- 1. Incorporate sexual assault prevention information through advising and freshman orientation.
 - A. UA-PTC Academic Advisors includes Title IX information in the new student advising packet, since summer 2017 for incoming students.
 - B. UAPTC New Student Orientation includes Title IX slides, since summer 2017 for incoming students.
- 2. Integrate information about the prevention of sexual assault into coursework where appropriate.
 - A. College Pathways has integrated sexual assault course content since the Fall of 2016 and will continue to offer sexual assault prevention content to first semester, first-time, entering students enrolled in College Pathways sections. This topic is covered during the "Personal Safety Strategies" section of the course.
 - B. Title IX Statement is mandatory on all course syllabi.
- 3. Identify opportunities to raise awareness of and provide resources for prevention across all student populations.
 - A. UAPTC will begin offering Vector's Sexual Assault Prevention Training for Community Colleges this upcoming Fall 2023 Term. The 45-minute course will be available online to all UAPTC students, faculty, and staff. All online participation will be electronically tracked and recorded.
 - B. Health Fair

UA-PTC students, staff, and faculty can get free health screenings and lots of information about health and wellness at the UA-PTC Spring Wellness Fair. Glucose and blood pressure screenings will be available as well as diabetic risk tests. Participants will be able to sign up for SNAP benefits and learn about other benefits. 6. Identify other topics relating to the prevention and reduction of sexual assault.
