eligibility.
- 5.01.2 Prior to the disbursement of funds, recipients will receive promissory notes for the purpose of entering into an agreement with the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.
 - 5.01.2.1 The terms of the agreement will include the general purpose, repayment and deferment procedures, interest calculations, and a schedule of advances.
 - 5.01.2.2 The promissory note shall be signed by the scholarship recipient and by a co-maker of eligible age.
 - 5.01.2.3 Modifications to any award amounts will be confirmed through the issuance of a new promissory note.

5.02 H. Disbursement Scholarship

- <u>5.02.1</u> The scholarship will be divided equally according to the number of terms at each institution:
 - 5.02.1.1 <u>T</u>three payments for those institutions on trimesters; and
 - 5.02.1.2 Two payments for those institutions on semesters.

- 5.02.1.2.1 <u>Disbursements may be made during fall, spring, or</u> summer semesters, trimesters, or their equivalent, based on the guidance in 5.02.1.1 and 5.02.1.2.
- 5.02.2 Funds will be sent to the institution via electronic funds transfer.
- <u>5.02.3</u> After verification of full-time enrollment for the scholarship recipient, the institution disburses the funds in accordance with its policy.
- 5.03 III. Limitation Scholarship
 - <u>5.03.1</u> A. Students may receive up to \$1,500 per academic year for full-time attendance.
 - 5.03.1.1 Awards for part-time students will be \$750.00 if they attend at least six (6) semester credit hours, but less than 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.
 - 5.03.1.2 For purposes of scholarship payments, "academic year" includes summer terms, semesters, quarters, or their equivalent, at the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled.
 - 5.03.2 B. Students may receive scholarships for a maximum of four (4) annual awards for full-time students.
 - <u>5.03.2.1</u> Part-time students may receive the number of academic hours equivalent to one (1) school year, as determined by the <u>university University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.</u>
 - 5.03.2.2 No student may receive an award after they have completed certification requirements, as determined by the teacher certification official to teach in Arkansas.
 - 5.03.3 C. Recipients must indicate an intention to teach in a public school district in a geographical area of the State of Arkansas where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the Department of Education.
 - 5.03.4 D. Act 1180 of 1999 states that students who receive scholarships from public funds may not use those funds in a financial aid package to exceed the Federally recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student enrolls.
 - 5.03.5 The institution must follow ADHE the Division of Higher Education policy in repaying public funds in the amount exceeding the total cost of

attendance for any student who receives public funds in a financial aid package above the cost of attendance.

6.00 **RULE 5**—Repayment of Scholarship

- 6.01 I. Terms of Repayment
 - 6.01.1 A. Scholarship recipients who teach full-time in an Arkansas public school district in a geographical areas of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the Department of Education, following certification shall render one year of service as a licensed teacher for each year of scholarship assistance received, when the total scholarship and accumulated interest will be forgiven.:
 - 6.01.1.1 Render two (2) years' service as a licensed teacher if the person received four (4) annual awards, or the equivalent of four (4) annual awards; or
 - 6.01.1.2 If the person received fewer than four (4) annual awards, or the equivalent of four (4) annual awards, the person shall render one (1) school semester of service as a licensed teacher for each year that the person received a full-time student scholarship or for the number of academic hours equivalent to one (1) school year, as determined by the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, for which a part-time student received a scholarship.
 - 6.01.2 The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff will verify the recipient's employment once a year in June by contacting the superintendent's office in the recipient's employment district.
 - 6.01.3 C. Recipients A recipient's scholarship will convert to a loan and the recipient who shall, within a maximum of five (5) years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school, repay the full remaining balance, plus accrued interest according to an interest and repayment schedule provided by the university if the they recipient:
 - 6.01.3.1 Do-Does not teach full-time in an Arkansas public school district in a geographical areas of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the Department of Education following certification, or
 - 6.01.3.2 who dDiscontinues their studies prior to completing their program of study shall, within a maximum of five (5) years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school, repay the full remaining balance, plus accrued interest according to

an interest and repayment schedule provided by the university University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.

- 6.01.3.3 At this point, the recipient's scholarship converts to a loan.
- <u>6.01.4</u> The repayment schedule will be set in monthly payments based on the total amount of the loan remaining at the time of entry into repayment, plus interest.
- 6.01.5 Payments will be computed to ensure that repayment will be completed within a maximum of five years from the completion of study or withdrawal from school.
 - 6.01.5.1 Minimum repayment is \$50.00 per month.
- 6.02 H. Interest on Loan
 - <u>6.02.1</u> Interest will accrue from the beginning of the repayment period at a maximum annual percentage rate of 10 percent on the unpaid balance.
 - <u>6.02.2</u> Interest will be calculated as a simple, per annum interest charge on the outstanding principal.
 - 6.02.3 Interest will not accrue, and installments need not be paid, when a deferment has been approved by the <u>university University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff</u>.
 - 6.02.4 Any recipient who wishes a deferment must submit an application for deferment to UAPB-the university for approval.
- 6.03 III. Deferment of Loan
 - 6.03.1 A. At <u>UAPB's the university's</u> discretion, scheduled loan repayments may be deferred if <u>UAPB-the university</u> determines that extraordinary circumstances prevent the recipient from making such repayments.
 - <u>6.03.2</u> Deferments may be granted for the following conditions:
 - 6.03.2.1 1. The recipient is engaged in a full-time course of undergraduate or graduate study at an institution of higher education.
 - 6.03.2.1.1 This must be verified by the Registrar's Office.
 - 6.03.2.2 2. The recipient is seeking and unable to find employment as a teacher in an Arkansas public school district in a geographical

- areas of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the <u>Dd</u>epartment of <u>Education</u> approved for a single period not to exceed twelve (12) months.
- 6.03.2.2.1 The loan recipient must submit a list of schools contacted for employment.
- 6.03.2.2.2 <u>UAPB-The university</u> will verify this information with the superintendent's office in each of those school districts.
- 6.03.2.3 3. The recipient is temporarily totally disabled, for a period not to exceed three years, as established by sworn affidavit from a licensed physician.
 - 6.03.2.3.1 <u>UAPB</u> The university reserves the right to require a second opinion by an <u>UAPB</u> university approved physician.
- 6.03.2.4 4. The recipient is unable to secure employment for a period not to exceed twelve (12) months by reason of the care of a spouse who is disabled, as established by the signature of a licensed physician.
 - 6.03.2.4.1 <u>UAPB The university</u> reserves the right to require a second opinion by an <u>UAPB university</u> approved physician.
- <u>6.03.2.5</u> 5. Other extraordinary circumstances which would prevent the recipient from repaying the debt within the contractual obligations of the note may be considered.
- 6.03.3 B. To qualify for any of the deferments, recipients must notify UAPB the university of their claim to the deferment on a Request for Deferment form which will be supplied by UAPB the university upon request.
 - 6.03.3.1 The recipient must complete the Request for Deferment form and return it, along with supporting documentation, to UAPB the university.
 - 6.03.3.2 <u>UAPB The university</u> will notify the recipient within ten (10) working days of approval or disapproval of any application for a deferment.
- 6.04 IV. Cancellation of Scholarship

- <u>6.04.1</u> <u>UAPB-The university</u> will cancel a recipient's repayment obligations if it determines:
 - 6.04.1.1 A. On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death.
 - 6.04.1.1.1 <u>UAPB-The university reserves the right to require a second opinion by an UAPB university approved physician; or</u>
 - 6.04.1.2 B. On the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient has died.
- 6.05 V. Prepayment of Loan
 - <u>6.05.1</u> There shall be no penalty for prepayment or repayment of all or any portion of the principal.
- 6.06 VI. Grace Period
 - <u>6.06.1</u> There will exist a nine-month grace period following graduation before the recipient must either:
 - 6.06.1.1 <u>*Take</u> employment in an Arkansas public school district in a geographical area of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the <u>Ddepartment of Education</u>; or
 - <u>6.06.1.2</u> <u>bB</u>egin repayment of the scholarship.
- 6.07 VII. Failure to Repay
 - <u>6.07.1</u> Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

7.00 **RULE 6**—Institutional Responsibilities

- 7.01 H. The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff shall:
 - 7.01.1 A. Be the administering agency of the program.
 - 7.01.2 B. Deposit all funds received from the repayment of scholarship awards by program participants in the funds that provides funding for the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program—; and

7.01.3 C. Make an annual report to the General Assembly that:

- 7.01.3.1 4. Contains a complete enumeration of the program's activities, scholarships granted, names of persons to whom granted, and the institutions attended by those receiving the scholarships, the teaching location of applicants who have received their education and become licensed teachers within this state as a result of the scholarship.;
- 7.01.3.2 2. Accounts for receipts and expenditures for salaries and expenses incurred.; and
- 7.01.3.3 3. Distinguishes between those recipients who have breached their contracts but with UAPB's the university's permission who have paid their financial obligations in full, and those recipients who have breached their contracts and remain financially indebted to the state.

7.01.4 B. Institutional Verification

- 7.01.4.1 The institution shall provide certification to UAPB the university each semester after registration, giving the names of the program scholarship recipients who are officially enrolled as full-time students.
 - <u>7.01.4.1.1</u> This information is reported on a verification roster.
 - 7.01.4.1.2 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification roster two times a year for those schools on the semester system and three times a year for those schools on the trimester system.
- 7.01.4.2 The verification roster will be mailed to the financial aid director at the time of registration for each term.
- 7.01.4.3 The signed verification roster should be returned to UAPB the university by:
 - 7.01.4.3.1 November 1 for the fall term;
 - 7.01.4.3.2 March 15 for the winter and/or spring term; and
 - 7.01.4.3.3 May 1 of the spring term for institutions on the trimester system.

- 7.01.4.4 The verification roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving an Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship scholarship for a given academic semester or trimester.
- 7.01.4.5 Students who are not enrolled in the current term or making satisfactory progress according to the rules and regulations of Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarships scholarships shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.

7.01.5 C. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

- 7.01.5.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after written receipt of funds.
- 7.01.5.2 Any outstanding funds not disbursed must be returned to the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university.

7.01.6 D. Refund Policy

- 7.01.6.1 It is the institution's responsibility to notify UAPB the university of the names of any persons owing a refund, the date of the withdrawal, and the refund amount.
 - 7.01.6.1.1 This information should be placed on the institution's verification roster before returning it to the university UAPB.

7.01.7 E. Due Diligence

- 7.01.7.1 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by UAPB the university on any current or former loan recipient.
- 7.01.7.2 In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program scholarship program.
- 7.01.7.3 The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university will periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

8.00 RULE 7—Scholarship Recipient Responsibilities

<u>8.01</u> L. Recipient's Responsibility

8.01.1 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff of any change in status within 21 days.

8.01.1.1 This will include:

<u>8.01.1.1.1</u> Change in name;

8.01.1.1.2 Change in residence;

8.01.1.1.3 Change in institution;

8.01.1.1.4 Change in full-time status (below twelve college semester credit hours or its equivalent per semester or trimester);

8.01.1.1.5 Change in course of study; and/or

8.01.1.1.6 Change in employment.

8.01.1.2 Failure to notify the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university of a change in status will affect future eligibility or collection status.

9.00 RULE 8 — Collection of Loan

9.01 L. Collection of Loan

- 9.01.1 Accounts will be retained by the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff

 UAPB in the School of Education until the individual is no longer eligible for forgiveness or deferment due to the recipient's failure to remain employed in the teaching field for the specified time period.
 - 9.01.1.1 At that time, the scholarship will be converted to a loan and the account will be turned over to a vendor for servicing.
 - 9.01.1.2 <u>UAPB-The university</u> will notify the student by mail of this action and include a loan amortization schedule with the notification letter.
 - 9.01.1.3 The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due.

- 9.01.1.4 Upon determination that a loan recipient is 120 days delinquent, UAPB the university will mail both the recipient and the co-signer a first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due.
- 9.01.1.5 If payment is not received within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient and the co-signer declaring the account delinquent and requesting that it be immediately brought up to date.
- 9.01.1.6 If no response is received by 90 days from the original payment due, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient and co-signer informing them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not received within 30 days.

9.02 H. Skip Tracing Mechanisms

- 9.02.1 If letters are returned as undeliverable, the Department of Finance and Administration's Motor Vehicle Division can be used to perform skip tracing activities.
 - 9.02.1.1 Motor Vehicle Division's records are updated in March and September each year.
- <u>9.02.2</u> To get this information, mail name, current address, and social security number on <u>University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff university</u> letterhead to:

Department of Finance and Administration Motor Vehicle Division P. O. Box 1272 Little Rock, AR 72202 ATTENTION: Correspondence Desk

- 9.02.3 A response from the Motor Vehicle Division should be received within ten (10) working days.
- <u>9.02.4</u> Additionally, <u>UAPB-the university</u> will use these steps to locate recipients and/or co-signers if communications are returned as undelivered:
 - 9.02.4.1 + Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
 - 9.02.4.2 2. Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient and/or co-signer's last known address;

- 9.02.4.3 3. Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
- <u>9.02.4.4</u> 4. Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;
- 9.02.4.5 5. Contact recipient's field of study professional organization, union, or licensing board;
- 9.02.4.6 6. Contact post office;
- 9.02.4.7 7. Contact utility companies; and,
- 9.02.4.8 8. Contact Chamber of Commerce.

9.03 II. Credit Reporting Agencies

- <u>9.03.1</u> Defaulted recipients and/or co-signers will be reported to the following credit reporting agencies:
 - 9.03.1.1 4. CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.
 - 9.03.1.2 2. T R W Credit Data
 - 9.03.1.3 3. Trans Union Credit Reporting Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers are located in the collections file.
- 9.03.2 <u>UAPB The university</u> will also respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients and/or co-signers.
- 9.04 IV. State Income Tax Set-Off
 - 9.04.1 By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, UAPB the university is a claimant agency for the set-off of debts against state tax refunds.
 - 9.04.2 To access the Set-Off Section of the State Tax Administration Office, UAPB the university must submit name, address, social security number, and amount of debt via computer magnetic tape by December 1 to intercept taxes for the next year.
- 9.05 V. Litigation

- 9.05.1 No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, UAPB the university shall institute a civil suit against the recipient and co-signer for repayment of the scholarship.
 - 9.05.1.1 Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00.
 - 9.05.1.2 If over \$3,000.00, UAPB the university must use Circuit Court.
 - 9.05.1.3 If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, UAPB the university may choose to use Small Claims Courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court.
 - 9.05.1.4 If UAPB the university chooses to waive the difference, it may not, at a later date, attempt to collect the difference.
- <u>9.05.2</u> Forms to take the recipient and/or co-signer to Small Claims Court are requested from the recipient's and/or co-signer's county of residence.

9.06 VI. Write-Offs

- 9.06.1 Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarships may be written off as uncollectible if UAPB the university shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:
 - 9.06.1.1 A. tThe cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
 - <u>9.06.1.2</u> B. tThe recipient and/or co-signer does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- 9.06.2 Proof of due diligence collections activities must be submitted to the administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approved by the administrator before scholarship Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship accounts may be written off as uncollectible.

9.07 VII. Nonpayment Penalties

9.07.1 Scholarship recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

RULE 9 - Program Definitions

The following definitions are used in the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship Program:

Academic Year

A measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient. The academic year is defined as two semesters, two trimesters, or three quarters.

Approved Institution

An Arkansas postsecondary public or private college or university school that is currently accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association that has a teacher education program or a regionally accredited two year Arkansas institution where those courses are directly creditable toward teacher education in a baccalaureate institution. The institution must not discriminate against applicants, or employees on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin, consistent with the provisions of applicable state and federal laws. The institution must have a signed administrative agreement with ADHE.

Award Year

The award year begins on July 1 of one calendar year and ends on June 30 of the next calendar year.

Cancellation

UAPB shall cancel a recipient's repayment obligation if it determines: On the basis of a sworn affidavit of a licensed physician, that the recipient is unable to teach on a full-time basis because of an impairment that is expected to continue indefinitely or result in death. UAPB reserves the right to require a second opinion by an UAPB approved physician; or on the basis of a death certificate or other evidence of death, that is conclusive under state law, that the recipient is deceased.

Default

Failure to repay the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship in accordance with the terms of the promissory note provided that this failure persists for 180 days for monthly payments.

Deferment

This is a postponement of repayments and the accrual of interest. UAPB shall not consider that the recipient has violated the repayment schedule if he or she does not meet the payments during the time he or she is in deferment status.

Delta Region

The following 42 counties of Arkansas are designated as being in the Delta Region: Arkansas, Ashley, Baxter, Bradley, Calhoun, Chicot, Clay, Cleveland, Craighead, Crittenden, Cross, Dallas, Desha, Drew, Fulton, Grant, Greene, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Lee, Lincoln, Lonoke, Marion, Mississippi, Monroe, Ouachita, Phillips, Poinsett, Prairie, Pulaski, Randolph, St. Francis, Searcy, Sharp, Stone, Union, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff. (Information obtained from the Delta Foundation in Mississippi.)

Due Diligence

This process refers to those steps UAPB takes to collect Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship funds when a recipient enters repayment status. It includes: billing the recipient, sending overdue notices, conducting address searches if the recipient cannot be located, reporting the account to credit bureaus, collection, and litigation. Due diligence also includes keeping the recipient informed of all changes in the Arkansas Geographical Critical Needs Minority Teacher Scholarship that affect his or her rights and responsibilities and responding promptly to the recipient's inquiries.

Full-time Student

A student enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

Grace Period

A nine month period of time following graduation and before the recipient must either take employment in a public school in Arkansas or begin repayment of the scholarship.

Minority

Persons who are Black Americans, Hispanic Americans, Asian Americans, and Native Americans which group includes all persons having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

Part-time Student

A student enrolled in at least 6 semester credit hours of the equivalent, but less than 12 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

Permanent Resident Alien

An individual who can provide documentation from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that he or she is in the U.S. for other than a temporary purpose with the intention of becoming a citizen or permanent resident. Valid documentation is an I-551, I-151, I-181, I-94, or passport stamped with the notation "Processed for I-551, Temporary Evidence of Lawful Admission for Permanent Residence". A completed Form G-641 can also be used to document permanent resident status.

Promissory Note

The promissory note is a legal document obligating the recipient to repay the loan if he or she does not teach one year for each year of scholarship assistance received. The recipient must licensed to teach in a public school district in a geographical area of the state where there is a critical shortage of teachers, or in the Delta, as designated by the Department of Education. The recipient's rights and responsibilities will be stated on the promissory note.

Satisfactory Academic Progress

Satisfactory academic progress is maintained if the recipient has a minimum 2.75 on a 4.0 scale if attending an approved two-year institution or 3.0 on a 4.0 scale if attending an approved four-year institution.

Skip Tracing

A process for locating a recipient that is in repayment status. UAPB's efforts may include contacting relatives, friends, references, and other individuals or entities in the recipient's file.

Teach on a Full-time Basis

Teach the same number of hours required of teachers who have full-time contracts, as determined by the institution or agency at which an individual is teaching, for a minimum of one academic term, as defined by the institution or agency in which an individual is teaching.

U.S. Citizen or National

The term "U.S. citizen" includes persons born or who have become naturalized citizens of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Trust Territory—Palau. The term "national" includes citizens of American Samoa or Swain's Island.

RULES GOVERNING THE EMERGENCY RESPONSE EQUIPMENT AND TRAINING AT ARKANSAS INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

In compliance with Act 737 and 811 of 2023, the rules for the Emergency Response Equipment and Training at Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Emergency Response Equipment and Training at Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Emergency Response Equipment and Training at Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Emergency Response Equipment and Training at Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education rules be approved for public comment release.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING EMERGENCY RESPONSE EQUIPMENT AND TRAINING AT ARKANSAS INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

Effective:

1.0 PURPOSE

- 1.01 The purpose of these rules is to establish the requirements and procedures for governing emergency response equipment and training at Arkansas institutions of higher education, including:
 - 1.01.1 Automated external defibrillator (AED) devices;
 - 1.01.2 Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) programs; and
 - 1.01.3 Opioid overdose rescue kits.

2.00 REGULATORY AUTHORITY

2.01 This rule is promulgated pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-60-119.

3.00 **DEFINITIONS**

- 3.01 "Automated external defibrillator (AED)" means a device that:
 - 3.01.1 Is used to administer an electric shock through the chest wall to the heart;
 - 3.01.2 Has built-in computers within the device to assess the patient's heart rhythm and judge whether defibrillation is needed;
 - 3.01.3 Has audible or visual prompts, or both, to guide the user through the process;
 - 3.01.4 Has received approval from the United States Food and Drug

 Administration of its pre-market modification, filed pursuant to 21 U.S.C.

 360(k);
 - 3.01.5 Is capable of recognizing the presence or absence of ventricular fibrillation and rapid ventricular tachycardia and is capable of determining without intervention by an operator whether defibrillation should be performed; and
 - 3.01.6 Upon determining if the defibrillation should be performed, the AED either automatically charges and delivers an electrical impulse to an individual's heart or charges and delivers an electrical impulse at the command of the operator.

- 3.02 "Cardiac arrest" means a condition, often sudden, that is due to abnormal heart rhythms called arrhythmias. It is generally the result of some underlying form of heart disease.
- 3.03 "Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR)" means a combination of rescue breathing, chest compressions, and external cardiac massage used to sustain a person's life until advanced assistance arrives.
- 3.04 "CPR provider" or "AED provider" means a member or employee of an institutional campus who has completed training in CPR in addition to knowledge and understanding of an AED's operation and use under the requirements set forth in this rule.
- 3.05 "Defibrillation" means administration of an electrical impulse to an individual's heart in order to stop ventricular fibrillation or rapid ventricular tachycardia.
- 3.06 "Emergency Medical Services (EMS)" means the transportation and medical care provided the ill or injured prior to arrival at a medical facility by a licensed emergency medical technician or other health care provider and continuation of the initial emergency care within a medical facility subject to the approval of the medical staff and governing board of that facility.
- 3.07 "Extra-curricular event" means any institution sponsored program or voluntary activity sponsored by the institution, or an organization sanctioned by the institution where students are competing for the purpose of receiving an award, rating, recognition, or criticism, or qualification for additional competition or including preparation for and involvement in public performances, contests, athletic competitions, demonstrations, displays and club activities.
- 3.08 "FDA" means the Food and Drug Administration
- 3.09 "Institution of higher education" or "institution" means a state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
- 3.10 "Institutional campus" means any institution's building or cluster of buildings, including grounds, that is used for any purpose, including, without limitation:
 - 3.10.1 Extracurricular activities; or
 - 3.10.2 Campus administration.
- 3.11 "Institutional personnel" means any employee of the institution, or independent contractor working under contract with an institution, that is required to follow campus policy and procedures.

- 3.12 "Program coordinator" means an individual, appointed by the institution, who is responsible for administration of the Automated External Defibrillation program for their respective campus.
- 3.13 "Protocol" means currently approved and accepted procedures describing specific steps a provider must follow in assessing and treating a patient.
- 3.14 "Renewal" means training and demonstration of competence in the application and use of automated defibrillation equipment.
- 3.15 "School-sponsored event" means any event or activity sponsored by the institution which includes but is not limited to:
 - 3.15.1 Athletic events;
 - 3.15.2 Student organization events; or
 - 3.15.3 Any activity designed to enhance the student experience whether or not it is organized on an institutional campus.
- 3.16 "Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA)" means a sudden or unexpected cessation of heart function, most often caused by a sudden arrhythmia, such as ventricular fibrillation (VF).
- 3.17 "Ventricular Fibrillation (VF)" means the most common arrhythmia that causes cardiac arrest.
 - 3.17.1 When this condition occurs, the heart's electrical impulses suddenly become chaotic, often without warning, causing the heart's pumping action to stop abruptly.

4.00 REQUIREMENTS

4.01 Each institution must have an AED, and appropriate institutional personnel must be adequately trained in use of the AED on an ongoing basis as outlined in Section 9.0 of these rules.

5.00 AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR MODEL

- 5.01 AEDs used by institutions of higher education must be:
 - 5.01.1 Approved for use by the FDA;
 - 5.01.2 Automated and require AED provider intervention to initiate a defibrillation shock; and

- 5.01.3 Capable of automatically collecting data.
- 5.02 No modifications shall be made to defibrillation equipment which results in:
 - 5.02.1 Deviation from the original manufacturer's specifications, or
 - 5.02.2 Deviation from AED protocols which include:
 - <u>5.02.2.1 Early access calling 911;</u>
 - 5.02.2.2 Early CPR starting CPR immediately;
 - 5.02.2.3 Early Defibrillation utilizing the onsite AED within 3-5 minutes of onset; and
 - 5.02.2.4 Early Advanced Care trained health care providers arriving to provide advanced care.

6.00 DEFIBRILLATOR PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR

- 6.01 Each institution shall designate appropriate personnel to be responsible for the maintenance of the AED(s).
- 6.02 All components of the AED and integrated data recording system shall be inspected by a qualified service technician at least one (1) time per calendar year or as recommended by the manufacturer to ensure that:
 - 6.02.1 The equipment meets original manufacturer's specifications; and
 - 6.02.2 The equipment maintains the currently approved treatment protocols based on the current American Heart Association scientific guidelines, standards, and recommendations for the use of the AED.
- 6.03 The battery of the AED shall be maintained and replaced in accordance with manufacturer's specifications.
- 6.04 All maintenance and repairs shall be performed by a qualified service technician recognized by the manufacturer.
- 6.05 Written records shall be maintained for all maintenance, repairs, and inspections performed on all components for mandated annual state reporting purposes.

7.00 AVAILABILITY OF AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR

7.01 Each institution shall designate appropriate personnel to be responsible for ensuring the availability of the AED.

- 7.02 The location of AEDs shall be based on the following:
 - 7.02.1 Size and physical layout of the buildings;
 - 7.02.2 Number and ages of individuals in the building;
 - 7.02.3 Types and locations of curricular, extracurricular, and school- sponsored events; and
 - 7.02.4 Design features that might be unique to the building.
- 7.03 Each institution shall report, in a format approved by the Division, maintenance records and any use of an AED.
- 7.04 During instructional hours, the AED will be placed at designated locations.
- 7.05 These locations shall be specific to each campus but should allow the device to be easily seen and accessed by staff.
- 7.06 The locations should allow staff members to retrieve the device outside of normal instructional hours.
- 7.07 AEDs shall not be located or stored in a locked office or room.

8.00 INSTITUTIONAL APPOINTED PROGRAM COORDINATOR

- 8.01 The institutional appointed program coordinator shall:
 - 8.01.1 Maintain current provider status in CPR/AED;
 - 8.01.2 Assure that the CPR/AED providers on campus receive appropriate training in the use and maintenance of the school's AED(s);
 - 8.01.3 Oversee training operations for the campus and maintain organizational training reports;
 - 8.01.4 Ensure AED equipment is maintained according to manufacturer and treatment protocol specifications based on the current American Heart Association scientific guidelines, standards, and recommendations for the use of the AED;
 - 8.01.4.1 This includes, but is not limited to, ensuring that AED pads and batteries have not expired;

- 8.01.5 Provide professional development opportunities annually for AED providers and all institutional employees, if applicable;
- 8.01.6 Verify credentials of personnel functioning as an AED provider within the institution; and
- 8.01.7 Review each use of the AED.
- 8.02 If the Program Coordinator is not a healthcare provider, a healthcare provider must oversee these activities.

9.00 QUALITY TRAINING

- 9.01 Appropriate training of anticipated rescuers in the use of the AED and in CPR will incorporate at least the following:
 - 9.01.1 Testing of psychomotor skills based on the American Heart Association scientific guidelines, standards, and recommendations for the use of the AED, as they existed on January 1, 2021; and
 - 9.01.2 Providing CPR as published by the American Heart Association, or the American Red Cross, or equivalent course materials, as they existed on January 1, 2021;
 - 9.01.3 Coordination with the emergency medical services system; and
 - 9.01.4 An ongoing quality improvement program to monitor training and evaluate response with each use of an AED.

10.00 OPIOID OVERDOSE RESCUE KITS

- 10.01 The Division of Higher Education shall consult and collaborate with the Arkansas

 Drug Director within the Department of Human Services to implement
 requirements related to ensuring that each institutional campus has an opioid
 overdose rescue kit in a clearly visible location that is labeled with the words
 "Opioid Overdose Rescue Kit Naloxone Nasal Spray."
- 10.02 An opioid overdose rescue kit required under this section shall:
 - 10.02.1 Be visually free of advertisements;
 - 10.02.2 Be located where it is readily available for public use; and
 - 10.02.3 Include without limitation:

10.02.3.1 Narcan;

10.02.3.2 Naloxone; or

- 10.02.3.3 Another medication approved by the Department of Health and the United States Food and Drug Administration that, when administered, negates or neutralizes, in whole or in part, the pharmacological effects of an opioid in the human body.
- 10.03 The location of each opioid overdose rescue kit required under this section shall be registered with the campus police of the institution higher education.
- 10.04 An opioid overdose rescue kit required under this section shall be located within the storage locations that contain automated external defibrillators in each of the following on each campus of each institution without limitation:
 - 10.04.1 An educational building;
 - 10.04.2 A dormitory;
 - 10.04.3 A student union;
 - 10.04.4 A sporting venue;
 - 10.04.5 An on-campus, freestanding, institution-owned sorority or fraternity house;
 - 10.04.6 A campus health center; and
 - 10.04.7 Other locations as necessary.

 - 10.09.1.1 The NARCANsas App; or
 - 10.09.1.2 An in-person Collegiate NARCAN Campaign (SOR II).

RULES GOVERNING THE STUDENT UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP

In compliance with Act 413 and 870 of 2023, the rules for the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship are presented to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) for initial approval.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board reviews the rules presented in this agenda item for the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship to be administered by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of the Arkansas Division of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections, when necessary, in the program rules for the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship rules be approved for public comment release.

STUDENT UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP

RULE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- I. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) shall administer the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his/her designee. The Student-Undergraduate Research Fellowship Selection Panel shall select recipients for awards.
- II. The Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship Selection Panel shall consist of:
 - A. Faculty or administrators at an Arkansas public or private institution of higher education who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline to be reviewed.
 - B. Other panel members will be considered who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline to be reviewed and who have an affiliation with an Arkansas public or private institution of higher education or an education-relatedentity.
 - C. The Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his/her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship Selection Panel and shall ensure that staff services for the Panel are provided.
- III. The focus of the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship is the continued development of undergraduate academic research efforts at Arkansas's public and private institutions of higher education and to provide funding to encourage students to conduct in-depth research projects in specific fields of study under the tutelage of tenured or full-time faculty member. The program is designed to assist all students throughout the state.
- IV. The Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education has the final responsibility for selecting fellowship recipients pursuant to the provisions of Act 2124 of 2005 and subsequent legislation, and program rules and regulations.
- V. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall follow the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act when functioning under Act 2124 of 2005 and subsequent legislation.

RULE 2 – FELLOWSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

I. Eligibility Criteria

An applicant must meet the following requirements to be eligible to receive the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship:

- A. The applicant must be a citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien.
- B. The applicant shall be enrolled in an approved Arkansas institution of higher education as a full-time student, as defined by the Department of Higher Education.
- C. The applicant must be enrolled in a program of study that leads to or is creditable towards a baccalaureate degree. These programs include baccalaureate and associate degree programs.
- D. The applicant must have completed at least 30 semester credit hours before funds are awarded.
- E. The applicant must have a minimum cumulative 3.25 grade point average.
- F. The applicant must have a tenured or full-time faculty member to serve as his/her mentor.

II. Continued Eligibility

A student may compete for additional years, but cannot receive more than three years of funding.

RULE 3 - APPLICATION PROCESS

I. Solicitation of Applicants

to:

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will disseminate the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship announcement through workshops, meetings, press releases, ADHE newsletter, ADHE website and other means deemed appropriate.

Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship announcements will be emailed

- A. Presidents and Chancellors
- B. Chief Academic Officers

- C. Directors of Research and Sponsored Programs
- D. Previous SURF panel members andmentors
- E. Faculty, administrators, and other interestedpersons

II. Application

Students must submit an application for the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will provide an application on the Department's website. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education will also provide application forms to any individual upon request. The applicant must complete the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship application to be considered for the fellowship.

III. Submission of Application and Application Deadline

Any interested student who has met the eligibility criteria listed in Rule 2 may apply.

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications each year. The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application and website.

All applications and supporting documentation must be postmarked by the established deadline date in order to be considered. It is the responsibility of the individual applicant to ensure that the application is postmarked by the deadline date.

*If any deadline date occurs on a weekend or holiday, the deadline will be extended to the following business day.

IV. Application Review Process

- A. The SURF Panel will read and score applications.
- B. SURF Panel members meet at ADHE or another centrally located location to make recommendations for SURF awards based upon the selection criteria listed in Rule 4. The SURF Panel is divided into two-groups (STEM and non-STEM). Based upon appropriations, the STEM SURF Panel will award 60% of the funds to STEM applicants; the non-STEM SURF Panel will award 40% of the funds to non-STEM applicants. Should there not be enough qualified applicants in the STEM or Non-STEM group to make recommendations for awards, funds can be shifted from one group to another until all funds are exhausted.

V. Amount of Fellowship

The amount of the fellowship awarded to each recipient shall be as follows:

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VI. Award Notification

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall notify each eligible applicant of his/her award. The award notice includes the student's name, address, faculty mentor's name, institution, and the actual amount the student is eligible to receive. The award notice also explains the Arkansas Department of Higher Education's disbursement procedures and conditions, as detailed in Rule 5.

ADHE shall notify the Presidents/Chancellors, Chief Academic Officers,
Offices of Research and Sponsored Programs, and the SURF Panel of SURF
awardees.

VII. Ineligible Notification

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall notify applicants who are determined to be ineligible and provide the reason for ineligibility.

VIII. No Funds Left Notification

Once all applicants have accepted his/her SURF award and all funds are exhausted, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall notify the remaining eligible applicants that all funds have been awarded via a "no award" notice.

RULE 4 - FELLOWSHIP SELECTION CRITERIA

I. All proposals will be reviewed by the Student Undergraduate Research
Fellowship Panel that is selected by the Arkansas Department of Higher
Education. The SURF Panel will use the following selection criteria for judging proposals.

- *Criteria for the awarding of points vary with the area of the endeavor. Criteria may include:
- Feasibility of the project, i.e., is the project reasonable for the proposed student with the available facilities?
- ✓ Is the proposed research/scholarly activity of value to the field of study?
- ✓ Is the project of sufficient difficulty to challenge the student?
- ✓ Will the project teach the student skills that are transferable to other research endeavors/ scholarly activities?
- Other criteria deemed appropriate by SURF Panel.
- ✓ Is there some justifiable reason to give this proposal consideration because the candidate is from a group under-represented in the area of endeavor such as women and minorities in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM)?

The SURF Panel shall meet and make recommendation of students to be awarded a SURF fellowship based upon the above selection criteria. Recommendation of awards shall be made until all funds are exhausted. The SURF Panel shall also select alternates to be awarded in the event a student does not accept his/her SURF award.

The Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education has the final responsibility for selecting fellowship recipients.

RULE 5 - FELLOWSHIP PAYMENT POLICIES

I. Limits of Payment

A. Disbursement of Fellowships

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall disburse fellowship funds to the institution designated on the student's application. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall send funds to the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs (ORSP) or Financial Aid Office via electronic funds transfer or state warrant. Additionally, the ORSP or Financial Aid will be sent an Award Roster and Receipt Confirmation. The Award Roster lists the students to be awarded and the disbursement amounts. The Receipt Confirmation should be signed by the disbursement officer and returned to ADHE. The institution will disburse the grant funds to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.

B. Cancellation of the Fellowship

- 1. The award will be terminated for any of the followingreasons:
 - Failure to maintain at least a 3.25 cumulative grade point average on a 4.00 scale.
 - b. Failure to maintain satisfactory academic progress as defined by the institution.
 - c. Failure to conduct the research for which the SURF fellowship was awarded.
- 2. The recipient is responsible for notifying, in writing, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of any change in status (i.e. change of address, email, transfer of research to another mentor, etc.). Failure to provide written notification may result in the cancellation of the fellowship for thatterm.

C. Military Service

Recipients who are members of the Arkansas National Guard or Armed Forces Reserve units who are called to active duty for reasons other than regular unit training and are unable to complete the current termwill be allowed to repeat the missed term. In addition, they will be placed in deferred status until six months after release from active duty, at which time they must be re-enrolled and continue research with the same mentor.

D. Refunds

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education is entitled to a refund of the fellowship amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a fellowship withdraws, drops out, is expelled, falls below the minimum standards detailed in Rule 2, or does not conduct the research for which the SURF award was made.

RULE 6 - INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

I. College/University Responsibilities

A. Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible fordesignating one institutional representative to act as administrator of the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible forverification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order tomaintain continued eligibility status.

The Authorizing Institutional Official ensures that by signing the SURFapplication that the applicant has met all conditions of the Fellowship-Eligibility Criteria in Rule 2.

B. Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of fellowship funds.

C. Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment, as of the close of business on the eleventh day of classes. The institution must-comply with OMB Circular A21 (Cost Principles for Educational Institutions) and OMB Circular A110 (Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Agreements with Institutions of Higher Education, Hospitals, and other Non-Profit Organizations) when

managing SURF funds. Each institution shall establish a separate account for each student awarded a SURF fellowship.

Each Department\Division\Dean\Chair is responsible for ensuring that the student and mentor are conducting research as set forth in the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship proposal submitted to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

D. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds & Refunds

Funds shall be disbursed to students and mentors in accordance with the institution's disbursement procedures according to OMB Circular A21 and OMB Circular A110. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by the end of the semester must be returned to ADHE within 15 days of the semester's end.

The Arkansas Department of Higher Education is entitled to a refund of the fellowship amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a fellowship-withdraws, drops out, is expelled or does not conduct the research for which the SURF award was made. The Institutional Representative is responsible for issuing a refund to ADHE within 15 days of the semester's end.

E. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education on any Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall periodically review the SURF program.

RULE 7 - FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status (i.e. change of address, email, transfer of research to another mentor, etc.). Failure to provide written notification may result in the cancellation of the fellowship for that term.

Change in the research project is not allowed for the Student Undergraduate-Research Fellowship.

II. Fellowship recipient is required to submit a one page abstract on the findings of his/her research upon completion of the project to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education as follows:

- 2.01 "Approved institution" means a public-supported or private, non-profit postsecondary institution with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV Federal student aid funds.
- 2.02 "Citizen" means a person who is a U.S. citizen or a permanent resident alien.
 - 2.02.1 If the recipient is not a U.S. citizen, but a permanent resident alien, the recipient must attach a copy of the permanent resident alien card to the application.
- 2.03 "Eligible applicant" means any applicant who meets the eligibility criteria established in Section 4.00.
- 2.04 "Fellowship" means an amount of money given to a student for a specified period that allows them to study and research a subject.
- 2.05 "Full-time student" means a student enrolled in 12 semester credit hours or its

- equivalent per semester.
- 2.06 "Institutional match" means the amount of funds institution must match for a student's stipend.
- 2.07 "Mentor" means a tenured or full-time faculty member.
- 2.08 "Mentor cost" means any salary, fringe benefits, materials, supplies and travel costs awarded to the mentor associated with mentoring the student.
- 2.09 "Semester" means a spring, summer or fall term.
- 2.10 "Student stipend" means an amount of money awarded to the student to conduct his or her research.
- 2.11 "Student travel" means costs incurred by a student to present the results of his or her research at a state or national conference or to attend a meeting of experts in his or her discipline.
- 2.12 "SURF Selection Panel" means a panel of faculty or administrators of Arkansas public or private institution of higher education who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline being reviewed.
 - 2.12.1 Other reviewers will be considered who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline to be reviewed and who have an affiliation with an Arkansas public or private institution of higher education or an education-related entity.

3.00 ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE

- 3.01 The Division of Higher Education shall administer the Student Undergraduate
 Research Fellowship (SURF) within the policies set by the Arkansas Higher
 Education Coordinating Board.
 - 3.01.1 All formal communications shall be addressed to or signed by the Commissioner of Higher Education or his or her designee.
 - 3.01.2 The SURF Selection Panel shall select recipients for awards.
- 3.02 The SURF Selection Panel shall consist of:
 - 3.02.1 Faculty or administrators at an Arkansas public or private institution of higher education who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline to be reviewed.
 - 3.02.2 Other panel members will be considered who have earned a Ph.D. or terminal degree in the discipline to be reviewed and who have an affiliation with an Arkansas public or private institution of higher

- education or an education- related entity.
- 3.02.3 The commissioner or his/her designee shall serve as presiding officer of the SURF Selection Panel.
- 3.03 The focus of the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship is the continued development of undergraduate academic research efforts at Arkansas's public and private institutions of higher education and to provide funding to encourage students to conduct in-depth research projects in specific fields of study under the tutelage of tenured or full-time faculty member. The program is designed to assist all students throughout the state.
- 3.04 The commissioner has the final responsibility for selecting fellowship recipients subject to the provisions of Arkansas Code 6-61-236 these rules.

4.00 FELLOWSHIP ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- 4.01 An applicant must meet the following requirements to be eligible to receive the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship:
 - 4.01.1 The applicant must be a citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien.
 - 4.01.2 The applicant shall be enrolled in an approved Arkansas institution of higher education as a full-time student, as defined by the Department of Higher Education ADHE.
 - 4.01.3 The applicant must be enrolled in a program of study that leads to or is creditable towards a baccalaureate degree.
 - 4.01.3.1 These programs include baccalaureate and associate degree programs.
 - 4.01.4 The applicant must have completed at least 30 semester credit hours before funds are awarded.
 - 4.01.5 The applicant must have a minimum cumulative 3.25 grade point average.
 - 4.01.6 The applicant must have a tenured or full-time faculty member to serve as his or her mentor.
- 4.02 A student may compete for additional years, but cannot receive more than three academic years of funding.

5.00 APPLICATION PROCESS

- 5.01 The Division of Higher Education will disseminate the Student Undergraduate
 Research Fellowship announcement through workshops, meetings, press
 releases, division newsletters, the division's website and by other appropriate
 methods.
- 5.02 Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship announcements will be emailed to:
 - 5.02.1 Presidents and chancellors of institutions of higher education.
 - 5.02.2 Chief Academic Officers
 - 5.02.3 Directors of Research and Sponsored Programs
 - 5.02.4 Previous SURF panel members and mentors
 - 5.02.5 Faculty, administrators, and other interested persons
- 5.03 Students must submit an application for the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship to the division.
 - 5.03.1 The division shall provide an application form on its website and to any individual upon request.
 - 5.03.2 The applicant must complete and submit the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship application to be considered for the fellowship.
- 5.04 Any interested student who meets the eligibility criteria in Section 4.00 may apply.
- 5.05 The division shall establish the deadline for receipt of applications each year.
 - 5.05.1 The deadline date shall be clearly printed on the application and website.
 - 5.05.2 All applications and supporting documentation must be postmarked by the established deadline date in order to be considered.
 - 5.05.2.1 It is the responsibility of the individual applicant to ensure that the application is postmarked by the deadline date.
 - 5.05.3 If any deadline date occurs on a weekend or holiday, the deadline will be extended to the following business day.
- 5.06 The SURF Selection Panel shall read and score applications.
- 5.07 SURF Selection Panel members shall meet with the division to make recommendations for SURF awards based upon the selection criteria listed in Section 6.00.

- 5.07.1 The SURF Selection Panel is divided into two groups to represent STEM disciplines and non-STEM disciplines.
- 5.07.2 Each group will make recommendations for applicants from the respective disciplines.
 - 5.07.1.1 Subject to appropriations, the SURF Selection Panel will award 60% of the funds to STEM applicants and 40% of the funds to non-STEM applicants.
 - 5.07.1.2 Should there not be enough qualified applicants in the STEM or Non-STEM group to make recommendations for awards, funds can be shifted from one group to another until all funds are exhausted.
- 5.08 The amount of the fellowship awarded to each recipient shall be as follows:
 - 5.08.1 Up to \$1,250.00 for a student stipend;
 - 5.08.1.1 If a student is awarded a fellowship for only a spring or fall semester, the student stipend shall not exceed \$625.00.
 - 5.08.2 Up to \$750.00 for student travel;

- 5.13 Once each applicant have accepted his or her SURF award and all funds are exhausted, the division shall notify all remaining eligible applicants that all funds have been awarded via a "no award" notice.

6.00 FELLOWSHIP SELECTION CRITERIA

- 6.01 All proposals will be reviewed by the Student Undergraduate Research
 Fellowship Selection Panel that is selected by the Arkansas Department of

- 6.02 The SURF Selection Panel will use the following scale to grade the selection criteria found in the table at Appendix A (the selection criteria), 1 being the best score and 9 being the worst score:

 missed term.
 - 7.04.1 Those recipients shall be placed in deferred status until six months after release from active duty, at which time they must be re-enrolled and continue research with the same mentor.

- 8.02 Each authorizing institutional official certifies, by signing the program application, that the applicant has met all conditions of the fellowship eligibility criteria in Section 4.00.
- 8.03 The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of fellowship funds.
- 8.04 The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment, as of the close of business on the eleventh day of classes.
- 8.05 The institution must comply with OMB Circular A21 (Cost Principles for Educational Institutions) and OMB Circular A110 (Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Agreements with Institutions of Higher Education, Hospitals, and other Non- Profit Organizations) when managing fellowship funds.
- 8.06 Each institution shall establish a separate account for each student awarded a SURF fellowship.
- 8.07 The appropriate faculty head of the academic discipline for which a recipient is conducting research under the fellowship is responsible for ensuring that the student and mentor are conducting research as set forth in the fellowship application submitted to the division.
- 8.08 Funds shall be disbursed to students and mentors in accordance with the institution's disbursement procedures according to OMB Circular A21 and OMB Circular A110.
 - 8.08.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by the end of the semester must be returned to the division within 15 days of the semester's end.
 - 8.08.2 The Institutional Representative is responsible for issuing a refund under

- 7.05 to the division within 15 days of the semester's end.
- 8.09 Each institution shall exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the division on any fellowship recipient or former recipient.
- 8.10 The Arkansas Department of Higher Education ADHE shall periodically review the program.

9.00 FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- 9.01 It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Division of Higher Education, in writing, of any change in status (i.e. change of address, email, transfer of research to another mentor, etc.).
- 9.01.1 Failure to provide written notification may result in the cancellation of the fellowship for that term.
- 9.02 A fellowship recipient shall not change the purpose for his or her research project.
- 9.03 Each fellowship recipient shall submit a one page abstract on the findings of his or her research upon completion of the project to the division as follows:
 - 9.03.1 By May 1 for a spring term project completion;
 - 9.03.2 By August 1 for a summer term project completion;
 - 9.03.3 By December 1 for a fall term project completion
- 9.04 Fellowship recipients are required to present the findings of his or her research at a state or national conference in his/her discipline or attend a meeting of experts in his or her discipline as directed by his/her mentor.
 - 9.04.1 Failure by a fellowship recipient to comply with any of the above may result in forfeiture of his/her SURF fellowship funds.

Outcomes are clearly proposed and Impact is anticipated.

STEM – Addresses an area of importance to the discipline and shows potential to advance the science.

Non-STEM - Expands knowledge of best/creative practices in the field, increases creative output.

Appropriateness of the methodology:

 - 2.01.1 Post-secondary credit will be awarded upon achieving the required score on:
 - 2.01.1.1 The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme Assessment;
 - 2.01.1.2 Advanced Placement examination; or
 - 2.01.1.3 One (1) or more CLEP examinations.

- 2.01.2 As determined by the division, post-secondary credit will also be awarded upon successful completion of, but not limited to:

 - iii. 2.17.2.3 Out-of-state tuition waivers for undergraduate students from contiguous states in close proximity to a college or university;
 - iv. <u>2.17.2.4</u> Scholarships for transfers from two-year institutions:
 - v. 2.17.2.5 Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
 - vi. 2.17.2.6 Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the institution of higher education for tuition, fees, books, or other costs of attendance:
- (18) <u>2.18</u> "Superscore" means the final composite score that is calculated according to a combination of the highest individual section scores across all of the ACT tests taken by an individual.
- (19) 2.19 "Traditional student" means a student who:
 - (a) <u>2.19.1</u> Will enter postsecondary education as a full-time first-time freshman on or before the fall semester of the academic year that begins immediately following:
 - (a) 2.19.1.1 The student's graduation from high school; or

- (b) 2.19.1.2 The last day of the school year:
 - (1) 2.19.1.2.a That would have been the student's junior or senior year of high school; and
 - (2) 2.19.1.2.b In which the student completes the requirements for high school graduation and obtains a General Educational Development certificate instead of receiving a diploma; and
- (ii) 2.19.2 Remains continuously enrolled as a full-time student;
- (B) 2.20 "Traditional student" includes a student who otherwise meets this definition but delays entering postsecondary education under a scholarship hold approved by the Division of Higher Education.
- 2.21 "Verification roster" means an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.

Procedures

3.00 Basic Eligibility Requirements.

- 3.01 The basic requirements for an applicant to be eligible for an award from the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program are:
 - (1) (A) 3.01.1 The applicant has been an Arkansas resident for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
 - (B) 3.01.2 If the applicant is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the applicant or a parent or guardian of the applicant shall have maintained Arkansas residency for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
 - (C) (i) 3.01.2.1 To be considered an Arkansas resident, an applicant shall demonstrate residency by evidence deemed sufficient to the Division of Higher Education.
 - (ii) 3.01.2.2 Evidence of residency may include without limitation information provided by the applicant on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Division of Education for federal financial aid.
 - (D) 3.01.3 During the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date an applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education if the person for whom the twelve-month period is calculated under subdivision (1)(A) or (1)(B) of this section is deployed outside of Arkansas under military orders, the Division of Higher Education shall calculate the twelve (12) months by:

- (i) 3.01.3.1 Excluding months of military deployment outside of Arkansas that are within the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education; and
- (ii) 3.01.3.2 Including months the person maintained Arkansas residency immediately preceding the military deployment outside of Arkansas;
- (2) 3.01.4 The applicant is a citizen of the United States or is a lawful permanent resident;
- (3) (A) 3.01.5 The applicant is accepted for admission as a full-time student or part-time student at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to or is creditable toward:
 - (a) 3.01.5.1 A baccalaureate degree;
 - $\frac{\text{(b)}}{\text{3.01.5.2}}$ An associate degree;
 - (e) 3.01.5.3 A certificate from a qualified certificate program; or
 - (d) 3.01.5.4 A graduate-level or professional degree; or
 - (ii) 3.01.5.5 An approved school of nursing in a program of study that leads to a nursing diploma under § 6-85-213.
 - (B) 3.01.5.6 A full-time student shall enroll in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Division of Higher Education.
 - (C) 3.01.5.7 A part-time student shall complete at least six (6) semester hours but less than the minimum number of semester hours for a full-time student, as defined by the Division of Higher Education.
- (4) 3.01.6 The applicant has not met the maximum continuing education eligibility requirements under Arkansas Code § 6-85-210;
- (5) <u>3.01.7</u> The applicant does not owe a refund on a federal or state student financial aid grant for higher education;
- (6) 3.01.8 The applicant is not in default on a state or federal student financial aid loan for higher education;
- (7) 3.01.9 The applicant has not borrowed, as determined by the approved

institution of higher education to be attended, in excess of the annual loan limits under the Federal Family Educational Loan Program Systems, William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, Income Contingent Loan Demonstration Program, Stafford Loan Program, Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students Program, or Supplemental Loan for Students Program in the same academic year for which the student has applied for assistance under this rule;

- (8) 3.01.10 The applicant is not incarcerated at the time of the application for or during the time the applicant receives a scholarship under this rule:
- (9) 3.01.11 The applicant has complied with United States Selective Service System requirements for registration;
- (10) 3.01.12 The applicant has completed and submitted to the United States Division of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Division of Education for federal financial aid; and
- (11) 3.01.13 The applicant certifies that he or she is drug-free and pledges in writing on the application form to refrain from the use or abuse of illegal substances in order to become eligible and maintain eligibility for this program.

4.00 Additional Eligibility Requirements for Traditional Students.

- 4.01 In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a traditional student if the applicant:
 - (1) <u>4.01.1</u> Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and has a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
 - (2) 4.01.2 Has a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C § 1400 et seq., as it existed on July 1, 2009, and graduated from an Arkansas public high school, and either:
 - (A) 4.01.2.1 Had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
 - (3) 4.01.3 Achieved a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; and
 - (B) 4.01.3.1 Graduated from a private high school, an out-of-state high school, or a home school high school; or
 - (C) 4.01.3.2 In the year in which the student would have been a junior or senior in high school, completed the requirements for

high school graduation and obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce_Services_ instead of receiving a diploma; or


- (4) 4.01.4 Meets the following criteria:
 - (D) 4.01.4.1 Was enrolled at an institution of higher education in the immediately preceding academic year as a full-time, first-time freshman:
 - (E) 4.01.4.2 Did not receive a scholarship under this rule as a first-time, full-time freshman;
 - (F) 4.01.4.3 Successfully completed with the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D" at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours of courses as a full-time, first-time freshman; and
 - (G) 4.01.4.4 Achieved a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale as a full-time, first –time freshman.

5.00 Additional eligibility requirements for a nontraditional student.

- 5.01 In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a nontraditional student if the applicant meets one (1) of the following requirements:
 - (5) 5.01.1 If the applicant has not been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has graduated from an Arkansas public high school, a private high school, an out-of- state high school, a home school high school, or obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services and had a minimum superscore of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or
 - (6) <u>5.01.2</u> If the applicant has been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has earned a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.

6.00 Continuing eligibility.

- (a) (1) (A) 6.01 A recipient who meets continuing eligibility criteria under this rule shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year renewable annually until the recipient has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours.
- (B) 6.02 A recipient may continue to receive a scholarship after he or she has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, if the student is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120)



credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this rule immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that academic year.

- (ii) 6.07.2.2 The Division shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.
- (C) 6.07.2.3 By accepting scholarship funds under this rule, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree.
- (7) <u>6.07.3</u> If enrolling in one (1) or more remedial courses, complete all remedial courses required by the approved institution of higher education by the time the student completes the first thirty (30) semester hours attempted after receiving the scholarship;
- (8) <u>6.07.4</u> Earn a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale_at an approved institution of higher education;
- (9) <u>6.07.5</u> Enroll in courses that lead toward a baccalaureate degree or graduate-level or professional degree after attempting the lesser of:
 - (A) 6.07.5.1 Five (5) semesters; or
 - (B) 6.07.5.2 The completion of an associate degree program; and
- (10) <u>6.07.6</u> Meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Division of Higher Education.
- (b) 6.08 A traditional student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply as a first-time nontraditional student.
 - (2) 6.08.1 A recipient under subdivision (e)(1) of this section 6.08 who loses eligibility for the nontraditional student scholarship is not eligible to apply for a scholarship under any eligibility provision of this rule.
- (e) <u>6.09</u> If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under subsection (c) of this section <u>6.08</u> due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family member of the recipient, the Division may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

7.00 Scholarship award amounts.

(a) The General Assembly may use net proceeds from the state lottery to fund the scholarships awarded under this rule and to supplement the state-supported student financial assistance that

the General Assembly determines is necessary to meet the state's objective for broadening and increasing access of Arkansas citizens to higher education.

- (b) Net proceeds from the state lottery used to fund scholarships under this rule shall:
 - (1) Be used exclusively for the purposes set out in Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 87, and this rule; and
 - (2) Supplement and shall not supplant nonlottery state educational resources.
- (c) The scholarships established under this rule are subject to available funding and do not create for any student an entitlement to financial assistance to enable the student's attendance at an approved institution of higher education.
- (d)(1)(A)-7.01 Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award amount under this rule for an academic year for a full-time recipient enrolled in a four-year approved institution of higher education is:
 - (i) 7.01.1 One thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a recipient who has earned less than twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours;
 - (ii) 7.01.2 Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least twenty- seven (27) semester credit hours but less than fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours;
 - (iii) 7.01.3 Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least fifty- seven (57) semester credit hours but less than eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours; and
 - (iv)(a) 7.01.4 Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a recipient who has earned at least eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours but no more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232, then up to the number of credit hours required to complete the baccalaureate program.
 - (b) 7.01.4.1 A recipient shall receive no more than one (1) year of the scholarship provided under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section 7.01.4 unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours as provided under Arkansas Code § 6-61-232.
 - (c) (1) 7.01.4.2 A recipient who is eligible to receive the scholarship under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section 7.01.4 may receive the scholarship while enrolled in a semester as a part-time student.
 - (2) 7.01.4.3 The scholarship amount for the semester in which a recipient is enrolled as a part-time student under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(iv)(c)(1) of this section 7.01.4.2 shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the recipient is

enrolled.

(B)(i) 7.02 To determine the correct scholarship award amount based on credit hours, a first-time recipient shall submit a current college or university transcript if the first-time recipient has earned any semester credit hours to the Division of Higher Education no later than a date determined by the division prior to the academic year for which the first-time recipient will receive an initial scholarship award.

(ii) 7.02.1 A first-time recipient who does not submit a transcript to the Division on or before the date determined by the division shall receive the award amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A)(i) of this section 7.01.1.

(C)(i) 7.03 An applicant may elect for the earned semester credit hours under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section 7.01 to be only those semester credit hours earned after graduating from high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services.

- (ii) 7.03.1 If the applicant makes the election under subdivision (d)(1)(C)(i) of this section 7.03, any semester credit hours earned through concurrent credit or any other method before graduating high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Division of Workforce Services_shall not be counted as earned semester credit hours for the purposes of determining a recipient's scholarship award amount under subdivision (d)(1)(A) of this section 7.01.
 - (2)(A) The Division shall award 7.04 An aggregate amount of scholarship awards to nontraditional students of up to fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000) shall be awarded to nontraditional students.
 - (B)(i) The Division shall return to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery the excess funding, if any, 7.04.1 Any excess funding that the Division of Higher Education receives for scholarship awards the Division received under Arkansas Code § 23-115-801 shall be returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery.
- (ii) The office shall deposit any funds received from the Division under this subdivision—(d)(2)(B) into the Lottery Scholarship Trust Account_established under § 23-115-801(b).
 - (C) 7.04.2 Priority for scholarships awarded to nontraditional students is based on:
 - (i) 7.04.2.1 The applicant's level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree; or
 - (ii) 7.04.2.2 Other criteria established by the Division of Higher Education division.

(3) 7.04.3 Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award for an academic year for a full-time student enrolled in one (1) of the following institutions of higher education is one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the first year and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the second year: (A) 7.04.3.1 A two-year approved institution of higher education; (B) _A branch campus of a four-year approved institution of higher education; or (C) 7.04.3.3 An approved school of nursing. Subject to the availability of net revenue, the scholarship award (4) 7.04.4 amount for a part-time student recipient shall be: (A) 7.04.4.1 One-half (1/2) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least six (6) semester hours but less than nine (9) semester hours; or (B) 7.04.4.2 Three-quarters (3/4) of the award amount for a fulltime student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least nine (9) semester hours but less than the number of hours required for a fulltime student recipient. (5) 7.04.5 A current recipient who maintains eligibility for the scholarship under this rule shall continue to receive the scholarship award amount first awarded to the recipient. (6) 7.04.6 The division shall give priority for a scholarship award to a fulltime or part-time student: (A) 7.04.6.1 Who meets the eligibility requirements under this rule; and (B) 7.04.6.2 Whose parent, by birth or legal adoption: (i) 7.04.6.2.a Was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the United States Armed Forces or whose official residence is in Arkansas: and 7.04.6.2.b Was a member of the United States (ii) Armed Forces who was killed while performing military duty: In a status identified under 32 (a) 7.04.6.2.b.i U.S.C. § 101 et seq. or 10 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. as they existed on January 1, 2011; or

- (C) 7.06.1.3 Last, in the event funding is insufficient to fully fund students under subdivision (h)(2)(A) or (h)(2)(B) of this sections 7.06.1.1 or 7.06.1.2, to students who have the highest postsecondary grade point average.
- (3)(A) 7.06.2 If after funding all students with continuing eligibility under this section <u>rule</u> funding is insufficient to fund all qualified first-time applicants, the division shall award—scholarships will be awarded to first-time applicants in order of priority based upon the applicants' ACT superscore or ACT-equivalent superscore.
- (B) 7.06.3 If after prioritizing first-time applicants based upon the applicants' ACT or ACT equivalent scores funding is insufficient to fund all applicants with like ACT or ACT equivalent scores, the division shall determine who receives an award by random drawing scholarships will be determined by lot from the remaining pool of applicants with like ACT or ACT equivalent scores.

<u>8.00</u> Payments of Scholarships.

- (A) 8.01 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall disburse scholarships to the approved institution of higher education of the student's choice. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall send funds to the institution via electronic funds transfer or state warrant.
- After verification of full time enrollment, the institution of higher education verifies that the student is enrolled, the institution of higher education will disburse the scholarship to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures.
 - 8.02.1 The scholarship payment will shall correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institution of higher education. In no instance may however, the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational academic year shall not be paid to or on behalf of such student in advance.

(B) Transfer of Scholarships to another Approved Institution

- 8.03 A recipient who has received an Academic Challenge Scholarship may transfer the scholarship to another approved Arkansas institution of higher education, provided that:
 - 1. 8.03.1 The student notifies the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division of the change of status by October 1 for the fall term and by February 1 for the winter and/or winter term, spring term, or summer term by changing the college on the student's ADHE YOUniversal financial aid account managed by the division;

(C) Repayment of Scholarships

- 8.04 If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution of higher education will shall determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses, and recover any overpayments.
 - 8.04.1 Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled. It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayments.

(D) Refunds

The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program is entitled to a refund of the scholarship or loan amount, for that semester, if the 8.05 If a recipient of a scholarship or loan withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after his or her first day of class of the payment period a semester and the situation falls under the refund policy of the institution. The scholarship is required to be refunded to the institution under the institution's refund policy, then the institution shall pay remit the refund to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division.

(E) Overpayment

8.06 If the award of an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student according to the state law (Arkansas Code § 6 80 105) governing the stacking of scholarships, the institution shall follow the ADHE Scholarship Stacking Policy in reducing the student's financial package to prevent the student from receiving funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

9.00 Institutional Responsibilities.

- I. College/University Responsibilities
 - A. Administrative Agreement
 - 9.01 The chief executive officer of the an eligible institution is responsible for appointing one shall appoint a representative from the institution's financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc.
 - 9.01.1 This representative is responsible for <u>student eligibility</u> verification, data <u>management</u> and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

B. Disbursement Records

<u>9.02</u> The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

C. Institutional Verification

- 9.03 The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a verification roster each semester after registration.
 - The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic 9.03.1 Electronic verification rosters will be provided to the Financial Aid Administrator institutions for each semester or trimester as needed.
 - 9.03.2 The electronic verification rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. Students who are enrolled less than full time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term.
 - The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall also provide electronic 9.03.3

 Electronic continuing eligibility rosters will be provided to the Financial Aid Administrator institutions before the end of the spring term.
 - 9.03.4 The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division no later than June 1 to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

D. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

- The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds.

 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Division of Higher Education. 9.04 Institutions shall disburse funds to students no fewer than ten (10) days after receipt of the funds from the division.
 - 9.04.1 For those students whose applications are received by ADHE the division too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

E. Due Diligence

The 9.05 Each institution will exercise due diligence in providing shall provide

complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Division of Higher Education division on any Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program.

9.05.1 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall division will periodically review the institution's records concerning this the program-in-an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

II. Recipient's Responsibilities

It is the recipient's responsibility to 9.06 Each recipient shall notify the Arkansas-Division of Higher Education division of any change in status within 21 days.— This will include: including without limitation:

- <u>9.06.1</u> Change in name;
- 9.06.2 Change in address;
- 9.06.3 Change in institution;
- 9.06.4 Change in full-time status (twelve college credit hours for those students who are in their first fall semester following high school graduation, fifteen college credit hours for those students who are beyond the first fall semester following high school graduation)
- <u>9.07</u> Failure to notify the <u>Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> division of a change of status may affect future eligibility.

10.00 Scholarship hold - Leave of absence.

- (a) 10.01 The Division of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold or a leave of absence for a traditional student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
- (b) 10.02 The reasons for a scholarship hold or a leave of absence may include without limitation:

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS WORKFORCE CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-302 et seq.

APPLICABILITY

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program.

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 1) "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship Program and that is:
 - 1.02.1 (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university; or
 - 1.02.2 (B) A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
- 1.03 (2)(A) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license, including without limitation a program operated or sponsored by a third party.

1.03.1 (B) The credit hours or contact hours awarded for a certificate program may include credit hours or contact hours that are not creditable toward an associate or a baccalaureate degree.

2.00 FUNDING

- 2.01 (1) For an academic year, the following shall be used to fund Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarships under these rules:
 - 2.01.1 (A) Excess funding returned to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-212(d)(2)(B)(i) from the previous academic year; and
 - 2.01.2 (B) Net proceeds remaining from the previous academic year after the Office of the Arkansas Lottery:
 - 2.01.2.1 (i)—Transfers the funds requested by the Division of Higher Education under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-801(c)(2); and
 - 2.01.2.2 (ii)—Deposits the amount necessary to maintain the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 in an amount equal to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).
- 2.02 (2)—A scholarship under these rules shall not be awarded for an academic year if:
 - 2.02.1 (A) Less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is available under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section; or
 - 2.02.2 (B) The Division of Higher Education division received a loan from the Scholarship Shortfall Reserve Trust Account under Ark. Code Ann. § 23-115-802 for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program --Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq., for the previous academic year.
- 2.03 (3) Any funds under subsection (1) 2.01 of this section that are not disbursed for scholarships under these rules shall be carried over to the next academic year to be used for scholarships under these rules.

Procedures

3.00 ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

3.01 (1) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship for an academic year if the student applies to the Division of Higher Education by a date determined by the <u>division Division of Higher Education</u> preceding the academic year and:

- 3.01.1 (A) Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either a parent of the student or the student is an Arkansas resident;
- 3.01.2 (B) Meets either of the following requirements:
 - 3.01.2.1 (i) Graduated from a:
 - 3.01.2.1.1 (a) Public high school in Arkansas or another state;
 - 3.01.2.1.2 (b) Private high school in Arkansas or another state; or
 - 3.01.2.1.3 (e)—Home school as recognized under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-501 et seq. or recognized by another state; or
 - 3.01.2.2 (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Arkansas Division of Workforce Services or another state;
 - 3.01.2.3 (C) Is not receiving a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-201 et seq.;
 - 3.01.2.4 (D) Is accepted for admission in a program of study at an approved institution of higher education that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program in one (1) of the following high-demand fields:
 - 3.01.2.4.1 (i)—Industry;
 - 3.01.2.4.2 (ii) Health care; and
 - 3.01.2.4.3 (iii)Information technology; and
 - 3.01.2.5 (E)(i) Whose program of study or certificate program will result in the student's being qualified to work in an occupation identified by the Arkansas-Division of Workforce Services under 3.01.2.5.1 subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section.
 - 3.01.2.5.1 (ii)(a) The Division of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Division of Higher Education by March 1 a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section that require the completion of a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certificate program.

- 3.01.2.5.2 (b) The Division of Workforce Services shall publish on its website the list under 3.01.2.5.1 subdivision (1)(E)(ii)(a) of this section and data supporting the list.
- 3.02 (2)-A student who received a scholarship under these rules and successfully completed a program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under subdivision (1)(D) 3.01.2.4 of this section is eligible to reapply for a scholarship under these rules if the student is accepted for admission in a different program of study or certificate program that meets the requirements under 3.01.2.4 subdivision (1)(D) of this section.
- 3.03 (3) A student who received a scholarship under these rules and does not successfully complete the program of study or certificate program is eligible to reapply for and receive a scholarship one (1) time only.

 - 5.03.1.1 The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term.
 - 5.03.1.2 The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester.
 - 5.03.2 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed.
 - 5.03.2.1 The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term.
 - 5.03.3 The Arkansas Division of Higher Education division shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term.
 - 5.03.3.1 The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the division Arkansas Division of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.
- 5.04 (D) Deadlines for disbursement of funds.
 - 5.04.1 The deadline for disbursement of funds by the eligible institution is no later than ten (10) days after receipt of funds.
 - 5.04.1.1 Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the <u>division</u> Arkansas Division of Higher Education.
 - 5.04.1.2 For those students whose applications are received by the division ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within ten (10) working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

5.05 5) Due diligence.

- 5.05.1 The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> on any Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient.
- 5.05.2 In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship.
- 5.05.3 The <u>division Arkansas Division of Higher Education</u> shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.
- <u>5.06</u> (F) Agreements Between Institutions.
 - 5.06.1 An approved institution of higher education may enter into agreements with other institutions of higher education, including without limitation technical institutes, to allow students enrolled in the approved institution of higher education under these rules to take courses at the other institutions of higher education.

DIVISION OF HIGHER EDUCATION RULES GOVERNING THE ARKANSAS CONCURRENT CHALLENGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM Effective Date:

POLICY STATEMENT

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Education, Division of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements and procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

APPLICABLE ARKANSAS CODE

Act 456 of 2019 Ark. Code Ann. § 6-85-401 et seq.

APPLICABILITY

This rule is applicable to students who are eligible for a scholarship under the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program.

1.00 DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 "Academic year" means a measure of the academic work to be accomplished by the recipient.
 - 1.01.1 The academic year is defined as fall, spring, and summer semesters, in that order.
- 1.02 + "Approved Institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education that:
 - 1.02.1 a. Is approved by the Division of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship Program;
 - 1.02.2 b. Offers at least a fifty percent (50%) discount on the tuition and mandatory fees of an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program to a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program, unless other opportunities are provided that lower the tuition and mandatory fees below fifty percent (50%); and
 - <u>1.02.3</u> e. Is a:
 - 1.02.3.1 i. State-supported two-year or four-year college or university;

- 1.02.3.2 ii. Private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university that has its primary headquarters located in Arkansas and that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
- 1.03 2) "Eligible course" means any endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 1.04 3) "Certificate program" means a program that is offered or made available to a student by an approved institution of higher education that leads to the obtainment of a certification or license.
 - 1.04.1 This definition does not include a program operated or sponsored by a third party.
- 4) "Endorsed concurrent enrollment course" means a college-level course offered by an approved institution of higher education in Arkansas that upon completion would qualify for academic credit in both the approved institution of higher education and a public high school that;
 - 1.05.1 a.—Is in one (1) of the four (4) core areas of math, English, science, and social studies;
 - 1.05.2 b. Meets the requirements of § 6-16-1204(b); and
 - <u>1.05.3</u> e. Is listed in the Arkansas Course Transfer System of the <u>division</u> Division of Higher Education;
 - 1.05.3.1 This definition does not include programs operated or sponsored by a third party;
- 1.06 5) "Student" means a person who has sophomore, junior or senior status and who is enrolled at a:
 - 1.06.1 a. Public high school in Arkansas;
 - 1.06.2 b. Private high school in Arkansas; or
 - 1.06.3 e. Home school, as defined in § 6-15-501 et seq.;
- 1.07 6) "Student success plan" means a plan developed by school personnel in collaboration with parents and the student that is reviewed annually.
 - 1.07.1 The plan shall, at a minimum:
 - 1.07.1.1 a. Guide the student along pathways to graduation;

- 1.07.1.2 b. Address accelerated learning opportunities;
- 1.07.1.3 e. Address academic deficits and interventions; and
- <u>1.07.1.4</u> d. Include college and career planning components;
- $\underline{1.08}$ 7) "Third party" means a person or entity that does not receive disbursement directly from the $\underline{\mathbf{Dd}}$ ivision for this program, including a subcontractor of the institution.

2.00 ELIGIBILITY

- 2.01 4) A student is eligible to receive an Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship for an academic semester or academic year during which the student is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program if the student:
 - 2.01.1 a. Is an Arkansas resident or, if the student is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the student or one (1) parent of the student is an Arkansas resident; and
 - <u>2.01.2</u> b. Provides proof that a completed student success plan has been submitted to the student's high school or home school.
- 2.02 2) The student success plan for a student who is enrolled in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program shall:
 - <u>2.02.1</u> a. Be prepared in consultation with school personnel, the student, and the student's parent or legal guardian or a college advisor.
 - 2.02.2 b. Include an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program that is relevant to the student's success plan and include measures that ensure the successful completion of the endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program in which the student is enrolled.
 - 2.02.3 e. A student whose enrollment in a vocational center is reimbursable under § 6-51-305 is not eligible for a scholarship under this program.
 - 2.02.4 d. Students must meet all established requirements for endorsed concurrent enrollment courses set by the Division of Higher Education.

3.00 CONTINUING ELIGIBILITY

3.01 4) A student is eligible to continue to receive the Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarship if the student successfully completes an endorsed concurrent credit

- course or certificate program course and receives a minimum grade point average of 2.5.
- 3.02 2) A student who fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 shall retain eligibility and enroll in no more than one (1) endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course for the first semester following the semester in which the student failed to successfully complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course.
 - 3.02.1 a. If a student fails to complete an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course a second time, the student shall be ineligible to reapply or receive the scholarship again.
 - 3.02.1.1 This also applies to a student that drops out of an endorsed concurrent credit course or certificate program course before the end of the semester.

4.00 AMOUNT OF AWARDS

- 4.01 4)-If funds are available, the Division of Higher Education shall award Arkansas Concurrent Challenge Scholarships to all students eligible for the scholarship for the fall, and spring or summer terms.
- 4.02 2) The maximum scholarship award a student may receive in an academic year shall be the lesser of:
 - 4.02.1 a. Five hundred dollars (\$500)
 - 4.02.1.1 i.—Eligible students shall be awarded one-hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) for each eligible course the student is enrolled, up to two (2) eligible courses per semester; or
 - 4.02.2 b. The actual tuition and mandatory fees cost to the student for up to two (2) eligible courses per semester.

- <u>5.05.2</u> In addition, the approved institution of higher education will exercise due diligence in complying with these rules.
- <u>5.05.3</u> The division may periodically review the approved institution of higher education's records concerning this scholarship program to ensure the compliance with due diligence requirements.

5.06 6) Course eligibility.

5.06.1 The approved institution of higher education is responsible for verifying that the endorsed concurrent credit courses and certificate program courses meet the requirements set in Ark. ansas Code Ann. § 6-16-1202 and policies of the division.

6.00 HIGH SCHOOL AND HOME SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.01 The high school or home school shall provide certification of eligibility for a student to enroll in an endorsed concurrent enrollment course or certificate program.
- 6.02 A high school or home school shall verify the completion of the student's student success plan before certifying that a student is eligible for the scholarship.
